Unit information officers help publicize activities

"It's no problem," said Gunnery Sergeant Victor Swanson, 1st Radio Battalion, about his duties as unit information officer.

"The main thing is getting cooperation from other offices on station, and that cooperation is there. Everything runs smoothly."

Swanson, a career planner, is one of many Marines and sailors who are assigned extra or collateral duty as a UIO. The UIO's job is to help publicize his unit and the personnel in it, according to the SOP for Public Affairs.

UIOs serve as a point of contact for their unit as well as the Joint Public Affairs Office. They maintain a liaison with JPAO concerning any tours of their unit given by the Public Affairs Community Relations Chief.

Any promotions, achievements, or other newsworthy events are passed on to JPAO, where there is normally a channel for its publication.

"I don't have any problems finding news," said Swanson. "There is usually enough going on. In our unit, the career planner is usually the UIO because he's the one who gets a chance to see everyone that reports into the unit."

The Fleet Home Town News release program is also the responsibility of the UIO. This program ensures that most accomplishments of service members have the opportunity to be published in home town newspapers.

UIOs must ensure that the releases are accurately completed by individuals and then sent to JPAO. The releases are then

forwarded to Fleet Home Town News Center, Norfolk, Va., where they are then distributed to the various home towns

"We have the Fleet Home Town News system down pretty good," said Captain Diane Higgs, UIO for Marine Air Control Squadron-2. "The troops usually come in on time to fill the releases out."

Higgs, Air Defense Control Officer, has other collateral duties besides UIO. "I'm NBC Officer, Human Affairs Officer, and Drug and Alcohol Abuse Control Officer," she said.

"I can't spend as much time as

UIO as I'd like to, but it's pretty rewarding. My UIO duties take a couple hours a week, and I have a trusty sergeant who does a lot of the paperwork."

Like Higgs, First Lieutenant Lamont Boileau, UIO for Headquarters Company, 3d Marines, also has other collateral duties.

"I'm company commander, Data Processing Officer, unit representative, and Drug and Alcohol Abuse Officer," he suid. "I have a clerk for my UIO and drug and alcohol abuse dutics. We

Boileau, who spends approxi-mately 1½ to 2 hours a week on UIO duties, said that the only problem he encounters is timeliness.

also have our own bi-monthly company paper called 'Times,' which I oversee."

"When I have something that I think is important and 1 need press coverage, it has to be done on a timely basis," he said.

Timely news can be a training operation, change of command, or even a public relations function with members of the civilian community

The Marines were at it again, spreading Christmas cheer to children in the civilian community.

"We called various places to inquire about the children and a place for the party. Catholic Services' Center referred us to Kalihi Family Services, who gathered the children for us."

Nathan Chang, supervisor for Kalihi Family Services Center, said that he children came from

diverse backgrounds. "The children were 9 to 12 years old," he said. "We opened the event to the whole community, but the purpose was for the underprivileged children from low to middle income families."

Alvarado said that the food was supplied by McDonalds. "Every one in MAIS-24 Comm donated so we could buy the food, decorations, prizes, and the items for the grab bags," she said.

Among the group of youngsters were three children from Makaha Child Abuse Center, "The child Child Abuse Center. "The child abuse center called and said they had three children they wanted to come to the party," said Lance Corporal Chris Pittman, committee member. "So I went down there and picked them up."

The Marines also had prizes for game winners, a door prize, and a prize for the best color grawing.

"This is a great idea," said Alvarado. "Some of these kids don't know what Christmas is all about. This helps them to have a better Christmas than they would have had."

And, judging from the 75 smiling faces, it was not only a great idea, but a great party.

After handing out presents, the teens spent time talking with the seniors. "They seem to really appreciate our coming out here," snid Mike Vezina, 19. "We're glad we could make their Christmas a

High winds and syrup cause electricians to glow

The office is examped, with elipbounds and key boxes lining the walls. An old file cabinet stands mule in one corner. The linoleum testifies to the heavy struffic in and out of the room. The two men who share this space as an office know the meaning of pressure.

"We put in over two weeks of the storm." said Dennis Shewell, Facilities Electric Shop foreman. We put in over two week's work It may be several weeks more before all the damage is fixed, but the major work has been completed.

Peter Beamer, the office's other occupant, is the high-voltage work leader. He and 13 other men spent eight hours clearing the tangled mess of high-power lines along the groad near Mokapu Gate.

The electricians volunteered to work through the Thanksgiving holiday to restore power as quickly as possible.

The shop has 16 workers, including Shewell, and they've been hard-pressed repairing storm damage together with their normal work load. The shop takes care of all the

station's electrical needs. including maintaining runway navigation lights, galley equipment at both dining facilities, power lines in housing and three high-voltage distribution lines entering the air station at Mokapu Gate. These three 12,000-volt

distribution lines supply all the power for the air station and two of these were destroyed during the hurricane when high winds snapped power poles. The third line, which is buried, was undamaged.

The underground distribution line feeds the area west of Harris Avenue, and when Hawaiian Electric restored power to the station, only that area was able to get electricity. The other two lines were still being replaced.

The shop has several generators for emergencies, and these were in great demand during and after the storm. When the power went out many of these generators, along with others supplied by Brig ide Service Support Group, were already working. Sewage lift stations received the highest priority, though. "Sewage will start backing up within 15 minutes of a power outage in some

helper, was assigned to generator crow during the storn and the experience revived of memories. "I was an Arm memories. "I was an Army specialist five in Vietnam 12 years ago," he said, "and these are the same type of generators we used

then." Normally, the electricians perform routine work such as electrical wiring for minor construction jobs, replacing street lights and emergency repairs. Although the title "emergency repairs" doesn't sound routine, it normally is, explained Shewell. "Most of the damage to power lines here is caused by salt corrosion." corrosion.

Some emergency calls aren't routine, just hilarious. Shewell related one incident. "When I got to the house (in station housing), the fire department and military police had the power disconnected and the house evacuated," he said.

He was escorted to one of the bathrooms where a mysterious black fluid was seeping out of the wall above the sink. "They thought it was some electrical insulation melting from a short or compatibing. It didn't back or small something. It didn't look or smell like anything electrical, so I tasted it... and it tasted like cough syrup. l opened the mediaine calinet and there is was. A bottle of cough syrup lying on its side, dripping

away The joke was on everyone, but there have been times when the incident wasn't funny. "One time, a power line came down in housing and fell across three parked cars, destroying them." he said. Lackily no one was injured. "There is danger involved with our work," Shewell said, "but with proper safety procedures, it's as safe as being a doctor." No one has been injured on the job here during bit two years as foreman and that

his two years as foreman, and that attests to the skill of all the safetyconscious workers.
