## Welcome home

## 37th MAU returns

Yellow ribbons, hula dancers, banners, hands and open arms greeted the Marines of the 37th Marine Amphibious Unit as they returned home after nearly six months on patrol in the Western Pacific and Indian Oceans.

The Marines arrived Feb. 15 when their ships, the USS Belleau Wood (LHA-3), the USS Ogden (LPD-5) and the USS Cayuga (LST-1186) pulled into port at Pearl Harbor.

The 37th MAU was comprised of Marines from Battalion Landing Team, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines; Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron (Composite) 262; and Marine Amphibious Unit Service Support Group-37.

While on deployment, the Marines participated in several exercises including Jade Tiger, conducted last December in the Middle East. Jade Tiger, a Rapid Deployment Joint Task Force (RDJTF) exercise, involved the United States Marine Corps, Navy, Army and Air Force, in addition to three Middle Eastern and African countries.

According to Major Richard Morrell, operations and training officer, BLT 2/3, the exercise involved a desert landing and simulated the reinforcement of an allied country.

Supported by an entire carrier battle group, the MAU landed as the spearhead of the larger RDJTF in conjunction with the Near Term Prepositioning Ships Program out of Diego Garcia in the Indian Ocean.

In addition to Jade Tiger, the Marines participated in the exercise Valiant Usher 83-3 in Berbera, Somalia in November. According to Morrell, it was the first time a Marine unit had conducted a landing in the area.

The two-day exercise involved both air and amphibious landings and the simulated evacuation of American nationals from the area.

Valiant Usher 83-2, basically an all air operation, according to Morrell, was conducted in Lancelin, Australia. The exercise was highlighted by live naval gunfire and artillery support provided by Marines from Battery B, 1st Battalion 12th Marines.

During their deployment, the Marines also cross-trained with Somali forces and Philippine Marines and participated in exchange visits with Singapore commandos. While in Hong Kong, the Marines visited the 2d Battalion, 2d Gurkha Regiment, King Edward VII's Own, who later came aboard the ships and viewed static displays.

"Although many of the exercises were high level, sensitive exercises," said Morrell, "everything went well and the countries were extremely happy to have us there."

It was not all work for the Marines, however. Liberty was enjoyed in such exotic ports as Perth, Australia; Hong Kong; the Philippines; Singapore; Berbera, Somalia; Okinawa; and Diego Garcia.

Although far from family and

friends, the deployed Marines enjoyed Christmas in Singapore and rang in the new year while on liberty in the Philippines. According to Morrell, several American families living in both cities opened their homes to the Marines to share the holiday season. The Marine Corps' 207th birthday was celebrated with the usual cake cutting ceremony and birthday balls while in Australia.

"We did some good exercises and pulled some good liberty," said Captain Jack Sparks, officer in charge of the advance party, "but we're glad to be back."

The Marines are not the only ones glad that they are back home. "Ecstatic, nervous, upset and excited," was the way Dedra Jenkins described her emotions as she waited for her husband, Corporal Gaius Jenkins, Headquarters and Service Company, to get off the ship.

Doreen Perez greeted her husband, Corporal Carlos Perez at the docks with their 3-month-old daughter, Angel. "It's good to be back, especially seeing my daughter for the first time," said Cpl Perez. "But I'm glad I made the float," he continued. "I'm proud of these Marines and I'm proud to be a part of BLT 2/3."

The Marines of BLT 2/3, HMM9C-262 and MSSG-37 are home at last, being replaced in the Western Pacific by the Marines of BLT 1/3, HMM(C)-265 and MSSG-31, scheduled to return home sometime this summer.

## Many contributions black Americans made to their country

WASHINGTON... February is Black History Month. Black Americans have made many contributions to their country, and the following is a list of significant events in black history that occurred during only one month, February.

Feb. 1, 1865 — John S. Rock was the first black lawyer to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Feb. 1, 1957 — Perry H. Young became the first black airplane pilot on a scheduled passenger line. He was co-pilot on a 12 passenger S-58 helicopter between New York International, La Guardia and Newark, N.J., airports.

Feb. 1, 1966 — Captain T.D. Parham Jr., CHC, USN, became the first black captain in the U.S.

Navy.

Feb. 1, 1978 — Harriet Tubman was commemorated by having a postage stamp — the first to recognize a black woman — issued in her honor. The stamp was issued in Washington, D.C.

Feb. 2, 1870 — Jonathan Jasper Wright, the first black jurist appointed as an associate justice of a state supreme court, began service on the state supreme court of South Carolina. He served until Dec. 1, 1877.

Feb. 3, 1947 — Percival L. Prattis was the first black news correspondent admitted to the House of Representatives and Senate press gallery. He worked for Our World in New York City.

Feb. 8, 1865 — Major Martin Robinson Delany, U.S. Army,

became the first black commissioned as a major in the Army. He was assigned to Charleston, S.C., during Civil War reconstruction.

Feb. 8, 1944 — Harry McAlpin, the first black news correspondent accredited to the White House, attended his first White House press conference. He represented the Atlanta Daily World and the press service of the Negro Newspaper Publishers Association.

Feb. 11, 1958 — The first black woman to become a flight attendant — Ruth Carol Taylor — worked on a Mohawk Airlines flight between Ithaca, N.Y. and New York City.

Feb. 12, 1865 — Rev. Dr. Henry H. Garnet became the first black preacher to deliver a sermon in the

House of Representatives. Garnet was pastor of the 15th Street Presbyterian Church in Washington, D.C., and was invited by President Abraham Lincoln to conduct the special service.

Garnet preached a sermon commemorating the triumph of the Union Army and the deliverance of the country from chattel slavery. He was the first black allowed in the House; previously, blacks had been forbidden to enter the grounds.

Feb. 14, 1977 — Clifford L. Alexander Jr. was sworn in as the first black Secretary of the Army. He had previously served in the New York National Guard.

Feb. 15, 1879 — Sen. B.K. Bruce, a Republican from Mississippi, was the first black senator to

preside over the U.S. Senate.

Feb. 20, 1952 — Emmett Littleton Ashford was the first black umpire in organized baseball. He was in the Class C Southwestern International League.

Feb. 21, 1949 — Mary McLeon Bethune was the recipient of the first honorary degree awarded a black woman by a southern white college. She received an honorary Doctor of Humanities degree from Rollins College, Winter Park, Fla.

Feb. 23, 1962 — Wilma Rudolph was the first black woman awarded the James E. Sullivan Memorial trophy presented annually by the Amateur Athletic Union. She was cited as the most to advance good sportsmanship

throughout the year.

Feb. 23, 1979 — Frank E. Petersen Jr., was nominated to become the first black general in the U.S. Marine Corps. He was the 30th black to achieve the rank of general or admiral.

Feb. 25, 1870 — Hiram Rhodes Revels is sworn in as the first black U.S. senator. He was elected by the legislature of Mississippi for an unexpired term beginning March 4, 1865, and ending March 3, 1871.

Feb. 27, 1929 — The first black-oriented motion picture — all-talking, all-singing — produced by a major company was shown in New York City. It was named "Hearts in Dixie."

## Patients pay for dental treatment with smiles and kisses

BEIRUT, LEBANON (Delayed) — They came for help from those they call "beautiful people." Some walked 20 miles, others drove. Most were still asleep during that early morning hour, but many came from all areas of this embattled city where death and destruction have become a way of life.

It was a goodwill dental and medical mission for the dental and medical specialists of Marine Service Support Group-24. Under the Medical Civilian Action Program, and as part of the U.S. contingent of the Multi-National peacekeeping force, 17 Navy Corpsmen, eight Marines and volunteer doctors from the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit are giving much of their time to give Lebanese people treatment most never had.

"At first we didn't have anybody come here, but after the word got around we had to turn people away," said Lieutenant Dan Scruggs, a dental officer who normally works at the Naval Hospital in Cherry Point, N.C.

"We have more than we can handle," he said, looking at the citizens waiting to get into his dental chair. "Some of these people sit and wait all day, and sometimes days — just to get to see us."

Lt. Scruggs, one of two dental officers providing the service, said if more equipment and technicians were available, two to three times more than the daily average of 30 to 40 dental patients could be treated each day. "One of the reasons we are so popular is because there is little or not dental care in Beirut."

Dental and medical service provided by MEDCAP is free; however, patients still try to pay. They pay with handshakes, smiles, and a kiss on the cheek. One thankful Lebanese girl said, "This is a very nice thing. We will never forget these beautiful people."

When Hospitalman Third Class Randy Truesdale of Kershaw, S.C., examined a little girl's throat, she smiled and kissed him on the cheek. He turned and said, "This is our pay; they are friendly to us. They are in bad need of our help."

"Back in garrison (the states)

we treat patients, but not like this," he added. Some of this is hard-core stuff. They show us they are thankful. We feel it. To them, we're gold. We put in good day and we know we've done some good."

Located about one mile north of Beirut International Airport, the medical staff sees nothing but the inside of tents from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. During the constant, up hill battle against the wind, cold and rain, they still manage to smile while trying to break the language barrier.

"Most days we hardly have time to take lunch breaks," Chief Hospital Corpsman Glen Dixon said.

"We open our doors here on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The other days we inventory our gear and work with the other half of the crew taking care of Marines."

The medical platoon treats about 100 patients daily. "We do some men, but mostly women and children," the Chief explained. "The people we are treating are those who were most seriously affected by the war and can't afford a doctor."

"We are providing primarily sickcall type treatment. We see

some infected wounds, but primarily rashes, ear-aches, and children with upper respiratory tract infections," Chief Dixon added.

# Intelligence Brief



## THE 7.62mm KALASHNIKOV ASSAULT RIFLE AK-47

Assault rifles are short, compact, selective-fire weapons that fire a cartridge intermediate in power between sub-machine gun and rifle cartridges. Assault rifles have mild recoil characteristics and, because of this, are capable of delivering effective full automatic fire at ranges up to 300 meters.

The Soviet designed Kalashnikov AK-47 assault rifle, a gas-operated, selective fire, box magazine-fed weapon, was the major infantry arm for most Eurasian Communist countries. The Warsaw Pact Armies, however, have generally replaced the AK-47 with the similar, but improved, AKM assault rifle. The AK-47 remains in wide use in Asia and is still used as a substitute standard weapon in most Warsaw Pact Armies. Large numbers of these weapons have also been passed to other nations as military aid, and some have been supplied to insurgent groups. In addition to the Soviet Union, the People's Republic of China, East Germany, Poland, Bulgaria, Romania, North Korea, Hungary, and Yugoslavia have manufactured AK-47's. Finland produces a modified AK-47.

## Property tax refund

Marines who paid California property taxes in 1978 or 1979 are eligible to file a claim for a refund, due to a recent California Court decision.

The case of Armstrong versus San Mateo County interpreted the Proposition 13 increase in California property taxes to have taken effect in 1979 rather than 1975 as was ruled by the State Board of Equalization.

Claims must be filed with the County Board of Supervisors within four years of the date the property tax was paid or by April 10 for taxes paid April 10, 1979.

# At a glance

## New I.D. cards

The Department of Defense will begin testing a new identification card for use by the armed services, the public health service, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The test, called the Real-Time Automated Personnel Identification System Project, RAPIDS, will begin this month and continue for six months at several east coast locations.

Installations to participate in the test are: Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, N.C.; Fort Lee, Va.; Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, N.C.; Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Va.; Military Entrance Processing Station, Richmond, Va.; and USS Portland, LSD-37, homeported in Little Creek, Va.

The goal of the test is to develop a tamper resistant identification card system throughout the Department of Defense and to establish uniform control over the issuance of identification.

## Unemployment compensation

The recent passage

of public law 97-362 implementing the Unemployment Benefits Program has changed the eligibility requirements for unemployment benefits.

Marines who are separated from active duty with an honorable discharge or under honorable conditions may be eligible for up to 13 weeks of unemployment compensation.

Additionally, Marines who are separated prior to completion of their first term because of medical disqualification, pregnancy, parenthood, hardship, service incurred disabilities, or for the convenience of the federal government may be eligible for benefits if they served on active duty for more than 179 days.

Benefit entitlements are based upon

the circumstances of separation.

Application must be made within a Marine's state of residence and a copy of DD form 214 is required to verify military service. Final determination on application rests with the state.

# FMFPac Band stay on the road; practice whenever they can

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii — Watching the Fleet Marine Force Pacific Band, is like seeing musical perfection personified.

With harmonious blasts of the horns, the throbbing drum beat, the enlightening toots of the woodwinds, the Marine minstrels strut with their heads held high, while the drum major, tall and graceful, sets the tempo of march. Spectators explode with applause, indicating that the performance was — as usual — superb.

Even though the band is in heavy demand, Master Sergeant Gil Harris comments, "Compared to other (Marine) bands, we're underworked." As one of the most popular and sought after musical units in the state, the FMFPac Band averages 27 commitments per month. Some days they might perform three times in different locations. Their work has taken them throughout most of the islands in the Hawaiian chain, and to Pasadena, Calif. for the Tournament of Roses Parade, which they attend every other year. By the end of the year they tally approximately 300 engagements.

MSgt Harris, the band's drum major, is the hub of the unit's operation. Aside from leading the 47 members in parades and various other ceremonies, he handles the administrative duties, coordinates field routines, and trains new bandmen.

He affectionately regards the music makers as "show offs," but declared that they are some of the best musicians he has ever known. He said their talents are extremely diverse. Some have academic degrees in music; others once taught it. Some play two or three instruments, and a few are dancers. Some even sing.

To further attest to their diversity, the band, which has two working combos, can be reorganized to accommodate whatever commitment they might have: dance, concert and marching.

The FMFPac Band is a separate unit, however they are administratively spread out in triplicate. They belong to Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Brigade at Marine Corps Air Station Kaneohe Bay, and they are tasked with commitments from the Public Affairs Office at Camp H.M. Smith. They live and work out of buildings that belong to the Marine Barracks here.

Harris boasts that the unit has a repertoire of music ranging from classical symphony to rock, and they have 15 marches memorized. "We can play basically anything and everything. We try to get in as much of a variety as possible," he said.

A typical non-commitment day for the band normally begins orchestra rehearsal. The afternoons are reserved for practicing marching routines, and any time in between allows for the combo groups to get together and swing through a few jazz and popular numbers. The same enthusiasm that sparks actual performances, kindles the rehearsals.

"But sometimes we don't get to practice much," said Harris. "We're so busy going from one commitment to another that we have to do it whenever we can."

To add to the time squeeze, Harris said the band must also fulfill their Marine Corps requirements. When the moment comes, the bandmen exchange their high-gloss shoes for running sneakers, and tackle the

physical fitness test. Sheets of music give way to pages of the Essential Subjects Test booklet, and instead of concentrating on hitting sharp notes, they focus on dinging bulls' eyes.

"We go out of our way to get our training. It's important, and has a high priority on our list," said Harris.

With a demanding schedule that includes days, nights, weekends and holidays, Harris said the going gets a little turbulent, and they have to be ready to assemble at the spur of the moment. The members feel the pinch, but react with professional attitudes. "Our main purpose is to get the job done, and we don't do it half-heartedly," he said.

Understanding the pressures of being constantly on the go, Harris said the band's staff tries to make things as comfortable as possible for the members. He said the close-knit group often eases the strain by sharing social outings. "When we work, we work. And when we party, we go at it vigorously," he said with a laugh.

But the shortage of personal time is the price they pay for being top-notch performers, and not many — if any of them — would trade the praise and kudos.

They have a trophy case stocked full of awards, and a wall papered with commendations, but Harris said their best prize is an audible one: hearing the thunderous applause from spectators. Although he said every performance is equally as important, they especially get a charge out of performing at changes of command ceremonies because, "all the troops are there, and we can really put it to 'em."

He was sentenced to six months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for six months, reduction to private and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

**Lance Corporal Michael A. Towner**, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from Dec. 6, 1982 to Jan. 4, 1983.

He was sentenced to 45 days confinement at hard labor and reduction to private.

**Sergeant Paul A. Sey Korn**,

Brigade Service Support Group, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of the wrongful sale, transfer, and possession of marijuana on May 30, 1982; and of the wrongful sale, transfer, and possession of marijuana on June 7, 1982.

He was sentenced to three months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$400 pay per month for three months and reduction to Lance Corporal.

**Private First Class James L. Hawkins**, 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of assaulting other Marines on four occasions, and of communicating a threat to another Marine.

He was sentenced to four months confinement at hard labor, reduction to private, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

**Lance Corporal David J. Ketelle**, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from Nov. 5 to Nov. 13, 1982, from 8 a.m. to Jan. 4 to 8 a.m. Jan. 5, 1983; and of twice missing movement, once through neglect, and once through design.

He was sentenced to four months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$380 pay per month for four months, reduction to private, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

# Marines patrol East Beirut on foot

BEIRUT, Lebanon (Delayed) — They were told that it would be the longest patrol Marines have ever walked in East Beirut. Their destination was circled in grease pencil on the squad leader's map. It was spelled "B'abda" and the Kilo Company Marines from Battalion Landing Team 3/8 had a different pronunciation for the disputed area of this city which contains token elements of Israeli Defense Forces. On that crisp Dec. 14 morning, it looked like a hundred miles from the command post to the top of a steep mountain in the center of B'abda.

Following a patrol briefing, 21-year-old squad leader Sergeant Mike Wallace placed the 13 Marines of his team into position. Taking a deep breath, the Huntington, Ind., Marine shouted for his unit to move out.

The mission of this and an increasing number of other daily foot patrols is to extend the U.S. Marine presence outside the perimeter of the Beirut International Airport and to show American presence in the factually-divided eastern part of the city. For the first B'abda patrol, the flag fluttered at the tip of the squad radioman's antenna.

Ahead for the Marines was a staggering uphill trek. Four vital checkpoints — code-named 96, Ann, Sue and Kerry — and three roadblocks manned by Christian Phalangists and the Lebanese Armed Forces (LAF).

As the squad entered the first road block across the strategic Sidon Road, used by the Israeli Defense Force to support troops remaining in Lebanon, Christian militiamen glared at the heavily armed Americans. The Marines continued to march.

The last man to pass, Corporal Ricky L. Carrier, of Frankfort, Ky., was impressed with the bearing of the Phalangists. "Man, those guys look like they know their business," he commented. Carrier said he felt "if anything was going to happen on this patrol, it was going to happen there."

Wallace stepped to the middle of the muddy, shell-pocked roadway and gave the signal for his squad to increase the interval between men. Checkpoint 96 was some two miles away.

At the checkpoint the Marines' knees began to flex as they began

the ascent to the top of the mountain. Wallace constantly consulted his map to guide the Marines through the twisting, narrow side streets that snaked between them and the final checkpoint that marked the halfway point of the patrol route. Sweat ran in rivulets off the Marines as they conquered the first leg of the trek that took them from 110 feet to 700 feet above sea level.

Although the word was passed to relax, most of the Marines cautiously scanned the buildings and alleyways of B'abda. "So far it's pretty exciting and everyone seems friendly enough," commented Corporal Joseph S. Bailey, a 21-year-old fire team leader from Baltimore. "But everytime we round a corner, I'm not sure what to expect."

At Checkpoint Sue an eight-man Lebanese Army squad manned a .50 caliber machine gun mounted on an armored personnel carrier. They waved happily to the sweaty Marines. A break for a combat ration lunch was called at Checkpoint Kerry. First Lieutenant Bruce Zuest of Klamath Falls, Ore., who went on the patrol as an observer, was

proud of this area on his tactical map. "We named this last checkpoint after my wife," he said with a smile. Zuest and Captain Heath Fox, the Kilo Company commander, joined the patrol to get a first-hand glimpse of the B'abda area.

"The platoon commander and I will pool what we observe about this place and the people, to brief other commanders who may launch foot patrols into this area," explained the Waynesboro, W.Va. native. "Since this is the first time any of our Marines have patrolled here on foot, it gives me a first-hand look at just what can be expected of future patrols."

Finishing his rations, a Marine slowly stretches to massage his aching feet through dusty combat boots. "Most of these people we've met are a lot friendlier than I thought they would be," noted Private First Class Sterling O. Mathews of New York City as he returned a wave from a carload of Lebanese children. Mathews slouched back on a rockpile and shouted to a fellow Marine across the street. "I'm not sure if these are my feet. They sure don't feel like the same ones I started with this morning."

# Motor Transport is on the road

Almost everywhere Marines are found, there is usually a motor transport unit. Motor transport, once taken for granted in many cases, has earned the appreciation of every Marine who had to get from point "A" to "B" via government vehicles.

Take an infantry leatherneck for example. After spending a few days in the sticks humping hills and eating dust, a "deuce and a half" is a welcomed sight. The fighting man knows that once the job is done, the two-ton limousine will whisk him back to the comfort of garrison life.

What about the supply Marine? Moving heavy crates and boxes from one warehouse to another is a breeze with the help of a motor transport truck. And the administration clerk can quickly make his daily runs with a set of wheels, courtesy of motor transport.

Examples like these could go on forever, but the point is clear: without motor transportation, the "green machine" will not move—at least not too far.

Motor Transport Company, Brigade Service Support Group understands that. With an inventory of vehicles ranging from small tactical jeeps, to huge 10-ton tractors, the company can accommodate just about any ground transportation requirement to keep the brigade rolling.

"Sometimes we have as many as 26 vehicles on the road at one time," commented Gunnery Sergeant Gene Hawn, truck master. "We're always hauling people and equipment all over the island. Since the drivers are on the road a lot, we (supervisors) don't get to spend much time with them."

Hawn added that whenever the drivers are in the compound, most of their time is spent tending to their vehicles, then its out and about again.

Last year, the company logged in more than 175,000 miles, carried approximately 15,000 tons of cargo, and transported more than 40,000 passengers. So far, this year's statistics are escalating rapidly.

Motor Transport Company is comprised of five platoons: Headquarters, Maintenance, and three platoons that rotate among the Marine Amphibious Unit Service Support Groups. Hawn said the absence of a full company creates a strain on the Marines left behind. "It gives them more commitments, and we're in a hurt locker for a while. But the Marines do a good job busting their butts to keep things going."

Hawn joked that the motor transport Marines do not believe in holidays because, by being on call any day of the week, those days are the same as any other. Drivers sometimes must wake before dawn to hit the road, and often find themselves returning a couple of hours short of when they first started.

By comparison, Hawn said that motor transport Marines are somewhat unique. "We're double-tasked to an extent because not only do we have to maintain our uniforms and a rifle like other Marines, but we have to worry about the condition of our vehicles too. They need constant attention, and some drivers are responsible for more than one."

Hawn's sentiments are not complaints. They are realities that motor transport Marines must live with because the brigade must move, and their job is to keep it mobile.

It often appears to be a thankless task for the drivers and mechanics, and Hawn said the company's staff realizes that. As a morale booster and a competitive incentive, the company presents two monthly recognition awards: the "Top Clutch" for drivers and the "Top Mechanic." Hawn said the awards are designed to spark better job performance, to let the drivers and mechanics know that their efforts are not ignored, but very much appreciated.

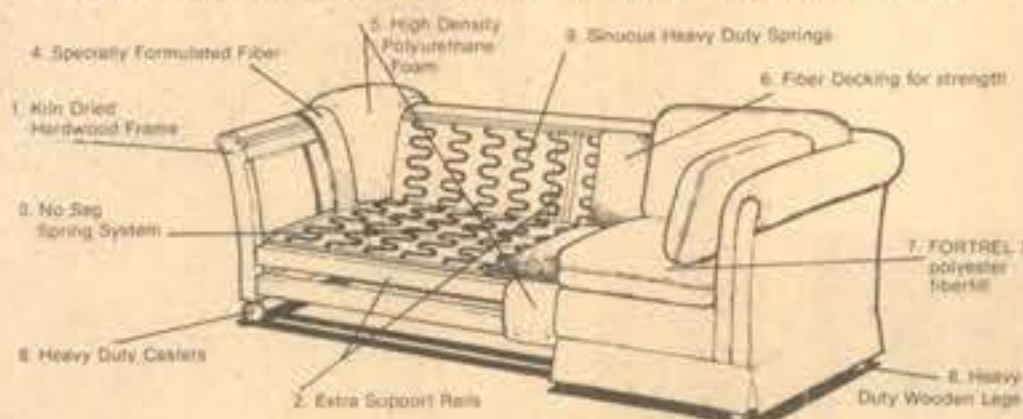

## Air station fisherman tells preference

When most people think of amphibious operations, they picture hundreds of Marines assaulting island beachheads. But ask a typical air station fisherman and he'll tell a different story: His amphibious operation is fishing.

"I fish on both shore and sea," said Master Sergeant Norman R. Kiplinger, Operations Chief, 1st Marine Brigade. "But I prefer shore fishing. The weather doesn't bother you as much."

According to the burly, 39-year-old leatherneck, he first fished when he was 5 or 6 years old. "I was taught to fish by my father," he said. "He was an avid fisherman."

Many mainland fishermen have a dream of fishing in an island paradise. "But, these ocean fish are different than fresh water fish," Kiplinger explained. "It's more difficult to figure out what will make them bite."

Kiplinger tests his baiting skills on "ulus," which is common in the rocky areas of Fort Hase Beach and Pyramid Rock.

"Generally," Kiplinger said, "fishing for them on the air station is better than other parts of the island because of imposed restrictions. By limiting fishing areas, is maintained a sizable stock."

According to Kiplinger, ulus tends to feed during incoming or high tides. "It'll stay full tide for about an hour," he explained. "Anywhere from one hour before to one hour after full tide is known as 'prime time' for fishing."

Ever since prehistoric man first fished on the shores of his primordial domain, the question has remained concerning proper bait for particular fish.

To catch ulus, Kiplinger uses bait not usually found in mainland lakes. "I use either octopus or eel," he said. "These are two of the best baits. You can also use live fish, but you might attract the reef sharks that inhabit the area."

At times, it's just as hard to catch bait as it is to catch fish. "In the winter months, I spend almost

as much time getting bait as I do fishing," Kiplinger said.

"The octopus are here in the summer time when the water's warm. Then, they come in close to shore. But in the winter, they go where the water is more constant."

Kiplinger uses a pole made of fiberglass and bamboo. "Years ago, they used all bamboo rods," he said. "But it doesn't make much difference, as long as the rod is sturdy enough to put pressure on the fish."

Kiplinger has a couple of recipes for cooking ulus. "You can cut it in thin strips and fry it, or you can put it in tin foil, put butter and garlic salt on it, and charcoal broil it. You can also eat it raw, but I like it cooked."

Anthony Gregory, a civilian fisherman, agrees. "It's better when cooked," he said. "But for people who haven't tried it, its taste is hard to describe. They should sample it for themselves."

Like Kiplinger, Gregory feels that fishing at the air station is better than other parts of the island. "Fishing for me is a way to get away and relax," Gregory explained. "You don't have to worry about trouble when fishing on base. There's nobody to bother you, and you can fish to your heart's content."

Being contented is difficult for Gregory when he sees waste among fellow fishermen. "Too many people catch the small ulus, called 'papi,' and keep them," he said. "They should be thrown back and given a chance to grow. That way, fishing on base would be more exciting and less wasteful."

Littering is a problem that plagues much of the island, with the air station included. "People who fish on base should clean up their mess," Gregory said. "Every time I look at the Marina, I see gobs of trash floating by."

"But it's really a force of habit for most people," he said. "They've been doing it for years."

As for how he cooks his fish, Gregory has a lot of recipes. "They can be steamed, fried, broiled, grilled, or barbecued," he said. "Anything but raw."

## Regulations

### Fishing allowed at selected spots

Authorized areas for fishing at the air station are being reduced in number, according to Master Sergeant Philip R. Johnson, Operations Chief for the Security Department.

The area southwest of the runway to the edge of the Marina has joined the Nuupia, Kalaupuni, and Kalekua ponds as unauthorized fishing areas, while the 50-foot safety limit at the north end of the runway has been extended to 100 feet.

"It's being done for safety reasons," Johnson said. "Fishing in these areas presents an operational hazard for the F-4 Phantoms."

Military personnel, their dependents, retired military

personnel, and all civilian employees working at the air station can fish in all other beach areas without permits, but civilians not connected with the air station must receive permits to fish in selected areas.

These areas are Fort Hase Beach and the Marina.

Civilians caught fishing in unauthorized areas can be issued a Federal Magistrate ticket and sent to court. Military personnel in violation of fishing regulations may face non-judicial punishment for being in unauthorized areas.

## Marine nominated for Sullivan Award

**QUANTICO, Va.** — Quantico's Greg Gibson, the All-Marine and World Champion wrestler, was recently nominated for the prestigious James E. Sullivan Award.

The 53rd annual award, which will be given by the Amateur Athletic Union to the outstanding amateur athlete in the United States, commemorates a founder and past president.

Competition for this year's award consists of 10 of America's finest amateur athletes, six men and four women, representing boxing, figure skating, diving, alpine skiing, synchronized swimming, swimming, long distance running and the equestrian arts.

Approximately 21,000 amateur sports officials, past winners and media representatives will select the 1982 winner based on leadership ability, character, sportsmanship and the ideals of amateurism.

Gibson has not had much of a problem exhibiting these admirable qualities. Recently, he toured the country sponsoring wrestling clinics for youth wrestlers with his fellow teammates.

The international wrestler's past year's qualification for the nomination are many, to include being the first man in the world wrestling history to win medals at the 1982 World Championships in all three styles.

He was also a gold medal winner at the Somo World Championships, a bronze medal winner at the World Freestyle Championships, and a fifth place winner at the World Greco-Roman Championships.

In addition, the 29-year-old Marine Sergeant won the U.S. National Championships in all three styles, qualified for the U.S. National team and won a silver medal at the World Cup Freestyle Championships.

Gibson's nomination for the award by the AAU National Convention is the second in a row for the native Californian.

In the past a large number of Californians have been recipients of the Sullivan Award. Previous winners include: Mark Spitz (1971), Bill Walton (1973), Bruce Jenner (1976) and John Nabor (1977).

The Sullivan Award dinner took place at the Indiana Convention Center 500 Ballroom, Indianapolis, Ind.
