Financial mishaps harm image

The high standards expected of Marines extend beyond personal appearance, job performance and leadership traits.

According to a recent message from Headquarters Marine Corps, the standards of conduct expected of Marines include financial responsibilities.

The message states that delinquent loans and issuance of dishonored personal checks by Marines are on the rise, and that the irresponsible acts of a few result in a stigma for all Marines.

This stigma jeopardizes the level and quality of financial services and privileges available

to Marines and their dependents because mistrust is created within the financial community.

The Navy Relief Society reports that a significant portion of financial assistance cases continue to be attributed to unsound money management and pay-related problems.

According to the message, most pay problems can be avoided if Marines review their monthly LFS (Leave and Earnings Statement) and notify commanding officers of all discrepancies.

Commanding officers must ensure that members of their units

understand their responsibilities for maintaining personal finances, states the message. This can be accomplished by providing information through the troop information program, morning formations, and conducting unit classes on subjects such as "Understanding the LES," "How to Resolve Pay Problems," and "Proper Use of Advances Pay."

Marines should also be made aware of the information programs and counseling services available from the Navy Relief Society, Family Service Center, military banking facilities, DOD-

Sponsored credit unions, and command legal assistance offices.

According to the message the Marine Corps will investigate and process all cases of reported violations concerning personal dishonored checks and delinquent indebtedness. This includes disciplinary action when warranted.

Identification bearing "USMC" must be viewed as an indication of personal integrity and financial responsibility by the civilian community, and the few must no longer stigmatize or jeopardize the honor of the title "Marine," concluded the message.

New law extends ex-spouses' benefits

Medical Care has been added to the list of benefits and privileges extended to unmarried former spouses under the Uniformed Services Former Spouse's Protection Act. The law was enacted in September 1982 and went into effect Feb. 1.

To be eligible for the medical benefits, the former spouse must not have medical coverage under an employer sponsored health plan.

The medical care benefits are

added to the commissary, exchange and theater privileges offered to unmarried former spouses whose divorce, dissolution or annulment was finalized on or after Feb. 1.

In addition, to be eligible for the benefits, former spouses must have been married to the service member at least 20 years, during which time the service member performed at least 20 years of creditable military service (normally

active duty). Also, former spouses must not have remarried since the marriage ended.

A statement of eligibility must be forwarded to Headquarters Marine Corps for confirmation and approval. Once confirmed, the former spouse may apply for a Uniformed Services Identification and Privilege Card.

In addition, under the new law, a service member may

voluntarily designate a former spouse as a beneficiary under the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) provided the service member became eligible to participate in the SBP on or after September 8, 1982. Other requirements must also be met.

More information on Public Law 97-252, the Uniformed Services Former Spouse's Protection Act, may be found in Marine Corps Bulletin 1700.

Blue Angels seek Marine officers

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Blue Angels Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron is looking for Marine officers to serve with its Marine Support Detachment.

Marines applying for a position must be career-oriented regulars, volunteers, and aircraft commanders in the rank of captain or first lieutenant.

Marines who want to apply should send a letter to: Commanding Officer, U.S. Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron, NAS Pensacola, Fla. 32508. Attn: Senior Marine Corps Officer.

The letter should include a general statement making application to the squadron for a billet. It also should include a brief personal and educational background, military and aeronautical experience and previous duty assignments. A statement of flight hours, status as a pilot and photograph similar to a promotion photo also should be sent. Letters must be endorsed by the applicant's commanding officer and a copy should be sent to the Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code MMOA-2).

Degree rates reclassification

Marines who have successfully completed the Staff Noncommissioned Officer Degree Completion Program may apply for reclassification of their military occupational specialties.

A board is now in session at Headquarters Marine Corps to determine classifications and assignments for SNCO Degree Completion Marines. In addition, enlisted Marines who have college baccalaureate degrees or higher may also request reclassification.

All MOSs requested must correspond with the Marine's

major. For example, Marines holding degrees in psychology may apply for reclassification in either a Family Services Center billet or as a Drug and Alcohol Abuse Counseling Assistant. Education majors may apply for MOS 8231, Education Assistant.

Applications for reclassification must be submitted by message to Headquarters Marine Corps (Code MMEA-7) before March 25. More information on reclassification for enlisted Marines with college degrees may be found in ALMAR 44-83.

Korean Marine Corps officer tours brigade's facilities

A representative of the Republic of Korea Marine Corps toured the 1st Marine Brigade training facilities March 16 and 17, as part of an in-depth study of the Marine Corps' training system.

Lieutenant Colonel Hyung Gun Park, doctrinal studies officer for the Korean Marine Corps, spent the two days touring training sites and participating in some aspects of Marine infantry and artillery training. The visit was a result of the joint agreement between the Commandant of the Marine Corps and the Chief of Naval Operations, Republic of Korea.

During his visit with the 1st Marine Brigade, Park participated in a gas chamber exercise with Marines from 3d Battalion, 3d Marines and rappelled with 2d Battalion, 3d Marines.

Park also attended company classes and witnessed field movements by 2/3 at 29th Air Force Station, he then flew to the Moku Valley near Schofield

Barracks to view 60mm team training with 81mm fire directional control. The artillery support was provided by Marines from 3/3.

On the second day, Park flew by helicopter to the Pohakuloa Training Area on the Big Island. There he viewed an aerial fire direction exercise conducted by the Air Force's 22nd Tactical Air Support Squadron and artillery Marines from 1st Battalion, 12th Marines. Park was also briefed on artillery battery training, small arms training and electronic warfare techniques.

In addition to his training with the 1st Marine Brigade, Park has trained at the Marine Corps Development and Education Center, Quantico, Va.; Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, S.C.; and Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, N.C. He also participated in a combined arms exercise with the 1st Marine Division.

New ID cards prevent exchange thefts

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A thief enters a Navy Exchange, and, before he leaves, he may have hundreds of dollars of stolen merchandise. He walks around like any other customer selecting items from the shelves. Calmly, he walks up to a cashier, pays and leaves the store.

What did he steal? Everything. Every item he purchased is considered stolen since he is not eligible to shop in exchanges or commissaries nor is allowed any of the other benefits of military people and their dependents. To help fight this kind of abuse, the Department of Defense has begun testing a new military identification card for possible use by all branches of the uniformed services.

The test, called RAPIDS (Real-

Time Automated Personnel Identification System), begins at six locations this month and will continue for six months. The goal is to develop a tamper-resistant ID card and to establish better control over the issuance of ID cards.

The new cards look like a credit card. Information is embossed on the front — name, rank, Social Security number, etc. — and a magnetic strip or computer chip is attached which contains more information. Although all of the test cards are similar in appearance, they differ slightly in the type of plastic used and the arrangement of information.

The cards — about 35,000 — are being issued in test areas to those who need a new card due to promotion, change in status or loss of a current ID card. The card is

also being issued to some reservists during the test period.

Dependents of active duty people issued test cards do not need to receive the new cards themselves nor will new cards be issued to retired personnel.

All military bases have been informed about the test so that anyone issued a new card will be able to use it on any base until the end of the test period. Information about the new cards has also been given to communities surrounding test areas, so that the cards also may be used for identification. During the test period, the traditional ID card still will be accepted from people not participating in the test.

If there are any problems with a new card — if one is damaged, lost,

stolen, rejected by a verification machine at a commissary or exchange, etc. — notify the personnel office which issued the card.

New cards are being issued at test sites chosen because they represent a cross section of DOD activities close to Washington, D.C. If it is decided to adopt the new ID card, they will be issued to all uniformed service people.

The activities participating in the test are: Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, N.C.; Fort Lee, Va.; Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, N.C.; Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Va.; Military Entrance Processing Station, Richmond, Va.; USS Portland (LSI 37), Little Creek, Va.

Adding surcharges at registers will save shoppers' money

WASHINGTON, D.C. Shoppers at Navy Commissaries will save about one penny on the dollar, effective March 29, as a result of a change in computing surcharges. Beginning that date, Navy commissaries will adopt the Army and Air Force practice of adding surcharges at the cash register. NAVRESSO formerly added a variable surcharge — which averaged 6 percent — to the shelf price of commissary items.

For example, an item costing a dollar would have 6 cents added to the price before it was put on the shelf under the old system. When the new system, all military commissaries will add a 5 percent surcharge to the total at the cash register, i.e., grocery items totaling \$100 will have a \$5 surcharge added.

The change resulted from a memo signed by the secretary of defense and will standardize the

surcharge at 5 percent at all DOD commissaries. That change will increase prices at Army and Air Force commissaries, which formerly added 4 percent surcharges at the cash register.

Patrons of Marine Corps commissaries can expect a similar decline in price as Navy commissary shoppers will experience because the two sea services' systems operate alike, a Marine Corps spokesman said.

The Coast Guard, which only operates commissaries at Governors Island, N.Y., and Kodiak, Alaska, is not affected by the change because it is not part of DOD.

The change will allow direct comparison among all DOD commissaries. The change was ordered because different surcharge methods caused confusion among commissary patrons and in Congress.

G.I. Bill extension

Congress grapples over alternate expiration date

WASHINGTON, D.C. — There have been several recent attempts in Congress to eliminate the Dec. 31, 1989 termination date for educational benefits under the Vietnam-era G.I. Bill. But officials in Washington, D.C. say there appears to be little hope the termination date will be extended or repealed anytime soon.

As a result, Marines who are eligible for benefits (those who enlisted before Jan. 1, 1977) must use them within the next seven years or lose them.

The Veterans' Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) has been the education program available for Marines since 1977. This program, however, has not been accepted as well or used as

much as the Vietnam-era G.I. Bill. A proposed new G.I. Bill (H.R. 1400) has received fairly strong support in the House of Representatives and is now awaiting floor action. A Senate version of a new G.I. Bill, however, is not expected to surface soon.

Some basic provisions of the House Bill include:

- an educational program for active and reserve members;
- basic benefits funded by the Veterans' Administration;
- in service use; and
- a requirement for honorable service.

Despite the best efforts of some legislators, Marines should not count on seeing a new G.I. Bill in the near future. With the services

currently meeting their end-strength goals, and with the current economic situation, a new educational benefits program is not considered by some to be a top priority.

Therefore, those active duty, reserve, retired and former Marines who joined the Corps before Jan. 1, 1977, should consider taking full advantage of the Vietnam-era G.I. Bill educational benefits open to them.

At present, various programs are available to eligible veterans seeking educational training. Institutions within the U.S. providing education at the elementary school level or above may be approved for training through the G.I. Bill program.

They include public or private elementary and secondary schools; vocational, correspondence, business and flight schools; colleges and universities; professional, scientific and technical institutions; and on-the-job, farm cooperative and apprenticeship programs.

Qualified Marines on active duty may also attend school part-time and receive an allowance from the V.A. However, G.I. Bill educational benefits may not be used by Marines attending school full-time under formal Marine Corps degree completion programs.

Airline travelers benefit from protection plan

An airline default protection plan has been established to greatly reduce the possibility of government travelers becoming stranded or delayed at airports. The agreement was made last November between the Air Traffic Conference (ATC) of America, on behalf of all member air carriers,

and the General Services Administration, representing all federal agencies.

Under the new plan, if a carrier participating in the Standard Ticket and Area Settlement Plan, fails to provide service to a traveler, airline tickets or coupons written by that carrier will be

honored by any air carrier that is a member of the ATC. Financial default conditions and the discontinuance of scheduled services or flights are only a few of the reasons that airlines may be unable to provide services to travelers.

According to Marine Corps Bulletin 4630, Marine Corps

activities that have arranged travel with airlines that are not represented by the Protection Plan should process the unused tickets or coupons for reimbursement to the government.



CMC details weapons' abilities

EDITOR'S NOTE — The following article is the second of a four part series of the statement on Marine Corps posture, plans and programs for FY1984 through 1988 addressed to the House Armed Services Committee by General Robert H. Barrow, Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Advanced surface craft

The Navy's LCAC program represents a revolutionary breakthrough in ship-to-shore movement. Current projections envision a force of about 100 of these advanced surface craft. The first six LCACs are under contract and the first LCAC base, at Camp Pendleton, California, is under design in preparation for the craft's delivery in 1986. The LCAC provides a quantum advance in amphibious capability by reducing our vulnerability and increasing our speed and flexibility. Its speed of over 40 knots and its 60 ton payload also provide us with a unique tactical opportunity for surprise landings from over the horizon onto widely separated beaches. LCAC will make the enemy's ability to defend far more difficult and vastly increase our flexibility and speed in the assault.

Assault amphibious vehicles, the workhorse of the amphibious surface assault, serve to further reduce our vulnerability during the critical ship to shore movement and improve our mobility on the battlefield. The assault amphibious vehicle Service Life Extension Program (SLEP) is intended to extend the utility of the LVT-7 into the 1990's. In addition to an extensive rebuild effort, the SLEP will add many new systems and components. Among these will be a new engine, non-integral fuel tank, and all-electric weapons station. The first Marine unit to be equipped with the new LVT-7A1 will be operational in FY84.

The Landing Vehicle Tracked (Experimental) (LVTX) is under development as a follow-on for the LVT-7A1. The new LVTX will provide increased firepower, improved armor, and a lower silhouette.

Helicopter support

To enhance our execution during the helicopter borne assault and to improve our maneuverability during subsequent operations ashore, our aviation community is also pursuing a number of modernization initiatives.

As I reported last year, our declining inventory of medium lift assault helicopters is of great concern to me. Due to the effects of inadequate performance and peacetime attrition, the aging CH-46 and CH-53A/D force lacks adequate capabilities to meet our assault lift requirements. JVX meets the need for a 250 knot assault transport that is self-deployable worldwide, reducing some of the demand for strategic air and sea lift. The urgent need for JVX stems from the requirement for modern replacements for the current force as well as to avert the critical lift shortfall that would occur if JVX were not introduced in 1991. JVX capabilities will complement those of the LCAC and LVTX. Capable of lifting 24 Marines up to 200 nautical miles, JVX will provide increased stand-off for naval and landing forces, the ability to rapidly penetrate deep into enemy rear areas or to bypass adverse terrain, weather or threats. Thus, JVX offers a quantum increase in strategic and tactical mobility. R&D funds requested in FY84 will lead to delivery of the first JVX in 1991.

Presently we have two squadrons of CH-53E helicopters operational. This aircraft can lift 32,000 pounds, more than any other helicopter in the free world. The FY84 procurement profile supports the immediate goal of three squadrons which, in conjunction with the five squadrons operating the CH-53A/D, will minimally meet the current heavy lift requirements. However, the ongoing introduction of the M198 Howitzer and subsequent fielding of the Light Armored Vehicle (LAV) will require additional CH-53Es.

New weapons systems

As the lead elements of Marines move across the beach and into the helicopter landing zones, the assaulting infantry battalions will be capable of striking with increased firepower as a result of the introduction of new weapons systems — and they will do so with fewer personnel. Their weapons will include the improved M16A2 rifle, the Squad Automatic Weapon, the Shoulder-Launched Multipurpose Assault Weapon, the Light-weight Company Mortar System, and an improved medium mortar. The first of these smaller, firepower intensive battalions was organized in October 1982, with an additional 14 battalions to be restructured during 1983. Nine more

Tanks

As the assault waves of infantry clear the beach, heavier landing craft will bring ashore another important anti-armor weapon, the tank. The M60A1, our main battle tank, will end its service life in the early 1990's; however, efforts are under way to either upgrade our present assets or to replace them with tanks providing enhanced anti-armor capabilities.

Additionally, excellent progress is being made in air deliverable weapons which provide outstanding accuracy against armor and other high-value targets anticipated on the modern battlefield. For our fixed wing aircraft, recent Laser Maverick tests have been a total success and we are anticipating an IOC in March 1985. The 25mm Multipurpose Cannon for the AV-8B also increases our anti-armor capabilities while the Gator mine provides an area denial capability which is essential in a highly mobile, armor-intensive situation. Hellfire has been selected as the primary precision-guided munition for use by our attack helicopters; procurement begins in FY84.

The AH-1T attack helicopter adds another dimension to our anti-armor capability. However, due to necessary resource allocations, the 22 AH-1T procurement, previously scheduled

and MIG-27, demands improved air defense protection for our front-line Marines as well as our vital rear area installations. These requirements are being addressed as quickly and economically as possible through the acquisition of IHAWK systems and Stinger missiles.

In order to integrate these offensive and defensive systems into a cohesive, responsive, and lethal fire support team, we must possess the means of control and coordinate their diverse capabilities. MAGTFs are organized, equipped, and trained to operate in a totally integrated combined-arms structure, thus providing our commanders the capacity to control all elements of the team including ground combat, aviation, and logistics. To that end, unique command, control, communications, and intelligence (C3I) capabilities are required. The following programs for C3I systems will satisfy that requirement.

Position location system

The Position Location Reporting System (PLRS) is designed to provide commanders and equipped units with instantaneous friendly position and navigation information. PLRS will interface with the Marine Integrated Fire and Air Support System, a real-time processing system which will be available in FY88 to provide commanders selective automated assistance to efficiently employ supporting arms at all echelons of the MAGTF. Our Tactical Air Operations Center-1985 (TAOC-85) is a modular, state-of-the-art, real-time air control system that will manage airspace and coordinate and control both interceptor aircraft and surface-to-air missiles. This system will also serve as the initial host platform for the Joint Tactical Information Distribution System (JTIDS). JTIDS, when fully implemented in this and other follow-on systems, will provide a high-capacity, secure, jam-resistant data

our tactical intelligence capabilities. Congress has recognized our deficiencies, and those of the other Services, and has taken steps to ensure the resources are made available to correct them. The status of the Marine Air-Ground Intelligence System offers proof. The heart of the system, the Intelligence Analysis Center, is now in procurement and a 1985 IOC is assured. The full field deployment of the Marine Air-Ground Intelligence System will significantly enhance our ability to support tactical commanders. Our all Source Imagery Processor will allow the commander to receive and process in near real-time multisource imagery from national as well as his own tactical imagery sensors. Additionally, we are in the process of upgrading and enhancing our Signals Intelligence and Electronic Warfare Systems to improve our tactical and strategic intelligence collection capabilities.

Once we have solidified our positions on the beaches and within the landing zones, we are prepared to move inland to seize control of landing force objectives and consolidate the force beachhead. On the modern battlefield such as thrust requires a high degree of mobility. Tactical mobility provides the means to rapidly close with and destroy the enemy and to logistically support Marines in a highly mobile environment. There are two ground acquisition programs intended to improve our battlefield mobility in addition to those programs related to the LVT-7A1 which I have previously discussed.

First, a new dimension will be added to the battlefield in FY83 with the activation of the first Light Armored Vehicle Company. This unit is the forerunner of a highly mobile, firepower intensive maneuver element which is going to be added to the Marine division and which will be unique because of its integrated combined-arms capability. These

Anti-armor weaponry

Having established our assault elements ashore, it is then necessary to secure our positions on the beaches and within the helicopter landing zones and to commence expanding those positions prior to the thrust for deeper objectives. The most critical threat to our ability to successfully maintain and expand that initial foothold is enemy armor action. Realizing that, and in appreciation of the magnitude of opposing armor and mechanized capabilities, we are sponsoring certain programs to further increase our firepower. Our infantry battalions will engage and defeat enemy fighting vehicles with the MK-19 heavy machine gun. New light anti-armor weapons are undergoing joint Army and Marine Corps evaluation. In addition, our medium anti-armor assets, DRAGONs, will be increased from 24 to 32 per battalion. Half of these new DRAGONs will be equipped with a night sighting capability beginning in 1985.

To provide a heavy anti-armor capability for the assault elements, a new TOW platoon with 24 launchers will be added to each infantry regiment. This will effectively double our heavy anti-armor assets within the division. The new TOW II with a 6" warhead, extended range, and electrical optic countermeasures will be fielded in FY84. Half of the TOW launchers will also have a night sighting capability by FY85.

during FY84, has been deferred one year. A procurement schedule of at least 22 aircraft for FY85, with commensurate advance procurement in FY84, is essential.

As the beachhead is sufficiently cleared to allow for the landing and emplacement of additional supporting arms, our artillery is brought ashore. In keeping with our proven doctrine of totally integrating our combined-arms effort, our artillery units will be strengthened by programs designed to enhance their effectiveness in general and, in particular, their anti-armor/mechanized capabilities. Introduction of the M198 155mm howitzer as our primary direct support artillery weapon significantly increases the lethality, range, and accuracy of our artillery units. Accuracy and lethality will be further improved by combining COPPERHEAD precision-guided projectiles with the Modular Universal Laser Equipment. Additional 155mm self-propelled artillery will be added to the force, not only increasing the numbers of artillery pieces available but also providing additional mobility to support the fast moving aspects of the battlefield of the future and furthering our anti-armor/mechanized capabilities.

A second, and equally critical, threat to our successful establishment of Marines ashore is the enemy's air attack capabilities. The steady expansion of Soviet attack capabilities, illustrated by weapons systems such as the HIND-D

distribution capability for the real-time exchange of tactical information within the Marine Corps and with other United States and NATO forces.

Recent events validate my comments of last year regarding the great strides being made in our Tactical Exploitation of National Capabilities program. Marine Air-Ground Task Forces throughout the world, some of which have only limited organic reconnaissance capabilities, are now receiving national intelligence systems support on a regular and continuing basis. The value of national collectors, in combination with theater and organic systems, was highlighted by the vital and effective intelligence support provided to our Marines deployed to Beirut, Lebanon. Finally, we have a clearly defined requirement to improve

maneuver elements will be formed around a family of eight mission-role vehicles, all built on a common chassis. The light armored vehicles in each LAV organization will not only be strategically transportable but, when the situation dictates, helicopters will be able to move them deep into the enemy's rear area to seize key objectives.

Finally, during the fight to consolidate the force beachhead and those subsequent operations ashore necessary for the accomplishment of a given mission, we must be capable of sustaining our combat power. Once deployed, our Marines must be able to stay and fight. Sustainability in combination with weapons systems and people, is a necessary ingredient of our force projection capability.

Profits donated to charity

Thrift Shop—place to get a good deal

In today's economy a good bargain may be hard to find, but the one place it's still easy to get a good deal is the Thrift Shop.

The shop, run by the Staff Non-commissioned Officers' Wives' Club, is located at Building 139 on E Street and sells items from military uniforms to civilian clothing to furniture, according to Callie Kerstetter, Thrift Shop Chairman.

"Shopping at the Thrift Shop is a good way for people to dress themselves and their children

without spending a lot of money," said Kerstetter.

"Our merchandise is given to us by people who either donate the items or else wish us to sell it on consignment for them.

"If a person wants us to sell their articles on consignment, we give them an account number and attach the same number to their articles. They set the price they want and we take 30 percent of the profit when the item sells. Items on consignment have 90 days to sell. If it doesn't sell, after each 30 days we knock 10 percent off the price.

"If the article still hasn't sold after 90 days, it becomes our

property and we set our own price for it unless the owners wish to repurchase the article."

Kerstetter said that the shop sets the prices of donated items.

"When we set our own prices on odd merchandise, things are cheap," she said. "Uniform jackets are \$3, uniform trousers are \$2, and khaki shirts are \$1.50."

According to Kerstetter, Thrift Shop profits are given to charity organizations.

"We provide two scholarships a year for dependent children," she said. "Last year, we gave money to help out the people involved in the

fire on base. There was also a death of a dependent child and we gave money to the family to help them with burial expenses on the mainland."

The workers at the Thrift Shop are volunteers from the SNCO Wives' Club.

"The volunteers who work six times in three months get taken out to a luncheon by the club," said Kerstetter. "We also pay for babysitting while the wives volunteer their time."

The Thrift Shop is open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings from 9:30 to 12:30.

Bacteria causes periodontal disease

EDITOR'S NOTE—The following article is one of a series being presented by *Hawaii Marine* in cooperation with the KMCAS Dental Department.

The common form of periodontal disease results principally from the action of bacteria, calculus (tartar), and food particles. When food debris remains on the teeth, bacteria grow in large numbers. Some of them produce a sticky substance that forms a film on the teeth. Trapped in the film are many bacteria, and also dead cells, particles of food, and substances from the saliva. The sticky mass is called bacterial plaque. This is the same plaque that was described in earlier articles dealing with tooth decay. Most scientists feel that certain bacteria living in the plaque give off products which cause the gums to become inflamed and the bone and soft tissue supporting the teeth to be destroyed.

If the bacterial plaque is not removed from

the teeth, it will start to harden (calcify) in 2 days to 2 weeks after it has formed. Two of the substances from the saliva — calcium and phosphate — form the deposit on the teeth. Calculus formation is much like the formation of coral. A layer of live bacteria calcifies, which in turn is covered by another layer, which calcifies, and so on. All the while, the bacteria living on the surface of the calculus are giving off their toxic products.

Other conditions that are thought to lead to periodontal disease are crooked teeth; loss of teeth which causes other teeth to drift out of position; increasing age; and grinding the teeth during sleep. Faulty restorations and fixed and removable partial dentures provide convenient places for the bacteria and food debris to collect. A diet that lacks sufficient proteins and certain necessary vitamins and minerals tends to weaken the supporting bone and soft tissue.

Certain systemic diseases predispose the individual to periodontal disease. It has been

suggested that those who suffer severely from periodontal disease in their twenties or thirties should be examined for a possible pre-diabetic condition. The disease may be aggravated by hormonal changes related to stress, pregnancy, or menopause.

It should be emphasized that the conditions which contribute to periodontal disease will not cause the disease by themselves. The primary cause of the disease is the bacteria living in the plaque. The other conditions may only make the disease more severe.

A dependent dental care program is offered at the Kaneohe Branch Clinic, the second Saturday of each month from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. For appointments call 257-3288 the first weekday of each month.

'Founding Father' recalls Camp H.M. Smith's birth

CAMP H.M. SMITH. — "Is this the best you can do for me?"

Referring to the then headquarters of Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, this question was asked in late 1954 triggering the birth of Camp H.M. Smith.

More than 28 years since retired Lieutenant Colonel Jimmy B. Miles was asked that question, he returned to see what his efforts had accomplished.

LtCol Miles, the assistant G-4 during 1954-55, was the main driving force in acquiring the old Aiea Naval Hospital complex which subsequently became Camp Smith.

Miles and his wife, Elizabeth, were vacationing in Hawaii recently when they decided to take a ride to see Camp Smith. "I could hardly find my way to Camp Smith," he said. "The area has changed so much and I am amazed at all of the development on Oahu."

According to the retired lieutenant colonel who now resides in San Antonio, Texas, the question had been put to him in 1954 at a morning briefing in the deputy commander's office located at Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor.

"I really don't know what my answer to Major General Vernon E. Megee was, but when the meeting was over, I know what I did," the 72-year-old former Marine said. "I went straight to the military real estate officer who was a colonel. Without telling him the reason I needed the information, I asked him where we could move the Marine headquarters in Hawaii."

The colonel in charge of military real estate on Oahu said he had some property at Catlin Park which was only a mile or two from Pearl Harbor. However, knowing the FMFPac headquarters had previously been located in Catlin Park in the 40's, Miles asked if there were any other locations available. "The colonel said that the old Aiea Naval Hospital was available, so when I went home that afternoon I thought about the possibility of moving the headquarters to Aiea," he said. "I knew the temperature was about 15 degrees cooler in the Aiea area than it was at Pearl Harbor."

After church the following Sunday, Miles took a ride up Halawa Heights Road to the old hospital complex and told the civilian sentry he wanted to look around. "I was pretty familiar with the area because my wife had been a grey lady (an American Red Cross volunteer worker) at the hospital and we only owned one car so I had to drive her to and from work each day." After taking a good look around the complex, Miles decided the area would be perfect for the FMFPac headquarters.

The following Monday, the lieutenant colonel sent a team of officers to the old hospital complex to determine the feasibility of converting the hospital into a headquarters. Their recommendation was to do it and they estimated that it would take about one million dollars to complete the project.

It didn't take Miles long before he was able to get the property transferred from the Navy to the Marine Corps without the Commander in Chief, Pacific realizing what

was actually taking place.

After acquiring the property, a name for the new installation had to be selected. "The name of General Holland McTyeire Smith immediately came to my mind." Miles who served in such places as Iwo Jima, Tarawa, Tinian and Solomons during World War II, was acquainted with Gen Smith's accomplishments. "Gen Smith was the colorful pioneer of amphibious warfare techniques and the first Fleet Marine Force, Pacific commander, so I decided to submit his name to the FMFPac chief of staff for consideration. The rest is history."

Before Miles could see the project through to completion, he was transferred to the Coronado Naval Amphibious School in San Diego during the summer of 1955. The dedication of Camp Smith took place Jan. 31, 1956.

While at Coronado, Miles suffered a heart attack and was placed in the Camp Pendleton Naval Hospital where he spent six months prior to being retired from the Marine Corps in 1959 after 27 years of active service.

The retired leatherneck reminisced on his tour of duty in Hawaii before departing for the airport and his flight back home to Texas. "I am very happy that my plan to move the headquarters to the old hospital complex actually came about," he said. "I am also happy the CINCPac never got wind of what we were doing or we probably would not have been able to 'steal' the property away from them."

In 1957, the Commander in Chief, Pacific moved his headquarters to Camp Smith too!

Marine mammals assist in underwater recovery

Quick Find, Deep Ops and SSP aren't new rock and roll bands — they're programs of the Naval Ocean Systems Center, and the Hawaii Laboratory here does its part in research for these vital programs.

Quick Find and Deep Ops are programs investigating the use of marine mammals for recovery of objects from the ocean, and SSP is a radically new concept in ship design.

The mission of NOSC is to be the principal Navy research, development, test and evaluation center for command control, communications, ocean surveillance, surface and air-launched

undersea weapons systems, submarine-arcic warfare and supporting technologies.

The Hawaii Laboratory is one of two research facilities NOSC uses to accomplish its extensive mission. The headquarters and major laboratory complex are located in San Diego. Naval scientists and engineers also work on NOSC projects in world-wide at-sea tests.

The NOSC complex here has been involved with the marine mammal program since the late '70s, and developed the successful Quick Find program, in which California sea lions have been trained to recover inert ordnance fired in fleet training exercises.

The Quick Find system consists of a small rubber boat, a sea lion and two or three handlers. When the boat reaches the

approximate location of the object to be recovered, the sea lion is sent over the side. He returns and signals, by pressing a rubber disc on the boat, when he has heard the object's acoustic beacon. A tong-like grabber device with a recovery line attached is then mounted on a nose cup the sea lion carries as he dives to the ocean floor. When the grabber is pressed against the object, it encircles it and locks on.

The sea lion returns to the boat for a fishy treat while the object is hauled to the surface.

This system saves significant time and expense because the use of human divers requires a decompression chamber, a medical van and a medical officer at the scene. Divers are also hampered by brief working times, poor visibility and strong currents.

The Quick Find system is now in fleet use.

NOSC also demonstrated in Project Deep Ops the feasibility of using pilot and killer whales to recover objects from greater depths. Sea lions work at depths to 500 feet, but the whales made recoveries at depths as great as 1,650 feet.

Another important project here is the Stable Semi-submerged Platform Kaimalino (a Hawaiian word meaning "calm water"). Representing a new concept in naval architecture, SSP has twin cylindrical submerged hulls attached to the deck platform by four vertical struts. Since the majority of wave action only impacts the small area of the struts, the craft is much more stable than ships of significantly greater size.

The Kaimalino is 89 feet long, displaces

225 tons and is designed to support both helicopter and submersible operations.

In 1976 the ship successfully performed operations with the Remote Unmanned Work System submersible vehicle, which required the Kaimalino to maintain extreme stability in rolling ocean currents. The operation had previously failed when a 4,000-ton monohull ship couldn't maintain adequate stability.

The Kaimalino's 32-ton payload, 450 nautical mile cruising range and gentle ride make it an invaluable support vessel for NOSC research.

Quick Find and other marine mammal programs, coupled with the research work accomplished aboard the Kaimalino, keep NOSC scientists and support people here busy, and make the Hawaii Laboratory a vital link in the Navy's research facilities.

Computer revolutionizes field communications

QUANTICO, Va. — Computer games are the latest in entertainment these days. Many people find themselves captivated in front of their television sets, not to catch the top programs, but to play video games.

There are even home computers available for those who would like to do such things as balancing a checkbook with the aid of modern technology.

Now, there's a new computer out that the Marine Corps is going to buy for use by Marines in the field. It's called the digital communications terminal (DCT) and it'll revolutionize the communications network used by field Marines.

The DCT is a lightweight hand-held communications message processor which provides the user with point-to-point and netted communications over a variety of military radios and secure equipments.

"It is a four and a half pound, 100 cubic inch volume computer," stated Major Edmund Lucke, developmental project officer. "That's the simplest way to describe what it is. But, it's really important because of the word terminal."

The DCT has the capability to

receive and transmit multiple messages over tactical nets with operator alerting and automatic storage of specified messages.

All of this is done through a stored program and a microprocessor.

The microprocessor performs all tasks of format composition, address coding, error control and error checking, including net protocol.

The DCT also transmits in bursts which will let us send our information faster," Lucke added. "It also makes a smaller target for electronic warfare since it transmits the message all at once."

The DCT can also work with the MULE (Modular Universal Laser Equipment) by accepting its reports on target range, azimuth and height. It'll then compose a target position for message composition.

The DCT has an LED (light emitting diodes) display and can also test itself. It works with all authorized crypto gear as well as with every Marine Corps radio in the inventory and those radios planned to go into the inventory.

The DCT battery lasts up to 22 hours. That is, it has 22 hours of transmitting capacity. It also comes with a variety of accessories including the connecting cables, a program entry device, alternate power supplies, and a rechargeable battery.

The new terminal, which has been a Development Center project for five years, went through a whole series of tests. From being submerged a three feet of water to being dropped from a height of four feet, 26 times, the DCT proved itself rugged and perfect for the field Marine.

During the operational testing, one of the requirements was that formal training not be required for Marines to operate it. Officials found that the Marines could be trained to operate the DCT in an hour.

Expected to reach the field by January 1985, the DCT will be issued to forward air controllers, forward observers in artillery units, all reconnaissance units and to forward area air defense batteries for their gunners.

"The Corps is getting the DCT because it will enable its users to efficiently exchange information in a way which is now not possible," explained Lucke. "It costs about \$24,000 for each one because it's a computer. It is expensive, but you don't get a lot of capability for little money."

The purchase contract for the DCT was signed in November for \$59.5 million. The initial contract will produce 1,200 for the Marine Corps and 345 for the U.S. Air Force.

Military hops offer low-cost air travel

They fly through the air with the greatest of ease, those military hops that save airline fees.

But where do we catch these hops, who can ride them, and when are they available?

On Oahu, military hops are handled by Hickam Air Force Base and Naval Air Station, Barbers Point.

Steelworker First Class Terry Clotfelter, Watch Supervisor at the Air Terminal, NAS Barbers Point, said that seats on flights are reserved on a first-come, first-served basis.

"Any retired, active duty, or reservist on active duty or under orders are eligible to ride the hops," said Clotfelter. "Dependents are eligible if they are accompanied by their sponsor. Emergency leaves always have priority."

Clotfelter explained that to catch a hop at Barbers Point,

personnel need only to call the Air Terminal two or three days before they wish to leave the island and put their names on a waiting list. They are then told the time to report for their flight.

"Active duty personnel must present leave papers or orders before boarding," said Clotfelter. "Retirees and dependents must present ID cards. The uniform requirements depend on the aircraft, but usually the dress uniform is required."

Clotfelter said that flights from Barbers Point go to the mainland, Okinawa, Guam, and sometimes the Philippines and Australia.

Military hops at Hickam AFB are handled with a slightly different procedure.

According to Sergeant Jimmy Moses, Marine Liaison at Hickam AFB, personnel must appear in person at the Hickam MAC Terminal to sign up for a flight.

Moses encourages people to register as soon as possible.

"It's best to sign up as early as possible," he said. "When someone comes down to sign up, they select the day they wish to leave from the schedule at the terminal. Active duty personnel must have their leave papers or orders with them at that time. Roll call is taken three hours prior to departure of the flight they have selected."

"The roll call begins with emergency leave cases, then PCS orders, TAD orders, ordinary leave, and finally reservists and retired. Who goes first in each category is determined by the time and date the individual signed up."

Moses said that emergency leave cases should first check with the Marine Liaison Office at Hickam before going to the MAC Terminal.

"The uniform of the day must be worn," continued Moses, "and no more than two pieces of luggage per person is allowed. The total

weight limit for the luggage is 66 pounds. The additional carry-on piece of luggage is allowed."

Moses said that weekends and summer are the busiest times. "It's more difficult for flights to get out during the week," he said. "And, in the summer, people do a lot of traveling since children are out of school."

Moses said that military hops out of Hickam fly mostly to Travis AFB in California.

"Weekends are the best times to catch a hop to Travis," he said. "Every Saturday and Monday morning there are flights departing for Australia and New Zealand, and a couple of times a week to McCord AFB in Washington. Flights also travel to other places such as the Philippines, Japan and Korea."

Personnel who wish to catch a military hop may call 684-2190/2174/4250 at Barbers Point or report in person to MAC Terminal at Hickam.

Vying for 4th consecutive state title

Hawaii Marines anxious for victories

It takes a special group of men to triumph repeatedly in their chosen sport. Such victories are seen frequently in professional sports, but are considered exceptional among lesser leagues.

The "Hawaii Marines" softball team has won the Hawaii state championship three years in a row. With the season beginning in April, the team is eager to extend its dynasty.

"We have an excellent chance to win again," said Dave Burnett, "Hawaii Marines" coach. "We're biting at the bit; we can't wait for the season to start."

Burnett has coached the team for the last two years and has watched the team's reputation grow. "We are the team to beat," he said. "When another team does beat us, it's almost as if they won the World Series."

"Jerry Morrison (assistant coach) and I coached the

All-Marine team last year," Burnett said. "There's no doubt in anyone's mind that what comes out of either of our mouths is law. The coaching continuity that we provide is helpful to the team."

Even with the past's victories, Burnett and Morrison have found room for improvement. "We have strengthened ourselves in the defensive area but still have our big hitters from last year. It should be a real fine ball club."

Several veteran players have

returned to the ball club this year, giving experience to the team and guidance to new-comers.

Scott Nobles returns from last year's team and is slated as starting pitcher for the '83 season. "Scott has been starting pitcher on the last two All-Marine teams," Burnett said. "He was chosen for national in 1981, but he was sidelined by injuries."

"His best quality is his ability to place the ball where he wants it. He also varies his location and speed of pitching to keep the batter off-balance. As a batter he's expected to lead the team in home-runs again this year."

Nobles hit 50 home-runs in 1981 and another 50 in 1982. "Home runs mean nothing unless you win," Nobles said. "We don't go up to the plate to specifically hit home runs. They just happen."

"Our goal right now is to make it four state championships in a row. The only real competition we will have will come from Athletes in Action, a civilian team from the other side of the island. They finished second last year. We weren't able to go to nationals, so AIA represented Hawaii."

Nobles expressed pleasure with the "Hawaii Marines" team structure. "It's the best program I've ever been associated with," he said. "The coach knows how to get the best out of all of the ball players; they like to play for him. If you get along with the coach, it's easy for players to give 110 percent."

"Another team leader is John Roberts," Burnett remarked. "He's also a third year team member and was the starting catcher on the All-Marines team last year. He'll rival Scotty for the home run title."

While Roberts acknowledges the importance of good hitting, he agrees that good defense determines the outcome of many ball games. "You can't always hit well," Roberts said. "Our defense has to do well, and I think that it will. We're going to win a lot of close ball games that we lost last year."

According to Roberts, veterans like himself will provide guidance to new players. "Returning players will provide leadership so that the new-comers will produce," he said. "Some of these new guys will be nervous and slightly awestruck."

Leadership doesn't come from

players alone. "We've got the best coach around," said Scotty Watkins, a returning left fielder. "He is outstanding. When I was a young Marine over here, he made me feel like a real man. He's a big asset to the team."

Watkins doesn't expect the team to have a perfect season. "We're going to lose games," he said. "But they won't be crucial games. Major league teams lose, but they know when to get down and dirty, so do we."

"Another player that deserves mentioning is Guillermo "Panama" Foster, Burnett said. "He's a right-center fielder in his third year. He's played on the All-Marine team in two out of the last three years. He has probably the finest throwing arm in the Marine Corps."

Jeff Huggins is a new addition to the team. "I'm looking forward to the season," he said. "A lot of the old-timers are back this year, and some of us newcomers will fill defensive positions."

"All in all, it's the most tightly knit ball club I've seen. The coaches do a great job, considering that they don't get us out of work for practice or anything; everything is on our own time."

According to Burnett, those who go out for the team and don't make it remain highly supportive. "The fans who we really like to see cheering us are the ones who went out for the team and didn't make it. They keep a super attitude."

Fan support is prized by the team. "The players always perk up and bring out that extra effort that only crowd reaction can bring out in a player," Burnett said.

"Unfortunately, we've only played three home games in the last two years," he said. "You can't expect people to go to the other side of the island to see us play. We're hoping to change that this year. We want at least one

double header on two Saturdays of each month.

"I'm sure that once we start playing home games, people will come out and watch."

Burnett cites different reasons for the team's success. "Part of the success of this team is due to the super support that we get from Special Services. We get everything we need."

"We really appreciate everything that Captain Bob Johnson (athletic director for Special Services) and Jerry Price (assistant athletic director) do for us. They're the ones who have been helping the program."

"Another reason for the team's success is Hawaii itself," Burnett said. "We play year-round against great competition from the local community. This is just a super heaven for softball."

Cyclist challenges terrain

Engine sounds tear the air, motorcycles rip through brush, their riders struggling desperately to control their wheeled stallions.

Some members of the Hawaii Motorcycle Trials Association failed in this task. Engines stalled. Cyclists scraped the ground in injurious "wipe-outs."

"We sign an agreement that says we will not hold the club liable for injuries or damages to motorcycles," said Staff Sergeant Bill Meeks, Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24.

The latest of the club's monthly trials competition took place at Pearl City Industrial Park, Sunday, and focused on surmounting rough terrain while maintaining balance.

"This has nothing to do with speed," said Don Roth, a sponsor of

Sunday's action. "It involved going over the obstacles without letting your feet hit the ground. A person is given a point every time he puts his foot down. A zero is a perfect score."

The industrial park proved an adequate testing ground for the athletes' abilities. There were eight sections to the course, each one more difficult than the last. Cyclists had to overcome boulders, streams, mud pits, holes, cliffs, logs, and brush in their efforts to stay balanced. Stalled engines and wipe-outs were frequent sights.

"It's a challenge," said Meeks, the only Marine in the club. "A lot of people join the club to develop more fitness in their riding skills. It's a very intense sport."

According to Meeks, as a person hones his skills on the cycles he is also toning his body's strength.

"Physical conditioning is there," he said. "It's very demanding, but it sure beats running a physical fitness test."

Meeks said that there are two categories of riders in the competition: expert and novice. "A person is an expert if he scores less than ten points for three consecutive trials. Otherwise, he is a novice."

Motorcycle repair is not something that the leatherneck has had to deal with. "The only thing that I've had to replace in the last year is spark plugs and oil," he said. "I've not had to perform major surgery on my cycle."

Likewise, no major repairs were needed on Meeks. He has sustained no serious injuries since he started riding in 1974. "The only people who I would advise against riding a motorcycle are babies," he said. "They're too small for a bike."

Military fraud results in devastation

Item one. A Marine files a fraudulent travel claim in an attempt to collect about \$400 of unearned per diem and more than seven excess travel days that should be charged as leave.

Item two. Meat, purchased by an Army commissary, is diverted to local restaurants.

Item three. Dye was used to conceal the fact that parachute cords, supplied by a Midwestern defense contractor, were more than 25 years old. Additional tests showed that the cords failed the military's specifications on strength and core composition.

The list goes on and fraud in the military continues to jeopardize the lives, welfare and interests of all tax-paying citizens, including military taxpayers.

Fraud awareness was the subject of a

letter recently prepared by the Department of Defense Council on Integrity and Management Improvements.

Millions of taxpayers' dollars are lost each year because of fraudulent claims and conspiracies. In one case alone, \$4.2 million in government property was stolen within a four year period, by a civilian contractor conspiring with service members at a Naval installation. Only about \$1 million worth of the stolen property, which included 800 tons of railroad track, 20,000 forklift batteries, a 50-foot landing craft and 3,288 pairs of work boots, was recovered. The servicemen and the company representative were convicted in federal court.

Money is not the only loss that occurs when attempts are made to defraud the government. A serious threat to the safety of combat troops was discovered when an investigation by the DoD Inspector General determined that parachute cords had been dyed to conceal the fact that they were more than 25 years old. A DoD Alert has been issued to all consumers who may still be using the "lifetime" products or have the products in stock.

Several criminal investigations have resulted from widespread abuse by DoD employees in claiming reimbursement on fraudulent travel claims. Unreasonable claims included \$13 for breakfast each day for 70 days and \$14 per meal for 14

days at an Air Force base in Dayton, Ohio.

According to General P.X. Kelley, assistant commandant of the Marine Corps, the key to preventing similar occurrences is awareness of internal controls that were either lacking or circumvented in the reported cases.

Thoroughly reviewing reimbursement claims before they are paid, monitoring material consumption data, and analyzing significant deviations from the norm are just a few ways suggested to prevent fraud. As a result of the Marine trying to claim \$400 for unearned per diem, the Marine Corps has initiated a nationwide review of cross-country claims that includes an

aggressive practice of travel counseling and verifying the actual mode of travel.

The meat that was destined for the Army commissary and never made it farther than the menu of a local restaurant, cost the government an estimated \$135,000. The Army's Criminal Investigation Division and the Federal Bureau of Investigation determined that commissary employees had conspired with the meat company to defraud the government. Since the same em. loyer was allowed to receive and account for the meat deliveries, the scheme was viable. The deficiency was corrected and four government employees and the meat company were convicted in federal court.

Fraud against the government is very serious and the results are always devastating. Awareness of the possibility of fraud is the first step in preventing the inevitable devastation.

Peter Vidito will serve on the committee and attend a committee meeting in Washington, D.C. in April. Vidito retired from active duty in 1980 after 20 years in the Marine Corps. He last served as the operations chief for Marine Amphibious Unit Service Support Group 31.

As a member of the Committee on Retired Personnel, Vidito will represent more than 4,000 retired sea service personnel in Hawaii. The 18-member committee that includes as many minorities as possible, plays an active part in the policy making decisions of the Department of the Navy as they

affect the retired community. "I've got to find out what the retired people are feeling and what they want," said Vidito, "so I can make it known to the Secretary of the Navy. I want to make sure that some progress is made for the good of the retired establishment here."

Vidito is accumulating information on retired sea service personnel from previous committee member files and from the Retired Affairs Office at Pearl Harbor. However, he is also interested in what the individual sea service retiree has to say. "I'm trying to accumulate enough information to be a contributing member of this committee," he said.

Intelligence Brief



The SA-6 is a low/medium altitude SAM. The Soviets first displayed this weapon in 1967. It is assigned to the air defense regiment of a number of motorized rifle and tank divisions, where it replaced the S-60 anti-aircraft guns. Three missiles are carried and launched from a special tracked vehicle which uses components of the ZSU-23-4 chassis. The SA-6 was designed to complement the SA-4 system in defending the army against air attack. Slant range of the SA-6 is 30 kilometers with an effective ceiling of 17.7 kilometers. The straight flush radar is the missile control. The SA-6 rate of fire is one to three missiles in ripple fire.

Fleet Home Town News

Program motivates, fosters pride and tells Marines' story

I guess I used to be a lot like other Marines about the Fleet Home Town News Program (FHTN). It seemed like a lot of bother to fill out the forms. I didn't think my accomplishments were all that great. And I was a little bit embarrassed about having someone stick my name in the hometown newspaper. But that was many years ago.

After working in public affairs for a few years, I've come to realize that FHTN is a valuable asset to the Marine Corps. If you don't believe it just ask any recruiter beating bushes in the hinterland when he's short on quota.

Most Marines have built-in resistance to filling out forms of any kind. And, though they may boast a bit after a few droughts of "old loudmouth," most do their jobs in a quiet, unassuming way. Few realize just how important their jobs are or how unusual some of their activities may seem to their civilian counterparts.

Many of those same Marines complain that "all I ever see about the Marine Corps is 'bad' news! Where are the favorable stories?"

Well, over 50,000 "favorable" stories were published last year in 250,000 publications through the FHTN program. Each release on a Marine being promoted, completing school, travelling to an exotic place for duty or getting a meritorious mast appeared in an average of five newspapers. A lot of those stories motivated young men and women to take that first step toward signing up as Marines.

Those stories also fostered pride

in the families and acquaintances of the Marines reported on. Thousands of those stories have been clipped and placed in family albums as the only tangible evidence of a loved one's military service. Yellowed by age, they will attest to children and grandchildren of dedication, honor and duty performed beyond that of the average citizen.

Those stories also indicate the type of quality of service being performed by Marines to the citizens of their local neighborhood. They are important in getting and maintaining public support for the Marine Corps. That can translate into budget dollars, equipment and benefits for each and every one of us who wears the Marine green.

Most importantly, those stories offset the impressions created by "bad apples" who rob, rape and murder and who by some mistake either now or at some earlier date have worn a Marine uniform. They are not Marines. As the Commandant said recently, "They masquerade as Marines." But the public doesn't know the difference. The "good" stories generated by the FHTN program help balance the slate and let the public know that the "masqueraders" are the exception rather than the rule.

Every Marine has a responsibility to inform the American public about the Marine Corps and its mission. We do it daily by the way we wear our uniform and how we conduct ourselves in public. But we also have an opportunity to tell the story more directly by filling out the FHTN form each time we deploy or

Professor teaches Mokapu's lore

The morning sun rose in the midst of oranges, purples and grays as three Hawaiian Gods — Kane, Ku and Lono — began their work. A shaped image of man was formed in the sands of Heleloa Beach, along the northern shore of the air station, and then "air" was breathed into the form — man was born.

This, according to the Hawaiian legend, is how man was born. In the early days, the peninsula, currently known as Mokapu (meaning Sacred land) and the home of Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay, was once a barren, desolate wasteland. This changed in the 16th century when King Belehohani built his royal palace near the Nuupia fish ponds, in the vicinity of the present-day main gate. During his reign, there was much mirth and pageantry in his court.

This past weekend, students from Chaminade University traveled to the "sacred land" to learn about some aspects of the Hawaiian religion. Hawaiian names, legends, superstitions and points of interest were addressed by Tyrone Reinhardt, the Chaminade professor. As students stood on a pinnacle on the outer edge of Ulupau crater, Reinhardt began his lore.

"The Hawaiian people were great gamblers," Reinhardt remarked. "People talk about Kaheki's Leap. We don't know if it was a game or if warriors trained to escape from the enemy by jumping off the cliffs into the water."

The students looked down the

cliff to the raging waters some 80 feet below them. "It's said that the Hawaiians held ti leaves in their mouths," continued Reinhardt. "Those of you who have dived from heights know how water can rush up your nose. Well, by holding the ti leaves in their mouths, the force of the water would push the leaf up over their nose and water couldn't enter."

Stories and legends were presented. For instance, King Kamehameha the Great (The Lonely One) selected Mokapu peninsula for use as a royal meeting place for his aliis (chiefs) and it became his sacred land.

The temple area of Mokapu was located inland from Pali Kilo, the coral cliffs south of Pyramid Rock. Here on the western fringes of Mokapu, King Kamehameha and his aliis were exclusive worshippers.

Two lesser temples were built for the servant class in the Pali Kilo bluffs. A small heiau (temple) was used by the servant class who prayed to the gods for the replenishment of the sea with fish. The larger of the two temples was used by gardeners who prayed for more taro, potatoes and other foodstuffs.

On the top of Pua-Hawaii-joa (Kansas Tower), Reinhardt told about the different land masses that can be seen from the summit. Hawaiian names express the relationship of different mountain ranges to one another. Hawaii Ioa who was a chief who, with his followers, settled in the Hawaiian islands, making his home atop the hill bearing his name.

"There were two brothers and a sister who lived on this side of the

Koolaus," Reinhardt said, pointing from atop Pua Hawaii-joa. "One brother lived up on the mountain and the other brother and his sister lived on Coconut island. The brother from Coconut island always gave his brother his poorest quality fish, hait-fish, whereas the brother up in the mountains always gave the very best of his food. It was a common custom that when someone's imu (oven) was opened, then friends and relatives would share. Well, the brother in the mountains didn't want to share his food because it would be taking it away from his family and he didn't have much. So he covered the opening to his imu and the smoke of his imu came out through another fissure in the mountains. When the people came to see what was in the imu, they found it empty. The clouds that cover the summit are held to be the steam coming from his imu."

In legends concerning Ulupau Head, it is said that Pele — the Hawaiian Goddess of Fire and Volcanoes — chose Ulupau for her Oahu home while wandering through the islands.

Ulupau means "fumes going up," more specifically the actual volcanic eruption and the fumes that follow.

From the crater, to Kansas Tower and then to Pyramid Rock, the students were exposed to various aspects of Hawaiian culture and religion, a heritage with which many Marines are unfamiliar. Marines come and go, maybe the Gods in the mountains will laugh at our antics, and maybe, just maybe, our coming and going will give way to other legends in years to come.


