America honors fallen servicemen during Memorial Day

Americans worldwide will pay tribute Monday to the men and women of past wars.

Wreaths and bouquets of flowers will be placed on the graves of servicemen, and bands honoring the unselfish war heroes will march through towns all across the United States.

Memorial Day is a tradition almost as old as time itself. Throughout history, civilizations, including the Greeks and the Romans, honored their dead by decorating their graves. This is a tradition people continue to practice.

Today almost every country sets a time to remember not only their people who gave their lives in battle, but to pay personal tribute to family and friends who have passed away.

Observance of Memorial Day in the United States has been attributed to different people and various localities. It's claimed that in Boalsburg, Pa. Emma Hunter instituted the idea during 1864 when she carried flowers to her father's tomb.

That day Emma met a Mrs. Meyer in the cemetery visiting her son's grave. Mrs. Meyer's son had been killed in the war and the two women decided to meet the next year to decorate the graves again.

Gradually other townspeople began decorating the graves of people who had given their lives in battle. Eventually a sign was erected noting the American village of Boalsburg as the birthplace of Memorial Day.

Many other townspeople honored loved ones who died during the wars by decorating their graves, but it wasn't until 1873 that the day was observed as a legal holiday. New York took the

first step as a state to make the observance a holiday. Memorial Day is now a holiday set by presidential proclamation.

In 1938, 1,800 veterans from throughout the United States met at Gettysburg to honor their brothers on the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg.

Twenty years later, in Arlington National Cemetery at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier of World War I, two unidentified men (one representing those of World War II and the other of Korean conflict) were interred beside the soldier whose casket had been placed there on Armistice Day in 1921.

Throughout the world Memorial Day is observed wherever American soldiers are buried. It is a time not only to honor those who made the supreme sacrifice, but to stress the fatality of war and express hope for a lasting world peace.

Delinquent loan repayment mandatory for U.S. employees

Anyone with a delinquent government loan should be aware of new legislation which permits the government to collect delinquent debts owed the United States by government employees and military members. The Debt Collection Act of 1982 was enacted by Congress because of increasing difficulty experienced by the government in recovering debts owed the United States.

The law permits the Department of Education to identify members who are delinquent or who have defaulted on their student loans and who have not made arrangements with DOE to repay the debt. Action to begin this process is under way.

Within the next several months, commanding officers will receive the names of people in their command who are delinquent in repaying student loans.

Members of the naval service are expected to pay their just financial obligations in a proper and timely manner, according to a recent naval message. People with delinquent student loans are subject to involuntary pay checkage. Individuals with outstanding student loans should act promptly to make repayment through voluntary allotments.

Power outage planned

High schoolers view military displays

Some were apprehensive, some seemed uninterested. A few thought it was totally uncool, but the ice seemed to melt with the warm morning sun and many of Kailua High School's 1,600 students enjoyed themselves, in spite of themselves, at the school's first Military Career Day May 18.

The freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors spent the entire school day viewing military displays set up on the school's football field. Marines from the 1st Marine Brigade joined the Army, Navy, Air Force and the Air National Guard in presenting the students with an idea of what the military services have to offer.

"The day was designed to allow the students an opportunity to see what the military services are all about," said retired Air Force Chief Master Sergeant Lawrence Barrett, assistant aerospace education instructor at the school.

"Some of the kids have an interest in going in the service as either enlisted or officers and this gave them a first-hand opportunity to see what the services have."

It took the students a while at first, but they finally got up the courage, or their curiosity got the better of them, as they decided to explore the odd array of equipment the services had on display. The career day was sponsored by the school's newly formed Air Force Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps unit, under the direction of retired Air Force Colonel James Harding.

A real eye-catcher at the Military Career Day was Corporal Philip Dameron from the Surveillance and Target Acquisition Platoon, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines, dressed similar to the legendary "Big Foot" in his camouflaged-cammies. Assisting Dameron in describing the sniper's job, weapons and equipment was Cpl Joseph Reyes, also with STA Platoon.

Some of the students tried on the camouflaged outfits and many had a taste of the Marine Corps' culinary delights with the opening of several packages of the new freeze-dried C-Rations. The majority of noses turned skyward but a few brave souls dared to take the plunge into the plastic bags of dehydrated beefsteak, pork patties or meatballs with barbecue sauce.

Cpl Roland Yamashiro and Lance Corporal Lyle Blackmon, both with Motor Transportation Company, Brigade Service Support Group, displayed and talked extensively about their vehicles. The 5-ton truck and the M151 Jeep were two highlights of the display. Many of the students enjoyed starting the engines, inspecting under the hoods and just honking the horns.

Three Marines from Company A, 3d Reconnaissance Battalion, explained much of the Recon Marines' equipment to the students. In addition to the small

inflatable boat and the scuba gear, Cpls James Barna, Steve Minnix and Leo Quinn talked about their individual jobs within the company. By the end of the day, several students sported the same cammie-painted faces as the Recon Marines.

According to Barrett, the students really enjoyed the displays, but were a little disappointed that they couldn't get a look at the Marine Corps' helicopters. Captains Stewart Bernard and Brian Jones, both from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 463, talked to the students about Marine Corps pilots and showed a video-tape of helicopters.

"Most of them (students) were pleased with what was displayed," said Barrett. "We're not trying to recruit them," he explained, "we're just trying to expose them to what the military has to offer. Many of them really do have an interest in going into the military."

Windward students study Mokapu Peninsula

Tomorrow's leaders spent an entire day May 16 developing a better awareness, appreciation and understanding of the resources and history of the air station and Mokapu Peninsula.

Approximately 100 students from Aikahi, Kailua, Kainalu, Lanikai and Mokapu elementary schools had their annual Interaction Day for the first time here.

The fourth, fifth, and sixth-graders are academically gifted and talented students in the Kalaheo Complex which encompasses the five Windward schools.

Following an orientation brief by the air station's Commanding Officer, Colonel Charles Robinson, an independent study project "The Float... How it affects families," prepared by Michelle Mock, Kim Shupe and Susan Heston, sixth-graders at

Mokapu, was presented. The students then received an overall look at the air station during a rolling tour which took them throughout the 3d Marines, Brigade Service Support Group and Marine Aircraft Group-24.

Individually chosen learning stations, located around the air station, were the next stops. The students, split into five groups, received in-depth instruction about the workings, resources and history of the air station and Mokapu Peninsula.

"We're dealing with the kids that are our future," explained Claire Ganiko, teacher for Mokapu's gifted and talented children. It was Ganiko's idea to hold the annual Interaction Day here. "We need to tie these kids in with the real world," she continued. "They have to extend their learning beyond the classroom and realize that they are a part of their environment."

The children had the opportunity to explore the Nuupia Ponds

for a look at the endangered Hawaiian Stilt and other marine birds, or study garbology and learn about the dangers of pollution and chemical waste. They could also dig for fossils at Ulupau Crater; learn about the Naval Ocean Systems Center; or study the Hawaiian history and legends of the peninsula.

"Everyone needs to learn a little about where they live and about the people who lived here before, so we can pass it on to others," said 9-year-old Kerrie Ticer, a fourth-grader at Aikahi Elementary School. Kerrie participated in the Hawaiian learning station, visiting Pyramid Rock, Heleloa Beach and Ulupau Crater.

"Since we live here," said Jared Farrington, 11, a sixth-grader also from Aikahi, "we should know more about Hawaii. It was a real experience and a lot of fun," he added after returning from the Hawaiian learning station.

According to Ganiko, gifted and talented children need time to be

alone, time to be with other children and time to be with other gifted and talented children. "This was their chance to be with other gifted and talented children," she said.

"It's nice to meet new people and make new friends," said Erik Gomez, 9, a fourth-grader at Mokapu Elementary School. "We need to learn about what different people do, how they work and what they are like," he added.

Erik and other students participated in the fossil dig at Ulupau Crater. His only disappointment was that he could not keep the fossils he found. The fossils were given to the Bishop Museum. "I'd like to find out what types of things used to live here," said Erik, "but I'd like to keep the bones."

"I think it's important to be together and learn about the different cultures and people."

Marine Corps aviation celebrates 71st birthday

Marine Corps aviation celebrated its 71st birthday Sunday. Since its inception in 1912 the fledgling has grown to a full-size eagle and is increasing in size.

The Marine Corps' first aviator, Lieutenant Alfred A. Cunningham, soloed on August 1, 1912 after only two hours and 40 minutes of instructions. Sulting up could take that long today.

Marine Corps aviation cut its teeth on action during World War I. During this initial growing period 282 officers and 2,180

enlisted men served in the field. Approximately half saw action overseas.

Between the World Wars, the only U.S. military service that actually saw combat was the Marine Corps with its aviators. Marines saw action in Santo Domingo (1919-1943), Haiti (1919-1934) and Nicaragua (1927-1933). During this time Marine pilots contributed new tactics to ground and air warfare: dive-bombing against an organized enemy, employing air-to-ground communications in combat and

transporting troops and supplies by air.

The attacks on Pearl Harbor and Wake Island during WWII had a devastating effect on Marine Aircraft Group-21. The group lost practically all of its aircraft during the attacks. From this low point, Marine aviators reached new heights by shooting down their first enemy plane at Wake Island and their last in Okinawa.

During the Korean War the Marines again found themselves setting records and performing

new tactical maneuvers. Peacetime found Marine aviators taking part in humanitarian missions, aiding flood victims in Ceylon and Taiwan during 1959.

The Vietnam conflict saw Marine aviation operating at its peak. The pilots of fixed-wing aircraft and helicopters distinguished themselves with increasing examples of bravery and excellence.

Marine aviation has come a long way since 1912, and its future is just as bright.

said 11-year-old Kristen Colley, a sixth-grader at Aikahi. "We need to learn how to communicate with other people. This was a real learning experience for me since I'm new to the islands." Kristen arrived here eight months ago.

Eleven-year-old Chris Mills, a fifth-grader at Kailua Elementary School, was a little hesitant about going to the air station's sanitary landfill to study garbage and pollution. Although he wasn't thrilled about going to the "dump," Chris realized the importance of learning about pollution and chemical waste hazards. "It's a real problem," he said.

Problem solving was the whole idea behind the interaction day events, according to Irene Motonaga, one of the resource teachers. "We want them not only to find the answers, but also to find the problems," she said.

After nearly two hours at the learning stations, the students returned to Mokapu Elementary School to compare notes and share their learning experiences with each other.

"It was a super, fantastic experience," said Ganiko. "The kids are on a high. They're riding on the crest of a wave. I think we have truly achieved our objectives," she said. "Hopefully, they have been stimulated enough to spin-off into individual study projects next year," Ganiko added.

Courts-Martial Report

EDITOR'S NOTE: The information contained in Courts-Martial Report is submitted by the Joint Legal Service Center and is published as a source of information for all Marines.

Sergeant Cheri A. McAlmond, Headquarters and Service Battalion, Camp H.M. Smith, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of wrongful use of marijuana. She was sentenced to one month confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$400 pay per month for two months, and reduction to lance corporal.

Private First Class Wayne J. Wardlow, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron, MCAS Kaneohe Bay, was convicted by special court-martial of behaving himself with disrespect toward a superior noncommissioned officer, who was in the execution of his office; and unlawfully striking a superior noncommissioned officer in the face with his fist. He was sentenced to four months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$50 pay per month for four months and reduction to private.

Hospitalman Third Class

James R. Ketchum, Headquarters and Service Battalion, Camp H.M. Smith, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of being disrespectful in language to a commissioned officer. He was sentenced to forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for two months.

Private First Class Guillermo Gonzales, Battalion Landing Team, 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of stealing U.S. currency in varying amounts from five Marines, in the total amount of \$672. He was sentenced to six months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for six months and reduction to private.

Private Virgil V. Mims, Headquarters and Service Company, Brigade Service Support Group, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of assault with intent to commit rape. He was sentenced to six months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$75 pay per month for six months and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

U.S. Armed Forces launch 'war' on Kahoolawe

The booming of gunfire, the smell of cordite, the sight of red dust clouds and the sound of machinery were evidence that Marines were on Kahoolawe last week.

But, it wasn't just Marines on Kahoolawe. Navy, Air Force, Army and a host of Seabees also made their appearance.

"This is a unique operation for us," remarked Colonel H.J.M. Radcliffe, commanding officer, 3d Marine Regiment. "The Navy is providing naval gunfire and the Air Force is using their A-10 jets in an operational capacity. In addition, there are some Army folks and about 800 Marines."

"We were able to get naval transportation over here because Navy ships were in the area," Radcliffe added. "Otherwise we would have had to make arrangements to get other transportation, and that takes time. Since I've been here (as the regimental commander), we've been able to come to Kahoolawe three times in the past 10 months. And it works for the Navy too. They get additional training in an actual ship-to-shore amphibious exercise; the opportunity to live-fire guns in the naval gunfire role and we get to adjust their fire in a realistic environment."

It didn't really look like an amphibious beach landing as the Marines and their equipment came ashore at Smuggler's Cove. A shore party detachment from Brigade Service Support Group brought the "mike" boats ashore during the day as Marines prepared their designated areas.

"This is really good for some of the new people we're getting in," said Regimental Sergeant Major John Knowles. "Some of the young Marines are making mistakes, and that's what we expect. That's why we have exercises like this. They see their mistakes and they correct them. By the time they come out here again, they'll be 'ole salts.'"

"This works well for everyone involved," said Colonel Radcliffe as he strode up a dusty roadbed. "For instance, some of the young drivers are getting experience driving onto the ship and driving onto the 'mike' boats. There isn't much space and really no room for mistakes. I can see why the captain of the ship worries about the equipment. I watch the same way sometimes with my breath held, as the drivers of the 'mike' boats come ashore. But, that's what it's all about, getting experience for our people."

"I've never seen dust like this," said Private First Class "Mac" McNicholas, one of the duty drivers. His jeep had just

hit a pocket in the road and dust enveloped the jeep and the passengers inside.

"There's not a whole lot more we can do to keep the roads open," explained Petty Officer First Class Keith Nielson, one of three Seabees who are "the keepers of Kahoolawe." "After we've graded the roads here and removed the top soil, we seem to be just grading the earth, pushing the dust around."

As Marines hit their designated areas, lines of communications were opened. Second Battalion, 3d Marines; Company G, 2/3; Battery B, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines; Battery K, 1/12; Detachment, Company A, 3d Assault Amphibious Battalion; Regimental compound; and Explosive Ordnance Disposal on the observation post prepared for their mission during the exercise. The tower from which forward observers plotted areas for naval gunfire and the artillery joined the communications network.

Amtracs traversed the island before setting on-line to give Marines a chance to try out their guns.

"That's Tracs firing the 50-cals," remarked a Marine as bullets began smacking the impact area. Areas were specifically designated for safety purposes and to ensure protection of archeological sites. The sounds of 60- and 81mm mortars joined the rat-tat-tat of the Tracs on the hillside.

As dusk set over the red hills, Marines came on-line with their M-16s. While night enveloped the island, illumination flares lit up the impact area as tracers were fired at designated targets.

"Thursday night we're going to show them the 'mad moment,'" said Gunnery Sergeant Larry Hatfield, company gunny for Co. G, 2/3. "Mad moment is final protective fire. That's it. After the 'mad moment,' it's down to hand-to-hand combat."

On Thursday morning, other classes began with different training. A light rain squall passed over the island but was not enough to pack the dust. Just enough to let Marines know that it does rain on Kahoolawe.

A rainbow graced the island as Marines from Co. G began their morning class at the "BZO" range.

"What we're doing this morning is giving the 0311s (infantrymen) some time on the machine guns, and the mortar men are giving classes to our 0311s for cross-training," said Captain M.C. Beegle, commanding officer of Co. G. "We'll give the 0311s a chance to get on the mortars, half-load them, and fire a round or two. The purpose is not to make them expert mortar men, but to familiarize them with what a mortar man

QUANTICO, Va. — After a tight competition among nine rifle squads representing the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Marine Divisions and the 1st Marine Brigade, 1st Squad, 1st Platoon, Co. I, 3rd Battalion, 3d Marines, led by Sergeant Carl Wilson, is the recipient of the coveted title, "Super Squad."

In the fight for that honored title, it was a close call between the top two squads, with the last event, land navigation, as the probable tie-breaker.

During a ceremony at Marine Barracks, Eighth and I Streets, Washington, D.C., May 13, an evening parade was held to honor the participating squads. General P.X. Seven combat events tested the squads as Basic School instructors evaluated their performance using a point system. In order to increase the challenge and decrease any unfair advantages, all the events had been kept secret. Even the squads were referred to as numbers to keep evaluators and event supporters objective.

"My favorite event was the endurance run... our staff sergeant's hard physical training program really paid off," said Sgt. John Knecht, 3rd Battalion, 3d Marines.

Corporal Pete Ferrarini of 3rd Battalion, 6th Marines, said, "Not only did this competition test our endurance, but it tested our squad's integrity, unity and discipline too."

During the Super Squad competition, a couple of "very important observers" watched the events unfold. Major General James Day, head of training, Headquarters Marine Corps and MajGen. David M. Twomey, Commanding General, MCDEC, spoke to squad members and evaluators and observed the action. After the last day of event, the squads toured Washington, D.C. and enjoyed a well earned rest and recreation after the trials of "combat" here.



Girl Scouts provide more than just cookie sales

Every year around February they show up at your door. "Would you like to buy some cookies? We have Dosi Dos, Thin Mints, Samoans and Peanut Butter cookies."

That's how most folks remember Girl Scouts, but there's more to the organization of young girls than just the sale of cookies. "The (Girl Scout) program emphasizes self-awareness, relating to others, developing values and contributing positive

things to society," said Donna Young, Windward Field Director for the Girl Scout Council of the Pacific. She remembers wanting to be a Girl Scout when she was a young girl. "But it was not available in the community where I grew up," said Young. "I think a girl should have the opportunity to join the scouts if she's really interested. That is one reason why my work is so meaningful to me."

Two hundred girls on the air station are members of the Girl Scouts. There are 12 troops, with 10 to 20 in each troop, according to Young.

Girl Scouting presents a single continuing program of activities for girls as they progress through four age groups. A girl may join a troop at any level.

The Brownies are 6 to 8 years old, the juniors are 9 to 11, the cadettes are 12 to 14 and the seniors are 15 to 17 years old.

Vicki Brown, 11, thinks it's great to be a Scout. "It's fun! We went to camp for two days and I really learned a lot. Next year I'll be a cadette."

A trefoil (cloverleaf) is the Girl Scout emblem. The three parts stand for the Girl Scout Promise.

"On my honor, I will try To serve God, My country and mankind, And to live by the Girl Scout Law."

The Girl Scout Law encourages

members to be honest, considerate, respect authority, themselves and others. Adult leaders show the girls how to reach these goals.

"A leader plans programs with the girls and helps them have a good time in a safe environment," said Young.

A contribution of about nine hours a week is necessary for one to be a leader. A person should be at least 18, enthusiastic and willing to work with the girls, according to Young.

"My husband is back and forth on floats and I wanted to keep busy. I've been a leader for a year and I love it," said Sergeant Marie Brown, Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Brigade. "The most rewarding part of being a troop leader is seeing the girls achieve something they worked hard for. For example, this year my cadettes worked very hard to raise money for a trip to Kauai. They had bake sales, car washes and sold cookies and calendars. Now that they've raised the money, they feel as though they've really accomplished something and so do I."

Jonnie Holt, an air station troop leader for three years, said, "I was a teacher and wanted to do something involving children. I enjoy the responses of the girls. They get so excited about doing something that would seem mediocre to an adult."

According to Holt, there is a shortage of leaders here. She encourages anyone interested to call the Girl Scout Council of the Pacific at 845-9911.

There are a lot of summer activities for the girls including lei making, bake shops and day camp. A girl does not have to be a member of the Scouts to take part in these activities, according to Holt.

Girl Scouts learn ideals of character and patriotism while

they enjoy a program of work, play and companionship.

The Girl Scouts, an international organization, was initiated in England soon after Lord Robert Baden-Powell introduced the Boy Scout movement there. It was organized in the United States in 1912 by Juliet Gordon Low in Savannah, Ga.

About three million girls and more than 655,000 adults belong to the Girl Scouts in the United States.



Servicemen must register


The Military Selective Service Act requires military veterans born after Jan. 1, 1960 to register with the selective service when they leave active duty, if they had not previously registered.

Individuals leaving active duty military service are responsible for registering upon leaving military service or entering the National Guard or reserve duty.

Those who fail to meet this obligation may be subject to prosecution.

The selective service system emphasizes that registration does not imply that an individual would be drafted or recalled in case of reinstatement of a national draft.

Plans are underway to include draft registration in processing individuals out of the armed forces. Until then, registration may be completed at any U.S. post office.



American heroes of aviation inducted into Hall of Honor

Six men who spanned the years of open cockpits to World War II were inducted into the Naval Aviation Museum's Hall of Honor, May 12, during ceremonies in Pensacola, Fla.

Inducted were General Roy S. Geiger, USMC, a leading combat general and the fifth Marine to earn wings of gold; Glenn Martin, pioneer builder of naval aircraft; Admiral Marc A. Mitscher, one of the outstanding leaders of World War II; ADM Arthur W. Radford, a World War II leader who became the first Naval officer to serve as a chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Vice Admiral Charles E.

Rosendahl, the Navy's principal lighter-than-air developer and proponent; and Commander Elmer F. Stone, USCG, the first Coast Guard aviator and pilot of the Navy's NC-4 on the first crossing of the Atlantic Ocean by air.

VADM Robert F. Schultz, deputy Chief of Naval Operations, air warfare, was guest speaker for this second annual ceremony. During the event, six bronze plaques commemorating the accomplishments and contributions of this year's inductees were unveiled.

Customs procedures facilitate parcel inspections, clearance

Individuals returning to the United States carrying letters and packages can take several steps to simplify customs inspection and clearance.

To facilitate customs inspections, hand carried letters should not be sealed. Letters are not mailed until they are turned over to the U.S. Postal Service. This makes hand carried letters subject to the same customs inspection and declaration as any other hand carried baggage.

Packages and items brought in from overseas must be declared on the owner's Personal Declaration Form (DD form 1854). Items being brought through customs for the convenience of others must be noted as such on the DD 1854. These items may subject the carrier to duties and Internal

Revenue Tax regardless of the carrier's exemption status. These items are also subject to examination.

Individuals carrying letters and packages are responsible for their contents. Anyone who unsuspectingly carries contraband items through customs is exposing themselves to severe penalties.

For more on customs rules and exemptions, contact the local U.S. Customs Service Office. A helpful pamphlet written for military servicemembers and civilian government employees, entitled "Customs Highlights for Military and Civilian Personnel," is available free of charge by writing: U.S. Customs, Washington, D.C. 22209, Attention: Information Office, Room 6303.



Speed vital for household claims

As the prime season for permanent change-of-station moves approaches, individuals are reminded that claims for loss or damage to household goods should be filed as soon as possible after their move is completed.

The main reason for timely claim filing is faster reimbursement for loss or damage. This not only benefits the servicemember and his family, it also saves the government money. Claims filed too late to be recovered from the

carrier are paid from government funds. Also, timely filing of the claim reduces the chance of losing important papers.

Rapid filing of claims also acts as an alert to the government against careless household goods carriers. This serves to protect other servicemembers who will be moving in the future. Accurate claims information assists the local transportation office in evaluating the performance of carriers, and forms the basis for

denying future shipments to firms with a history of high claims.

Thus, early filing of household goods claims benefits everyone. It's more convenient, less time consuming, saves the government money, and provides timely information to evaluate household carriers. For additional information and assistance in filing household goods claims, contact the Transportation Management Office here at 257-2137.

Down on the firing line, Hatfield was preparing his Marines for their morning shoot. "What we're going to do here is get our battle sight zero, 'BZO', and we're going to use this new Canadian bullseye. This is not the rifle range, and you're not in competition. In other words, by aiming at your point of impact, you can hit your target at 300 yards or closer."

A little later in the morning, Marines gathered under the tower to watch as F-4 Phantoms came into the action.

"At this point we're doing individual fire missions by unit," explained Lieutenant Colonel Brian Fagan, commanding officer of 2/3. "Right now we're firing 81 mortars, using artillery (105s) and also using naval gunfire. They're independent missions that are answering calls from individual unit requests. At 9 (a.m.), we have the first fixed-wing coming in and we'll cover them with supporting fire."

"We're coordinating artillery fire, mortar fire and naval gunfire with the F-4s coming in. We've given naval gunfire a target, artillery a different target and we

have the F-4s dropping at another," continued Fagan. "This is for safety sake. We mark the targets with mortars and then have the other fire directed to their targets. Then we bring in the F-4s. We're working on coordination. After the F-4s pass, we'll send up illumination flares. If heat-seeking missiles had been fired, the heat from the flares would draw the missiles away from the jets."

Hidden under camouflage covering at a section of Smuggler's Cove was the artillery battery from 1/12. With their guns aimed and 105 rounds in hand, Marines awaited the word to get "hot."

When it was time, the ground shook as they fired and prepared to reload.

"What was that?" asked PO1 Neilson, Seabee, as the 155 was fired. The 155 had been silent letting the 105s "talk" until the call came for the big gun. As the big gun fired, Neilson's "hooch" shook from across the cove.

Guns sounding, mortars barking, M-16s chattering, F-4s screaming in the air and the rumble of Amtracs filling the island with red dust devils were ample evidence of Marines working in conjunction with the Navy, Army and Air Force.

Beirut gets TV

Armed service television channel 8 went "on the air" May 3 in Beirut, Lebanon.

Marines and sailors serving with the multi-national peacekeeping force are now able to watch 44 hours of television programming weekly.

The Navy broadcasting service mobile detachment, which has been providing the Navy and Marine Corps with entertainment since December 1982, now provides a television service as well. Programming includes recent sporting events, news, information programs and popular T.V. series.

RAPE

WOMEN'S RESOURCE CENTER, Calif. — Screaming and running could be the best defense against rapists and robbers, it was concluded in a Northwestern University crime study.

The two-year survey, presented recently in Toronto at a meeting of the American Criminological Society, has found that it pays to resist a stranger's attempt at rape or robbery.

But if the attacker is armed, resistance is best limited to screaming and running away, it was decided. The researchers did not include crimes in which the victim was killed.

Researcher Richard L. Block, who helped analyze six years of crime statistics compiled by the U.S. Census Bureau, said 85 percent of the people who failed to

resist were robbed, compared with 43 percent who resisted non-forcefully and 37 percent who resisted with force.

Non-forceful resistance was defined as screaming, running away or making verbal threats. The study considered only rapes of women.

Block said 58 percent of the women who did not resist were raped, compared with 19 percent who resisted non-forcefully and 33 percent who actively fought their attackers.

In robberies, researchers found that strong-arm criminals — those armed only with their fists — were more likely to attack their victims than criminals armed with knives. Attackers carrying guns were less likely to use the weapons than those with knives.

Statistics list noise as best defense

"A gun is such an efficient threat that few targets resist," the study said. "Therefore, the robber is less frequently required to attack the target to gain compliance."

Half the robbers and 70 percent of the rapists were unarmed, according to information collected from 1973 through 1979 in the National Crime Survey of the Census Bureau of 4,270 robbery and 550 rape victims.

More than two-thirds of the rapists were unarmed because they perceived their victims to be relatively defenseless, the study surmised.

"Black women are apparently

perceived to be more threatening than whites. Rapists of black women were much more likely to confront their target with a gun (33 percent) than were those of white women (nine percent)," the study said.

Men and women are likely to resist robbery attempts, but women more often use non-forceful means, the study concluded.



Bonds finance college studies

There's a guaranteed minimum of 7.5 percent interest to protect bond purchasers from the sharp drop in market rates. If bonds are lost, stolen or destroyed, they will be replaced free of charge with no loss of interest.






Kolekole Half-Marathon

Deadline for applications to participate in the American Cancer Society Kolekole Pass Half-Marathon has been extended to Tuesday. The benefit run through the historic pass will take place at 6:30 a.m. June 5, at Schofield Barracks.

"We've had such a positive response to the event, that we've extended the deadline past the Memorial Day holiday weekend," said Dick Hoyer, who shares the responsibility of race director with ultra-marathoner Bob Davidson.

"I can see where anyone who is even vaguely interested in running would want to do this course," said Davidson. "It's got

to be one of the most scenic and breathtaking runs in the state — even the nation."

The Kolekole Pass connects Schofield Barracks and the Naval Ammunition Magazine complex on the Leeward side and is normally closed to civilians. Many years ago, the pass would be opened to residents for one day only to drive from one side to the other.

Applications for the race are available at most athletic stores, gyms and health clubs, running clubs, and the HMA office at 3435 Waiialae Ave., 734-7200.

Entries are now being taken for the Coca-Cola/Bud Light Festival of Running, a series of ultra-marathons, relays and fun runs on Memorial Day weekend sponsored by the Honolulu Marathon Association.

Entry forms are available at running shops, sporting goods stores, gyms and health clubs, running clubs, and the HMA office at 3435 Waiialae Ave., 734-7200.

There are four long-distance races, relays for 10-member teams in 13 divisions, and the Hawaii Centipede Championships in the festival, all run over a four-mile course in Hawaii Kai.

The ultra-distance events are at 100 miles, 100 kilometers (62 miles), 50 miles, and 50 kilometers (31 miles), all starting at 5 p.m., Saturday.

The relays, with each runner completing the four-mile loop, begins at 8 a.m., Sunday (limited to the first 700 teams).

The Centipede championship is a 2.3-mile race for seven-member teams joined by tape or ribbon, with teams judged on costume and style as well as on time. That event starts at 8 a.m., Sunday.

Entry fee for the distance events is \$18. Fee for the relay teams is \$80 and for the Centipede race teams \$40.


There is a \$5 entry fee for individual kite contests, and kites can be purchased at the festival. However, there is no admission charge to come and enjoy the workshop and entertainment.

Toothpaste foam helps brushing



Free degree.

The following article is one of a series being presented by Hawaii Marine in cooperation with the KMCAS Dental Department.

Toothpaste, because of its flavored, foaming action, makes brushing teeth more pleasant, especially for youngsters. In terms of what's good for your oral health, however, the brushing itself is the important thing. Claims that a dentifrice alone, or a mouthwash alone, can provide a shield against decay, prevent bad breath, or get rid of gum disease simply are not true.

The American Dental Association, national organization of the nation's dentists, regularly checks products that claim to help your dental health and issues reports on their demonstrated value or lack of value.

Until 1960, none of the toothpastes tested by the ADA was clearly demonstrated to fight tooth decay — advertising claims notwithstanding. In the fall of 1960, however, the ADA did recognize one dentifrice — a toothpaste containing stannous fluoride. This dentifrice, the ADA stated, was of "significant value" in preventing dental decay when used as part of a complete oral hygiene program along with regular professional care.

In other words, this toothpaste would help prevent decay provided you took good care of your teeth and visited your dentist regularly.

The toothpaste recognized by the ADA had been clinically tested over a period of years and had proved to be effective in actual tests on children. The Association's report was issued only after the toothpaste's value had been actually demonstrated.

Since the ADA's report, other fluoride dentifrices have been shown to be effective in reducing decay. However, only those dentifrices having the ADA's Seal of Acceptance on the tube have been proven effective in actual tests.

Beware of the so-called whitening and brightening toothpastes. Whiteness and brightness are not necessarily signs of dental health. You can have the whitest and brightest teeth in town and still have them riddled with decay and undermined with periodontal disease. Any toothpaste will remove plaque — in fact, your toothbrush alone, with no toothpaste, will remove bacteria. The fluoride toothpastes give added protection. Toothpastes that are too abrasive may actually damage your teeth and gums — that is, they may wear down the tooth surfaces and irritate the soft tissues.

As for mouthwashes, there is no evidence, according to the ADA, that the average person needs to use a medicated mouthwash. The only value of a non-fluoride mouthwash is in making your mouth taste better and possibly in freshening your breath for a time. The bacteria that cause dental decay and periodontal disease are protected from the mouthwash by the sticky plaque in which they live. No amount of rinsing with anything will remove the sticky plaque. Fluoride mouthwashes have been shown to be effective in preventing tooth decay in children.

In short, neither mouthwash nor irregular use of a particular dentifrice can substitute for regular tooth cleansing that removes plaque. Neither will prevent bad breath or gum disease.

Your best program for oral health is still the same... proper tooth cleansing with both a brush and dental floss, a diet low in sugars, fluoridation of drinking water, and regular visits to your family dentist.

The dental department at KMCAS conducts a preventive dentistry program on the second Saturday of every month. Eligible dependents participating in the program will receive dental health information, a dental check-up and a fluoride treatment. Appointments can be made by calling 257-2820 on or after the first working day of each month.



HONOLULU WALDORF SCHOOL

Nestled in quiet Niu Valley, Honolulu Waldorf School stands sheltered beneath spreading monkey-pod trees on 2 acres of green grass.
