Marines test Soviet assault weapon against M-16

In some parts of the world, a burst of fire from a Soviet made AKM would mean only one thing to a company of U.S. Marines: A firefight!

The chatter of an AKM and an M-16 heard at the rifle range here was not a firefight, but a familiarization fire by 2d Battalion, 3d Marines. The exercise pitted the impact and accuracy of the U.S. M-16 against the AKM, the Soviet's primary assault weapon.

The four-day, live-fire exercise, conducted May 24 to 27, was supervised by Staff Sergeant Mickey Hankins, regimental S-2 intelligence assistant.

Hankins explained that the purpose of the live-fire exercise was to acquaint Marines with the weapon they are most likely to encounter in a combat situation. "There's about a 90 percent chance that any hostile fire against a Marine unit will come from an AKM," said Hankins.

Hankins pointed out that a problem experienced in Vietnam was that some Americans, new to combat, could not distinguish the sound of the AKM from the M-16's. "On more than one occasion, Americans got in firefights with each other because they weren't

familiar with the sound of the AKM."

One of the advantages of the M-16 is its greater practical effective range, the distance at which an infantryman can hit a target 50 percent of the time. The M-16 has a practical effective range of 350 meters, with the AKM limited to 300 meters.

While the AKM was built as an in-close assault weapon, the M-16 was designed to be a long distance, precision firing weapon.

"The Soviets are trained to fire their weapons on automatic," said Hankins. "They fire semi-automatic only one time, during basic training. It is very possible that if a Soviet soldier never goes into actual combat, he will never fire semi-automatic again."

In comparison to the Soviets, who are trained to mass small-arms fire on an area until they can overrun the enemy's positions, the Marines are trained to fire well-aimed rounds from a long distance.

Both rifles proved accurate up to 200 meters, but the M-16 showed itself deadlier at greater distances. Hankins explained that the M-16 is 25 percent longer from the front sights to the rear sights than the AKM. "The longer the distance between the front and rear sights, the more accurate the weapon will be," he added.

Although the ARM round is

larger, the M-16 round is faster and has more knock-down power, the 7.62 millimeter AKM round produces a neat hole going in and coming out. The 5.56 millimeter M-16 round has a tumbling effect upon impact. "The M-16 round can enter a man's chest, bounce around and tear things up, then exit back out through the chest," explained Hankins.

This tumbling effect was dramatized by using five-gallon milk containers filled with water. The containers were positioned 200 meters in front of the firing line and the stage was set for a comparison of the bullets knock-down power.

When the AKM round impacted on its target, the effect was so minimal it caused the Marines watching to question the marksman's ability.

When the M-16 round found its target, the explosion caused by the tumbling effect brought a rousing OOBRAH of approval from the Marines watching the demonstration.

"I like the AKM, but I'd still prefer my M-16 in the field," said Private First Class Darrel Smith of Company G. "The AKM doesn't have a stock weld which makes it very hard to sight in. I wouldn't trade my M-16 for it, but it feels good knowing that if I had to pick one up in combat, I'd know how to use it."

Cooper takes helm of FMFPac

LiGen Cooper, whose last assignment was Deputy Chief of Staff for Manpower in Washington, D.C., will replace LiGen John K. Davis, the next Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Cooper is a 55-year-old native of Clarkdale, Miss. He graduated from Bobo High School in Clarkdale in 1945. He attended the University of Mississippi before entering the U.S. Naval Academy where he earned a bachelor's

degree in electrical engineering.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in June 1950.

Upon completion of the Basic School, Quantico, Va. in March 1951, he joined the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, 1st Marine Division in Korea. He was seriously wounded while participating in the Korean counter-offensive of 1951. For his services in Korea he was awarded the Silver Star and two Purple Hearts.

Beating the prognosis of restricted use of his legs due to injuries received in Korea, he returned to full duty in 1953 and was assigned inspector-instructor of the Marine Corps Rifle Reserve Company in Columbia, S.C.

In July 1956, Cooper was transferred to the 4th Marines, 1st

Shelter befriends battered military spouses

Victims of physical or mental abuse may feel they have no one to turn to. They are either ashamed, humiliated or feel that things will get better.

But if things do not improve, there is a place to turn.

The Military Spouse Abuse Shelter is the only 24-hour emergency shelter specially designed for abused spouses of military personnel, retirees and dependents on the island.

Until last November the only service on the island like this was offered to both the civilian and military communities. But it became apparent that there was a specific need for a shelter strictly for abused military spouses because one-quarter to one-third of the victims in this dual shelter were military.

"The military is a special population," said Kate Keegan, social worker at the Military Spouse Abuse Shelter. "They have special needs and different types of stresses, such as being cut off from friends and family, culture shock and financial difficulties."

The majority of the women who come to the shelter are spouses of enlisted men, 18 to 26, and have one or two children, according to Keegan. Statistics indicate that violence occurs more often in younger families with parents younger than 30. Fifty-five percent of military members are younger than 30 as compared to 25 percent in the civilian community.

Since opening, the shelter has provided shelter and counseling to 70 active duty military families. The staff has also handled approximately 368 crisis phone calls. The callers normally request specific information

concerning a problem or are in immediate need of shelter.

The victims are primarily referred by military medical facilities, counselors and police. Approximately one-fourth are self-referred or referred by friends and neighbors.

"We try to help the women explore options and make choices during their five-day stay," said Keegan. "Some of the options include going back to their husbands with counseling, leaving their husbands by going back to the mainland or leaving their husbands but staying in Hawaii and becoming self-sufficient. This is accomplished through individual and group counseling. The majority of the women choose to go back to their husbands."

Although family separation is not encouraged at the shelter, it remains a viable

Commandant selects new top enlisted leatherneck

HQMC, WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Commandant of the Marine Corps has announced the selection of Sergeant Major Robert E. Cleary as the next Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, effective June 28.

Cleary will succeed retiring SgtMaj Leland D. Crawford as the Corps' highest ranking enlisted Marine. He will be the 10th to hold that post.

The Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps is the senior enlisted advisor to the Commandant. He advises the Commandant on all matters pertaining to the welfare, morale and performance of enlisted personnel, and performs whatever other duties the Commandant may specifically direct.

SgtMaj Cleary was born June 2, 1931 in Tweksbury, Mass. He graduated from

Holyoke Trade High School in May of 1949 and enlisted in the Marine Corps Oct. 24, 1951.

He underwent recruit training at Parris Island, S.C., then attended a nine-week Demolition Specialist Course at Camp Lejeune, N.C., where he was also promoted to private first class. He was then assigned to the 7th Engineer Battalion at Camp Pendleton, Calif., where he was the battalion demolition specialist.

In April 1953, Cleary joined the 1st Marine Division in Korea. He was a squad leader and right guide, and attained the rank of sergeant after Korea. He served with the reserve training staff in Springfield, Mass., until early 1958, when he reported to the Military Police Company at Camp

He was promoted to staff sergeant in May of 1958 and continued to serve as a military policeman until April of 1961 when he was transferred to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, as a drill instructor.

Upon completion of his tour on the drill field, he joined the 1st Marine Division for duty as a section leader and later platoon sergeant in an 81mm mortar platoon. In February 1965, he joined the 3d Marine Division as a platoon sergeant and platoon leader in an anti-assault platoon.

These assignments were followed by his first tour in Vietnam as a platoon leader with Company G, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marine, 3d Marine Division, where he was promoted to gunnery sergeant. He earned the Silver Star during his first tour in Vietnam.

In August 1967, Cleary returned to San Diego for a short tour as a drill instructor, where he was selected for first sergeant and returned to Company H, 2d Battalion, 27th Marines, where he served as the company first sergeant.

In March 1968, he returned to Vietnam, serving with Battery C, 1st Light Anti-Aircraft Missile Battalion, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, and later with Company G, 2d Battalion, 27th Marines, 5th Marine Division.

In August 1971, he was a company first sergeant in the 1st Marine Division, followed by his third tour in Vietnam as the squadron sergeant major of the Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 165, Marine Aircraft Group-36, 1st MAW.

Lebanon Marines guard site of shattered U.S. Embassy

BEIRUT, Lebanon (delayed) — Lebanese salvage workers have nearly finished clearing the rubble created by last April's terrorist bomb blast which killed 60 people and severely damaged the U.S. Embassy in Beirut.

What remains, according to a Camp Lejeune Marine, who left the embassy only a half-hour before an explosive-laden pick-up truck was driven up to the front doors and the charge detonated, is an almost tangible anxiety in that tortured city.

"Things are understandably a little tense here," commented Sergeant David N. Luttenberger, a spokesman for the 22nd Marine Amphibious Unit in Beirut. He had left the Embassy after an unusually brief stay April 18, but rushed back some 20 minutes after the 1 p.m. blast to handle the crush of U.S. and foreign press that quickly thronged in the area along the city's scenic seaside corniche.

Luttenberger indicated that the first members of the multinational force to arrive on the rubble-strewn scene were French soldiers who helped dig out casualties and guard Lebanese Red Cross rescue workers until two platoons of Fox

Company, Battalion Landing Team 2/6 arrived from their positions to the south near Beirut's International Airport. He said the Marine command is now rotating platoons from other rifle companies to keep a tight perimeter thrown up around the shattered Embassy building.

The body of a Marine security guard, Lance Corporal Robert V. McMaugh of Manassas, Va., was found April 20. He was the only Marine killed in the fiery blast that is being blamed on a pro-Iranian, radical Moslem group.

"Of course, the Marines are a little angry and frustrated that one of their Marine brothers was killed in the bombing," Luttenberger said in a telephone interview from Beirut April 22, "but no one is blaming the Lebanese. There is no indication of hostility and you have to remember a lot of Lebanese were killed too."

Meanwhile Luttenberger indicated officials at Beirut's American University Hospital, where most of the casualties are being treated, had received a telephoned bomb threat which proved false. The Marines continue to help sift through the rubble of the completely collapsed center section of the Embassy building and man

a tight cordon to discourage gawkers. They were forced into defensive positions at one time April 20, when wild firing from a Lebanese soldier in the area was interpreted to be aimed at them.

"There is concern here because of what's been going on," Luttenberger commented. "It might not be the safest place to be right now, but we are Marines and we realize there is an important job to be done here."

In his phone call from Beirut, Luttenberger revealed some further details of the sniping incident April 17 involving a Marine sentry on post near the airport. Private First Class Kenneth E. Simpson of Wellston, Ohio, was on duty near the old Lebanese University of Beirut when small arms were fired in his direction. One of the rounds tore through the cargo pocket of his camouflage combat uniform.

"He became the first American Marine since the initial landing in August to fire back at an attacker," Luttenberger indicated. "He returned two bursts (from his M16 rifle) of five rounds each in the direction he could see the fire come from."

Simpson escaped injury and no suspects in the shooting were apprehended.

Japanese students exchange culture with 'typical' families

problems because of the language barrier, so the interpreters are always on call."

"It's really interesting," said Klidell Glenn, with Family Housing here. "We had two girls last summer and it was really great. Surprisingly, the language barrier was no real obstacle. We communicated mostly through sign and body language."

"Families do not have to act as tour guides. The idea behind the program is for the children to experience a typical weekend in the life of an American family," said Glenn. "If the family is already planning to see the sights of the island that's fine, but if the family's weekend activities include cleaning the house or tuning the car, that's fine, too."

Families that have not participated in the program before will have to be interviewed by Kubota. "Interviews are necessary so that I can get a feel for the people and the home," she said.



Booby birds enjoy haven in Ulupau Crater

One of the most celebrated residents of the air station is not the infantry with its massive arsenal of weapons, nor the aircraft group with its sleek, silver birds of prey. It's the red, white and blue birds living in Ulupau Crater.

More than 700 Red-footed Booby birds make their home here. Their presence has graced the skies over the crater since the early 1920s. Since their arrival, a virtual "bird metropolis" has formed on the upper ledge of Ulupau Crater.

Being the smallest of the Hawaiian Booby birds has not hampered the red-foots' ability to propagate its species. Like their mainland relative the Gannet, this swimming sea bird has the same webbed duck-like feet.

But not all boobies go around dressed the way our red-footed, white-bodied, blue-billed residents do. In some areas of the world, boobies go around dressed in greyish brown with white tails.

Unlike some of their distant

cousins, the Red-footed Booby birds build their humble but adequate nests in trees and shrubs. This enables the birds to get the most housing from the space available. Nesting away from the ground also affords the birds and their chicks a certain amount of protection from the wily mongoose.

During April and May, the female lays her single egg of the year. The incubation period lasts about six weeks and required some pretty impressive teamwork from the proud parents. "The male and female take turns feeding and incubating the chick," said Stewart Fefer, migratory bird biologist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The "incubation shifts" last about 24 hours. "While one parent sits on the egg, the other is off feeding," said Fefer. "After the egg hatches, the feeding shifts are shorter than the incubation shifts. The chicks have to eat every 15 to 20 hours so the parents must feed more often."

The care and feeding of the chicks lasts approximately 20 weeks. Once the young boobies try their wings and leave the nest, they must become self-sufficient.

Mom and dad no longer bring home the lunch everyday.

For its food, the red-foot dives from the skies, easily catching a meal of fish or squid from the sea.

In flight, the booby soars like an eagle, rides the winds like a kite, and returns to earth with the grace of a ballerina. Visitors here marvel at the grace and beauty of these birds.

According to the community relations chief at the air station's Public Affairs Office, approximately 10 bird tours are conducted each month. Bird lovers travel from around the globe to see the boobies face-to-face. The accessibility of the bird colony offers a rare, close-up view of the birds, available in few other areas.

With the Red-footed Booby birds curious nature, bird watchers sometimes find themselves being watched by the birds.

With the steady increase in the booby bird population, and the number of bird colony tours, it is safe to say that the boobies are here to stay.

But why shouldn't they want to stay? The rent is free, the food is plentiful and they are protected by the United States Marines.



Marine Brigade, Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, where he served as a rifle company commander, weapons company commander, anti-tank company commander and as the regimental assistant operations officer.

He returned to Quantico in August 1958, and served as a platoon commander at the Basic School.

After attending the Marine Amphibious Warfare School and the Special Weapons Employment Course, Cooper was transferred to the 3d Marine Division on Okinawa where he served as the division training officer, G-3, and subsequently as S-3 of the 9th Marines until August 1963.

In 1963 Cooper returned to the United States and was assigned as the Marine aid to the Chief of Naval Operations, Washington.

In June of 1966 he assumed command of the 2d Battalion, 8th Marines, 2d Marine Division, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

From July 1968 to June 1969 he attended the U.S. Army War College, Carlisle Barracks, Pa. He was then assigned as secretary to the General Staff, III Marine Amphibious Force in Vietnam.






option. The Family Service Center here may also be contacted to counsel the abuser in some cases. "Counseling abusers is sometimes done through anger management sessions. It is a six-week, group-structured activity to associate people with others who have had similar experiences and find alternatives to physical anger," said Harvey Leighner, assistant director at FSC. "At other times individual counseling is more effective."

"We work very hard with the women who come to the shelter, but all we can do is support them," Keegan said. "In the end it's their choice."

The shelter's staff includes a social worker, a child development specialist, a house manager and assistants. Information and referrals

regarding finances, employment, and other social services are available.

The shelter is quite comfortable," according to Keegan. "It's located in a large four-bedroom house with 10 beds available for victims. There is no charge for the shelter and all necessities are provided. The only thing we expect of the women while they're here is to help with the cleaning and cooking."

The location of the shelter is confidential for obvious reasons. "We do provide transportation to the shelter because most of the women do not have cars. If a woman does have transportation, we will arrange to meet her."

The shelter's 24-hour hotline number is 681-3244. For someone in need of assistance because of mental or physical abuse, help may only be a phone call away.







Station speed demons win 10K

Another hometown victory was achieved by Corporal Bruce Hall, Friday, in Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron's Navy Relief 10K.

Hall, Brigade Service Support Group, finished the 6.2-mile race in 30:28, giving his fans an encore performance of his triumph in the Windward Marathon.

"It was a tough race," Hall commented. "I didn't expect to run this race until the last minute. I had no time to prepare for it and was hurting all the way through."

Captain Mike Boyd, Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Brigade, nipped over two minutes behind Hall's quicksilver heels, finishing with a time of 32:50. Major Charles Barton, Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron, came in third, with a time of 34:00.

Three lady leathernecks from SOMS ensured that the hosting unit was included in the win column. Sergeant Patricia Loftis was the first female to halt her heels, asthmatically crossing the line at 43:25.

"I only won because there were very few women in competition,"

Loftis said. "I'm not that fast. I felt like I had asthma at the finish. I've never felt that bad in my life."

Finishing behind Loftis in second and third places respectively were Capt Rosa Knight (45:00) and Staff Sergeant Charlene Romero (47:55).

Race competitors were charged a \$9 entrance fee, unless they made a \$1 allotment to Navy Relief.

According to Capt John James, SOMS Navy Relief fund organizer, 127 runners tested their tendons in the race, netting approximately \$300 in donations.

"An event like this generates a lot of interest," said Maj Pat Skeldon, commanding officer of SOMS. "Racing is the thing to do in Hawaii. Most people who enter a race do it for fun. There are a select few who are in it for the competition."

While participants entered for fun, competition, or for a good cause, other reasons were evident.

"In my office, there's a movement to run," said Lieutenant Colonel Gerald Miller, staff judge advocate for the air station. "If you don't run, you're not with it."

Although the course was a

"mere" 6.2 miles long — far shorter than the 26.2-mile Windward Marathon — exertion was evident in the eyes and sweat of all participants. Side cramps were the most common complaint, but the wind's occasional demise also made the run difficult.

After the race's end, runners found innovative ways to lower body temperatures. Cold oranges were gulped, and crushed ice flew in every direction to cool hot skin.

SOMS' Navy Relief fund drive is continuing with a steam-cleaning operation for engines at Crash, Fire and Rescue through Monday.



Leatherneck emerges victorious in SNCO golf tournament

Hot, new game is being sold by Woolworth

Can an old-fashioned board game steal the thunder from video games? Can the roll of a die compete with a joystick?

The F.W. Woolworth Company in Hawaii thinks so, and has already begun marketing the world's most popular new game at its Ala Moana store. The game, called Trivial Pursuit is a runaway best seller in Canada, where it was introduced a year ago. More than 100,000 games have



already been sold there, in a market where 10,000 sales would be considered good. Some 4,000 games have trickled into the United States in the last couple of months and have been selling as fast as stores can stock them.

Trivial Pursuit, geared to adults left out of the video game craze, but popular with teens, is based on knowledge of trivia. A player rolls a die and lands on a space representing one of six categories: geography; entertainment; history; art and literature; science and nature; and sports and leisure. Another player then takes a question-and-answer card from a box and queries the first player. The eventual winner must have correctly answered questions in all categories.

Between 2 and 24 players can participate, and there are more than 1,000 questions in each category. Some examples: "Who played the title role in 'The Goodbye Girl'?" and "What's the plural of mongoose?"

The game was invented by three Canadians who have already introduced a second edition with 6,000 questions based on movies.

The price of Trivial Pursuit is in the neighborhood of \$35. The answers: Marsha Mason and mongooses.




