9th MAB forms at sea

Marines assault Okinawa

OKINAWA, JAPAN — Task Force 76 of the U.S. Seventh Fleet assembled off the coast of Okinawa last week to conduct Exercise Valiant Blitz 83-3 OK, which started June 7 and ended Monday.

The amphibious task force, commanded by Commodore Robert E. Klee, involved more than 20 ships, 250 aircraft and 30,000 sailors and Marines.

D-Day, June 7, saw two battalions of the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade launched into an amphibious assault. Leathernecks of the 3d Battalion, 3d Marines hit Kin Blue Beach in amphibious assault vehicles while, simultaneously, the 1st Battalion, 3d Marines descended on the Northern Training Area in a helicopter assault.

Both landings went off without a hitch.

As the assault units moved out to seize their next objectives, Marines of Bridge Service Support Group 9 began pouring onto the beach and into the landing zone to establish the combat service support required to sustain the infantry battalions in the attack.

Marine Aircraft Group 30, a composite group that included fighter, attack and helicopter aircraft, comprised 9th MAB's aviation combat element.

From D-Day on throughout the exercise, MAG-30 provided close air support and tactical helicopter assault support to the ground combat element. Regimental Landing Team 9, Fighter aircraft quickly established air superiority over the objective area.

A unique aspect of Valiant Blitz 83-3 was the formation of the 9th MAB at sea.

Commanded by Brigadier General John H. Gary III, 9th MAB was formed by combining the 31st, 35th and 37th Marine Amphibious Units and drawing upon other units within the III Marine Amphibious Force.

The brigade's task was no easy chore.

Normally, 9th MAB has a relatively small permanent staff. To conduct an exercise of the scope of Valiant Blitz, the staff was augmented with personnel from the 3d Marine Division, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing and 3d Force Service Support Group.

The many long, hard hours of staff work paid off, though, as the success of the exercise quickly proved.

Off shore, the 9th MAB was supported

by an impressive armada of Task Force 76 ships.

While Amphibious Squadron 1 and Amphibious Squadron 3 supported the landing of combat Marines, the Midway Carrier Battle Group and the destroyers and frigates of Destroyer Squadron 25 conducted air, surface and sub-surface operations in support of the task force.

As Valiant Blitz proceeded smoothly, 1st Battalion, 6th Marines began phasing into Ie Island, which had been secured by 1st Battalion, 5th Marines on D-1.

Also joining the fray was the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines, which had been the landing force reserve.

Flying in from mainland Japan, 1/6 was dove-tailing its participation in Joint Airborne/Air Transportability Training Exercise 83-2 into Valiant Blitz.

Conducting an exercise like Valiant Blitz 83-3 OK has enabled the amphibious forces of the U.S. Seventh Fleet to practice, and at the same time prove the value of, amphibious warfare.

The 9th MAB has once again demonstrated that Marine air ground task forces are ready for any challenge, should the need arise.

Automatic teller machine opens for 24-hour service

The grand opening of the Bank of Hawaii automatic teller here was June 7.

"The purpose of the machine is to allow customers access to their accounts day and night," said Kevin Williams, Marine Corps Air Station branch manager. "The machine will decrease lobby traffic and leave more time for individual customer attention."

Colonel Charles D. Robinson, commanding officer of the air station, Roland Reeve, vice president of Bank of Hawaii, and Kevin Williams, branch manager, did the ribbon cutting honors.

"Operating the automatic teller is relatively easy," said Williams. All a person needs is a Bank of Hawaii VISA, Entree or Bankoh Bank card, and their personal identification code."

Operating procedures for the automatic teller are as follows: Insert a bank card with the brown magnetic stripe down. Enter the personal identification code. The auto-teller allows 30 seconds to enter code. If the wrong code is entered, press the clear button and the machine will allow an additional 90 seconds to enter the correct code.

Then select the transaction. The bank machine has 12 transactions to choose from. For cash withdrawals, free the withdrawal key. The machine will ask for the desired dollar amount (\$40, \$60, etc.) and press the enter button. Do not press zeros for cents. The machine will then say "please take cash." The money comes out of the currency slot on the left side of the machine.

Cash in \$20 increments up to \$100 per transaction can be withdrawn, and up to \$200 per day per card with a maximum of two withdrawal transactions per day. Withdrawals (and transfers) are reflected immediately in account balances.

For checking and savings account balances, press the balance inquiry key. The machine gives checking and savings balances as of the end of the last business day. Keep in mind that checking account balances reflect only the deposits that have already been processed through the banks.

For deposits in checking or savings accounts, fill out a deposit slip before inserting the card, and put both the slip and deposit into one of the special Bankoh Bank Machine deposit envelopes located at the front of the machine.

The Bank machine will then ask for the amount in dollars and cents, watching the display window for movement of the decimal point. Mistakes can be corrected by pressing clear before pressing enter. Re-enter the correct amount and insert the sealed envelope in depository. The arrow on the envelope indicates which way it should go in.

When the transactions are completed, please remove the card and receipt. The card emerges from the card slot, and in a few seconds the receipt will emerge from the receipt slot. Each transaction will be indicated on the receipt.

Carelessness hurts kids

Gunny X had received transfer orders. His wife was ill so he decided to take his young son to the Child Care Center. Preoccupied with the things he had to do at work before checking out, he forgot his sleeping son was in the car, Gunny X drove to work, parked the car and entered his office.

It wasn't until he heard a siren and looked out the window that a feeling of dread came over him. As the ambulance parked next to his car, he rushed out . . . remembering that his son was in the back seat. The young boy was rushed to the hospital, suffering from heat stroke . . .

"Parents need to realize the dangers of leaving children unattended and unsupervised," commented Master Sergeant Michael McKelroy, Provost Marshal's Office. "Just five minutes at the Commissary, exchange or 7-Day Store and . . . things can happen to small children."

"We, as grownups, are able to get out of our vehicles and walk around if we get bored. Children are going to want to do the same thing. If they get out, they could get hit by passing cars."

According to station regulations, children 5 years old and younger need constant supervision, and children younger than 12 may not be left unattended. McKelroy cites an example of what can happen:

"Suppose some parents want to go to the club. They might let the child or children go to sleep and then leave. A number of things can happen. For instance, what does a child do if a fire starts? What if the phone rings and the child awakes and no one's home? Maybe the child will get up and walk outside looking for the parents. The child could get lost, or get hit . . . any number of things can happen."

McKelroy went on to give directions for child safety. "Take the time to take the child with you if you're going to the exchange or the store. Even if you have to wake the child, take the time to do that. Or leave someone responsible with them, but you can't expect a 5-year-old to watch a 5-year-old," he said. "Also, talk to the older children. Explain the danger areas for their younger brothers and sisters."

"Don't let them play in the streets, in abandoned buildings, sewers or drainage ditches. These are dangerous areas," he said.

"We aren't trying to scare anyone, we're trying to ensure child safety awareness," McKelroy concluded. "Just one time of not being careful could be fatal. And it's not worth it. A child should get the opportunity to grow up healthy."

Child safety affects everyone. School is out for the summer, so make sure your child, and the other children in your neighborhood, are safe.

Battleship New Jersey visits Pearl Harbor Saturday and Sunday

PEARL HARBOR — The largest U.S. battleship ever built, the USS New Jersey, will host limited public visitation from 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday at Pearl Harbor's Hotel piers 3 and 4.

The New Jersey's crew will give guided tours of the main deck aboard the 887-foot, 58,000-ton battleship. Armored with the latest in electronic warfare and communications technology and a crew of 1,500, the New Jersey is considered to be the most modern warship of our time.

Open house aboard the New Jersey will be controlled by advance distribution of free tickets designating the visiting hour and date. Navy and Marine Corps service members and their families will be given an opportunity to obtain tickets one day before they are available to the general public.

Tickets will be distributed from Bloch Arena parking lot at Naval Station, Pearl Harbor, on a "first come, first served" basis. The schedule for distribution is as follows:

- Today from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. — 3,000 tickets will be available to Navy/Marine Corps service members and their families upon presentation of valid ID card. Entry to Bloch Arena parking lot will be from inside base only.

- Thursday and Friday, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. — 2,000 tickets will be available each day to the general public. Entry to Bloch Arena parking lot will be through Center Drive Gate only.

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Art Buchwald reflects on leatherneck life

The Hawaii Marine with thanks to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, S.C., newspaper, is happy to present this story on (former Marine sergeant) Art Buchwald, one of America's best-loved journalists.

Buchwald was born in 1925 in Mt. Vernon, N.Y. An orphan, Buchwald made his home in the Corps from 1942-45.

Buchwald's column now appears in more than 300 newspapers throughout the world.

PARRIS ISLAND, S.C. — Like many eager young men of his day, Art Buchwald ran away from home to find himself.

With ingenuity and the help of a friendly wino, Art Buchwald found himself at MCRD, Parris Island, S.C., in October 1942.

Before enlisting, Buchwald hitchhiked from New York City to Greensboro, N.C. to say farewell to an old girlfriend. After she refused to see him, Buchwald found the nearest Marine recruiter and revealed his fervent desire to become a United States Marine.

The recruiter informed him that because he was only 17 he would need his parents' consent.

"Don't worry about that," Buchwald told the recruiter. "Paw's in town buying feed so I'll get him to sign the papers."

Without a clue as to how he was going to get the papers signed, young Buchwald intuitively headed for the shabby part of town. In a dingy pool room he found "Paw."

An old drunken bum staggered up to him and asked, "You wouldn't have a drink on you, would ya, boy?"

Buchwald responded, "Mister, I'll buy you a half pint of whiskey — if you'll do something for me."

"What ya want done?"

"My Dad won't let me join the Marine Corps and if you become my father for just one hour and sign the consent papers, I'll give you the booze."

The bum's eyes lit up. "Why I'd be doing something patriotic, wouldn't I?"

"You'd probably win the war."

So he staggered down to the notary public with Buchwald and the lad explained to the notary that his paw had been drunk for three weeks, and asked if he had any objection if Buchwald held his Paw's shaky hand while he signed. The notary, also a patriot, said all right, and the papers were signed. Paw got his half pint of whiskey and "son" dashed off to the post office to be sworn in as a United States Marine.

In 1965, Buchwald returned to Parris Island accompanied by his former drill instructor Corporal Peter Martin Bonardi. His triumphant return was featured in Life magazine later that year.

In a snappy "Old Corps-New Corps" personal glimpse he told Life readers that from what he observed DIs were still "saber-toothed, man-eating Marine Corps drill instructors, whose main nourishment was chewing on the nerves of raw recruits."

The island was then known as "Alcatraz East," and no one who had spent more than 24 hours in boot camp ever hoped to leave it alive.

In a recent letter to the Public Affairs Office here, Buchwald reiterated his admiration for Marine basic training. He wrote, "The most important part of my entire Marine Corps experience was Parris Island. The people there changed my life, hopefully for the better. They made a man out of me. At least they showed me how important it was to be a man. When I went back for Life I told one of the master sergeants that the Marine Corps had been the first father figure I ever had. He said that 50 percent of the kids who went through there had the same experience."

Following boot camp in 1942, Private Buchwald was assigned to the air wing in El Toro where he was trained to be an ordnance man. "I was a very bad ordnance man; probably the worst they had during the war," Buchwald recalls. "They finally assigned me to work in the office, instead of loading 50-caliber ammunition into F-4Us."

Buchwald considers himself fortunate to have been in the air wing, though at the time he was miffed that he would not be

landing on the beach like John Wayne.

Next, Marine Buchwald "sat out" 14 months of the war on Eniwetok in the Marshall Islands, reloading fighter planes.

Seeking a change of pace, he asked for torpedo school because, as he tells it, "I figured if I wasn't very good with bombs, perhaps I might excel with torpedoes. Fortunately for the Marine Corps, I never had to use my knowledge in combat."

At his next duty station, Cherry Point, N.C., he tried his hand at public relations. This time the only bombs and aerial tactics he observed were those of the station's football team.

In 1945, according to Buchwald, he was discharged as a sergeant, given \$190 and told never to come back!

Nothing is sacred when Buchwald is on the loose with a typewriter. In one of his articles Buchwald answers the "Is there a

Santa Claus?" letter from little Virginia — using replies from the FBI, NOW and the post office. He once punned (or was it) that the slogan best describing America was, "the check is in the mail."

Buchwald has written such laugh-a-page books as "Have I Ever Lied To You," which contains more than 125 short stories. (One story relives the moment Indians discovered Columbus.) In "And Then I Told the President," Buchwald looks at crucial political and social issues, ranging from "Keeping Up With the Joneses" to "How to Stamp Out the Beatles." He again ponders the American way of life in "Washington is Leaking" with such curiously-titled articles as "Sara Lee for Senate and Killing Santa Claus." He contemplates the Samurai-Kamikaze spirit of Japanese drivers and interviews a flying saucer occupant, JFK and LBJ in "Son of the Great Society."

At least once, someone out-

Buchwald Buchwald, the writer and the Marine. And wouldn't you know it, it was a Marine sergeant major.

While revisiting Parris Island in 1965, a sergeant major gave him a tour of the confidence course, which wasn't around when Buchwald went through boot camp. The columnist wondered how recruits made it through the

demanding obstacles.

The salty s. ine pointed out that it was merely psychology. The sergeant major explained, "When you have an obstacle like this in front of you and a drill instructor like that in back of you, most of the men prefer to go forward."

Well, that's the way Buchwald told it.

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Leathernecks' assault supplied from beach

KIN BLUE BEACH, Japan — Three waves of amphibious assault vehicles crossed the Kin Blue Beach line carrying two battalions of Marines last week.

After the smoke cleared and the rattle of aggressor weapons ceased, the Marines proceeded with their missions — some continued inland while others secured the beach area.

Meanwhile, another Marine battalion assaulted the Northern Training Area via helicopter for the same purpose — to silence the aggressors and move on. As the assault battalion moved out, some Marines remained behind.

The Marines who stayed back formed a support net which catered to their fellow Marines moving further inland during Valiant Blitz '83. They were part of nearly 2,000 Marines who, after D-Day, comprised Brigade Service Support Group 9, the support element for the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade.

"Ammo, rations, fuel, water . . . if they need something, they call us. That's what we're here for," said Gunnery Sergeant Arthur P. Rouis, Marine Amphibious Unit Service Support Group-37 operations chief.

Both MSSG-37 and MSSG-31 were responsible for maintaining a flow of supplies to field units around-the-clock, while the remainder of the support element waited at sea for the first phase of the exercise to be completed.

"This meant we had to secure the beachhead, establish a defense perimeter, plan where to stage the equipment and funnel supplies to landing zones at the Central and Northern Training Areas," said Rouis.

The CTA landing zone was to be the sight of an ammunition depot, while the NTA landing

zone was equipped to affect medical evacuations. Both LZ's were also staging areas for transported equipment.

However, it was the beachhead that functioned as the nerve center. It was here that the bulk of the logistics were staged and decisions made as to where needed equipment would go.

"The tactical logistics control group decides what goes where," said Rouis. "It was up to us to determine the priorities and act on them fast."

The beach was also the location of the communications center. It was where everything came together.

"We're the link," said Master Sergeant Ray Subdon, MSSG-37.

"We're 'tied' to the ships, the LZ's and the Marines in the field," Subdon said. "We're working primarily for the landing forces by relaying information to them from the ships, the command post, and TLCC."

As in all amphibious landings, Valiant Blitz was a joint service endeavor. Not only because the Marines assaulted from Navy ships, but sailors played a major part in coordinating the disembarkation of tons of equipment without incident. In this case, Beachmaster Unit-1, Beach Party Bravo, comprised of 23 men, eased the transition of equipment from ships to its safe arrival on the beach.

"It's a narrowly defined task," said Petty Officer Second Class Calvin Woodward. "We unload the equipment — trucks, jeeps, etc. — and the Marines decide where to put it."

BMU-1 also manned the hospital evacuation station on the beach in the event anyone was injured during training.

All in all, leathernecks from 1st and 3d Battalions, 3d Marines were assured that no matter how far they penetrated into "enemy" territory, they weren't beyond the reach of the "friends" who provide vital gear.

Island hosted WWII aircraft

Marines rebuild airfield

IE SHIMA, Japan — Providing tactical airfield support on this rural island off the northwestern coast of Okinawa, 77 Marines from the various 1st Marine Aircraft Wing units contributed to the success of exercise Valiant Blitz '83.

"Since the helicopters are going to be flying over the ocean, they're counting on us to be open and ready to fuel them and get them back home," said Gunnery Sergeant James R. Cook, noncommissioned officer in charge of Marine Air Traffic Control Squadron-18.

Master Sergeant Weldon L. Wichman, NCOIC of the temporary camp, explained that the landing field was originally a crushed coral runway during World War II.

"For this operation we had to set up on the old runway. All the equipment,

power and water had to be brought in," Wichman said, "to perform the same functions as any airport."

Controllers at the airfield directed the traffic of CH-46 Sea Knights, CH-53 Sea Stallions, AH-1 Cobras, OV-10 Broncos, A-4 Skyhawk jets and C-130 cargo aircraft during the exercise.

"In our job we rarely go to the field," said Staff Sergeant Scottie L. Thomas, radar/air traffic controller. "Here we get field experience working with the portable equipment, packing up, moving it in and setting it up."

Before the equipment could be moved in, Marines from Wing Engineering Squadron-17 arrived to ensure fuel, water and electricity would be available.

Other support members included crash crewmen from Marine Aircraft Group-36, vehicle drivers from Wing Transportation Squadron-17 and

communications experts from Marine Wing Communications Squadron-18.

Expeditionary airfield personnel from Marine Wing Headquarters Squadron-1 set up runway lights and a helicopter refueling system.

SSgt Louis S. Aselin, maintenance chief, said the 15 Marines from his section were working under pressure unlike that encountered in garrison.

"Out here we're more concerned with the operation. If something goes down, we're on the go until it's fixed. It's not a 7:30 to 4:30 job," he said.

Adding to the combat environment of the operation were a series of passes by A-4 Skyhawk jets and OV-10 Broncos, simulating attacks on the air field.

Whether set up with portable field equipment in an area surrounded by fields of sugarcane or in a permanent station environment, the primary concern of everyone remains the same, the safety of the aircraft.

He was sentenced to 45 days confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$380 pay per month for two months and reduction to private.

total value of \$1,173; larceny of a wallet containing \$30; larceny of a pair of boots of a value of about \$31.96; and wrongful appropriation of one stereo, two speakers, one television/radio/cassette combination, and one stand.

He was sentenced to six months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for six months, reduction to private, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Pvt. C.L. Kluczynski, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of failing to go to his appointed place of duty on two occasions, leaving his post as firewatch on two occasions, sleeping on post and breaking restriction.

He was sentenced to two months confinement at hard labor, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

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Marines fix engine

MCAS EL TORO, SANTA ANA, Calif. — Marines at Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-11 saved the Marine Corps some money recently by completely rebuilding an F-404-GE-400 Turbofan engine, the powerplant of the F/A-18 "Hornet" aircraft.

According to Gunnery Sergeant P.J. Agrusa, noncommissioned officer in charge of the Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-11 powerplant section, this is the first F-404 engine repaired at a Marine intermediate maintenance activity.

The powerplants section received a damaged F-404 engine April 16 that left them with two options: fix it themselves or send the engine to the Naval Air Station, North Island, Calif. Rework Facility. The latter could

have easily exceeded \$200,000.

H&MS-11 had initially sent three Marines to receive formal schooling on rebuilding the F-404 engine in October 1982, but those maintenancemen are still considered to be in an on-the-job training status. But when the downed F/A-18 engine was sent to their shop, they quickly went to work at making it operational again. Sergeants Dean Polilo and Larry Van Dyke, Lance Corporal Desso Scholtz and McDonnell-Douglas technical representative Larry Slay spent approximately 411 man-hours replacing about 116 parts on the damaged engine.

The engine was released to its unit, fully operational, May 26.

"The men could hardly wait to see the aircraft fly once it had been repaired," Agrusa commented. "This was a tremendous boost for them. We know now that we have the confidence and the know-how to repair this type engine."

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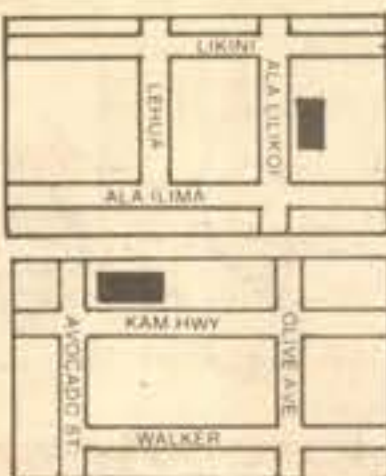
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—NCOs and privates had to be "able-bodied men, not under 5 feet 6 inches in height without shoes, nor under the age of 18 nor above the age of 46 years."

—monthly pay was: lieutenant colonel, \$60; major, \$40; captain, \$30; lieutenant, \$22; sergeant, \$5; corporal, \$4; and private, \$3. That is not what they received, though. "Sums . . . shall be deducted from the pay of the noncommissioned officers, privates and musicians . . . for the purpose of forming a fund for clothing and hospital stores." Deductions were: sergeant, \$1.50; corporal, \$1.25; and private, \$1.

—a fringe benefit in those days was that subsistence was paid to officers at the rate of \$12 for lieutenant colonels and \$10 for majors. Captains and lieutenants didn't get anything.

—for enlisted people, "every noncommissioned officer, private and musician . . . shall receive annually, one hat or helmet, one coat, one vest, two pair of woolen and two pair of linen overalls, four pair of shoes, four shirts, two pairs of socks, one blanket, one stock and clasp and one pair of buckles."

—there were no dining halls or base exchanges. Enlisted people got "one pound of beef or three-quarters of a pound of pork, one pound of bread or flour, half a gill of rum, brandy or whiskey or the value thereof at the contract price where the same shall become due; and at the rate of one quart of salt, two quarts of vinegar, two pounds of soap and one pound of candles to every 100 rations."

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LtCol Horton takes helm of MABS-24

Lieutenant Colonel Joseph R. Horton assumed command of Marine Air Base Squadron-24 during a change of command ceremony here Thursday. Horton, who has served as the logistics officer for Marine Aircraft Group-24 since December of last year, took the helm from LtCol Myles C. Still.

Horton was promoted to his present rank Dec. 1, 1982. His decorations include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Air Medal with 17 Strike Flight Awards, the Navy Commendation Medal with a Combat "V", the United Nations Service Medal and various Vietnamese Campaign Medals.

Illinois will hold a special primary election July 26, followed by a special election Aug. 23, to fill the seat left vacant by former Congressman Harold Washington who was recently elected mayor of Chicago. Washington represented the 1st District of Illinois, which includes the city of Chicago.

Military personnel and civilians who maintain a legal residence in the 1st District of Illinois may vote in the primary and in the special election Aug. 23.

Members of the U.S. Armed Forces and Merchant Marine, and their spouses and dependents who are residing with them, and U.S. government employees serving outside the United States, may vote in the special election. They need not register if they voted at least once in the previous four-year period.

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Coxswains guide landing craft in amphibious assaults

SAN DIEGO (NES) — The thought of an amphibious assault might conjure up visions of Normandy's D-Day or John Wayne on the beach at Guadalcanal. But ask a sailor assigned to ACU-1 and he's apt to recall what he did at work today. "Somebody's got to get the troops and gear to the beach," says James Stevenson, 24, of North Augusta, S.C., a coxswain for one of the unit's landing craft. "We not only get them there but make sure they arrive on time."

Assault Craft Unit One is located at the Naval Amphibious Base Coronado, Calif., and

provides landing craft and crews for amphibious operations in the Pacific.

ACU-1 detachments deploy to the Western Pacific aboard the Navy's large amphibious ships, designed with floodable well decks to carry a flotilla of landing craft. These craft consist of LCU's — utility landing craft and LCM-8's — mechanized landing craft.

Manned by enlisted crews, these barge-like, shallow-draft craft slide directly onto the beach to drop their bow ramps and quickly unload combat-equipped troops, equipment and supplies.

By providing transportation to the beach, these small boats and crews are the final link in

inherently complex and dangerous amphibious operations.

Each 135-foot LCU carries as many as 450 combat-equipped troops and up to three tanks, or a variety of other cargo such as bulldozers, communications vans, jeeps, trailers and artillery. The smaller 73-foot LCM-8's, commonly called Mike boats, have space for one M-60 tank, 150 troops or 60 tons of equipment and supplies.

Usually a chief or first class petty officer is in command of an LCU. Nine other crewmen handle the ship's gunnery, deck, communications, supply and engineering tasks.

Serving as craftmaster of a landing craft is a unique

opportunity for senior enlisted men to experience the responsibilities of a command.

Several months of practical experience, classroom training, completion of personnel qualification standards and passing a comprehensive written examination are required before a petty officer can qualify as a craftmaster of an LCU.

The Mike boats, though smaller than the LCU's, require no less responsibility and professionalism from their crews. Like craftmasters, the coxswain of a Mike boat receives extensive training in inland and international rules of the road, weapons, communications, supply, first aid

and amphibious operations and tactics. Assisting him are a chief engineer, assistant engineer and a bowhook.

Unlike the LCU's, the Mike boats are not self-sufficient. They rely on the mother ship to furnish food, berthing space and living quarters throughout a deployment.

Precise timing is the key to any amphibious operation and the landing craft must hit the beach within seconds on a complex, interdependent, predetermined schedule.

"We practice landings with the Marines," says Petty Officer Second Class Darrol Back, 28, of Borger, Texas, another coxswain

with ACU-1. "And we work with the ships to launch from and return to their well decks."

"I'm like the skipper of the boat," he says. "To qualify as a coxswain, I had to go through a special school and pass an oral exam board."

"It's satisfying to know I'm good enough to have my own boat."

And good he has to be.

The success or failure of an entire amphibious operation depends on the seamanship and courage of the enlisted assault boat coxswains and craftmasters who must con their craft to the beach — safely and on time.

The list of activities planned by the FCA include films, picnics, guest speakers, softball games and gospel and rock concerts.

Ganier said he wants to make the group's activities available to more people. "Not enough people know what we're about and what we're trying to do," he said. "It's not a chapel Bible study. We're a group of people who enjoy going out and doing things together."

Marines and sailors involved with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes speak enthusiastically about the organization and its members.

"There's real fellowship

involved here and I think it's great," said Religious Program Specialist-3 Ethany Leech of the Station Chapel. "It provides a togetherness that you don't get from work or from being away from your family."

According to Lance Corporal David Nordvall of Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Brigade, a lot of people have a misconception about the purpose and scope of the organization. "I really feel in my heart that if people would look at the FCA objectively, not just as a bunch of Christian athletes getting together to pray, they would realize the true potential it possesses."

Joining the FCA, a non-profit organization, is neither a commitment to attend every

meeting or to spend money. The organization is completely funded by the Station Chaplain's Office.

Even with the obvious benefits of the FCA, only a handful of Marines and sailors have taken advantage of the situation.

But the enthusiasm of the members show potential for the future of the organization here.

"No matter how many people show up for the meetings, we'll be at the Boondocker the first and third Monday of each month at 7 p.m. with something to do," said Ganier. "Whether it's a film, guest speaker or concert, we will be there."

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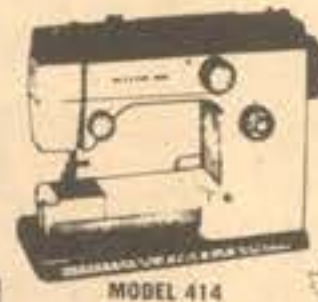

New DoD policy ups pay back of bonus money

A new policy was announced by the Department of Defense regarding enlistment/reenlistment pay back procedures.

The new policy will have an impact on individuals who fail to complete their terms of service while serving on an enlistment/reenlistment contract. The change in bonus recoupment affects enlisted personnel in several categories.

First, the new policy states that any unearned portion of the reenlistment bonus, already received by a servicemember, before entering a commissioning program may be kept.

However, members eligible for future anniversary bonus payments will have those payments suspended upon entering a commissioning program and will lose eligibility for the remainder of the bonus upon commissioning.

Secondly, enlisted women who voluntarily leave military service due to pregnancy, lose entitlement to any unpaid portion of the reenlistment bonus and will be required to repay any unearned portion already allotted.

Previously, those women who voluntarily separated for pregnancy were allowed to keep

any unearned portion of the bonus already received and were paid the remainder of the bonus to fulfill their reenlistment contract.

Individuals who are separated for various reasons considered within their control are also affected by this revision policy. This clarifies recoupment policy on "Misconduct" discharges and include such reasons as unsatisfactory performance, drug and alcohol rehabilitation failure and overweight/obesity.

Personnel separated for these and similar reasons must repay enlistment/reenlistment bonuses upon discharge.

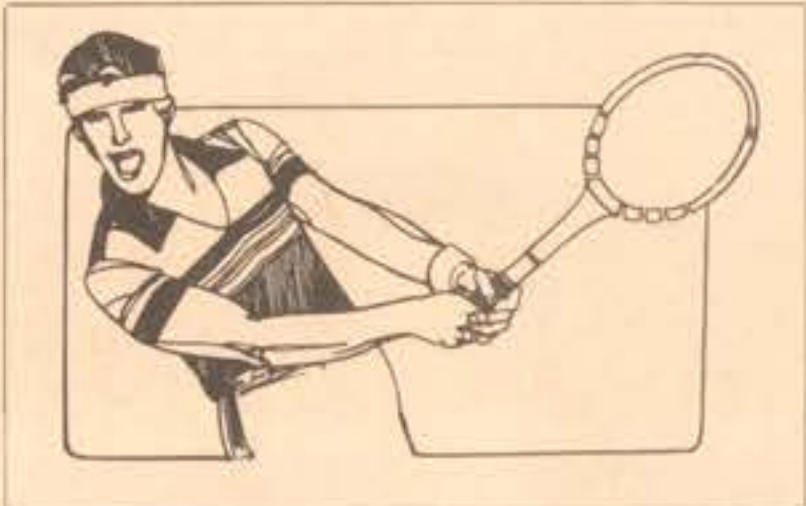

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Arm wrestler victimizes confident opponents

Headlines are harvested by time-honored sports. Athletic-minded Americans turn to the sports section and read about baseball, basketball, football, and other staples of American competition.

Some sports, however, don't make it into breakfast table newspaper. They aren't even given the opportunity to line the cage of the family canary. Truly, the neglect has been complete — until now.

"Arm wrestling is a true sport," said Lance Corporal Mike Burgamy, Marine Barracks Hawaii. "It's growing more and more every day."

At 6-foot-4-inches tall, the 185-pound leatherneck is not what spectators expect in an arm wrestling champion. Still, he has proven his abilities in numerous competitions, including the Hilo State Arm Wrestling Championship Tournament (in which he finished first in light heavyweight and super heavyweight divisions) and in his home state of Georgia (where he finished second in state competition in 1981).

"It's really just a matter of tendon strength," the lanky leatherneck remarked. "It's not a lot of muscle strength. Tendon and finger strength are what count."

The sport, in one form or another, has been around for generations. Rarely a night goes by that it isn't cheered on in saloons across the land. It's even become cliché for meek, social drinkers to be coerced into competition by mammoth, pot-bellied carousers.

A rising tide of professionalism has failed to remove this foolishness. "In bars, the best cheater wins," Burgamy commented. "Likewise, most of the people who get in these tournaments aren't serious. They think they're big and strong and can beat everybody. Someone who is serious about it has a big advantage."

Those who haven't seen Burgamy defeat a 300 to 400 pound opponent are missing something akin to "David and Goliath." Opponents frequently pound the table out of

anger or embarrassment, and one referee in the Hilo competition, skeptical of Burgamy's abilities, called foul each time the Marine put his opponent down. After three times, Burgamy was declared the victor.

Strategy for a match depends on the size and

build of the adversary. "I prefer a method where I pull back and bend the other guy's wrist backwards," he commented. "Quickness is also a very important factor."

"When wrestling, I block everything else out of my mind," he added. "I concentrate on

putting his arm down. If he makes a movement to twist my wrist or something, I try to think of a countermove to stop him."

Training consists of practice sessions between Burgamy and one or more friends. "For training, I just arm wrestle a lot," he said. "I let people use two hands. There's no amount of weight lifting that you can do to build your strength for arm wrestling. One thing that you can do is arm wrestle someone a whole lot bigger than you. That will build up your strength."

Burgamy will be competing in state competition 7 p.m. Saturday at the Hawaii State Fair. His major opponent will be last year's defending champion, the "disbelieving" referee in Hilo. Maybe Burgamy will make a believer out of him one more time.

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Malocclusion destroys teeth, jawbones

The following article is one of a series being presented by Hawaii Marine in cooperation with the KMCAS Dental Department.

Teeth aren't likely to chew well if they do not come together (occlude) properly when the jaws close. Malocclusion, as this condition is called, may cause problems in eating. It may also put a strain on the entire chewing mechanism. This strain can damage the teeth and the structures that support them. It may also injure the joints that allow the lower jaw to move. Besides, teeth that are irregular and do not occlude properly detract from a person's appearance.

Malocclusion most often develops when the first teeth are being shed and the permanent teeth are erupting, but it may occur at any age. Sometimes, malocclusion is the result of inherited factors, such as the size of the jaws and the teeth. Sometimes, harmful habits such as thumb sucking, or early loss of teeth through decay, are the major reasons. Sometimes, there is a combination of causes.

Whatever the cause, prompt treatment by a dental specialist known as an orthodontist is required if crowded, widely spaced, or rotated teeth are not to spoil a child's appearance or damage his dental health.

Teeth that are too prominent or that meet improperly may interfere with chewing and put an extra burden on the stomach. Food particles lodge readily between teeth that are not in proper position, making them prey to tooth decay and gum disease.

When you consider the fact that jaw muscles can apply 200 or more pounds of force with each chewing bite, it's easy to see how malpositioned teeth could cause severe strain and damage.

A dentist can often prevent conditions leading to malocclusion, if he is consulted

early. That's why he should see your child between 2 and 3 years of age, as soon as all the first teeth have erupted.

Baby teeth are needed to maintain the shape of the dental arch and save the space that will be needed if the permanent teeth are to come in properly. Your dentist can help keep the first teeth healthy. He can place a space maintainer if the first teeth are lost too soon, or he can remove those teeth if they stay too long. He can provide advice on improper habits that may be causing faulty tooth position.

As the permanent teeth come in, the dentist can refer your child to an orthodontist if such treatment is needed. The critical age for correcting malpositioned teeth is when your child is 11 or 12 years old, for then the orthodontist can take advantage of the normal growth of the mouth and face to aid in making corrections.

Does it weaken teeth to have them straightened? No. Teeth can be moved or rotated in the mouth without damage and without loss of bone support. In fact, many persons have had complete orthodontic correction with excellent results after they were grown. Teeth are moved slowly by light pressure applied by means of bands and wires attached to them. The bone structure against which such a force is applied is slowly rearranged, making room for a tooth to move. At the same time, new bone is building up on the opposite side. It fills in the space from which the tooth has moved and provides continued support.

Malocclusion can usually be entirely eliminated. Function and appearance are almost always improve, and the result is a long

step toward keeping that smile for a lifetime.

The primary task of dentistry is not to extract teeth but to preserve them.

By partially or fully removing a tooth's diseased or injured nerve, your dentist may be able to keep a tooth in your mouth that would otherwise be lost. These so-called dead or "devital" teeth can last just as long a normal teeth and are always superior to false ones.

Treatment of teeth with an injured or destroyed nerve is called endodontics. Endodontic treatment is used when the tooth pulp — the innermost core of the tooth that contains the nerves and blood vessels — has been injured, or attacked by deep decay. Such a tooth may become infected, and the bacteria causing the infection can spread throughout the entire pulp, eventually reaching the bone around the tooth and damaging it.

If the diseased portion of the pulp is removed and the bacteria destroyed, healing takes place — just as it does in any other part of the body. A protective layer of "secondary" dentin will form where the pulp has been only partially removed.

Where the jawbone has become involved, the bone will grow back normally once the infection is gone.

Sometimes, only part of the pulp needs to be removed; sometimes, the removal of the entire pulp is required. In either case, the dentist will fill the pulp canal with a special material and cap the tooth to prevent penetration of bacteria or fluids. The fibers that attach the tooth to its socket continue to hold it firm.

Endodontic therapy is being used more and more to save even baby teeth, whose retention in the mouth is so important to proper positioning of permanent teeth.

These pulp-treated teeth are so strong that they can even be used as anchors for partial dentures replacing those teeth that could not be saved by endodontic treatment.

A dependent dental care program is offered at the Kaneohe Branch Clinic, the second Saturday of each month from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. For appointments call 257-3266 the first workday of each month.

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

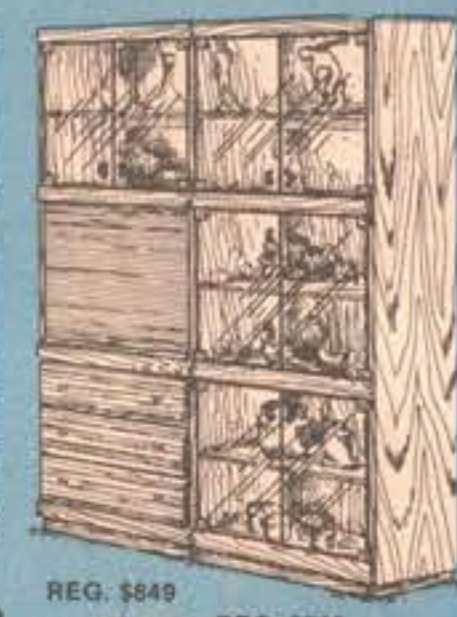
