Like a giant emerald on a cloth of aquamarine velvet, Coconut Island rests serenely in the center of Kaneohe Bay.

Protected from the west by the Koolau Mountain Range, and from the east by the Marines, the island boasts a history as vast and as colorful as any of the islands in the Hawaiian chain. Coconut Island, or more correctly Moku o Lo'e, is currently the home of the University of Hawaii's Institute of Marine Biology, but in years past the island has served a multitude of purposes.

Originally used exclusively by Hawaiian royalty, the island has also served as a playground for the rich; a location for several Hollywood movies; a private zoo, complete with an elephant and giraffe; a Rest and Recuperation Center for Americans during World War II; and even as a sanctuary for Queen Kalama's turkeys and chickens.

The origin of the islands real name, Moku o Lo'e, lies deep in Hawaiian folklore.

According to legend, long ago two brothers and their sisters were forced to leave their home at Kahua-iki (Wea) or constantly fighting with their arents. The brothers were named 'ahu and Kahoe, and the sister's name was Lo'e.

After being expelled from their home, the outcasts traveled to the windward side of Oahu to begin a new life.

In order to practice his trade as a fisherman. Pahu set up his home by the bay, now known as Kaneohe Bay. Kahoe, the farmer, moved to the country where the soil was best for his crops. Lo'e made her home on what is now Coconut Island, thus the name Moku a Lo'e or the Island of Lo'e

Bet perhaps the most celebrated resident of the island was Christian R. Holmes, the multi-millionaire heir to the Fleischman yeast fortune.

Holmes purchased the island in 1933 in a storm of controversy. Several Hawaiian families claimed the island had been granted to them by King Kamehameha III, but none could substantiate their claim.

Eventually the courts decided that Holmes' purchase of the island was valid, so he set about turning the island into a luxury retreat.

Holmes indulged himself with his new "toy." He stocked the island with pheasants and peacocks, imported an elephant and giraffe for his private menagerie, and covered the treeless island with coconut trees, thus its present name.

He later purchased a four-masted schooner named the Seth Parker. Filling the hull with cement, he permanently dry docked the ship and

turned it into a muntical recreation noom

But Holmes' most flamboyant venture had to be the enlarging of Coconut Island, Using coral dredged from the bay. Holmes more than doubled the size of the island, from 12 to 28 acres

Chris Holmes did not get to enjoy his island retreat for long. In 1944, he committed suicide. His possessions were sold to the highest bidder and his paradise quietly deteriorated until World War II created a new purpose for the island.

During the war, the U.S. government paid \$2,425 a month to use the island as a Rest and Recuperation Center for fighter pilots and bomber crews.

In 1946, a group of businesmen led. hy Edwin Pauly purchased the island for \$250,000. They planned to open a businessman's club called The Coconut Island Club International. But offering the club's high-priced membership to an elite clientele did not work out.

Over the next decade, the proposed projects for the island ranged from a nudist colony to a heavenly home for Father Divine's angels. Both fell into obscurity.

## **Blaze destroys** home of SOMS leatherneck

While many people were gearing for a fantastic three-day weekend May 27, a fellow Marine and his family were burned out of their home

Corporal Paul Mugge, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron, did not have fire insurance and has no way of recovering his loss.

Material losses of approximately \$10,000 included a recently purchased electric keyboard and accordian.

Irreplaceable articles were also lost. Those types of things most people never really think about until they don't have them anymore, such as high school year books, pictures and sentimental objects of days gone by.

'Mr. Walsh was the lone fatality of the fire. The parakeet died of smoke inhalation. "The bird's death got to my wife," said Mugge. "She was really attached to it.

Mugge arrived on the island in March from Cherry Point, N.C., and had just started feeling at home in Kailua.

"I thought of all kinds of insurance when I got here - car insurance, life insurance ... but fire insurance? Most people don't have fire or theft insurance and neither did I, but I should have,"

said Mugge with a regretful tone.

The American Red Cross arranged for the Mugges to stay at the Pagoda Hotel during the weekend following the fire, and Navy Relief donated pots and pans to the couple.

"The Marines in my unit have really helped out. My officer-incharge, Captain R. Betros, helped me salvage what was left after the fire, which wasn't much," said the corporal.

Other Marines in his unit have offered him things at dirt cheap prices including baby clothes for his expecting wife.

"The Monday following the fire I went to the housing office and they arranged for me to be on a special temporary living allowance until a housing unit is available," said Mugge.

They moved into station housing last week.

"It's such a drag having to start all over again. We had everything straightened out and were on a smooth road looking. forward to the birth of our first child. Now we'll have to start all over again." said Mugge.

Arson is the suspected cause of the fire because a finmmable liquid was found in the area, according to the fire marshal in Kaiiua

The Soviet SA-7 GRAIL is a man portable, light anti-aircraft missile similar to the American Redeve. It utilizes an infrared homing system and relies upon tail interception to engage low flying aircraft.

Sighting the SA-7 is accomplished optically with the infrared seeker being activated when the operator has acquired the target. Once the indicator shows the seeker has "locked on" to the target, the operator can fire the missile

Flares were found to be an effective counter measure against the initial model, however, later models are equipped with filters to comhat this tactic. The missile is generally lethal only to small aircraft, but has been proven to be especially effective against helicopters. Many thousands of these simple, but reasonably effective weapons, are in service around the world, some of them with guerilla and revolutionary movements.

# Marine retires

"I had just taken the entrance examination for the Air Force and as I was leaving the office I saw two Marine recruiters in dress blues, I said to myself, 'Self, I want one of those!' I asked the recruiters how I could get one. They said, 'follow us' and I did.'

That's the way Sergeant Major William Cockett, Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Brigade, described his decision to join the Marine Corps.

"Of all my experiences, next to combat, boot camp had to have been the most devastating experience," reminisced the sergeant major just minutes before he retired June 24.

"My first opportunity to leave Hawaii was when I enlisted in the corps. Back in 1957, it was a big deal just to go from one island to another and I had never even done that," he said laughingly. "It took 10 hours to reach the mainland and it was quite an experience for a young man who had never been off an island."

The flight time to the mainland has diminished to five hours since Cockett joined the Corps, and the leathernock has witnessed other changes as well.

"I've seen better equipment developed, more intelligent troops and definitely a lot more comraderie. It seems to me that the troops are sticking together much more now than they have in the past. When a fellow Marine needs help his comrades are there to extend a hand," said the Hawalian native.

Attitudes in the Corps have also changed, according to Cockett. "Senior enlisted Marines are giving 110 percent more toward the comfort of their troops. And, the troops' attitude has also changed. They are more vocal about their opinions, but at the same time they are respectful."

"My advice to young Marines is to keep working toward a goal in the Corps. Whatever you obtain in the Corps, whether it's work experience or life experience, you will be able to use it in civilian life, whenever you decide to return to it," said Cockett.

Future plans? "Well, my immediate task is to move home to Maui and go fishing," said the sergeant major as he imitated casting a line, "I've had a few job offers, but rest and relaxation are the immediate things on my agenda.'

"Some of the money was given to local organizations such as Recreational Education for Adults and Children with Handicaps. However, most of the money was donated to organizations on the air station," said Thomas.

Donations from the wives club have provided disposable diapers at the dispensary, babysitters for families attending pre-deploy-ment briefs, Operation Second Stage and Operation Homecoming, according to Thomas.

"We have also provided funds for the Hotline from the airport to the air station. The Hotline is used when a Marine comes to the island and there is no one at the airport to meet him. He can use the line to call the air station and someone will pick him up," said Thomas.

The club has also helped families in times of personal crisis such as fire or death.

Money that is donated by the club is raised through raffles and other fund raising activities.

Thomas says the wives are trying to draw attention to their purpose and goals. "We try to improve the lives of the Marines and their families here.

Anyone having the time and energy to devote to the club's goals are invited to join. Members must be wives of staff NCO's. However, women of junior enlisted men are invited to sit in on the meetings. and participate in the activities, according to Thomas. The only difference is that they are not allowed to vote.

Don't make a lot of noise by singing or chanting, especially near housing areas. If you do, the enemy will spot you quicker or you may find yourself de of exercise similar to dodging old shoes, rolling pins and dirty names. The only group of people more fanatic than joggers are mothers trying to get their kids to aleep.

jogging is to avoid jogging. It makes sense, but as evidenced by the herds of gasping, sweating bodies dotting the air station's roadways, joggers are just not going to stop jogging.

As I slimmed another quarter into the box my finger jammed and 1 dropped about \$1.80's worth of change on the floor,





Seven United States presidents would probably say yes if they were alive to do so.

Tecumseh died in that battle and the Prophet, who was the Shawnee medicine man, put a curse on Harrison and his government.

# 3/3 Marines declared 'Super Squad' of 1983

In the tradition of victorious warriors, 14 Marines of Company 1, 3d Battalion, 3d Marines brought honor and distinction to themselves and to the 1st Marine Brigade by winning the coveted title,"Super Squad."

The Super Squad competition, May 3-14 at Quantico, Va., tested the Marines' technical and tactical proficiency in seven events. Their victory was the direct result of months of intensive training.

The first event, the rifle range competition, tested the Marines' skills with light anti-tank assault weapons, M-203 grenade launchers, night firing, calling support fire from 81mm mortars, and the combat trophy course.

The Kaneohe devil dogs made an impressive showing in this event and their combined skills earned them second place in the rifle range competition.

The next event was the combat endurance run, a three-mile course, up and down the hills of Quantico, in a simulated combat situation.

### Charging forward

The course took the Marines over, under, around and through strategically placed obstacles that pushed the leathernocks near their limits.

"There were officials all along the course," soid Sergeant Carl Wilson, squad leader. "They were judging our endurance, teamwork was in desperate need of and motivation. We were really up - reinforcements. for that event."

According to Wilson, each squad was given a complete personnel and equipment inspection at the end of the run. "They wanted to see how much equipment we lost along the course. We had every piece of gear we started with." Wilson added confidently

The squad members were then required to fire their weapons to ensure serviceability.

Marines secured a solid first-place to the objective. victory

On the third event, the individual fire teams and squad

leaders were tested on their ability designated casualties weren't to function separately.

One fire team was given a nuclear, biological and chemical problem. The team was required to treat a Marine who had been exposed to an unknown chemical agent and then transport him to a BOCUTE ATEA.

Another fire team was given the undesirable task of locating and clearing a minefield. "We went strictly by the book on that one," said Corporal Richard Demaio, grenadier rifleman for the first fire team. "We cleared the entire field with no problems. That's where training and teamwork come in handy

The third fire team was judged. on its ability to administer combat first aid to a wounded Marine, sans corpsman.

### Explosive test

The squad leaders' test in the third event was no easy task. They were required to set in, fire and retrieve a live Claymore antipersonnel mine. Wilson's presence at evening chow attested to the success of his mission.

As would almost become habit, another first-place victory was secured by the India Company grunts.

The fourth event was a defensive combat problem. The scenario was ats follows; A Marine platoon, set in a defensive position, was being attacked by an enemy force of unknown size. The platoon had taken numerous casualties and

The squad's objective was to make its way to the beleaguered platoon and prepare defensive positions. Throughout the entire eight-hour exercise, the Marines were required to wear NBC suits.

To further test the endurance and initiative of the grunts, three Marines were designated as casualties at the start of the event. Since Marines never abandon their own, the casualties had to be In this event, the Kancohe transported by the rest of the squad

### Real casualty

As if the NBC suits and the

problem enough, one of the Marines from here actually became a heat casualty during the exercise.

In true Marine Corps fashion, the 1st Marine Brigade devil dogs administered to their wounded. reached their objective in time, and established defensive positions. Mission accomplished, and another first-place victory.

The fifth event in the competition was a security patrol. The squad's objective was to locate several checkpoints and radio their locations back to the judges.

"At one checkpoint the enemy was waiting to ambush us," said Cpl Thomas Bullins, second fire team leader. "They hit us hard. We had a quick firefight, then they retreated back into the bush."

Bullins said a helicopter on a reconnaissance patrol radioed to the squad that an enemy patrol had been spotted at the next checkpoint, waiting in ambush.

"We had another firefight at the next checkpoint," Bullins said excitedly. "We beat them back again, but this time we found ourselves with two prisoners of war.

In order to test the effectiveness of the squad's chain of command. the officials declared the squad and first fire team leader killed in action during the second ambush. Bullins, being the next Marine in the chain of command, immediately assumed control of the squad.

"I knew I had a real problem on my hands," said Bullins. "I had KIAs and POWs to transport, and not enough men to provide flank security.

#### Initiative

"But I knew my problems were solved when I saw a field ambulance coming down the road. I told Cpl (Louis) Ward to get us that truck ... any way he could."

Since Marines always follow orders, Ward halted the ambulance and "convinced" the two Navy corpsmen inside that it was in their best interest to give up their vehicle. They did.

said amusedly. "Not until they ran into Ward that is."

Their initiative, judgement and aggressiveness secured another first place for the Kaneohe Marines

The sixth event was an offensive cmbat problem. After flying into a landing zone, the squad moved to an assembly area to prepare for a live-fire attack on an enemy position of pop-up targets.

During this phase of the competition, the squads were judged on how well control was maintained during movement to the objective. Once at the objective, the squads were graded on their fire control and marksmanship. Another first-place victory for

the 1st Marine Brigade was added. The seventh and final phase of

the competition was the land navigation course. This 23-mile course zigzagged through dense Virginia countryside and took more than eight hours to complete. "I had checkpoints that were more than three miles apart," said Wilson. "We really hustled through the land-nav course, but only tied for third place.

Although the Kancohe Marines swept the competition with five first-place, one second-place and one third-place victory, they were not informed of their standing in the competition until the Sunset Parade in their honor at Marine Barracks 8th and L

"When they started to announce the winners, we all had butterflies in our stomaches," confided Wilson. "As soon as the announcer named the first runner-up, we knew we were the winners. When he announced us as the "Super Squad of 1983," we went wild. We ooh-rahhed so loud that we drowned out the announcer.

After the parade, the new super squad had the honor of being photographed with General Paul Kelley, then Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps and then Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps Sgt Maj Leland Crawford.

'It was the greatest moment of my Marine Corps career," Demaio said proudly. "It was even better than graduating from boot camp "The corpsmen weren't even at Parris Island . . . and that's involved in the exercise," Bullins saying a lot."



"John Wayne couldn't make it because of a tight shooting schedule. I found Kirk Douglas at a barin Waikiki. He couldn't make it either because of the film they were shooting."

Another famous person who "almost" participated in the parade, had to cancel his planned visit at the last minute. "In 1979 President Jimmy Carter was supposed to be in the parade. The whole island was excited about that. We had a lot of entries in the parade all of a sudden," said Farias. "The place was covered with secret service agents. President Carter had to cancel for some reason ... but we still had a great parade."

The Kailua Fourth of July Parade has become a tradition on Oahu. From a modest beginning of less than 2,000 spectators, to the more than 40,000 people who lined the parade route last year, the parade has grown at an impressive rate.

This year's parade has the potential to be the biggest and best

parade ever, according to Jack Richardson, chairman of the parade committee and honorary mayor of Kailua. "There will be over 4,000 people marching in the parade this year." said Richardson "We have floats, clowns, horse units, car and motorcycle clubs, military units and at least seven bands. We'll

have something for everyone." Richardson explained the theme behind this year's parade "Polynesian Fourth of July." "Kailua is a small town but we have as much patriotic spirit as any town on the mainland. We might be the 50th state, but we're just as proud to be Americans as the people from any other state."

An aerial portrait of light and color will be painted above Flat

Island beginning at 8 p.m. and lasting about an hour.

Grand Marshal Jrungard Aluli will preside over the parade that is scheduled to begin 10 a.m. at Omao Road in Kailua. The parade will travel more than a mile down Kainalu Drive, working its way past tens of thousands of spectators, and will end at the

Kailua Intermediate School on South Kainalu Drive.

The reviewing stand for the judges will be located in front of St. Christopher's Church.

Adding to the festivities will be the Arts and Crafts Fair located in the parking lots of the Kailun Library and the Kailun Elementary School from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Consisting of more than 100 food and craft booths, the fair will offer a wide variety of tasty dishes and impressive products.

Continuous onstage entertainment will be provided during the fair. Hawaiian, contemporary and pop music will fill the air for those who come to shop, munch or just browse the day away.







## Shift gears for regionals

# Leathernecks falter in league finals

The Hawaii Marines stampeded to within three games of the Armed Forces Softhall League Championship Saturday, but were reined in by Richard's Hawailans, 9-6.

Saturday's loss followed a fourgame winning streak, which saw the leathernecks rout Sizzler. Athletes in Action, the Air Force Flyers and the Al Harrington team. The Marines lost their first tournament game Tuesday to Koolau.

Saturday's action began with an incredible victory over the Air Force. With home runs by Lance Corporal Thad Hammond,

Private First Class Roger Dunnam, LCpl Clint Evans, Sgt Scotty Nobles, and Foster, the devil dogs shot down the Flyers, 17-5, with play ending in the fifth inning because of the enormous lend.

That victory contrasted sharply to their next triumph, over the Al Harrington team, which took on a sour note. After going down one, two, three in the first, the Marines were anxious to hold the Harrington team in the bottom of the inning. Evans moved from left field to first and filled in admirably for Roberts, while Sgt Scotty Watkins took Evans' position in left.

After holding "Als," the


Marines went to work. Evans started the softballs soaring with a two-run homer over the left field fence in the second imming. Dunnum scored later in the inning, giving the Marines a 3-0

lead. Als retaliated with one. A couple more runs were exchanged during the game, but the leathernecks emerged victorious, 5-3. Then came the Hawaiians

For awhile, it seemed that the Marines would carry their winning momentum right through the game. Indeed, a fiverun first inning got them off to a good start.

They stayed in front until the bottom of the fifth, when the Hawailans came across with four runs, taking the lead and maintaining it to the end. The Hawaiians won, 9-6.

"We just ran out of gas," Burnett commented. "Of course it's a psychological effect when you lose one of the team leaders. Everybody presses themselves trying to pick up for him



According to Sgt Don Felts, all it took was practice. "We spent a lot of time in after-hours practice," he remarked. "Everybody coached each other, and we all worked well together.



# **IRS** taxes extra income

Hobbies ... most people have at least one, whether it be sewing, bowling, gardening, gourmet cooking, or making pottery. Hobbies are designed to give personal satisfaction - and in some cases, extra income

As any tourist will attest, many people are into crafts. Gift stores have sizeable stocks of handmade items which tickle the fancy of most shoppers. Although these craft items were made as a hobby, the income derived from them is taxable for federal tax purposes, the Internal Revenue Service points out.

Many people breed and sell animals as a hobby; others farm a few acres of land while working a full-time job elsewhere. It's important that hobbyists know how the IRS sees the difference between a hobby and a business. Generally, a hobby is more for pleasure than for business and losses from a hobby are not deductible. A business hobbyist is allowed to deduct operating expenses, but not more than the amount of taxable income the business generates.

In order to claim an activity as a business rather than a hobby, a crafter must be able to show that the activity was for the specific purpose of making a profit. He must have conducted the business as a hard-headed, profit-motivated person would; that is, advertising, promoting, and doing what can be done to maximize sales and minimize costs.

If a business is run from a basement, for example, the operator must be able to prove that the basement was not used for any other purpose in order to claim the home affice deduction.

With respect to hobbies, if people make items for sale at such events as flea markets, for instance, they must report the income derived from the sales.

Many activities that began as simple hobbies blossomed into business ventures. Records should be kept because any equipment purchased for business may be subject to depreciation, a plus for the taxpayer's tax situation.
