HMM-265 returns from cruise

The "Fighting Dragons" of Marine Medium Helicopter (Composite) Squadron-265 have returned home after five and a half months on deployment in the Western Pacific. The squadron was the aviation element of the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit.

The deployment began when the squadron departed Hawaii aboard the USS New Orleans in February. The Fighting Dragons were augmented by personnel and aircraft from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463, Marine Air Base Squadron-24, Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24 and Marine Attack Helicopter Squadron-169 from Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

The first port of call was Subic Bay in the Republic of the Philippines. There, a practice amphibious assault on the Zambales Training Area was conducted in preparation for the upcoming exercise Team Spirit-83, in Korea.

During Team Spirit-83, the squadron, along with shore-based units of Marine Aircraft Group-36, flew in support of four Marine battalions landing teams as well as units of the South Korean armed forces. During this period of cold and often adverse weather, the squadron accomplished all of its missions including a "raid" zone in a narrow valley, on a freezing, windy, moonless night.

"The flying was the most difficult I've ever done and it built my confidence immensely," said First Lieutenant Pete Gaskill, a CH-46 pilot. "I felt great confidence in my ability to fly aboard the ship and be able to go ashore with troops abroad," he added. "The night flying was especially challenging."

After exercise Team Spirit, the Marines sailed to Hong Kong for a few days of rest and relaxation before returning to Subic Bay in early April. There, the squadron participated in another LANDEX and supported the Marines of Battalion Landing Team, 1st

Battalion, 3d Marines during their operations ashore.

In addition, virtually every Marine in the squadron "turned-to" in the blazing Philippine sun to "bust rust" and clean the helicopters in preparation for a maintenance and aircraft inspection. The squadron received a seldom-awarded grade of excellent on material condition of the aircraft and achieved overwhelmingly favorable results in the various functional areas of maintenance.

After leaving the Philippines for the second time, the squadron proceeded to Western Australia for operation Valiant Usher-83. During the operation, the Fighting Dragons flew 329 flight hours and lifted 450 tons of cargo in support of BLT 1/3.

It was their third and final visit to Subic Bay that the squadron began operational planning for the last major exercise of the deployment: Valiant Blitz-83.

Operations were hampered by bad weather over Okinawa, but the squadron still managed to log 350 flight hours during the exercise. The exercise also terminated the squadron's association with the 31st MAU.

For 23-year-old Corporal Mark Black, a crew chief on a CH-53 helicopter, it was his first deployment to the Western Pacific. According to Black, the flying was the most interesting he had ever done. "The operations were very realistic and reflected all the training we did at K-Bay," he said.

"This was my first trip overseas," Black continued, "and it was quite a shock to see that not everyone spoke English. I really enjoyed seeing how other people live and experiencing a different type of culture."

The Fighting Dragons of HMM-265 have returned home to their wives, children and friends, having been replaced in the Western Pacific by the Marines of Medium Helicopter (Composite) Squadron-165.

Gen Barrow marches out; Kelley assumes CMC post

General P.X. Kelley assumed duty as the 28th Commandant of the Marine Corps last week during a Change of Command ceremony at Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C.

After the battle color of the Corps was entrusted to his care by Gen. Robert H. Barrow, the 27th Commandant, Gen. Kelley directed that the following message from President Reagan be published immediately to all Marines.

"And so to the new Commandant, General Kelley, I issue the first orders from your Commander in Chief, on behalf of all Americans, I want a message sent to every member of the Corps, to every place where the words 'Semper Fidelis' is a way of life.

"Tell it to the Marines — whether in ceremonial white or leatherneck blue, whether in dress greens or combat camouflage — whether they serve in the air, on land, or at sea — tell them that their countrymen are grateful, tell them that we stand behind them, tell them that we are proud of our proudest."

The Commandant also sent his first message to the Marines. "As I assume duty as your new Commandant, I have the utmost pride and confidence in each of you and the future of our Corps."

This Fourth of July, I am reminded that you exemplify America's bravest tradition; you fulfill America's highest expectations; and you epitomize America's commitment to the spirit of liberty so powerfully described 207 years ago in our Declaration of Independence.

As we pause to celebrate the birth of our great nation, let us never forget that the citizens of our country have a special trust in their Marine Corps; for they know we have pledged "our lives . . . and our sacred honor" in defense of the Constitution and in support of those "inalienable rights" affirmed in the Declaration of Independence.

And let each of us renew our pledge to be *Semper Fidelis* — always faithful for our spirit, courage and vigilance in defense of liberty are as necessary today as they were more than two centuries ago during America's first battle for independence."

Helicopters pull troops from 'war zone'

Phantoms, frogs, Hueys, and hogs took to the sky last week, as components of the 1st Marine Brigade fought a simulated war against a mythical government.

Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463 (with CH-53 "hogs" and UH-1 "Hueys"), Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-262 (with CH-46 "frogs"), Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-233 (with F-4 Phantoms) and 2d Battalion, 3d Marines (with 110 troops from Company F) took part in the "war," which involved coordinated troop instructions, troop withdrawals, and aerial fire support.

The exercise, dubbed a "mini Marine Corps Combat Readiness Evaluation System mission," was "fought" Wednesday and Thursday at Kahuku Training Area and the Kahoolawe U.S. Navy Bombing Range. It was designed to provide air/ground units with experience in mission

preparation as well as to test combat readiness.

"Planning of the mission is the most important part," said Major Ed Langston, mission commander for HMM-463. "Execution is the fun part of the mission."

Exercise planners had to prepare dozens of combat contingencies as well as provide for potential real-life emergencies.

Planners also had the difficult job of making the exercise as realistic as possible.

In the detailed war scenario, the Hawaiian Islands were not part of the United States. Instead, they constituted independent nations with vastly different economic and idealistic beliefs.

As with much of the "real" world, the Hawaiian chain was polarized between communist and capitalist camps.

The democratic monarchy of Kahoolawe ruled all of the islands except for Kauai, which was granted

independence in 1966. A socialist government quickly arose there, and, in the late 1970s, launched a campaign of subversion and revolution among its neighboring isles. This continued until 1983, when all-out war erupted. Kahoolawe was unprepared and called upon its ally, the United States, for military assistance.

"This type of realistic operation increases combat readiness tremendously," said Captain Willis Foster, HMM-463's mission organizer.

Such missions are vital for testing aircraft and weapons and provide mandatory flight time for pilots and co-pilots he added.

"Every pilot and co-pilot has certain things that he must do to remain current," Foster commented. "These operations make that possible."

Pilots' training involved withdrawing troops from one spot in the Kahuku and repositioning them in other zones. Hilltop landing practice was extensive, with pilots and co-

Marine aviator receives award

Major James E. Cartwright has been named to receive the Association of Naval Aviation's annual Outstanding Achievement Award in Tactical Aviation for his performance as the aircraft maintenance officer of Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-235 while stationed here during 1982.

The award is intended for those "whose specific action or achievement... most clearly and dramatically demonstrates the

naval aviation ideals of courage, resourcefulness, perseverance and concern for the well-being and freedom of the United States of America," according to the association.

Cartwright assumed his duties with VMFA-235 here in May 1980. The squadron, nicknamed the "Death Angels," operates the F-4 "Phantom" aircraft. He was cited for his performance during 1982, "a particularly demanding year of great personnel turbulence involving numerous aircraft transfers and acceptances, and

WestPac deployments," according to a summary of action.

Cartwright was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1971 after graduation from the University of Iowa. He was designated a naval flight officer in 1972 and a naval aviator in 1979. He has amassed more than 2,700 accident-free flight hours in the F-4. In 1980 and 1981, he was nominated for the Alfred A. Cunningham Naval Aviator of the Year award. He is now assigned to the 3d Marine Aircraft Wing at MCAS Yuma, Ariz.

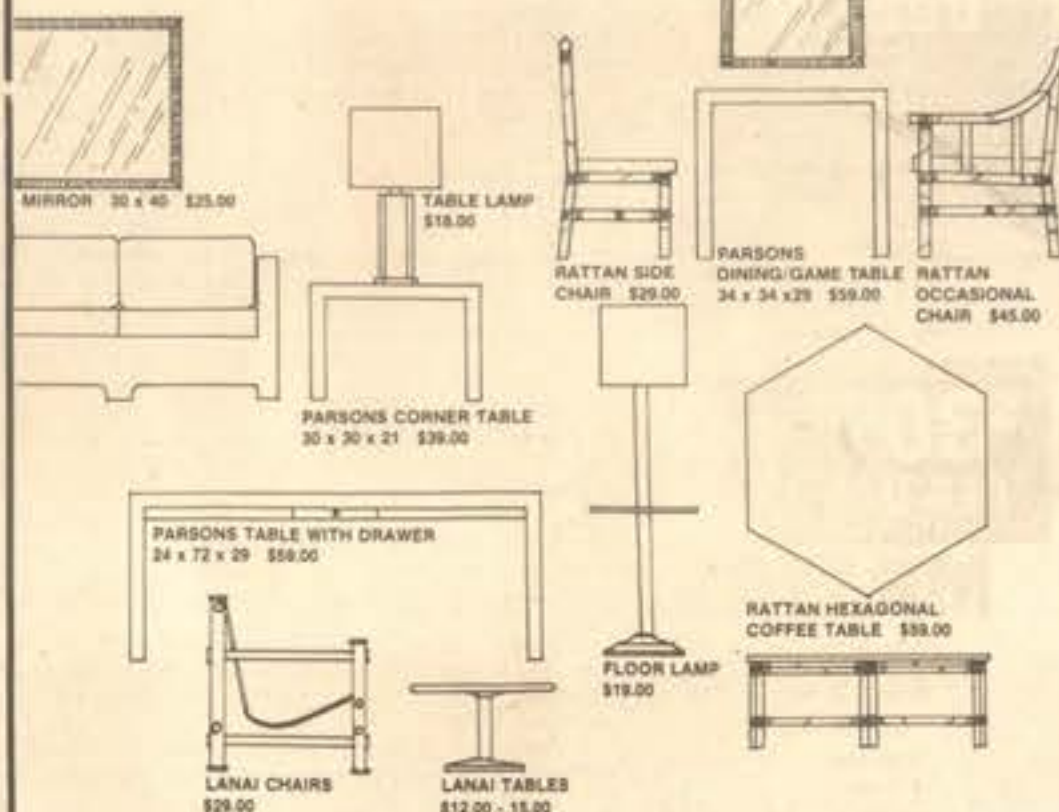

Marine's son struggles for life

Little Adam lay in his hospital crib looking the perfect picture of health. As his mother and father talked of his medical problems and complications, their faces reflected the pain they feel and the love, devotion and hope they share for their tiny son.

It all began Dec. 3, when Gunnery Sergeant Michael Franklin, of Modesto, Calif., and his wife Virginia, of Smyrna, Ga., were blessed with a second son. He and his wife of seven years had hoped for another son after the birth of Michael Maurice Edwards four years earlier.

The dream turned into a nightmare shortly after Adam Clay was born.

"Adam appeared to be in perfect health," says Franklin, "but soon after his birth, the nurse went to check his temperature and she found that he had no rectal opening."

Adam was then transferred from New Bern, N.C., to a nearby university hospital in Durham. After a thorough examination, a colostomy operation (a surgical construction of an artificial excretory opening for the colon) and more tests, a traumatic diagnosis was given.

The Franklins were told that Adam was suffering from a collapsed lung, had no kidneys, and could be expected to live for only five days. They were also told that dialysis or a kidney transplant was impractical at this point and no other alternatives existed.

Seven days later, Dec. 10, the hospital released Adam so he could be with his family during his last days. Funeral arrange-

ments were made, and the Franklins valiantly accepted what they thought was meant to be.

"Originally, we were shocked and disheartened," says Franklin. "In silent resignation, we took Adam home and gave him all the love and attention we had to give. But little Adam is a fighter, and when some contradictory symptoms occurred, he truly began to defy the odds. Soon, one week turned into two weeks, and two weeks into three. We began to have hope, because Adam had become very dear to us in the short time that he had been with us," he says.

The Franklins became insistent that the doctors take another look at Adam. The doctors, however, stood firmly by their previous diagnosis, insisting that the baby was indeed a "medical miracle" because he had lived so long. They insisted that nothing could be done for their baby, not yet a month old.

Adam's parents refused to give up so easily. When doctors suggested that all nutrition to Adam be ceased so he could expire quietly, Virginia was repulsed by their advice and decided to seek another opinion.

Practically, Virginia reached for the telephone and, in desperation, dialed an Atlanta long distance operator for the name of a kidney doctor — any kidney doctor. "Atlanta is a big city, and I figured there had to be somebody there who could help him," she says.

Indeed, there was someone who could help. Dr. Julius Sherwinter, the only pediatric nephrologist in Atlanta, and he agreed to see Adam.

Franklin phoned his unit at Cherry Point, N.C., got emergency leave, and left right away. He and Virginia drove all night to Atlanta.

Upon their arrival in Atlanta, Adam was immediately admitted to the intensive care unit at the Scottish Rite Children's Hospital. A series of tests were conducted, and Adam was put on chronic dialysis — a continuous cleansing of the kidneys of poisons.

From the day Adam was admitted, Virginia kept a

constant vigil. If not in the hospital library trying to understand all the medical terms being thrown at her, she was close to Adam's side. Franklin and his older son, Michael, in the meantime, had returned to North Carolina to make arrangements for the family to stay in Atlanta while Adam underwent treatment.

In the hospital, Adam immediately began to gain weight. He went from just five pounds to ten, Virginia says. "His

neurological examinations all showed a tremendous improvement — constant improvement, not stop-and-go by any means. Adam is just like a normal baby. He learns more and more everyday. With a kidney transplant, he could lead a normal childhood."

Adam was transferred March 30 from the Scottish Rite Hospital to the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, preparing to undergo a kidney transplant — his mother will be the donor.

According to Franklin, Virginia is feeling the weight of all the emotional strain, but overall has a positive outlook and is mentally holding up. "Virginia has been a driving force for me. Her love and devotion for Adam is probably one of the things that has kept him alive this long. She's truly a mountain of strength," Franklin says.

In April, Franklin received a humanitarian transfer to Marine Aircraft Group-41, Detachment "B," Naval Air Station, Atlanta, allowing him to be closer to his wife and child.

Although approximately 87 percent of the medical expenses are being paid by CHAMPUS, the portion the Franklins must pay continues to grow and only adds to the burden they must bear. The dialysis treatment at Scottish Rite alone was \$53,000.

Marines and sailors have begun a fund to help defray the expenses involved in Adam's surgery. Individuals desiring to make contributions may do so through the "Protestant Chaplains' Fund for Adam Franklin," c/o NAS Atlanta, Ga. 30060.

Adam is doing very well in his fight to live, according to doctors at the University of Minnesota. He is maintaining his weight at 10 pounds, 12 ounces, and has the healthy look of a baby with no problems. After the transplant, Adam will be given immunosuppression drugs indefinitely to aid his small body in the acceptance of the new kidney.

Adam Clay will be one of the youngest infants to ever receive a kidney transplant, according to doctors, and his chances for life are very good.

Marine mech takes top spot in school

When it comes to curing the ills of a coughing engine, a private first class from Motor Transport Company Brigade Service Support Group, has proven himself as a first class doctor.

PFC Leland Mumaw is the first Marine to graduate with honors as the number one student from a 19-week Army Vehicle Maintenance Course at Schofield Barracks.

"Mumaw exemplifies the type of academic excellence and dedication to duty that's typical of our young Marines today," said Captain John Valentin, commanding officer, Motor Transport Company.

"The school was good and I learned a lot," said the 5-foot-9 Hoosier. "I enjoy working on vehicles and was guaranteed this field when I enlisted."

Being a good mechanic is second nature and important to Mumaw.



"I've been working on cars since I was 12," said the Kokomo, Ind. native. "My father owned a service station and was a race car mechanic. When he worked on cars, he explained what he was doing and then gave me a shot at it. After my first off change, I decided to pursue this trade."

"Racing is my motivating factor for being a successful mechanic. In my home town, racing is a household word and the competition for mechanics is keen. My father told me that in order to land a solid job, I would need some schooling and that backyard experience is not good enough anymore when it comes to race cars."

With Richard Petty as his driver, to emulate, Mumaw dreamed of becoming a race car driver before he enlisted. "But, maintaining a race car meant I couldn't afford the proper schooling to be a good mechanic. So I decided to come into the Marine Corps," he said.

"The training I've received has helped me tremendously. When I get out I'm going to follow-up my dream. If I don't make it as a driver, I'll have sufficient mechanical credentials."

The only problem I experienced as a mechanic was trouble shooting (trying to figure out what's wrong with a vehicle from what the owner tells you). Since completing this course that's no longer a problem.

WHIZ:

There are many ways to accomplish a task. For example, it can be done the old-fashioned manual way or it can become a whiz with advanced technology — the computer.

First Lieutenant Grant K. Holcomb, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines Logistics Office, chose

the latter way. Five months ago, he purchased an Apple III computer with 256K primary storage at a cost of more than \$5,000.

"I could not have handled my work load without the computer," Holcomb said honestly. His duties include, but are not limited to, embarkation, Navy Relief, auditing, radiological safety and

information coordinating officer.

"I probably would have asked to be relieved of some of my duties if I had not bought the computer," said the sandy-haired lieutenant.

He has used the computer as a word processor, platoon commander's notebook that asks questions, and as a training schedule programmer for his troops. "My troops' training dates are

always on time now, because the computer never forgets." He is currently working on a program to graphically load ships when preparing for deployment.

Holcomb has also placed naval form letters in the computer which enables him to just fill in the blanks for various correspondence.

After filling in the blanks, the information is printed out and stored in the computer's memory bank.

"The computer saves the clerks a lot of typing time. A clerk no longer has to type from handwritten notes, which eliminates problems deciphering handwriting," said the lieutenant.

Holcomb's major in college was electrical engineering while his minor was computers. He has also taught computer programming aboard ship for Emory Riddle Aeronautical University. "They are amazing," said the blue-eyed leatherneck. "It's boundary is only limited by the operator's imagination and ability."

Although Holcomb bought the computer primarily to keep up with his work load, he does consider it a "long range investment." He plans to devise and sell programs of his own in the future.

"I may not be able to afford a television or a car because of the cost of the computer, but I am able to get my work done, which is more important," the lieutenant said with a smile.

pilots having to judge the slope of hills as well as the height of treetops.

During the entire operation, enlisted crew chiefs of each aircraft fed information to the pilots, telling them of distance from other choppers, distance from the ground, and whether or not trees were going to be cleared.

At all times, the pilots paid careful attention to pre-flight briefings, which detailed "hostile" areas. If a chopper drifted slightly off-course, it was

declared "shot down," and the crew forced to walk a considerable distance to safety.

Evacuation of the U.S. embassy on Kahoolawe took place Thursday, with three '53s and three '46s evacuating assault forces and simulated embassy personnel.

The successful completion of the evacuation was conducted with the simultaneous dropping of live ordnance from two F-4 Phantoms.

"The entire two-day operation was extremely successful," Langston

commented. "This coordinated training exercise provided the necessary 'Xs' that are required. HMH-463's goal is to keep sending quality aircraft and quality aircrews to the deploying squadrons, so that when the real evacuation occurs, Marine amphibious unit commanders can count on the air portion of the air/ground team. "Lebanon has proven that you have to be ready at all times," he added. "This type of exercise goes a long way in accomplishing that goal."

Military kids fingerprinted

"Operation: Child Identification," a program to assist parents in case of a lost or runaway child, will be held Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Mokapu Elementary School cafeteria.

The program, conducted by the Security Department here, offers parents an opportunity to compile a vital statistics folder on their children, which includes fingerprints, height, date of birth and color of eyes.

"Once the folder is compiled, we're asking parents to keep it in a safe place," said Master Sergeant Michael McKelroy, Security Department. "This is to emphasize the importance of the folder."

The program is being conducted on a trial basis and, if it works well, it may be incorporated throughout the Marine Corps, according to McKelroy.

"During the first attempt at identifying children several weeks ago, we identified almost 200 kids," said Kathy Diefenderfer, a member of the Mokapu Elementary Parent, Teacher, Student Association.

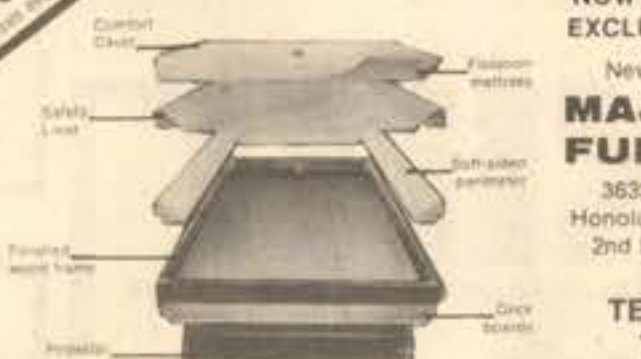

Marijuana:

WASHINGTON (NES)—"I'm honest, sir, I wasn't actually smoking it. See, I was at this party, you know, and everyone else there was smoking and, actually, it, the smoke, you know, just got into my body."

Sorry, sailor, your defense just went up in smoke. Trying to beat a positive urinalysis finding for marijuana by claiming "passive inhalation" isn't going to make it these days.

Based on a National Institute on Drug Abuse contracted study, passive inhalation of enough marijuana smoke to register a positive finding in a urinalysis test is highly questionable. The research, performed by Dr. Mario Perez-Reyes, University of North

Carolina School of Medicine, was conducted in three different settings. The first setting involved four smokers and two non-smokers confined in a small, unventilated room. The test was conducted using first 2.5 percent THC potency marijuana cigarettes and again several weeks later using 2.8 percent THC content (the highest potency marijuana cigarettes available from NIDA). All participants were confined in a closed 8-foot-by-8-foot-by-10-foot room for one hour; each of the four smokers smoked two cigarettes. Of a total 24 urine samples collected from the non-smokers, all gave negative results when tested.

The second part of the study, also performed twice, was

identical to the first except that all cigarettes contained 2.8 percent THC, and the six subjects were confined in an automobile (150 cubic feet). All non-smokers' urine samples gave negative results.

In the third segment of the study, the results of repeated non-smokers' exposure to marijuana smoke were examined to determine whether the drug would accumulate in their bodies and be detectable in their urine. On three consecutive days, two non-smokers and four smokers were confined to a small, unventilated room and stayed there for one hour while each smoker smoked one 2.8 percent THC cigarette. All non-smoker urine samples collected for the next 24 hours

gave negative results when tested. It is highly unlikely that measurable concentrations of THC could be obtained through passive inhalation in real-life situations where marijuana cigarettes are usually smoked sequentially and in more ventilated conditions. Additionally, all Navy laboratory equipment is set at confirmation cutoff levels double the highest probable nanogram per milliliter detection levels for passive inhalation as estimated by the White House Board of Scientific Advisors on Drug Abuse. DOD has a stated policy that passive inhalation is not an acceptable defense in a positive urinalysis because of the facts presented by the Perez-Reyes study.

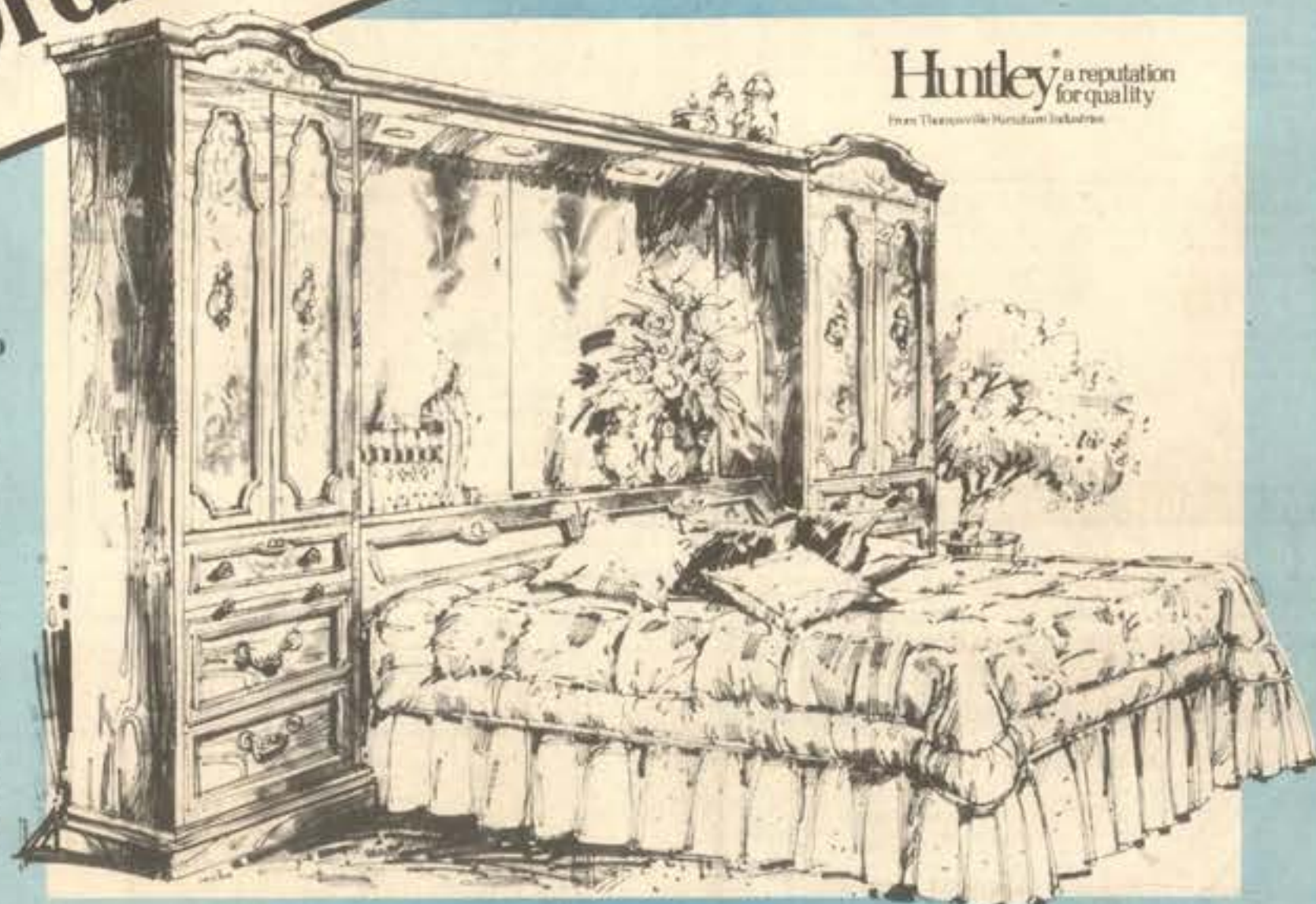

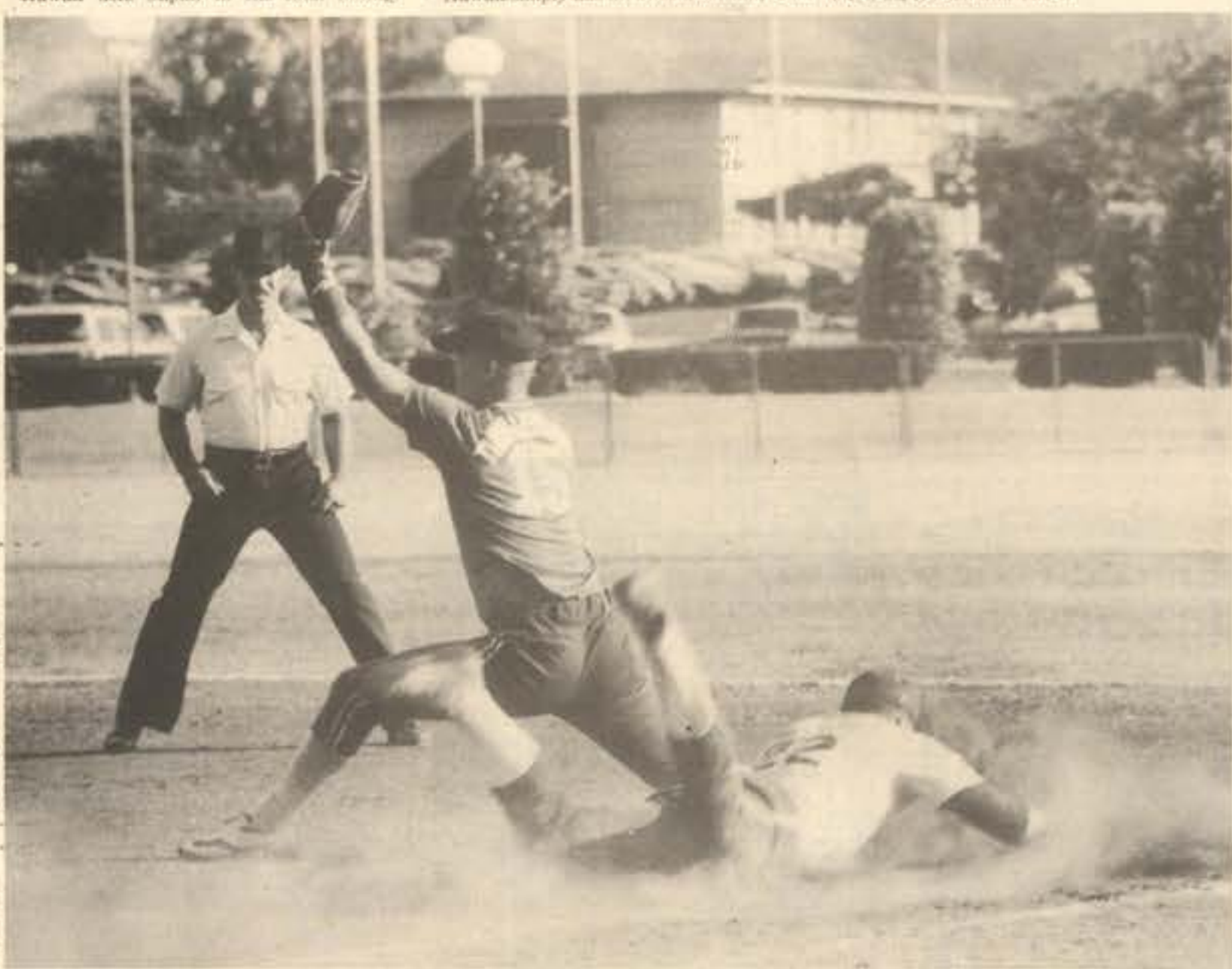
