Leathernecks 'war' in Kahukus

Marines were in the process of setting up their bivouac area in a tree grove when the sound of an aircraft was heard.

"Enemy air!" came the shout. Suddenly Marines were rushing for cover and grabbing for their weapons. As the aircraft came closer, a machine-gun position opened fire, then more Marines joined in with small arms fire. As the aircraft flew over the area, the glade filled with the smell of cordite.

Although the machine-gun and small-arms fire employed blank ammunition, the scenario actually happened last week in the Kahukus Training Area during the combined Combat Readiness Evaluation Exercise.

"We're doing a combined operation because the General (Brigadier General O.K. Steele, 1st Marine Brigade Commanding General) feels this is much more realistic," said First Lieutenant Eric Bingham, a pilot with Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-265. "During the exercise we await word from the battalion and then provide support to them."

Elements of 1st Battalion, 3d Marines combined with HMM-265 and Army and Air Force components to create a realistic setting for the exercise. Companies A; B; C; along with Weapons Company; Headquarters and Service Company; 1st Platoon, Company A. 3d Reconnaissance Battalion; 3d Engineer Battalion; and members of Battery A, 1st Battalion, 12 Marines participated in the

exercise. Company K, 3d Battalion, 3d Marines played the role of an agressor force while other members of the brigade evaluated and played role models for the week.

Though preparations for the training began months ago, Mother Nature showed her mischievous side as rain filled the skies Dec. 6 when HMM-265 prepared to transport a recon unit to the Kahukus.

With evening drawing nigh and visibility getting poorer by the minute, a last second change occurred as the recon unit was forced to move from the landing site to the helicopter flight line in order "to catch their flight."

The next morning, as Marines from Company A and part of

of infamy Japanese pilot remembers fateful attack

A former Imperial Japanese Navy pilot recently revisited the air station to pay his respects to comrade, First Lieutenant Fusata Hda and to the Americans who lost their lives here on that eventful morning on Dec. 7, 1941.

During his visit, he related his experiences as a direct participant in the attack on Ouhu.

"Our squadron consisted of nine planes that flew in a three, three, three formation pattern," said former 1stLt Iyozo Fujita, who at 24 was the youngest pilot to participate in the attack on the air station.

"Iida was the commander of our squadron and I was the small commander of the second wave of planes," he said.

When we came over Oahu, we searched for the American fighter ets but were unable to locate them. We circled the island twice, then Iida directed us to Kaneohe Bay by way of the mountainside.

We didn't have bombs in our fighters, just machine guns," explained Fujita. We located three sen planes near the hangars in the bay, fired upon them three times and destroyed them.

lida then directed his squadron to Bellows Air Field.

"We attacked Bellows twice before Iida banked from left to right with his fighter plane signaling to the rest of the squadron that it was time to gather.'

After their planes gathered, they flew back to Kahuku Point which was their assembly point and gathered again to attack the air station.

Fujita was directly behind Iida, whose plane was shot in the fuel tank, causing a massive leakage of fuel which made his already planned suicide crash inevitable.

"As we formed over the air station, I saw fuel flowing from lida's fuel tank. Then I saw his signal. He touched his finger to his mouth indicating that he had no fuel left and moved his hand in a downward incline to indicate that he was going down and for me to return to the carrier, Souryu (Blue Dragon)," said Fujita.

He felt lost after realizing that lida was out of the fight.

I was depending on following lida. At first tears flowed freely down my cheeks. I felt hopeless and lonely," said Fujita, "but I soon realized that with him gone I was responsible for taking the other fighters back to the carrier."

But that was not to be an easy

In a dogfight above Kahuku Point, Fujita's engine went out

and then restarted enabling him to fly 150 miles back to the carrier. "But just as I landed my oil

pressure guage swooped down to zero, and one of my cylinders fell off. I was glad to be out of the air."

After the war, Fujita worked 63 a pilot for Japan Airlines and retired from the sky five years ago. As he returned with other

comrades to pour "sake," a Japanese fermented alcoholic beverage made from rice, over lida's crash impact site, memories of that day pervaded his mind, And once again he saw his commander signal to him that he was out of fuel and going down.

Molokai

Marines share Christmas joy

MOLOKAI, Hawaii — For the children on the island of Molokai, Santa Claus wore green this year. His sleigh was two CH-46 Sea Knight helicopters and his elves were the Marines from the Honolulu Marine Corps Reserve Center.

As part of this year's Toys for Tots campaign, Marine reservists made their fourth annual flight to Molokai carrying with them over 200 toys and gifts to be given to underprivileged children of that tiny island.

Upward of 100 children waited on a baseball diamond at the Monnalon Baptist Church, nestled quietly on a steep-sided plateau. They huddled together in the misty rain peering out over the rough, gray ocean and anxiously waited for Santa's arrival.

Meanwhile, two choppers from

Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-165, based at Marine Corps Aircraft Station, Kaneohe Bay, cut lower through the clouds loaded with their precious cargo.

For most of the 12-year-old and under children it was the first time they'd seen Marine Corps helicopters and the excitement quickened as the two green helos broke through the drizzling mist and circled the make-shift landing zone.

From the air, the reservists could see the youngsters as they pointed skyward and scurried about, searching for the most advantageous position to watch.

Once the birds were down Gunnery Sergeant David Kalama and four other Marine reservists heaved five large black plastic bags loaded with toys over their shoulders and headed for the anxious kids.

All eyes were on the Marines. Gazing through a small fence outside the LZ, the children's tiny fingers clutched the wire mesh, joy beaming from their innocent faces.

"This is a blast," said Kalama.
"This is the fourth year we've been here and it makes us feeel good when we can give these kids something for Christmas. For some it's probably the only gift they'll get."

The majority of the toys were donated by the bikers of the state during their annual Street Bikers' United of Hawaii Ride for the Toys for Tots held in Honelalu,

"This is the happiest day for these kids this year," said Pastor Mike Shelton, Moanaloa Baptist Church, "When the Marines bring the toys for these children it is the highlight of the entire year. They are actually in complete awe when the helicopter lands and the toys are distributed. For most of these children it will be the most treasured gift imaginable. A lot of them are under guardianship or only have one parent so Christmas Day doesn't seem quite as plentiful as it might otherwise be. It is the best day of the year for

As the toys were distributed, the boys and girls patiently stood in line eagerly eyeing each gift that passed by them, grasped tightly the hands of a child that went before them. When it was their turn, the nervous anticipation was plain to see.

When all the kids received their gifts and the Marines had mingled with the sparkling-eyed children, Santa's elves climbed back aboard their flying sleigh and headed home to Oahu.

The next day, the Marine

reservists were in the air again flying to the isle of Kauai where they repeated their generous goodwill for the children there.

As the Toys for Tots collection campaign draws to a close, the Marine reservists know that they have given joy to underprivileged youngsters where there might have been none.

"It's a good feeling to do this," concluded Kalama. "No matter how expensive the gift or how much we might get for Christmas, just seeing the happiness on the children's faces is the best present."

As the choppers disappeared back into the grayness, one teacher near the small church yard said, "They've brought us sunshine on a cloudy day."



CMC speaks out on Beirut bombing

following is the second in a series of articles featuring remarks by General P.X. Kelley, Commandant of the Marine Corps, to the security and constructed Senate and House Armed Services defensive obstacles at the Committees on Oct. 31. In his statement, the Commandant discussed the tragic bombing of the Marine Headquarters in Beirut, Lebanon on Oct. 23.

A new phase of the Beirut story began in March of this year. The situation began to deteriorate somewhat at that time. Although there was no intelligence of an increased threat, a 12-man Marine presence patrol in a community north of the airfield was attacked by a grenade thrown from a building. It resulted in five Marines receiving minor wounds. It was not predicted and was the first such incident against the Marines in 41/2 months. Commanders immediately increased passive defense measures such as varying patrol routes, times, and size of patrols. In the opinion of some, about this time several Lebanese factions may have perceived a subtle shift of the USMNF from being pro-Lebanese to pro-Christian.

In April, the tragic car-bombing of the U.S. Embassy took place Clearly, the United States was emerging as a prime target for those who either opposed or misinterpreted the role of the Multi-National Force in Lebanon. The former reason is more likely, in that the Italians and the French were also victims of terrorist harassment, even though they were not significantly involved in the reconstruction of the Lebanese Armed Forces,

Although I know of no intelligence warning which indicated that the spectacular carbombing of the Embassy was in the offing, there were renewed warnings that terrorist attacks were likely to continue. Car-bombs were viewed as a likely form of attack. The Embassy bombing prompted several decisive steps to counter the threat. The Marines provided a special protective detail for the temporary U.S.

increase intelligence sources in the immediate area of the Marine positions.

As pertains to the headquarters

-Civilian traffic was prohibited from the headquarters area.

-All civilian and military vehicles were searched in the proximity of the headquarters

Headquarters buildings and facilities were sandbagged. Over o quarter million sandbags were emplaced.

-Barbed wire entanglements were emplaced throughout. Concerting wire was strung in the civilian parking lot in front of headquarters. While the civilian parking lot adjacent to the Battalion Landing Team Headquarters lot was ideally suited for a mine field in a tactical sense, mines were not emplaced as the lot served the commercial airport and was actively used by civilians.

-Additional Marines were posted in each guard post during high-threat periods.

-Roof-top surveillance was

increased. -Foot patrols were increased

within the headquarters area. -A metal sewer pipe barrier was placed in front of the BLT headquarters building.

-Tunnels beneath the headquarters complex were

-The use of night observation devices was increased.

-Magazines were inserted in weapons at appropriate posts. (This in addition to previous orders which directed Marines on the perimeter and on patrol to stand duty with loaded weapons.)

-Tank ditches were contemplated, but considered unnecessary and impractical in view of the threat existing at the time and the commercial nature of the airport.

Throughout May, Marines operated in a high-threat environment and continued to actively patrol, train the LAF, and improve security. During June. there was a noticeable deterioration in relations with some factions of the local population.

This was exacerbated by the reinfiltration of Palestine Liberation Organization elements into neighborhoods surrounding the airport. Among other indications, verbal harassment was directed against Marine patrols. The first rocket and mortar attacks against the LAF in the Beirut International Airport complex occurred. Spillover of stray rounds came into the Marine positions. The Marines fully recognized the increased threat posed by this firing, and continued to harden positions by emplacing sandbags and diggin in deeper. Marine and LAF patrols were also integrated. Intelligence snow indicated that rockets and mortars were to continue to be a primary concern to the safety of the troops.

During August, the periodic rocket attacks did increase against LAF targets, with a continued spillover into Marine positions. It was decided at this time to move the remainder of the BLT support personnel, and a reaction platoon (approximately 150 men), into the BLT headquarters building to afford maximum protection against small arms, mortar, rocket and artillery fires.

It should be pointed out that the building was chosen because during the earlier fighting for Beirut it endured furious Israeli artillery barrages without being destroyed. An earth tremor in June also failed to cause any structural damage. It should also be noted that in a thirteen-month period, no Marine billeted in the building was killed or injured due to incoming artillery, mortar, rockets or small arms.

Marine scholarships finance education

The Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation is a non-profit corporation founded in 1962. The purpose of the foundation is to encourage needy and deserving children of Marines and former Marines to develop their capabilities through education by providing financial assistance to qualified applicants.

Approximately 300 scholarships, ranging from \$500 to \$1,500 each, are awarded by the foundation every academic year. Recipients' geographical location is of no concern when applying

for assistance, as evidenced during the 1982-1983 academic year, when grants were awarded to students representing 44 states.

To qualify for scholastic aid, the applicant must be the son of daughter of a Marine who has served honorably for a minimum or 90 days with the Marine Corps and who is either a Marine, on active duty or in the Reserve; or, a former Marine or Marine Reservist. The applicant must currently be a senior in high school, a high school graduate or currently enrolled in a certified college or vocational school.

The applicants' family income cannot exceed a prescribed limit. As an example, the limit in the 1983 taxable year was \$25,000. 

Suicidal breakdowns claim military lives

Strength in the face of adversity has always been an established Marine Corps trademark. Yet, Marines are still human, and vulnerable to the stresses which can tragically cause death by their own hand.

In America today, 25,000-35,000 deaths are attributed to suicide each year. Of those, young people between the ages of 15-25 attempt suicide most often. That dangerous age category includes a bulk of our young Marines and sailors, who have no special immunity.

According to statistics from Tripler Hospital, during the months of January through November 1983, six active duty Oahu-based Marines and 15 sailors attempted suicide. During that same period, four dependents of Oahu-based Marine Corps' personnel and 20 dependents of Navy personnel tried taking their own lives.

Unfortunately, some suicide attempts do result in death. According to the Hawaii State Health Department, two members of the U.S. military on Oahu actually succeeded in killing themselves during 1981. The number of successful suicides rose to six in 1982. Additionally, five U.S. military members have taken their own lives during the months of January through September

The Suicide/Crisis Center. Honolulu, Hawaii is a 24-hour hotline designed to intervene in, and help correct a stressful situation, which could drive an individual to suicide.

"Crisis implies strain," said Delores Weidman, program director, Suicide/Crisis Center. "It is an acute type of emotional or environmental strain, which cannot be tolerated for long. Something has to change. Either the strain is relieved, or a 'breakdown' occurs.

"While not every individual in crisis is suicidal," she continued, every suicidal person is definitely suffering from an acute crisis.

"The Suicide/Crisis Center steps in, offers alternatives, and helps solve problems," she said.

A large body of young military personnel have an additional stress placed upon them, as they try to cope with a military

"Individuals come into the

attitudes they've been raised with," explained Weidman. "These people are then forced to conform, but basic ideals and values remain the same. Conforming to strict military guidelines can be very difficult for somebody who hasn't prepared

The individuals we hear from most are still growing and changing," she continued. "They haven't become comfortable with handling military problems.

"The image of the military person portrayed in movies," said Weidman, "is someone who's very strong, and very together. Because they're in the military, they're expected to be 'macho' and survive by themselves.

"People in the military aren't any different than civilians as far as their mentalities are concerned," she continued. "If they need help, they need it. If they're emotionally weak, they need extra support at those times of crisis. That's what hotlines are

There are many reasons for calling, but they seem to share one common characteristic.

'Most of our callers are experiencing a type of loss," said Weidman. "It can be an actual loss or a threatened loss of a job, spouse, or friend.

"Depression is the main result of that loss," she continued. "Depression is also a main factor in suicide. Not every depressed person kills himself, of course. Most of us have coping mechanisms that take over and work out the depression. Some people just can't cope anymore, or their methods of coping, for example alcohol and drugs, don't work anymore."

Young military personnel are not the only ones who call for guidance. Older retirees and dependents call the botline as

"Marriage concerns account for the majority of calls by dependent wives," said Weidman, "especially when husbands are on float or on the 'Big Island.' They feel alone and isolated. They don't think they fit in with the Hawaiian

We hear from the over-49-yearold service members and veterans also," explained Weidman. "They seem lonely and afraid that they've got no place to go from here. They're afraid of losing their independence, income, and dignity to old age.

"We hear less from the 'lifers' than any other group," she said. They're the military personnel between the ages of about 30-45 years, who have successfully adjusted to military life."

Suicide methods vary to a great degree, and some are not quite so

'Individuals in the military, especially the Marine Corps, seem to use the more violent methods of suicide," said Lieutenant Commander Linfay Paden, director, Mental Health Clinic, Naval Medical Clinic, Pearl Harbor, "Firearms are used more often in suicide for men and women in the military, because of their greater accessibility. The second most popular choice of suicide for men is hanging. An overdose of drugs is the second most popular method of suicide for

"It has been shown that women attempt suicide three times more than men," continued Paden. "Men, however, succeed in killing themselves three times more often than women.

"An individual who commits suicide by driving drunk or overdosing on drugs is harder to recognize," said Lieutenant Commander Steven Jensen. Family Service Center Chaplain. "What may seem like an accidential death, may be in reality a suicide.'

Individuals experiencing crisis are encouraged to talk their problems over with someone.

"All active duty service members, dependents or retirees from this station are encouraged to bring their crisis problems to Family Services," said Jensen. "During off-duty hours, individuals can reach a 'duty chaplain' through the brigade or station officer-of-the-day.

"The Suicide/Crisis Center has a 'crisis team' that can meet with distressed individuals face to face," said Weidman. "We also have a psychiatrist on call for those people in crisis who feel they need to speak to a professional.

"Our phone specialists are very well screened," continued Weidman, "We try to obtain people who are truly interested and empathetic. They are all volunteers who have developed effective listening habits.

"A crisis hotline also exists at the U.S. Army installation at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. We sometimes refer military calls to that hotline in the event of a military problem that our telephone specialists can't completely understand."

The volunteers not only listen effectively, they also try to help the troubled caller alleviate his crisis.

"We have a resource index with more than 1,400 listings to community services all over the

island," said Weidman, "We've had some military dependents call to request emergency food for weekends when money was short. We can also provide volunteer community jobs, like 'Big Brothers/Big Sister,' to those individuals who are depressed and lonely.

"The Sexual Abuse Treatment Center operates from the Crisis Center as well," she explained. "We can contact the Rape Center at Tripler Hospital for any military personnel and dependents who need it.

"It is necessary for people to talk out their problems," stressed Weidman. "It will probably keep them from getting ulcers and retiring early. Furthermore, everything discussed with our phone specialists is kept confidential."



Weapons Company boarded belicopters for the trip north, the weather interfered again as visibility decreased, causing the helicopters to return to the pick-up site. Company C, scheduled to remais in reserve, was called out to fill the role that Company A had in the operation.

After the Company A and Weapons Company Marines returned to the landing zone, they took a bus and "6 by 6s" to the training area. Meanwhile, Companies B and C bided their time enroute to their assigned positions as roads were almost unpassable due to the persistent

rains. When the Marines were set up in their initial positions, the "fun" began. Agressors attacked Marine positions during the evening and were repelled as other Marines fought "occupied" areas to reach their objective positions. Simulated casualties occurred, and corpsmen had their work cut out for them. Communications links were set up, and Marines prepared for nightfall.

With the morning sun, H & S Company moved toward another position and was soon spotted by the "enemy." Enemy helicopters

caught part of the transport element on the road and began a strafing run. Quickly the sound of small-arms fire could be heard and later the chatter of machine guns as the enemy aircraft came by for a second run. After the enemy departed, the trucks made their way quickly to their assigned position.

But the enemy spotted them and soon reinforcements of enemy aircraft flew overhead as the Marines prepared their command post emplacement. When the shout, "Enemy air!" was heard again, Marines dropped to the ground or scrambled for their weapons to repel the enemy.

Concertina wire surrounded the outer perimeters of the compound and only vehicles with personnel who knew the password were allowed to enter. One vehicle approached the compound with an unusual load. Marines had captured two prisoners. They were escorted under guard to a secure area where an interrogator gleaned information from them. Maps and paperwork were confiscated and pored over, and then the questioning began.

"A surprise is on its way to the marines," reported one prisoner. "Gas," came the hint from the other prisoner. When no more information could be extracted, both prisoners were taken to battalion headquarters.

Meanwhile, across the ravine, Company A defended their position from a hostile attack. Again and again the enemy rushed. Company A repelled them. Casualties were attended to and Marines continued to secure their positions and fighting areas.

Companies A and C moved to a forward position. Enemy aircraft spotted them and the ground troops quickly spread out and opened fire.

"This is the first time I've been to Kahuku," said a machine-gunner with Company C. "I like it a lot better than PTA on the Big Island. There are a lot of lava dogs (rocks) and it's really hot there.

Finally after several miles, Company C set up for the evening. Their mission: a night attack to take a hill. Company A meanwhile prepared to take an adjacent hill.

A topography model was used to

they would take their objectives. Again enemy air struck their positions. Company C opened fire in retaliation, but there were wounded and kills from the air strike. The corpsmen went to work again. More Marines were out of action.

The surviving Marines found resting spots where they could and and the waiting began. Sleep, however, was a luxury they could not afford. Cleaning weapons, eating chow, refilling canteens all had to be done in preparation for the night attack.

"We began our attack at 0300," said First Sergeant Daniel Burns, Company A. "We took our objective and subdued three counter attacks at the water tanks. The enemy left the area,"

he spoke matter-of-factly. Thursday morning found the Marines wondering about the "gas" attack announced by the prisoner.

Soon the rumor was confirmed. Marines went into a "Mock II" alert, donning NBC suits and masks. But even then they were harrassed by enemy air. As helicopters and airplanes made passes over the area, the insectlooking Marines opened fire on the

enemy. "Enemy air!" was repeated time and again as the aircraft left the area only to return moments later. During one of the passes, gas cylinders were tossed to simulate a chemical attack. Arm movements sprend throughout the area as Marines signaled "Gas!"

Flying VIPs from a landing zone, interrogating prisoners, being subjected to gas warfare, performing night attacks, repelling enemy attacks from the ground and air, and dealing with the elements took their toll on the Marines. But one thing can always be said for marines, they work hard and "relax" hard.

"What are you doing tomorrow night?" came the question from one Marine from Company C to another.

Going to a party."

"Am I going with you?"

"You know you are. I never go to a party without asking you if you want to go."

"Thanks," came the reply. A contented smile began to form on his face. The mud, the gas, the lack of sleep didn't bother him any





Former Marines earn football fame

PARRIS ISLAND, S.C. Monday morning discussions throughout the Marine Corps this time of year generally center on the same subject addressed in civilian officers chatter and shoptalk: football,

But unlike those serving in perhaps more mundane professions, tradition-conscious Marines are conversing about a sport already rich with garnetand gold overtones. The pigskin and the eagle, globe and anchor have sustained a love affair dating back to the days when leather helmets were in vogue, and according to California newspaperman John Gunn, the Corps has a right to be more than a little

"When you talk Marine Corps

football," said Gunn, "you're talking about players the caliber of Elroy 'Crazylegs' Hirsch, Eddie LeBaron, and Notre Dame's great All-American Angelo Bertelli.'

"The gigantic all-pro tackle, 'Big Daddy' Lipscomb played Marine ball," he said, "and so did actor Gene Hackman and boxer Ken Norton

Gunn, a retired Marine Reserve colonel, is writing a book on Corps football (Over Here) and points to an era when service ball clubs -Parris Island, Camp Lejeune and San Diego among them - played full military and collegiste schedules. The official USMC team at Quantico was probably the most famous of these, suiting up against opponents the likes of Michigan, West Virginia and Boston College before the program was dropped in 1972.

The Quantico Marines have been replaced by a wellorchestrated marathon as the Corps' high visibility entry into world-class jockdom, but football remains peppered with gung-ho types who cut their teeth on the leatherneck version of the sport.

Even a cursory look at today's coaching ranks shows a roster filled with former Marines. Vince Dooley of the Georgia Bulldogs, Hayden Fry of Iowa's Hawkeyes and Arizona State's Darryl Rogers are gridiron mentors who wore Marine green as did Minnesota Vikings assistant Les Steckel, a USMCR major.

Gunn's research, though, has focused primarily on what he calls "the early days," and he relates with enthusiasm the athletic contributions of '20s and '30s era

'Marine greats" like Frank Goettge, L.M.H. Sanderson, Swede Larson, 'Boot' Brown and the late General David Shoup.

Later, Gunn said, Marine football "provided some of the leadership for World War II, Korea and even into Vietnam.

"Among those becoming generals," he said, "were Gay Thrash, George Shell, Tom Cushman, Lew Walt, Lowell English and Joe Burger.

More familiar to contemporary observers might be Major General Ernest Cheatham, commanding general, 1st Marine Division, Camp Pendleton and a former Baltimore Colt.

Gunn's special love, as a Southern California resident, was

The Marines' defense triumphed again, as the Navy downed-out their next possession.



The following state procedures for license extensions for military personnel apply to residents of those states who are out-of-state on active military duty.

It is a general requirement of all states that, if the license doesn't confirm military status, the individual must produce proof of military service. In addition, in automatic extensions, the license had to be current and valid at the time of entering service.

Gov't housing scarce at El Toro

MCAS El Toro, Calif. The baby boy gazed across the room as his mother carefully studied the list on the wall in front of her. Her husband was seated at a desk on the far side of the office, filling out forms that might, just might land them housing aboard Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro.

The young couple is not alone in their quest for government housing. According to Harold H. Wise, housing director here, there are presently 1,300 families on waiting lists for government quarters at El Toro and Marine Corps Air Station (Helicopter), Tustin.

Depending on a Marine's rank and family size, the wait for quarters can take anywhere from six months to three years.

"Unfortunately, by the time housing is available, very often the Marine requesting it has moved on," Wise said.

"We always have a housing crisis in this area," Wise said. "I'm sure that when most Marines first arrive in Orange County, they feel the frustration of a one percent and the situation hasn't gotten vacancy factor." any better," Wise lamented.

This high demand for housing has a costly side effect; high prices for what little civilian dwellings are available.

"A one-bedroom spartment in Orange Country starts at \$450," said Wise. "A three bedroom house will run about \$800. The only way most families can make it is if the

wife is working too." For those families that find \$450 too steep a price to pay for housing, the alternatives are not too attractive. Wise said that many younger Marines are forced to move into substandard housing in "rundown" parts of the county.

"We don't recommend that people move into the inexpensive areas," Wise said. "They are crowded, high crime areas. It's a shame that some military families live there simply because they can't afford anything else.

Wise said that many Marines move to Riverside, San Bernadino, or the Camp Pendleton areas because of the lower priced housing available there.

"I've been in the housing department for almost 10 years,

As far as government housing goes, Wise says that the longest wait is for field grade officers who want a three bedroom home; the normal wait is three years and the shortest for E-1's to E-3's who apply for Navy-Marine substandard housing is six months.

There are currently 212 units under construction at Tustin, bringing the total at both stations to 2,115 units, but Wise said it is doubtful there will be any permanent relief.

But even though the situation is tough for prospective home hunters, there are some things that can be done to help alleviate the pain of finding a place to live.

"We recommend that you not bring your family to Orange County until you find housing,' Wise said. "Also, a person should come in and physically apply as soon as they arrive here According to Wise, these two

simple steps can help make a tough situation a little bit easier. "When someone is first arriving at a new station they have enough to worry about," Wise concluded.
