CG reaffirms concern on DWI

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an interview with BGen. O.K. Steele, Commanding General, 1st Marine Brigade, concerning his new policy memorandum on drunk driving. The general wants members of his command to be aware of the consequences of and alternatives to driving while intoxicated.

Hawaii Marine: Your policy memorandum on drunk driving and alcohol abuse seems to indicate that a "war" has been launched against these problems. Is this an accurate statement, and, if so, do you consider it to be a personal war?

CG: To call it a "war" would be inappropriate. I prefer to think of it as a campaign, the objective of which is to take the drunk driver off the road. But it certainly isn't a personal battle. As a matter of fact, I sought the opinions of all my unit commanders. My senior commander, Col. (Harry L.) Solter, of BSSG, chaired a group in which all of the major commands were represented. I had them look for practical measures to reduce the number of drinking and driving incidents in which Marines are involved. They studied it for about six weeks and reported back to me with a number of recommendations. Some were

incorporated in this policy memorandum, while others are more long-range in nature.

HM: In your policy memorandum, you said this was the "major problem facing the Brigade." Why do you believe the problem to be so great?

CG: When I say that it's the greatest problem facing the Brigade, I take alcohol abuse in its total context. As I read records of courts-martial, incident reports from PMO, and cases for administrative discharges and the like, I estimate that about 80 percent stem from alcohol. That ranges anywhere from the young man who comes in from liberty and winds up talking back to the duty NCO when he should be listening, all the way to one who drives a vehicle at a high rate of speed while intoxicated and ends up injuring or killing himself or someone else. People do dumb things while intoxicated — things they wouldn't otherwise do. And we're talking about people just like you or me, who came into the Corps with goals, aspirations, and a strong desire to succeed. But because they're intoxicated, they behave irresponsibly. Alcohol abuse causes more agony in the Brigade — and more waste of time and money — than any other factor. That's my own

judgment, having sat at this desk for about a year and a half.

HM: Throughout the Corps' history, Marines have been characterized as hard-drinking carousers. Is this policy memorandum a repudiation of that image?

CG: I don't know that there ever really was such an image. So I don't know that we're repudiating anything. What we're doing is getting in line with civilian law enforcement and organizations, such as Mothers Against Drunk Drivers, to get these people off the road.

HM: This problem has been around for quite a while, and other, less-stringent actions have been taken in the past. Why did you decide that tougher action was warranted?

CG: What we were doing showed no positive results. For example, the number of incidents involving alcohol ranged anywhere from 30 to 40 per month — it was almost a constant number. What we're talking about here is not only the three deaths that we suffered last year (directly related to alcohol), but also the potential for anywhere from 30 to 40 deaths. We have 30 or 40 unguided missiles out there on the highway, putting themselves and others at risk. In order to deal with the problem, we're giving the unit

commander a tool so that he can do something about it. Whereas before, a person would go to a federal magistrate, he'll now have to look his commanding officer in the eye and explain his behavior. That alone should be a deterrent.

HM: Did this memorandum arise because of the alcohol abuse surveys conducted in 1982 and 1983?

CG: No. As I recall, the results of the '82 and '83 surveys didn't come out until late last summer. The figures came as no surprise; we were about where we thought we were. We were highlighting the problem; we were watching it closely. But we weren't doing any better. We became much more aware of it, but for some reason, we weren't reaching the people we needed to reach. In the end, awareness prompted this memorandum, more than the surveys did.

HM: As you know, beginning Jan. 1, all Brigade officers and staff noncommissioned officers involved in alcohol-related incidents will have their cases forwarded to you for review and action. Why do you feel the need to personally counsel these individuals?

CG: Personal counseling for alcohol-related incidents is nothing new. I can remember as a second lieutenant, that when an officer was apprehended for driving under

the influence, he presented himself to the commanding general. And I can also tell you that when you knew to whom you were going to have to explain your actions, it caused you to think about it. Therefore, I don't think what I'm doing is radically different. Moreover, my aim is to show everybody that this program is not just for sergeants and below. To succeed, it must be viewed as fair by all hands. I expect officers and staff NCOs to take the lead and set the example. As for those who aren't setting the proper example, I intend to look at them eyeball to eyeball and find out why.

HM: You have instructed Brigade unit commanders to establish "aggressive preventive education" programs. What do you have in mind?

CG: I want my unit commanders to be able to identify and confront individuals with problems. They should provide their Marines with healthy outlets and alternatives to drinking, such as intramural sports or promoting off-duty education programs. And, if an individual successfully finishes some pursuit he has taken up during off-duty hours, he should be recognized in a unit formation, just as we would in a promotion, an award presentation, or a decoration. We should bring

these positive accomplishments into the open. But on the negative side, unit commanders must ensure that their Marines are aware of the punishment that will come if someone disregards the advice that's being given concerning drinking and driving.

HM: You have also instructed unit commanders to stress programs that promote attitudes of individual responsibility. To what programs did you refer?

CG: This policy memorandum places the responsibility right on the individual. I want to make it clear that he or she, in the final analysis, is the one responsible for his or her actions. In the Marine Corps, you learn to stand on your own two feet. And if an individual thinks he's going to stand before his commander with some half-baked excuse, he's dead-wrong. Drinking and driving is just not going to be tolerated.

HM: You've led and served in many different Marine commands. Out of all the cases of drunk driving that you've seen, is there any one that stands out in your mind?

CG: We've all heard of a number of unfortunate cases. But I guess the one that stands out in my mind was one that happened before I arrived at the Brigade — I believe it was

Courts-Martial Report



Pvt. Carl E. Schettler, HMH-463, was convicted during a Special Court-Martial on Nov. 15 of wrongful possession and use of marijuana; and issuing checks without funds on five occasions. He was sentenced to forfeit \$395 a month for five months; confinement at hard labor for five months; and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Pvt. Randall L. Siler, MABS-24, was convicted during a Special Court-Martial on Nov. 21 of unauthorized absence from May 3 to 7, 1984; leaving his appointed place of duty; failure to go to his appointed place of duty on two occasions; and disobedience of a lawful command from a commissioned officer. He was sentenced to forfeit \$350 a month for three months; and confinement at hard labor for three months.

Pvt. Harold T. Hill, HMH-463, was convicted during a Special Court-Martial on Dec. 7 of conspiracy to steal property of the U.S. Government valued at \$150. He was sentenced to forfeit \$150 a month for three months, and to be discharged with a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Pvt. Craig W. Stevenson, 1/3, was convicted during a Special Court-Martial on Dec. 7 of assault, resisting arrest, wrongful use of marijuana and disturbing the peace. He was

sentenced to forfeit \$200 a month for four months; confinement at hard labor for four months; and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

1.Cpl. Aaron C. Williams, HqCo, 3d Marines, was convicted during a general court-martial on Nov. 30 of raping a child under 16 years old, unlawfully attempting to influence the testimony of a witness, and communication of a threat to injure. He was sentenced to forfeit all pay and allowances; reduction to private; confinement at hard labor for 10 years, and a Dishonorable Discharge.

Pvt. Charles E. Smith, MABS-24, MAG-24, was convicted during a special court-martial on Nov. 23 of the wrongful distribution of 27.11 grams of marijuana. He was sentenced to forfeit \$300 a month for six months; confinement at hard labor for six months; and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

1.Cpl. James Waring, 1/3, was convicted during a special court-martial on Nov. 28 of unauthorized absence from Sept. 7-Oct. 1, 1984, and the wrongful use of marijuana. He was sentenced to forfeit \$200 a month for two months; reduction to private; and confinement at hard labor for 75 days.

Party hosts held liable for drunks

WASHINGTON (NES) — 'Tis the season for parties! Office parties, Christmas parties, New Year's parties, parties for the sake of partying. You may be planning to throw a bash yourself.

Before you host a party, consider: You may be liable for your guests' drunken actions. Some states have "dram shop laws" that make you liable for serving alcoholic beverages to someone visibly intoxicated.

While the primary targets of dram shop lawsuits have been establishments that sell

alcoholic beverages, cases have been made and won against individual hosts.

Here are some suggestions to help you keep your party guests from misusing alcohol:

—Provide a relaxed environment. Put guests at ease with personal greetings and introductions.

—Keep the "cocktail hour" short; if serving a meal, serve it reasonably soon.

—Serve snacks so guests need not drink on empty stomachs. Avoid foods that stimulate thirst — such as salty chips. Instead, offer low-calorie, high-moisture content

foods such as raw vegetables and light dips. High protein foods such as cheeses and meats digest slowly and help slow alcohol absorption.

—Avoid carbonated mixers; carbonation speeds alcohol absorption. Use fruit juices for mixers instead.

—Serve attractive non-alcoholic drinks to those who choose not to drink alcoholic beverages.

—Measure drinks and don't "double up." Avoid having an open bar.

—Give your guests time to experience the effects of one

drink before offering them another. Never encourage guests to drink. One drink per hour is about all the body can normally absorb.

—Promote activities and/or entertainment as diversions from eating and drinking.

—Stop serving alcohol toward the end of the party to give guests a chance to sober up a bit before heading home.

—Create a climate that discourages alcohol misuse.

However, if any of your guests do overindulge, see that they get home safely or invite them to stay later or overnight.

HQMC studies attrition causes

HQMC — Manpower officials at HQMC have developed a 32-question survey to be completed by Marines during their separation from active duty process.

The questions, ranging from job satisfaction to quality of life indicators — family separation, commissary/exchange and medical/dental care — result from a field survey of nearly 1,000 former Marines who recently separated from active duty.

Except for basic administra-

tive data, completing the survey is voluntary. The computer scannable form is simple in design, asking the Marine to rate each item as "extremely important, very important, important, of some importance, or of no importance." The Marine is then asked to indicate the top three reasons influencing his/her decision to leave active duty.

According to a systems analyst with the Manpower Research and Development Section, the survey will be a

valuable aid in retention efforts since it will provide a Corps-wide view of Marines' perceptions regarding opportunity and benefits-related issues.

In the past, while individual career planners asked Marines about their decisions to leave the Corps, there was no way to collect and analyze the information.

The form includes an extra answer section capable of recording responses to 30 additional questions. The

additional answer block could be used for special survey questions of a particular group, such as Marines assigned to a particular MOS or geographical area.

The survey will be administered to all Marines, officer or enlisted, with results forwarded to HQMC on a weekly basis. Manpower officials are projecting early 1985 as the time when some initial conclusions can be drawn based upon the survey responses.

Policy memo highlights DWI

A new policy memorandum on drunk driving has been issued by the 1st Marine Brigade in an effort to make people more aware of the problem.

Policy Memorandum 7-84, effective Jan. 1, will cause some people to stop and think before driving while intoxicated.

Officer and staff NCOs involved in alcohol-related incidents, for instance, will have their cases forwarded to the commanding general for review and action.

Marines apprehended on-Station for driving under the influence will no longer be referred to Federal District Court. From now on, on-Station offenses will be treated as violations of the UCMJ and offenders will have to appear before their commanding officer.

Off-Station offenses will be processed by local civilian authorities. Both on- and off-Station convictions will result in a OQR/SRB entry for driving while intoxicated, and with the blood alcohol content



listed. Civil convictions will also be reported in section "C" of the fitness report.

Additionally, unit commanders have been instructed to establish "aggressive preventive education programs" to highlight alternatives to driving while intoxicated.

So as not to promote alcohol, Special Services funds may be used for the purchase of only one beer per person for unit parties and social functions.

Perhaps the most noticeable part of the policy are ID checks

at the gates. Inbound ID checks will be conducted, from a time to be designated, until 5 a.m., seven days a week. Outbound traffic will be stopped after normal working hours on Fridays and holidays until one hour after the clubs close.

On paydays, Saturdays and Sundays outbound traffic will be stopped, from a time to be designated, until one hour after the clubs close. Surveillance of the club parking lots will be conducted, and on-Station checkpoints will be randomly established.



Helmets a must Jan. 1

Effective Jan. 1, all operators of mopeds must wear protective helmets and eye protection which meet the standards of the Department of Transportation.

During the last 11 months, 12 sailors and Marines of FMFPac were killed, and another 48 have been seriously injured as a result of motorcycle and moped accidents. Frequently, the cause of death or severe injury has been proven to be head injuries when helmets were not being worn.

The State of Hawaii does not

require operators or passengers of motorcycles, who are 18 years or older, to wear helmets on the state roads; however, protective helmets have proven to prevent fatal head injuries when properly worn.

For this life-saving reason, and to ensure the safety of all operators on the Station, an approved DOT protective helmet will be worn by all operators and passengers of motorcycles and operators of motor scooters and mopeds, according to Air Station order P5500.6B.

HPD sets up roadblocks

In an effort to reduce the number of drivers endangering other people, the Honolulu Police Department has increased the number of DWI roadblocks and patrolling officers on the island through the holiday season.

So motor vehicle operators will think twice before driving under the influence of intoxicants, this increase will continue to be extensively publicized. Those who persist in ignoring these laws will be caught and prosecuted.

The penalties for drunk or drugged drivers are severe, and Department of Defense personnel face other consequences from their respective government agency in addition to the civil penalties.

Think before you drink, and be honest enough with yourself to know when not to drive.

in the Spring of '83. I'm referring to the tragic deaths of two Marines and the two critically injured while returning from liberty in the early morning hours. They were traveling through Wilson Tunnel toward Kaneohe, and according to the police reports, were going about 80 mph when their car struck the guard rail. Their wasted deaths will stand out in my mind for a long time to come.

HM: Do you consider breathalyzer tests to be a valuable tool in the battle against alcohol abuse? Will their use be increased?

CG: Breathalyzers would be valuable for PMO or officers of the day when they suspect that someone has been drinking. They could determine whether he should be in a duty status, driving, or something of that nature; but I also see the potential for broader uses on the positive side. I have heard of taverns back on the mainland, for example, where they have a breathalyzer on the premises, so that a person can call a taxi if he feels impaired. Perhaps our clubs should offer a similar service. It would be a positive thing to do.

HM: Do you support random sampling?

CG: Earlier this year the Brigade participated in a test to determine the effectiveness of such a program. We tested it in an infantry battalion and in one of our squadrons. On balance, we didn't see it as a useful tool on a random basis. As far as random sampling similar to urinalysis, I don't favor it at the moment.

HM: ID checks at the gate are not exactly popular among the troops. Will they continue?

CG: Yes. I agree with the Station Commanding Officer that we need to tighten security on the Station. In this age of terrorism, there are people who might want to do us harm, and we need to screen them out. But also, our gates offer us the best control point to keep potential drunk drivers off the road; and therefore, random stops of both inbound and outbound traffic will continue for the foreseeable future. If someone is thought to be intoxicated, we can do something about it on the spot rather than read about it in the paper the next day. It used to be that at the company or squadron levels, liberty cards were issued. That was our control point. When an individual returned from liberty, the duty NCO would take his card and make a log entry concerning the individual's condition. So, when

you look at how it used to be, what we're doing with the gates isn't all that radical. In fact, it's quite a bit more liberal than the old days.

HM: Why are the club parking lots under surveillance?

CG: I see it more as a courtesy rather than the notion that someone is lying in wait to apprehend somebody. As clubs close, we have the highest chance for an altercation in the parking lots, or decisions being made by groups to continue the party elsewhere. By being around and being visible, our PMO patrols can discourage that from happening. In some cases, when someone has had too much to drink, whoever's on patrol could offer the individual a ride back to the barracks. So, we also see it as a courtesy — one that in the cold light of day the person could possibly be grateful for.

HM: Are you in favor of eliminating "happy hours" at the clubs?

CG: No. But I feel that if the prices of alcoholic beverages are reduced, then the prices of non-alcoholic drinks should also be reduced.

HM: Are you against alcohol?

CG: No. I'd be a hypocrite to say that I was. What I'm aiming at here is to come out

with a policy that will "cause people to pause" before driving while intoxicated. In other words, to simply stop and think, and consider the consequences, preferably before that first drink is taken. Maybe someone else could drive the car. And there's always public transportation, or even a "courtesy patrol." Some units have a standing policy that if somebody is impaired and doesn't feel that he should drive, he can call the duty NCO and transportation will be arranged. Those are the sort of alternatives that should be applied.

HM: Do you believe that the increase in alcohol-related

incidents is due to the Corps-wide crackdown on drug abuse?

CG: Some have argued that point. It is true there are some individuals who appear to need a crutch of some type, and some may have gone from drugs to the legalized drug, which is alcohol. I'm sure there is some validity to that. But I don't believe the crackdown on drug abuse is the root cause of our current problem with alcohol.

HM: Is there anything you would like to add?

CG: Yes. I don't feel very good when someone says that our rate of drunk driving incidents probably compares to the civilian world. It shouldn't

compare; Marines are supposed to be a cut above the rest. In the eyes of the country, Marines are special. We've got to keep it that way. If we prevent three deaths in the next year — if we, in a way, prevent the three deaths that occurred last year — then I would be anxious to hear from anyone who says that this program isn't working. If we end 1985 with no lives lost, I'd want to see that person face-to-face. All too often, the life of a young Marine is snuffed out by some unthinking act caused by alcohol. It's a shame, and as commanders, we have the responsibility to do something about it.

Christmas all year-round

People in need might not have a "Merry Christmas" this year, but Navy and Marine personnel in Hawaii can have a Sherry Christmas year-round.

Christmas, a Navy Relief volunteer, is about to complete 3,000 hours of work with the society — an organization of which she is extremely proud. "We're here for the emergency needs of the serviceman," said Christmas.

"But some people come here just for budget counseling. They might say 'my budget is messed up. Can you help me?' In some cases, we go over their LESs and find that a married serviceman hasn't even applied for ComRats or COLA. Budgets are the most important thing that we do."

It was when Sherry's husband, Col. G.R. Christmas, CO of 3d Marines, commanded Marine Barracks Annapolis, Md. in 1976 that she first became involved with the NRS.

"At that time, they wanted all CO's wives to be introduced to the organization," she commented. "I became interested in it and decided to take the course. I had four small children, and volunteer work was a way to get out of the house and do something for the Marine community."

"It was a place that I could go and be me," she continued,

"not my husband's wife or Tracy, Jim, Kevin, or Brian's mom. I was just Sherry. They paid for the babysitters, and I got to be around adults and use my skills."

Col. Christmas supported his wife's volunteer efforts. "He encouraged me and learned a lot about Navy Relief in return," she remarked. "It was a learning experience for him. I was able to talk with him about LESs, benefits, and things like that. It became a source of conversation."

"The knowledge that I was helping servicemen was also important to him," she continued. "He's always wanted the troops to get fair treatment and to have some place to go if they needed help."

Volunteers, according to Sherry, work from a genuine interest in serving or helping military families. But, she concedes, it's also fun. "Navy Relief is a place to develop comradery and meet people," she remarked. "If you're going to a new duty station, it's nice to be able to walk into the Navy Relief office and say 'I've just come from ... wherever ... and would like to go to work.' Immediately, you're welcomed as a member of the family."

According to Sherry, working with Navy Relief in Hawaii has been different than at other places. "In most auxiliaries on the mainland,

you don't have Rent-Plus, and the rental fees aren't so high," she commented. "Finding a place to live isn't as difficult in other places."

"In Hawaii, it's especially stressful because there are young girls whose husbands have to go on deployments. A lot of these wives have never been away from home before. They come from small towns and are here where they can't go home to 'Mama.'"

"It sometimes helps to sit down and talk with them and let them know that you've been through the same thing," she continued. "Some come to us looking for guidance, while others just need someone to talk to."

Sherry has talked to many sailors and Marines since she first volunteered; but no matter what similarities they may have, she keeps them in perspective. "They're all individuals, and that's how we like to treat them," she remarked. "You might have four different people come in because of rent problems, but for four different reasons. And you may be able to help them in four different ways."

At times, however, Navy Relief can't help the service member in the way that he or she would prefer. "Sometimes they get upset only because they're so frustrated," Sherry commented. "They may have problems that are too involved for us. We're not counselors — we can't help

when they're going through divorces or separations or things like that. All we can do is send them to Family Services, Legal Assistance, or to the chaplain's office."

If a person seeking monetary assistance is refused, he does have alternatives. "If they feel that they've been treated unfairly and don't agree with the decision that was made, they can always make an appointment with the executive director," Sherry explained. "In extenuating circumstances, the decision could be reversed."

Confidentiality is a cornerstone of Navy Relief policy, as is the prevention of potentially uncomfortable situations. "I don't interview people at Kaneohe because of my husband's job," Sherry explained. "It might make a client feel hesitant, knowing that the CO's wife is asking all of the questions. To avoid that, I do all of my interviewing at Pearl Harbor."

If someone in need of assistance is interviewed by Sherry, there's no guarantee that he'll get the money he needs. "The worst part about my job is having to say 'no,'" she remarked. "But we try to help as best we can."

While monetary assistance isn't certain, the applicant can at least count on a little Christmas cheer — Sherry style.

Scholarships

HQMC (MCNews) — The Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation is now accepting scholarship applications for the 1985-86 academic year and expects to award \$400,000 in aid to deserving children of active duty and former Marines.

Eligible applicants must be the son or daughter of an active duty, reserve or former Marine in good standing; a high school senior; high school graduate; registered as an undergraduate student in an accredited college; or, be enrolled in a post high school vocational/technical institution. Scholarships are not available for graduate study. The combined gross family income cannot exceed \$25,000 in the 1984 taxable year.

Since 1962, the Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation has awarded 2,451

scholarships to deserving students, ranging from \$600 to \$1,500. Nearly two thirds of all applicants receive some degree of financial aid.

Written requests for a scholarship application form should be addressed to: Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation, James Forrestal Campus, P. O. Box 3008, Princeton, N. J. 08540.

Admin degree

CLEP/DSST testing for dependents

Although geared toward active duty military, the Joint Education Center here can also be an asset to military family members.

The College Level Examination Program tests and DANTES Subject Standardized Test may be administered to dependents. These tests enable an individual to receive college credit for knowledge gained through independent study.

There is a \$28 fee to take each CLEP test, and a \$25 fee to take each DSST. At least one month's advance notice is required in registering to take a CLEP test, as they have to be ordered. DSST's are in stock, so less lead time is required.

Family members not enrolled in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System will now be denied nonemergency medical care at military health treatment facilities, according to DoD officials.

September Leave and Earnings Statements listed information contained in DEERS. Marines with incomplete information should contact their unit administrative office as soon as possible.

There are exceptions to this policy. People who will not be denied routine care for nonenrollment are children younger than one; families of Marines stationed overseas; and newly acquired (less than 120 days) family members. These individuals will be treated upon the presentation of a valid DD Form 1173. Parents/guardians may use their DD Form 1173 for children younger than 10.

Marines whose dependents are denied care can update the DEERS information through their unit administrative office.

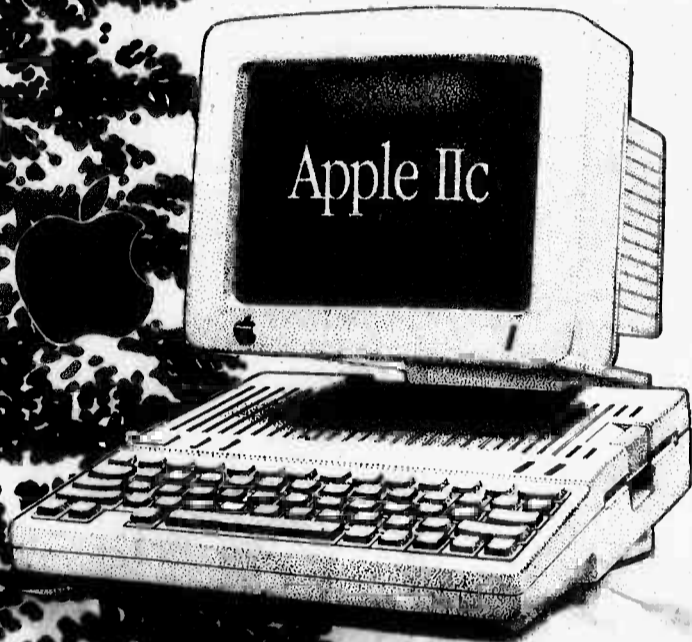

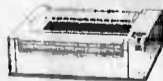

Marines shoot for combat efficiency

In the Northeast corner of the Air Station lies nearly 50 acres of grassy knolls spotted with wooden benches, firing lines and buildings. The scenic view from this extinct volcano encompasses a wildlife refuge, but also includes Marines preparing to be efficient in combat.

"Our purpose at the Range Complex is to train Marines to be highly efficient marksmen," said GySgt. V. Fuiava, NCOIC. "We help them to understand their weapon and have more

confidence in its use."

The section of the range complex that often comes to mind when thinking of weapons training is known as the firing line.

"We have eight people working on the line," said Fuiava. "Their job is to teach Marines the proper way to care for and to accurately fire their weapons. Safety is always stressed. Our coaches, called Primary Marksmanship Instructors, are trained to teach Marines how to correct shooting problems. All a Marine has to do is listen to the PMI, apply what he

learns, and he will be a better shooter."

Depending on their unit, Marines may attend either the KD course for two weeks, or a three-day course known as the B-Mod, for Marines who are not assigned to ground units. But before shooters get to the firing line, they must attend the Range School.

"The marksmanship instructors provide the shooters with information on proper safety procedures, firing techniques and positions, and the commands they will receive on the line,"

said Fuiava. "More importantly, the shooter is prepared to take proper corrective actions when actually firing. We have barrels with targets painted on them so the shooters can snap-in."

Snapping-in is the practice of assuming a firing position and aiming in at the painted targets. "Shooters who apply themselves seriously while on the grass always fire better before it is too late."

Pistol qualification is also done at the Range Complex.

"We are able to qualify .45 and .38-caliber pistol shooters," Fuiava continued. "Our mission on the pistol range is the same as the rifle range."

At the Small Arms Remote Target Systems range, located across from the Range Office, Marines can fire M60 machine guns, 60mm mortars, 50 caliber machine guns, M16A1 rifles, light anti-tank assault weapons and throw grenades. Infantry units can also practice combat maneuvers.

"Our SARTS range is the only place where troops

actually get combat training with live fire," said Fuiava. "They can use our machine gun and artillery simulators along with pop-up targets. This gives a realistic approach to the training."

Marksmanship is not the only subject taught at the Range Complex. "By instilling confidence in a Marine's capability with his weapon, we can help him develop all-around confidence," said Fuiava. "Marines who are well-trained in marksmanship are more effective in combat situations."

Christmas float

Marine effort pays off

The contribution made by the

1st Marine Brigade to commemorate Christmas 1984 will be long remembered by the citizens of Kaneohe and Kailua.

The Brigade built a Christmas float which included a cannon, a drum, and a biplane, and entered it in the 1984 Kaneohe and Kailua Christmas parades.

"I observed the Christmas parade last year, and for some reason, troops in combat gear marching down just didn't seem very much like Christmas to me," said BGen. O.K. Steele, Commanding General, 1st Marine Brigade. "So we decided to build a float. We felt that this would best portray the true spirit of Christmas."

The float took first place in the non commercial float category in both parades, and was selected as the best overall entry, winning the Kaneshiro Perpetual Trophy

from Kaneohe and the Grand Sweepstakes Trophy in the Kailua parade.

Units involved in building the float were MAG-24, who did the biplane; BSSG, who was responsible for the drum and decorating the trailer; and the 3d Marines built the cannon.

Building the cannon was entrusted to 2nd Lt. J.D. Hochstetler, S-3, 1/12. His crew consisted of PFCs R.W. Zoni, G.D. Poindexter, and LCpls C.A. Harrison, S.M. Feist, J.S. Graham and J.S. Morrin.

"We chose to build a cannon from the 1800 era," said Hochstetler. "The reason for this decision was based on the fact that the Marines portraying toy soldiers on the float would be dressed in appropriate historical attire."

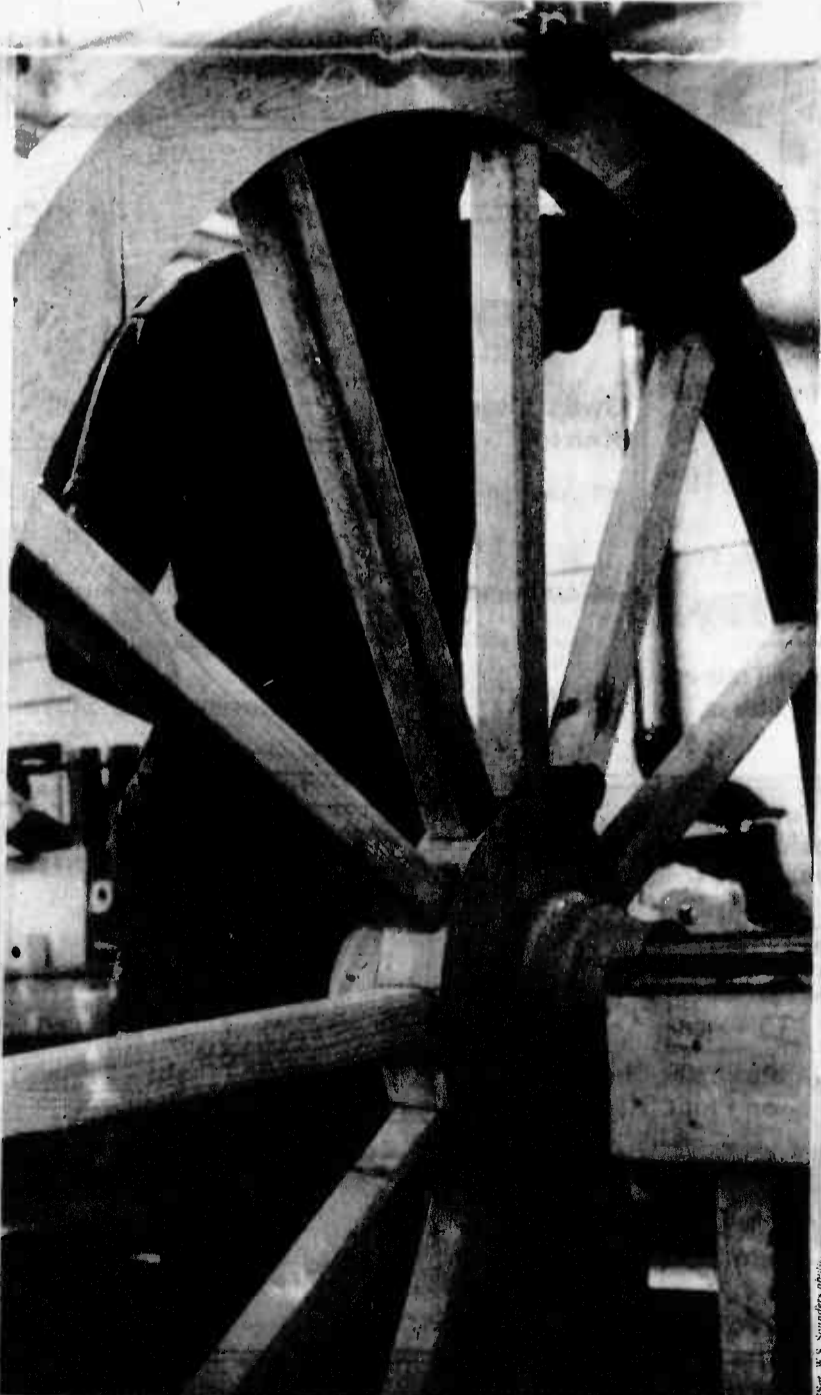
It took the lieutenant and his crew eight days to complete the project.

"The crew was outstanding,"

said Hochstetler. "They worked hard and were very innovative," he noted. "Now that the parades are over, we are hoping to be able to display the cannon in front of our headquarters."

The drum was built from an F-4 engine container and the low-boy trailer, on temporary loan from the Army, was decorated by Marines from BSSG under the supervision of Maj. R.N. Sifer, CO, Supply Co. His crew consisted of PFCs L.D. Shields, W.H. Long and LCpl. D.J. Ridder.

"It was beyond my wildest expectations as far as the quality," said BGen. Steele, when he described the award-winning float. "People came up to me after the parade and said the Marine Corps couldn't have done anything better to promote goodwill with the towns of Kaneohe and Kailua. Well done, Marines."




