Marine, wife rescue their neighbors from burning home

In the early morning hours of June 20, the family of GySgt. Robert Phelps lay sleeping in their family quarters on Brown Street here.

As the family of five slept, fire from the empty quarters next to theirs, quietly crept its way toward them.

What could have been a tragedy for the Phelps was prevented, due to the alert and spontaneous actions of a wife of a Marine lieutenant here, who got the family out of their house — just in time.

Nora Wheeler, 34-year-old wife of 1stLt. Joseph Wheeler, assistant operations officer, 1st Radio Bn., was recently awarded a Letter of Appreciation from the Air Station Commanding Officer, Col. W.E. Daniell, in a ceremony held in his office, for her efforts in evacuating the Phelps family from their home on that June morning.

The events which led up to her rescuing the Phelps family from their home is still so vivid to her. Wheeler says, "I remember laying in bed that night when I heard a 'buzzing' sound coming from somewhere. I went to my window to look out to see where the sound was coming from, but I saw nothing."

Fifteen minutes later, Wheeler says she still heard the strange sound, and went to her window again. This time she saw flames coming from out of the house that

was behind her home. The strange sound she had been hearing was the sound of a fire detector going off in the empty house.

According to an official from the Fire Department here, the fire was "probably started from someone who left a burning cigarette in the empty house."

Instinctively, Wheeler ran out the door to the burning house, and told her husband to call the Fire Department

here. "While my husband was calling, I ran down to the burning house and shouted 'Fire!' so the neighbors could hear me. I then started banging on the windows of the house — until I realized it was empty," she recalls.

Wheeler's husband joined her by this time, and they both ran from the empty house, to the Phelps' house next door. "Although the fire from the empty house hadn't reached the Phelps' house, you could see smoke coming

from the top vents which joined both houses through the roofing."

Both Wheelers frantically knocked on the Phelps' door, but no one answered. Wheeler, as well as GySgt. Phelps, think the noise of the Phelps' air conditioner may have drowned out the sound of the fire detector from the burning house next door, and also prevented him from hearing the Wheeler's pounding on the door. Not getting

Energy conservation violators to be cited

If your section is one of those which consistently forgets to turn off lights or air conditioners after securing in the evening, to use a Marine Corps cliché: "Standby to standby."

According to LtCol. J.G. Plantz, Station Inspector, units and sections here have been given ample advice and stern warnings to help conserve energy, but still consumption is far exceeding the Station's energy budget.

Plantz says that stronger measures are now needed to help curb wasteful energy consumption. As a result, any unit or section which is found not practicing and enforcing energy conservation will be cited by his team of inspectors, he said.

"All of us have heard many times over, the need to conserve," Plantz said.

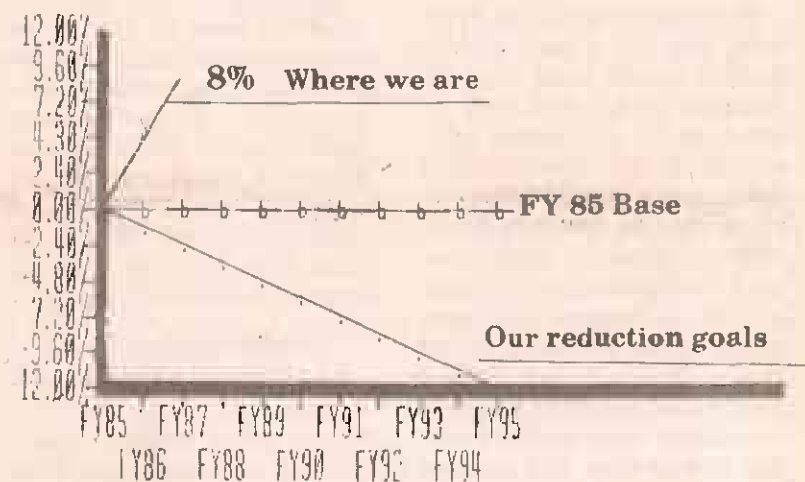
"The Hawaii Marine has published articles about how to cut down on energy waste, and the Station's marquee has offered energy tips. Yet, we are still exceeding our energy consumption goals," he said.

As chairman of the Utilities Conservation Enforcement Committee, Plantz will head a team, consisting of select Marine and civilian personnel here, which will closely review energy enforcement policies, restrictions, and the issuance of warnings and tickets.

Plantz urges all military and civilian personnel here to lend a hand in keeping energy use down, and offers some simple advice: "If you see a light on — turn it off, or a door open — close it. Little things like that will help prevent shortages of any utility, and meet conservation goals."

Defective boots to be repaired

Some of the new-style combat boots have been found to have defective rivets for the speed lacer assembly, and rubber heels are weak.

According to ALMAR 252/87, Quality Deficiency Reports cite that in some boots, the rivets caps have come out, and other boots were manufactured with no adhesive attached to the heels.

The Defense Personnel Support Center (DPSC) is Philadelphia, has taken steps to correct the deficiencies, but some defective boots are still on Marine Corps Exchange shelves.

Instead of recalling all the defective boots, the DPSC has developed procedures to either reimburse exchanges or contract local cobblers to repair the boots. The cost of repairing the boots will be

paid by the government, not the individual Marine.

MGSgt. Carl Pyron, NCOIC of the Exchange here, says the Marine Corps Exchange will try to get a contract negotiated with a local cobbler, once they get all the boot specifications from Headquarters, Marine Corps.

CMC forms group to study WM's progress

HQMC, Washington — The Commandant of the Marine Corps has formed a task force, at the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, to examine the policies and programs affecting women in the Marine Corps.

The group is composed of a steering committee of five general officers, three colonels and two sergeants major to oversee a working group of officers, SNCOs and NCOs.

Representatives from HQMC and other major Marine Corps commands first met Oct. 6 at HQMC, and have until late November to review programs and assess existing policies which affect the assimilation of women into the total force.

The Task Force has been directed to analyze current policy on the utilization of women, examine the disciplinary environment regarding

the equal treatment of males and females, and provide recommendations on any policy changes required as a result of this examination.

The formation of the Marine Corps task force occurred at a time when Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger announced he was establishing a Task Force on Women in the Military, whose purpose is to review current policies relat-

ing to women and recommend changes where necessary.

Major General W.H. Rice, Inspector General of the Marine Corps, HQMC, has been selected to head the steering committee. Other steering committee members include: MGen. Jacob W. Moore, Deputy Chief of Staff for Reserve Affairs, HQMC; BGen. Gail M. Reals, Director of Manpower, Plans and

Policies Division, HQMC, also the senior woman in the Marine Corps; BGen. William M. Keys, Director, Personnel Management Division of Manpower, HQMC; and BGen. John P. Brickley, Deputy for Education/Director, Education Center, MCDEC, Quantico, Va.

any response from the Phelps, Wheeler and her husband entered the family's home.

"We knew someone was home because cars were in the driveway. My husband and I then entered the house, and my husband went straight to one of the bedrooms and grabbed the Phelps' baby boy. In the meantime, I went to the Phelps' bedroom, and told the couple to get up, and get out of the house."

(GySgt. Phelps, a shop chief with Maint. Co., BSSG-1,

recalls waking up to see Wheeler standing in his bedroom.

"We were stunned to see Nora in our bedroom. But when she started giving us orders, with such command presence, we realized that we had better listen to her. She obviously knew what she was doing," he said.

Phelps marvels at Wheeler's calm attitude in helping his family evacuate, and says he will never forget one special act of compassion she showed toward them. "After she got us out, she had the foresight to go back into the

house to shut our windows and doors. And if that wasn't all, she went back into the house again, and grabbed my little boys' stuffed animal to keep him company through the dilemma.

"I can't tell you what that meant for him" Phelps said.

The Phelps' house and the empty house are both gone now; all that remain are the foundations. The Phelps were relocated to other quarters on the Air Station; most of their belongings were damaged by the smoke which filled their home. Although

their cat died of smoke inhalation in the fire, Phelps and his family say they have a lot to be thankful for because of Nora Wheeler.

"We really feel a lot of gratitude toward her. There's no way we could have gotten out if it wasn't for her. A few days ago, my daughter asked me, 'why were we chosen to have this terrible thing happen to us?'"

"I asked her a question back, 'Why was Nora Wheeler chosen to save us? I think my daughter knew the answer to that: our family was just plain lucky.'"

Legally Speaking

Military justice developments

The U.S. Supreme Court and the U.S. Court of Military Appeals recently decided cases which may have a significant impact upon the type of evidence admitted in court-martials. The courts opened the door for the introduction of results of polygraph examinations and testimony resulting from hypnosis. The courts further held that law enforcement agents can use discretion to select which cars are stopped and searched during a command authorized gate search and that drug use cases based on urinalysis require an expert's testimony for conviction. In a separate area, the Court of Military Appeals upheld court-martial jurisdiction over a member of the U.S. Fleet Marine Corps Reserve.

Polygraph Examinations

In *United States vs. Gipson*, the U.S. Court of Military Appeals held that an accused was entitled to attempt to introduce into evidence the results of a polygraph examination to show that he testified truthfully at trial. In that case, both prosecution and defense wanted to present their own polygrapher's testimony, but the military judge denied both sides' requests; this was consistent with military justice at that time. The accused was convicted, contrary to his pleas of "not guilty," and

he appealed; his appeal succeeded in the highest court in the military. The *Gipson* case opens the door for military accused to use the polygraph to their advantage, but judge or jury will still have to decide if trial testimony is truthful.

Hypnosis

In *Rock vs. Arkansas*, the U.S. Supreme Court held that a trial court cannot arbitrarily keep out an accused's testimony resulting from hypnosis. In that case, the accused was limited to testifying about matters remembered after hypnosis, absolutely prohibited under Arkansas law. The accused was convicted and she appealed; her appeal succeeded in the highest court in the nation. The U.S. Supreme Court noted that an accused has a constitutional right to testify in his/her own behalf.

Arkansas arbitrarily deprived Rock of part of her constitutional right, so her conviction was reversed. The accused's constitutional right to testify in his/her own behalf in court-martial proceedings was already well established, but the *Rock* case has not yet had an impact on military justice.

Gate Searches

In *United States vs. Jones*, the U.S. Court of Military Appeals held that a military policeman could use discretion to select which cars were stopped and

searched during a command authorized gate search, and that evidence obtained in the search would be admissible against that accused. In that case, the accused was the registered owner of a car in which a marijuana roach was found during a command authorized gate search. Although the accused had loaned the car to friends and was not present in the car during the search, since he had previously tested positive for marijuana usage, his commanding officer had probable cause for a urinalysis.

The accused's positive urinalysis resulted in his conviction for marijuana use and he appealed; his appeal failed. The *Jones* case may have the impact of strengthening the Marine Corps' "War on Drugs" by helping to cripple drug traffic on and off military installations.

Urinalysis Experts

In a related matter, in

United States v. Murphy, the U.S. Court of Military Appeals held that a drug use conviction could not be based solely on urinalysis results, without the testimony of an expert to interpret those scientific results. Such testimony was needed to prove that the accused used marijuana because it cannot be presumed that a judge or jury are capable of understanding such technical matters. The *Murphy* case will not change local practice because the prosecution already presents expert testimony in urinalysis cases as a matter of standard operating procedure.

Jurisdiction over retirees

In *United States v. Overton*, the U.S. Court of Military Appeals upheld court-martial jurisdiction over GySgt. Overton, a member of the Fleet Marine Corps Reserve. GySgt. Overton had completed 22 years

of active duty service, voluntarily transferred to the Fleet Marine Corps Reserve and received retainer pay, although he had performed nothing like active duty since transfer. He was caught in a conspiracy to steal retail merchandise from the Navy Exchange at Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines, convicted by general court-martial, and he appealed; his appeal failed. The U.S. Court of Military Appeals rejected GySgt. Overton's challenge to part of Article 2 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). Article 2 of the UCMJ spells out who may be tried by court-martial and includes retirees who are entitled to pay. The last prosecution of a retired member took place in 1958 and involved a rear admiral.

Until the decision in this case, there has been considerable doubt about court-martial jurisdiction over retirees. This decision will serve as a reminder to retir-

ees — particularly those who work on bases and air stations — that they are subject to court-martial for offenses against the military.

Conclusion

The most significant recent military justice developments affect the admissibility of the results of polygraph examinations, post-hypnotic memory and evidence obtained through discretion in command authorized gate searches. The requirement to present expert testimony in urinalysis cases will not change local practice. Upholding military jurisdiction over Fleet Marine Corps Reservists may serve mainly as a reminder to all persons subject to military jurisdiction under Article 2 UCMJ.

The impact of these developments on individual cases can only be determined by consulting the Military Justice Section of the Legal Services Center, 257-2160/2168.

On the Blotter

Editor's Note: The following are actual incidents which occurred on the Air Station this week. The Military Police Department here is bringing significant cases to your attention to prevent these types of incidents happening to you or your family. To report a crime, or if you notice suspicious activity on the Air Station, please call the Military Police Department's 24-hour Crime Stopper number — 257-2123.

A number of Marines have been apprehended for illegal use of drugs this past week.

The Criminal Investigation Division will now investigate all persons who test positive on urinalysis tests. In the past, each command conducted its own investigations. Once a Marine tests positive on the urinalysis, he/she will be sent to the CID office to talk to a criminal investigator.

A private first class was apprehended for wrongful possession and use of dangerous drugs after various tablets and liquids were seized during an inspection of the barracks. The items were tentatively identified as steroids.

A sergeant was apprehended for driving while on station revocation. The ser-

geant was pulled over initially for not stopping at a stop sign. When the MP checked the registration, it was found that the sergeant was on the revocation list. The sergeant was apprehended then released to his unit.

A lance corporal was apprehended for wrongful possession and use of marijuana.

During an inspection of the barracks, Drug paraphernalia was also found in the lance corporal's room. A Military Police drug detection dog "alerted" on the lance corporal's desk, which resulted in the seizure of two hand-rolled cigarettes.

Two Marines, a sergeant and a corporal, were apprehended for wrongful use and possession of dangerous drugs after a unit urinalysis indicated that they had used cocaine. Both are under investigation.

A lance corporal was arrested by the Honolulu Police Department after he struck a civilian man and his friend near Kuhio St. The lance corporal was released on \$50.00 bail and will appear in court at a later date.

Three lance corporals were apprehended for the assault of a private first class in their room at the

barracks. The private first class was hit in the head with a spray can, and struck several times, after which one of the lance corporals slammed the private first class to the floor. One of the lance corporals blocked the door so the private first class could not leave the room. All were processed and released to their unit.

A lance corporal was apprehended for communicating a threat and disorderly conduct. The lance corporal was knocking on doors in a barracks looking for a private, and threatening to kill him. The Duty NCO told the lance corporal to leave. As the lance corporal left, the DNCO got the license number from his car. The car was stopped at the gate and the lance corporal was apprehended. Attempts to locate the private revealed that he had been discharged from the Marine Corps.

A lance corporal reported the theft of his Kenwood stereo amplifier in town. The amplifier was in his pickup truck, which was locked. Also stolen was a wallet and miscellaneous papers belonging to his friend. The Honolulu Police Department was notified and will assume the investigation.

in to the vehicle registration office.

A dependent wife and a lance corporal were involved in a traffic accident when the wife entered a one way street going the wrong way. Her car struck the rear of the lance corporal's car as he backed out of a parking spot.

A hit and run traffic accident occurred after a lance corporal backed a government vehicle into a Volkswagen. The lance corporal then left the scene of the accident. He was apprehended, issued a traffic citation, and released on his own recognizance.

A lance corporal reported that someone had stolen two 35 pound weights from the Station Mini-Gym.

A corporal reported the theft of his wallet. The wallet was left in his car parked near the Housing Office. The car was left unlocked.

A corporal reported the theft on his beige 10-speed bicycle. The bike was left on the porch of his quarters, and was not locked.

A corporal reported that someone had withdrawn \$400 from her bank account with her ATM card at two separate locations off station. The theft is still being investigated.

Two more civilian construction workers were detained for fraudulent use of a contractor's pass this week. Both were instructed to obtain visitor's passes, and the illegal passes were turned

Food stamp distribution equalized

An upcoming change in the Department of Agriculture's policy concerning allocation of Food Stamps will now equalize the distribution that had been thrown off by recent changes to the military pay schedule.

The changes to the pay schedule, which resulted in military personnel receiving only one paycheck in September, and three in October,

left military personnel with unequally distributed paychecks.

Under the old Food Stamp issuing policy, recipients should have received surplus Stamps in September since they were physically paid less that month. In October since they were, in effect, paid more, recipients should have received fewer, if any, stamps.

The month in which they were physically received, said Blanche Ma'a, acting Food Stamp Administrator, Hawaii State Department of Human Services.

Although official notification of the change has not been received from the Department of Agriculture, State agencies here are aware of the change and expect to implement it before the end of the month, according to Lt. Col. Sevath Boyum, the Director of Family Services, which coordinates Food Stamp distribution aboard the Air Station.

The Food Stamp policy will require state agencies responsible for the program to credit the paychecks to the month they were earned, not

Major General Moore, acting in MGen. Rice's absence, briefed the task force on their mission by saying, "Don't be hesitant to say that a policy is good and should remain that way. But if there's some changes that should take place, then I'm looking for you to recommend changes."

But he added a note of caution. "Before you recommend changes you need to say 'what is the impact', not just the impact on a particular MOS, a woman Marine or a male Marine, but what is the impact on the Marine Corps."

The task force's final report is due to the Secretary of the Navy by Dec. 5.

The policy review was prompted, in part, by reports made by members of the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services (DACOWITS) after their recent visits to Navy and Marine Corps installations. While these reports showed continuing progress in the integration of women into the services, they also listed a number of serious issues that DACOWITS members

felt required immediate attention.

DACOWITS provides the Secretary of Defense and the five armed services with assistance and advice on matters pertaining to women in the services. The committee, established in 1951, is composed of civilian members selected for their professional prominence and varied fields of interest, and to present a fair demographic representation.

Committee members visit military installation for two reasons: to enable the members to better understand the military and military women's issues, and to provide commanders and servicemembers an opportunity to discuss their concerns with a DACOWITS member.


The committee is divided into three subcommittees concentrating on the issues of force utilization, career development and quality of life. Though DACOWITS is concerned with "women's issues," many areas they investigate have an impact on both male and female servicemembers. Such issues include single military parents, married service couple rotation policies, discrimination, health and child care, and military dependency issues.

Among the area of concern which have been voiced by DACOWITS in the recent past were promotion/advancement opportunities, command opportunities, sexual harassment and women in non-traditional jobs.

Rear area security increases during 1st MAB's CPX

The Command Element of the 1st Marine Amphibious Brigade recently practiced command and control channels in a Command Post Exercise held at Bellows Air Force Station, but unlike previous CPX's this one had a new twist to it.

As in all 1st MAB Command Post Exercises, the purpose of the training is to exercise the command and control channels between the 1st MAB and all of the major subordinate commands, said Capt. Jerry Roberts, G-3 Training section.

The unique aspect of this CPX was that for the first time, Brigade Service Support Group-1, one of the

major subordinate commands within the 1st MAB, operated as the rear-area command element, responsible for coordinating its own rear-area security, said Roberts.

"This exercise allowed us to increase our overall knowledge about handling possible security problems, using our existing Tables of Organization and Equipment," said Capt. John Bower, BSSG-1's Maritime Prepositioning Ships plans officer. "We also wanted to get as many people as possible familiar with our MPF assets," he added.

"The whole exercise tempo was just right to allow us to educate ourselves as we went along. We asked questions like 'Did we think about this,

and what would we do about that?'" said Bower.

The scenario for the CPX called for the 1st MAB to operate as a Maritime Prepositioning Force in support of "Country Blue," at that time under attack by forces from neighboring "Country Orange."

Using message traffic, the Tactical Exercise Evaluation Control Group simulated various problems for the Brigade staff, which included enemy actions, refugee security, and civilian media interviews.

"The TEECG creates the scenario and the enemy threat. The Brigade then has to decide how to respond to the threat," said Maj. Peter Freeman, officer-in-charge of the TEECG and the director of Brigade Schools.

The emphasis of the first phase of the CPX was on exercising a simulated MPF mission, to include BSSG-1 off-loading equipment from four imaginary ships of the MPS-3 squadron, assigned to the 1st MAB.

The second phase of the exercise required the Brigade command element to identify potential enemy threats and respond to them.

Units prepared responses to their situations, which were then evaluated by the TEECG.

"The whole exercise worked out well, but going through some things for the first time, like the new rear-area security responsibilities, brought out a lot of questions, and we found areas that need some work," said Roberts.

Scout Pack 225 cleans station beach

The Air Station's North Beach is a lot cleaner now and some marine life a little safer, thanks to the efforts of a few Cub Scouts and their families here.

Twenty-four Scouts of Pack 225 based here, and their parents, recently participated in "Get the Drift and Bag it," an annual nationwide beach cleanup that focuses on ridding beaches and oceans of debris.

Medical/Dental run a smooth 'operation'

More than 850 Marines from the Brigade Service Support Group-1, recently conducted a three week field training scenario to refresh

their memories on individual field skills, defensive and company tactics.

The "cradle-to-grave" Group moved all of their field equipment to Bellows Air Force Station for the training evolution.

Two of the seven companies which comprise the Group-21st Dental Company and A Company, 3d Medical Bn.-put their patent leathers, khakis and whites in the closet, and left a multi-million dollar medical/dental facility to train with their in-the-field medical equipment. And for some of the corpsmen, it was their first time of "hands on" training with the 'field' equipment.

The medical and dental companies were based together, but in a separate location from the Group during the training evolution — as they would be during an actual combat situation.

Both companies utilized the new Marine Corps Expeditionary Shelter Systems in the field for the first time. The 8-by-8-by-20 foot containers are air conditioned and can be put together or used separately to accommodate the doctor(s) needs.

The Dental Company supplied the same services in the field as they did back at the Air Station — only they performed their duties utilizing dental field equipment.

According to Lt. Nathan R. Patterson, dental officer for 21st Dental Co., the dental officers would work hand-in-hand with the medical doctors, as well as the dental technicians working with the corpsmen, during wartime emergency situations in the "O.R." (operating room).

Company A, 3d Medical Bn., also performed everyday medical procedures such as sick call, lab and x-ray work.

The main objective of A Co. was to train the corpsmen with the medical field equipment. In addition to the field equipment training, the corpsmen also received an introductory class on Advanced Trauma Life Support, mass casualty procedure training, and "IV" and suture certification.

"The primary purpose of the FMF doctors and corpsmen is saving lives in combat," said LtCmdr. James B. Calvin, commanding officer of A company. "This training evolution is very important for the doctors and corpsmen because, even though they may have four or 20 years experience in basic life saving procedures, the real difference is the in-the-field equipment and change of atmosphere."

Motor 'T' Company keeps BSSG-1 rollin'

MT's NCO's put to test

During their recent three-week field exercise at Bellows Air Force Station, 117 Marines from Motor Transport Company, BSSG-1, participated in Group-level and company defensive skills training.

"Our training during the first week of the exercise was spent in the classroom," said 1stLt. Anthony Johnson, executive officer MT Co. "Some of the skills our Marines were taught were individual defensive measures, field sanitation, NBC measures, land navigation,

use of crew-served weapons, calling for fire, patrolling, ambushes, squad and platoon tactics."

A scenario was developed by the company staff to put their classroom work to the test during their second week in the field.

The troops were broken up into two groups. The senior sergeants of one group were tasked with preparing their Marines for a convoy. At the same time, another was tasked to ambush the first group's convoy. Problems were built into the scenario that required the drivers, security personnel and ambushers to react. The next day, the groups' roles were reversed.

The Motor Transport staff tried to introduce as much realism into the scenario as possible, said Johnson. "The NCOs were responsible for all their own planning and procurement of support equipment. Each NCO called

for supporting arms "reconned" his own routes, organized teams for the convoy, including positioning the crew-served weapons and security personnel," he said.

The company's officers and NCOs served as evaluators and controllers for the problem and conducted detailed debriefings on the actions taken by the NCOs.

An important element of the company's training centered on defensive skills training which included reconnaissance parolling to find the enemy Command Post (CP), erecting physical barriers, establishing primary and secondary defensive positions, and sentinel and listening posts.

After the Motor Transport Marines set up their defensive positions, Motor Transport's NCOs were again responsible for the planning and execution of patrols.

"Our Marines found this part of the exercise to be quite

enjoyable because it was unlike anything they had become accustomed to their previous field training," Johnson remarked.

In addition to their own training, the company also provided support to 1st MAB and other BSSG-1 units in the field at Bellows. Overall, they dispensed some 13,000 gallons of fuel, and accumulated more than 27,000 accident-free miles during the three-week exercise.

HMM-165 reaches 20,000 accident free hours

MCAS FUTENMA, Japan — The "White Knights" of HMM-165 celebrated 20,000 hours of accident-free flying during a flight line ceremony here, recently.

The squadron, which is home-based at MCAS Kaneohe Bay, is here on a six-month deployment as part of the Unit Deployment Program.

The ceremony also included the presentation of the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Annual Aviation Safety Award for calendar year 1986. During the year,

the squadron flew a total of 3,572.5 accident-free hours.

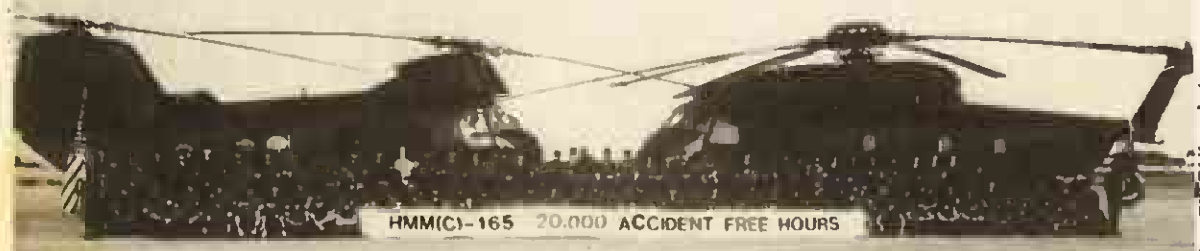
The squadron went over the 20,000 accident-free hours mark on Sept. 15. The accident-free hours started on Sept. 27, 1983.

During their 20,000 accident-free flight hours, the "White Knights" have participated in numerous major exercises and unit deployments.

During these missions, the squadron has provided supply, troop lifts, medical evacuations, command and control liaison, and reconnaissance insertions and extractions of the 1st and 3rd Marine Divisions.

Squadron commander LtCol. B.F. Luby explained that the squadron's junior Marines are responsible for the safety milestone. "It's our young Marines who are getting the word on safety and doing things by the book," Luby said. "When the young Marines fail, that's when the squadron fails. So far, they haven't and neither has the squadron."

"In peacetime, we don't have to force ourselves in to the air," Luby continued. "We don't cut corners. We stop flying when it's not safe. We've worked hard and we've been lucky. However, we believe that when you work hard, you create your own good luck."

F-21A Kfir comes to MCAS, Yuma

During their deployment in Yuma, pilots from VMFA-232 are getting some real-world training against possible supersonic foreign threats, with the recent introduction of a new aircraft into

the Marine Corps inventory.

The aircraft, the F21A Kfir, is an Israeli supersonic fighter recently inaugurated into service by Marine Fighter Training Squadron VMFT-401 at MCAS Yuma, Ariz.

The Israeli jets will be used as an "aggressor squadron," giving Marine Corps pilots practice in air-to-air combat, said Maj. Michael Bush, the assistant operations officer MAG-24.

Bush, who trained with the F21A while assigned to Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-122 at Naval Air Station, Oceana, Va., in 1984, remembers the Kfir as being very fast, and difficult to fight against."

The new aircraft were inaugurated on Aug. 13, in a ceremony attended by Gen. A.M. Gray Jr., Commandant of the Marine Corps, and Avraham Ben-Joseph, director of Israel's Defense Mission to the U.S.

The introduction of the Israeli Kfir fighter into the U.S. Marine Corps inventory is another major link in the chain that binds our countries together," said Ben-Joseph.

MC family readiness guide book

HQMC, Washington, D.C. — Help is on the way for the wives and husbands of active duty and reserve Marines. That help is in the form of a 66-page, fact-filled information and records-keeping handbook called, "What's Next? A Guide to Family Readiness."

"What's Next?" is written specifically for the non-military family members and

designed to help orient the spouse to the Marine Corps and to prepare the wife or husband to head the military family while their Marine is away from home. It's packed with information on the Marine Corps, the family's benefits and rights, and the support agencies set up to assist the family.

Additionally, information on personal finances, taxes, vital records, and other pertinent subjects provide a complete personal and financial guide to handling everyday family matters.

"In the past, most units provided some type of deployment handbook to their Marine families," explains Maj. Laurel Hull, program manager, Family Programs Branch, Human Resources Division, HQMC. "What was needed was a standardized guide to prepare families for separation. This book was the result of an 18-month project and from the reac-

tions I've received to the advanced mailings, I feel this book will do the job well."

The handbook also includes 12 worksheets for use in keeping a centralized record of the family's financial matters — medical histories, employment records and personal property.

"What's Next?" helps you gather the kind of information you need to have at the times when it's most difficult to find," said Hull. "This book is one each family should keep updated and available."

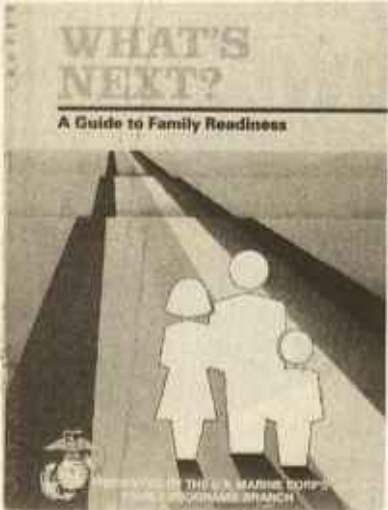
Judy Hampton, family enrichment specialist involved with the project from its inception, says the concern about family separation stems from the fact that the average Marine Corps family spends at least one month out of each year separated. "In 1985, 78 percent of the Corps' officers and 68 percent of the enlisted Marines were away from

their families for at least 30 days.

"Then take into consideration the number of Marine dependents (210,062 claimed by active duty Marines in July 1987) and you can imagine the magnitude of the potential problems created by these separations," she added.

The handbook is currently being distributed to commands throughout the Marine Corps, both active and reserve, to be given directly to Marine wives and husbands whenever possible. Each family service center will receive a small supply to distribute to newly married couples and to use as replacement copies.
