Memorial service for Okinawa crash victims held

Gov. Waihee orders flags to half-mast

More than 700 mourners gathered at the Station Chapel Monday for a memorial service for the Brigade corpsman and 13 Marines presumed dead in a CH-46 mishap off Okinawa May 30. The helicopter, carrying 22 personnel from Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-265 and 2nd Bn., 3rd Marines, crashed shortly after take-off from the USS Denver during night operations in support of exercise "Valiant Mark 89-4." Seven Marines and one corpsman were rescued by other helicopters and rubber boats immediately after the mishap.

As the start of the 40-minute memorial service neared, a steady flow of mourners filed into the chapel until it was full. A speaker was set up for the overflow of mourners outside.

In front of the altar, a trifolded American flag was framed by an infantry helmet to the left and a helicopter pilot's helmet to the right. The display represented the spirit of the air-ground team work between HMM-265 and 2nd Bn., 3rd Marines — units that had trained together for more than a year prior to the accident.

A somber mood gripped those inside the chapel as families and friends, their faces painted with grief, were seated in pews reserved for them near the front of the chapel. For them, the service was meant to be as much a time of strength and encouragement as it was a time of pain.

"Today our Marine Corps family gathers together, seeking to console each other," MajGen. J.A. Studts 1st MEB commanding general told mourners. "We deeply grieve for the surviving families of our Marines and sailors, many of whom are

with us this morning to help us pray."


MajGen. Studts hailed the contribution of the wives of servicemen, saying their "willingness to endure hardship and separation" is sometimes a harder task than that of their husbands'.

"This painful occasion gives opportunity to stop and reflect on our own family and our own children and our own lives," he said. "Knowing it is they, in moments such as these, that must suffer the ultimate sorrow."

Capt. H.L. Bergama, Brigade Chaplain, related a story of a time he was faced with making sense out of the death of a friend, and told of a gunnery sergeant who watched a helicopter fly off with one of his Marine in a body bag.

"The gunny crammed his muddy knuckles into his moist eyes and turned ... and said to me, 'That was my Marine,'" said Capt. Bergama. "Those four words comprise the essence, on the sidewalk level of life, of what it is that we are all about. I know it is true of other services, too, but it is certainly true of the United States Marine Corps. 'That was my Marine.' That is a qualitative commitment, a reference to and an exemplification of what it is for which we stand. It is a bond, a mystical union, variously articulated by the individual Marine, but nonetheless present, and it gives us cause not only to bear the pain of the moment, but to triumph over it and to transcend it."

Capt. Bergama continued, "We approach this service appropriately, with sadness and with pain. But also with pride, with dignity, with comfort and commitment that the loss of these lives was not in waste to God or to us, because their significance did not depend on how long they

Once the last words of condolence were offered, a

Marine bugler played "Taps," causing many to shed silent tears who had, to that point, held them back.

As a tribute to those lost to the crash, Gov. John Waihee ordered the flags over state buildings be lowered at

half mast Monday, while the national colors were lowered at the 1st MEB headquarters.

News In Brief

VHA Increases

Military people may see an increase in their paychecks June 15, as Variable Housing Allowance rates have been adjusted to meet a FY-89 congressionally imposed funding ceiling. The new rates are designed to give service people the maximum amount of money for housing as allowed by law. VHA rates are normally adjusted biannually to meet cost of living changes for people in different areas of the country and overseas.

The monthly change will vary from \$5.81 for a corporal with dependents to \$9.15 for a captain with dependents. The variable allowance is designed to help make up the difference between what someone receives for quarters allowance and what housing a particular area actually costs.

Not all people will notice a change, and people who reside in base housing will not be affected. June leave and earnings statements will contain detailed information for each individual person. The new rates will remain in effect until January 1, 1990, when VHA rates will be reviewed, and a possible 3.6 percent increase may be granted.

Kennel Lance Echo underway

'Rules of Exercise Play' outlined

Exercise Kennel Lance Echo (KLE), a major counterterrorism exercise, is underway, and will continue here through Sunday. The exercise is designed to train and evaluate security procedures at Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station, Naval Base Pearl Harbor, and NAVCAMS EASTPAC.

During KLE, there are numerous "Rules of Exercise Play" (ROEP), which are contained in this article and must be followed in order to make Kennel Lance echo a successful and safe exercise. There are two categories of exercise participants:

• **Blue Force** — All active duty military personnel are

players in the exercise. Except for civilian law enforcement officers and investigators participating in the exercise, non-military personnel are not players in the exercise unless they agree to participate.

• **Aggressor Force** — Members are usually in civilian attire. Each member carries a valid Military Identification card and a U.S. Navy Security Officer's Badge. NSCT members will produce both identification card and badge to prove identification upon request.

In addition to Blue Force and Aggressor Force, there are two groups of Exercise Support Personnel. They are not players for either side and are not involved in the actual

exercise play. ESP identification is as follows:

• **Contractor Support Group (Civilian)** They will wear yellow arm bands with blue letters stating "NSCT SUPPORT". They will also carry yellow ID cards with "NSCT SUPPORT" printed in blue.

• **Safety Controller Group (Military or Civilian)** — They will wear yellow arm bands with blue letters stating "NSCT SAFETY OBSERVER". They will also carry yellow ID cards with "NSCT SAFETY OBSERVER" printed in blue.

• **Exercise Support Personnel Vehicles** will be marked with a yellow flag with

"NSCT SUPPORT" in blue letters. These vehicles are not to be impeded.

The use of physical force will not be used in this exercise by either side.

Blue forces shall use proper apprehension techniques to search and restrain apprehended Aggressor Force members.

Weapons will not be drawn or pointed at anybody at any time. An order to halt accompanied by a hand placed on a sidearm holster, or by a rifle or shotgun held at port arms, will be sufficient to indicate control in apprehension situations. Blue Force personnel who are captured or become

casualties will not be required to relinquish custody of their weapons.

To ensure safety and to avoid alarming the local populace, pursuit of any kind (vehicular or on foot) is not authorized beyond the perimeter of MCAS Kaneohe Bay. Aggressor Force interaction with Blue Forces will be initiated by an NSCT member proclaiming "Exercise Kennel Lance Echo."

Civilians living near the Air Station have been informed of KLE, and may assist in supporting the security effort by reporting suspicious activity near the station perimeter.

Diapenauries, schools, Marine Corps Exchange, Commissary, child care facilities, and non-DoD facilities are excluded from exercise play.

The authority of and rulings of the Safety Observers regarding any aspect of exercise play is absolute. All weapons and simulated explosives will be considered as lethal by players on both sides. Vehicular speed limits will be adhered to by all players at all times.

Personal possessions, identification, watches, rings and similar items, will not be taken from exercise participants without their permission. Material in their possession that may relate to the exercise (intelligence material) may be confiscated.

Ammunition will not be carried by Aggressor Force intruders. Aggressor Force will not use physical restraining devices. Aggressor force personnel will submit to apprehension when confronted and challenged by a Blue Force armed defender who is clearly in position to take positive control of the situation.

Off-base areas contiguous to base perimeters may be used by Aggressor Force personnel for surveillance and approach to perimeter penetration points. Aggressor Force personnel may use smoke devices and artillery or grenade simulators.

Private vehicles may be used only with prior consent of the owner. Government vehicles may not be stolen or commandeered. Locks may be cut if replaced with Aggressor Force locks. Cut locks and fences will be reported as soon as the operation is completed.

Classified material will not be removed from any space. Cryptological equipment will not be taken from radio operators, tampered with or in any way endangered.

Civilians and dependents will not be abducted or used as hostages without their consent. Other military personnel, plus participating civilian police officers and investigators, may be abducted or used as hostages. Abductees/hostages will not

be harassed. Simulated weapons will not be used by defensive forces.

Except for flag officers, all Blue Force military personnel and participating civilian law enforcement and investigative personnel will submit to apprehension and comply with instructions when confronted by an Aggressor Force opponent who is clearly in position to take positive control of the situation.

Areas exempted from exercise play:

- a. NOSC Marine Mammal facility, Building 3067, off flightline in Kaneohe Bay.
- b. Main NOSC Complex, West Field area.
- c. Child care Center, Building 579.
- d. Menchune Rainbow Preschool, Building 1193.
- e. Naupia Ponds Wildlife Management Area (less beach to high water mark along Kailua Bay).
- f. 1st MEB armories and ordinance storage areas (plus 50 feet outside of fences).
- g. MAG-24 Ordnance Compound, West Field, Building 4081.
- h. Family Housing Areas.
- i. MCX and club activities.

By following these simple Rules of Exercise Play, Kennel Lance Echo can be a successful and safe exercise.

Please be alert for any unusual occurrences at home, your work space or in the barracks. Report all suspicious activities immediately to the Military Police at 257-2123.

In July 1981, LtCol. Simpson was assigned to the Development Center, Firepower division, Quantico, Va. He served as head of the Anti-Air Warfare section and head of the Offensive Air Support section, where he worked on various research

and development projects for aircraft systems.

In 1984, LtCol. Simpson transitioned to the F/A-18 and served as the operations officer and executive officer for VFA-106.

During July 1988, LtCol. Simpson was assigned to MAG-15 in Iwakuni, Japan. Upon consolidation of MAG-15 and MAG-12, LtCol. Simpson served as the assistant operations officer and head of the "current operations" branch. LtCol. Simpson has logged over 3500 hours in fighter/attack aircraft.

LtCol. Simpson was promoted to his present grade June 1986. His personal decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal and Navy Commendation Medal.

Busy summer planned for new Community Center
Dependent Recreation offerings increase

The staff at the Air Station's Dependent Recreation Center have made themselves at home in the new Youth and Community Center (Building 5082), completed in April. A 10-month project, the facility was fully operational May 1 and the staff held its ribbon-cutting ceremony May 6.

Dependent Recreation, an arm of Special Services, makes it their business to find things for Marines and their families to do in their off-time. The new facility made it possible for them to expand these services.

"It's wonderful," said Pam Van Dyke, the center's director. "This is one of the few buildings on Station being used for what it was originally designed for. We're looking forward to this be-

coming a really active community center."

Located just west of Coleman Field, the \$900,000 facility is a single-story, three-wing building with concrete masonry block walls, jalousie windows, and a central concrete slab courtyard.

The building houses a furnished meeting room with audiovisual capabilities, a multi-purpose room equipped with a full kitchen, and three staff offices.

According to Kim Germany, of Dependent Recreation, both the meeting room and the multi-purpose room are open to the Air Station community and may be used for official or unofficial meetings, classes, or parties. Private use of the rooms costs \$25 and requires at least two weeks advance notice. The center plans extensive

use of the rooms this summer when the Red Cross, Armed Services YMCA, and Dependent Rec team to kick off "Summer Blastoff" next week. The teen activities program is sponsored by a youth group within the Red Cross.

The group will use the community center as a home base, and conduct such activities as hikes, trips to the museum, planetarium, ice skating, lessons in sailing, tennis, crafts, water skiing, ping pong and racquetball.

Ongoing activities at Dependent Rec include youth athletics, Jazzercise, After School Kids program, gymnastics, lessons in tennis, swimming, Tae Kwon Do, karate, dance and aerobics.

Escape from Vietnam

A small squad of Viet Cong soldiers patrolled through the village of Nha Trang, searching for South Vietnamese nationals refusing to adhere to communistic reform.

It was nearly sundown. The giant reddish-orange sun rolled behind a grassy Vietnam hillside.

The peaceful landscape exists in sharp contrast with the brutality of those such as the men on the patrol.

A change was imminent, at least for one boy who could no longer accept being oppressed by the "insensitive government."

The year was 1978. LCpl. Bay Van Ho, an administrative clerk at Marine Wing Support Squadron-174, fled his homeland that night for a better life.

LCpl. Ho, who joined the Marine Corps in 1986, vividly remembers the events that led up to his escape.

"That evening, I was told I was going on a three-day fishing trip," said the 21-year-old in a heavy Vietnamese accent. "I had known about the plans some men had made, but I didn't know the exact day or time the escape was to happen. My mother had known about the plans, too, and she pleaded with me to stay whenever that day came."

If LCpl. Ho stayed, he knew that his chances would be slim of ever getting out. If he went, the possibility of never seeing his family would plague him for the rest of his life.

"If I stayed there, I would have given up my freedom,"

he said. My sisters, my brothers, my mom and dad were there; it was very hard for me to leave, but I had to. I just had to get out."

The day finally came. The men who devised the plan had arranged for the fishing boat to be docked farther back from shore. They knew that at the time they were leaving, the water level would be at low tide. "This would prevent the Viet Cong shore patrol from leaving the bay," said LCpl. Ho.

Decked only in short pants and a T-shirt, he made it to the boat and prepared himself for the journey. A few miles out to sea, the fishing boat's engine started. The diesel fuel, mixed with oil, caused large clouds of white smoke to rise from the small boat. This increased the chances of being spotted by the shore patrol.

"If caught, we would have been sent to re-education camps for about a year," he said with a raised brow. "I've seen people get caught before. Going there means hard labor — very hard labor."

Fortunately, LCpl. Ho and his fellow companions weren't sighted.

After about a day at sea, the waves became violent and the days long. "A lot of people became very sick," recalled LCpl. Ho. "I was used to it; I usually went fishing every day."

Luck ran out when the boat ran out of water and fuel.

"We drifted for about two or three days without a drop to drink," said LCpl. Ho. "It got pretty scary for a while, but I just thought about being free. I just had to make it."

The small fishing boat

drifted into a heavily-traveled shipping lane. Three ships passed within rock-throwing distance, but they all refused to stop and give aid to the distraught refugees.

Luckily, on the third day, a ship stopped and gave the boat water and fuel — enough supplies to reach the Philippines. Once in the Philippines, the people were split up. They all had to wait for American citizens to sponsor them to the United States.

Good news came for LCpl.

at the time when he first went to the recruiter's office. The recruiter asked him why he wanted to become a Marine.

"I told him that I thought the Marine Corps was the best service and I would feel very proud to serve in its ranks," he said.

Boot camp proved to be a learning experience for him. He encountered some small problems with his drill instructors. "Everything was so new to me," said LCpl. Ho. "I had to adapt very quickly, and I still had a

"Getting caught meant going to a re-education camp."

Ho when a family from Texas decided to sponsor him and take him in as their son.

"I was so grateful to them for accepting me," he said.

But something was bothering the then 13-year-old boy. He started feeling as though something was missing. He wanted to do something with his life.

After a few short months with his temporary family, LCpl. Ho moved out with two of his South Vietnamese friends.

"I guess I felt comfortable with them, and I could relate to what they were going through," said LCpl. Ho. "One of my friend's parents had been killed in South Vietnam."

Armed with nothing but the desire to succeed, LCpl. Ho and his guardians set off on a journey to Sacramento, Calif. While in Sacramento, he saw a Marine Corps magazine that caught his attention. He was in high school

difficult time speaking English.

But LCpl. Ho graduated from MCRD San Diego, Calif., and was assigned to the Administration school at Camp Delmar, Calif. Upon completion of that school, he received orders to Marine Barracks, Yokosuka Japan. After performing 18 months of service there, he came here to MWSS-174.

"I enjoy being in the Marine Corps," said LCpl. Ho. "But I love being in America — the freedom to do almost anything you want to."

LCpl. Ho has not yet reached his goal of becoming an American citizen, but he is eligible this year.

"I want to become an American citizen so I can make my family proud," he said. I want to some day go and visit my family, but I can't now. If I go back now, I probably wouldn't be allowed to return to the United States."

Standing in the control tower, surrounded by an acre of glass with only the hum of air conditioners cooling a hundred instruments, it's hard to imagine this is one of the first links in close air support.

But, before an airplane gets from a hanger to a battlefield, it has to leave the ground. In the case of military aircraft, the pilot is usually competing with everything from hovering helicopters to slow-moving transports to take off.

Anytime two airplanes are flying through the sky, especially around a congested air field, the potential for a collision is present.

Providing for the smooth, orderly and expeditious flow of traffic around an airfield is a 24-hour-a-day business.

the selection process, an elite breed.

"For a half-park figure, I would say out of 50 Marines who leave boot-camp to go to controllers school, maybe 15 are going to actually wind up with their qualifications," said MSgt. James Cook, non-commissioned officer-in-charge of the Marine Corps Air Station Kaneohe Bay Air Traffic Control Facility.

"A controller must have an instinctive ability to gather, process and assimilate information coming in from several different sources. He must then make a decision that is going to affect the safety of everyone out there flying. All of these are mental calculations that must be done in seconds," said MSgt. Cook.

When a Marine checks in from controllers school all he has is a basic MOS, and basic understanding of how to create highways in the sky for pilots to fly. It can take anywhere from three months to a year-and-a-half for him to become a fully "checked-out" air traffic controller. In addition, every time a Marine transfers from one Air Station to another, he has to go through a complete new series of checks to get qualified at the new airfield.

The controllers job begins by coordinating all of the traffic on the ground of the airfield, which is handled by ground control. The runways and taxiways are an inter-connecting system of roads used to get planes to and from places they need to go. They are used to get planes to maintenance areas, fuel farms and to and from hangers.

At this Air Station, where there is constant and varied helicopter traffic, most of these "roads" are also areas where helicopters take off and land. To make sure a helicopter coming back from a re-supply mission to another island doesn't cross paths with an F/A-18 heading to the runway, the ground controllers must constantly scan the airfield.

"Military airfields have a unique situation where it isn't uncommon to have aircraft operating at speeds of up to 288 mph," said MSgt. Cook. "That means they are covering a lot of ground real fast. You can't have a helicopter crossing the runway when an F/A-18 is coming in. You can't have a fuel truck running around out on the flightline without control."

Once an aircraft has crossed the airfield and is ready to take-off, the pilot is switched to local control. These Marines rely on a myriad of information to get pilots in and out of the area around the airfield. They depend on weather instruments to tell them wind direction and speed, information from radar telling them what kind of traffic is in the

outlying areas and specific information about the capabilities of planes and runways.

Local control is responsible for all of the air space around the Air Station. Their control area extends in a five mile radius around the tower and up to 3,000 feet above sea level, with added arrival and departure ways extending out from the runways.

"When a pilot is coming in he gives us a call, and we keep track of all the traffic in the area," said Sgt. Simeon Beatty, of the Air Traffic Control Facility, as he directed a flight of CH-46 helicopters down the runway and prepared for a formation of four F/A-18 to come in. "This is a great job. There's always something going on and it's never the same two days in a row."

While local control relies on visual scanning of the air space to direct traffic into

and around the air station, there are times when weather precludes visual flight. The use of radar is then required to guide airplanes.


"Our radars emit a signal to the plane, which has equipment that answers back telling the altitude and position of the plane," said Cpl. Charles Smith, Air Traffic Control Facility as he scanned a radar covering the Kaneohe area. "We can direct pilots through bad weather and tell them exactly where they are."

When all of these elements are put together, the flow of air traffic in and around the Air Station is controlled. Every airplane or helicopter is directed to a "highway" of its own.

"Air traffic controllers have to be 100 percent at all times," said MSgt. Cook. "There is no room for mistakes, lives depend on what we do."



Servicemembers facing disability retirements should be aware of some significant changes to the Disability Evaluation Manual of 1987.

With the goal of streamlining the Disability Evaluation System (DES), the Secretary of the Navy issued AINav 120/88 which modified the Disability Manual. For cases received by the Physical Evaluation Board (PEB) beginning Nov. 1, 1988, the new system provides a single disability determination with a single, non-automatic opportunity for review for servicemembers found unfit for duty.

Both the servicemembers and the naval service should benefit from the new system, which arrives at a fair conclusion faster.

The most common cases falling within the scope of the DES involve knee injuries, back injuries, and acquired respiratory diseases. When a servicemember suspects that he might have a disability, a medical examination should be requested. The examining physician will then determine whether a medical disability exists. If a medical disability is suspected, the servicemember will usually be sent to a specialist for reexamination. If a disability is found, the physician will then prepare the disability package and send his recommendation to the PEB.

Due to the lack of physicians in comparison to the number of servicemembers, the time span between seek-

ing medical attention and the PEB receiving the package can take as long as one year. Servicemembers must remember that administrative discharges have priority over medical boards. Therefore, if the servicemember is involved in misconduct while awaiting a medical discharge, he could lose all of his disability benefits by receiving an other than honorable discharge.

The Physical Evaluation Board

AINav 120/88 established a Physical Evaluation Board which acts on behalf of the Secretary of the Navy and performs all the duties previously performed by the Central Physical Evaluation Board and the three Regional Physical Evaluation Boards. The old lengthy rebuttal and review process is now nearly eliminated.

The PEB makes findings of fitness for duty, degree of disability, entitlement to disability pay, and the combat-relatedness of any disability found. The PEB's decisions are final upon a finding of fit for duty or upon waiver of the right to a hearing by the servicemember in cases of a finding of unfit for duty. A petition for relief from final action must be determined by the president of PEB. The servicemember has four options based on the initial determination of the PEB.

Option 1: The servicemember can agree with the findings of fit for duty. In this case, since there is no right to a hearing, the servicemember is returned to duty.

Option 2: The servicemember can disagree with the finding of fit for duty and request reconsideration. The servicemember must then

provide additional information for reconsideration. The servicemember must also state whether or not a hearing is desired if the finding of fit for duty is unchanged. If the finding of fit for duty is confirmed, there is no right to a hearing, and the servicemember is returned to duty. However, the PEB is authorized to grant a hearing when found necessary to preclude an error or injustice.

Option 3: The servicemember can agree with the finding of unfit for duty and waive the right to full and fair hearing. In this case, the PEB findings are final.

Option 4: The servicemember can disagree with the finding of unfit for duty and exercise the right to a full and fair hearing with lawyer counsel. The PEB will conduct the hearing, and if the member disagrees with the board's final determination, he may request reconsideration from the judge advocate general of the Navy.

The PEB will transmit its preliminary findings to the servicemember by certified mail or hand delivery. The servicemember must exercise his options within 15 days of notification of the PEB findings. This procedure establishes the legal presumption of acceptance if the member does not respond within 15 days.

Final determinations in each case will be transmitted by certified mail or hand delivery directly to the serv-

icemember. As a general rule, the effective date of retirement or separation for physical disability is within 20 days of the date that the servicemember receives the final PEB decision. In cases of severe hardship or infeasibility, the time frame can be extended.

Review of PEB decisions

AINav 120/88 also implements a change in the legal review process of DES cases. Previously, JAG reviewed all DES cases for legal sufficiency. Now, JAG generally reviews DES cases involving the retirement of an officer, cases involving findings of misconduct in which the member has requested a full and fair hearing, cases involving mental impairment, cases in which the servicemember has petitioned for relief from final action, and cases concerning inactive-duty reservists.

JAG Manual investigations

Commanding officers must insist that necessary line of duty/misconduct JAG Manual investigations provide accurate information on accidents and injuries. The PEB is controlled by regulations contained in the Disability Evaluation Manual for technical guidance in making its findings. JAG Manual investigations and injury reports are reviewed to determine the circumstances surrounding an incident.

The importance of having accurate and complete JAG Manual investigations and

injury reports cannot be overstated. If the PEB determines that the disability was not received in the line of duty, the servicemember is not covered by the Disability Evaluation System, and will receive no disability benefits.

The president of the PEB may defer acceptance of a case into the DES until the command responsible for the servicemember supplies the necessary information regarding medical records or a line of duty investigation. Therefore, a copy of any line of duty/misconduct determination made on a servicemember should be included within the servicemember's medical record. This procedure eliminates a delay if the servicemember ever changed duty stations after such an investigation had been conducted.

Disability benefits

The disability benefits a servicemember receives upon separation are determined on a case by case basis. The PEB makes this determination considering such factors as grade, time in service and the seriousness of the disability.

For servicemembers on active duty before Sept. 24,

1975, all disability benefits are tax-exempt. For servicemembers entering active duty after that date, only disability benefits arising from "combat-related" injuries are tax-exempt. "Combat-related" is defined as a personal injury or sickness incurred as a direct result of armed conflict, while engaged in extra-hazardous service, or under conditions simulating war, or which was caused by any instrumentality of war.

After separation

After being separated from the service due to a medical disability, servicemembers should immediately visit the nearest Veterans Administration hospital to their home of record. The examining physician should then be provided with a copy of the servicemember's medical record in order for a review to be made of what disabilities occurred while on active duty. This physician may determine that the disability was greater than originally recorded, and request that the servicemember receive greater benefits.

Medically Speaking

You're not a drug abuser. But when you found out that you are in a testing-designated position, you definitely became nervous.

Terror is an accurate word to describe your feelings when you were told to go to the lavatory for your drug test. After all, you've read the stories about people whose careers were ruined by a false positive on a drug test. You've heard that if you take prescription drugs or over-the-counter allergy pills or even if you eat poppyseed bagels, you'll test as positive as a hardened addict.

Calm down. According to Navy Cmdr. John Irving, "If you are not abusing illegal drugs, you have no reason to fear the tests." He is acting chief of the Drug Testing Section, Office of Workplace Initiatives at the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

The Department of Defense

uses only military and certified civilian drug-testing labs. To ensure accuracy, DoD regularly sends special coded "dummy" specimens, it loses its certification.

DoD drug screening involves a two-step process. The first is a screening test, where specimens are analyzed to indicate the presence of drugs. Specimens that test positive in the screening phase are retested to confirm beyond doubt that the urine does contain the drug in question. The second test involves a procedure called gas chromatography/mass spectrometry. Using it, the possibility of obtaining false positives is virtually eliminated. If fact, the results of urine tests using these procedures have been accepted

and sustained in the federal courts.

Job applicants and a percentage of DoD civilian employees in testing-designated positions are being

screened for THC (the active ingredient in marijuana), cocaine, PCP, opiates and amphetamines. Unless an individual agency wants to do so, there will be no test for barbiturates.

Irving said that certain over-the-counter drugs could produce a false positive in the initial screening. These drugs include some antihistamines and Vicks-brand inhalers. However, recent improvements in the screening test have reduced the likelihood of this happening, and the

more accurate second test, the gas chromatography/mass spectrometry, usually eliminates the problem.

However, as a safeguard, the medical review officer will talk to individuals who test positive before their agency is notified of the results. During the interview, the individual can demonstrate that the positive finding is due to a valid prescription or an over-the-counter drug. If so, the result is sent back to the agency as negative.




