

Mail process speeding up Mail myths, rumors rampant

Some people are anying that all mult to Saudi Arahia is being consored by the U.S. military's Arah hosts; others say that isimpossible because nothing is getting there in the first place. Both accounts are wrong.

There are many rumors floating around the Air Station about muil to Saudi Arabia. Kaneohe Bay is not alone with this problem. Rumors are rampant at many military bases across the United States.

To dispel some of these rumors the Commandant of the Marine Corps published a recent message containing the facts.

the facts. Saudi customs officials are not censoring U.S. mail. However, there are restric-tions on what is allowed to enter the country, and cus-toms and postal officials do randomly check parcels to ensure that these restrictions are being honored. Most of these are similar to restric-tions by U.S. customs. For ipstence. Saudi regulations prohibit the entry of alco-holic beverages of any kind, narcotics, weapons and explosives, and pornography. This is the same as U.S. postal regulations, although

Marines, sailors continue to

aid Liberian refugees

aid Liberian refugees Marines and sailors aboard Marine Corps helicopters carried more than a ton of emergency medical supplies from the U.S. Embassy in Freetown, Sierra Leone to the U.S. Embassy in Monrovia, Liberia Sept. 26 to help reopen a field hospital in the city. At last report, Sept. 27, the ceuse fire among the four armies in Monrovia had held for the fifth day, although news media reports said sporadic gunfire could be heard. In a Pentagon news brief Sept. 27, DoD spokesman Pete Williams said U.S. Marines continue to provide security to the embassy here, while the samphibious ships USS Whidbey Island and USS Barn-table County maintain a watch off the Liberian coast. U.S. Marines and sailors have so far assisted in the evacuation of 2,100 people, including more than 200 U.S. citizens, from the civil-war ravaged capital.

There are rumors that a picture of n women dressed according to accepted Ameri-can customs would be con-sidered pornogruphy, and that all women in photos must be completely covered. This is not true. Photos which would be considered good take in America are acceptable for mail to Saudi Arabia.

Arabia. As for restrictions on relig-tous materials, the U.S. government is checking into news reports of individual bibles being returned to their senders. Thus far, these reports have not been con-firmed. As best the admini-stration can determine, any incidents of bibles being returned are isolated cases of misinterpretations of regula-tions by postal officials in the United States. These misinterpretations are being retified. The linison person-nel working with Saudi postal and-outstant authorities have seen no matances of such items being rejected after arrival in the Middle East. While Saudi regulations

their religion, they are ac-cepting small quantities of religious materials intended for individual servicemen's use. Sending large quanti-ties of religious materials are strongly discouraged, how-ever, as this could be miscon-strued by the Saudis us an attempt to convert the Saudi public.

Additionally, greeting cards depicting religious holidays are not being prohibited as some reports and rumors have suggested.

In fact, letter mail is not heing censored unless it appears unusually hully, in which case it may be exam-ined to see if it contains contrahand, such us drugs. A small proportion of parcel unail is being examined on a spot check basis to determine conformity with Saudi cus-toms regulations. Liaison personnel from the U.S. military postal service are working side by side with Saudi inspectors and are closely tracking the inspec-tion process. They report that they are aware of no in-stances of censorship or interference with mail for U.S. troops.

Using good judgement and paying attention to Saudi postal regulations can reduce the problems of slow mail.

During a Community Infor-mation Day held Sunday, IstSgt. George M. Hohnberger, who recently returned from Saudi Arabia told family members present that the mail process was moving slowly in the first couple weeks hecause there were so many units over there and most weren't settled in yet. vet

yet. He explained however, that this problem no longer exists now that the various units are in place. He said that each unit has a mail clerk that makes mail runs back and forth between the camp and the post office at least once a day.

"We get huge amounts mail every day," sa Hohnberger.

Another rumor was that mail with stamps depicting the U.S. flag was not being allowed into the country. This again is incorrect. All pestage stamps are valid.

There are also concerns that servicemen are not being allowed to practice their relig-ions. The Department of Defense reports that those who choose to do so are able to worship according to their bellefs. This right is exer-cised with sensitivity for the beliefs and feelings of the Saudis.

By Cpl. Sieve Netson SAUDI ARABIA, — When U.S. forces arrived in Saudi Arubia in support of Opera-tion Desert Shield it was obvious the American and Arabian cultures didn't have much in common. Although the United States and the host nation both have the same objective — thwarting I-raqi aggression into Saudi territory — there still may be some miscommunication between the two in thefr efforts to successfully carry out the mission.

One way the Marine Corps is breaking that barrier is by employing its 3d Civil Affairs Group of the 4th Marine Division. The reserve group is headquartered in down-town Los Angeles and ar. town Los Angeles and arrived here Aug. 22.

"What we're doing here is coordinating our activities with the local government in such matters as civil defense, public safety, and displaced civilians," Kaheny said.
