3d Marines' colors to pass to new leader

Col. Wayne E. Rollings will take command of the 3d Marine Regiment from Col. John Admire today.

Rollings, a recipient of the Navy Cross and two Silver Stars, will accept the colors from Admire, who will also be frocked to brigadier general during the 3 p.m. ceremony on the Air Station's Platt Field. Admire will report later to Headquarters Marine Corps.

A 31-year veteran, Rollings completed his first tour of duty as an enlisted reconnaissance Marine. In 1963, he returned to Parris Island, S.C. and served as a drill instructor for 26 months. In 1965 he was released from active duty and entered the Marine Corps Reserve while attending the University of Georgia. He graduated in June 1968 with a bachelor's degree in history and was commissioned.

After The Basic School, Rollings served as a platoon commander in Vietnam for 1st Force Reconnaissance Company. Fourteen months later, he rotated to Kaneohe Bay to serve as a company commander with 1st Battalion, 3d Marines.

Rollings returned to Vietnam in 1972, where he served as a battalion adviser with a South Vietnamese marine division. He later completed Amphibious Warfare School and was a staff platoon commander at the Basic School.

In 1974, Rollings was reassigned to the Middle East, where he served as a United Nations observer. In 1975, he became a company commander and later a battalion operations officer with the 2nd Marine Division.

In 1977, Rollings took command of 2nd Force Reconnaissance Company. Later, after attending Armed Forces Staff College and a tour as an officer-instructor at the University of South Carolina, he returned as a lieutenant colonel to The Basic School where he served as commanding officer of Headquarters and Service Battalion.

Rollings later returned to the 2nd Marine Division where he served as operations officer until June 1986, after which he commanded 3d Bn., 4th Marines, until May 1988. Selected for

colonel in 1988, Rollings was reassigned to the Joint Staff, The Pentagon, where he has been chief of the Strategy Branch (J-5) for the past three years.

Rollings' personal decorations include the Navy Cross, two Silver Stars, the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Bronze Star with Combat "V," two Purple Hearts, and the Navy Commendation Medal.

In April 1981, Rollings set a world record by performing 40,000 consecutive sit-ups in 16 hours.

Admire, a 26-year veteran of two wars and holder of three master's degrees, came to Kaneohe in 1989 and served as assistant chief of staff (G-3) of the 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade. He took command of 3d Marines (Reinforced) in June 1990, and mounted out for Saudi Arabia two months later.

Under Admire's command, the regiment was assigned to the 1st Marine Division and commanded with elements of all three Marine divisions to serve as a key defender of Saudi coastal facilities. "Task Force Taro," which the regiment was designated, was later joined by the Marines of 2nd Bn., 3d Marines, who had come from their Okinawa deployment.

Shortly before the four-day allied attack on occupied Kuwait, Task Force Taro was reunited with its artillery element, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines - which

had been assigned to 11th Marines in support of various Marine and Arab regiments along the Kuwaiti border.

Taro served as one of the 1st Marine Division's infiltrating forces, which preceded the main assault mostly on foot, guarding the main force's flanks as they attacked and taking many prisoners. 1/12 fired missions in support of various operations in the area.

Elements of the task force, including 1/12 and Co. A, 1st Reconnaissance Bn., also made enemy contact in support of allied-Arab operations in and around the Saudi border city of Khafji weeks before the main allied attack.

Admire also served two tours of duty in Vietnam - one with 3d Marines and a second as an adviser for the Vietnamese Marine Corps.

Other highlights of Admire's career include a tour as a senior White House military social aide to President Carter, and commanding officer of the 2nd and 3d Reconnaissance Battalions.

He also participated in planning for the 1986 retaliatory air strikes against Libya, and was commander of Contingency MAGTF 3-88 during its deployment to the Persian Gulf (1988-1989).

Admire's personal decorations include the Legion of Merit, two Bronze Stars, the Purple Heart, and two Defense Meritorious Service Medals.

BSSG-1 proves MPS doctrine to rest of world

Editor's note: Col. Ernest Beinhardt will relinquish his command of Brigade Service Support Group-1 in a ceremony June 26. Beinhardt describes BSSG-1's experiences in southwest Asia in the following story.

They had just finished perfecting their off-loading capabilities during Exercise Freedom Banner-90 at Indian Island, Wash. Then, just a few days later at the port of Jubail, Saudi Arabia, Brigade Service Support Group-1 was proving it to the rest of the world.

To the 1,200 Marines and sailors of BSSG-1, getting equipment off the Maritime Pre-positioning Ships and into the hands of Marine units as quickly as possible was their primary mission. But the fact that BSSG-1 would be disbanded and scattered throughout the theater of operation soon after did not affect the unit's ability to handle the enormous off-loading task.

Like floating warehouses, the four monstrous cargo-carrying MPS-3 ships - Motor Vessels 1st Lt. Jack Lummus, Sgt. William Button, 1st Lt. Baldomero Lopez, and PFC Dewayne Williams, pulled into port. And like clock work, the ships' hulls were emptied.

According to Col. Ernest Beinhardt, BSSG-1 commanding officer, the ships carried enough equipment for a brigade of more than 16,000 Marines. Once off-loaded onto the dock and staged, accountability and organization of gear became crucial, Beinhardt said.

"Knowing where and how to find one container out of literally thousands took organization," Beinhardt said. He added that within that container could be a key spare part for a downed assault amphibious vehicle.

Carefully balancing the speed of the off-load with accounting procedures became a crucial part of the operation, according to Beinhardt. He attributed the success of BSSG-1's rapid and controlled

off-load to a bar-code scanning procedure and well-trained, well-disciplined personnel.

"In the rush to get the gear off rapidly, there was a real danger that accountability of equipment could be lost," he explained.

After BSSG-1's initial mission was completed Sept. 4, the unit ceased its colors at the port of Jubail and "ceased to exist."

Its Marines were then reassigned to various detachments and battalions within the growing 1st Force Service Support Group, whose headquarters came from Camp Pendleton, Calif. From there, they were dispatched throughout the theater in support of the I Marine Expeditionary Force.

"We were spread to the winds, figuratively speaking," said Beinhardt, adding that they were spread from Bahrain up to the Kuwaiti border, and later into Kuwait.

Every element of BSSG-1's nucleus now faced new

Marksmanship, PFT requalification waived for Shield, Storm veterans

'Flying Tigers' let loose ... finally

A jumbo jet carrying hundreds of tigers from the Philippine jungles taxied onto the Air Station's tarmac near Hangar 105 June 4.

After more than 10 months of deployment, 213 "Flying Tigers" from Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-262 were finally let loose.

A few hundred feet away, at Hangar 102, anxious families and friends waited for their loved ones.

Welcome-home banners were raised a bit higher and the "I love you" balloons were clutched a little tighter as the first bus-load of Marines and sailors rounded the corner. Tears began to flow from many of the wives' faces.

"No, it wasn't forever, sweetheart," one Marine said to his daughter, picking her up. "It just seemed that way."

The Flying Tigers left home Aug. 3, one day after Iraq invaded Kuwait. Instead of tales of burning Kuwaiti oil fields or blinding sand storms, these Marines spoke of earthquakes, monsoons and life-saving rescue missions deep in the heart of Philippine jungles.

The squadron's first stop was at Okinawa, but its stay there was short-lived. After

three weeks, the Flying Tigers were relocated to Naval Air Station Cubi Point.

As part of the Unit Deployment Program, the Flying Tigers sharpened their skills by relocating 10 CH-46E and four CH-53D helicopters from MCAS Futenma, Okinawa, to Cubi Point, Philippines.

Once reaching the Philippines, the Flying Tigers were tasked with providing support for Marine Air-Ground Task Force 4-90. "We acted in a contingency capacity due to unrest in the country," said Lt. Col. Fred Geier, commanding officer of HMM-262. Geier added that if a crisis had taken place, the squadron's 12 CH-46s and four CH-53s "would have been used to reinforce the Marines from 2d Battalion, 9th Marines, and 1st Battalion, 24th Marines." The 24th Marines are a reserve battalion out of Detroit, who were already in-country.

According to Geier, the Marines were also instrumental in providing transportation for the U.S. Base Negotiating Team from the United States Embassy in Manila.

After days in-country, the squadron was called to assist in a rescue operation.

"We arrived in the Philip-

ines on the tail end of an earthquake and a monsoon," said Geier. He added that most of the area around Baguio and the Cordillera Mountains had been hit "pretty hard."

He said that the area had been so hit so hard that paths, roads and even bridges were either submerged several feet under water or destroyed altogether. The local Filipinos were cut off from the rest of the world.

Once the call came in, the Flying Tigers dispatched helicopters laden with rice, medical supplies and survival items to the disaster-stricken area. Victims needing transportation down the mountain were flown back. Grateful for the Marines' support, Filipinos left bushels of fruit and vegetables for the pilots and crews.

In as little as three weeks, the Flying Tigers had aided 14 villages and transported more than 55,000 pounds of cargo.

"I felt good about being able to help the people out like that," said Cpl. Brad Wollin, crew chief. "I remember seeing the look of relief on their faces when we came in."

Another highlight for the squadron was when it sur-

passed the 11,000 accident-free flying-hour mark while in the Philippines. And although they were in a contingency mode, the Flying Tigers used the 24-hour airfield and the ground Marines there for crucial "warrior" training.

Geier said the Marines went on routine force marches, jungle environment training, Special Patrol Insertion and Extraction training operations and other training.

"When we deployed from Kaneohe Bay, we had a combat readiness percentage of 79 percent," said Geier. "Our training and efficiency increased so dramatically, we came home with a 94 CRP. So we are more ready to deploy now if need be."

Now home, Geier admits to having mixed emotions about not going to the Gulf region.

According to Geier, the squadron's orders were to remain in the Western Pacific region to provide contingency support for the III Marine Expeditionary Force.

"Of course, like any other Marine, we wanted to go where the action was," he explained. "But when everything broke out in Southwest Asia, we had one of the highest levels of readiness on the Air Station; we were ready to go."

DATE RAPE

Not listening to 'no' can be criminal

A Marine is out on a date with a woman. First, he takes her to dinner. Next stop is a nice club; they have a few drinks.

When they leave the club, they head back to his room in the barracks. Things are going well, or so he thinks. He makes a couple of moves. She is receptive.

As they approach the moment of truth, she says, "Stop!" He backs off. He wonders if she meant it. He moves in again and she says "no" again. But he thinks she really means yes. He can tell she wants it too.

So he goes for it. She continues to resist and tell him "no," but he overcomes her with his charms (and his arms).

This scenario, or some variation of it, was frighteningly common in the past. Only in the last few years has the criminal aspect of it had earned public condemnation.

Now "date rape" is the crime of the '90s. The national news weeklies have responded to the outrage of women's groups and given it front page coverage.

American society is making it clear that this insidious form of sexual assault will no longer be tolerated. It will not be tolerated because it is a crime.

There are essentially two offenses under the Uniform Code of Military Justice involving lack of consent to sexual advances that can be committed in a date rape situation: rape and indecent assault.

The maximum punishment for rape is death and the maximum punishment for indecent assault is five years confinement and a dishonorable discharge. Even leaving aside the death penalty, a Marine convicted of rape is looking at up to a life

sentence in jail and a bad discharge.

Under the UCMJ, rape is defined as sexual intercourse with a female (other than the wife of the accused) by force and without the consent of the victim. Most cases of date rape focus on the issue of consent.

The law looks to see whether the woman made it known that she did not consent to sexual intercourse. She is not required to resist if resistance would be futile, if she is threatened with death or serious harm, or if she lacks physical or mental capacity. The law considers all the circumstances but a simple "no" or "stop" is an indication there is no consent.

Thus, although a woman is well advised to make her lack of consent clear, a man should stop at any sign of reluctance on the part of the woman. "I know she wanted it" is at best, a flimsy defense to a rape charge. Similarly, the drunkenness of either party is not a defense. The risks are far greater for both the man and woman when alcohol is involved.

The UCMJ defines indecent assault as an assault against a person who is not the spouse of the accused, committed with intent to gratify the lust or sexual desires of the accused. The conduct must also be prejudicial to the good order and discipline of the armed forces or service discrediting. However, it is difficult to think of a situation in which indecent assault would not meet both those criteria.

An indecent assault, as any other assault, must include "bodily harm" but that term includes any offensive touching, however slight. Certainly, non-consensual sex does not have to go as far as intercourse to be criminal. Any touch-

ing after a woman has said "no" can amount to an indecent assault. As with rape, the issue is consent and if there is no consent a crime is committed.

So, our Marine wakes up the morning after his date with more problems than a possible hangover and pangs of conscience. He has committed a serious crime under the UCMJ. No matter how good of a Marine he might have been in the past, he has now become the ugliest form of criminal - a rapist.

His career and life are now in jeopardy. If the incident seemed innocuous to the Marine, he is criminally wrong. Rape and indecent assault are repugnant crimes under any circumstances and will not be tolerated.

The message is clear for all Marines. Women Marines, as well as other women should avoid placing themselves in situations where their intentions might be misread or where they are helpless, should their refusals be ignored. Even if the rapist is convicted, the rape cannot be erased.

Male Marines must respect the decisions of all women. No means no. By pushing, the man runs a far greater risk than a slap in the face or a slap on the wrist.

Male Marines should also avoid any situation where an allegation of date rape (or any other sexual assault) might arise.

The opposite sex visitation rules for the barracks are clearly stated. Violators can be prosecuted for orders violations and can receive up to six months confinement and a bad conduct discharge at a court martial. The visitation rules will be strictly enforced.

Do not put yourself at risk. Being raped or being accused of a rape is a nightmare that will ruin your life.

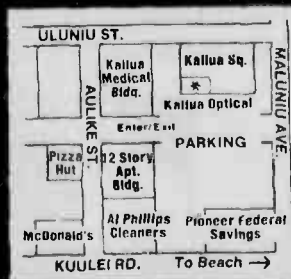

BSSG-1 puts Maritime Pre-positioning Ships doctrine to use

BSSG-1/from A-1 challenges of re-integrating with other Marine elements. Its Motor Transport Company was assigned to a motor transport detachment that later evolved into a battalion.

According to Beinhart, the Marines drove hundreds of miles across the desert to deliver the heavy rolling stock to front-line units.

The supply personnel were faced with challenges from the moment BSSG-1 arrived in-country. Those challenges escalated throughout the campaign. All the general supply — such as ammunition, clothing, spare parts, and other essential items — was received, staged and controlled by the supply element.

The maintenance company of BSSG-1, which later integrated into a maintenance detachment and finally a maintenance battalion, operated under strenuous workloads and a harsh environment, Beinhart said. He added that the maintenance company was instrumental in putting reactive armor onto M60 tanks.

The colonel said that all the support elements of BSSG-1, including Landing Support Company, Headquarters and Service Company, and the medical and dental companies, played integral parts in Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

"Our medical company established a field hospital which treated more friendly

casualties than any other medical facility in the theater," Beinhart said. He also said that the dental personnel worked both in a dental and medical capacity.

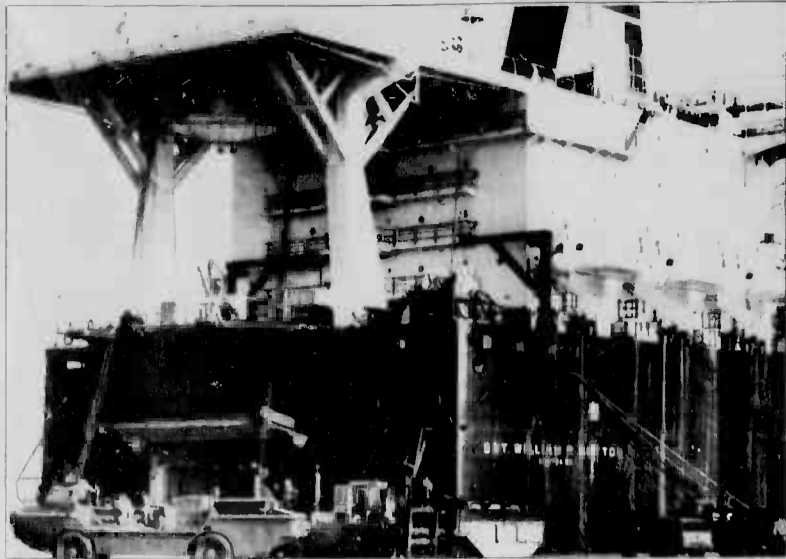
At the onset of the ground war, Beinhart added, the hospital was expecting a large amount of casualties, and in anticipation, dental corpsmen took on the roles of medical technicians.

Other BSSG elements that deployed to the Gulf region were a military police detachment, lawyers, a postal platoon, data processing personnel, EOD personnel and a communication platoon.

In the initial stage of the campaign, Beinhart said that BSSG-1 contributed about 30 percent of the combat service support personnel and off-loaded about 50 percent of the total MPF equipment used by Marine forces in Saudi Arabia.

"From early September to the end of the war, our Marines and sailors played an integral part as members of larger units," said Beinhart. They helped to strengthen the units they were a part of. "They were all good team players."

After BSSG-1 returned from the gulf in April, a formal ceremony was held to re-

dedicate the unit's colors and officially mark the unit's renewed "existence." It marked the first unsealing of their colors in seven and a half months.

"I couldn't be more proud of BSSG-1," said Beinhart. "We had trained hard and it

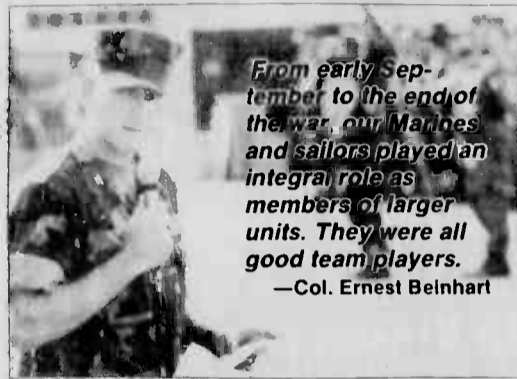
showed when we went to war."

In upcoming weeks, BSSG-1 will remain busy repairing and maintaining the Brigade's MPF equipment for future operations.

BSSG-1 Marines and sailors

have recently been volunteering their time and Marine Corps knowledge to support the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Marine School Visitation Program.

They have visited more than 40 Hawaii schools in the last few weeks.

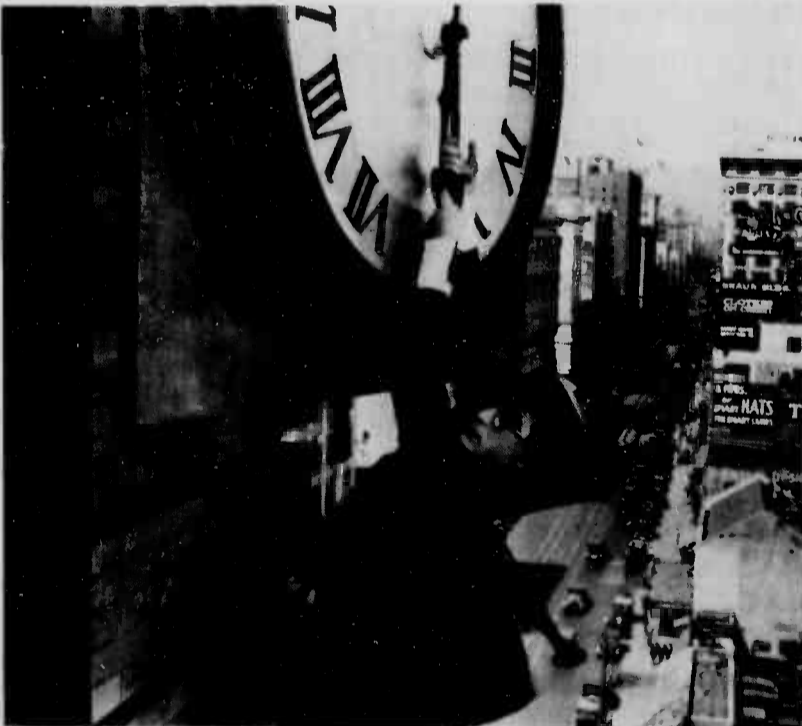

K-Bay's K-9 cops dominate competition

Four Marines and their canines dominated the 5th Annual Police Dog Competition here May 31 and June 1.

Between the four, Kaneohe Bay and Camp Smith claimed 11 of 18 possible first through third place individual awards and Kaneohe's kennels were named the best of the bunch. This was from a field of 47 competitors representing eight different kennels, including teams from all branches of the service and the Honolulu, Kauai and Hawaii Police Departments.

Before the competition, several of the K-Bay dog handlers said they weren't optimistic about the Marines' chances this year. Although Marines have dominated all four of the previous competitions, this year's team had been stricken by the death early last week of 8-year-old Cay, a German shepherd who'd been Top Dog in 1989 and was one of the most experienced of Kaneohe's dogs. Needless to say, Cay's death was felt more on a personal level by the Marines than from its effect on the

team's chances in the competition.

No one felt that loss more than Cay's handler and friend, LCpl. Jason Alvarado, who said he was having a rough time with the sudden tragedy.

Later in the week, Duco, last year's Top Dog, suffered a sprain that pulled the Belgian Malinois out of the competition as well.

Despite the setbacks, the Marines dominated the two-day event. In fact, first, second and third places for Top Dog all went to Marines.

K-Bay's Sgt. Louis Villalba and Ondo took the top honors. The 8-year-old German shepherd also brought home first place honors in drug detection, as well as a second place in obedience.

LCpl. James Stringer and 6-year-old Belgian Malinois Rob, also from K-Bay, took second place for Top Dog and landed first place in obedience and third place in aggression.

Camp Smith's only team, Cpl. David Schleich and 8-year-old Malinois Nero, took third in Top Dog. They placed in explosives, scouting and obedience, as well, taking first, second and third places, respectively.

LCpl. Ron Lewis and 4-year old shepherd Aika took second place in aggression.

Hickam Air Force Base, with a first and second and two third places, barely edged out the Honolulu Police Department with trophies. HPD took a first, second and only one third. None of the other teams placed.

Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

Help is here for those 'getting out'

See them at 'pre-seps' brief Monday

Another Arab war seemed only a passing interest to a corporate vice president in his Manhattan high-rise last summer.

It didn't seem like the end of the world to a horse rancher in Oregon, a medical student in South Carolina, or a foreman at a manufacturing plant in Texas, either.

But when President Bush said America was getting ready to help fight the most recent Arab war, these four men, who used to be Marines, were reminded of where the "Individual Ready Reserve" got its name.

Military life today is already quite different than it was just a year ago. Mostly, it's better. But still, many people are getting out. For them, as well as for those who are staying in, the war represented a stone thrown into the placid pond that was military life, and the ripples it created are still causing change.

That stone-throw marked a dramatic change in the lives of many people, of them these four Marine reservists and the two civilians they work with. That stone-throw was the rebirth of this country's resolve to take better care of its veterans.

The four "former" Marines have recently been embarked on a rigorous tour of duty here that has been a study in irony. They had done their time and gotten out; one of them even retired a few years ago. They left their phone numbers with the reserves, then put their uniforms in a box somewhere and joined the private sector.

Then they were called to duty to help in casualty assistance and funeral details in support of Operation Desert Storm. But instead, they have found themselves back in uniform helping other Marines do what they had already done before: make the transition back into civilian life.

They have been directly affected by history, and history has shown that some good can come out of wars. The Congress of the United States, itself largely made of

veterans, recently took steps to make sure that some good comes out of this war as well.

In effect, the legislators resolved that Gulf War-era veterans will have an easier and more rewarding transition back into civilian life than any other veterans before them. Public Laws 101-510 and 101-189 have been a long time coming. They establish that from now on, no one will honorably leave the service without a break, or without at least knowing what will come next.

Meanwhile, back at the ranch - and for that matter back at the high-rise, the lab, and the assembly line - the four reservists went home and broke out their uniforms sometime in early January. To them and many others, this meant that America was definitely going to war.

What the four men didn't know was that the battle they would join would be to right the wrongs that the law had previously failed to protect veterans from.

And while the success of the war in the Gulf was obvious, these Marines are now working long hours right here aboard the Air Station at the Family Service Center to help score a victory in this second battle.

If you are one of the members of the Hawaii Marine community who have given the best years of their lives to the service and are now leaving, you should get to know these people.

If you are a Marine or sailor and you are getting out soon, you will be required to see them.

They are a special task force whose first mission here is to help the Hawaii Marines, sailors and their dependents who were held on active duty during the war and are now being released on notice.

They are: Maj. Brian Goodson (the medical student), officer-in-charge of the Marines of the Transition Assistance Management Program here; Capt. Robert P. Doyle (vice president of data administration at Citicorp), project officer and counselor; GySgt. Keith F. Neill (the horse rancher), noncommissioned officer-in-charge and counselor; and Sgt. Robert Critcher (a manufacturing foreman), relocation NCO and counselor.

The Marines of the TAMP are currently helping to get the program off the ground. They are here on a temporary basis, however, and Neill already left recently. There are plans to hire civilians to take their place after they leave.

The program's civilian staffers are: Linda Keller, TAMP manager and director of the FSC's Employment Resource Center, and Murray Cole, a volunteer Employment Resources counselor and retired Air Force officer.

The TAMP staff has been trained by the Department of Labor, Headquarters Marine Corps, private business and extensive on-the-job training. Its most visible function here is the pre-separation briefing, which is required for all Marines and sailors who are getting out and is encouraged for spouses. The staff also gives on-going classes and provides individual counseling. The next pre-separation briefing starts Monday. The program has been fortified as a result of the recent Congressional mandates and is now four-days-long instead of two. It includes information on how to set up a TMO move; how to write a resume and eventually land a job; how to get unemployment benefits after separation; veterans' benefits and how to deal with the Veterans Administration; how to get into the Civil Service; how to get into the Marine Corps Reserve and its benefits; and how to deal with the stress of a new lifestyle and financial situation.

In addition to running the program, Keller speaks to departing servicemembers on a variety of subjects, such as how to write a resume and interview techniques and how to get into the Civil Service. She has been in the position of hiring manager many times and has been in the Civil Service for years. She also gives separate classes on getting into the Civil Service.

Other speakers include representatives of the Transportation Management Office, the VA, the Disabled American Veterans, the Marine Corps Reserve, the Department of Labor, Brigade Medical, private business and the Navy/Marine Corps Relief Society.

Additionally, even though the law doesn't require it, the ERC is working on getting college admissions officials to take part in the briefings, since so many separating servicemembers go to college.

The major, who was called to duty from medical school, is one obvious Marine to talk to about going to college. So is the captain, who became an officer through the Marine Corps Enlisted Commissioning Education Program (MECEP) and holds a master of business administration (MBA) degree.

The gunny is a Vietnam vet who put in more than 20 years. The sergeant did six years, got out, and went to work in the private sector. The Marines have "been there," and they say their Marine Corps experience has helped them. When they counsel separating Marines, Keller says, they offer unique insight.

They talk a lot about how you can translate military experience into civilian language, and Neill talks a little

Korean War veteran retires after 40 years

He decided to enlist on the "spur of the moment." Now, nearly 40 years later, LtCol. Kenneth Edward Allen is preparing for his return to

civilian life.

Allen, who has most recently been serving as the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, enlisted in the Corps June 14, 1951. His retirement will be official July 1.

A retirement ceremony was held May 31 at Camp H.M. Smith's Borden Field. At it, Lt. Gen. R.F. Milligan, Commanding General, FMFPac, said, "We could write a story about LtCol. Ken Allen. We could probably even make a movie, but most people wouldn't believe it."

During the ceremony, Allen was awarded the Legion of Merit Medal for "exceptionally meritorious conduct" as Special Security Officer, FMFPac, from October 1987 through April 1991. He was also awarded the Meritorious Service Award for his "sustained outstanding performance of duty" while serving with the Naval Security Group at numerous times through his career.

"I'm not exactly sure what made me decide to join," said the Elmyre, N.Y., native. "It was very strange. I was a theater manager and one day all my ushers came in and said they were quitting to go join the Marine Corps. For some unknown reason, I thought 'I'll go with them.'"

After enlisting, Allen moved quickly through the ranks to the grade of techni-

cal sergeant (E-6), and became a warrant officer in April 1960. He was designated a naval flight officer in August of that year and received his commission as a second lieutenant in 1965.

"I'm in the end of an era," said Allen. "I am the last former enlisted airborne intercept operator in the Marine Corps. I was a member of the Marine Corps first warrant company, and I'm one of, if not the only, Korean War veteran on active duty."

As far as the aviation aspect of his career goes, Allen carried a flying designation from 1953-1979. During that time he either flew in or was assigned to fly as a crew member of 24 various Marine Corps aircraft, including the F7F-3N "Tigercat" and the AD-3N "Skyraider."

"In those days, almost everybody flying was enlisted," he said. "We only had a handful of officers, and they were pilots who stuck around after World War II. It stayed that way until the twin-seated 'night-

fighter' program went away."

"I gave up my wings in November of 1978 to take a billet in London." continued Allen. "That ended up being an excellent decision. I held the position of Marine Officer Assistant to Director, Naval Security Group, Europe. As it turned out, I was the only Marine in the entire command and I really enjoyed myself for the almost five years I was there," he said.

Other highlights of his career include duty as an electronic warfare officer with the 3d Marine Aircraft at MCAS El Toro, Calif.; duty as head, Engineering Analysis Branch, Naval Scientific Intelligence Center, Washington, D.C.; and duty as chief, Intelligence Production and Requirements Branch, Atlantic Command, Electronic Intelligence Center, Norfolk, Va.

His awards and decorations include: the Bronze Star with combat "V" the Air Medal, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal with two bronze

stars, the Combat Action Ribbon, the Good Conduct Medal with one bronze star, the National Defense Medal with two bronze stars, the Korean Service Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal with four bronze stars, the Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm Unit Citation, the Republic of Vietnam Civic Action Unit Citation with Palm, the United Nations Service Medal and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.

"It's been fun (throughout) my entire career and I still think it's fun. I enjoy being a Marine," Allen said. "I'm sorry I have to get out but when it's time to go, you've got to go. The only words of wisdom I have to pass on to my fellow Marines is to do the best you can 100 percent of the time. And for those who don't like it, still do the best you can until it's time to leave," the 60-year-old leather-neck added.

"LtCol. Allen is wonderful to work for," said SSgt. Kimberly Cox, FMFPac G-2 Special Security Office chief. "He's taught me so much since I've been here. It's going to be hard losing his experience, understanding and leadership. We're really going to miss him."

With more than 40 years of active military service behind him, it's time for Allen to move ahead into the civilian world.

"My wife, Josephine, and I haven't really decided what

we're going to do after I retire. We'll probably travel in the U.S. and abroad for the better part of a year and then find a place to plow," he said.

Contributions help relief society stay 'healthy'

During my seven years in the Marine Corps I've heard that the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society's expenses have always exceeded their income from the previous year. I've also heard that every dollar a Marine or sailor contributes to the society is disbursed back to a Marine or sailor in a time of need. As this year's keyperson for the Air Station's NMCRS fund drive, I found that both of these statements are true. In fact, in 1990, the society's expenses totaled \$61 million and its income was \$57 million.

So what keeps this organization afloat when it's constantly "in the red?" The answer is the society's reserve fund.

The reserve fund was created during World War II by a national fund raising drive conducted by private citizens across the country. At the time, the society was on the verge of bankruptcy and consequently, extinction. The fund drive raised \$10 million and saved the society.

Through proper management and wise investment strategies by NMCRS, the reserve fund presently totals more than \$100 million. The society's policy is that every

dollar in this fund is available for relief expenditures, if and when required. In fact, if recent events had taken a nastier turn in the "sand-box," NMCRS would have drawn major amounts of money from this fund, in all likelihood. The last time the society accessed a significant amount of money from the fund was in 1989, to provide direct relief to victims of Hurricane Hugo.

After the WW II fund drive, the Department of Defense decreed no more fund raising efforts of this type would be taken to the public. We now take care of our own.

The reserve fund is a great part of the society - it allows the organization to keep going year after year. It pays operation and administration costs. The fund can be accessed in emergency situations. Meanwhile, it earns money to be used in the future by Marines and sailors in their time of need.

However, each year we draw upon the fund to make up the negative difference between income and expenses (as was done in 1990). We adversely affect the health of an absolutely great organization.

This is why the "Annual Call to Contributions" is so

important. If we generate enough support through contributions, we can leave the reserve fund in the bank so that it can continue to earn money for us. If not for us personally, it will someday help fellow Marines and sailors in their times of need.

Now is the time to demonstrate your support for NMCRS. Several Station-wide fund raising activities are in the works. Capping them off is the five kilometer run, which takes place this Sunday, beginning at 7 a.m. I think everyone one will find it to be an enjoyable run. It should be a cool run, as about a quarter of

the race route is along the shore line.

Also, all participants will get T-shirts. You don't have to run to participate - you can make it your "morning stroll." The cost of the shirts goes down if a larger number of them is ordered, so the greater the participation, the more money will actually be earned for NMCRS.

Other activities are planned, including a bowling tournament. Registration is now open for this event, which should be a lot of fun. The *Hawaii Marine* will keep you posted on this and other upcoming events.

TRANSITIONS/from A-8 about what it's like to be a Marine going back into "the world." He also offers his insights on the Marine Corps Reserve.

"It's an entirely different world than it was when I got out after Vietnam," Neill says. "Two different worlds politically and two different kinds of people behind the politics. The people you saw in the '70s and the people you see today are totally different." "Most people don't realize how much training the Marine Corps gives them in the eyes of a civilian business," says Doyle. "For example, leadership equals management. There's also planning and organization, and teaching. Just these three things every Marine does is way beyond what most civilians do."

Keller, who has on many occasions interviewed and hired people, says the time is ripe for veterans in the job market.

"You people are leaving at the right time," she says. "People are calling here saying they want Marines to come and work for them. But be realistic; there is a recession."

Critcher also reminds Marines to be realistic about the changes they will see - particularly younger Marines.

"We tend to put things off and think we're going to go and just fall back into life after we get out, but you don't," he says. "After just four or six years in the Marine Corps, you find that you've advanced. You've had

responsibilities and outgrown your high-school mentality, so you can't just go back to the way you were."

If it's starting to sound like this is all about getting a job, that's because getting a solid job after service is a big part of making the transition. The Employment Resource Center is at the heart of the TAM

Program, and it offers computerized job search assistance, various classes, and one-on-one counseling.

Everyone knows that getting a job and planning a smooth transition takes time and extensive planning. However, the rapid departure of many servicemembers after the war

has put even more pressure on the program and many of those here who are getting out.

Because of this, the TAMF team is giving priority to those who don't have the recommended six months in which to lay the groundwork for their transition.

"We are literally catching a lot of them as they go out the door," Goodson says. He added that a "feedback loop" is developing in order to keep contact with people after they leave.

"Our whole purpose here is to help Marines, sailors and their families make a difficult

transition," Keller says.

And that means long hours and plenty of work for the TAMF team. Keller says her staff is up to the challenges required by these changing times.

"I'm really proud of them," she says.

It's hurricane season — is your home prepared?

In the summer of 1988, the people of Hawaii buckled down and prepared for Hurricane Fabio to uproot their lives. The commanding officer of the Air Station placed the base in Storm Condition Four, and appropriate measures were taken to minimize losses.

By a stroke of luck, the hurricane's course shifted and the islands suffered no damage, unlike 1982, when Hurricane Iwa swept destructively through the islands.

While Oahu is relatively immune to hurricanes, according to Station Order 3140.IN, "significant damage could be caused by relatively spontaneous and energetic storms of local origin."

With the Hawaii hurricane season here (June-December), it may be a good idea to take precautions. Hurricanes have been known to hit as early as May.

June is Disaster Preparedness Month in Hawaii, and the Air Station will conduct a hurricane preparedness drill to determine strengths and weaknesses in its defense system. Printed below is a variety of information that can help you start or improve your own system at home.

- Types of warnings**
- Storm Condition FOUR: Destructive winds of force indicated are possible within 72 hours.
 - Storm Condition THREE: Destructive winds are anticipated within 48 hours.
 - Storm Condition TWO: Destructive winds are anticipated within 24 hours.
 - Storm Condition ONE: Destructive winds are anticipated within 12 hours.
- Individual preparations**
(According to ALL NA-VACT'S Hawaii [140-90])
- Preparations should

include ensuring that you have a three-day supply of non-perishable food, first aid kits, fire extinguishers, a battery-powered radio, flashlights, and extra batteries.

- Keep tuned to a local radio or television station for the latest weather service advisories as well as special instructions from local governments.

- Check battery-powered equipment. A battery-powered radio may be the only operational resource for getting emergency information.

- Keep a car fueled should evacuation become necessary. If the electricity is out, gas pumps will not work.

- Store drinking water in jugs and bottles. Fill up your bathtubs for whatever water needs arise, such as refilling commodes. Water lines may be damaged by the storm.

- Board up windows or protect them with storm shutters or tape. Danger to small windows is mostly from wind-propelled debris. Larger windows may be broken by wind pressure. While tape will not stop a window from breaking, it will prevent broken glass from being propelled by the wind.

- Secure outdoor objects that might be blown away. Garbage cans, garden tools, toys, signs, porch furniture, and a number of other seemingly harmless items become deadly missiles in hurricane winds.

- Moor boats securely before the storm arrives, or move them to a designated area.

- During the hurricane, remain indoors. Be especially wary of the "eye" of the storm. If the storm center passes directly over-

head, there will be a lull in the wind lasting from a few minutes to half an hour or more. At the other side of the "eye," the winds will increase rapidly to hurricane force, and will come from the opposite direction.

Types of destruction

- Tropical cyclones: Non-frontal, warm-core, low-pressure systems that originate outside of the tropics or tropical cyclones which have lost all tropical characteristics.

- Subtropical storms: Non-frontal, low-pressure systems developing over subtropical waters and occasionally evolving into hurricanes. They occur mainly during the period November through

April and are generally responsible for the southerly winds experienced in Hawaii. "Kona" is the Hawaiian term identifying "other than trade winds." When these disturbances form near the islands, they are usually accompanied by moderate to torrential rainfall and higher winds sometimes gusting to more than 50 knots and lasting for up to three days or more.

- Strong northeast trades: Occur when high pressure north of the Hawaiian Islands builds to form a tight pressure gradient over the local area causing strong northeast winds. These winds occasionally gust to 40

knots or higher and last from several hours to several days.

- Frontal winds: Occur during November through April and are often accompanied by strong, gusty surface winds which may last from several hours to several days.

- Low-level wind shear: Conditions under which an in-flight aircraft could experience a rapid change in wind direction and/or speed. These conditions, usually brief in nature, are commonly associated with thunderstorms, moderate to heavy rain showers, and tight pressure gradients.

The National Weather

Service issues watches and warnings to civil defense authorities and local TV/radio stations. The National Weather Service broadcasts continuous weather information on weather band radio KHA-99 on frequencies 162.40 and 162.55 MHz.

The Hawaii Hurricane Hotline 1-900-410-WARN is also available. There is a charge of \$.45 for the first minute and \$.35 for each additional minute. These taped recordings are about two minutes in length. Also, consult the white pages under U.S. GOVERNMENT, NOAA, NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE for other pre-recorded weather forecast numbers.

Evacuation Plan

- These highlighted areas are designated shelter areas aboard MCAS, Kaneohe Bay
- In the event an evacuation is ordered, seek these shelters or go to the highest ground available.
- Families in housing areas will be notified by loudspeaker trucks when it is time to move to the shelters.

Hawaii Marines set drug-free example

Hawaii Marines have joined the war on drugs. They are employing a unique battle philosophy that has taken them to the combat zones where a great many of the victims are claimed — our schools.

The warriors aren't there to interdict trafficking and sales of illegal drugs. As a matter of fact, they're not even there to give lectures about the evils of drug-use. Instead, they're there to be drug-free role models, and to reinforce the abundant anti-drug campaigns already being waged by other agencies across the nation.

The activities of these Marines, while unique to Hawaii, are the result of tasking that came all the way down the chain of command from the President. Since 1989, the Department of Defense has had an expanded role in supporting the nation's war on drugs, including various interdiction, education and awareness activities.

To help in this mission, Headquarters Marine Corps created an umbrella for such activities last year, known as the Marine Corps Community Drug Education Assistance Program. Outlined in MCO 5355.4, the program calls for increased individual and unit efforts to help meet the demand for drugs in their communities.

The program being used in Hawaii is a subtle approach to anti-drug awareness, and is the brain-child of FMFPac Commanding General LtGen. R.F. Milligan.

As part of the FMFPac program, the Hawaiian Islands have been subdivided into various regions of responsibility and split up between the Air Station, Marine Barracks Pearl Harbor and Camp Smith. Each of the three installations is tasked with supporting one area with frequent visits by Marine units to schools and other youth-oriented institutions.

The program takes an indirect approach to spreading the drug-free message. Rather than telling youths not to take drugs, Marines show students some of the complicated aspects of military demands, and subtly suggest that people on drugs couldn't be relied upon to perform such tasks.

"The kids have all kinds of anti-drug messages being thrown at them, so it wouldn't do much good for us to be telling them the same things," explained Lt. John Byrne, who has led two of the Air Station's recent excursions to Big Island intermediate schools.

"On the other hand, if we can actually show them that in order to be a member of a team like the Marine Corps, you have to be sharp and alert — and that you have to be drug free — then we are reinforcing all of the

other messages."

The Marines teach and perform various battle skills, such as NBC and Land Navigation, to illustrate the need to be alert.

Because they have to give presentations on various BST subjects, the Marines also sharpen their own skills, explained Byrne, which helps to enhance unit readiness.

He further explained, however, that it is a difficult task to be subtle while also getting the drug-free message across.

"I tell my Marines to talk about the particular BST subject they're presenting, and after demonstrating that there's a lot they have to know, mention that you have to be alert," Byrne said. "If it seems appropriate, they can throw in something to the effect that drugs would prohibit them from doing the job."

The Marines are also told not to spend the whole time talking about their particular subject. Instead, they're encouraged to spend as much time as possible just talking with the youngsters; letting the students' questions steer the conversation.

If the topic of drugs comes up, the Marines have the opportunity to let the kids know that they don't approve, and some of the reasons why, he added. And even if it doesn't come up, the students still get to meet a Marine and have an added positive role model in their life.

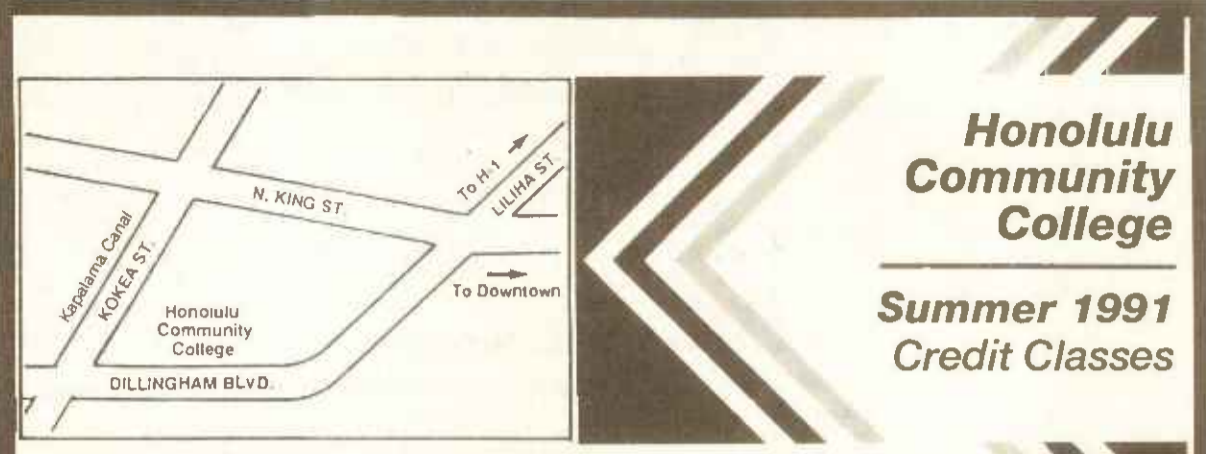

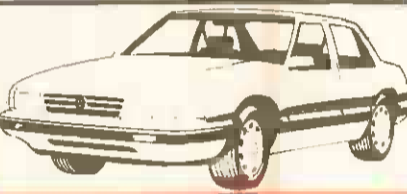
