More than providing a nicer place to shop, the new commissary will provide customers with a greater selection of line items.

In addition to the 3,500 new line items that will now be provided, the new commissary also has a fresh seafood section, a bakery and an extensive deli section.

"Now we won't have to drive all Now we won't have to drive an over the island to find a good bargain on seafood," said Marin Hausley, who arrived at the commissury at 8:35 a.m. to wait for its grand opening.

In the past, many customers had to drive as far as the Hickam Air Force Base commissary in order to take advantage of their. bigger selection.

"Not only will the commissary save us money on food but it will also save us money on gas," said Hausley.

Along with the customers saving money, the new commissary is expected to raise sales. The old commissary sales were approximitely \$1.2 million per month, it is expected that sales will rise to \$2 million per month.

"You better believe I will not be shopping," said Socorro Heather, another of the many early customers. "Why would 1? This commissary provides us with more selection and the added room makes it much more comfortable makes it much more comfortable to shop at."

On. June 17, the moving company used by the Oahu Consolidated Family Housing Office walked out on their contract without notice. This company was used to move loaner furniture into government quarters. Marine Expeditionary Brigade were called in to help continue providing housing residents with this service. The help received from the Marines not only helped the housing residents but it also saved thousands of dollars of government

"Approximately \$24,000 was saved," said MGySgt. David Keen Deers/Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA), officer-in-charge. Keen explains that if families do not have loaner furniture. they may be granted TLA. "We had several families come in last Thursday and they had to atay on TLA for ten days instead of the usual three," he said. The loaner furniture serves as a means of saving valuable government money. At the same time it accommodutes the servicemembers needs. "These big saving were made

mobilized so quickly," said Jared St. John, Housing Office director. "Within a matter of hours the Marines had stepped right into the movers' job." "On Thursday they started working at about 3 p.m. and did not go home until after 8 p.m.," he said.

Although a back-up had been caused, the Marines caught up on Priday. They will continue to help the housing office with the loaner furniture until a new

contract begins. "We expect to have a new contract by Monday, but because this was unexpected, it's hard to have a definite date," St. John coid said.

Even though an exact reason is not known, St. John says he thinks Oley Services walked out on their contract because of the pressure they were receiving from the Oahu Consolidated Family Housing

Office. "We had been having some problems with them. We had some problems with them, we had some complaints about them not performing their jobs and not being up to standard. 



Housing office offers many tips

Housing Policy Explained In the summer months ahead, thousands of military families located all over the world will receive orders which will direct them to new locations. Some of them will make their new homes in Hawaii. If you will be sponsoring one of the incoming families, you may find the following information helpful. Incoming servicemembers



The counsellor will also initiate paperwork to stop the Basic Allowance for Quarters (BAQ). During the check in inspection, the housing inspector will provide operational instruction for appliances, and installed operational instruction for appliances, and installed equipment.
