H & S Co., Marine Bks. Hawaii, folds its flag

Another page in the history of Marine Barracks Hawaii closed Feb. 7 as Headquarters and Service Company officially disestablished its operations in a morning colors ceremony at Naval Base Pearl Harbor.

Pearl Harbor.

The ceremony was bittersweet in that the historic unit was also celebrating its 90th birthday. With the disestablishment of H & S Co., only one guard company unit remains in what was once a 450-plus Marine Security Group. Also with the closure of H & S Co., Marine Barracks has downsized from three guard companys (including West Loch) and one support company to its one guard company. The company will become known as Marine Corps Security Force Company, Pacific. The Marines in H & S Co. will be sent to other Hawaii-based units with the redesignation of the remaining guard company expected sometime in August.

"This is a sad but historic day in the Marine Corps," said Capt. Charles Page, commanding officer of H & S Co.

Page was recognized with a Navy Commendation Medal during the ceremony for his outstanding service while serving in several billets, including H & S Co.'s commanding officer. Col. W.W. North echoed Page's feelings as he addressed the Marines in attendance. "This should be a happy day of celebrating the Marine Barracks 90th birthday but is instead a sad time as we see this part of this historic unit so rich in tradition go away."

Despite the changes taking place at Marine Barracks, the tradition of the Marines stationed there will remain the same, according to North. "We as Marines must go on. We must accept the change but continue to excel as Marines and know that we have been a part of that special history of the Marine Corps," North admonished to his troops.

Following North's remarks, the Marine Forces Pollowing North's remarks, the Marine Porces Pacific Band played the traditional "Happy Birthday" song and the service songs of the Navy and Marine Corps, and the troops were dismissed for the final time.

The remainder of the day was dedicated to a picnic and competition between the band and Barracks Marines in various sporting events.

FY95 budget announced

HQMC, Washington, D.C, Feb.7. 1994 — During the State of the Union address last month, President Bill Clinton declared that this year's defense budget would "draw the line against further defense cuts" while ensuring that it "protects the readiness and quality of our forces."

With that as a foundation, Secretary of Defense William Perry revealed the \$252.2 billion FY95 defense budget on Feb.7, the

FY95 defense budget on Feb.7, thus beginning the implementation of the Bottom-Up Review (BUR); a detailed reassessment of U.S. defense needs undertaken last year by recently-retired SecDef Les Aspin. "For America's future security, the bottom line is the BUR—its strategy, its force structure and its comprehensive vision," Dr. Perry stated. "The President's budget increases spending for readiness, sustains current rates readiness, sustains current rates for flying hours and operation, and ensures that our military has what it needs to keep U.S. forces ready to fight."

The FY95 budget, which includes funds for a 1.6 percent pay raise for military and civilian pay raise for military and civilian personnel, also begins implementation of DoD's Future Years Defense Program (FYDP) for FY95-99. Both the budget and the FYDP support the conclusion of last year's BUR which, in effect, shifted the nation's defense strategy, force structure, modernization and infrastructure from a posture designed to meet a global Soviet threat to one which focuses on new dangers such as regional conflicts, proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and threats to U.S. economic security.

In detailing the new budget, Dr. Perry noted that it culminates many months of intense scrutiny about how best to protect U.S. Security interests in the post-Cold War era while ensuring that America will retain, in the words of the President, "the best equipped, best trained and best prepared fighting force on the face of the earth."

The Marine Corps' share of the DoD budget totals approximately \$8.9 billion. While that figure

represents only about 3.5 percent of the DoD military budget, the importance for the American tax payer can be seen in the fact that five cents of every DoD dollar provides about 12 percent of all active U.S. forces; 13 percent of general purpose forces; 10 percent of the fighter/attack aircraft, and 11 percent of the nation's reserve

general purpose forces; 10 percent of the fighter attack aircraft, and 11 percent of the nation's reserve divisions. And, the Corps will remain manpower intensive—that is, about 75 cents of every Marine Corps budgeted dollar will support military and civilian personnel costs, e.g. pay entitlements and minimum support programs such as critical skills bonuses, quality of life programs, etc.

In terms of real dollars, the proposed military personnel budget for active duty Marines in FY95 is \$5.8 billion and \$354 million for the Reserve force. These figures reflect a FY95 end strength of 174,000 active duty and 42,000 Reserve Marines. It's important to note that while Congress had previously authorized an active duty end strength of 177,000 Marines, the Corps will draw down to the BURSee Budget, A7

Station MPs receive domestic violence training

Station military police and their civilian counterparts have been improving their skills in handling domestic violence during a unique course conducted here this week as part of Headquarters Marine Corps Family Advocacy Program. The program is a means by which Family Services, the Provost Marshals Office and local commands are working to head off incidents of family violence before they occur or escalate into Station military police and their

off incidents of family violence before they occur or escalate into larger problems.

LtCol. John Wintersteen, head of military police and physical security, HQMC, is coordinating efforts here and said the air station is the first base in the Marine

is the first base in the Marine Corps where the program is being implemented.
"In February of last year, station MPs, Family Service Center social workers and myself participated in an intense seven-day program in Duluth, Minnesota," Wintersteen said. "We traveled with police units during family violence incidents, participated in jail visits, sat in on courtroom hearings on family violence cases and in treatment groups."

This helped in the formulation of new ideas and procedures that MPs are implementing here during

of new ideas and procedures that MPs are implementing here during domestic violence incidents. "We are placing extrememly heavy emphasis on protecting the victim," Wintersteen said. "This begins with MPs conducting a full investigation with detailed reports on each incident." Before, Family Services may have been tasked with completely handling the problem.

Now the Provost Marshal will be providing to the individual's command a detailed report of the incident and, if needed, a

recommendation for confinement, behavior for the MP involved in recommendation for confinement, restriction or a military protective order," he said. Family Services will still receive a copy of the report for their follow-up, but commands will be tasked with ensuring their Marines are fully accountable for their conduct, Wintersteen said. This can include non-judicial punishment or a more severe penalty.

"The commandant has said it's unacceptable for Marines to abuse their spouses or for civilians to abuse their Marine spouses." Wintersteen said.

Wintersteen and station MPs have also been involved in taning a video here simulating cases of domestic violence that will be used in training other MPs around the Corps. It is a valuable tool, said Wintersteen, because the tapes present certain facts about a domestic violence incident but don't give a clear-cut conclusion to what

behavior for the MP involved in a domestic violence report, he said. The class is eight hours long and Wintersteen estimated approximately 175-200 station MPs and Honolulu Police Department personnel will have undergone the training at its conclusion.

Last August, Wintersteen met with station leaders, including unit officers and staff non-commissioned officers and staff non-commissioned officers, to begin the Family Advocacy Program training and this month concluded the individual MP training. He also reviewed the station's family violence cases to see if the guidelines were being followed correctly. Wintersteen said the Marine Corps will continue conducting independent quality control measures to evaluate how effective the program is and how to better fine-tune it. Career Brief Perry confirmed by Senate as Secretary of Defense

William J. Perry was unanimously confirmed by the United States Senate as the 19th Secretary of Defense Feb. 3 and was sworn in during an informal ceremony shortly after the vote. The Senate confirmed his nomination with a 97-0 vote. Perry had been the number two man in

had been the number two man in

had been the number two man in the Pentagon and is regarded as a scholar, businessman and an expert on high-tech weapons.

The three-and-a-half hour confirmation hearing was the speediest of any cabinet position of the Clinton administration. Perry is considered by both Republicans and Democrats as an excellent choice for the ton

excellent choice for the top Pentagon position. Members of the Senuice Armed Services Committee had urged an accelerated process of Perry's nomination to fill what had been seen as a leadership vacuum in the nearly two months since Aspin announced his retirement.

During Perry's confirmation hearing, members of the Senate Armed Services Committee spoke highly of the nominee

"The record clearly shows that Bill Perry is highly qualified to be the secretary of defense," said Senator Sam Nunn, armed services chairman. "He is an expert in national security issues and has shown high standards of personal conduct and integrity." conduct and integrity.

Perry has spent most of his career in the defense industry as a consultant of super-secret weapons. His expertise in high technology has caused him to be known as the "Godfather of the Stealth bomber."

DNATO moves toward Bosnia intervention

intervention

Members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization are moving toward a decision to force an end to the siege of Sarejevo by the removal of all artillery from the city and surrounding territory and the enforcement of the demands with military power.

Top advisors of the Clinton administration have prepared a proposal for NATO which is basically an ultimatum for all the forces in the Sarejevo area to remove their heavy weapons and artillery, which has crippled the troubled region and killed several civilians in the past 22 months. It is estimated more than 200,000 people have died in the former Yugoslavia during that time. The action by NATO if the proposal is approved would be the most aggressive diplomatic effort to bring a settlement from the three warring ethnic groups the Serbs, Muslims and Croats.

The vote would have to be unanimous and thus far only Britain and Canada have showed reluctance to the plan. The proposal includes options of air strikes and other military action for the Feb. 5 attack in which a single shell exploded in a Sarejevo marketplace and killed 68 people. However, the question which military leaders and administration officials are considering is that the proposal would reduce the chances of something like the recent attack happening again.

The United Nations Security Council would formally demand that the Muslim-led Bosnian government and the Bosnia Serbs remove all heavy weapons, artillery and tanks outside a 13

Ukraine's decision to join NATO is part of warming relations with the West following a renewed commitment to eliminate its nuclear arms.

forces begin their withdrawal from Somalia before March 31, the Clinton administration is divided over whether a small diplomatic contingent should remain behind despite warnings from Marine Corps officers in regards to the group's safety.

The White House decided on Jan. 12 to leave approximately 25 diplomats and 50 combat Marines in the U.N. compound. However, a Marine survey team concluded after traveling through Somalia last month that "violence would rapidly escalate" with the departure of U.S. forces and that a platoon of 50 troops cannot ensure the safety of the diplomatic outpost.

Maj. Michael Edwards, operations officer for the Marine battalion that protects the State Department officials in Somalia, sent a memorandum to Ambassador Richard Bogosian stating that one security platoon would not be sufficient for

continuing operations.



Avoid tax errors

A few minutes spent double checking the federal tax return before sending it to the Internal Revenue Service could save time nevenue Service could save time in the long run, said IRS officials.

Any mistake slows down processing and could delay a refund by as much as two weeks, said IRS officials. The error, like no signature or missing attachments, might even kick the return back to the taxpayer.

Before you mail the federal tax return, IRS officials suggested going through forms one last time to check these points:

•Make sure your correct name and Social Security number appear on each schedule.

on each schedule.

•Make sure the name and Social Security number of each dependent 1 year and older appear on the tax

•If you are filing a joint return, make sure your spouse signed and dated the form.

•Make sure your math is correct. •If you are not itemizing, use the correct standard deduction.

•If you qualified for the earned income credit, child care credit or other type of credit, make sure you correctly filled out the required

Double check that you marked the correct boxes and carried the correct figures to the appropriate

Double-check that you entered the correct amount from the tax

•If you owe taxes, be sure to

on the check or money order.

Ensure Form W-2s, schedules and other required forms are attached in the proper order to the tax return.

Once you determine the tax return is correct, make a copy of the complete package, including all supporting forms.

Check the postage on the return before you mail it. IRS officials will return a postage due enve-lope to you. The return is considered late if they receive it after April 15, even if the first time you mailed it was before the deadline.

Publications help

The Internal Revenue Service offers two publications for military members that outline which pays and allowances are and aren't

allowances are and aren't taxable. Military and special pays, dependency exemptions, deductions and other areas are handled in IRS Publication 3, Tax Information for Military Personnel. IRS Publication 945, Tax Information for those affected by Operation Desert Storm, discusses tax free-income, filing extensions and other tax aspects for those involved in the military operation. operation.

Some generally taxable military pays include:

•Reserve training pay; •Military retirement pay based on length of service or

age;
•Re-enlistment bonuses; • Lump-sum payments on separation from active duty;

•Pay received by retired personnel who are serving as instructors in Junior ROTC

programs.

Those generally not taxable

include:

•Uniform allowances;
•Basic quarters allowance;
•Variable Housing

•Moving or storage expenses for permanent-change-of-station moves.

Give the Internal Revenue Service about eight weeks processing time after you file your federal income tax before calling to check on the status of a tax

to check on the status of a tax refund.

If the check hasn't arrived at the end of eight weeks, call the IRS Automated Refund System at toll-free 1-800-829-4477. IRS updates tax refund information every seven days.

Information you need before calling the service includes Social Security number, filing status and the whole dollar amount of the expected refund.

The service operates Monday through Friday. If you use a touch-tone telephone, the hours are 7 a.m. to 11 p.m.; if you use a rotary telephone, call during normal business hours, said IRS officials.

officials.

Ever wonder why it takes the IRS awhile to issue a tax refund? Once the tax refund is delivered to the IRS service center, it is opened and sorted according to the type of return.

The returns are coded and edited

for computer input with the information placed on magnetic tape. Information and math accuracy are checked. If it all checks out, the tapes are sent to the IRS computing center where the final return information is credited to the taxpayers's account. The Treasury Department's regional finance centers then receive refund tapes and issue the checks.

checks.

IRS officials suggested you file your tax return in January or February, if you can. Fewer returns are filed during this time frame, which speeds the refund process; in some cases, a check can be in the mail just three or four weeks after filing the return.

Office for help, said IRS officials. Usually, the office can handle the complaint or problem in just a

IRS officials said the people who staff the Problem Resolution Offices are tax specialists used to dealing with complex issues.

Areas they handle include:

•Problems that remain after discussion with an IRS employee's

These include, but are not limited to, Freedom of Information Act requests, appeals of decisions made in tax examinations, Privacy Act inquiries and hiring practice

division and wing.

Major procurement projects for the Corps in the current budget proposal include seven Joint Tactical Information Distribution Systems (JTIDS); 113 Advanced Field Artillery Tactical Data Systems (AFATDS); and 1 Joint Service Imagery Processing System (JSIPS). Additionally, the proposed budget includes Navy procurement funding for four AV-8B Harrier upgrades (at a cost of about \$146 million) and 12 new AH-1W Supercobra helicopters (totalling approximately \$142 million).

In research and development, \$491 million has been budgeted for the V-22 "Osprey" — the leading contender to replace the Marine Corps' CH-46 "Sea Knight" helicopter. Additionally, \$25 million is included for the Advanced Amphibious Assault (AAA) program.

The Corps' FY95 budget proposal includes 11 military construction projects at a cost of \$57 million. Those projects include, among others, a cryogenics facility at MCAS Cherry Point; a multi-purpose training range complex at MCB Camp Lejeune; a child development center at MCRD Parris Island; and a sewage treatment plant at MCCDC Quantico.





Sound mind, sound body will help in the future

Some students lining the outer edge of the Pahoa High and Intermediate School football field on the Big Island Jan. 28, stood awestruck as a giant CH-53 helicopter landed and 24 hard charging and highly-motivated Marines and sailors charged out.

No, this wasn't an invasion but it certainly was an attention grabber for everyone

there.
The Marines and sailors

The objectives of the mission
were to instruct the students

were to instruct the students on setting and obtaining goals, to stay in school, stay off drugs and to maintain healthy, physically fit bodies, "This is a wonderful program which the Marines put on for the students. The students here are kinda isolated from

everyone because the school is located so far out," said Jodean Delacruz, assistant Jodean Delacruz, assistant principal of Pahoa Intermediate. "This is really a unique chance for the students to see all the things the Marines do as well learn about staying healthy and staying off drugs."

The Marines and sailors had eight different stations from which they shared not only their knowledge of the equipment but also the experiences they have had in life.

The stations which the students participated in included first aid, camouflaging and concealment, communications, nuclear, biological and chemicals (NBC), a tour of the helicopter, drill and a question and answer station on life in the Marine

Corps.
While the students learned about the equipment they also saw examples of how a physically fit body and mind are important to members of the military services. One

example which many of the students enjoyed was the drill station.

The drill station gave the students a chance to bark out commands as two Marines tried to follow the instructions. Unfortunately for the students, one of the Marines acted as if he was "hung over" and couldn't function too well. This instilled in the students that a clear head and healthy

that a clear head and healthy body are important in the working world.

At another station, communications, Marines talked about establishing goals and working towards achieving them. Some of the Marines talked about ways they continued their education and how they enjoyed their time in intermediate and high school.

At the first aid station, students acted wounded and all the other students had to call out to the Marines and sailors the correct life-saving steps.

Teachers found themselves becoming the target for face painting at the camouflage

station as students quickly volunteered their daily

instructors.

The Marine Corps question and answer station was recently added to the mission. Marines were asked questions from "why is their hair so short?" to "have you ever killed anyone?"

"This was really cool that you guys came and showed us all this stuff," said student Angelina Souza. "I have never seen any of this and I really learned a lot today,"

The Marines hoped to make a lasting impression on the

lasting impression on the

students but they certainly made a positive impression on the teaching staff.

the teaching staff.

"Drugs are a growing problem in this area. It is even encouraged in some homes. I hope that this will help some of the students realize that staying off drugs and keeping healthy bodies is important," added Delacruz.

"I thought the entire program was very well

program was very well balanced. All the stations appeared to be well prepared. Each of the instructors possessed a thorough knowledge of what their job

was and presented themselves in a highly professional manner," said Becky Ramsey, an eighth grade teacher.
Following the static displays the Marines joined the students in the school cafeteria for lunch. The Marines brought along MREs (meals ready-to eat) which they gladly shared with the students.
Following the meal some of the Marines and students played a quick game of

played a quick game of basketball and then as quickly as they arrived the Marines were airborne and heading back to Oahu.





I'm writing to you as a last resort for help. I've exhausted all other resources exhausted all other resources with no results. I live in base housing (a bottom unit). My downstairs neighbor and the couple above her are why I'm writing. They throw their trash in the bins without bagging it, which causes a disgusting smell and maggots, Also the girlupstairs has a dog that has not

been off of their back porch since June or July of '93. It's a big dog, a German Shepherd, and I feel that's cruel. They also let it urinate on the porch and the urine runs down onto the downstairs unit and the yard. It's really causing a bad problem of flies and smell. My little boy can't even go outside and play on hot days because it gets so bad. When they do wash the porch, they use either the spray nozzle or the yard sprayer, which causes the mess to go everywhere. 



New weapon against mosquitoes developed

Rejoicel You now can outwit mosquitoes, ticks, biting flies and all those other lousy bloodsuckers. DoD has developed effective ammunition that can stop service members from catching malaria and other insect-borne diseases.

from catching malaria and other insect-borne diseases.

The weaponry, a skin cream and a liquid for spraying or soaking fabrics, is now in the military supply system.
Further, the protection - developed by DoD, the Department of Agriculture and private industry — may also be purchased commercially.

"These are the best insect repellents in the world," said Air Force Col. Robert Clegern, the research liaison officer for the Armed Forces Pest Management Board and now a retiree. "Proper use of the two-part system provides almost 100 percent protection against most biting species," he said.

The first part is a repellent cream applied to the skin.

The second is a liquid for fabrics that remains effective even after numerous washings.

fabrics that remains effective even after numerous washings. Dry cleaning will remove the repellent, if necessary, said

repellent, if necessary, said Clergen.

He said the primary ingredient of the skin repellent, DEET (diethyl-m-toluamide), has been in use about 40 years. However, it was not until prior to Desert Shield in 1990 that research finally developed the

present 33-percent slow-release product. The older 75 percent military DEET product reddened yr burned some users' skin. It also acted as a plasticizer, clouding watch crystals, causing gun stocks to become sticky and paint to peel. The new DEET formulation lessens these adverse effects while still affording excellent protection.

Entomologists say there are nearly 2,500 species of mosquitoes. They are found almost everywhere except on open seas, at the polar regions and in very dry deserts. Mosquitoes are more dangerous to human health than any other group of insects; they carry such diseases as malaria and yellow fever.

Only females bite and spread disease from one victim to another. They can take as many as 44 blood meals during a life span of 100 days in the laboratory.

According to Carl Schreck, research entomologist with the Department of Agriculture Research Service, the clothing

pellents - which can also repenents — which can also kill the bugs on contact — were tested in Alaska, Australia, Florida, the rice fields of Louisiana, Pakistan, Zambia and Thailand.

Zambia and Thalland.

Different temperatures and species at many sites made it impossible to generalize about repellent effectiveness.

For example, in the Florida Everglades as many as 3,000 mosquitoes will hover around a single person. "There we got upward of seven hours of total protection against bites on the protection against bites on the exposed skin that had been treated with the repellent," Schreck said.

Schreck said.

"We have to be careful to not make an all-encompassing statement that if a repellent works against one insect, it will work against all, in every place. It doesn't work that way."

The military set a goal of 12 hours for length of effectiveness of each application. According to Schreck, the most dangerous transmitters of malaria bite late at night, between 10 p.m.

and 1 a.m.
"We wanted a repellent that would last from dusk until dawn, when service members would arise and put on another application if necessary. It's always been difficult protecting people at night, because the mosquitoes attack them while they sleep,"

Not only do these formulations provide comfort and protection from mosquitoes, research has discovered a secondary benefit: Mosquito populations diminish in proportion to the length of time large numbers of repellent-protected troops are in the area.

We've demonstrated that when people with this clothing-treated protection walk trails

when people with this contains the treated protection walk trails where mosquitoes are thick, mosquitoes virtually disappear after a time," Schreck said. "In fact, we've been so successful that we could just wear a t-shirt as upper clothing and still not have any mosquitoes flying about."

Air Force Capt. Armando Rosales, a medical entomologist with the board, conducted the most recent field test of the system with troops in Somalia. Rosales worked with the Air Force's 823rd Civil Engineering Red Horse Squadron from mid-December 1992 to mid-March 1993, showing members how to use the repellents. Not one came down with an insect-horne disease. came down with an insect-borne disease. Other comparable units without his

help did.

While not naming specific products, Schreck said persons interested in purchasing repellent creams at places like sporting goods stores should look for the percentage of DEET ingredients. However, the company supplying the military has been permitted to say so on its label for commercial sales.

"As a rule, you find most

"As a rule, you find most companies have a product that ranges from 16 to 40 percent of DEET," said Schreck. "More of DEET," said Schreck, "More is unnecessary. One product contains only 8 percent. It does a fairly good job for a few hours. And that's what it's marketed for, to cover you while working in the garden. The 8-percent product is also recommended for use on children."


