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# Immediate Response Team joins forces for simulation exercise

Two JP-5 fuel tankers collide into each other causing a fuel leakage which erupts into flames and spills aviation jet fuel onto the streets and down the storm drain system leading into Kaneohe Bay.

The Immediate Response Team was challenged with this situation during a mock scenario held at the corner of 6th and C Streets aboard Marine Corps Base Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay Jan. 17 at 2:45 p.m.

The Immediate Response Team initiated action to close off the area, extinguish the "fire", care for "injuries" and to prevent the "fuel" and "hazardous waste" from reaching the navigable waters of Kaneohe Bay.

This exercise was planned by LtCol. K.E. Gregory, assistant chief of staff, G-3, MCB Hawaii, to help train and prepare the response team for similar emergency situations.

"We have a continual training program of various scenarios that we conduct, at a minimum, quarterly," Gregory explained. "These exercises are to improve the coordination and communication between all the base agencies involved.

"The simulation gives the agencies a chance to test their reaction time and their knowledge of what action should be taken," he said. "This way, the var-

ious agencies are prepared 'if and when' such an emergency occurs."

The members of the immediate response team are from the Military Police Department, Federal Fire Department, Medical, Environmental, Waterfront Operations, Facilities, and Crash Fire and Rescue.

The response team was directed by LtCol. William Tourek, the designated base on-site commander. Tourek has received the training that is required

by Federal law to handle hazardous waste spill response.


Since the simulation involved a "vehicle accident," the MPD was first on the scene to assess the damage and contact the

remaining members of the response team. In addition, they re-routed the traffic around the scene and also identified and directed essential personnel to the scene and command area.

The Federal Fire Department arrived within minutes and extinguished the "fire" and began the coordinated spill response to contain the "hazardous

The experts from the Base Fuel Division were contacted to determine whether or not the "fuel" was volatile and might explode. JP-5 fuel has a flashpoint of 140 degrees fahrenheit so once the "gasoline fire" was extinguished the situation was not compli-

# Many homes receive new roofs

Approximately 150 Marine Corps Base Hawaii, housing units are in the process of having their shingles replaced. The work began in August and is scheduled to be completed in May.

The new roofs are part of the housing scheduled maintenance, explained Eddie W. Kerr, the construction inspection supervisor with the Family Housing

Department. The deterioration caused by the salt air to the cap sheeting and galvanized gravel stops makes it necessary for the roofs to be replaced on a regular basis, said Kerr. "The hot tar and cap sheeting work Tar Tar sauce - One of the roofers contracted to replace the roofing being done to the units is performed every 10 to 12 on MCB Hawaii Housing units pours hot tar into containers. The years."

"Some units in the Capehart area received roofing in

1988 but funding ran out," said Kerr. The more than \$1 million for this project is from appropriated Army money left over from Fiscal Year 1994, he said.

"The roofers are starting and completing units on the Kaneohe Bay FY-63 housing units and 140 Capehart average of one per day," said Kerr. "This includes the removal of the old shingles, and replacing them with the new roofing materials.'

"The biggest inconvenience to the residents is the presence of the tar trucks," he said. The contractors are aware of the inconvenience and are making a conscious effort to minimize the disruption.

The housing department inspectors and contractors from the Public Work Center at Pearl Harbor hold sight inspections to make sure the roofers from Certified Construction are adhering to the guidelines that have been established, he continued.

"The occupants of affected units will be notified prior to start of the work on thier units," he concluded.

# Base dump saves Marine Corps approximately

A rusted old bucket, a broken mirror, a bundle of colorful clothes all lie in a pile at the Base Landfill. Each year approximately 2,400 tons of trash find their destiny in the landfill.

project is expected to continue through May.

The Marine Corps Base Hawaii Landfill, an approximate five-acre area, has the capability of being piled more than 100 feet high.

Although it may seem like a large area to throw trash, after a study of the landfill was done in 1987, it was determined that the landfill would reach maximum capacity in 2003.

Previously, the landfill was the site of a motorcross area, rodeo arena and the base stables. The original landfill was located behind the Boondocker Theater but when it reached its limitations, a new location had to be found.

One other important thing people should keep in mind when using the landfill is the danger of disposing hazardous materials at the landfills.

"People must become more aware of

"Absolutely no hazardous waste should be thrown at the base landfill Periodically the state checks the landfill for contamination. If hazardous waste is found our landfill could be shut down with a citation and possible fine. Then we would have to take our trash off-base," Au said.

In order to keep the bad smell of the landfill to a minimum, the law requires a six inch soil cover be placed on the trash collected at the landfill each day.

Au explained the base is doing everything possible to extend the life of the landfill. Now it's up to the rest of the base community to contribute to this effort by recycling.

The dump may look like just a pile of trash but it's saving Marine Corps dollars which can be used in other areas such as recreation, education or housing.

MARINE BARRACKS, Washington, D.C.-A new Color Sergeant of the Marine Corps was named in a ceremony Jan. 12 at Marine Barracks. Washington, D.C., after seven sergeants nominated for the position from around the Corps underwent a rigorous week-long screening process.

Sgt. Thomas W. Rollison, a food service specialist from the Marine Corps Air Facility Quantico, Va., was selected as the 24th Color Sergeant of the Marine Corps, replacing Sgt. Daniel Corps and the Sergeant Major of the

"Primarily, we look at the situation and assess what action needs to be taken to prevent any adverse environmental impacts," explained Maj. George Wheeler, Environmental director MCB Hawaii. "The big thing with any petroleum product is to prevent it from reaching navigable waters. If it does, we have then committed a violation of the Clean Water Act.

"Our main objective is to prevent a Bay."

"This simulation was very beneficial for us," Unverdorben said. "Usually all we do is talk about how a situation would be handled. This way we have hands-on experience on how to set up the Boom explained Petty Officer 1st Class and how long it takes to deploy, retrieve and clean the Boom. Because of this training our people are better prepared to react to emergency spill situations."

A boom is a containment system that tion with these containment and prevention methods there are many other options. Each emergency situation is assessed and the best possible system of containment and clean-up is used by the team.

"There will be many more drills, each involving a different situation and requiring a different response," Tourek explained. "The simulations help us know how to react, what might go wrong and how to prevent it. It improves not only the reaction time but also the relationship between the response teams."

# crime Stoppers

On Tuesday, January 10. 1995 an unidentified male contacted a Central Oahu corporation and claimed to be Sgt Clyde Thourp of the Honolulu Police Department, a Crime Stoppers Investigator. This male told the personnel director of this corporation that he was conducting an investigation for three sexual assaults and narcotics trafficking. The male suggested that the corporation fire the employee before the story of the investigation was known to the press, damaging the corporation's reputa-

No such investigation was being conducted of the employee. There is no Sgt, Clyde Thourpe with the Honolulu Police Department. The only investigators assigned to the Crime Stoppers Program are Detective Margot Tang, who is currently on extended leave, and Detective Robert Naylor. If members of the public are unsure of the identity of any person claiming to be a police officer, they should contact the Honolulu Police Department and confirm the identity of that person. If approached by a person claiming to be a police officer, and they are unsure of that person's identity they should call 911 and a uniformed officer will be sent to confirm whether the person is in fact a police officer.

Crime Stoppers will pay a reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the identification, arrest and charging of the person who impersonated a police officer in this case. Crime Stoppers will pay similar rewards for information on other crimes. Callers do not have to give their names. Call Crime Stoppers at 955-8300.

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

> "She told me if I loved what I was doing I would succeed," Jensen explained. "However, she said that if I didn't like it I would probably fail, but regardless she would be behind me all the way."

Jensen arrived at boot camp in August 1992 and after graduation left for the Basic Aviation Ordnance School in Millington, Tenn.

"Actually, I was trained on ordnance for the F/A-18 Hornet," she said. "When I arrived here in March of 1993, I was supposed to be stationed with VMFA-212. However, they had already modified my orders to send me to HMH-463."

The ordnance for the Sea Stallion is much different than for the Hornet so Jensen had to study and work hard to learn about the new aircraft.

"Jensen is an outstanding Marine and a real team player," said CWO3 Don Davis, officer-in-charge of ordnance. "She really takes her job to heart and is focused on her goals. On several occasions she has served as the supervisor for the ordnance section and she also played a vital role in helping HMH-366 set up and maintain their ordnance workcenter."

The excitement she feels when flying

make up the helicopter squadron. At the age of 20 Jensen is now training and learning about every function aboard the CH-53D Sea Stallion Helicopter in pursuit of her wings as an aerial observer/aerial gunner.

"She has a strong character and pushes the limits but she isn't here trying to break-down barriers," Davis explained. "Jensen does her job and does it well. I'm sure she will soon earn her wings and become an integral part of the aircrew."

Every work center at HMH-463 is given the opportunity to become part of the aircrew. It is completely voluntary for those who want to be trained as an aerial observer/gunner.

"I love to fly," Jensen said. "My father was a pilot in Fresno, Calif., and he used to fly us (five sisters and one brother) around. It is because of him that I grew interested in learning all that I can about flight, so when I was offered the opportunity to do more in the squadron I jumped at it.

"Right now I'm an aerial observer/aerial gunner under training," Jensen explained. "To become a part of the aircrew you, have to undergo a lot of training."

The requirements for qualification as an aerial observer/gunner are listed in Marine Corps Order 3500.1. These requirements include an extensive swim qualification, flight physical, flight physiology (training on survival and basic gear in a pressure chamber has led her to ask questions and learn set at 25,000 feet), and completion of team. I'm happy to be a part of it."


"I've met the other qualifications and have almost completed the necessary flight training, but there is a lot more I need to know," Jensen explained. "There is so much to learn about this aircraft, I need to know more before I will consider myself as a qualified member of the aircrew. There is so much that goes on to keep helicopters flying. The absolute minimum in knowledge is not good enough."

Almost all of the training is handled by Marines who have been certified in their field. For example, Jensen is the only collateral duty inspector (CDI) for ordnance in her unit. This means she is qualified to train and certify other Marines for ordnance:

"The CDI is responsible for making sure the job is done right," Jensen explained. "All of us are responsible for the safety of the aircraft and the crew. If someone in the squadron is interested in learning about one of the other workcenters they can go right to the CDI for that job and ask them 'hey can you teach me this?"

Training is essential for the Marines in the squadron. The more individuals that receive training and become qualified in the other sections the more it benefits the entire unit.

"We all work together in this squadron," Jensen said. "If even one area is lacking the whole unit can be jeopardized. The training we receive and the opportunities we are given ensures that we work together as a

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
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



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# Camp H.M. Smith has illustrious history of service to Pacific

Despite surviving a revolution of change, Camp H.M. Smith, home of the Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Command and the Commander, Marine Forces Pacific, has undoubtedly stood the test of time. Camp Smith will celebrate its 39th anniversary as a Marine Corps facility, Jan. 31.

On that date in 1956, Camp Smith was dedicated as headquarters of the Fleet Marine Force Pacific (FMFPac), the largest single U. S. Marine Corps field command. The camp overlooks Pearl Harbor from an elevation of about 600 feet on Oahu's Halawa Heights, and offers a commanding view of the entire southern coast of

The camp was named in honor of the late Gen. Holland McTyeire "Howlin' Mad" Smith. Gen. Smith, the first commanding general of FMFPac, was one of the most famous Marines of his time and known as the "father of modern amphibious warfare." His ferocious temper earned him the nick- casualties of war. name "Howlin Mad."

"These buildings and grounds are sacred to me for here many thousands of my men, wounded in the Pacific, received tender care by the medical corps of our great Navy..." said Gen. Throughout World War II, the Aiea Heights Naval Hospital located on the site served as a stopping-off place for thousands of wounded Marines and sailors on their way home from the war in the Pacific. Originally a sugar cane field, the land was approved for purchase by an Act of Congress on March 17, 1941 for the buildings and grounds of a Navy hospital.

Work to construct the 1,650-bed facility began in July 1941, but moved rather slowly. 

Other organizations currently located at Camp Smith include the Special Operations Command, Pacific; Joint Task Force-Full Accounting and the Defense Logistics Agency.

From hospital to Marine headquarters, to the most important command complex for the Pacific's military, Camp Smith has served its purpose when its country needed it most. And though the pain-filled voices of wounded troops have faded from its long hallways, the undying memory of those servicemen who fought in America's defense during WWII is reflected upon each year when Camp Smith commemorates its anniversary.





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
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
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

tables and lamps - for the first 90 days of your marriage. Clothes washers and dryers are also available for long-term loans, even to eligible families who live off base. If you plan to rent only until government housing is available, it's important that you report to the housing department no later than 30 days after your marriage, Cutter said.

"If the sponsor comes in within 30 days, the eligibility date for housing will be the date of the marriage. If they wait until after 30 days, they'll go on the housing list as of the day

they report," Cutter said.

In order to be placed on a waiting list for government housing, you must bring your marriage license and proof that you have obtained command sponsorship for your dependent(s) to the housing office.

The housing department, located in building 455 at Marine Corps Base Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, is open Mondays through Fridays from 7:30 a.m. until 4 p.m., except Wednesdays, when they close at 12:30 p.m. No appointment is necessary, but plan to arrive at least a half-hour before closing time.



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



My, how things have changed.



However, San Diego must be effective in its ball-control offense and keep the 49ers' offense off the field. That also means not turning the ball









Highlights: Game was decided in the closing moments - the Colts won it when Jim O'Brien kicked a 32-yard field goal with five seconds remaining ... Dallas' Chuck Howley becomes the first defensive player to win the award and remains the only MVP from a losing Super Bowl team. The Colts won despite managing a meager 69 yards rushing on 31 attempts, and they were intercepted twice.

SUPER BOWL VI — Dallas 24, Miami 3

Highlights: Dallas took a 10-0 lead in the second quarter and never looked back, becoming the first NFC team other than Green Bay to win a Super Bowl ... The Cowboys' Roger Stauboch is named Most Valuable Player, the fifth time in six years that a quarterbock wins the

award. Staubach was named MVP after filling the airwaves for all of 119 yards ... Miami plays in its first of three straight Super Bowls.

SUPER BOWL VII - Miami 14, Washington 7

Highlights: Miami led 14-O in the fourth quarter, when Washington's offense finally awakened with an impressive 79-yard drive. But when the Redskins went for the end zone, Miami defensive back Jake Scott intercepted a pass intended for Charley Taylor and returned it 55 yards.

The Dolphins then tried to put the game away with a field goal, but it was blocked and the Redskins turned it into a touchdown when Miomi kicker Garo Yepremian tried to throw the ball and instead fumbled it. The Dolphins held on for the victory, though, to complete what remains the only unbeaten season in NFL history. Yepremian becomes immortalized in "NFL Bloopers" for his ridiculous pass attempt.

SUPER BOWL VIII -Miami 24, Minnesota 7

Highlights: Larry Csonka's 2-yard touchdown plunge made the score 24-0 in the third quarter. Csanka rushes for 145 yards and was named the game's MVP as Miami's ground game dominates Minnesota's formed "Purple People Eater" defense

Vikings become the first two-time loser of the Super Bowl ... Miami joins Green Bay as the only two-time Super Bowl winners.

SUPER BOWL IX - Pittsburgh 36, Minnesota 6

Highlights: Pittsburgh's "Steel Curtain" defense makes its Super Bowl debut, dominating the Vikings. Minnesota's "Purple People Eaters," meanwhile, has its hands full stopping Steelers running back Franco Harris, who sets two Super Bowl records by rushing for 158 yards on 34 carries and scoring one touchdown. In a game the Steelers won on the ground,

SUPER BOWL X - Pittsburgh 21, Dallas 17

Highlights: Dallas signal caller Roger Staubach, who made the "Hail Mory" pass part of football lore, heaved another one at the end of this game that almost won it for the Cowboys. This time, it went unanswered ... Steelers receiver Lynn Swann sets a new standard of grace with his diving catch of an overthrown pass from Terry Bradshaw. To make the 40-yard reception, Swann had to leap into the air, tip the ball over the hands of a defender and catch the ball on his way down to the turf. The catch has become the most famous in Super Bowl history. Swann, who suffered a concussion two weeks earlier in the AFC championship game, was named Most Valuable Player after catching four passes for 161 yards and one touchdown

SUPER BOWL XI - Oakland 32, Minnesata 14

Highlights: Raiders quarterback Ken Stobler and receiver Fred Biletnikoff shred the Viking defense to pieces as Minnesoto loses its fourth Super Bowl in eight years ... An AFC team wins the Super

"Doomsday Defense" steals the show from Denver's "Orange Crush" in the first Super Bowl ployed indoors. Led by linemen Horvey Martin and Rondy White, forces

seven Denver turnovers in the first half. By game's end, the Cowboys had intercepted four passes and recovered four fumbles, including one recovered by Martin. Together Martin and White put constant pressure on Broncos quarterback Craig Morton, limiting Denver to just 35 net yards passing. ... For the first time since its inception, Super Bowl winners (\$18,000) and losers (\$9,000) shares are increased

SUPER BOWL XIII - Pittsburgh 35, Dallas 31

Highlights: Arguably the greatest Super Bowl ever played, the game matched the two dominant teams of the 1970s ... Trailing by 18 points in the second half, the Cowboys rally for two touchdowns but fall short. Dallas missed out on a third touchdown when seldom-used tight end Jackie Smith dropped a pass in the end zone, the most famous dropped pass in Super Bowl history.

SUPER BOWL XIV - Pittsburgh 31, Los Angeles Rams

Highlights: The Rams were overwhelming underdogs, but Los Angeles quarterback Vince Ferragamo "guaranteed" victory, stirring up memories of Joe Namoth 11 years earlier

take a 19-17 lead.

Pittsburgh then came up with big plays on offense and took the lead for good on a 73-yard touchdown pass from Bradshaw to John Stallworth. The "Steel Curtain" defense also rose to the occasion, and the Steelers became the first team ever to win a Super Bowl after trailing at halftime and the first to win four Super Bowls.

SUPER BOWL XV - Oakland 27, Philodelphia 10

Notes: The Raiders raced out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter, and the Eagles never really made a game of it after that. Raiders quarterback Jim Plunkett (13 of 21 for 261 yards, three touchdowns) completes his comeback story. walking away with MVP honors ... In the second half, the only exciting thing to look forward to was commissioner Pete Rozelle's postgame presentation of the Lombardi Trophy to Raiders owner Al Davis. Davis and the NFL were in the middle of an ugly courtroom battle as Davis pushed forward on his plans to move the Raiders to LA. Tensions rose as Rozelle presented Davis with the trophy, but the encounter was cordial.

SUPER BOWL XVI - San Francisco 26, Cincinnati 21

by its huge offensive line (known as "The Hogs") and workhorse fullback John Riggins ("The Big Diesel") against Miami's defense, nicknamed "The Killer B's."

Ironically, it was Miami special teams player Fulton Walker who appeared to break the game open with his 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown.

But trailing 17-13 and facing a crucial fourth-and-1 late in the game, the Redskins gave the ball to Riggins. The Big Diesel burst through the line, broke a tackle on the outside and rambled 43 yards for a touchdown to put Washington up for good. Riggins bulled his way for a Super Bowl-record 166 yards behind The Hogs.

SUPER BOWL XVIII — Los

Angeles Raiders 38, Washinaton 9

Highlights: Late in the first half, Washington trailed by only five, 14-9, and had a chance to settle for that and come back with a strong second half. Instead, Redskins quarterback Joe Theismonn backed up near his own end zone and attempted a screen

pass in the left flat. Raiders linebacker Jack Squirek picked off the wounded duck and waltzed into the end zone to put LA. up 21-9, and Washington was finished.

Two Raiders touchdowns in the third quarter made it 35-9, and what could have been a good game became the first of many "yawners" that have become commonplace in the last decode ... The city of Los Angeles celebrates its first Super Bowl victory ... Raiders running back Morcus Allen busts loose for 191 yards. He capped his performance with a dazzling 74-yord touch-

SUPER BOWL XXI -- New York Giants 39, Denver 20

Highlights: The Giants trailed, 10-9, at the half, then scorched the Broncos with 30 second-half points ... Setting a new standard for marksmanship, Giants quarterback Phil Simms entered the Super Bowl record book for consecutive completions (10) and completion percentage (88),

and he completed every pass he threw in the second half. He finished with 22 completions in 25 attempts, for 268 yards and three touchdowns, running away with MVP hon-

SUPER BOWL XXII -Washington 42, Denver 10

Highlights: When the Broncos raced out to a 10-0 lead in the first quarter and the Redskins fumbled on the ensuing kickoff, it appeared that another Super Bowl rout was at hand. It was, but it was the Redskins who delivered it. Washington recovered its own fumble, then proceeded to score 35 unanswered points in the second quarter to make this one a real yawner in the second ... Washington running bock Timmy Smith, never to be heard from again, set a Super Bowl record by rushing for 204 yards and scores two touchdowns ... Redskins quarterback Doug Williams left the game in the first quarter with a leg injury, but returned to throw for 340

yards and four touchdowns. Williams completed 9-of-11 passes for 228 yards in the second avarter alone.

SUPER BOWL XXIII - San Francisco 20, Cincinnati 16

Highlights: Basically uneventful for the first 45 minutes, this game exploded with excitement on the first play of the fourth quarter. Stanford Jennings ran a kickoff back 94 yards for a touchdown that tied the score at 13. Kicker Jim Breech gave the Bengals a 16-13 lead with a late field goal.

Weaving his two minute magic, San Francisco quarterback Joe Montana engineered a length-of-the-field touchdown drive with under two minutes left to win it for the Niners ... San Francisco receiver Jerry Rice ran wild in the Cincinnati secondary, catching 11 passes for 215 yards. Both those numbers represent Super Bowl records.



The Giants' 17-play, 91-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter ate nine minutes off the clock and was one of the most memorable in Super Bowl history.

Although it was wellplayed and went down to the wire, this gome somehow isn't as memorable as some other Super Bowls.

SUPER BOWL XXVI -Washington 37, Buffalo 24
Highlights: The Redskins

jumped out to a 17-0 lead at the half, and began the third quarter with a quick touchdown set up by former Waionae athlete Kurt Gouveia's interception and return to the Buffalo two-yard line. That made the score 24-0, and by that time everybody watching started feeling the pangs of Super Bowl blowout nausea. It also rang up the NFC victory streak in the big game to eight straight, making people very bored of the AFC's futility.

SUPER BOWL XXVII -Dallas 52, Buffalo 17

Highlights: Dollas quarterback Troy Aikman sparked a Cowboys offense that lit up the scoreboard for 52 points as he completed 22 of 30 passes for 273 yards and four touchdowns. After Buffalo closed to within two touchdowns on the last play of the third quarter, Aikman put the Bills away with a 45-yard end zone strike to Alvin Harper, making the score 38-17 and clinching the victory for the Cowboys.

SUPER BOWL XXVIII -Dallas 30, Buffalo 13 -

Highlights: The Bills took a 13-6 lead into halftime, but get outscared 24-0 in the second half as turnovers spell a record fourth straight Super Bowl defeat for Buffalo. The Bills had more first downs than Dallas (22-20) and had nearly as many total yards (314 to 341), but two Thurman Thomas fumbles and and interception thrown by Jim Kelly proved to be costly. Thomas was held to 37 yards on 16 carries while his counterpart, Emmitt Smith, carried 30 times for 132 yards and a touchdown.
