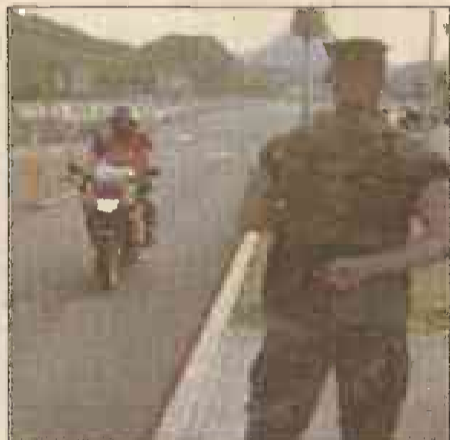

Accident prompts safety checks

Random checks of motorcycle safety cards for all riders exiting and entering the front and rear gates went into effect here Wednesday.

This latest measure is being taken in response to a motorcycle accident outside the front gate Oct. 9, involving an inexperienced rider who borrowed a friend's motorcycle, said SSgt. Daniel J. Bowen, traffic safety manager, Base Safety Office.

"A lot of times, a Marine will

sell his bike to another Marine and leave the DoD decal on the bike," said Bowen. "It's a requirement to take a motorcycle safety course to get the decal. Without a safety card, you aren't allowed to ride a motorcycle on base."

More than 90 percent of riders who are involved in accidents didn't take a rider safety course, said Bowen.

"When you sell or loan a bike to a buddy, if he doesn't have a rider safety card, you will be held responsible if anything happens," said

Bowen. "That's why the random checks are planned. We're not out to get everybody. We just want everybody safe and up to regulations."

The planned checks will run three to five days in duration, two times a month, said Bowen. If a rider doesn't have a safety card, they won't be allowed to enter or leave base on the bike.

The checks have been conducted in the past and quite a few violators were discovered, said Bowen. And due to the recent checks, more rid-

ers have signed up for the safety course.

"Motorcyclists face more of a risk when they are on the road and riding requires more physical skill than driving an automobile," said Bowen. "This course instills basic riding principles and develops the physical skills needed to ride. It just makes you a better rider and more aware of what you are doing."

Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 363, the Red Lions, conducted a decontamination exercise here Oct. 28 which had Marines mopping up in MOPP four.

Otherwise known as Mission Oriented Protective Posture gear, this chemical protection suit gets a little uncomfortable, especially when Marines must continue regular operations,

according to Marines like LCpl. Juan A. Hernandez, ordnance man, HMH-363.

"But the experience helps us adapt to it," he continued. "It's better to get used to it and mess up performing operations now than to do it when nuclear and biological chemicals are actually in the air."

Along with decontaminating pilots, crew and an injured person who required immediate medical attention, the

Marines also had to decontaminate an entire CH-53D Sea Stallion. This is the first time any squadron has actually decontaminated an entire helicopter, according to Sgt. Joe Bailey, training noncommissioned officer. "It's very important they train in every aspect," he said. "Chemical weapons are accessible to anybody these days. We have to be prepared for anything

Domestic violence law is retroactive

Any misdemeanor domestic violence assault conviction will prohibit servicemembers from carrying issued weapons.

A law passed in Sept. 1996, U.S.C. 18 section 922, prohibits anyone convicted of a domestic violence offense from owning or handling firearms or ammunition under any circumstance.

"The biggest part of the law is it is retroactive," said Capt. Paul L. Starita, trial counsel, Legal Services Center. "So, a sergeant major who was convicted of a misdemeanor assault crime

against his wife, when he was a private, in his first marriage back in Onslow County could be affected.

"The letter of the law is perfectly clear, any past conviction precludes the use or ownership of any firearm," added Starita. "The only problem is when a National Crime Information Center background check is conducted, it only shows assault. Not who the crime was committed against."

Domestic violence is not a crime, it is an assault conviction under civilian and military law. If the military is expected to check all its personnel for domestic violence convictions it would be nec-

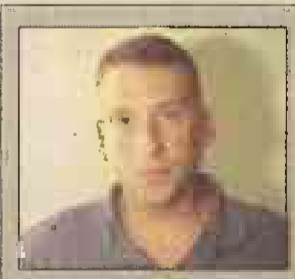
essary to investigate all assault charges any servicemember would have on record explained Starita.

"According to the law it would also be illegal for a commander to send a Marine for rifle requalification, if he was knowledgeable of that Marines conviction," said Starita.

Another issue is how are servicemembers who have been substantiated by the base's Case Review Committee as having committed domestic violence offenses are to be handled, said Starita.

"What is considered domes-

tic violence on base and is substantiated by the CRC might be merely considered a public disturbance out in town," said Starita. "An example would be an argument, out in town it would not be considered assault until a threat is conveyed, but on base, a verbal altercation could be substantiated as a low level domestic violence incident.

"No one will know until DoD comes down with an official policy on how these incidents are going to be viewed," added Starita.

In the military there is no distinction between a misde-

meanor or a felony crime. Serious offenses are handled by Special and General court martial. "The policy is going to have to encompass a broad range of situations and I believe that is why we don't have a policy yet," said Starita. "I would not expect this to have a big impact on the services, because anyone convicted of a court martial now has basically ended their career. Many cases have been substantiated by the CRC, but I have only worked three or four domestic violence court martials in my two years here and they all were punitively discharged."

Legislation is now pending before the House of Representatives to tone down the bill.

that may happen. And these Marines must be confident that they will still be able to function in MOPP four."

"The training gave us familiarization on how to work in these types of tactical conditions and what to do to when we are presented with chemical weapons," said LCpl. Rafael L. Wilkins, ordnanceman. "Training like this helps us become more combat ready and effective."

The Marines train for dealing with NBC every month, according to Bailey.

And they get hands-on training approximately three-times a quarter.

But all this training isn't necessarily because the Marines need their skills tweaked in the NBC area. It's also intended to boost the squadron's chances to deploy first when trouble arises, Bailey said.

"If anyone has to go, we want to be first," he said. "We train hard, that way, we'll be able to knock out anything we're tasked to do."

The Marines honed vital NBC skills, corpsmen learned how to treat injuries in an NBC situation and a Red Lions helicopter got a very detailed bath. If trouble pops up near the Pacific, the Lions are ready to pounce.

Peleliu crew honors heroes

ABOARD USS PELELIU — During World War II, strange and remote names became part of the American dialect — Guadalcanal, Iwo Jima, Okinawa — names which forever will be linked with the courageous struggle of America's march across the Pacific.

One central Pacific island in particular bears a legacy as the site of some of the most savage fighting in the Pacific campaign — Peleliu.

Though the name is not as well known as other battle sites, those who were there or know WWII history know the tiny atoll was literally transformed into hell on earth and remains a striking reminder of the bloody battle in which the U.S. Marine Corps fought and prevailed.

The legacy of the island is alive today in the Navy and Marine Corps. The amphibious assault ship USS Peleliu proudly bears its name in honor of the heroism and exemplary conduct Navy and Marine Corps personnel dis-

played during the battle to capture the island.

The ship conducted an official ceremony Sept. 24 to dedicate a "Hall of Heroes" in honor of the eight Marines who were presented the Medal of Honor for their gallantry in the fight for Peleliu. The date chosen to dedicate the hallowed passageway was auspicious and symbolic.

"It wasn't by accident that we chose today and this very hour to dedicate this hall," said Capt. Gary Jones, executive officer, USS Peleliu. "This is as close as we are going to get to Peleliu island, which is 305 miles away. We have been planning this ceremony with the support of the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) since prior to our departure from San Diego almost a month ago.

"The passageway is rededicated to honor all those who served and sacrificed on the island of Peleliu," Jones continued. "Representative of that sacrifice, the photographs and citations of the eight Marines who were awarded the Medal of Honor will now

be put on permanent display. The eight stars on our ship's seal will now be more tangible and more meaningful to all who serve on board the USS Peleliu."

During the ceremony, the citation of each awardee was read by a Marine from 13th MEU(SOC). After eight bells were rung and a ribbon cutting, the new Hall of Heroes was open for all to view.


Those who received the Medal of Honor were Cpl. Lewis K. Bausell, PFC Arthur J. Jackson, PFC Richard E. Kraus, PFC John D. New, PFC Wesley Phelps, Capt. Everett P. Pope, PFC Charles H. Roan and 1stLt. Carlton R. Rouh.

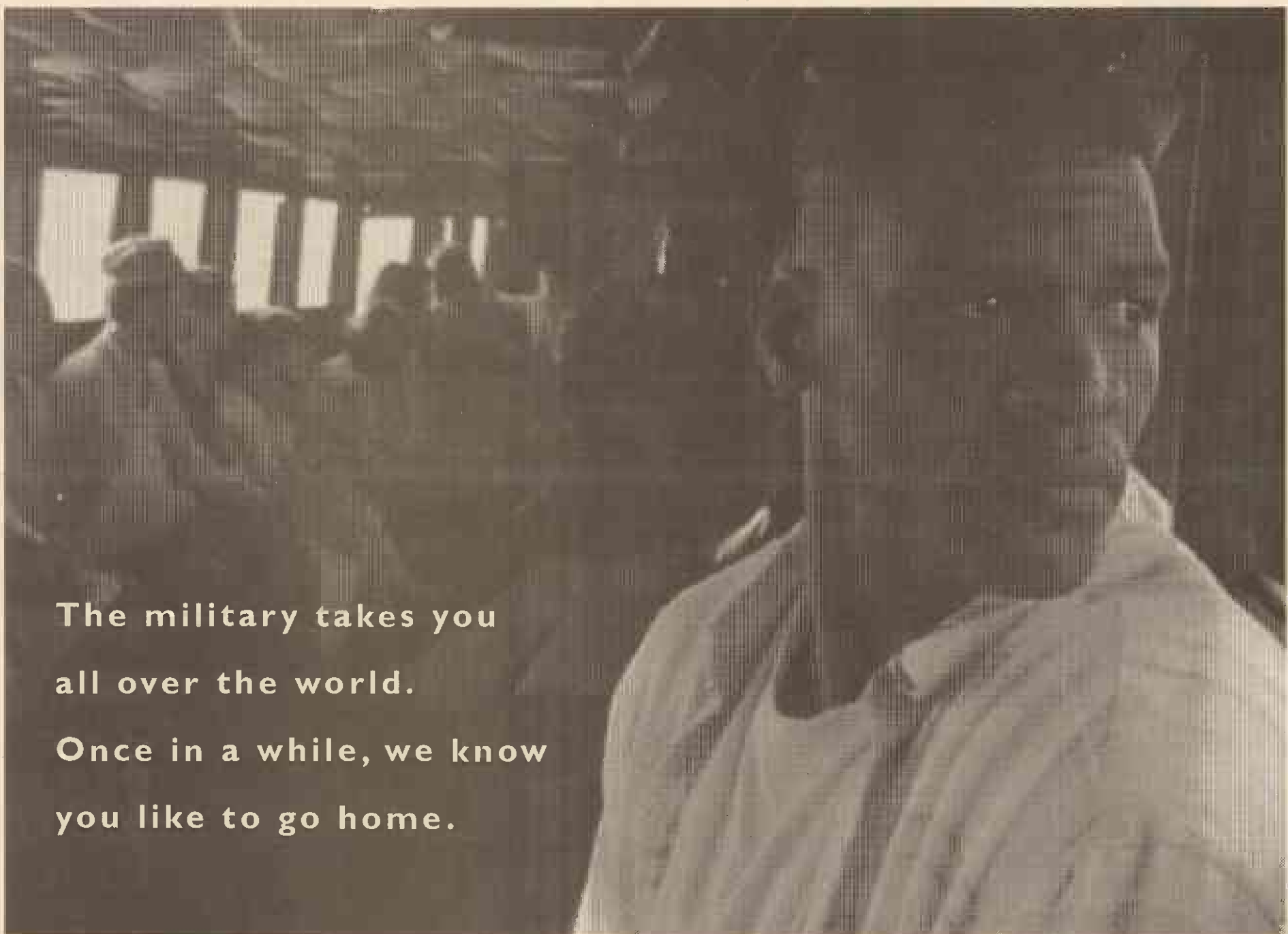
"Up to this day and this point, we have moved closer to the island of Peleliu," said Cmdr. J.L. Precup, USS Peleliu's chaplain. "But each moment of this day, we have also moved farther away in time from the battle that happened over 50 years ago. That battle transcends space and time. Impact Area

Do not leave your child unattended

In the past couple of weeks the base has experienced a high number of reported unattended child calls.

When asked, many parents were unaware of the regulations regarding children and what constitutes an unattended child. Base Regulation 1006, Control of Children addresses parental responsibility regarding the supervision of young children here.

Children under 5 must be attended by a responsible person at all times here. Children under 10 but over 5 must be attended by a responsible person at all times while at beaches, theaters, swimming pools and other recreational areas excluding neighborhood playgrounds.

Children over 10 may be left alone in quarters or may care for younger children provided they are of sufficient maturity to take appropriate action in the event of an emergency. They must be capable of exercising

sound judgement and authority in controlling children.

It is strongly recommended children under 12 not be given child-care responsibilities for younger children given their lack of maturity and difficulty exercising sound judgement during stressful events such as injuries, fights, intruders and other things. Children 12 and older who are going to have child-care responsibilities should attend the American Red Cross babysitting course, which is offered regularly here. For information on training dates and times call 257-3150.

Of significant concern is the lack of supervision of children under 6 while outside, especially at local playgrounds. The lack of adult supervision for these young children can needlessly endanger them and places them at greater risk for all types of harmful experiences. Even on a controlled access base such as ours, there are occurrences of molestation, breaking and entering and sexual and physical assault, to name just a few harmful situations.

Why place your child in a situation

where they may have to cope with an adult or older/larger child intent on doing them harm? Young children are not equipped emotionally, intellectually or physically to protect themselves from older and larger individuals who can easily manipulate them. They need a protective parent to ensure they remain safe and unharmed.

The best reason for exercising close supervision of young children is not because the base regulation mandates it but because you love them and are concerned about their well-being at all times. Playgrounds may seem like a safe, protective environment, but without adequate adult supervision they can quickly become magnets for many types of harmful events for a child.

If you are interested in learning more about safety, enrichment or parenting of a young child, the New Parent Support Program has a staff of professional home visitors who can meet with you in your home to answer any of your parenting questions. Call 257-9965, extension 333.

As an NCO, I am a lance corporal's direct superior. I want

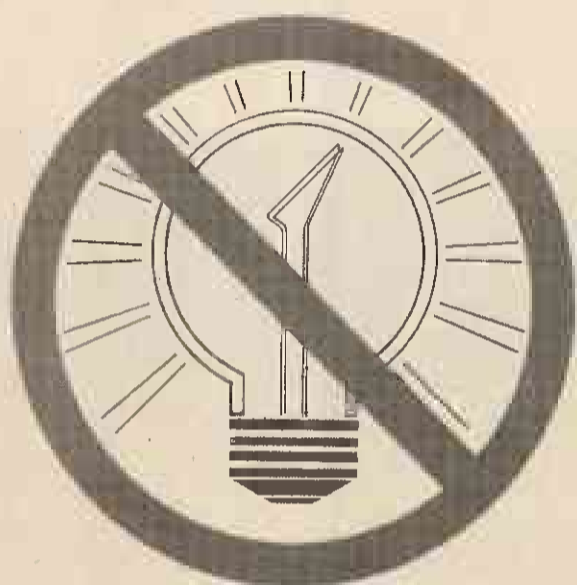
him or her to come to me with their questions and problems. Would they be comfortable in doing so if they have the idea I think I'm above them and could care less about their needs?

A good leader leads by example. How can I be the example if I am separated from my junior Marines?

Maybe the reason SNCOs are separated from sergeants and below for PT is because they just can't keep up with us young whipper-snappers...but that's another story.





New female uniforms ready for Pageant

Two new uniforms will appear in the base's birthday ball pageant Friday at Dewey Square, enhancing coverage of women in Corps history.

Not only are the Korean and Vietnam War era uniforms a breakthrough for the pageant, thanks to Raymond A. McGarrigle, a certified public accountant in New York, they're making MCB Hawaii's pageant unique, according to Richard J. Keogh, USMC Ret., pageant consultant and advisor.

"To our knowledge, no other pageant in the Marine Corps has these uniforms," said Keogh. "We're very fortunate to be able to expand the pageant with the Korean War uniform."

The first female Marine unit became a part of the Corps in 1943. They were involuntarily called to active-duty for the first time in 1950, during the Korean Conflict.

The Vietnam era uniform represents another significant place female Marines had in history, he continued. As many as 40 female Marines were serving with headquarters elements throughout the conflict.

"These women should be recognized," said Keogh.

McGarrigle donated three boxes of collectable military gear, including hats, handbags with mirrors and combs, female Marine utilities from World War II and more.

"We depend on these types of donations to keep the pageant running," said Keogh. "The Pageant wouldn't happen without them."

And thanks to a generous New York accountant, the pageant has expanded beyond anything the Corps has experienced. It also allows proper recognition of dedicated women in the Corps' history who sacrificed right beside men.

Pageant gets authenticity from veteran

An Army Vietnam veteran has MCB Hawaii's birthday ball uniform pageant running on guns and needles.

Albert C. Mongeon, a 49-year-old, electrician with Facilities Maintenance here has provided the pageant with two old rifles and a pistol for four years and needlework for three. Each are rare commodities, but he said he's happy to help out the Corps on its birthday.

"It doesn't do any good to keep them locked up in a safe," said the Kailua, Hawaii, native. "Besides, the more authentic we can make the pageant, the better. Providing actual weapons from different time periods makes the event a true slice of history."

Mongeon is definitely no stranger to military pride. He served in the Army for four years, two in Vietnam. During his years in Vietnam, Mongeon earned the Combat Infantryman's Badge. He was working in his primary military occupational specialty as a radio intercept operator by day, and jumping in gun pits to provide direct support for Marines with 81mm mortars by night.

Even after he was discharged from the service, he stayed with the military. He became a DoD employee and began working at Schofield, his last duty station. He was transferred here in 1982.

Four years ago, he began lending the birthday ball pageant committee his M-1 Garand and M-1 Carbine with bayonets and his Smith & Wesson Victory Model .38 pistol with shoulder holster. All three weapons were used in World War II and the M-1 Garand and M-1 Carbine were used in the Korean Conflict. The Carbine was also used in the Vietnam War.

Three years ago, he began lending a talent the pageant was in dire need of — sewing.

"He provides a resource that doesn't exist anywhere else," said Maj. Richard J. Keogh, USMC Ret., pageant consultant and advisor. "Last year, he had to literally piece each uniform back together bit by bit. If it hadn't been for his skill, I don't know what we would've done."

The uniforms are all authentic, according to Keogh. The materials are very old and difficult to maintain. But Mongeon said he doesn't mind putting in the extra hours.

"I have the skills and two sewing machines," said Mongeon. "I learned how to sew in the service. I canned a lot of extra money by sewing service stripes on for people."

But the only profit he's making for his stitching now is the pride of watching his handiwork displayed in one of the Corps' most important ceremonies of the year.

"It's a real challenge because the clothing is decades old and the material is ripe," said Mongeon. "I like seeing it all come together."

Along with being a skilled tailor, Mongeon also has a plethora of other titles. He's the former president of the Windward Council Navy League, former president of the Civilian Employee Association, an 11-year volunteer game warden for the Military Police Department, is on the board of directors for the Hawaii Rifle Association, member of the Kailua Chamber of Commerce, a member of Disabled American Veterans and he's the mastermind behind the fireworks show over Kailua Bay every Independence Day. He's been shooting the fireworks display since 1971.

"He's one of those unnoticed heroes," said Keogh. "If we didn't have someone like him who could make this pageant happen, we simply wouldn't have it."

'Help us improve service,' Anderson Hall officials ask

Anderson Hall, the base mess hall which serves thousands of Marines daily, is seeking ways to improve service and variety and is asking its patrons for help.

The staff wants to cut waste, pinpoint problem areas and offer a wider variety of foods and services for the Marines here, said MSgt. David Steward, mess hall manager.

"In the past, we have had problems with folks coming in and eating, then taking more food out to their friends back at the barracks or taking more than they will eat," said Steward. "All of this makes us lose money."

The mess hall operates on a basic daily allowance for each meal a Marine receives, said CWO3 Alan Brandon, food services officer. The allowance consists of \$2.53 for lunch

and dinner and \$1.27 for breakfast. "For each patron who comes in to eat, we're given this allowance per meal," said Steward. "We aren't given credit for each meal we serve. We're only credited for the number of people who pass through the doors."

Anderson Hall doesn't operate to make money, said Steward. The intention is to break even. All the money made from customers goes to the purchase of food and supplies.

"If we accounted for each meal we served, we could provide better service," said Steward. "If each person would come in and sign in for their portion, we would be better off. The more people who come in, the more food we could buy. We could offer steak and lobster once a week, but we need the customer's help."

"We could also save money if we wasted less food," said MSgt. David A. Smith, food service technician. "Most

people go through the line once, get a lot of food, then waste it. Go through the line, get enough food and if you are still hungry, go back and get more. Never get more food than you will eat."

"Get what you want, but eat what you get," said Steward. "That's our motto here. At most mess halls you can't get a second helping. Here, you can eat whatever you want."

Another problem Anderson Hall has been facing is lost silverware, plates and cups, said Smith.

Anderson Hall personnel simply want everyone's cooperation in making it a better mess hall, said Steward.

"We have a wonderful facility and our food service Marines work hard to support the base," said Brandon. "But we are always seeking improvement. With everyone's cooperation, we can serve the base better and everyone will be happier."

New cover destined for fleet

A new improved Marine Corps cover will hit the shelves of uniform shops soon.

The new cover featuring stitching around the top edges in order to keep its shape longer should be in the uniform shop by the beginning of the year, according to Michelle Jenkins, MCB Hawaii Uniform Shop.

Gunny receives \$3,000 check for \$3 invention, bit of innovation

A Marine from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 363 here received a \$3,000 check Oct. 29 for a \$3 invention which could save the Aviation Support Element more than \$1 million annually.

Gunnery Sgt. Patrick D. Dickens, a Cleveland native serving with HMH-363 as a quality assurance chief, teamed up three years ago with SSgt. Raymond Flaugh, an airframes mechanic from Marine Corps Air Station Tustin, Calif., to invent a special tool. Since their invention was put into use, it has saved the Corps hundreds of thousands of dollars, according to Dickens.

"I first was stationed at Tustin five years ago this December, right before we left for Operation Restore Hope in Somalia," the 39-year-old Marine said. "The morning I checked in, some helicopter blades had folded and were dragging on the ground."

Dickens had a technical explanation for what hap-

pened, but in layman's terms, the helo's pitchlocks, which help in supporting the blades, failed. This malfunction allowed the blades to fall, damaging the swash plate, flight controls and rotor head — all of which are expensive to repair.

"One incident in particular caused \$149,000 in damages," said Dickens. "And I've seen worse."

The incident happened again one week later.

Dickens and Flaugh got together to mastermind a plan to stop blade dropping. They took a shipping cap, a small one-inch diameter, metal cap used in shipping gear, and put a piece of machined metal in it which stuck out approximately five-sixteenths of an inch.

A set of six of these devices, now called pitchlock caps, were made. They were screwed into the pitchlock before the helicopter blades were folded, then the pitchlock caps were removed after they were folded.

"The squadron hasn't dropped blades since," said Dickens. "That doesn't mean these things are a 100 percent guarantee, but I'm

sure they're helping."

The Marine inventors submitted their idea to have more of these devices made and distributed to the other CH-53D Sea Stallion helicopter squadrons in the Marine Corps. However, the paperwork was lost in the shuffle during HMH-363's transition from MCAS Tustin to here in July 1996.

Then, about nine months ago, a squadron here dropped blades.

"So, I submitted the idea again in September 1996," said Dickens. "It was worked through fast. Now

all the squadrons here have at least one set."

Since the squadrons were dropping blades approximately twice a year, with each drop costing around \$200,000 to \$300,000 (totalling approximately \$1 to \$1.5 million for ASE each year), the \$3 invention came in very handy.

"It wasn't anything to make," said Dickens.

Dickens and Flaugh are both \$3,000 richer, but the biggest benefit of their little contraptions is the green stuff that's staying in ASE's piggy bank.

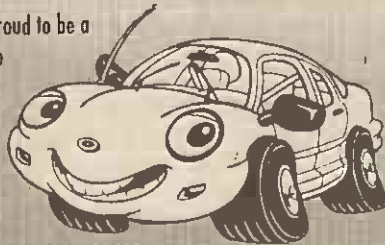

Self Help is virtual vault of tools

Providing more than just lawn mowers for cutting grass in housing, MCB Hawaii's Self Help here is a consolidation of the older housing and military self help services.

Located in building 1505, next to 802 Housing and across from the Kaneohe Klipper Golf Course, Self Help provides support for military units and occupants of base housing alike.

"We have two sections under our consolidated Self Help which work essentially the same as before, except it's under one roof," said Sgt. John A. Trimble, combat engineer, Self Help. "The housing section is the same and still signs out lawn mowers and home care materials while the military section still helps units with self help projects."

The housing section also has weed eaters, hedge trimmers, rakes, shovels, air conditioner filters and replacement glass for light fixtures. The military section has lawn care materials, paint,

paint brushes and rollers, fluorescent bulbs, spackling compound, floor and ceiling tile, screening material, nails and a custom sign shop, said Trimble.

"To get something from the housing section, all one needs is a military ID, be at least 10 years old and have an address here," said Trimble. "Once they finish with the equipment it has to be turned in for the next user."

Self Help is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturday from 8 to noon, said Trimble.

"Some of the busiest times for Self Help are lunch and an hour before closing," said Trimble. "Saturday is the busiest day."

Family Advocacy Program Frequently Asked Questions:

What is the CCR?

The Coordinated Community Response is the Marine Corps' response to the problem of domestic violence in the Marine community. Specifically, it is Marine Corps Order 17523B, published in 1994. This MCO states the Marine Corps will have zero tolerance for domestic violence, will promote family safety and considers domestic violence to be a community problem.

What are the goals of the CCR?

The goals of the CCR are threefold: to protect victims, to create a climate to eliminate spouse and child abuse and to hold offenders accountable.

Who is involved in the CCR?

Everyone who lives or works in the Marine Corps community is involved in the CCR. This means all personnel (active duty and civilian) and all family members must be responsible for eliminating domestic violence in the Marine Corps community. This requires all people to get involved and not feel "It's none of my business. I don't want to get involved."

Specifically, all persons working or living in the Marine community are responsible for the identification (noticing or suspecting occurrences of domestic violence) and reporting (notifying authorities) allegations of domestic violence.

How do I report allegations of spouse or child abuse?

The Military Police are the 24-hour point of contact for allegations of domestic violence. You may also call the Family Advocacy Program during duty hours if you are not sure about calling the MPs. The MPs can be reached at 257-2123, while FAP can be reached at 257-3655.

What happens when I call in an allegation of domestic violence?

The MPs will respond to the scene of the allegation. They will first try to establish safety for all family members. They will also begin an investigation. This may include MPs talking to persons involved or MPs notifying other legal authorities (Criminal Investigative Division, Naval Criminal Investigative Service). If the MPs determine there may be credibility to the allegations, they will separate the couple by removing the active duty member. The active duty member will then be released to his or her unit. There will be a legal investigation to

determine if any Uniform Code of Military Justice laws were broken and a FAP assessment to assess what the problems are within the family. The case will then go to the CRC, where it will be determined whether abuse occurred or not.

What else does the CCR consist of?

Other responses to domestic violence included in the CCR are recommendations for command actions in allegations of domestic violence, recommendations for programs to treat causes of domestic violence, services for the victims and case management by FSC personnel.

Fifth graders visit 4th Force

Enchanted Lakes Elementary School students got a taste of the Marine Corps Oct. 30 when they visited 4th Force Reconnaissance Company here.

Fifty-four fifth graders made the trip to get a better look at what their "adoptive Marines" do all day.

"As part of our Adopt-a-School and DARE programs, we brought out the kids to show them what we do is real and not just something they see on TV or in the movies," said 1stSgt. Curtis Barnhill, company first sergeant.

"We just wanted to give the kids a glimpse of what Marines do," said Shery Matsumoto, Enchanted Lakes Elementary teacher. "The kids loved it."

The students were first shown a demonstration of how Recon Marines insert scout swimmers. After explaining the job and equipment of a scout swimmer, five scuba divers, who had gone unnoticed by the children even though they

were less than 100 feet away, surfaced to their surprise.

"I really like when the divers came up," said Alex Mullinaux. "I never saw anything like that before."

The students were then given a tour of the paraloft where Recon keeps its parachuting equipment, and a quick brief on parachuting

gear and how Marines use it. Then they had a chance to play with Marine radios and field telephones.

The field trip also served as a reminder to other units with Adopt-a-School programs to be innovative when planning activities with them.

"We wanted to show other units that they just don't

have to go out to the school — bring the kids here and get them involved," Barnhill said.

Loading back up on the bus, the students were sad to go, but glad they had the opportunity to come.

"This was fun," said Jhun Agag, 10. "It was a lot better than going to see that play Alice in Wonderland."

Marines take Army down, 91-55

The Army's basketball team swaggered into the Main Gym here Oct. 30 wearing ties, slacks and nice shoes — a weak attempt at emulating the Chicago Bulls, who travel everywhere looking stylish.

However, the soldiers' basketball game looked more like the Dallas Mavericks, as the Hawaii Marines spanked them 91-55 in varsity basketball action.

Led by crowd-pleasing point guard John Nichols, skywalking forward Jimmy Wheeler, hustler Victor Collins and shoot-at-all-costs center Ken Nelson, the Marines' game plan worked to perfection.

"We wanted to work the ball down low," said Darrell Henson, the Marines' coach. "We were more athletic on the inside, and I felt we could beat them there."

Beat them they did. Nelson scored

on a variety of turnaround jumpers, drives to the hole and putbacks. Wheeler was a force on the inside, collecting defensive rebounds and putbacks on the offensive end.

"I was just trying to help the team," said Wheeler. "My strength is rebounding."

The Army responded to the Marines' inside game by — what else? — shooting three-pointers. It worked for a few minutes, but as the old basketball saying goes, "You live by the three, you die by the three."

The Marines simply stuck with a 2-3 zone and let the soldiers shoot themselves out of the game. After an early 8-0 run to take a 13-6 lead, the soldiers were done. The leathernecks pulled back by sticking with their game plan — and running off long rebounds after Army missed shots.

"I was bringing it up the floor as quickly as possible," said Nichols. "We thought they'd put on a press but once we saw they were hanging back, we took it right to them."

And the packed gym, full of boisterous Marines and family members, heckled the Army's players, its fans and even the referees.

With 10 minutes to go in the second half, the only Army fans left were sullen and quiet. The ones who yelled so loudly for the soldiers during their early run mysteriously disappeared.

The Marine victory was convincing. After a 47-28 half-time lead, the teams traded baskets until 10 minutes were left in the second half, when the Marines began pouring it on. It was clear this team is bigger and more athletic than last year's squad.

"I was happy with the way we played," Henson said, "but we still have work to do on some areas. When we're clicking on all cylinders, we'll be a force in the league."

The news is out — the Hawaii Marine women's varsity basketball team is for real.

Word obviously got around after they won their first game — against the defending champion Air Force team, no less — because a large crowd at the Main Gym here watched the tired Marines defeat a strong Army team 63-50, Oct. 30.

The leathernecks controlled the entire game, and were never headed in running their record to 2-0. Carlotta Moore played on top of a 2-3 zone and released on every Army shot (many of which were missed), so when the rebound invariably went to players like Paulette Sangster, a simple outlet pass to Moore usually resulted in a quick score.

"We planned to run them from the beginning," Moore said. "We had to play uptempo because we felt that's what they were going to do to us."

"I wanted to control the boards, control the rebounds," Sangster said. Faced with bigger players on the Army side, she added, "We're the short team of the league, and my plan was to block out and get position."

Their plan worked to perfection, as the Marines leaped to a 21-6 lead with 6:50 to go. They stretched the lead to 34-13 at half. The game appeared well in hand.

But fatigue affected the Marines' play in the second half. After April Ayers suffered a mild ankle sprain, the Marines seemed to lose concentration as the Army closed to within six at 56-50 with 2:05 left in the second half. But the leatherneck defense tight-

ened up and didn't allow the Army to score again.

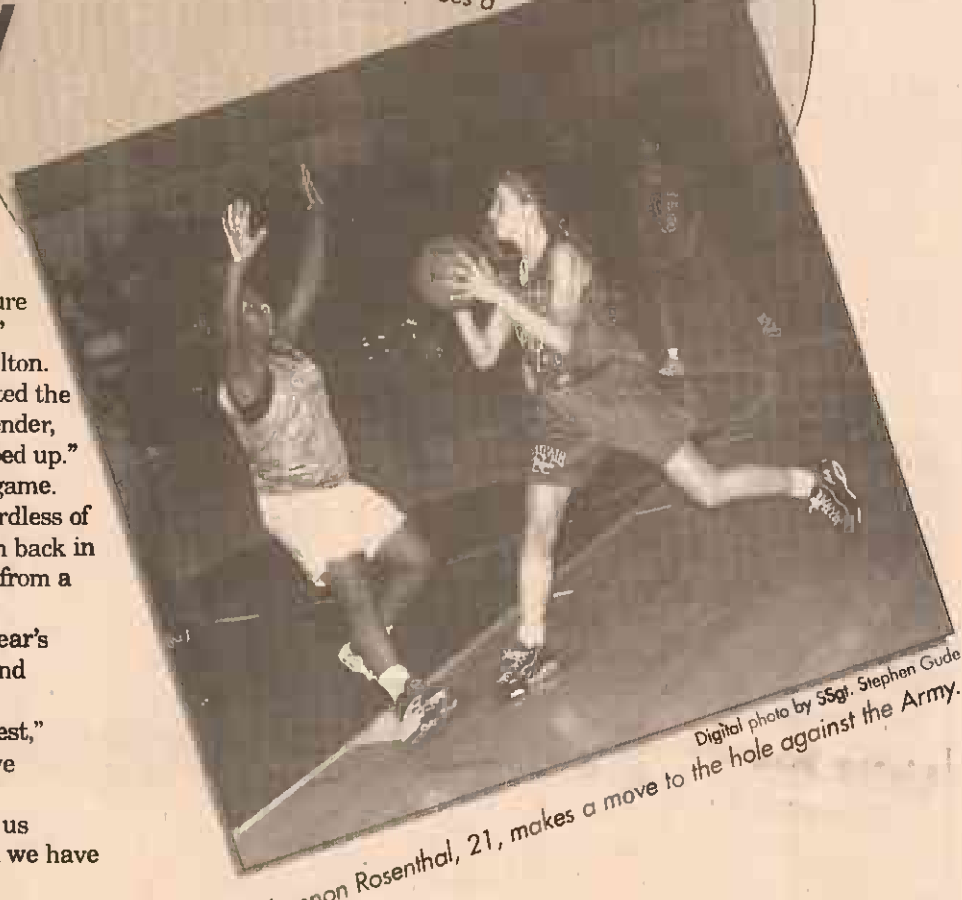
"Our plan was to use pressure defense and make them run," said Marine coach Randy Melton. "When April got hurt, it affected the team because she's a key defender, but the rest of the team stepped up."

Ayers later returned to the game. "You've got to suck it up regardless of the injury. When we let them back in the game, it was just fatigue from a game and a hard practice."

The turnaround from last year's squad has impressed Ayers and Melton.

"We believed we were the best," Ayers said, "and that's how we played."

"Until another team proves us wrong," Melton said, "I think we have the best team."

Fishermen have haven in K-Bay

Plop! splashes an artificial lure just shy of a coral reef. It is quickly engulfed by a papio, while somewhere else on base a spear thunks into a fat parrot fish.

Whether your fishing style includes getting down and getting wet with the fish or staying high and dry on land, K-Bay has the fish for individuals wanting a unique Hawaiian experience.

"The first time I went spearfishing was in a shallow cove at night," said Jason L. Taylor, an armorer with Combat Service Support Group - 3. "We went at night to try and spear parrot

fish and that is when lobster and octopus come out.

"It took me a good 20 minutes to get comfortable being in the water after dark," added Taylor. Hawaii Lightning Rugby takes third in international competition

The Hawaii Lightning Rugby Club, comprised of soldiers, Sailors, Marines and military family members stationed in Hawaii, brought home third place from the Hawaii Harlequins International Rugby Tournament in October at Kapiolani Park. Ratcliff, who has only been practicing with the Lightning for three weeks, scored twice dur-

ing the tournament and is well on his way to achieving Rookie of the Year honors. The Lightning is coached by Dallas Weaver, who formed the team only two months ago through an aggressive campaign of flyers and telephone calls. Always looking for new recruits, the HLRC holds practices every Wednesday at 6 p.m. and every Saturday at noon. No experience is necessary; just a love of the sport and a focused, team-oriented attitude. Ultimate test of endurance, strength coined by Sailor looking for challenge

KONA, Hawaii — Talking with military pals after competing in the 1977 Around-Oahu Bike Race, Navy Cmdr. John Collins tried to figure out who was in better shape — swimmers, bikers or runners. "Swimmers said they were in better shape, but wouldn't race the runners because they didn't want to beat up their knees," said Collins, now a retired Navy captain. "Runners said they were in better shape because swimming was just a skill. And I thought bikers were in the best shape because of articles I had read in Sports Illustrated." So, Collins came up with an ultimate test that would test any type of athlete to find the ultimate athlete — the Ironman. He combined the courses for the 2.4-mile Waikiki Rough Water Swim, 112-mile Around Oahu Bike Race and Honolulu Marathon. "I got permission from the City and County of Honolulu and we set it up in 1979 so we could do it before my friend, SgtMaj. Tom Knoll, deployed to Okinawa, Japan," said Collins. "I got a logo from my secretary and a silk screen from the shipyard (on Naval Station Pearl Harbor). We made up everything you could want — shirts, towels, bags — it was big time." Fifteen triathletes gathered Feb. 18, 1978 for a shot at the first Ironman title, nine of which were military. The entry fee was \$5, a far cry cheaper than the current \$245 registration fee.

Gordan Haller, a reserve Navy petty officer who was working in Honolulu as a cab driver, won the first event with a time of 11 hours, 46 minutes and 58 seconds. Since then, the winning times have dropped to as low as 8:04:08, a record set in 1996 by Luc Van Lierde from Belgium. The race was moved to Kona in 1981 when Valerie Silk took over as race director. She insisted on keeping the military tradition of the race by developing a special division for military triathletes, according to Collins.

It gained national attention from Sports Illustrated in its second year and went international on ABC's "Wide World of Sports" in its third. "It caught on pretty quick," said Collins. "I couldn't believe it all started around me and my friends just sitting around talking." As popularity grew, the amount of competing triathletes skyrocketed from 15 in its first two years to more than 1,500 this year. The event created an amazing history for itself, hosting everything from Julie Moss' historic crawl to the finish in 1982 to Marc Allen's five-year winning streak from 1989 to 1993.

Collins never expected the event to be world-renown in 20 years, he said. "Most single events were good and challenging, but I wanted something more," said Collins. "The Ironman forced you to exercise your whole body and lead to higher physical fitness and health." As far as he's concerned, he said he merely developed the ultimate test to find the ultimate athlete — an Ironman.

From here to the other side

HAWAII KAI, Oahu — Imagine the memorable scene in "From Here To Eternity," in which Burt Lancaster and Deborah Kerr swap passionate kisses on a beach. As you imagine this, visualize the Blowhole, located near Hanauma Bay, because this was the set of the often-spoofed scene from the classic 1953 movie and is also an exciting place to take the kids and the family dog to spend a day at the beach.

"I like it because it is secluded and it's more what you would expect to see in Hawaii," said Mililani resident Julie Jones, Blowhole beach goer. "It's very beautiful and the rock formations are great."

The beach is literally a "hole in the wall" because of the way the rocks are formed there. From the road and parking lots, the rock walls drop straight down and a small walkway provides the only safe way in and out of the inlet.

The Blowhole is very rocky, much like Hanauma Bay, only much smaller. Although there aren't any lifeguards on duty, patrons feel the beach is safe as long as common sense is applied.

"You can jump from the rocks where the water comes into the shore," said George Saffery, Waimanalo resident and avid Blowhole visitor. "My kids love jumping from the rocks. But when you go near the opening of the cove and jump from the rocks, the current will suck you out."

The inlet is also an occasional stop for sea turtles which come ashore there for a break to spend time in the sun, said Saffery.

"Every time I come out with my kids we see a couple of turtles," he said.

The beach can be enjoyed by almost anyone, from sunbathers to swimmers and even man's best friend, said Saffery.

"It's a good place to bring Rover for some playtime in the water," he said. "But a pet should be kept on a leash to ensure it doesn't disturb fellow beach goers."

"It's fun to be here," said Jones. "The beach holds a feeling of adventure. There's so much to do here in such a little space. It's definitely not your usual tour bus stop."

From people who want to make their own "From Here to Eternity" scene, to an avid beach goer looking for an out-of-the-way spot for family fun, the Blowhole is the spot.
