3/3 Super Squad heads to Okinawa

Marines from L Co., 3d Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment, defeated the squad from F Co., 2/3, in the regimental Super Squad competition.

The Marines now travel to Okinawa, Japan, to test their infantry skills against the best of 3d Marine Division April 10-17.

"We worked hard, and it paid off," said Cpl. Jason Adcock, the squad leader for L Co., 3/3. "Now we're looking forward to Okinawa and winning there."

"Both squads did an exceptional job, and the scores were really tight," said CWO-5 Al Nevglowski, the regimental gunner for 3d Marines. "The 3/3 Marines made up for their lack of experi-

ence with aggressiveness, and that gave them the edge."

The Marines will undergo the same testing in Okinawa, but it probably won't be as tough as the competition here, according to Nevglowski.

"We intentionally made this tougher — both physically and mentally, than what they'll have in Okinawa," Nevglowski said. "They'll definitely have the edge over there, and they will win."

If the Marines come out on top in divisional competition, they'll then travel to Quantico, Va., for Super Squad of the Marine Corps.

"We can't say we'll win for sure, but we're going to give it our best shot," Adcock said. "I've got the hardest squad in the Corps, now we just have to prove it."

HMH-365 returns

Marines from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 365 returned home to Kaneohe Bay March 6 after a three-month stay at Marine Air/Ground Combat Center 29 Palms, Calif.

During their deployment, the squadron supported several combined arms exercises with infantry battalions.

"We got some great training in with other units," said Maj. John Forti Jr., the operations officer for HMH-365. "We flew a ton of hours. In fact, we flew an entire quarter's worth of sorties in seven weeks."

The pilots and crews of the helicopters practiced flying into hot landing zones, low-level flying, extracting Marines in different situations and environments and other helicopter tactics.

"Overall, the deployment was a great success," Forti said. "Our Marines got some of the best training they've had in a long time — and it's training that will stick with them."

Sixty-eight Marines and four helos are still at 29 Palms and are scheduled to return April 28.

Six of our Marines are going through the Weapons Training Institute and the other Marines are supporting the school," Forti said.

VITA exceeds expectations

The MCB Hawaii Tax Center has already surpassed last year's totals with three weeks left in the tax season.

The tax center filed 4,500 claims last year, but this year, center workers will file almost 2,000 more, said Capt. Hong Hwang, the tax center officer in charge.

The tax center electronically files both federal and state taxes for free, saving Marines and Sailors here anywhere from \$75 to \$150 depending on the individual's claims, Hwang said. This year, the tax center will save an estimated \$500,000 in filing fees.

The crew which makes this possible are Marines and Sailors compiled through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program, said Hwang. The 15-person team, many of which have past experience in tax filing, go through a two-week course to learn tax laws and how to use computers for filing.

"I recommend this to anyone who is interested in doing it," said LCpl. James Randall, the tax center's state tax specialist. "It would give you some insight to the tax laws which change every year. If you learn the ins and outs, it can help you when you file taxes for the years to come."

Tax center workers are asking those who haven't filed their taxes yet, to come in and file before the April 15 deadline, said Hwang. The center will stay open until April 16 to take care of late-comers. The center runs from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. There is also an "appointments only" time each evening from 6 to 8 p.m.

BAC debates funding

Representatives from Youth Activities visited the Base Action Committee meeting Tuesday evening at Fairways All Hands Club to discuss the scope of their programs here.

Darrell Manuel, the director of the recreation operations division at MWR, and Ron Kubo, the youth sports coordinator, fielded questions from parents about youth sports fees, summer programs and how to generate more youth activities volunteers.

"Our programs promote physical, social and intellectual development," said Manuel. "We do this through a variety of organized learning, leisure and sports activities."

Funding for youth programs is 65 percent appropriated funds and 35 percent

participant fees and charges, Manuel said.

The general cost per sport in the youth sports program here is \$35, which covers league fees, volunteer coaches' training and jerseys and accessories for participants, Manuel said. Youth sports programs are generally cheaper here than at other installations on Oahu.

"We shoot to break even," said Manuel. "We don't try to make a profit from youth activities, we just try to stay afloat without a loss."

Many activities and programs youth activities are planning for children this summer were introduced, as well. Programs such as a family bowl-a-thon, a rollerblading obstacle course and youth dances are all slated for the summer months, said Manuel.

Next month's meeting, April 28, will focus on the Semper Fit series.

Lead found in blinds

Some nonglossy finish vinyl miniblinds installed in housing here have been found to contain lead, which could become a health problem for young children.

The lead-containing blinds could pose a health problem to children under six years old who

play or wipe their hands on the blinds and then put their hands into their mouths, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission. Lead ingested in significant amounts has been associated with learning disabilities, hearing problems and growth retardation.

Marine sticks to her 'master plan'

From the posters on her wall, one might think SSgt. Jacqueline Husbands is a travel agent instead of a Marine.

Locals say this is paradise, but she will argue her home is the most beautiful place on earth.

"I get homesick so I put these posters up in my office," said Husbands, a maintenance administration clerk with Marine Aviation Logistics Support Element here. "I don't think Hawaii is as pretty as Barbados. I prefer my home."

Husbands was born and raised on a farm in Barbados and moved to Chicago when she was 17.

Now 29, she entered the Corps Sept. 27, 1988 after going back to high school in Chicago to receive her high school diploma.

"I didn't have the credits to receive my diploma in the states so I had to go back to school," said Husbands,

who wasn't disappointed about going back to high school. "When in Rome, you must do like the Romans." Husbands stepped on the yellow footprints at 19, and said she has enjoyed every step since then. She entered the military to get a college education, but the Marine Corps wasn't her first choice.

"Everybody was going into the Air Force and the Army, but the waiting list was too long for women," Husbands said, only revealing a trace of her Caribbean accent. "But the Marine Corps didn't have a list because not many women were signing up."

Soon after, Husbands realized she made the right choice.

"I liked boot camp," said Husbands, who enjoys painting, sewing and drawing in her free time. "It was a lot of fun. I didn't have too hard a time because I'm athletic and I ran track in high school."

"My mom didn't even know what the Marine Corps was," Husbands said, giggling. "She thought it was all

the Army. I was in for five or six years and she still told people I was in the Army."

Husbands doesn't feel animosity about being part of an organization generally thought as mostly dominated by men.

"I'm quite feminine and I know females who try to fit in and sometimes lose their identity," said Husbands, who's five feet, four inches and weighs a trim 122 pounds. "I do what the Marine Corps requires and it doesn't take away from who I am. You can carry your weight and earn respect even as a female."

Husbands has served in Okinawa, North Carolina and Florida and she's also found the time to earn college degrees. Husbands has a bachelor's degree in aviation and a bachelor's in business administration.

Now that she has two degrees, she has put schooling on the back burner and shares her time by volunteering for "Meals on Wheels," Renewed Life Providers and the Black History Month Committee.

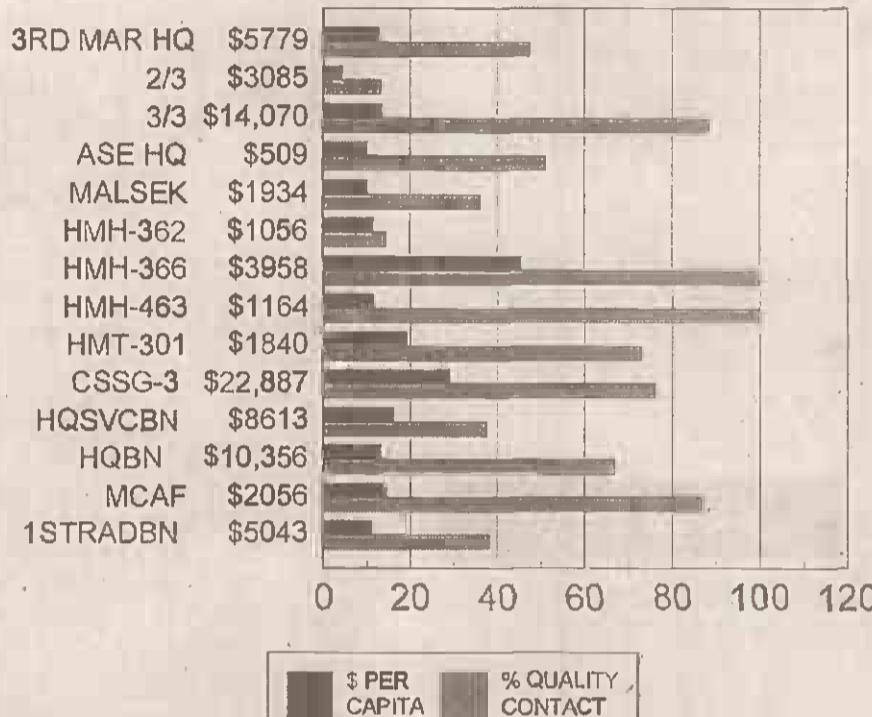

1/3 tests cold weather capability

CHITOSE-CHIKU TRAINING AREA, Hokkaido, Japan — More than 300 Marines and Japanese soldiers participated in the Field Training Exercise Forest Light 98-2 here in late February.

Marines from 1st Battalion, 3rd Marines, deployed from MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, and members of the Japan Ground Self Defense Force's 11th Infantry Regiment, 7th Division participated in the two-week annual exercise culminating with a three-day FTX designed to develop interoperability between U.S. Marines and Japanese soldiers in a cold weather, bilateral combat environment.

"We seek to learn from each other; our cultures, military capabilities and methods of training," said LtCol. T. E. Gregory, the commanding officer of 1/3. "Forest Light provides us an unique opportunity to the Japanese and American people to improve our military skills and strengthen our spirit."

Gregory's Japanese counterpart, Col. Minoru Matsueda, the 11th Regt. commander, echoed the same hopes.

"We are honored to be here together in Chitose and participate in Forest Light 98-2," he said. "This exercise has been supported by many people from both of our countries, military and nonmilitary. To live up to the expectations of these people, it is important to give your best effort during the exercise."

Marines trained with the Japanese for two weeks, which included cross country skiing, live-fire demonstrations of both countries' weapons, squad tactics and assault maneuvers. The training then culminated with a three-day FTX.

The company started the FTX with a five-kilometer ski march to their assembly area, where both forces set up a base camp for the night. The second day started off early when the Marines and the JGSDF's 1st Company set out to secure their first objective.

The FTX was a great training opportunity, said SSgt. Peter J. Sweet, the platoon sergeant of second platoon, Co. A, 1/3.

"We're pretty much the champs of jungle training, but up here, we learned a lot," added Sweet. "Getting to work hand-in-hand with the Japanese when we're right out in the field with them in this type of environment is great."

The two forces moved to their first objective eas-

ily, but it took time and by the end of the day, both Marines and Japanese soldiers were tired.

"It was cold and seemed like it took forever to reach our objective," said Cpl. John P. Deer, a squad leader with 2nd Plt., Co. A, 1/3. "By the end of the day we were all cold and tired, but we reached our objectives and accomplished the mission."

After a good rest and an evening Meal Ready to Eat, the two companies began their night attacks. This portion of the exercise was designed to see how well the two companies worked together at night against unknown forces.

"I think that we worked well together," said JGSDF Cpl. Kosuke Matsuzawa, squad leader, 1st Co., 11th Infantry Regiment. "This was a great opportunity for me to train in the field with my American counterparts."

The FTX culminated with a combined joint attack on several objectives leading up to the final objective the following morning. The hill was seized and the exercise a success.

"Everything went smoothly," said Capt. Charles Henderson, the commanding officer of Co. A. "The coordination between the two companies was good. We had translators with us at all times and it made it easier to communicate."

"Although moving through the snow was difficult at first, the Marines did a superb job at adapting and overcoming," Henderson continued. "Forest Light was a success and I hope to be able to train with the Japanese again in the future."

Marines go "down under" for infantry skills training

SHOALWATER BAY TRAINING AREA, Australia — Rotor blades pound the air as four CH-46 "Sea Knight" helicopters, with bellies full of combat ready Marines, carve their way deep into enemy territory.

As the hot landing zone comes into view, Marine helo gunners unleash deadly 50-cal machine-gun fire into enemy targets below. One by one the helos land and spill their cargo of adrenaline-filled Marines into the cover of chest-high grass. As the helos become airborne once more, the 50-caliber machine-guns come alive for one final sweep of the tree line. As they complete their sweep the Marines begin a deadly assault forward destroying the enemy and securing their objective.

Such was the scene here recently as more than 100 Marines from Company

B, 1st Battalion, 3rd Marines, 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable), hit the Australian wilderness to conduct four days of intense infantry training March 9-12 as part of exercise Valiant Usher 98-1.

From the moment their boots hit the ground the Marines were getting the most out of the unique training opportunities Australia had to offer.

"Conducting a live-fire assault after coming off a helo was something not too many Marines get to do," said Cpl. Jason M. Travis, a 21-year-old section leader with B Co., 1/3, 31st MEU (SOC). "It was really motivating, and very realistic because with live-fire you only get one chance to get it right."

Once the company-sized force was on the ground, the Marines continued their training by dividing into platoons and spending the afternoon honing patrolling skills. Exercises included immediate action drills, movement to

contact and various squad tactics.

Later that night each platoon conducted a night patrol which concluded with a live-fire response to a simulated enemy ambush.

The next day the Marines conducted more patrolling rehearsals and hit the ranges again for live-fire platoon assaults.

"This is one of the best operational training areas I've ever seen," said Capt. Kenneth M. Detreux, the commanding officer of B Co., 1/3. "The ranges here are phenomenal. They offered us much more latitude on the variety of training we could conduct than the ranges we use in the states."

Although the company conducted training on several various field skills, the majority of it revolved around live-fire exercises.

"Live-fire definitely makes our training better," said Travis. "We want to familiarize ourselves with it at every opportunity. It keeps everyone focused

on where your fellow Marines are and allows you to see where you are actually firing."

That night the Marines moved to a new position and spent the following day setting up a defensive perimeter and conducting security patrols. They spent their final night conducting platoon raids.

The company was attached to the 31st MEU(SOC) just for this deployment, and augmented the MEU's Battalion Landing Team. This gave them the opportunity to not only hone their field skills, but also train in Australia.

"This was our first field operation since October," said Sgt. Christian A. Boles, a 25-year-old squad leader with B Co. "Australia offered us some very good training opportunities and we definitely took advantage of them."

The exercise lasted only four days, but the Marines seemed to agree they all benefited from it.

"We got a lot of training in a short amount of time, and we all learned a lot," said Travis. "The training has been very organized and proficient like I've never seen before. I've been in the field than we've done here."

Protect your social security number, life

Writer's Note: From June 1988 to August 1989, my original social security number was compromised through unknown means. The problem with someone acquiring your social security number includes another person can assume your identity and start a new life of illegal activities for you (the victim). This occurred to me, not just by one person, but several dozen people.

For the past five tax filing years, I have been audited by the Internal Revenue Service for tax evasion and fraudulent tax filing/reporting. The IRS justified the audits by stating that I had earned additional wages evidenced by W-2 forms of employers around the U.S. Although it would have been nice to actually earn an average of \$85,000 to \$126,000 during a given year, a sergeant through gunnery sergeant has little or no hope of ever making that much money on active duty.

It is also improbable that one person was physically located in five different states and employed by several employers within those states at the same time. Nevertheless, the burden of proof fell on me to prove to the IRS I had not earned the wages which were reported for the last five years.

I have been harassed by collection agencies stating I failed to pay just debts for services or merchandise. Many

agencies contacted me, claiming I was indebted to one organization or another.

As I would clear myself from one bogus claim, another would arise. Threats from collection agencies included docking my pay, foreclosing on my home and repossessing my vehicles.

I have been accused of having my driver's license revoked in

several states. As with most service-members, if you're overseas, you take an overseas written driver's test to drive. The Military Police then sends your current driver's license number and identification information to be checked by the National Criminal Information Center. Of course, my license always came up revoked. I would have to send correspondence to the state or states which claimed my license was revoked, and get a letter from them clearing me of this

erroneous information entered into the NCIC.

This normally took two to four weeks, and during this time, my privileges to drive at the overseas duty station were suspended. Once again, the burden of proof fell on me. It was a challenge I would not wish on any of my fellow Marines.

Topping off the frustration, I learned the injustices done to that point weren't that bad, that is, if you consider what the state of Texas claimed: Texas officially declared me dead as of March 1994. How did I find out?

My friends in the Social Security Administration sent an e-mail inquiry to DFAS in Kansas City to find out why the Marine Corps was still paying me. DFAS sent a unit diary message to my last command requesting a response to the SSA's inquiry. I received a telephone call from the unit diary

chief asking if I was a vampire.

Still, the burden of proof remained in my hands.

Nevertheless, after seven years, I finally showed enough proof to the appropriate government agencies, specifically the SSA, and I received a new social security number.

All this has prompted me to recommend Marines, Sailors and family members, protect your social security number. Do not issue your number over the telephone (especially cellular) and do not disclose it for anything other than official purposes.

I also encourage MWR and other agencies to stop requiring military members from disclosing their social security numbers when they write or cash a check.

I recommend unit commanders and barracks managers to stop requiring Marines and Sailors to list their social security numbers on room doors or wall lockers. Anyone walking past will have easy access to this sensitive information and may illegally use it, causing serious damage to the young servicemember. Our Marines have better things to do; don't let them be subject to the pain and tribulation I have endured these past few years.

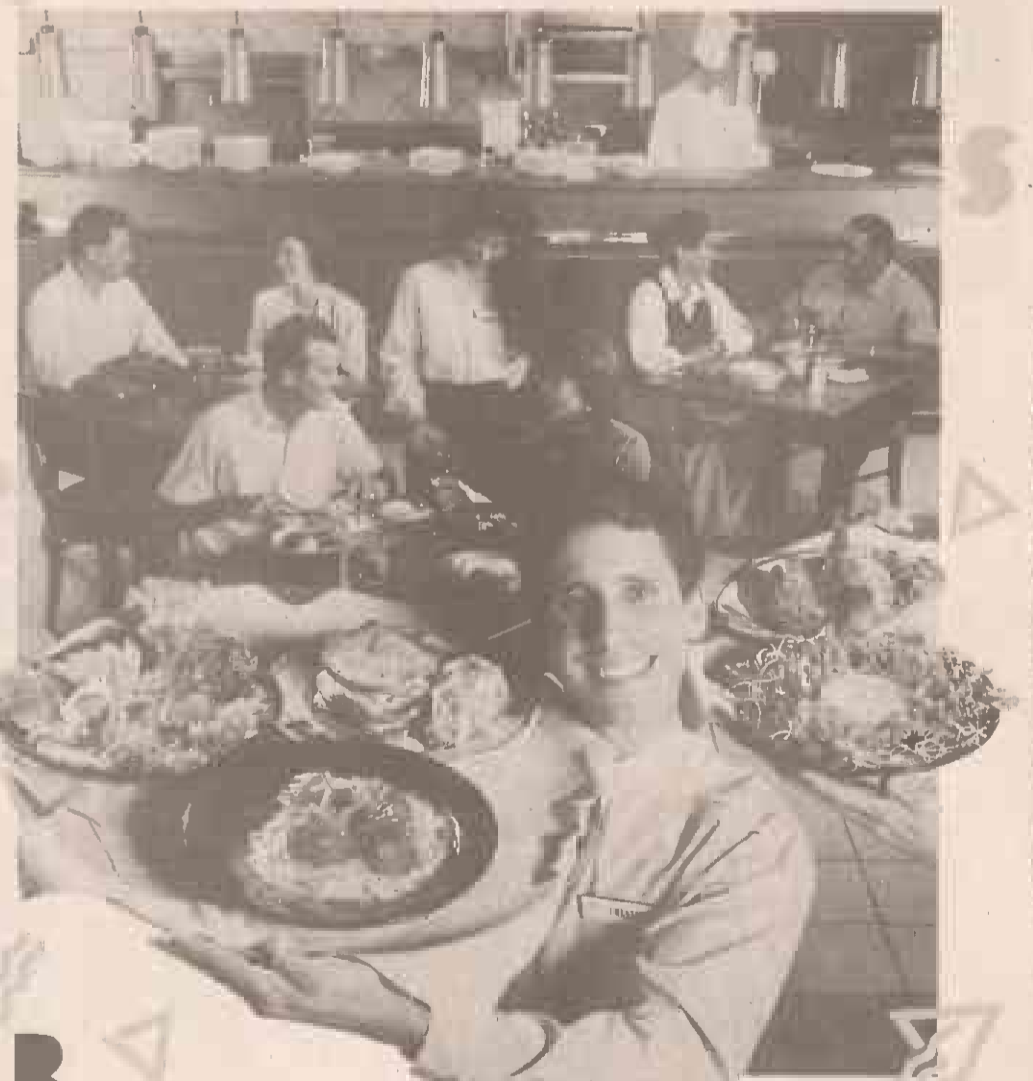

Tuskegee Airman gives Kaneohe Marines a lesson in U.S. history

"It was held that the black man was physically unqualified for combat duty; was by nature subservient, mentally inferior and believed himself to be inferior to the white man; was susceptible to the influence of crowd psychology; could not control himself in face of danger; and did not have the initiative and resourcefulness of the white man."

— Quote taken from a three-year study of the performance of black soldiers in World War I by the Army War College in 1925.

Attitudes like this were what men like retired Air Force LtCol. Charles W. Dryden had to fight before the armed forces of the United States were integrated in 1948.

But Dryden, who was one of three black men to graduate from the second class of pilots trained during what he called "the Tuskegee Aviation Experiment" at Tuskegee Institute in Alabama, said nothing was going to stop him or the 992 men who became the nation's first black pilots to fly in combat during the famed program.

"We proved," he said, "when the bars are taken down, we excel."

Dryden, 77, spoke to a group of Marines and civilians at the base theater Monday, and quickly gained his listeners' attention with in-depth truths about the Tuskegee Airmen, as the group of World War II pilots came to be called.

"My mom used to say I'd tear bits of paper, throw them in the air and try to say the word 'airplane,'" said Dryden, who spent 21 years in service and flew combat missions over Europe and Korea. "I always wanted to fly. I wanted to be an Army pilot and have a career as an Army officer."

Dryden, whose flight moniker was "A Train," spoke of the history of black aviation in America, which stretched back to nearly the time Orville and Wilbur Wright first flew at Kitty Hawk, N.C. in 1903.

"Jacques Bullard, of Columbus, Georgia, heard about this and gathered all the information he could about flight," Dryden said, his voice a measured baritone betraying his Jamaican ancestry. "He learned to fly and

eventually flew with the French during World War I, because of America's restriction against him flying for its Army Air Corps."

Bullard's exploits led others, such as Bessie Coleman and Charles Anderson, who later became the chief instructor of the Tuskegee program's primary phase, into flight.

"Anderson taught himself to fly," Dryden explained. "He bought an airplane in 1926, and spent six weeks taxiing back and forth before he got the nerve to lift off."

The beginning of the Tuskegee program may have been Eleanor Roosevelt's doing, Dryden said. In early 1940, the then-first lady, wife of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, visited Tuskegee to see its polio center (the president was stricken with polio), and noticed planes flying about. She inquired who was flying, and was told several black pilots.

Her interest piqued, she was introduced to Anderson, and went on a quick flight with him. Months later, in October, the Army began accepting blacks for flight training, Dryden said.

"I think she said something to her husband to get it pushed along," Dryden said, smiling.

The Tuskegee Aviation Experiment began July 19, 1941. Dryden, a New Yorker and graduate of Hofstra University with a bachelor's degree in political science, was commissioned April 29, 1942. He joined the 99th Pursuit Squadron, the "Red Tails," with the mission of escorting B-17 and B-24 bombers over the European Theater. The 99th, which later became the 332nd Fighter Group, was commanded by LtCol. Benjamin O. Davis Jr., a man known for incredible discipline and toughness.

"That man was as tough as they come," Dryden said. "He told us, 'If you lose a bomber, don't come home.'"

None of the members of the unit had to find out what Davis would have done to them if they had lost a bomber — the squadron didn't lose any.

"We took out 409 German planes," said Dryden of the 450 Tuskegee Airmen who saw action in Europe. "There were 98 of us shot down. A four to one ratio."

The other Tuskegee-trained pilots were trained to fly B-25 Mitchell medium bombers in the Pacific Theater, but the war ended before they saw action there.

"The Japanese surrendered because they knew the black pilots were coming," Dryden quipped.

Standards such as the ones Davis held the pilots to were the norm, according to Dryden.

When questioned about what happened to pilots who washed out of the program, he said some of them became flying instructors later, which indicated to Dryden and the others although the military was giving them an opportunity to serve the country, the mindset of the times remained.

"It was clear we were on a quota program," Dryden said. "We knew we dare not fail. We were characterized as the cream of the crop of black males and we knew if we failed, they would have said 'See? We gave you a chance, and you failed.'"

"There was pressure, but it was positive," he continued. "We knew there were lots of young blacks who had dreams and they hinged on what we did. There was quite a debate within the black community about training us in an unsegregated environment or not at all or take the opportunity being presented and make the best of it. By taking the opportunity, we got the chance to show what we could do. If the ones who wanted it to be all or nothing had their way, we wouldn't be here at all."

Dryden, who has shared a platform with MGen. Charles Bolden, a Marine astronaut, said people who make history owe it to children to tell what happened during their lives. His words told why he still speaks of his experiences as well, letting as many people as he can know what really went on.

"You have an obligation to tell the young ones what it was like, your perspective," Dryden said. "It's history to them."

mine the severity of the problem since we don't know how many of these blinds were installed," said Becky Chestnut, the director of family housing here. "Normally it takes six weeks to get results back, but under this special contract, we will have the results by mid-April."

Manufacturers used to add lead to stabilize plastic in the blinds, but sunlight and heat can deteriorate the plastic over time and form lead dust on the blinds, according to Chestnut.

"Residents should check the bottom of their blinds for a 'lead-free' label, and if there isn't one or they aren't sure whether they have lead-free blinds or not, residents should at the very least keep the blinds elevated and out of reach of children until we know the scope of the problem," Chestnut said.

Residents can call the Housing Department to take the blinds down, Chestnut added.

"Best case scenario — it's a small problem and can be taken care of rather quickly," Chestnut said. "Worst case — we have to replace or remove the majority of blinds in hous-

ing." The lead-containing blinds were installed by the previous change of occupancy maintenance contractor who bought the blinds from several different manufacturers. The problem was discovered during a pediatric wellness check when Preventive Medicine found elevated amounts of lead in his blood. Preventive Medicine tested all potential lead sources in the boy's house and the lead in the blinds was discovered.

"Concerned parents can schedule an appointment with Base Medical to screen their children," Chestnut said. "They are aware of the situation and very willing to work with us."

LINKS still strong after year

The LINKS program at MCB Hawaii, one of two established in the Marine Corps, celebrated its first year here Sunday at its new home on Reed Road.

The Lifestyles Insight, Networking, Knowledge and Skills program is one part of Marine Corps family team building, a way of adapting to the demands of being a family in the Corps.

"We're here to help make people feel connected to the Marine Corps and our base," said Jennifer Stewart, a LINKS volunteer. "We try to offer them the skills and techniques to survive as Marine spouses."

Thanks to LINKS, spouses of Marines here have been able to adjust more easily to military life for more than a year now. Spouses of members of other military services and civilian employees are also welcome.

The success of the program has created interest in its development at other Marine bases in the near future, according to Laura Gutzwiller, the LINKS team leader.

The program is designed and staffed by wives of Marines, and gets funding

strictly from donations. A three-day or four-evening course covers topics such as how to read a leave and earnings statement, moving allowances for permanent change of station moves, and how to deal with the absence of Marines on deployment.

"I think I appreciated it more since it was other wives giving me help with questions I had," said Jennifer Truitt, a spouse who recently completed the course.

"It's much nicer to hear it from a wife than a guy in cammies. It's less intimidating and you don't feel talked down to," Truitt said.

Brigadier Gen. David F. Bice, the commanding general, MCB Hawaii, congratulated the LINKS volunteers at the breezy, outdoor anniversary celebration. He and his wife, Charlene, untied a Hawaiian garland as a ribbon-cutting gesture to inaugurate the new location for the program.

"We do our part for our family, and we do our part for our nation," said Zandie Krulak, the wife of Gen. Charles C. Krulak, commandant of the Marine Corps, in a message to Marine families, "and that's plenty to be proud of."

K-Bay Gas Lanes get new look

Gas Lanes to get state of the art equipment, new services, and in the future, a mini-mart.

Sophisticated new fuel dispensers are being installed at the gas lanes here to make the lanes more convenient for base residents without raising gas prices.

"We want to bring the gas lanes into the 21st century by installing an automated system," said Kenneth Takeya, a retail operations specialist with MWR. "Everyone's in a rush and this will provide better service. The pumps will be faster and credit card accessible."

The new pumps cost around \$9,000 each and will offer three grades of fuel from just one hose on each pump, Takeya said. The six fuel islands will be reduced to four and each island will have two pumps. Air and water dispensers will be moved from the islands to another location to prevent delays caused by customers adding air to their tires.

"We're reducing the number of pumps, but it'll be faster to get gas and go," said Takeya. "Right now, each island can serve only one car at a time on each side, but the new islands can serve two cars on each side. Were taking away two islands, but we'll still be able to serve more cars at one time."

The underground fuel storage tanks are also being removed and replaced with above-ground tanks, which is part of a base-wide

effort to remove all underground tanks, said Takeya.

In order to keep the lanes open for residents, workers are renovating one side at a time, said Takeya. Left side islands are currently under construction and set to open with new pumps by May. After the new side is up and running, the right side will be renovated.

The new gas pumps will eventually have the capability to be debit card or ATM card-accessible, said Takeya.

"We're getting state of the art equipment," said Takeya. "But it might be six to eight months before we can get the software to make the pumps accessible to ATM and debit cards."

Eventually, MWR plans to remove the pay booth and consolidate the automotive supply store next to

Firestone with the gas lanes, Takeya said. Customers will either swipe their credit cards to pay for gas or pay cash or check at the automotive store.

"Our future plans include adding a mini-mart," said Takeya. "We want to increase the size of the automotive store and combine it with the mini-mart like many of the gas stations off-base."

Swamp Romp nears

It's mud, sweat and cheers at the 4th annual CSSG-3 Swamp Romp, Saturday at 7:30 a.m. at the Boondocker here.

More than 120 teams, with more than 700 people, will run in one of the most unique races in Hawaii. This five-mile run and obstacle course, which runs through the base and along its beaches, is sure to challenge all fitness levels. Although modified for non-military participants, the course is challenging and includes obstacles such as scaling of walls, crawling in and under barriers, and navigating through marshes and swamps.

Open to the public, teams include the Honolulu Police Department SWAT team, Navy, Army and Air Force squads and a STREnd team.

Entry fees are \$95 per team (six members) for DoD I.D. cardholders, and \$105 for civilian teams. (Entries are non-refundable.) Teams may still enter as late as Friday. All members must sign the entry form, and each member will receive a T-shirt. Competitors must wear utility/long trousers or sweat pants, and some type of boot. No spandex, or tennis/running shoes is allowed.

Awards will be presented after the race for first, second and third place teams in the following divisions: Young Men (total ages not greater than 120 years), Warriors Men (greater than 120 but less than 210), Masters Men (Greater than 210), Women (6 women, any age), and Mixed (3 men, 3 women, any age).

A perpetual trophy will be awarded to the major command (USMC only) whose team finishes in first place, and major commands will be awarded Commanding General's Fitness Series points based on the percentage of assigned personnel participating (military teams with dependents or family members will not qualify for CG's Fitness Series points). Refreshments and showers will be available to race participants.

To qualify for awards, teams must start and finish with six members without being penalized. Teams finishing with less than six members will be penalized 60 seconds from their finishing time. (Time stops when the 6th person crosses the line).

Team packets may be picked up at the Athletics Office, building 3073, from now to Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., or on race day at 5:30 a.m.

Organized by the Morale, Welfare and Recreation Department Athletic Office and the Combat Service Support Group-3, and sponsored by Island Demo and Gatorade, proceeds from this event benefit Hawaii's Marines, Sailors and their families. "We didn't connect on passes all that well out there in the first game," said Tony Camacho, of 3d Marines, "but we were able to pull out the win."

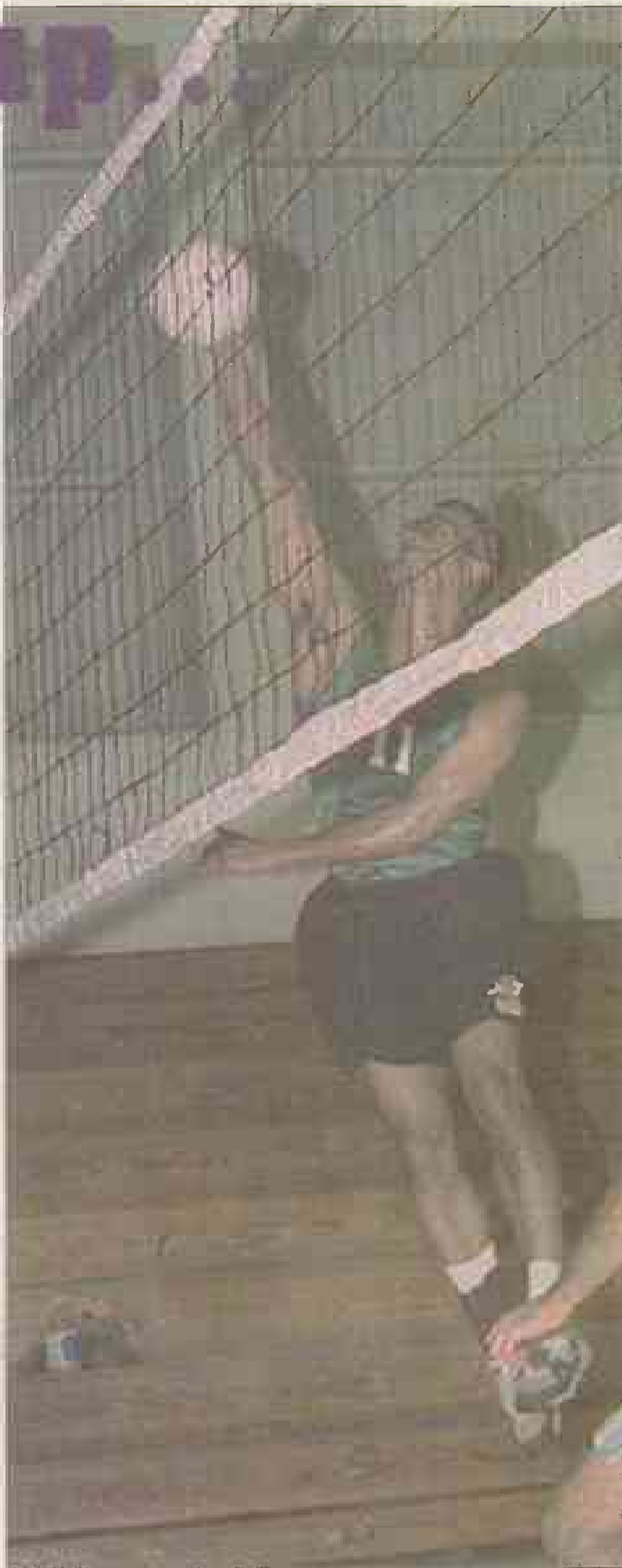
The team had played together only once previously, but the players worked well together as a team.

WAIMANALO, Hawaii — The Hawaii Marine Weightlifting team boasted a second place finisher in the first-ever Amateur Athletics Union sanctioned weightlifting tournament in Hawaii.

Marine lifter William Clarke III placed second in the 198-pound sub-masters division by bench pressing 320 pounds, squatting 315 and dead lifting 475 at the First Baptist Church here Saturday.

"It was nice to have the Marines come out

here and compete in the community," said Keith Ward, the state chairman for AAU. "For a first-time tournament here, everything was great."

"The whole meet was based on how strong you were without artificial support," Clarke said. "Support like wrist wraps and bench shirts weren't allowed. All you could wear was a wrestling singlet and footwear. It really tested your pure strength."

Tournament judges were very strict but consistent in the way they judged each lift, Clarke said. This was his first full meet and he considered it part of an all-around good learning experience.

Seeing the underwater world

Aquarium offers the deep blue without getting their feet wet

WAIKIKI — How'd you like to see Hawaii's brilliant underwater worlds without getting wet for only \$4? People do it everyday at the Waikiki Aquarium.

The Waikiki Aquarium has squeezed Hawaii's vast sea life like Monk seals, coral reefs, sharks and jellyfish into a three-hour tour.

"For people who can't swim or snorkel, this is accessible to them," said Pat Bilyk, an "Edge of the Reef" interpreter and aquarium volunteer. "Many people who come here are from places which aren't tropic. The experience here can broaden their perspective and knowledge of the ocean. It's especially good for children."

The Waikiki Aquarium features over 60 tanks displaying a variety of both fresh and saltwater life, said Bilyk. Aquarium workers grow coral to recreate habitats much like those from places such as Kaneohe and Hanauma Bay. People who visit the aquarium can have their very own tour guide for only a buck. The electronic tour guide is a black wand which plays recordings with information about each exhibit. Just enter the number of the exhibit, and the guide tells all about it.

The aquarium also works closely with Sea Life Park in trying to restore the

Monk seal population, said Bilyk. The seals can only be found in the wild in the Hawaiian Islands and presently Monk seal's numbers have dwindled to nearly 1,500.

The park has three seals in captivity and marine biologists train and study them daily, said Bilyk. The public can get up close and personal with these creatures at daily feeding times.

"But our claim to fame is the Chambered Nautilus," said aquarium volunteer Ron Craven. "We're the first aquarium to ever successfully breed them in captivity."

Aquarium workers are currently improving their nautilus exhibit, and it should be ready in April, said Craven.

Guests can learn more about nautilus, seals or jellyfish at the SeaVisions Theater. The theater is free and features a series of informational videos about different oceanic citizens.

The Waikiki Aquarium is located at 2777 Kalakaua Avenue, past the Honolulu Zoo in Waikiki. It's open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and admission is \$4 with military identification. Children 12 and under are free.

"Man In The Iron Mask" is first-rate visual feast

Movie critics around the world seem to be taking great joy in trashing "The Man in the Iron Mask," the 1998 adaptation of Alexandre Dumas' novel of treachery, valor and compassion. Since I'm not a movie critic per se, I'm not going to jump on that carriage.

Instead, I'll tell you why I thoroughly enjoyed the visual feast director Randall Wallace put together (if Wallace's name sounds familiar, you don't have to look back very far — he wrote the 1995 Best Picture winner "Braveheart").

Wallace has assembled a first-rate cast. I'll be the first to admit I'm not a big Leonardo DiCaprio fan; in fact, let me get this off my chest — boo, hiss Leo, for not attending the Oscars after you weren't nominated for Best Actor! Remember, nominations and votes come from your peers, not teenage girls. But DiCaprio is a capable Louis XIV in this film. He seems to take some delight in playing this historical spoiled brat of a king, and comes off fairly convincingly.

The problem is he must play Louis' twin brother Phillippe, who resides somewhere toward the other end of the emotional spectrum, and this is where he loses me. He tries to make him so much the opposite of his twisted brother, he only succeeds in making his character sappy beyond the average movie-goer's ability to suspend disbelief. A few words of advice for Leo: stop trying so hard to make us love you, and maybe (just maybe) we will.

That being said, there's a lot to love about this film. The Four Musketeers (no, not Cubby, Darla, Bobby and Annette) are a bit older than when we last saw them in the 1993 Disney flick "The Three Musketeers." All but D'Artagnan ("Cool World's" Gabriel Byrne) have retired from the Musketeers, and I must say the years have been kind to them. Athos (the delectably intense John Malkovich)

has raised a son of his own; Porthos (the hysterical Gerard Depardieu) is having trouble with his libido and Aramis (the always superb Jeremy Irons) is a priest.

All four are concerned about the state of their beloved France, the main difference is D'Artagnan is sworn to defend a king he knows is headed for disaster and the other three former Musketeers believe the life of France and her people depends on removing the callous Louis.

I don't think you could have assembled a better cast for the roles of the Musketeers. I found myself drawn to each of the characters for their own individual strengths and, more importantly, their weaknesses. You could really see what the years of service to Louis' father, the previous king, had done for and to them; you could also see what Louis' kingship was doing to the country through them. Nowhere is this more true, at least for me, than in Malkovich's Athos, who learns his son Raoul has been killed because Louis the little horn-dog has the hots for his fiancée. Malkovich's anger boils up from deep within him as this event sets off the powder keg of hatred that has been building as the country edges toward ruin at Louis' hands.

Depardieu is delightful as Porthos, the heavy-drinking womanizer of the four — only he's having some trouble living up to his reputation. His hilarious attempts at suicide add a touch of levity to keep the story from getting too dark. When he makes his comeback, you'll cheer.

Then there's Aramis, the priest. Irons exudes style as the spiritual leader of the three, and adds a touch of spice with one-liners which will catch you off-guard. His portrayal of the devout and devoutly French musketeer is one of the better selling points of the movie.

Byrne's D'Artagnan is torn between his oath to his king and his love for his fellow musketeers. You can really feel and see the anguish he goes through as the movie progresses,

and though you may find yourself doubting him from time to time, never fear: it's still "all for one and one for all."

I don't want to tell you much more about the story, since it unfolds so well and so richly on the big screen, so let me tell you some things which may encourage you to see this movie. James Acheson is the senior costume designer; the name may mean nothing to you, but some of the films he's provided costumes for may: "Dangerous Liaisons," "Highlander" and "Time Bandits." He's outdone himself this time, as Louis and his court are arrayed in splendor which is a feast for the eyes.

This is a good example of how a period piece should look. The sets are equally enticing. I had no problem letting myself believe I was watching events unfold in the palaces and gardens of France. The interiors were rich and lavish and really set the stage well for this story.

If you're looking for another "Gandhi," go somewhere else. If you're expecting another "Braveheart," you might be disappointed.

But if you're looking for a fun way to spend time, "The Man in the Iron Mask" will fit nicely, and more importantly, you won't leave feeling you wasted your hard-earned dollars.

Chill with the right air conditioner

There are many types of air conditioners sold here at the Exchange. But if you're in the market for an air conditioner for your home on base, make sure you are reading the correct data in order to purchase the unit.

The air conditioner's efficiency is perhaps the most important information the base is concerned with. The efficiency is measured by the energy efficiency ratio. The EER is the ratio of the cooling capacity (in British Thermal Units or BTU per hour), to the power input (measured in watts). Cooling capacity depends on the size of the room being cooled. The higher the EER, the more efficient the air conditioner. Anything above 10.0 is considered very efficient.

But according to Base Order 11300.13, the EER of air conditioners for home use here will not be less than 9.0.

Here are some tips which will help you use your air conditioner more efficiently:

- Use fans to assist the air conditioner's distribution of cool air.
- Keep lamps, televisions, or anything which produces heat away from the thermostat. The thermostat senses heat from these appliances, which can cause the air conditioner to run longer than necessary.
- Keep the air conditioner in a shaded spot, away from direct sunshine. Don't block the air flow. The shade will save as much as 10 percent of the normal amount of electricity used.
- When not in use, units should be covered or removed and stored away.
- Keep the filters clean. Keeping the filters clean can lower consumption by five to 15 percent. Dirty filters can also cause health problems because of dirty air. The filters are usually located behind the face panel, on the back. They are also very delicate, so clean them carefully.
- Holes and cracks in the seal around the window allow cool air to escape from your home.

Moisture from the air conditioner can cause the seal to crack. Prevent this by performing maintenance checks annually, by manually looking an improper seal, holes or cracks (any kind of maintenance or operation can be explained in the owner's manual).

Be smart and learn how to read your EnergyGuide labels. The U.S. government established a mandatory compliance program in the 1970s requiring certain types of appliances bear a label in order to help the consumers compare the energy efficiency among similar products.

In 1980, the Federal Trade Commission's Appliance Labeling Rule became effective, and requires all new refrigerators, freezers, water heaters, dishwashers, clothes washers, room air conditioners, heat pumps, furnaces and broilers to have an EnergyGuide label present for consumers. The labels are bright yellow with black lettering identifying energy consumption characteristics of household appliances. The labels will not tell you which appliance is most efficient; only the annual consumption and operation costs for each appliance is listed. You do the comparisons.

EnergyGuide labels show estimated yearly electrical consumption to operate the product along with a scale for comparing similar products. The comparison scale shows the least and most energy used by comparable models. The labeled model has an arrow pointing to its relative position on the scale. This is so the consumer can compare similar models easier.

The consumption figure printed on EnergyGuide labels, in kilowatt-hour, is based on average use assumptions and your actual energy consumption may vary depending on the appliance use. EnergyGuide labels are not required on kitchen ranges, microwave ovens, clothes dryers, on-demand water heaters, portable space heaters and lights.
