Evaluators ensure unit readiness

Marines from 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment recently kept a close eye on 3/3 while at Pohakuloa Training Area on the Big Island. It was their job.

These Marines were tasked with evaluating 3/3 to ensure the battalion was combat ready.

They observed every action as 3/3 participated in a four-day combat exercise.

"We're trying to give a very detailed and fair assessment of 3/3," said Lt. Col. Dan Liddell, the commanding officer of 2/3 and senior evaluator for 3/3's Marine Corps Combat Readiness Evaluation. "We're giving them a really good look."

Approximately 20 Marines from 2/3 were on hand to evaluate, the majority of which were company grade officers and staff non-commissioned officers, said Sgt. Maj. Albert Hamm, 2/3 sergeant major.

The 2/3 evaluators shadowed their 3/3 counterparts, observing how efficiently they operated or what areas the Marines needed to improve on.

"All we're doing is... observing another guy doing our job," said Capt. Patrick J. Keane, commanding officer of G Co, 2/3. Like many of the evaluators, he said he used his personal experiences commanding a company to help in his evaluation of the commanding officer for L Co.

"By operating a platoon, you already know what they're doing right and doing wrong," said Staff Sgt. Tracy L. Reddish, a platoon sergeant with G Co.

"We get to see what they're trying that's different," said Capt. Barry Montgomery, commanding officer for headquarters and service company, 2/3. "It's a pretty good learning environment."

He said in addition to watching and learning, each evaluator had a checklist of areas 3/3 had to show proficiency in. Like many of the other evaluators, he passed a unit if their plans worked and they met Marine Corps standards, he said.

Keane said he always asked himself one question before deciding if a unit was combat ready.

"If it was live rounds flying around out there, would they pass the test?" Keane asked.

Marines weed Nu'upia Ponds

Marines from 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, traded their weapons for gardening tools as they set out to free the Nu'upia Ponds aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, and their inhabitants of habitat-ruining vegetation Jan. 27.

Their mission was to aide the MCB Hawaii Environmental Department in their efforts to remove mangroves that have been taking over animal habitats.

"We've been losing ground to the mangroves big time — until 2/3 came to our rescue," said Lance Bookless, the natural resource manager for the base Environmental Department.

Instead of hiring a contractor to remove mangroves that are still growing, the environmental department organized a working party with 2/3 and 15 Marines were sent to pull the growths from the pond edges.

"I'm a grunt — a ground pounder," said Lance Cpl. Justin McBride, a rifleman with F Co, 2/3. Doing this work allowed McBride to literally pound the ground and dig up the menacing mangrove.

There are many reasons why these plants need to be removed from the more than 1,000 year-old ponds and the habitats they provide, said Bookless.

The first and arguably biggest reason for removing the mangrove is the fact that these plants take away from the natural habitat of the Hawaiian Stilt, an endangered and protected bird that uses the muddy banks of the Nu'upia Ponds as its nesting grounds.

These plants are also capable of filling the ponds since they thrive in the Hawaiian climate and grow uncontrollably, and Bookless explained that the ponds looked like a forest in the 1970's due to the uncontrolled growth of the mangroves.

The mangroves may also potentially damage some archaeological features in the ponds, such as the

remains of the gaming farm that was near the ponds during World War II.

These facts were explained to the Marines by Bookless before they started weeding out the plants. While pulling, many of the Marines began asking questions about the other plants, the wildlife in and around the ponds, and other questions to provide insight for them on the area they were toiling to keep clean.

At different points during the day, Marines came across some items in the pond that are not usually identified as water life. Things from shoes and baseballs, to tires and chairs were being pulled out of water.

Although the Marines did accomplish their mission, the mangrove is an enemy that regrows quickly, explained Bookless. With the help of units like 2/3, the ponds will stay as mangrove-free as they can possibly be.

Secretary of Defense approves new training plans

Plans slated to train troops on gay conduct policy

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense William S. Cohen announced today that he has received and approved each of the military services' updated training plans on the Department's homosexual conduct policy.

The updated plans incorporate the guidelines for

investigating threats against or harassment of servicemembers based on perceived or alleged homosexuality.

"I am very pleased with the effort that went into updating the services' training materials. These plans make it very clear to recruits, servicemembers, and to law enforcement personnel, commanders, judge advocates, and investigators that are charged with implementing the policy, that there is no room for harassment or threats in the military," Cohen said.

Cohen also noted that he had directed the Defense Department Inspector General to conduct an assessment of the environment at representative installations within each department with respect to

the application of the homosexual conduct policy.

He said that, as part of that assessment, the Inspector General would review the extent to which harassment may occur and the extent to which disparaging speech or expression with respect to sexual orientation is tolerated.

"I will receive the results of that review by March 13 and make a judgment as to whether any additional actions may be needed," Cohen said.

The Secretary emphasized that "servicemembers need to understand that harassment for any reason will not be tolerated and commanders will take prompt, appropriate action against individuals involved in such behavior."

The individual services' plans also included

implementing guidance not part of the previous policy that required additional actions as part of the new policies:

1. Inspectors general are to include as an item of specific interest in their inspections, the training of those charged with application and enforcement of the homosexual conduct policy;
2. Installation staff judge advocates will consult with senior legal officers prior to the initiation of an investigation into alleged homosexual conduct; and
3. Military Department secretarial-level approval will be obtained prior to the initiation of any substantial investigation into whether a servicemember made a statement regarding his or her homosexuality for the purpose of separation.

Rescue team trains Marines for emergencies

The Marine Corps Air Facility's Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting team rushed to the scene of a practice fire Jan. 27 at a training pit at West Field, aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay.

The fire-response exercise was one of many considerations used to qualify Marines on the use of a P-19A firefighting truck under a simulated emergency situation.

To pass the test, Marines are evaluated on how well they drive and maneuver the firefighting truck to the fire by assessing wind conditions.

Marines are also tested on operating gear such as water pumps used to

protect the truck from oil spill fires and to extinguish the fires.

Before taking the maneuvering and handling portion of the test, Marines are also required to spend 10 hours driving the truck, using its systems, and conducting preventative maintenance on it. Marines must also pass a 100 question written test and undergo a knowledge inspection, where they are verbally asked questions about the firefighting truck.

"It's a long, drawn-out process," said Sgt. Dan Ryley, an ARFF Marine who helped set up the test. "but we want to make sure Marines are proficient on their vehicles and know what they're doing."

Role of military outlined for future

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — "The military makes a great hammer in America's foreign policy toolbox, but not every problem that we face is a nail," the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff told more than 200 people at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government, Jan. 19.

Army Gen. Henry H. Shelton spoke about the intersection of force and diplomacy and discussed the importance of the American public's support for any use of America's military abroad.

"As a world superpower, can we dare to admit that force cannot solve every problem that we face?" Shelton said. "I think that the decision to use force is probably the most important decision that our nation's leaders can make. Of course, it has to be a civilian decision. It has been, and hopefully always will be, based on sound military advice."

"Let's be realistic," Shelton said. "I think that in any intervention that we face, anytime that we use our forces abroad, we are going to face opposition here at home. This is not only the nature of American democracy, but it is at the very heart and soul of our system."

He said America should set clear parameters as to when the use of military force is appropriate.

"The fundamental purpose of our military

forces is to fight and win the nation's wars," the chairman said. That's not the only purpose, however. "The military can do a lot of other things in support of our foreign policy and national interests, including maintaining America's presence around the globe, providing deterrence where appropriate and intervening if necessary."

He outlined three categories in which he believes military intervention could be used — vital national interests, important national interests and humanitarian interests.

"By vital national interests, I mean things that will directly impact our way of life such as the safety of American citizens abroad, the security of our territories or that of our allies, and the protection of our economic well being."

"That's seldom an issue," he said. "Those issues are very clearly discernible as vital national interests. Of course, we'll do whatever we need to do to protect these interests; and force, when applied in combat, will be done in an overwhelming and decisive manner."

The second category, important national interests, includes "those things that are short of our national survival, but nonetheless, will affect our nation," Shelton said. "If there is a threat to our important interests, then military force will be used if the cost and the associated risks are commensurate, and if there is not another element of our national power that might be more appropriate for the mission at

hand." Using America's military in humanitarian efforts is sometimes appropriate, the general said. "The appropriate use of our armed forces can bring a solution to the immediate problems at hand and set the stage for international leaders to address the longer term, more systemic deficiencies," Shelton said.

When the scale of conflict dwarfs the ability of international aid agencies to respond, "such as we saw happen in Rwanda, then the military can be used, and should be used, in a very efficient and effective manner," Shelton said. He also cited the effective use of the military in relief efforts for national disasters, such as support of Turkey after earthquakes there last summer.

Such efforts should be "limited in duration ... have a clearly defined end state ... and they should entail minimal risk for our troops," Shelton said. "They should be designed to give the affected country the opportunity to restore its own basic services. At the same time, we have got to ensure these efforts should not jeopardize our ability to respond to direct threats to our national security in other regions of the world."

Regardless of what type of threat America's forces are responding to, sustaining these forces abroad requires the support of the American people, Shelton said.

U.S., China to resume military relations

WASHINGTON — U.S. and Chinese defense leaders agreed Jan. 26 to resume military-to-military relations.

China severed relations with the United States last year after a U.S. plane mistakenly bombed the Chinese embassy in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, May 7 during NATO Operation Allied Force. The accident killed three persons and injured 20.

After a meeting here

with Chinese People's Liberation Army Deputy Chief of Staff Lt. Gen. Xiong Guangkai, Defense Secretary William S. Cohen announced he had accepted the general's invitation to visit Beijing later this year.

Cohen, who last visited the People's Republic of China in 1998, termed his meeting with the Chinese military chief as "very cordial." "I think that we are on track to getting military-to-military relations back at a normal state of affairs."

The DoD's steps toward restoring relations with China are part of an overall administration effort. President Clinton called on Congress to establish permanent normal trade relations with China in his State of the Union address Jan.

27. U.S. markets are already open to China, he said, so this would open China's markets to the United States.

Permanent normal trade relations would advance the cause of peace in Asia

and promote change in China, the president said. "It lies not only in our economic interest to grant China permanent normal trade relations status, ... We must do it to encourage China along the path of domestic reform, human rights, the rule of law and international cooperation," Clinton stated in a Jan. 24 letter to the speaker of the House and the president of the Senate.

American and Chinese defense officials discussed a range of re-engagement

issues here Jan. 25 and 26. Walter Slocombe, under-secretary of defense for policy, and Xiong led the talks.

"We agreed on a program to resume our military-to-military relationship, with a schedule of events for the coming year," Slocombe told reporters at the Pentagon Jan. 27.

Pending approval by both nation's capitals, the proposed calendar will

Infantry Marines test skills on Big Island

Battalion gets training in varied climes, conditions

Marines from L Co., 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment recently learned how a Nuclear, Biological and Chemical environment can affect warfighting.

As part of the battalion's Marine Corps Combat Readiness Evaluation Exercise, the Marines donned NBC gear and boarded a CH-53D Sea Stallion helicopter from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 363 for a helicopter assault on enemy positions defending Pu'u Keekee at Pohakuloa Training Area on the Big Island.

The heat and steep climb proved to be daunting obstacles in a Mission-oriented Protective Posture level four, which includes a NBC protective suit, boots, gloves and gas mask.

"A lot of Marines struggled to get up there," said Sgt. Philip Samuels, a guide for 1st platoon. "You've got to get your bodies used to these elements."

After a helicopter whisked the company into positions east of Pu'u Keekee, Marines advanced to the base of the hill where they encountered a chemical attack from the defenders.

"The lift into the zone went smoothly," said Capt. Prescott Boisvert, L company commander. He said inexperience caused a little confusion before the Marines recovered and "showed good dispersion when moving into their positions."

"The Marines who just got here ... they're not used to it," said Lance Cpl. Franklin Metz, a fire team leader. "It was good conditioning."

First Sgt. Edwin Clark, L Co. first sergeant, said the physical demands the environment placed on the Marines demon-

strated the importance of being prepared for anything.

"It can make simple things difficult on the battlefield," Clark said. "It shows why Marines need to be in outstanding physical condition."

Leadership from the non-commissioned officers helped keep the assault together and make it a success, he said.

"It looked like something you'd see in a movie," Clark said. "They looked good."

Forty-five minutes after the assault started, L Co. secured two peaks and was setting up base camp at the bottom of Pu'u Keekee hill, he said.

"That's pretty fast for this terrain," Clark said. "As quick as they moved across it, they would have taken it."

The day's assault on the hill may have exhausted the Marines, but this was just another battle in a war that would last another three days. For the Marines to think about returning home to K-Bay, they would have to continue to locate, close with, and destroy the enemy.

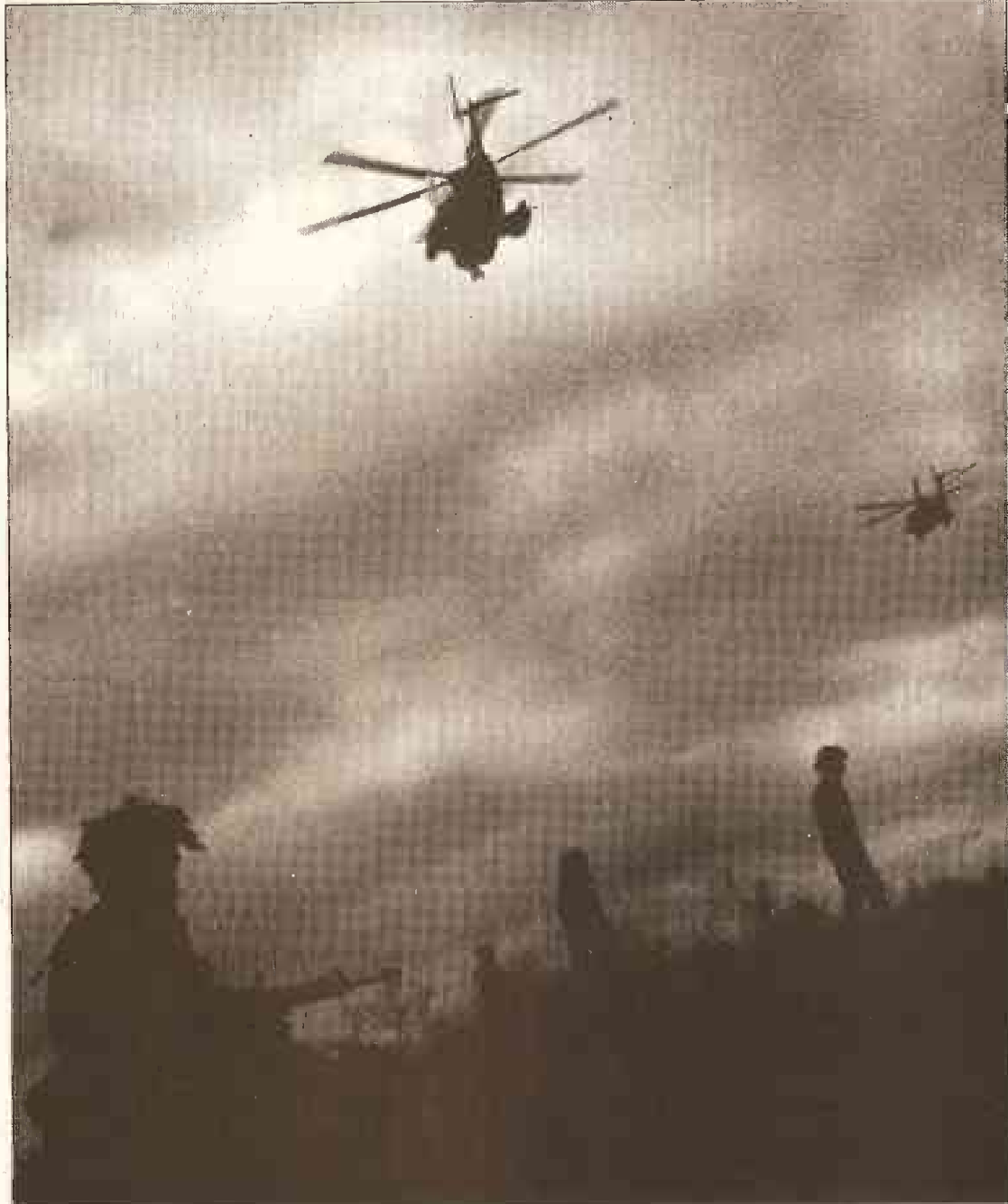

Call is out for women drill instructors

If you have been reading the message traffic coming from Headquarters Marine Corps lately, you know a call for volunteers has gone out for women Marines to take up the challenge of training the next generation of women Marines at Parris Island by serving as Drill Instructors.

It is the importance of this request and the importance of drill instructor duty that I would like to talk about this week.

First of all, let me say that I cannot think of a more rewarding special duty assignment for a noncommissioned officer, male or female, than a tour as a Drill Instructor at one of the two Depots. While serving as a Recruiter or on Embassy Duty are certainly both rewarding and challenging, neither one, in my opinion, challenges you the way a tour as a D.I. does.

Learning to deal with recruits from very diverse backgrounds will put more tools in your leadership tool box than you could ever acquire without experiencing it first hand.

For this reason, and for the future of our Corps, I am personally asking each and every one of you to "step up to the plate" and volunteer for this most demanding but rewarding duty.

According to the December issue of "Marines" magazine, of the 154,744 enlisted Marines who make up the active

duty Marine Corps, 9,269, or six percent, are women.

All of these women, just like their male counterparts, have one thing in common — something unique to our Corps that no other service can claim.

What is it? They all have had an ultimate role model mold them into basically qualified United States Marines.

At some point in their lives, a Marine Drill Instructor at Parris Island wearing a Scarlet Cord or a Campaign Hat put a little bit of themselves and the Eagle, Globe and Anchor into the hearts of each and every one of them. They were made Marines.

Each of the 9,269 women Marines currently on active duty, and the thousands of others who came before them, all had a Drill Instructor role model who mentored, taught, trained and led them in their quest to become United States Marines. What I am asking you to do is provide that role model just like you had.

Is the duty tough? You bet your butt it is. Drill Instructor School is one of the toughest schools in our Corps. It has to be. Why? As future Drill Instructors, you are being trained to lead the most precious thing this country can entrust to our Corps, the sons and daughters of its citizens.

Drill Instructor duty entails long hours on duty with a lot of time on your feet and, yes, some aggravation at times. But the feeling you get as you place the

Eagle, Globe and Anchor into the hand of a newly christened Marine who you trained is indescribable.

You will be working with some of the finest noncommissioned officers and staff noncommissioned officers in the Corps, and while you are training you are also learning. Believe me when I tell you, I myself became a much more effective leader after my tour on the Drill Field. What that experience did for me, and thousands of other former Drill Instructors, it will do for you.

Look at it this way — if you don't do it, who will?

How many times have you looked around the Marine Corps and wondered why a young Marine was heading down the wrong path? How would you like the opportunity to put them on the right path at the very beginning of their service? You can as a Drill Instructor.

As a Drill Instructor, you are the ultimate role model for the next generation of Marines.

You can make a difference in some young person's life and in the future of our Corps by your service. And in a way, you can become immortal at the same time, because while not all of us will become the Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, as a Marine Drill Instructor you will be putting your own Marine DNA into the Corps' newest Marines.

In short, you will live forever by passing on your love of our Corps, its traditions and its values to the next generation.

What greater way to make your mark

in this life?

Every year at the Marine Corps Ball, you watch as a piece of birthday cake is passed from the oldest to the youngest Marine present, symbolizing the passing of knowledge and Marine know how from one generation to the next.

Well guess what? Here is your opportunity to pass the very first piece of that cake to the newest members of our Corps.

The Marine Corps needs each and every Marine it has. Every Marine has to be well-trained and well-led. Who do we have to do it?

You only have to look in the mirror to answer my question. This is your opportunity to give back to the Marine Corps what it has given to you.

There is no perfect Drill Instructor template. You don't have to be a specific height or build, or be able to yell louder than Lee Erney. If you love the Corps and are willing to pass that love on to the next generation of Marines, believe me, you have what it takes.

I ask all of you to seriously consider a tour on the Field. If I have sparked an interest in you, see your Career Planner

There is no perfect drill instructor template ... If you love the Corps ... believe me, you have what it takes.

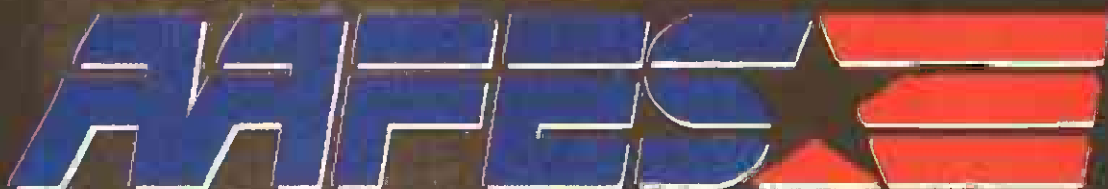

Aviation Marines cooperate with Air Force to hone embark skills

Making things happen and taking care of business may prove to be the "Marine Corps way" when looking at Marine embarkation specialists at Aviation Support Element Kaneohe.

Embarkation Marines at ASEK are responsible for transporting CH-53D Sea Stallion helicopters across the Pacific Ocean for maintenance or training operations like combined arms exercises in California.

With a limited budget and scarce resources for transporting the helicopters, Marines have to make several coordinations to accomplish their missions, according to Gunnery Sgt. Eric I. Gustafson, the embarkation officer and logistics chief for ASEK.

"We're being proactive in a situation that if we're not, we're going to hurt ourselves," said Gustafson, explaining that without prior coordination, helicopters couldn't be transported overseas.

Months before actually sending aircraft

overseas, Gustafson has to "scout out" Air Force Reserve units that he contacts from across the country to coordinate missions with them and make use of their C-5 Galaxy aircraft, which are capable of carrying two CH-53Ds.

"The more people you know, the easier the job is going to be," said Sgt. Deanna Daugherty, the embarkation chief for ASEK. "If you're not people-oriented, you're going to have a hard time."

During a recent mission, a helicopter had to be flown to Korea and two had to be brought back. The Air Force flew the mission as part of their training, which saved the Corps approximately \$400,000 in transportation costs.

In return for the Air Force's services, Marines give them the opportunity to come to Hawaii and get the unique training experience of transporting a CH-53D.

"They're used to transporting standard cargo, and a helicopter is not standard cargo," said Gustafson. "The more training they get

in different areas, the better they become."

Several things have to happen before being able to load the helicopters, which barely fit into the C-5s, said Gustafson.

"Once we get the airplane here, it's takes nothing but teamwork from the squadrons," said Gustafson. "One person can't do all that work. It takes a person who is an expert on how to load the helicopter to teach these Marines how to load their own gear."

Much of the loading involves continuous hands-on training in which Marines prepare the helicopter for transportation by doing things such as taking apart its rotors and transmission systems.

Marines make use of the C-5s approximately two to three times a month, continuously saving the Corps millions of dollars per year on transportation when the Air Force helps out at no charge, said Gustafson.

Embarkation Marines said the most satisfaction they get is from seeing the C-5 take off with a pair of CH-53Ds and knowing they were responsible for and making it happen.

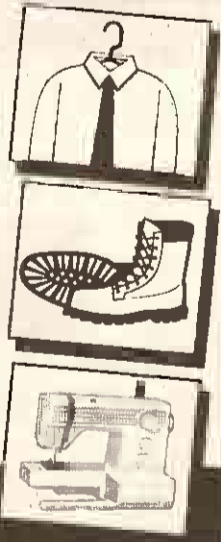

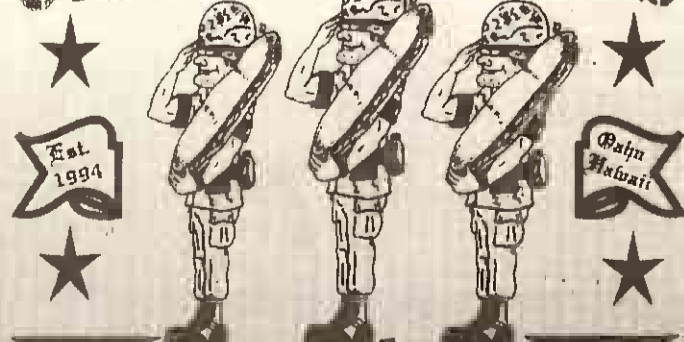

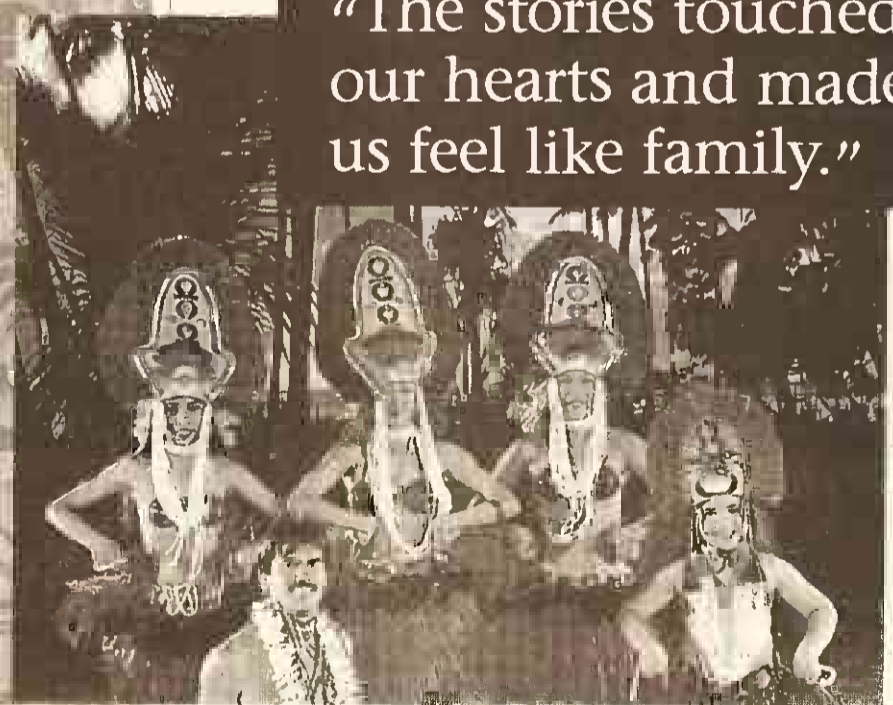

"Tuesday Tune-ups" and Wednesday Lunchtime Seminars offer classes like time and stress management from 11:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. in building 267, room 2, explained Linda Read, a prevention specialist with the MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, Marine Corps Community Services.

"We have made the classes user friendly," said Read. "This way people won't have to be away from their work station. They can come during lunch and get good information quickly."

There are two reasons that the classes can really help people out, explained Read. The first is if someone thinks they need the skills that one of the classes offer, they can show up, no registration needed.

Secondly, if a unit leader notices someone not performing well and a class may help them, they can recommend they take the class.

Along with these new lunchtime classes, there are also some other classes offered by

Personal Services. One of those is the Active Parenting of Teens.

This new class is six weeks long for parents of children age 10-18. The class helps parents who are past their teen years, explained Read. During the class, new teen problems are discussed.

Other classes offered on base included the Marriage Skills Workshop, which is a two day class held monthly, explained Robert Yourek, also a Family Advocacy Program prevention specialist with the Family Service Center.

Quarterly, there is also the Prevention and Relationship Enhancement Program, he added.

All these classes go along with the mission of the Family Advocacy Program, which is to "encourage individuals and families to take proactive steps in utilizing available programs and resources to resolve issues before they escalate into conflicts or violence," said Read.

Starting and Keeping a New Year's resolution to be more organized or become less stressed is possible through these free classes. To get information on these classes, contact Read or Yourek at 257-7775 or call 257-7787.

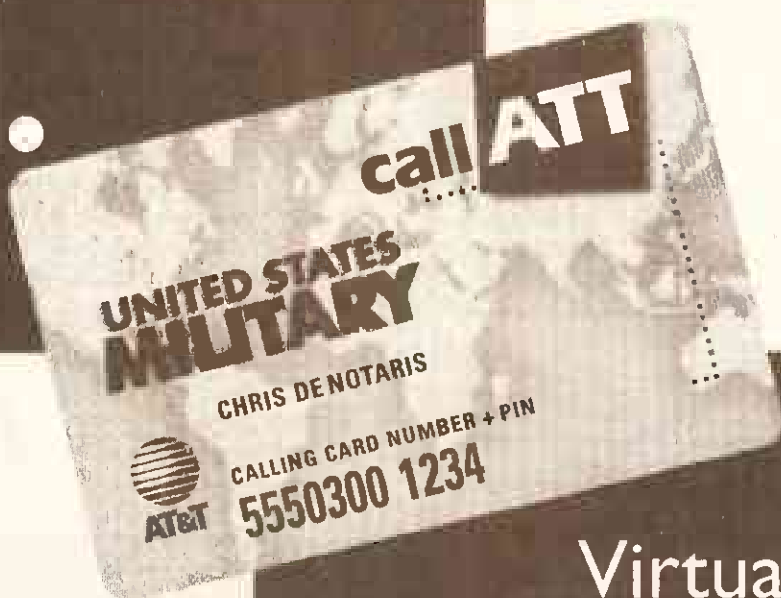

Marine fights for life, career in Corps

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION YUMA, Ariz. — Today, he blends in with the rest of the blue-suited Marines in his power plants shop at Marine Attack Squadron-311. On the outside, there is nothing that really makes this medium-built, brown-haired Marine from New Orleans stand out from his co-workers. But what's inside him makes Cpl. Shane Arabie, a plane captain with VMA-311, very different. He has leukemia.

Although the AV-8B Harriers the technicians work on are deadly machines of war, few of them have actually seen combat. In the fight for his life and the struggle to survive as a human as well as a Marine, however, Arabie sees combat everyday.

His body bears the marks of the steel bores that have been drilled into his body. He endures the attack of stabbing needles and powerful drugs on a daily basis.

"You can't help but feel sorry for him, but at the same time, he motivates the whole shop because of what he's going through," said Staff Sgt. Richard Brandenburg, Arabie's staff noncommissioned officer-in-charge.

His battle first began in January 1998, aboard the USS Belleau Wood with the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit. They were on their way to the Arabian Gulf from Okinawa, Japan.

It was on this ship that Arabie experienced "dizzy spells" after a hard day's work.

Months later, still thinking he was being overworked, Arabie never saw a doctor. The symptoms had worsened — nausea, weight loss, fatigue. One night on the coast of Mina Jabal Ali, after dinner, a friend told him his complexion was really white and that he needed to see a doctor. He retired that night to read a book, hoping he would get better. But when he opened the book, the words were too blurry to read.

He finally decided to see the ship's doctor.

"Normally, a person's white blood cell count is between 4,000 to 10,000. Mine was at 99,000," said Arabie.

White blood cells are a general term for a variety of cells that fight off infection and disease in the body, but when there are too many of them, it can be fatal. The doctor said Arabie was getting so dizzy because the massive number of white blood cells was slowing the blood flow to his brain.

"Another week and I would have been blind or in a coma. They started freaking out, doing the tests over and over again.

"When they sit you down on the big fluffy chair, you know something's

wrong," said Cpl. Arabie. They told him they believed he had leukemia and sent him home for further testing.

At that time, his wife, Hope, was in Yuma awaiting his arrival. "He told me he had some good news and that he had some bad news," said Hope. They agreed not worry too much until the finds were confirmed.

Doctors at Balboa Naval Hospital in San Diego performed a bone marrow biopsy and confirmed the ship doctor's find. He had chronic myelogenous leukemia.

They immediately started Arabie on powerful medications that would kill the white blood cells in his body.

The doctors informed him that he had a one-in-10 chance of being cured through chemotherapy. But after starting the chemo, they told him his best chance of being cured would be a full bone marrow transplant.

According to Arabie, Wilford Hall in Texas is the biggest medical facility of several in the military that have the capabilities of performing bone marrow transplants. But they only have the capabilities of doing transplants in which the donor is a relative.

"If I would have had a brother or sister, they could have done the transplant, but since I don't have any full siblings, I'll have to get a non-related donor transplant," he said. His doctors told him he had to receive the transplant through a civilian facility. The Arabie family decided the Harbor-University of California at Los Angeles Medical Center would be best. Since the operation costs \$250,000, they told him he had to get medically retired from the Marine Corps to receive the operation through Thicare.

"That would have devastated me for the rest of my life," said Arabie. He also would have had to rent an apartment in Los Angeles to be close to the hospital. Based on his financial options as a medical retiree, Arabie said he would not have had enough funds to even rent a one-bedroom apartment. "That's what I was dealing with."

The Marine told his doctors he wanted to stay in the Corps, but the doctors kept telling him he had to get out. He insisted that that was not an option.

"I'm not ready to go yet. At first I couldn't understand. It's not supposed to happen to you," said Hope. "But instead of flying off the handle, I chose to deal with it."

She and her husband decided to fight the system for what they felt they deserved.

"We intended for him to retire from the Marine Corps. I wanted to do everything I could so he could do what he wanted," said Hope. She said she spent

every ounce of her energy trying to find a solution to their problem. "That was my way of coping."

"We bothered everybody," said Hope. "It got so bad, we'd walk into the hospital and people would hide from us," said Arabie. Hope said they inquired everywhere about similar cases. Despite their efforts, they were not getting many results.

"Nobody wanted to tell me, 'You can stay active duty,'" said Arabie. "I wasn't getting any answers."

Using his chain of command, he finally made an important alliance with Capt. Patrick Torrey, the head of the disability section of the Separations and Retirement Branch at Headquarters Marine Corps.

"He's the one who started lighting for me and rattling cages," said Arabie.

"I got involved in August of '98 when we found a Marine was suffering from a condition we couldn't get him treatment for until he retired," said Torrey. "That didn't sound like we were taking care of our Marines."

"This is the kind of Marine we still need in the Marine Corps. He still performs all of his duties and he fought to find a way," said the captain. "It was kind of an ugly battle with a lot of phone calls, but we were finally able to get the right people who could make that decision to afford this Marine treatment and the chance to fight the disease."

Torrey credits Maj. Gen. Terrance Murray, director of Manpower Management Division at HQMC, with the initial decision. "He sought to get Arabie treatment and keep him on active duty."

"What's amazing, is that he's not thinking about what's going to happen 'if I beat this.' He asked me 'when,' not if, but 'when' I beat this, can I go to Florida and be an instructor?" said Torrey. "Here's a kid who's looking at the long term. He's not gonna let this beat him. That's the spirit we as Marines should all strive for."

Because of all the efforts in his chain of command and the support of higher officials, Arabie was allowed to stay on active duty and a check for the full amount of the transplant was written to the medical center at UCLA. According to Hope, UCLA has the best statistics for that type of procedure in the country, so not getting into Wilford Hall might not have been so bad any way.

"God works in mysterious ways. Maybe that was his plan to bring us here,

(to UCLA)" said Hope.

"Everything that needed to happen, happened," said Arabie. "I would have gotten railroaded if I hadn't been so damn stubborn."

Because of what Hope, Torrey, Gen. Murray, and countless supporters have done, Arabie said not only will he benefit, but others may benefit as well.

"I think there's going to be a lot of changes because of me. Hopefully, what happened to me will be beneficial to somebody else who doesn't want to get out."

Hope said her husband has made such an impact on the way things are being done, that future servicemembers in the same position will be able to refer to similar situations as the "Arabie case."

Although his fight to stay on active duty is for the most part won, Arabie still faces another battle — getting a perfect match for his bone marrow transplant. Since he does not have a brother or sister to give him a related-donor transplant, Hope is counting on a brother or sister from the Marine Corps, or even a civilian to donate the life-giving marrow. She is trying to organize a marrow drive in the Yuma community through the aid of the American Red Cross National Marrow Donor Program, although a definite date has not been determined.

Arabie said there are several possible donors on the national registry but they are either imperfect matches or they can't be contacted. Hope's efforts to save her husband's life also spurred Torrey to organize a marrow drive at HQMC and one in New York.

While their battle for life quietly wages on, the Arabies continue smiling. Through her actions and attitude, Hope shows her name is more than a word she is called by. Hope is something she holds dearly.

"You gotta stay optimistic. If you dwell on the fact that you could pass away or that I might lose somebody I love, you'll get nowhere. I love him and he's staying healthy. That's what we're focusing on," said Hope.

Looking back on his battles, emotional conflicts, and war with his outlook on life, Arabie said the most important thing he did was fight for what he believed in, and against something more deadly than leukemia.

"You can't let them roll you over," said Cpl. Arabie. "That's what will really kill you."

"Needless to say, any operation that we do is not going to be without risk to our troops, and insertion of armed forces always carries with it the potential for casualties," he said.

Therefore, Shelton said, each situation needs to be subjected to what he calls the "Dover Test," named after Dover Air Force Base, Del., the point of entry for the bodies of service members killed in action. "We have to ask the question, 'Is the American public prepared for the sight of our most precious resources coming home in flag-draped caskets into Dover Air Force Base?'" Shelton said.

This should be among the first things raised by Washington decisionmakers.

During the past decade, the use of America's armed forces in situations around the world has increased dramatically he said. The overriding lesson from these operations "is that we must bring all of our resources to bear — our political, diplomatic, military and economic — if we expect to be successful solving non-military problems, especially those that are rooted in religious, cultural or ethnic strife," he said.

"Sometimes providing assistance and help is exactly what this nation should do," Shelton said. "But it is also always prudent. I think, to consider the unintended consequences which may accompany well-intentioned impulses to use our strength for the good of the international community. We may find out that sorting out the good guys from the bad is not as easy as it seems. We may find that getting in is much easier than getting out. I think that these are the types of issues that we should confront up front before making a decision on whether to commit our military forces."

Okinawa, Corps ends gear issue

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION FUTENMA, Okinawa, Japan — As part of the Business Reform Initiative, active and reserve Marines will no longer be issued Career Length Issue equipment in accordance with the Marine Administrative Message 003/2000.

The initiative is a Corpwide effort that takes a look at day-to-day business

practices in order to find more efficient and effective ways of doing the job.

According to the message, sustaining the CLI program was not the most cost effective method.

It states, in order to better manage Individual Combat Clothing and Equipment resources, Consolidated Issue Facilities will be established throughout the Marine Corps.

Phase One is currently underway. Marines who are

scheduled to change permanent duty stations or leave the Marine Corps must return CLI equipment to their parent commands' Organic Supply sections prior to leaving Okinawa, said to Sgt. Sovanara Sar, MCAS Futenma property chief.

Eventually, records of Marines' individual clothing and equipment and any other records remaining in organic supply will be transferred into the consolidated facilities as

they come more into focus, said Sar.

Possible locations for facilities on Okinawa are camps Foster and Hansen. However, selected organic supply accounts will remain in operation where geographical location prevents being supported by a consolidated facility, added Sar.

Marines may contact their units' supply section for more details concerning their career-length gear issues.

include high-level military and professional visits, some confidence-building measures and participation in multinational events.

One of the first contacts will be a visit to China in the coming months by Adm. Dennis Blair, commander, U.S. Pacific Command. U.S. and Chinese officials also plan to discuss how the military can help respond to humanitarian and natural disasters.

Officials also plan to resume discussions on military maritime arrangements. Cohen signed an agreement Jan. 19, 1998, designed to prevent accidents and confrontations between the U.S. and Chinese navies. Cohen later said the pact strengthened U.S.-Chinese military ties and established a mechanism for regular communication between the two nations' militaries.

Slocombe called the military-to-military ties part of a balanced and deliberate program to reopen contact. "We think it's appropriate to start gradually and make this a very prudent and deliberate process," he said.

Events also will be consistent with applicable legislation, such as the fiscal 2000 defense authorization act signed by Clinton in October, Slocombe noted. The act limits military exchanges with China to prevent the

Chinese from gathering intelligence about defense technology. Department of Defense officials reviewed each potential military-to-military activity against the standards of the statute, he said. During the talks, Slocombe said, U.S. and Chinese officials also discussed global, regional, and bilateral issues, including the U.S. Asian-Pacific strategy.

He said he stressed that the Asia-Pacific region is a critical U.S. interest and that the U.S. military presence there is a factor for regional security, essential to developing democracy, economic prosperity and increased respect for human rights.

"I made clear that we do not seek confrontation and we do not follow a policy of containment or domination," Slocombe said. "We have strong differences of view with the government of China on some important issues, and we will protect our interests, but we do not regard China as an enemy."

On Taiwan, Slocombe said, "We made it clear that we will continue our sale of defensive arms to Taiwan so as to provide, in the terms of the Taiwan Relations Act, a sufficient defense capability." American officials pointed out it is in everybody's interest to avoid a build-up of tensions during the election period in Taiwan and the subsequent formation of a government, he said.

American officials also pointed out that the United States is developing a national missile defense system and has initiated talks with Russia to modify the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty. The Chinese voiced opposition to U.S. national missile defense and indicated they would prefer to see the ABM Treaty unchanged, he said.

American and Chinese officials share a strong common concern that tensions on the Korean Peninsula should be reduced and that North Korea should be nonnuclear. "The Chinese, in general, believe that the danger from the North Korean regime is less than we would characterize it as being, but they agree with the basic objective," Slocombe said.

Slocombe described the talks as fairly intense and cordial, despite real differences on some key issues. "I believe that Gen. Xiong Guangkai ... returns to China with a sense that the United States is committed to engagement with China and to cooperate where we have common approaches and interests and to work through our differences to resolve them where they exist."

During his visit here, Xiong also met with Army Gen. Henry Shelton, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Jim Steinberg, deputy national security adviser; and State Department officials, members of Congress and a number of private groups.

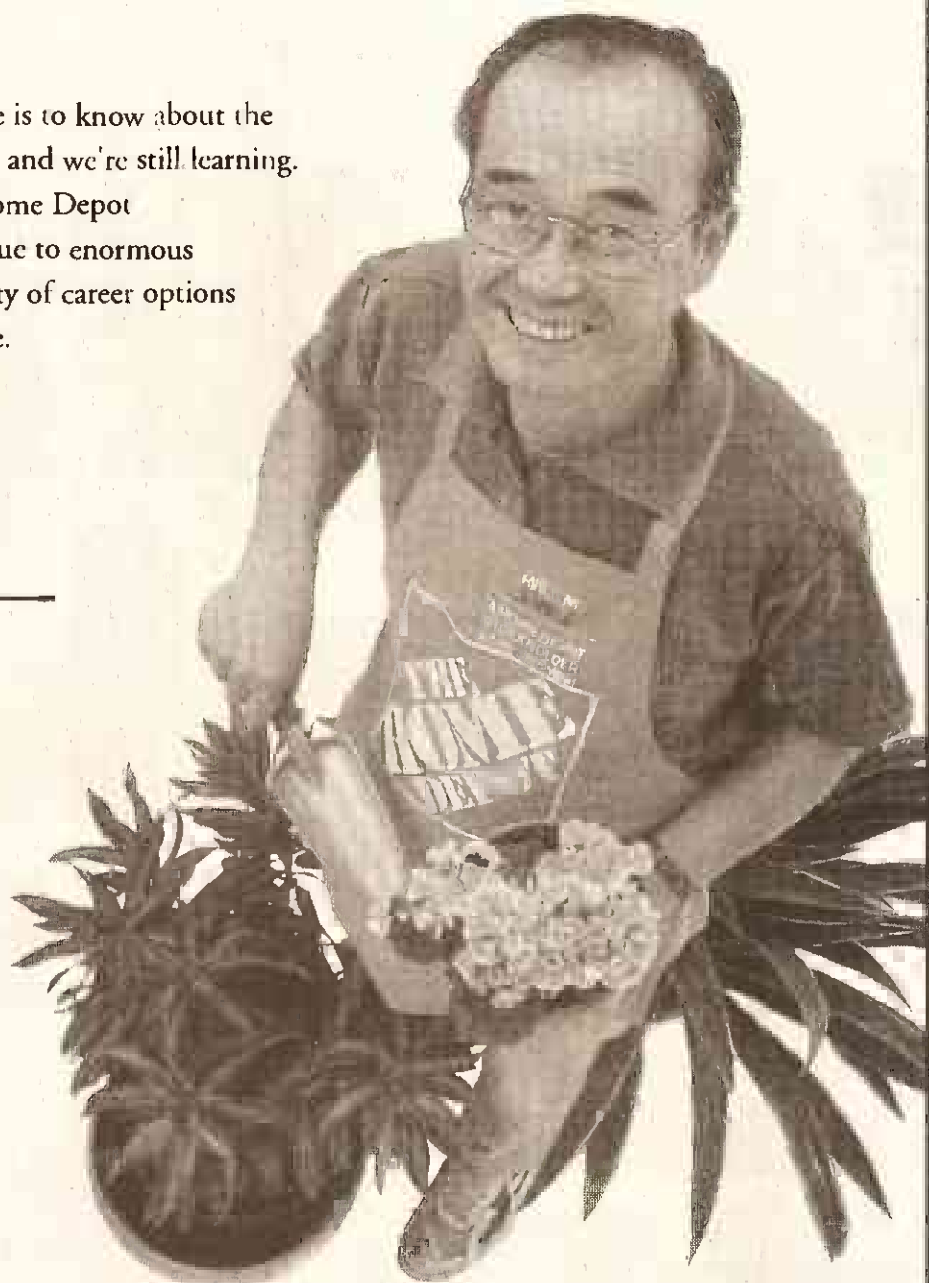

Nightlife thrives in Waikiki

As the sun settles across the horizon and darkens the island of Oahu, a distant glow shines the streets of Waikiki to bring out the nightlife unique to Hawaii.

Strolling down the central source of the hustle and bustle along the strip of Kalakaua Ave., tourists and kama'aina alike can find a whole new world within an almost two-mile stretch next to Waikiki Beach.

Even the smell of food from common fast-food restaurants compete against the cuisine of elegant, but more expensive dining places.

For the more lively crowd, the sounds of upbeat dance music may be enough to entice customers to the club scene.

"The dance clubs are cool," said Schwinden. "It's fun to go for entertainment."

But despite the omnipresent number of ways to spend a dollar, any passerby can visit the strip for an exercising walk or passing drive in sheer appreciation of

Hawaii's modern aloha culture.

Even mimes embodied in silver or gold paint can be seen throughout the streets attracting crowds of people as they move their bodies in robotic fashion and other people may even take free instant pictures of passersby who pose with their tropical birds.

And with police officers present every few blocks, people can rest assured to walk the streets without having to worry about facing adverse conditions, said Schwinden.

"It's a pretty clean city," added E.J. Loucks, a food service specialist for 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, "and there's a lot of good stuff to do."

Aside from just taking a spontaneous trip to Waikiki, others may find time to pre-schedule certain evenings for luaus and dinner cruises as well.

Just because the sun sets on another day, not everyone seems to head for home when taking a look at the lively scene of Waikiki at night.

Hiking, hunting, camping classes promote outdoor adventures

Hunting, hiking and camping opportunities in Hawaii abound, though for each activity there is a degree of risk.

To eliminate some of the dangers of the outdoors, the Hunters Education Course at the Department of Land and Natural Resources offers free classes to people 10 years of age and older to educate them on outdoor safety.

"This is one of the best buys for your money for anyone who want to do anything (outdoors) in Hawaii," said Debbie Ward, public information specialist for the Department of Land and Natural Resources, State Parks Office.

Though the name might make the class seem like it is for hunters only, there are many topics that deal with the outdoors in general, like outdoor

ethics, explained Wendell Kam, conservation education program specialist for the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Hunter Education Office.

Although this class is not mandatory to hike or camp on Oahu, hunters must have earned a certificate from completing the nationally recognized course.

Many of the topics taught are about safety and ways to survive. On the island of Oahu, there are two classes for hunting accidents -- attitude and mechanical, said Kam.

"About 90 percent of all hunting accidents are due to the wrong attitude," said Kam. "This class will teach people to be aware of their surroundings and recognize dangerous situations."

Another accident that occurs during many outdoor hiking, camping and hunting expeditions is

falling off cliffs.

The course can help prevent this by getting people orientated with the terrain of Hawaii, Ward said.

This course is held two to three times a month at various locations on the island and usually is fully booked two months in advance, said Kam.

Currently the MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, Environmental Department is coordinating with the Hunter Education Office to schedule a class on base in the future, said Gordon Olayvar, a natural resources technician for environmental.

Upcoming classes are scheduled for March 3 and 4 at Schofield Barracks, March 17 and 18 at Nimitz Business Center, and April 7 and 8 at the 4-H extension building next to the Kaneohe Police Department. To register, or for more information call 587-0200.

Recycling center turns trash into savings for base

Tons upon tons of garbage will fill landfills every year, but the Rainbow Recycling Center aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, is doing its part to reduce rubbish by offering ways to aid the base efforts to recycle and reuse a myriad of items.

Aside from saving the environment from unsightly garbage, recycling and reusing also saves money, said Karen Guntow, recycling program manager at the center.

At the end of the 1999 fiscal year, the center saved the base a total of \$314,348 with recycling and reusing programs currently in effect, said Guntow.

Of that money, \$18,406 was money saved through the variety of reusing programs that the Rainbow Recycling Center offers, explained Guntow.

The money saved is through avoiding disposal costs and the value of the reusable materials contributed to the center.

Rainbow Recycling encourages people to bring their recyclable items in them-

selves, or make use of recycling bins on base to help save the base money.

The center has also found ways of making items that are not recyclable reusable for base personnel.

From wood to office supplies, the center has free items that can be used for official and some personal use, explained Gunnery Sgt. William Salter, Marine liaison at the center.

The free wood is available to anyone on base for official or personal use, explained Salter. Wood sizes and types vary.

"We have people come here daily for the wood," said Guntow. "All the wood is in good condition and some of it seems brand new."

Due to these services, the center has become more accessible to the base personnel.

"These services are free and since the services bring people into the RRC, public relations have improved," said Guntow.

Some of the items that are accepted range from the common aluminum cans,

plastic milk jugs and glass bottles to printer ink cartridges, metal and wood pallets.

Now, if a Marine is changing duty stations or mailing a package, the cost of boxes and packaging material can be expensive. The Rainbow Recycling Center may help in that area, as well.

They have boxes in many sizes, bubble wrap, paper and Styrofoam peanuts. This supply of material is also available to anyone on base.

In the actual Reuse Room, there is a lot of equipment that can be gathered for official use, mainly office supplies. From binders to fencing, the reuse room is an easy way for a section to cut down on costs.

To contribute or take items, interested persons should visit the RRC on base from 7:45 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, except Wednesday when the center operates from noon to 3 p.m.

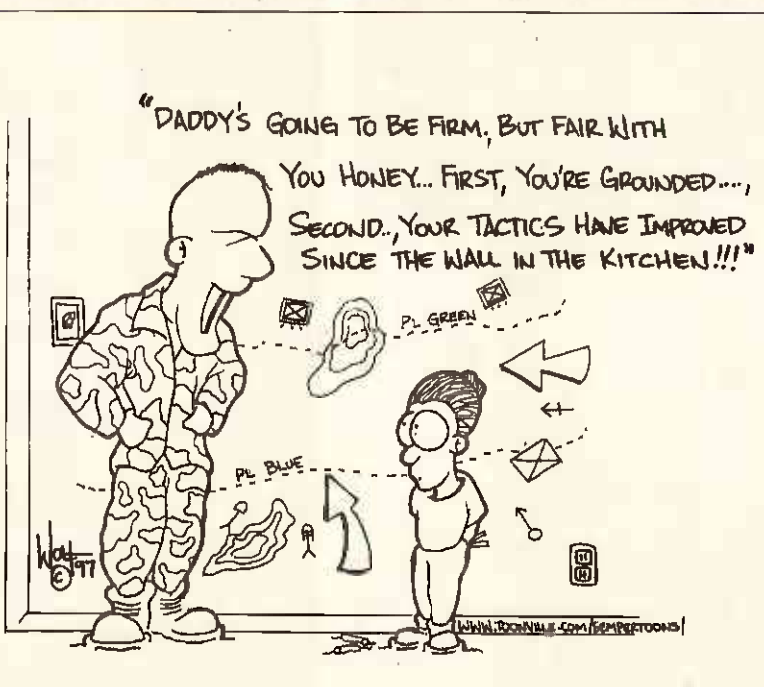

Navy/Marine Corps Relief Society serves 96 years

The Navy/Marine Corps Relief Society celebrated nearly 100 years of aiding deserving Naval servicemembers Jan. 23.

Nineteen volunteers founded the Navy Relief Society Jan. 23, 1904, to provide assistance to Navy widows and orphans. Initial funding came from the Navy's share (\$9,000) of the proceeds from the ticket sales of the 1903 Army-Navy football game. Until 1917, business was conducted out of the office of its chairman, Adm. George Dewey, and in the homes of different volunteers. After just one year of operations, the society opened several regional auxiliaries to more efficiently solicit and distribute funds to clients. In 1911 the society adopted a policy of using voluntary contributions from within the Naval Service for current relief expenditures.

The advent of World War I brought official Navy recognition of the Navy Relief Society when retired Navy Capt. E. J. Dorn, was ordered to special duty as the Corresponding Secretary and was allowed to use active duty enlisted personnel to handle the burgeoning society correspondence. It took 13 years – or until 1917 – for the society to accumulate \$100,000 in operating revenue. The Massachusetts Auxiliary raised that much in a single year in 1917. By that time, the organization had ballooned to 18 Auxiliaries, but the names of only one has survived from those early days – the District of Columbia. At that time, funds for society operations came mostly from the sale of Annual or Life Memberships. Even today, we occasionally receive correspondence or phone inquiries from individuals asking how much it costs to become a member of the Society!

June 1917 marked the birth of Navy Relief loans. Until that time, all of the society's assistance had been in the form of outright grants. Five years later, in 1922, the Society hired its first paid employee – Nell Watson, a visiting nurse at Parris Island, S.C. According to the 1922 Annual Report, "the service of a visiting nurse has been procured. In addition to rendering nursing assistance to the sick, she will be ready to furnish aid and instruction in the care and management of infants and children, especially as steps necessary in order to avoid disease, and in regard to question of diet, will give instructions on matters pertaining to

household hygiene and will be prepared at all times to undertake those duties ordinarily regarded as coming with the province of the community or visiting nurse. In this connection she will make a house to house visit, and it is desired that every facility be afforded her in carrying out this duty." Watson had no automobile and was granted permission to drive the base ambulance when she made house calls.

Recognition from the Secretary of the Navy came in 1923 when he gave the society its first permanent Headquarters in the "New Navy Building." Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. E.W. Eberle was elected president of the society on Oct. 28, 1926, beginning a tradition where the senior naval officer on active duty would serve as president. This practice lasted until 1978 when the Board of Managers decreed that the chairman of the board (title change in 1962) would alternate between the Chief of Naval Operations and the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

In 1937 the cumulative amount of assistance provided in the form of interest – free loans and grants finally reached \$1 million. World War II caused the need for the Society's resources to grow drastically. At the request of the Board of Managers, and with President Franklin D. Roosevelt's concurrence, Clarence Dillon, a prominent New York financier, chaired the National Citizens' Committee to conduct a one-time public solicitation of funds to support the Society.

Through this committee and many individual citizens, such as Joe Louis, who in 1942 donated his entire \$65,2000 heavyweight title winnings to the Navy Relief Society, the funds of the organization were increased by \$19 million. The funds remaining from the National Citizen's Committee were incorporated into the Society's reserve fund and carefully invested. Today, that reserve fund is valued at approximately \$202 million.

At the conclusion of World War II, Vice Adm. Vincent Murphy became the society's president, a position he held until 1962. His policy, "err on the side of liberality rather than parsimony" remains the underlying philosophy of the organization. By 1947 NMCRS changed terminology – detachments had become branches. At the time NMCRS had 38 auxiliaries and 25 branches. The society also boasted 10 visiting nurses.

The society established a field visiting service in

1945 and hired the first field representative in 1948, giving birth to the society's "Travel and Teach Team" concept. The purpose of this team was to provide instruction so that volunteers were well-versed and adhered to society policies. Today, this segment of the society workforce is known as the Training and Field Assistance Division.

Vice Adm. H.B. Jarett, society president from 1962-1964, established the education fund to assist servicemembers by financing college education for dependent children. In 1965, the first education loans (\$111,000 to 153 students) were issued. Just 2 years later in 1967, 650 students received \$536,000 in scholarships and loans for education. In 1999, the society disbursed \$6.4 million, assisting more than 4,000 students, including, for the third year in a row, support to spouses of active duty servicemembers and dependent children of retirees. Eighty percent of the grants for education are disbursed to enlisted servicemembers and their dependents.

In 1987 the society had 267 paid employees and 3,500 volunteers. That year NMCRS initiated the society's monthly newsletter, LINK, designed for employees and volunteers throughout the society. During that same year, the society initiated COD (Children of Deceased Servicemembers) education assistance program. During that year, the society provided \$31 million of financial assistance in the form of interest-free loans and grants, in more than 85,000 financial relief cases. The NMCRS had 49 auxiliaries and distributed 10,000 layettes, or junior seabags.

Even though the society has consistently rendered assistance to Sailors as well as Marines, the organization officially changed its name to the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society in 1991.

In 1992, the society began a direct mail campaign to retirees. The purpose was to remind Navy and Marine Corps personnel that they remain eligible for society assistance even after they retire, and to solicit financial contributions from them. Initial mailings were restricted to the officer community, but in 1993 a package of materials was sent to all retired Sailors and Marines. Contributions from this mailing have grown from \$200,000 in 1993 to more than \$1 million in 1998.

Retired Adm. Jerome L. Johnson, former Vice Chief of Naval Operations, became the society's president in 1994, implementing the concepts and

philosophy of Total Quality Leadership (TQL) throughout the society. He chaired a Strategic Planning Conference in 1995 with representation from auxiliary executive directors, chairmen of volunteers, division directors, and officers of the society. This group developed a Mission, Vision and Guiding Principles and identified seven strategic goals that guide the society today. Under his guidance, the society is continuously reviewing and improving business practices and processes to ensure our clients receive quality service. Since this Strategic Planning Conference, the society has conducted two international conferences.

Enjoying a strong partnership with active duty Navy and Marine Corps leadership, the society has taken an active role in promoting Personal Financial Management (PFM) training. The society was actively involved in helping the Chief of Naval Education and Training and the Bureau of Naval Personnel develop a comprehensive curriculum for teaching personal financial management throughout the training pipeline, down to the individual command/unit level. The society remains convinced that PFM education remains the most effective method for achieving financial self-sufficiency.

The Hawaiian Auxiliary opened in 1929. In 1999, the Hawaiian Auxiliary served over 2,000 local Sailors, Marines and their families with over 250 junior seabags and over \$1 million in interest-free loans and grants. In June 2000, the auxiliary will celebrate 71 years of service to the local community.

The NMCRS approaches the new millennium with confidence and excitement. The Society turned the corner on the 20th Century and is anxious to continue exploring ways to improve service for its clients and to strengthen partnerships with the Navy and Marine Corps leadership. The Society remains committed to responding effectively, with enthusiasm, to the needs of active duty and retired Sailors, Marines and families. The organization now has 30 auxiliaries, 45 branches, and 40 offices ashore. The society has an additional 125 shipboard offices. The society has 261 paid employees, but more than 3,000 volunteers, including nearly 500 active duty shipboard representatives, remaining the heart and soul of the society. Without them, the organization could not meet the needs of the naval service families.

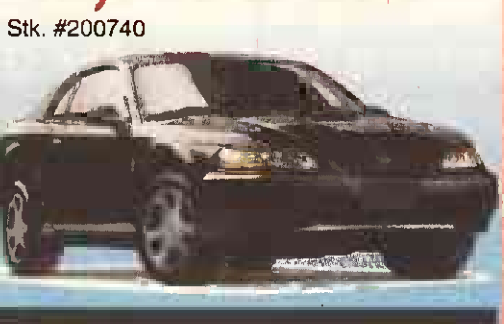
