### Commandant, Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps visit Marines, sailors in Helmand for final time

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan – General James F. Amos, the 35th Commandant of the Marine Corps, and Sgt. Maj. Micheal Barrett, the 17th Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, visited Marines and sailors aboard Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan, Sept. 6. The commandant visited the troops currently serving with Marine Expeditionary Brigade – Afghanistan for his final time before relinquishing his command to Gen. Joseph Dunford later this year. “This is my last opportunity to see you,” said Gen. Amos. “I’ve been the commandant for four years and a Marine for 44 (years). I wanted to come look you in the eye and say thanks. Thank you for making me proud every day when I wake up and put on this uniform.”

### Never Forget: RC(SW) holds remembrance ceremony aboard Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan – Marines, sailors and coalition partners gathered at the Regional Command (Southwest) headquarters aboard Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan, to commemorate the 13th anniversary of the 9/11 attacks. Several hundred service members gathered for a small ceremony during the morning hours, Sept. 11. During the ceremony, a brief script was read aloud reminding all in attendance the timeline of events on that fateful day. Following the reading, the national anthem was sung while the American flag was raised and then lowered to half-staff. The service members then observed a moment of silence. Brigadier Gen. Daniel D. Yoo, commander, RC(SW) and Marine Expeditionary Brigade – Afghanistan, concluded the ceremony by speaking to the service members about the significance of the day. “For Americans, 9/11 evokes a very special meaning,” Brig. ## Bravo Company Marines, sailors, ANA disrupt insurgent lethal aid in Helmand province, Afghanistan

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan — During the early morning hours, in almost pure darkness, a company of infantry Marines mounted in Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected vehicles and convoyed approximately three hours south from Camp Leatherneck for a security operation. Marines and sailors with Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, alongside elements of the Afghan National Army's 215th Corps conducted an operation to continue to show a military presence in Helmand province, Afghanistan, Sept. 3. The operation was designed to deter enemy insurgents from operating in the southern area of Helmand province.

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan – Petty Officer 2nd Class Joshua Van Horn was awarded the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with Combat Distinguishing Device, Sept. 17, during a small ceremony aboard Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan. Van Horn is currently on his second deployment in Helmand province. The 28-year-old Akron, Ohio, native wanted to join the Navy to serve his country and do something to help support his family. During 2010 while on his first deployment in southwestern Afghanistan, the Navy corpsman worked on an isolated forward operating base on the outskirts of Musa Qal'ah, a district that at the time was known for a significant enemy presence. Horn was a part of the Navy's Shock Trauma Platoon and Forward Resuscitative Surgical System, a small group of Navy doctors, nurses, anesthesiologists and corpsmen who work in tents that can be set up anywhere and who are trained to treat and stabilize critically wounded casualties prior to transporting them to larger, more sophisticated hospitals. ## Bravo Company Marines, sailors, ANA deter insurgent operations in Helmand

HELMAND PROVINCE, Afghanistan — Marines and sailors with Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, alongside Afghan National Army counterparts, disrupted insurgent activity during a security operation in Helmand province, Afghanistan, Sept. 9-11. During the 72-hour operation, two sections of Marines and ANA soldiers conducted dismounted patrols on foot at alternate times in the area. A dismounted patrol is when a small team of Marines leaves their vehicles to get a clear picture of the situation by sweeping the immediate area on foot with mine detectors. When one group of Marines and ANA were patrolling and searching nearby compounds for weapons and lethal aid, the other group held security inside a fortress of Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected vehicles. “Our main mission is to provide security and disrupt enemy activity in the area,” said Cpl. CAMP SHORABAK, Afghanistan — Afghan National Army soldiers with the 215th Corps completed the Afghan Tactical Air Coordinator course aboard Camp Shorabak, Helmand province, Afghanistan, Oct. 2. The course was designed to familiarize the soldiers with map reading and coordinating with airborne pilots on friendly and enemy troop positions on the battlefield. “Today we graduated eight students,” said Capt. John Graas, an operations advisor with the Consolidated Corps Advisor Team. “They learned how to talk to pilots in the air, how to integrate air support into the ground scheme of maneuver on the battlefield and how to call for casualty evacuations.
