# Department<br/>Open House

To take part in Fire Prevention Week which was Oct. 5-11 and October's Fire Prevention Month the Gowen Field firefighters hosted an open house Sunday, Oct. 5, at the Fire Department on base. Firefighters gave tours of their new vehicles, held demonstrations that showcased their equipment, and educated people about the department's capabilities.

Tech. Sgt. Jeffrey Sawmiller who has been full-time in the department for four years said, "Fire Prevention Week and Fire Prevention Month is something we take pretty seriously around here. We have a really good fire protection program."

The department inspects more than 200 buildings, and some of those are inspected up to four times in a year. "The more we do on the prevention side of things, the less we have as far as actual incidents," he said.

Gowen Field Fire Department had rescue and extrication tools set up for attendees to view and try out. To demonstrate their rescue tripod system, they suspended a simulated victim wearing a rescue harness, this allowed visitors to take a try at tugging the victim up to safety. The rescue tripod allows the 185 pound dummy to be pulled at one quarter of its weight. This rescue tripod would be used to rescue an individual from a manhole, or similar situation.

Additionally, visitors operated a tool that is commonly called the "Jaws of Life". This tool is a hydraulic rescue tool used for incidents such as a vehicle crash. This tool weighs in at roughly 50 pounds, with spreaders at the tip that expand at 30,000 pounds of force per square-inch.

Not only does the department respond to calls stemming from Gowen Field, they take calls from Boise and provide support for wildfires.

Senior Master Sgt. Chris Borelli, Gow-

en Fire Chief said, "If they needed us we would respond just like Boise City, any house fire, if they needed our capability."

During the open house the department also highlighted their medical capabilities. "A lot of people, even that work out here full-time, don't realize we have the medical capability, that everybody's an EMT, and that we have an urban search and rescue team right here on base," said Sawmiller.

Gowen's urban search and rescue team has equipment that is kept to deploy within six hours. In event of a natural disaster such as a hurricane, earthquake, flood, or storm, this team would pair up with Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Regional Team 10 based out of Seattle, Washington.

A feature that makes the Gowen Field Fire Department unique from Boise City is their rescue capability. Boise City Fire Department has no

rescue capability, which means they do not have a rescue vehicle. Both departments would be called at the same time, but Gowen would show up with the rescue vehicle.

purpose out here is to provide water. They provide the water, the foam, and we provide the rescue. We would actually get inside the aircraft, shut the aircraft down, and pull the pilot out."

A real incident happened just roughly a week before October drill. A civilian Boeing 737 that was diverted on a Las Vegas charter flight came in with report of a fire in the wheel well. Gowen Field Fire Department got the initial call stating a chute deployment was a possibility as the aircraft came in. This means that the aircraft would deploy its slides to get the passengers off the aircraft to safety. Gowen was in charge of the entire rescue operation and had city units assigned to them. After the aircraft landed, they realized there wasn't a fire. Gowen confirmed with the aircraft and

pilot whether they wanted to bus the passengers to the airport or evacuate them anyways. The aircraft was eventually towed back to the gate.

Another strength of the Gowen Brearley said, "Their [Boise City] whole Field Fire Department is their water tender, "Smokey 3," according to Sawmiller. Smokey 3 has a water capacity of 4,000 gallons. Boise City will call Gowen's department for assistance in the event that they are busy and need more water. Gowen Field Fire Department will set up on the road and refill and top off Boise City's trucks as they come by. Currently, there is a Mutual Aid Agreement under consideration by the Boise District of the Bureau of Land Management, allowing Gowen Field Fire Department to respond to incidents within Ada County. Sawmiller also explained that Gowen and Boise City have a good working relationship. Boise City can be confident that if they call Gowen, they will be getting qualified members to bring a tender out.

Gowen Field Fire Department is also fully capable of fighting wildland fires. According to Staff Sgt. Timothy Tullefson and Staff Sgt. Jason Rodgers, every Gowen firefighter is certified to the level of Wildland Firefighter 1 -- the same training expected of BLM or Forest Service Firefighters . There are three classes going into this certification, a field day, you also must know how to deploy the fire shelter, and there is refresher training every year following.

This open house showcased Gowen Field Fire Department's unique capabilities such as their water tender, brush trucks, and rescue equipment. According to Brearley the department hopes to share the knowledge of their abilities with everyone on base. . If a caller dials 911 from a cell phone, even on base, the call goes directly to downtown Boise which causes a delay, while dialing through the DSN the call will go to the Gowen Field Fire Department.

# **New Policy:**

# Possession of Privately Owned Weapons on IDNG **Properties Prohibited**

### Oct. 23,2013

A key responsibility of the Idaho National Guard (IDNG) is to provide a secure and safe workplace. The Possession of privately owned weapons (POWs) on Gowen Field and all IDNG properties constitutes an unacceptable threat to the safety of military and civilian employees of the IDNG. Accordingly, the possession of POWs on Gowen Field or in any facility or training area owned or leased by the IDNG is expressly prohibited. This prohibition specifically includes any individual issued a license to carry a concealed

# MAKING GREAT PROGRESS WITH ECARS SELF-REGISTRATION

ECARS went live September 5th, and since that time 59% of base personnel have self-registered in the program. Typical implementation rates at Guard bases are 40-45% after four months, so the IDANG is ahead of the curve! Let's keep improving! ## **ECARS** Registration is for Everyone!

The Employee Vehicle Certification and Reporting System (ECARS) is a web-based program designed to ensure the IDANG complies with Clean Air Act (CAA). This Act requires the IDANG to document that vehicles driving on base comply with local air emissions requirements.

### What does this mean?

ALL personnel at the base have to self-register in ECARS. If you drive a vehicle on the installation 60 days or more per year, you need to have a passing Ada or Canyon County emissions test on that vehicle. This applies to all personnel driving on base – even if your car is registered outside of Ada/Canyon County. ECARS is the program that documents you comply with this regulation. If you don't drive on base 60 days or more per year, you still need to identify this in ECARS.

### Why do I have to do this?

Congress passed this CAA law with the intent that employees at federal installations would not have a negative impact on local air quality. Since Ada County has air quality issues, employees at federal installations in Ada County are required to drive vehicles that pass the local emissions test.

Using ECARS to document your compliance with the CAA is required per <u>AFI 32-7040</u> and Commander supported (<u>read Brig. Gen. Michael Nolan's support letter here</u>).

### Who is Exempt?

Great question! The following vehicles are exempt from requiring a passing local emissions test.

- Vehicles that are driven on the installation less than 60 days per year
- Electric/hybrid vehicles
- Vehicles less than 5 years old
- · Vehicles older than 1981
- Classic automobiles
- Vehicles weighing less than 1,500 pounds
- Motor homes

EVEN IF YOU ARE EXEMPT, you still have to self-register and identify your exempt status!

# How do you self-register in ECARS?


From a military computer, follow the link: https://apims.af.mil/apims/ecars/certification/initCertification.ecars?certificationld=999000412776&esc=true to register in ECARS. There you can identify your vehicle as compliant/non-compliant, or exempt from the emissions requirements. ALL personnel MUST self-register in the system. This is a quick and easy process!!! You will be required to self-certify in ECARS every 1-2 years.



Article 137 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) requires that specific articles of the UCMJ shall be explained to each enlisted member when enlisting and at each reenlistment. The UCMJ briefing is required before reenlistment or within six days

# Leaders **Encouraging Airman** Development

It is that time of year for outstanding Airmen to apply to the United StatesAir Force Academy (USAFA). Our USAFA and its Preparatory School offer extraordinary opportunities to the most qualified enlisted Airmen who meet the criteria to enter the commissioned ranks. Those qualified and selected for an appointment will earn their Bachelor of Science degree while stationed at the Academy in Colorado Springs, CO. Upon graduation, LEAD Airmen are commissioned as an officer in the United States Air Force. The minimum postgraduate service commitment obligation is five years. In the aviation career path, the minimum obligation is 10 years after completion of UndergraduatePilot Training (UPT).


Interested Airmen must be academically qualified, of high moral character, possess exceptional leadership potential, and meet all USAFA entry requirements. Airmen cannot be past their 23rd birthday by 1 July 2015 for USAFA entry, or not past their 22nd birthday on 1 July 2015 of the year of entry to the Preparatory School. Airmen cannot have dependents, and must be aU.S. citizen upon entering the USAFA. Airmen are encouraged

to retake the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and/or American College Test (ACT) to ensure the most recent standardized test scores are submitted. As part of the application process, Airmen must complete an AF IMT 1786 with their Commander's recommendation. The completed 1786 form must be received by the AdmissionsOffice no later than 31 December 2014.

# The December PHA Festival will work much like a PDF line

### Here is what you can expect:

- 1. Member completes Web
  HA by close of business
  November UTA (From
  a military/CAC enabled
  computer click here)
- 2. Unit Health Monitor schedules members (30 slots/chalk, one chalk every 30 minutes)
- 3. Member reports to building 1500 at scheduled appointment time

- 4. At check-in member is given a color coded folder for either the Fast Track or Exam Track depending on their requirements
  - Fast Track is for members that only require immunizations and/or blood draw (30 minute max)
  - Exam Track is for members that require a Comprehensive HA (every 5 years) (2 hour max)
- 5. Folders are collected, reviewed and updated in the ASIMS system after member checkout

# Remote Active Duty Dental Program Steps to Make a Dental Appointment

As a remote active duty service member, you may personally coordinate your routine (examinations, cleanings, fillings) covered dental services\* if the dental treatment is less than \$750 per procedure, procedures within a single appointment are less than \$750, or the cumulative total is less than \$1,500 for treatment plans completed within a consecutive 12-month period.\*\* Keep in mind that treatment must be provided by a network dentist.

### Follow the steps below to initiate care:

- 1. Go to: addp-ucci.com and click the "Active Duty Service Member/Active Guard & Reserve" portal.
- 2. On the left, click the box "Make an Appointment."
- 3. Choose the option "Remote (Routine Care)."
- 4. Read the information and click on the link, "ACN Request Form."
- 5. To proceed, you must select "I agree" in the Privacy Act Statement box.
- 6. Complete the form providing all information.
- After submitting your completed form, a confirmation page that includes your ACN will appear. Print a copy of this page for your records.
- 8. After receiving your ACN, you can make your appointment with a United Concordia network dentist.
- 9. Remind your dentist to include your Dental Readiness Classification on the claim form to ensure your worldwide deployability status.
- \*A listing of ADDP covered benefits, to include specialty care, is available in the Benefits section of the website. Not all dental procedures are covered. If you elect to receive non-covered services, you are responsible for payment.

\*\*If your dentist recommends specialty care, or care in excess of these monetary thresholds, he/she will submit a treatment request for you. If approved, both you and your dentist will receive the ACN.

Veteran Designation on Idaho Driver's License and ID Cards

You must present an acceptable document to an Idaho Driver's License Office showing proof of honorable discharge from military service.

The information will be entered into Idaho's driver database.

There is no additional charge to add the veteran designation to a new or renewed Idaho driver's license or identification card.

There will be \$15 duplicate card fee to add the veteran designation at any other time.

The designation is permanent. There will be no additional cost unless you choose to have the designation removed.
