In the cards: Fort Meade implements Automated Installation Entry system

If you have visited Fort Meade recently, you may have noticed changes to the process for accessing the installation.

As part of the Department of Defense's enhanced access control procedures, the Fort Meade Directorate of Emergency Services has begun implementing the new Automated Installation Entry system at the gates.

The AIE security system will officially activate April 4 at all Fort Meade gates, requiring DoD Common Access Cards or family member identification cardholders to swipe or scan their ID card in order to gain entrance to the installation.

The purpose of the new system is to

increase security for service members and their families, DoD civilians, federal retirees, contractors and guests of the installation by electronically validating an individual's identification.

Gate guards will continue manning the access control points.

Delays at the gate may be avoided by following a few simple tips:

- Pull up close enough to the curb to access the AIE machine.
- Properly swipe or scan your CAC or family member ID using the barcode.
- Allow five to 10 seconds for the barcode scan to complete.
- Be alert while waiting in line.
- Proceed to the AIE machine after the vehicle in front of you has entered.
- Do not wait for the arm to completely lower before using the AIE system.
- Ensure all passengers in the vehicle possess a valid photo ID.
- No ID, no entry.

Does Cooling-Off Rule apply to your purchase?

The Legal Assistance Division frequently gets questions about door-to-door sales and solicitations for sales of periodicals and other goods.

The problems range from misunderstanding rights of cancellation and failure of the company selling the material to deliver the product promised, to the buyer figuring out that he or she really didn't want the product.

At stake is the potential obligation to pay lots of money for unwanted, defective or undelivered merchandise. If you purchase something at a store and later change your mind, you may not be able to return the merchandise.

However, if you buy an item in your home or at a location that is not the seller's permanent place of business, you may have the option to return the item.

The Federal Trade Commission's Cooling-Off Rule mandates that you have three days to cancel purchases of \$25 or more. This right to cancel and receive a full refund is effective until midnight of the third business day after the sale.

The Cooling-Off Rule applies to sales at your home and place of employment as well as at facilities rented by the seller on a temporary or short-term basis such as hotel rooms, convention centers and fairgrounds. The Cooling-Off Rule also applies if you invite the salesperson to your home to make a presentation. Under this rule, the seller must tell you about your cancellation rights at the time of the sale. The seller also must give you two copies of a cancellation form (one to keep and one to send in) and a copy of your contract. The contract must be dated, list the seller's name and address, and explain your cancellation rights — all in the same language used during the sales presentation.

The following types of sales may not be canceled even if they occur in locations normally covered by the rule: Sales under \$25; sales made entirely by telephone or mail; sales that are the result of prior negotiations held at the seller's permanent place of business; sales needed to meet an emergency; sales made as part of your request for repairs and maintenance on your personal property; sales for goods and services not primarily intended for personal, family or household use; sales involving real estate, insurance and securities; sales of arts and crafts at fairs, schools and shopping malls; and sales of motor vehicles at temporary locations, provided the seller has at least one permanent place of business.

To cancel a sale, you must sign and date one copy of the cancellation form and mail it to the address given on the form. The envelope must be post-marked before midnight of the third business day after the contract date. Saturday is considered a business day, but Sundays and federal holidays are not.

Since proof of the mailing date and proof of receipt are important, send the form by certified mail so that you get a return receipt. Keep a copy of the cancellation form for your records. If the seller did not provide you with a cancellation form, you may write your own letter.

You do not have to provide a reason for your decision to cancel.

If you have canceled the purchase, the seller has 10 days to return any promissory note to you, refund your money, inform you whether the product you have will be picked up, and return any trade-in merchandise.

Within 20 days, the seller must either pick up the merchandise or reimburse you for mailing expenses, if you agree to mail the items back.

You must make all merchandise available to the seller in as good a condition as when you received the goods.

If you do not make the merchandise available to the seller, or you fail to return the items as agreed, you will be obligated under the contract to pay for them.

Meade High stopped short

Mustangs halted in pursuit of second state championship

Some things just aren't meant to be.

In their quest for a second-straight state championship, the Meade High Mustangs boys varsity basketball team were shut down by Greenbelt's Eleanor Roosevelt High Raiders 72-39 on Saturday night at the Xfinity Center at the University of Maryland, College Park.

Last March, the Mustangs beat the Bethesda-Chevy Chase Barons 80-45 to win the 4A Boys State Basketball Championship. It was the first time since 1990 that an Anne Arundel County high school team won a state championship.

The stinging defeat in the 2016 Boys State Finals came after the 'Stangs (23-4) decimated Bethesda's Walt Whitman High Vikings (17-10) 61-35 in the Class 4A state semifinals on March 10 at the Xfinity Center.

On March 4, Meade High defeated the Annapolis High Panthers 62-59 in the Class 4A East Region final. Six days later, Eleanor Roosevelt (24-3), the West Region champs, knocked out the Perry Hall High Gators 69-59 in the state semifinals.

The Raiders, who won their second state title in the past four years, opened the game against the Mustangs on a 13-2 run. By the end of the first half, Eleanor Roosevelt was leading 38-13.

For the remainder of the game, Eleanor Roosevelt dominated, sending Raiders fans in the Xfinity Center into a frenzy. Leading the way was Raiders shooting guard Naji Marshall, who scored 21 points and grabbed five rebounds against the Mustangs.

61-35.

Meade High's star player, shooting guard Tristan Easton, tied his season low with 6 points as the Raiders' defense closely guarded him throughout the game. None of the Mustangs scored in double digits. Point guard Kodie Jackson came closest with 9.

Last December, the Raiders defeated the 'Stangs 62-54 in the Route 175 Holiday Classic.

Although disappointed by the outcome of the most recent game against Eleanor Roosevelt — which snapped the Mustangs' 14-game winning streak — Meade High coach Pete Corriero said he was extremely proud of his players.

"It was not the way we expected it to go. Roosevelt played extremely well and had a great season," he said. "We knew going in that we had to play a near-perfect game and Roosevelt had to have a bad game. Instead, they played their best game all season.

"We were outmatched on size alone. We were that team last year, bigger than everybody else. Once the game started, Roosevelt was very focused and executed better than we did.

"But that doesn't diminish our season at all or making it to the state championships two years in a row. No one expected us to make it that far," Corriero said. "That's an amazing accomplishment. This group achieved more in that two-year window than maybe any other team. This is a history-making class."


Although the Mustangs are losing seven seniors -

including Easton - Corriero said he looks forward to the Mustangs' next season and is quite optimistic. He noted that seven members of the team's current roster are freshmen.

"It's going to be a lot of fun. There will be growing pains, but that's what makes it fun," Corriero said. "They're ready to get back to work. Our guys are very proud of the tradition of the school and their legacy, and the younger guys see that.

"It's a great present and a really good future."

Kirby said the wing represents new opportunities for instructors to "challenge students" in the classroom and also push learning outside to "the fleet and field."

Meade's Directorate of Public Works and the Fort Meade garrison for their expertise and support in the construction of the new wing. Rockville, was the lead contractor on the project.

With its refurbished classrooms and upgraded offices, the new wing represents "a greater capacity and capabilities for teachers and students to learn in a modern environment," Downie said.

The school also installed a wireless network, obtained tablets for students and increased online training materials.

But more importantly, Downie said, the new wing "reunites our school."

During construction, DINFOS was a "divided campus," he said, with the main serious commitment on the part of the

south campus, which was an 88,000-squarefoot facility made up of multiple trailers that was located at the corner of Simonds Road The John C. Grimberg Company, based in and York Avenue. The south campus was established four years ago.

Some classes were temporarily held at the south campus until the new wing was opened to instructors and students in January.

"We are reunited and it feels so good," Downie said, referring to the song "Reunit-ed" by Peaches and Herb, a disco duo popular in the 1980s.

DINFOS is now able to train up to 3,000 students per year in one location.

In his remarks, Kirby said the new wing stands as "tangible physical evidence" of "a
