More U.S. troops headed to Iraq

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Defense Secretary Ash Carter and one of his senior commanders offered some details about the role of the 560 additional U.S. troops the Defense Department announced Monday will deploy to Iraq to support Iraqi forces combating the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant.

The commander of Combined Joint Task Force Operation In-

herent Resolve, Army Lt. Gen. Sean MacFarland, said the troops will serve a support role, “to help expand the base at Qayyarah West airfield into a node that can support the Iraqi security forces as they move forward with the Mosul operation.” He added that some of the troops will help provide “a security envelope” for the force.

Carter noted the airfield is one of two objectives — the other being the town of Makhmur in Erbil province — “that we

set some months ago as places from which the Iraqi security forces would position themselves for the southernmost envelopment of Mosul.”

“The whole idea is to envelop Mosul from the north and the south, and then collapse ISIL’s control over it, as has been done in other cities,” Carter said. “Hit, Rutbah, Fallujah, Ramadi and so forth.”

Carter said Iraqi forces have

To mark the 50th anniversary from the day the Air Force presented the keys of Larson Air Force Base to the Port of Moses Lake, officials hosted an open house for the local community July 1.

C-17 aircrews from the 62nd and 446th Airlift Wings routinely use a nonlighted runway for nighttime assault landing training at the airport. More than 2,800 members of the local community walked around the Grant County International Airport at Moses Lake and toured different aircraft, both military and civilian, up-close.

In addition to viewing the aircraft static displays, there was also a classic car show, food, vendors and music.

“This was more a thank you to the community,” said Rich Mueller, Port of Moses Lake event manager and director of facilities and operations. “What started out as an event with one airplane and a little ceremony, turned into this successful event that was free to the community and showcased what we do here.”

The 62nd Airlift Wing flew a C-17 and aircrew out to Moses Lake earlier that day to setup a static display before the gates opened at 10 a.m.

 His eyes gleamed without any sense of nervousness as Spc. Sajalupadhyaya Nepal stood tall and recited the United States of America’s Pledge of Allegiance at his naturalization ceremony at the Seattle Center June 15.

“As I sang the national anthem, I couldn’t stop smiling,” Nepal said. “I just kept thinking

I am finally done waiting to become a citizen.”

Nepal’s journey to become a U.S. citizen started when he was 18 years old. He came to the U.S. from Biratnager, Nepal, on a student visa to attend Colorado State University at Pueblo.

His father convinced him to apply to universities in the U.S. and to tackle the challenges of

Airfield tower gets its cab

Dreary skies couldn't dampen Robert Rodriguez's mood as he watched the final piece placed atop Joint Base Lewis-McChord's new Flight Control Tower at Gray Army Airfield July 8.

"Elated is the best word to describe it," Rodriguez said, aviation officer and JBLM aviation division chief. "It's the crown jewel. Since 2003, when I got here, we have literally replaced or repaired every single item (on) this airfield. The runway, all the taxiways, the instrument landing system, radar, weather system — so there is literally nothing we haven't fixed, and the tower is the cherry on top."

Groups of workers, community members and construction executives gathered around the site to watch as a large crane lifted a 5-ton steel cabin more than 150 feet into the air before resting it on the newly-built tower. While the tower isn't expected to be operational until spring 2017, the placing of the cab is the final phase of structural construction for the tower.

The new \$11.6 million tower comes after more than a decade of planning, which is what made seeing the cab placed on the tower such a memorable moment, Rodriguez said. It was also extremely needed due to

the state of the current tower, which Rodriguez described as "too small, in bad shape and almost unusable."

The condition of the previous tower shouldn't come as a surprise, seeing as it had been built more than 50 years ago. It had also been deemed "an obstruction to air traffic" under current guidelines due to its close proximity to the runway.

This new tower will improve the airfield's operational capabilities and efficiencies, providing room for growth over the next 50 years, according to

Rodriguez. It will also increase the shelf life on equipment because of improved airflow, contain extra space for training, and any potential new equipment, and offer a better view of aircraft landing at the airfield. The tower is LEED certified — Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design — accrediting it as environmentally friendly according to standards established by the U.S. Green Building Council.

All of these improvements are critical to handle the five battalions and more than 150 aircraft that regularly use the airfield, Rodriguez said.

"Since the arrival of the 16th (Combat Aviation Brigade) and (4th Battalion, 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment), the airfield has seen nearly a 300 percent increase in air traffic," Rodriguez said. "We desperately, dearly, needed this tower and the renovations to the airfield."

Staff from the company hired to build the tower, Walsh Construction, also expressed their excitement at the structural conclusion of the tower.

"It's an example of a well-executed plan that took weeks to draft," said Keith Dyer, a regional safety manager that worked to ensure the cab was placed safely. "It's always a success when a plan comes together and no one is hurt."

Museum closed for renovation

The Lewis Army Museum, located on Lewis North, closed for restoration July 2 and is expected to reopen its doors to the public in the new year.

Lewis Army Museum Director Erik Flint spoke about the changes visitors can expect to see when the museum reopens in 2017.

"The museum's first floor galleries will be closed for the next few months while (Joint Base Lewis-McChord) Directorate of Public Works prepares the building for the installation of our new, updated exhibits" Flint said. "The new custom-made exhibits are being fabricated by Formations, Inc. of Portland and will be installed by them following DPW's work."

Flint predicts the museum will welcome visitors and guests early in the coming year.

"We expect the museum to reopen, along with our new pedestrian access parking lot, after the first of the year," Flint said. "We are extremely excited to be able to share what will be a first-class museum experience with service members, families and the public."

The reasons for the renovation are more than just aesthetic.

"The artifacts will be more secure in new cases that were designed with artifact preservation in mind," said Heidi K Pier-

son, curator at the museum.

"Less damaging LED lighting and conservation figures will also provide a safer way to exhibit artifacts, especially textiles."

With all new exhibit cases built at the same time, comes better security.

"The new exhibit cases will all be keyed in a similar manner, allowing museum staff to more easily check on artifacts and maintain property accountability," Pierson said.

The museum is located in an historic building built during the establishment of Camp Lewis during World War I. Minor changes have been made to the building over time. In 1955 the exterior was covered with cement asbestos shingle siding and exterior fire escapes replaced the original wood balconies.

The plumbing, electrical wiring and bathrooms were upgraded. In 1962 the post engineer recommended that the Inn be demolished. Fortunately in 1965 his successor ordered an

extensive structural analysis that resulted in another upgrade on the first floor lobby area when carpet was installed, interior and exterior painting, and construction of a new parking lot, landscaping and the remodeling of two rooms adjacent to the lobby.

In 1972 the Army condemned the building due to fire and safety concerns. However a historically significant building would be preserved as a post landmark on the National Register of Historic Places in 1979 and it became the home of the Fort Lewis Military Museum. Deferred maintenance left the third floor of the museum uninhabitable until a major renovation took place from 2009 to late 2011.

With the merger of JBLM in 2010, the museum continues to serve in its role as the Lewis Army Museum and is the only certified U.S. Army Museum on the West Coast.

Today, the museum operates with by a small professional staff augmented by volunteers and Soldiers. The Friends of the Lewis Military Museum operate the Cannon Shop Gift Store in the museum or online at fortlewismuseum.com. All proceeds go back to the museum.

The Soldiers are from various units on JBLM who serve 90 days assisting with events, visitors, tours and give military history classes for local community organizations, schools and units on JBLM.

Social worker honored for helping families

2nd Bde., 2nd Inf. Div. Soldier dies during unit physical training

A Soldier assigned to Joint Base Lewis-McChord died early July 8 during unit physical training. The Soldier, Spc. Louis M. Moua, 26, an infantryman from the 2nd Battalion, 1st Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division, was taking part in a unit run in a wooded area on Lewis North at the time of the incident.

"On behalf of the Soldiers and officers of the 2nd Battalion, 1st Infantry Regiment, I want to express my most heartfelt sympathies to the family of Spc. Louis Moua," said Lt. Col. Troy Meissel, Commander, 2-1st Inf. "The tragic event that occurred on July 8 was a significant loss for both you and the battalion. It has been an honor and privilege to have known and served with Louis."

Emergency medical staff from Madigan Army Medical Center responded to the scene and administered emergency medical treatment. Moua was transported by ambulance to Madigan where he was pronounced dead.

Moua arrived at JBLM in September 2015. Moua deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom from February to October 2014.

Amtrak Cascades station at Freighthouse Square opens 2017

City, state and railroad officials celebrated the start of construction of the new Amtrak Cascades station in Tacoma's Freighthouse Square with a construction kickoff ceremony Wednesday.

The 100,000-square-foot station will be a new structure that replaces an existing portion of the historic Freighthouse Square building. It is adjacent to Sound Transit's Sounder station in the building and across the street from the Pierce Transit Tacoma Dome Station.

The ceremony celebrated the station's construction and a new era in train travel. The station will be designed to align with ongoing transit-oriented development within Tacoma's Dome District, aimed at further developing the area as a vibrant transit hub that includes retail and residential spaces.

When it opens in fall 2017, the station will serve six daily roundtrip Amtrak Cascades trains and Amtrak's Coast Starlight long-distance service.

"Today is a day that U.S. Army got it absolutely right," said Brig. Gen. Edwin J. Deedrick, commanding general of 1st Special Forces Command (Airborne) who presided over the ceremony. "I've known Otto Liller since he was a captain, and I've known Guillaume Beaurpere since he was a major, and they are two of the finest officers I've ever known. Officers, both warrant and senior, saw the ability of these fine officers early in their careers and invested the time and effort

ASOG welcomes Col. Berry as commander

Airmen from the 1st Air Support Operations Group saluted their new commander for the first time during a change of command ceremony on Joint Base Lewis-McChord July 6. The incoming commander, Col. Jon Berry, assumed command of the group from outgoing commander Col. James Bowen.

The ceremony was presided over by Col. David Mineau, 354th Fighter Wing commander, Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska, which the 1st ASOG is assigned to.

Berry comes to the Pacific Northwest from Joint Region Marianas, Guam, where he served as the director of operations overseeing more than \$34 million in assets and 450 people.

Taking command of the 1st ASOG, Berry will be responsible for leading more than 550 active-duty military and civilian personnel from four squadrons and four detachments, which provide combat-ready tactical air control party and battlefield weather assets to combat units.

These include the 1st Weather Squadron, 3rd Air Support Operations Squadron, 5th Air Support Operations Squadron and the 25th Air Support

Operations Squadron.

"Along our journey you can count on an emphasis in intellectual rigor; professional development and the inclusion of appropriate risk taking leadership principles," Berry said. "Ultimately, allowing us to directly pursue and support the most effective warfighting preparation and training opportunities available."

The 1st ASOG also allies the Army on U.S. and allied aerospace power, warfighting doctrine and capabilities as well

as integrates close air support, airlift and reconnaissance assets into joint battle plans. The group provides support to the Army Pacific, Army Alaska, I Corps, 25th Infantry Division and multiple aviation, airborne, infantry and Stryker brigade combat teams.

Well acquainted in serving in numerous operational staff and command assignments throughout his career, Berry has served as a flying training adviser for the Royal Saudi Air Force, chief of Middle East exercises with

the U.S. European Command, and as commander of the 4th Air Support Operations Squadron.

"To the ASOG family, many of you already know me, and have worked alongside me, but let me offer my sincere appreciation in advance for what you do every day in support of our mission," Berry said. "Your efforts do not go unnoticed. From me, here's what you can expect: clearly defined commander's intent and focus; timely and decisive actions;

Lancer Brigade finds success in Hanuman Guardian

The combined U.S.-Thai formation learned from each other during the exercise, facing training challenges such as mountain rescue operations, casualty care and security operations tailored to prepare the Royal Thai Army to respond to natural disasters — all while contending with the driving rain of Thailand's monsoon season.

"As I look out at the audience, I see a group of professionals who have gained great insight and experience over these last

few weeks," said Brig. Gen. Wallace Turner, assistant Adjutant General and commander of the Washington Army National Guard in his address to the assembled Soldiers. "The long days and the hard work you have put in has paid off."

In its fifth iteration, Hanuman Guardian has built on the training and lessons learned from previous exercises.

"With each successive year we, with our (Royal Thai Army) partners, have made Hanuman Guardian a better and better exercise," said Lt. Col. Ian Palmer, commander of the 8th

Squadron, 1st Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Bde., 2nd Inf. Div. "We are committed to making (Hanuman Guardian) 2017 even better than this year.

"The coordination, the training, the life support, and everything else associated with the exercise gets better and better."

In addition to providing valuable training to the Soldiers of the 2nd Bde., 2nd Inf. Div., leaders were faced with the challenge of coordinating and conducting training with many different units. Soldiers from the Washington Army National Guard provided high-angle rappel and

helicopter hoist training, aviators from the 2nd Battalion, 25th Aviation Regiment flew hundreds of flight hours with their Thai counterparts. Medics and Soldiers from 18th Medical Command shared health care practices with Royal Thai Army doctors, and civilian medical personnel and the 593rd Expeditionary Sustainment Brigade provided logistics support to make it all possible.

"It's really amazing to see the number of parties involved with putting Hanuman Guardian together," Palmer said. "We have U.S. units from both the

active and reserve component, from CONUS and Hawaii, and from combat arms units to doctors and veterinarians all working together to strengthen our partnership with the (Royal Thai Army)."

Hanuman Guardian is the first of four training exercises conducted as part of Pacific Pathways. In addition to training in Thailand, the Lancer Brigade is preparing to train with allies in the Philippines, Malaysia and Indonesia; each iteration has the aim of improving interoperability with Soldiers and leaders in the Indo-Pacific region.

Volunteers needed on the water

If you're interested in water sports, looking for a good way to learn more about boating and fishing and want to help others stay safe while enjoying and protecting the waterways available on base, becoming a volunteer at Russell Landing Marina and Shoreline Park might be the outdoor opportunity for you.

As the Northwest's short, sprightly season of sun unfolds, Russell Landing staff are looking for a few good young men and women to volunteer. Russell Landing is on the north shore of American Lake and offers boat, pedal boat, canoe and kayak rentals, as well as jet skiing and fishing.

Nearby Shoreline Park, off Shoreline Beach Road, offers a lifeguards-on-duty swimming area, beach volleyball, basketball court and horseshoe pit. There's also playground equipment and boat, paddle boat, canoe and kayak rentals.

Volunteers need to be at least 14 years old and should have some experience with water safety and activities, said Kristy Utkin, a recreational aide at Russell Landing.

"It's important volunteers know how to swim and aren't afraid of the water," she said.

Rain or shine, volunteers are outside throughout the day, assisting with life jacket fittings, helping load boats, providing rules of the lake and

helping with general maintenance and cleanup.

Volunteering at Russell Landing and Shoreline Park counts

as community volunteer hours for schools and military service, according to Robert Money-maker-Donachie, manager at

Russell Landing Marina and Shoreline Park.

Although there currently is only a need for one or two volunteers, as the season progresses and weather permits, additional volunteers will be needed, Money-maker-Donachie said.

"If it's a really busy weekend, we can always use more volunteers," he said. "This year, the weather hasn't been supporting

that, but probably (the end of the summer) will be busier."

Volunteering at the lake can be a stepping stone for future jobs and a learning experience for retail and water activities, Money-maker-Donachie said.

Volunteering gives workers "a foot in the door," as volunteers can be contacted later if a paid position is available, he said.

Seventeen-year-old Cheyenne Lombardi is proof that hard work at the facility can lead to job opportunities. Lombardi, a Yelm High School student, became a volunteer at Russell Landing last year. This year, she is a paid staffer there.

"My mother works here, and it was busy so she asked me to come help," Lombardi said.

The youth originally helped out with life jacket fittings and moved on to working in the small store at the facility as well. Her family has a boat, and she earned her boater's card as a volunteer.

More military bases join Sentinel Landscapes

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Numerous military installations have joined the Sentinel Landscapes partnership to maintain military readiness while preserving local agriculture, natural resources and wildlife habitat, Defense Department officials announced Tuesday.

Avon Park Air Force Range, Fla.; Camp Ripley, Minn.; and the eastern North Carolina region, which comprises numerous military installations, joined the cooperative partnership between DOD and the departments of Interior and Agriculture, DOD officials said.

The first designees were Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Fort Huachuca, Ariz., and Patuxent River Naval Air Station, Md.

In July 2013, the departments launched the Sentinel Landscapes partnership through a memorandum of understanding to meet three critical goals:

- preserve working and agricultural lands
- restore and protect wildlife habitat
- assist with military readiness.

PARTNERSHIP VITAL TO THE NATIONAL DEFENSE

Through the Sentinel Landscapes partnership, the federal agencies work with state, local and private partners to preserve working and natural lands important to the nation's defense mission.

Protecting and restoring habitat around military bases so that at-risk species can survive will help provide for unimpeded training and sustain military readiness, White House officials said.

"What makes this announcement so significant is the benefit these partnerships provide to our national security," said Pete Potochney, performing the duties of assistant secretary of defense for energy, installations and environment. "Not only does the collaboration around Avon Park, Camp Ripley, and throughout eastern North Carolina ensure the continued availability of critical military installations and ranges, but this partnership also preserves working lands that provide food and fiber to our nation and sustains key natural resources that help to ensure water quality and provide climate change resilience."

"The Sentinel Landscapes partnership is an innovative initiative that protects critical DOD missions through efficient government and private-sector collaboration. This is a true win for warfighters and taxpayers."

PARTNERSHIP CORE CHARACTERISTICS

Led at the local level, stakeholders work together to ensure the Sentinel Landscape possesses three fundamental components, according to the partnership's website -- sentinel-landscapes.org.

- Military installations or ranges anchor each Sentinel Landscape. Installations and ranges benefit from the compatible land use and conservation provided by the lands in the Sentinel Landscape;
- Defined landscape is associated with the anchor installation's "mission footprint." Within this landscape, government agencies, private parties, and nongovernment organizations coordinate their programs in support of ranching, farming, forestry and conservation with the full involvement and partnership of the landowners in the landscape;
- A coordinated and collaborative strategy or plan provides

incentives and recognition to participating landowners, who adopt and sustain land uses compatible with the military mission while providing tangible benefits to conservation and working lands within the landscape.

THE BENEFITS

DOD officials said these new locations encompass vital military ranges needed to test and train to meet threats as they arise, as well as support strong and effective conservation partnerships.

At Avon Park Air Force Range Sentinel Landscape in Florida, 24 local, state and federal partners have committed more than \$8.25 million to protect or enhance 1,926 acres. Avon Park is the Air Force's primary training range east of the Mississippi River and is a training resource for all branches of the military and state and local law enforcement. The Sentinel Landscape is also a biodiversity hot spot and

home to the Everglades Headwaters National Wildlife Refuge.

Avon Park and the surrounding area are part of a strong agricultural tradition with numerous cattle ranches, citrus farms, croplands and working forests.

At the headwaters of the Mississippi River, Camp Ripley in Minnesota is the primary training center for national guard units from seven states. The rural and agricultural character of the landscape helps protect the quality of one of Minnesota's most important drinking water sources. More than 40 miles of the Mississippi River are involved, with 16 local, state and federal partners sharing responsibility for protecting water quality.

They have committed more than \$5.18 million to protect or enhance 34,903 acres, which is expected to protect Camp Ripley's training mission, the integrity of the region's natural resources, and provide expanded access to hunting, fishing and recreation.

In eastern North Carolina, military-related activity is the second-largest economic driver behind agriculture, and the area is home to significant wildlife areas and 29 federally listed threatened or endangered species. To protect national defense, preserve valuable regional resources, and benefit local economies, the Eastern North Carolina Sentinel Landscape has 20 local, state, and federal partners that have committed more than \$10.71 million to protect or enhance 42,971 acres.

Through the Sentinel Landscapes program, partners are helping pioneer innovative approaches to land protection, restoration and management.

achieved important results against ISIL, aided by the U.S.-led coalition.

"It's essential that this work continue," he said. "It's not done yet. We still have important work to do here in Iraq and also in Syria. As we expel ISIL from the major urban areas of Iraq, which the Iraqi security forces with our help are in the process of doing, there will ... need to be a larger effort to secure the country."

In discussions with Iraqi Prime Minister Haider al Abadi, Carter said, the two leaders also discussed possible support from

U.S. intelligence and for countering improvised explosive devices for Baghdad, where ISIL has mounted deadly attacks in recent weeks.

MacFarland emphasized that ISIL's territorial losses are affecting the group's ability to mount organized attacks.

"As the enemy loses control over some of these key support nodes, like Manbij (in Syria), and eventually Raqqa and Mosul, they lose a base of operations," the general said. "They lose finances. They lose the ability to plan, to create the fake documentation that they need to get around the world. So we don't know how many acts of terror that we've disrupted or prevented so far. It's impossible to know or to prove.

"But you have to believe that as we continue to deny the enemy the ability — or a safe haven where they can plan and prepare for these operations — it will eventually support the larger campaign against terror around the world."

MacFarland said that ISIL is an adaptive enemy that requires an adaptive offense.

"The best defense is a good offense," the general said. "And by continuing to put pressure on the enemy in places like Raqqa, Mosul (and) Manbij, it does prevent the enemy from really hatching a lot of these types of plots. But we are starting to put pressure on the enemy's ... terror networks, threat networks that are around the capital and we will continue to ramp that up over time."

Carter said he and other military leaders will continue to look for ways to accelerate the campaign against ISIL in Syria and Iraq, "consistent with our overall strategic approach, which is to achieve a lasting defeat which means working with capable, motivated local forces that can hold territory and govern territory after ISIL is expelled from it."

"We will defeat ISIL, I don't have any doubt about that," Carter said. "But as and when (MacFarland) determines that there are additional capabilities that he needs, again in the enabler role, we will provide them. I will ask the president for them and I have every expectation he will give them."

MacFarland said that coordination with the Iraqi govern-

ment is key to the coalition's efforts.

"Our coalition partners are also increasing their capabilities here right along with us. And it's not just the United States," MacFarland said. "There is a large coalition and more and more we're getting the contributions that we need from our partners who, by the way, are decreasing the number of U.S. troops that need to deploy as well."

MacFarland said the deployment announced Monday will not put U.S. forces "any closer to the enemy than we've been anywhere else."

"But we need to move to this place so that we can be as close to the fighting as we have been in the Euphrates River Valley fights," he said.

The event was one of dozens of similar activities presented on bases across the country by the Army and Air Force Exchange Service, Hasbro and Disney. The training was provided to allow military families a chance to participate in the activity available otherwise only at Walt Disney World in Florida.

This was the second year that Jedi training has been provided at JBLM.

"At no point should any part of the lightsaber go behind your body," said Kevin Ritch, Jedi trainer and a Hasbro representative. "When I say 'Go' I want you to strike the No. 2 block (markings on the dummy bags) as quickly as you can."

And the trainees weren't treated like they were youngsters — they were going to be trained as Jedies.

"This is not a toddler class — quicker, you've got to be quicker," Ritch said a few moments later. "Stretch your arms out like this," he said, showing the technique to a small girl in a brown robe, black mask, jeans and bright pink neon sneakers.

Children came from across the base and beyond to participate in the classes. Sessions lasted less than an hour each but were repeated for more than 240 children registered for each day. They were all children or

grandchildren of service members or veterans.

"Andre is very excited; we've never seen him like this," Juana Riede said as she and her husband, Sgt. Jason Riede, 46th Aviation Support Battalion, 16th Combat Aviation Brigade, watched Andre enthusiastically

wield his lightsaber.

"Now, spin," Ritch said to his crew of exuberant Jedi Knights-in-training, adding, "It's very important in Jedi Training 101 that we don't use the helicopter spin. Don't hold your lightsaber out; hold it up."

Afterward, children stood in

line to receive certificates of Jedi Knighthood and get their pictures taken with a "real" Stormtrooper, portrayed by Joe Marzocca, a U.S. Navy veteran. Natalie said her favorite part of the training was the "1-2-3 spin."

"I didn't know I could do that," she said, with a big smile.

Debbie Gipson and her husband, Don, a U.S. Army veteran, applauded as their 5-year-old grandson, Dontevean Ray concluded his training.

"He loves 'Star Wars,' and it's good to get him out of the house," Dontevean's grandpa said. "He did excellent."

earning an education overseas.

"No one wants to move away from home when things are easy and where you are comfortable with your friends," Nepal said. "When I moved to the United States, everything got harder."

The only person Nepal knew when he moved to the U.S. was his older sister, who was also on a student visa attending the Colorado State University at Pueblo. Even though they attended the same school, he was still in a new environment, with new people, half way around the world from what was comfortable.

"When I moved here, I did not even know how to do simple things like cook," Nepal said. "The United States taught me everything that I know because I moved here when I was so young. I am truly grateful for the experience, it made me grow as a person."

Upon completion of his undergraduate degree, Nepal accepted a job in the District of Columbia working as a health care con-

tractor. Not surprisingly, he challenged himself again — working by day and completing his master's degree in business administration from Columbia College at night.

While working in the District, Nepal made friends in the military. As a child he had always wanted to join the armed forces, and seeing his friends in uniform motivated him to sign up

even more.

"Wanting to join the military became my passion," Nepal said. "I liked the idea of the lifestyle, discipline and the camaraderie."

Nepal was persistent about joining the military and, after several years, joined the Army as a new recruit.

Immediately after donning the uniform as a new Soldier, Nepal

applied to become a U.S. citizen while attending Army basic training at Fort Jackson, S.C. Noncitizen service members are allowed to apply for citizenship while attending basic training — they must demonstrate good moral character, knowledge of the English language, knowledge of U.S. government and history and take an oath of allegiance to the U.S. Constitution.

While once again balancing two jobs — the rigors of basic training and the hours required to study for citizenship, Nepal diligently prepared to become a Soldier and attain U.S. citizenship.

After graduation, Nepal embarked on another long journey taking him even farther from home, traveling the 3,000 miles from South Carolina to Joint Base Lewis-McChord, where he was assigned as a medical logistics specialist.

With one goal achieved, Nepal furiously focused on the next: taking the naturalization exam and preparing for the face-to-face interview. But his focus wasn't singular — during this time, he was nominated for and selected as the driver for the commander of Madigan Army

Medical Center.

"When I passed my citizenship test, I finally relaxed," Nepal said. "I was so happy, but my command team was more excited than I was."

Colonel Michael Place, the commander of Madigan, said that Nepal showed superior motivation, determination and performance through the entire process of receiving his citizenship.

"We were very excited for him to received his citizenship; he is a self-motivator," said Sgt. 1st Class Marisa Richardson, non-commissioned officer in charge of the Madigan command group.

Naturally, Nepal has new goals. Now that he is a citizen he would like to sponsor his mother and father in order for them to become U.S. citizens.

Additionally, he hopes to apply to attend officer candidate school in order to become an officer within the Medical Service Corps.

"Team Madigan is enormously proud of his hard work, and his decision to become an American citizen," Place said. "We appreciate his on-going contributions to the defense of our great country."

10K event sets pace for Ten-Miler qualifier

Richard Williams had a good first official day on Joint Base Lewis-McChord July 8. Before reporting to Madigan Army Medical Center after receiving permanent change of station orders from Tripler Army Medical Center in Hawaii, he finished with the fastest overall time during the JBLM Triumph 10K Championship.

Williams finished with a time of 38 minutes and one second — more than two minutes faster than the second best time by Josh Harsager (40:06) of the 2nd Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment and David Kidd (40:30) of

the 555th Engineer Brigade. Despite the win, the time didn't meet Williams' standards.

"I'm kind of nursing an achilles, and this is my first run in more than 30 days," he said. It's been a busy month having made the transition from Hawaii to Washington. Williams said he enjoyed the much cooler temperatures for the early morning run that started at 6 a.m. on JBLM.

He's also planning to compete in more distance runs in preparation to earn a spot on the base Army Ten-Miler team, such as the JBLM Freedom Run July 23 that will feature a 10-mile qualifying run for the Army

Ten-Miler in October in Washington, D.C.

"Hopefully, I can run around the same pace or better," Williams said. "I want to represent Madigan as best I can."

Another runner hoping to qualify for JBLM 10-mile squad is the 62nd Medical Brigade's Elizabeth DeSitter, who had the fastest overall time among women after crossing the finish line at 44:44. Her time was more than two minutes ahead of the second place Sylvan Smith of the 555th Engr. Bde. (46:53).

Similar to Williams, DeSitter said she feels she can run a

better pace as she continues to train for the upcoming 10-mile qualifying run. Running at a 7:12 mile pace was a good measure for where she was a few weeks from the JBLM Freedom Run.

"I was hoping for a little bit faster pace, but I'm not going to get down about this race — just train for the next one," DeSitter said.

For the team competition, the 17th Field Artillery Brigade had the most points with the most top-three times — six — to give the brigade 50 total team points and lead the second-place tie between the 62nd Med. Bde. and 555th Engr. Bde. by a distant margin. Each brigade that had at least one runner earned the unit 10 additional participation points to go toward the 2016 JBLM Commander's Cup sports trophy given at the end of the year.

The early morning run

The different drills the JBLM soccer hopefuls were put through tested not only their individual skills, but also the proper use of their body position, body language and working well as a team with others.

"Selecting the right players by position and how they fit into our system will be the key," Hyres said.

The two started developing a team earlier this year with an indoor team that practiced at the Tacoma Soccer Center and competed in the inaugural High Desert Cup at Fort Irwin in March. JBLM finished fourth in the tournament after losing in the third-place match against the Royal Lancers from the United Kingdom by one goal.

With the success from the High Desert Cup, the expectation is for the JBLM team to advance to the quarterfinals with the main goal being to win in a tournament that attracted 40 installation teams across the country.

"What we saw before the tryouts is that we have a solid core group of guys," Hyres said. "Because we have so many different units to pull from, we have the potential to put together a good squad."

One of the players who came to the tryout camp is Mark Rivera, who played for the Lackland team while stationed there between 2007 and 2011. He's been tracking the tournament and how it has grown since he transitioned to JBLM and is excited at the possibility of returning to the tournament with a different team — as a much different player.

"I was much younger and had a lot more stamina, but now I have more confidence with having more control of the ball," Rivera said.

The tournament will have a large amount of talent with players who regularly play semi-professional and professional soccer and also represent the different branches during Armed Forces Soccer Championships or with the U.S. Armed Forces Team at international tournaments like the International Military Sports Council's World Military Games.

Dornbusch is an Army Reservist who not only plays for the All-Army program, but also

plays professionally for Hauerseter SK in Norway. He and Hyres are also hoping that having the

JBLM team for both indoor and outdoor tournaments will become a feeder program for the U.S. Armed Forces' soccer programs.

"Not only does this get you recognition here, but also for the All-Army team," Dornbusch said. "(The opportunity) is much bigger."

Hyres and Dornbusch will host another three-day camp scheduled for Aug. 9 to 11 at Rainier Field on McChord Field. The final team will have the top 18 players coming out of both camps. Practices will take place every Tuesday and Wednesday until the Defender's Cup.

Those who don't make the final cut are still encouraged to maintain soccer shape. They'll be placed on a reserve team that both coaches feel will be needed in the event of injuries or other military-related obligations.

This newly-built team will not be sponsored by JBLM's Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation — meaning the team will have to use money from previous fundraisers to help cover the costs of team registration, travel and other expenses. There's also likely to be out-of-pocket costs players will be responsible for.

All who turned out said they are still excited for the opportunities of making this JBLM team, including Makaio Hamilton, who said making the All-Army team one day would be a dream come true.

"(The Defender's Cup) may not be the Champions League or La Liga, but it's a start," Hamilton said. "And I would be grateful for the chance. I would work hard for it."

finding triathlons near her; the most recent was at the Lakewood SummerFest Triathlon in Lakewood Saturday. It began with the half-mile swim in American Lake and continued with a 14-mile bicycle ride and 5K run through Fort Steilacoom Park.

"(Triathlons) give me a way to connect with whatever community I'm in," Drysdale said.

Since last year, the Lakewood SummerFest Triathlon has attracted service members from JBLM. A few years ago, JBLM used to host three triathlons a year, but these activities have been reduced due to budget cuts.

A partnership between the city of Lakewood, the organizers of the Black Hills Triathlon (held in Lacey in June) and the JBLM Intramural Sports and Race team created a new Triple

Threat Triathlon series that will conclude with JBLM's Deuces Wild Triathlon Aug. 20 at Shoreline Park on Lewis North.



Each site provides visitors a chance to get away from their day-to-day lives and enjoy the wilderness with a sense of safety one can only find on a military base. For many campers, it's that safety and seclusion they find so valuable.

"You feel like you're camping in the backcountry, but you can feel safe

knowing that you're camping behind (gates) as opposed to out in the open," said Holiday Park's manager Amanda Parker.

Parker oversees one of the most popular campsites, Holiday Park, which is located on Lewis North. People are able to camp with tents or RVs as they explore the sprawling campground. It is usually crowded during the summer, with countless families flocking from all around the Northwest to enjoy it. Luckily for vis-

itors, the grounds are so spacious that it doesn't feel crowded, even when it reaches maximum capacity.

"Some campgrounds line you up in a row, like a town; this one actually keeps some distance between campgrounds," said Richard Styczynski, visiting for the first time from Phoenix. "It really makes it feel like camping."

Another popular site is the Lewis Travel Camp, right on American Lake, with a variety of lodging

options. Not only can people bring tents and RVs, but there is also an option to rent out cabins. Size varies from studios to


two bedrooms, but reservations are required. Cabins go fast, so make sure to call the Northwest Adventure Center at 253-967-6263. Reservations can be taken up to 90 days in advance, and it's best to call as soon as that 90 day mark hits, according to Northwest Adventure Center representative, Abigail Crosby.

The other two sites, on Chambers Lake and Lewis Lake, are small and first-come, first-served. If you're lucky enough to

swipe a spot, you'll be treated to a nice quiet weekend on the lakefront. If you are looking to explore off base, speak with the staff at the Adventure Center, who organize camps trips for service members around the state.

When visiting these spots, make sure to be respectful and safe, especially with fires. Campers may have above ground fires at Holiday Park and the travel camp, but they are forbidden on the two lake sites. Pets are allowed at the camp sites, but not in the cabins at the travel camp.

When you're looking for some way to enjoy the summer sun, look no farther than escaping into the wilderness on JBLM.
