- **1.** Fool me once, shame on you. Fool CSM Dailey once and he will roundhouse kick you in the face.



As I hovered over a small portion of Baghdad a few nights back, I couldn't help but recall my last year spent here. I thought about the obvious changes that have occurred in the time passed. This war is ending right in front of my eyes. The times have changed and this place is not the same Iraq it was when I left almost three years ago.

I thought about the things I had done wrong then; mistakes made by myself and members of my platoon at the time. We were not working to end the war or to make peace in a torn nation, nor did we carry any consideration for the people of Iraq.

At the time, that was the direction we were pushed, but now, in a dark sky above, I see streets littered with traffic and commerce flowing freely on the streets, shops open and busy. A world prospering

compared to a bullet-riddled hell I knew before. I must face the music, that this piece of Baghdad I will call my own for the next year or so, must be looked after and taken care of, not pushed around and harassed. It is

my time, to pass the torch and ensure that I keep my head straight and do the right thing, as well as lead my soldiers in the right path.

The last time, most of the fighting was with foreign fighters from Syria and Iran.
