COMREL Updates Includes Nice Bridge Timeline Update and Statewide Jobs Initiative

The Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) Community Relations (COMREL) Council held its second quarter meeting May 17 at the High Tides on the Potomac restaurant, in Colonial Beach, Va., where updates to the civilian and military leadership from both sides of the river included an overview of the Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren 100th Anniversary, the most recent changes to the Harry W. Nice Bridge replacement project and an introduction to the “GO Virginia Initiative,” a bipartisan and business-led coalition working to create better business opportunities statewide.

Colonial Beach Mayor Eddie Blunt welcomed the nearly 70 attendees to the event and introduced NSASP Commanding Officer Capt. Mary Feinberg. Feinberg kicked off the updates with discussion on recent events at NSF Dahlgren and NSF Indian Head, including the upcoming change of com-

mand slated for June 21 when Capt. Michael O’Leary will assume command of NSASP, as well as a change of command for the Joint Warfare Analysis Center (JWAC) aboard NSF Dahlgren. She discussed the recent award from the Maryland Historical Trust for the efforts by staff at NSF Indian Head and the Washington Navy Yard to preserve a historic Watch Box that was restored and returned from NSF Indian Head to the Naval Yard, where it saw use during the U.S. Civil War. Feinberg also briefed the COMREL about the completion of the annual HURREX exercise — a Navy-wide exercise to evaluate and enhance major weather response on Navy installations. Feinberg shared the results of the recent aerial bald eagle survey conducted by the Center for Conservation Biology at the College of

NSASP Prepares for Hurricane Season During HURREX Exercise

This week personnel from all across the Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) command worked in conjunction with Naval District Washington (NDW) to evaluate the preparedness of not only first responders, but also to ensure that everyone aboard with an NMCI account has updated their contact information via the Wide Area Alert Network (WAAN) — located on the right-hand side of their NMCI machine’s toolbar as a small purple globe called “AtHoc.”

This year’s HURREX scenario involved two simulated tropical cyclones that developed and intensified to hurricane strength, threatening the East Coast of the United States, the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean coastal regions. Aboard Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren however, the fictional “Hurricane Brady” downed a tree that caused a HAZMAT spill; this functional portion of the drill tested first responders’ ability to handle the effects of powerful weather events.

The fire, rescue and police team members had to secure the scenario location, determine if there were any casualties or victims and stabilize the scene; responders also had to “treat” an role player who was “exposed” to HAZMAT.

Robert “Mo” Stone, an environmental technician at

a HAZMAT storage facility on NSF Dahlgren, played the role of victim for the event. Stone shared that if this was an actual scenario he would know exactly what contaminant he had come in contact with.

“We’ve been pretty fortunate so far,” Stone shared. “We have not ever had a real life incident like this in

the past, but it’s good that we are going through this drill to make sure we know what to do.”

NSASP Emergency Manager Tim Bennett agrees with that summation. The two-week long exercise provided information regarding preparation and prompted all personnel in the first week to take necessary precautions to ensure that they were prepared and had updated their WAAN information. The second week has all Navy bases on the Eastern seaboard preparing for any eventuality through various exercise, including simulated overturned vehicles, mock power outages and flooding that allowed them to test their response to such incidents. A recent EF-1 tornado touch down on NSF Dahlgren only reinforced that need for preparedness.

“The recent weather that affected us locally really highlights the necessity of this kind of exercise,” Bennett said. “Making sure our people are prepared and we have a plan in place is key to successfully weathering those types of events.”

Personal responsibility is a key factor in preparedness in extreme weather situations. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), in an extreme weather event or any other disaster situation. The Navy website — <http://www.ready.navy.mil> offers Sailors, dependants and Navy civilians all the information they need to properly prepare for emergencies, both on and off base.

DOSC Awards Annual Scholarships, Charitable Donations

munity in about 1971 and she's been part of the Dahlgren Officers' Spouses' Club since then," he said. "I think nobody better exemplifies what it

means to give back than Rosemarie."

Blades thanked the DOSC volunteers for all their support over the years. "You and I would not be

here today if not for the dedicated volunteers who work at the Second Tour Thrift Store," she said.

Those everyday acts of giving back facilitated more giving. "This is our 17th year and we have given out \$73,600 in that time, with 48 recipients of scholarships," said Blades.

William and Mary.

"We currently have nine nests and 13 eaglets at Dahlgren and 10 nests and 18 eaglets at NSF Indian Head," Feinberg shared. "We like to tout that because we do take pride in restoring our cultural and natural resources at both installations."

Feinberg updated the attendees on the latest economic and demographic information from both installations. The full release and report of those demographics will be included in the May 26 edition of the South Potomac Pilot.

The 100th anniversary of NSF Dahlgren was the topic of discussion from Joseph Fordham, who is leading the charge for the event. Fordham provided an overview of how the base is planning to share the event with a wider audience through blog posts, podcasts and other interactive events that will take place over the course of the 15 month period between Oct. 2017 and Dec. 2018, when the base will recognize the anniversary. One of the planned activities that Fordham forecasts will take place on Friday and Saturday of the opening week of Oct. 1 – 8 of 2017 will be a seven-station stop bus tour.

"It will begin at the Dahlgren Heritage Museum and will include stops at the most significant things on the base that we can show you," Fordham said. "Our goal is to put QR codes on all of the artifacts that are on the tour... you will

be given a tour of that area or object at a website to provide further information."

Town Manager for Colonial Beach Val Foulds provided an update on community development projects around the town designed to enhance the infrastructure of the town including new sidewalks and crosswalks and upcoming projects that will include a splash pad for children and more sidewalk and lighting improvements. Foulds shared that Colonial Beach would be kicking off a summer concert series that will begin on May 27 and run through Sept. 15.

Following Foulds' update, a member of the Colonial Beach Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Steve Keene shared more events that will be taking place in Colonial Beach including the 66th Annual Potomac River Festival in June, the 4th Annual Colonial Beach Bike Fest in Oct. and the 51st Annual Boardwalk Arts and Crafts Festival in Sept.

An update on the progress of the Harry W. Nice bridge reconstruction project was followed by several questions as entities on both sides of the Potomac river will be affected by the new structure. Mike Blair, with Johnson Mirmiran and Thompson, Inc. an architectural engineering consulting firm shared that there has been reduction in the width of the bridge by paring down the previously-planned 12-foot wide shoulders and a reduction in the height of the planned bridge; those changes have brought down costs, allowing for the project to move forward more quickly. Aside from the traffic capacity limitations and the safety issues, the cost to rehabilitate the old structure was one

of the rationale for the new construction. Other changes were made to the current plan that will also help reduce costs while ensuring that bridgework begins on schedule.

Using data points from future development plans upstream of the bridge and on both sides of the river, and consulting with the U.S. Coast Guard and the Army Corps of Engineers, the establishment of proposed horizontal clearance of 250 feet and proposed vertical clearances of 106.5 will put the bridge within U.S. Coast Guard Bridge guidance for clearances.

"The reduction in the vertical height would have precluded the passage of only eight ships out of the hundreds of thousands of vessels that travel that stretch of water," Blair said.

The navigational channel will shift closer to the Virginia side of the bridge as the design stands today. An adjustment in the span of the bridge will include more of a curve to lessen the appearance of a sheer, steep crossing. The start of construction is slated to begin in 2020 with a completion of work to be done by the end of 2022 – beginning of 2023.

On the Virginia side of Route 301, Marcie Parker, Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) briefed the COMREL about a study it is conducting. Parker shared that due to an expected \$850 million worth of projects scheduled to be built by 2023 between exits 130 and 143 on I-95, VDOT is looking for alternate routes for travelers who would typically travel the Interstate to traverse the East Coast.

"There's going to be a lot of construction going on," Parker said. "We will have from exits 130 to

143 completely under construction at the same time. We need the people from New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Maryland to not come down I-95 if they don't have to. If we can reduce the traffic on I-95 by five to 10 percent it would help out a lot while construction is under way."

Parker also mentioned that the expansion of the Harry W. Nice bridge is a consideration for the study as well.

The purpose of the study is to identify improvements that will preserve the capacity and ensure the safety of that corridor without large scale widening while still accommodating economic development. An initial stakeholders meeting was held in January of 2017 and upcoming meetings will take place in September and October.

The final presentation of the morning was from Christopher D. Lloyd, the senior vice-president and director of infrastructure and economic development at McGuire Woods Consulting LLC. Lloyd was on hand to share the GO Virginia Initiative. The Virginia Initiative for Growth and Opportunity in Each Region (GO Virginia) was initiated by the Virginia Business Higher Education Council (VBHEC) and the Council on Virginia's Future to foster private-sector growth and job creation through state incentives for regional collaboration by business, education and government.

Lloyd shared statistics from the last 15 years that compared the U.S. Gross Domestic Product (GDP) with Virginia's Gross State Product

Military Spouse Life — Has its Challenges, but Ultimately Rewarding

Jenny Forrester has been a Marine spouse for 14 years and while many military spouses make several moves in that amount of time, her move to Naval Support Facility (NSF) Indian Head in 2015 was the family's first move away from their first duty station — Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, N.C. — where her husband served in 12 different units.

The Forresters have been a part of the NSF Indian Head family for a little less than two years, but Jenny made sure to follow the advice she often shares — get out, make friends and volunteer. She and her two children turn those words into action every week when they volunteer at the NSF Indian Head USO office.

“When I found out Barb [Locke] needed volunteers here at the USO I thought that's something we can do together that would help others,” Forrester said. “Volunteering, for a spouse, is a great thing. You get to know more about the area you live in, you get to meet people from on and off the base. There are people that are here [at the USO] that have lived here for years and they say ‘oh hey, have you tried this place?’ or ‘have you done that?’ It's a wonderful way to get to know the area.”

In addition to being a military spouse, Forrester is also a homeschooling mom of two. Finding ways for the children to enjoy enrichment activities, as well as giving back to

the community, were important to Forrester. Together with their mom, Lucas and Isabel stock boxes and help unload the baked goods shipment that comes into the USO each week. In addition to the USO, Forrester and her children perform volunteer work at their church and are a part of a homeschool co-op during the school year.

Those types of activities, Forrester believes, are an important part of what makes her military family's lives richer. Although she is supportive of her husband's military career, Forrester has continued to expand and enrich own her life through continued education and other work opportunities that she credits to being part of a military family.

“If my husband wasn't in the military, I don't think I would have gone back to school,” Forrester shared. “I was able to go back to school because they had different universities at the continuing education facility right down the road from us. It was a great opportunity.”

Forrester encourages spouses who are new to the military life to jump in wherever they land and take advantage of all that their service provides for them.

“There were a lot of things I didn't know coming into this [military life],” Forrester laughed. “It was difficult, but one of the key things I did that was so helpful was I just got out and started finding things to do. It's important to find the support available at your duty station and stay in contact with your family support system. Don't be afraid to try something new.”

Forrester also advises spouses to not lose sight of who they are and to stay plugged into those activities that support your own personal growth and that help to grow your marriage. Forrester shared that she and her husband have attended the Marriage Enrichment programs provided through the Chaplain's office and that they are wonderful and beneficial programs.

Her final advice? Don't go to bed angry and don't be afraid to ask questions, whether learning about your spouse's job, how the military works, medical care or anything else you may encounter. “Doctors, relatives, friends and even strangers may mean well, but they aren't infallible. Do your research from the smallest to the largest.”

(GSP). In years past, Lloyd explained, Virginia's GSP was always higher than the U.S. GDP. Following the recession of 2007-2008, Virginia has not rallied as it has in past recessions and is outperformed by states like North Carolina, Ohio and Indiana. Lloyd explained that the drop is attributed to the loss of federal and military positions and a downturn in manufacturing and wholesale trade. While the state has enjoyed an uptick in jobs, Lloyd points out that the jobs that have been created are in the lower paying leisure and hospitality services and retail trade. To maintain the higher paying positions, workers are moving to other states.

“For the first time we now have outmigration in Virginia,” Lloyd said. “We are losing talented people.”

Lloyd compared the Gross State Produce effects of private sector job change from 2007 to 2017 and showed that the average change in salary went from \$132,697 to \$90,392.

“One of the challenges faced in Virginia is the separation of cities and counties and we have a very fractured tax system and administration system. Counties don't cooperate to attract

those positions,” Lloyd said.

The GO Virginia initiative was designed to encourage localities to work together. Lloyd shared that there is more than \$30 million dollars in grant monies for the next fiscal year for growth and diversification plans.

“Thirty million doesn't sound like a lot,” Lloyd said. “But that is twice what the state spends on economic development.”

The money will be divided up between nine regions in Virginia, equaling roughly \$650,000 to work on capacity-building, growth and diversification plans and administration.

Once plans are in-place, additional funding will be available to execute collaborative efforts to improve the city or county. In addition to the GO grants there are several other initiatives to help job growth in the state including the implementation of the Collaborative Jobs Act. The legislation allow counties who can show that they are working together to tap into the income taxes revenue stream.

“This is the first time that counties will have access to that tax revenue stream,” Lloyd said. “They have always had to rely on property taxes before. This says work together and you're going to get a stream of money from income taxes. This is a fundamental change for Virginia.”

The next COMREL meeting will take place in August.

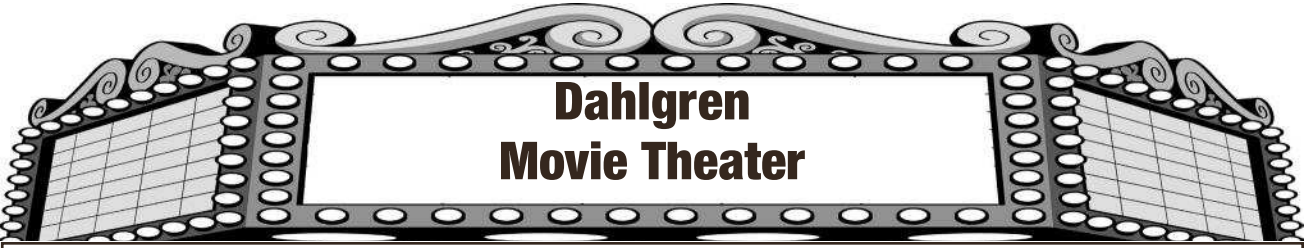
