

## NSASP Takes Second Place in NDW Energy **Biggest Loser Competition**

For the second year in a row, Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) has placed in the Naval District Washington's (NDW) annual Energy Biggest Loser (EBL) competition resulting in a cash award. NSASP Energy Manager Kathryn Simpson is excited, pleased and determined to continue "energizing" both Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren and NSF Indian Head to be more cognizant of their collective energy usage and find ways to be more energy efficient.

The EBL competition pitted installations against each other to see which could reduce overall energy consumption during the months of September and October. Energy usage was tallied monthly and compared to August usage to determine which installation exhibited the greatest reduction percentage.



This is the second such annual competition and NSASP has held steady at a respectable second place.

One of the factors that helped push NSASP over this year was the fact that Joint Interoperability Test Command (JITC) building was temporarily vacant — JITC was still up and running, the number of computers and lamps, for example, were no longer drawing

"The people in the buildings -that's what drives the energy [consumption]," Simpson said. "I think that's what a lot of people don't realize; they think they don't make a difference in a building, what folks do with their lights, and what folks do with their computers... it does make a difference."

Simpson gave an example of a tabletop lamp on her work desk that now uses an LED light bulb.

"In the grand scheme of the Navy, that [one bulb] doesn't make a big difference," Simpson explained. "But if a bunch of us do that, it does."

NSASP took second place, coming in behind larger Naval Air Station (NAS) Patuxent River. The latter reduced its consumption by 24.8 percent this year, a substantial increase from its total reduction last year of 6.2 percent. NSASP's reduction this year totaled 18.4 percent, also much improved from its reduction last vear.

"In America, we've grown accustomed to lights turning on when we flip a switch and our appliances working when they are turned on, we may have a tendency to think of energy as an unlimited resource. It only takes a quick read of the local newspaper or evening news to know that is not the case and we must all work hard to secure our future energy resources," NSASP Commanding Officer Mary Feinberg said.

Also awarded aboard NSASP was Naval Surface Warfare Center (NSWC) Dahlgren Division Facilities Manager Sam Thompson, who was recognized as the Best Building Energy Monitors (BEM) on the installation.

According to the Commander, Navy Installations Command (CNIC) web page on the Navy shore energy program, energy bills are the single largest

Transport Platoon and UH-60M Blackhawks from U.S. Army's 12th Aviation Battalion located at Fort Belvoir, Va., for a special sling load operation making this exercise a multi-service operation.

IRF B was given the task to detect and identify the cause of what seemed to be a chemical attack said Erick Swartz, senior scientist with CBIRF. After the identification of a nerve agent Marines from Extraction Platoon quickly extricated simulated victims trapped inside an office building while remaining on the alert for

any improvised explosive devices, IED's.

"Marines with Identification and Detection Platoon were able to narrow down the chemical threat to a nerve agent which caused temporary blindness and seizure-like symptoms," said Sgt. Augustine Romero, operations chief for IRF B.

"This exercise posed unique challenges to the IRF," said Romero. "The IRF was in need of more supplies"

As part of the simulated attack, in partnership with 12th Aviation Battalion, logistics Marines conducted a sling load operation to simulate a re-supply push package from NSF Indian Head Stump Neck Annex to NSF Dahlgren via

UH-60M Blackhawk helicopter.

This sling load operation served two purposes, said Romero. It allowed the IRF to accomplish a more complex mission over a longer than usual working time and provides all around training for embarkation, motor transport and engineer Marines.

"The sling load training is an important asset to an IRF as it provides a more expedited way of transport to be able to resupply the IRF with items such as more medicine, or more equipment to get the mission accomplished," said Sgt. Joshua Davenport, a team leader with Logistics Platoon, CBIRF.

"Whether CBIRF responds to a natural disaster or an explosion of

sorts, aerial transport might be the only option. This type of training helps build stronger relations with the 12th Aviation Battalion," added Davenport. "It is important for different branches to train together to better serve when needed."

Training to transport needed materials using other services' assets is realistic because when CBIRF is tasked to respond it will more than likely be within the command structure of a Joint Task Force. In that scenario, it is very likely that CBIRF would coordinate with units like 12th Aviation Battalion for logistics support.

"CBIRF's response was a success," said Romero. "If this would have been a real life scenario we would definitely have saved lives."
