CBIRF Responds to Simulated Nuclear Detonation **During Exercise Scarlet Response 2016**

On the morning of Aug. 22, 2016, at approximately 9 a.m., a nuclear bomb detonated near Houston. The explosion rendered massive damage to the infrastructure of the city including a complete shutdown of a highway leading to Houston forcing part of the city into isolation.

This was a simulated detonation during a training exercise, during which Marines and sailors with Chemical Biological Incident Response Force, CBIRF, U.S. Marine Corps Forces Command, deployed as part of an Initial Response Force, IRF in support of this simulated nuclear detonation as part of Exercise Scarlet Response 2016 at Guardian Centers, Perry, Ga., Aug. 22-26,

Scarlet Response 2016 provided the unit with three days of section-specific training. Each element of the IRF responded to different scenarios under instructor supervision to better understand and prepare for a real world event, all leading to nuclear detonation.

Virtual Strike Group Verifies New U.S. Navy **Combat Capability in Complex Test**

DAHLGREN, Va. - The Navy evaluated a strike group's gun weapon systems, combat systems, and unmanned vehicles' interoperability with surface and air assets while firing on targets at the 2016 USS Dahlgren demonstration, Aug. 30.

It was the first time an entire Navy strike group was brought together in a land-based environment spanning the entire kill chain – plan, detect, control, engage and assess.

"This demonstration integrated capabilities across multiple laboratories, utilizing unmanned and manned sensor platforms, engaging a hostile swarm

The cybernetic USS Dahlgren proved engagement coordination across the simulated battlegroup and live fire destruction of multiple targets from two combatants utilizing two different gun based systems.

Low Impact Development (LID) SW Management Requirements on Navy Facilities

LID stormwater management requirements for construction projects are outlined in the Navy LID Policy (November 2007) and the Federal Energy Independence and Security Act (EISA) Section 438 (December 2007).

Navy LID Policy requirements

- Sets a goal of No Net Increase in SW volume and sediment/nutrient loading
- This applies to major renovation projects (Greater than \$5 Million) and construction projects (Greater than \$750 Thousand)
- Directs that LID be considered for all projects that require stormwater management.

EISA Section 438 requirements

- · Applies to all Federal facility development and redevelopment projects with a footprint that exceeds 5,000 square feet.
- The predevelopment hydrology of the property must be maintained post-construction with regard to temperature, rate, volume, and duration of flow
- To accomplish this, Navy and A/E designers should use LID site planning, design, construction, and maintenance strategies to the Maximum Extent Technically Feasible.

LID Structural and Non-Structural BMPs

Listed below are some suggested practices that may be incorporated into existing or future developments.



CFS Training Prepares Sailors to Navigate **Financial Seas Safely**

Everyone has advice regarding money, whether it's car buying advice or where to invest and how to best prepare for the future. At the Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) however, Carol Allison, the transition assistance program (TAP) and personal financial management (PFM) program manager, along with the latest class of Command Financial Specialist (CFS) trainees, are making sure that they have the right advice for service members right now.

"When you first start in the military you never learn about this stuff," Fire Controlman 1st Class Weylin Kee said. "Taking this class now will allow us to help our Sailors so that when they are our age or older they can think, 'Thank God I listened to those guys."

Allison provides training that allows the new CFS to establish, organize and administer the PFM program. That training allows those CFS to better assist Sailors and others in the command with their personal financial issues and ensure that anyone who needs assistance has a peer that can provide information and instruction.

For Fire Controlman 2nd Class Ienn Kelly, it's important to be able to assist her students. She has seen firsthand, both ashore and underway, the critical role that a good grasp on financial management can have on the success of her students and fellow Sailors

"I like helping people and I feel I am easy to talk to and can find ways

understand," Kelly said.

Kelly remembers being an 18-yearold first entering the Navy and being away from home for the first time. She recalled not fully understanding the financial aspects of that transition and sees it in her current students as well.

"I didn't have a car then and a lot of the students now don't have a car and they are buying lemons," Kelly said. "I have a class of about 12 students and half of them have issues with their cars or concerns about paying their student loans. I try to help them but I don't always have the right words."

Kelly was astute enough to know that Allison and other helpful experts at the Fleet and Family Support offices located on School House Lane at Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahl-

to communicate so that my students gren are just a phone call away with are putting \$50 or \$100 in savings prudent advice and assistance.

> "I've actually called Carol a couple of times and asked about the Servicemember Relief Act, because I've had students who they or their spouse have had issues with student loan payments," Kelly explained. "With Carol's help, I found out it's not applicable for the spouse but it is for the service member."

> The class of eight were in agreement when asked about the number one piece of advice they would offer to their students or anyone who is interested in ensuring they are handling their finances correctly.

but it's better to put that ten or fifteen percent of your paycheck in savings now when you are here at Dahlgren and you don't have a lot of expenses then when you get to the fleet and need a car or have other expenses," Kelly said.

One of the most important lessons that this current class took away from this session concerns how they save. Several were already making contributions to their TSP but are now thinking about converting them to a Roth IRA. The type of financial acumen they are gaining allows them to not only improve their own financial situation but prepares them to assist their fellow service members.

"We need these people." Allison said. "They are working side by side your paycheck is only \$400 and you with these young students and they also be reached at 540-653-1839.

are the ones who will hear the talk about buying a car or other issues and they will be on the front lines and will be able to step in and provide the resources to help."

Allison provides CFS training several times throughout the year and appreciates the work that the trainees put into become better prepared to assist their fellow Sailors.

"Seeing them implementing the changes from the training they've learned is a wonderful win-win, Allison said. "Especially when I can see them grasping the concepts and using it for themselves and then knowing that they will be sharing that information and assisting others."

Allison gained the expertise she now shares firsthand. She shared that she was a former military spouse and a divorced mother of five so she has dealt with many of the same financial issues that she sees come across her desk

"I tell my clients I'm not going to get upset or judge the situation or anything you tell me because I have probably made the same mistakes before, so I have walked that line," Allison said. "We have to learn from the mistakes we've made and share that knowledge with others so they don't make those same mistakes. That way they can start off on the right path."

Naval Education and Training Command (NETC) Force Master Chief (AW/SW/FMF) Mamudu Cole visited the Center for Surface Combat Systems (CSCS) and AEGIS Training and Readiness Center (ATRC), co-located onboard Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren, Aug. 22.

Capt. Pete Galluch, ATRC commanding officer, welcomed Cole and discussed current training of AEGIS Fire Controlmen and the block learning concept in support of Ready, Relevant Learning (RRL) during an office call.

Chief (select) Fire Controlman Elizabeth Sharpe then provided Cole a tour of the schoolhouse. He was able to see firsthand how ATRC trains Aegis FCs to operate, maintain, and employ the various systems associated with the AEGIS combat system found onboard the Navy's AEGIS cruisers and de-

"While observing the standard classrooms, hands-on labs, simulations, as well as computer-based and interactive courseware training, Force Master Chief Cole took various questions from students," she said. "We also visited ATRC Admin and the Sailor Resource Center."

After the tour, Cole held an ATRC E-6 and Junior Call and then a CSCS and ATRC Chief Petty Officers and Selectees Call.

"I am continuously impressed with the training we are doing throughout our learning centers," said Cole. "The team here is conducting training 24 hours a day, five days a week to meet the requirements of the fleet. It's remarkable to see the accomplishments of our new Sailors as they learn new skills that will be utilized when they enter the fleet."

CSCS' mission is to develop and deliver surface ship combat systems training to achieve surface warfare superiority. CSCS headquarters' staff oversees 14 learning sites, including ATRC, and provides nearly 70,000 hours of curriculum for 700 courses a year to more than 40,000 Sailors. CSCS delivers specialized training for Officer and Enlisted Sailors required to tactically operate, maintain, and employ shipboard and shore-based weapons, sensors, and command and control systems utilized in today's navy.

"Scarlet Response's purpose was to give us a venue where we could utilize all of the IRF's capabilities," said Gunnery Sgt. Matthew Weiland, IRF B mission chief. "It allowed all of the sections to work hand in hand, allowing us to see what the IRF would look like if it were deployed in a real life scenario."

The exercise solidified CBIRF's capability to respond to a catastrophe inside the United States and anywhere in the world.

This large scale exercise provided the alert command element, ACE, to be fully engaged from the beginning to the end of the mission. The ACE is the forward command and control node supporting IRF operations down range.

The command and control aspect of any operation is essential to the success of the mission, said Weiland.

"If the IRF needs something down range, whether it is intelligence or more water or [protective] suits, the ACE can provide it while simultaneously reporting to higher headquarters of having a static zone to work with, we had to

everything that is going on," said Weiland.

During Scarlet Response, CBIRF also had an opportunity to work alongside soldiers with 911th Technical Rescue Engineers Company stationed at Fort Belvoir, Va., training with technical rescue platoon Marines during lane training and the multi-hour simulated response exercise.

"I think is a great way to show that the services can work together," said Army Staff Sgt. Michael Christensen with 911th Technical Rescue Engineers Company.

911th soldiers provided great assistance in the final exercise dividing the workload and allowing the IRF technical rescue platoon to develop a rest cycle.

The final exercise began at 9 p.m. in a mile long highway blocked off by vehicles flipped over and simulated victims trapped inside located on the training grounds of Guardian Centers.

"The highway clearance mission we were given on the first night was a unique challenge that we have never executed before," said Capt. Zachariah Dentes, Reaction Force Company executive officer and IRF B commander. "Instead

continuously move our elements forward down Georgia Search and Rescue allowed for each the long highway."

Identification and detection platoon, IDP, was the first section to go into the "Hot Zone," a term used to describe the contaminated area.

IDP geared up in level "B" protective equipment including sealed suits and a Self-Contained Breathing Aparratus, SCBA, to prevent from inhaling unknown agents. Technical rescue platoon and search and extraction platoon worked together to free the victims trapped inside vehicles using extrication and heavy machinery to work through the mangled vehicles.

The casualties coming out of the hot zone were transported to the decontamination area where ambulatory casualties were given instructions to wash themselves with special detergents to neutralize and decontaminate radiation exposure. Non-ambulatory victims were decontaminated by decontamination personnel. CBIRF's Navy corpsmen were on standby to examine and treat every victim coming out of decontam-

IRF B was able to incorporate two additional task forces to accomplish the mission. 911th Technical Rescue Engineers Company and

task force to work 12 hours shifts and continue operations for the 48 hours of the exercise.

Exercise Scarlet Response ended with the IRF successfully clearing out 75-acres of town on the Guardian Centers' training ground rescuing victims, clearing a mile long highway of overturned and damaged vehicles, extricating victims from vehicles and building support mechanisms for collapsed building to properly help trapped victims, decontaminating victims and providing medical care.

"The [primary assessment] teams searched and cleared a total of 58 buildings in 95 plus degree heat in level b gear [sealed suits and SC-BAs]," said Dentes. "Everyone was impressed with the Marines' abilities to press on through the heat."

"The Marines at all levels did an excellent job," said Weiland. "The motivation, dedication and work ethic was commented on by Georgia Search and Rescue, Guardian Centers' staff and instructors with years of experience in the first responder's field. We received nothing but positive feedback on how hard the Marines worked on this operation."

"This has been five to six years come at a better time as we see real-world events such as the recent small boat incursions in the Middle East, highlightcommanding officer.

MH-60S Seahawk helicopters to the Aegis Combat System and the Ship Self-Defense System - with new technologies such as Virtual Automatic Scoring System (VASS).

The NSWCDD-patented VASS calculates gunfire miss distances and adjusts targeting for gunners to converge gunfire onto a target without risking the lives of forward observers.

Live targets were quickly destroyed at safe distances as more than 60 visitors observed the power of integration.

at a much reduced cost."

The event's first scenario featured simulated engagements on maneuvering targets, proving the Navy's ability to use manned and unmanned platforms for early over-the-horizon detection and tracking as well as future unmanned surface vehicle engagements.

USS Dahlgren facilitates this mission with high fidelity testing that leverages both hardware-in-the loop and virtual combat systems.

"All testing occurred within the fence in an environment that does not impact Navy ships or crew members," said Steven Shannon, USS Dahlgren tactical operations lead. "The testing normally required aboard a Navy ship and other high demand sites can be now accomplished through USS Dahlgren including capability at other warfare centers."

Its integrated testing capabilities ensure that test and evaluation resources can rapidly adapt to changing warfighters' needs.

In this case, USS Dahlgren created a land-based air and surface representation of a strike group. In the future, the goal is to bring in additional undersea capability through collaboration with other warfare centers.

"The level of complexity shown in this demonstration directly reflects the complexity our operational units see in theaters

will work together easily – and of operation today," said Melissa Smith, USS Dahlgren lead investigator and Integrated Lab Council lead. "This land-based ability to recreate the complexity of naval surface warfare helps us to find new technologies and repurpose current technologies and equipment. This is the primary mission of our laboratory environment across the nation -maintaining technological advantage for our surface Fleet."

> USS Dahlgren increases this advantage by providing a mechanism to measure latencies, develop draft concept of operations, and influence systems to improve the entire detect-to-engage kill-chain.

> "Early findings and adjustments with respect to the killchain are crucial for increased tempo encounters," said Nelson Mills. USS Dahlgren colead investigator and capabilities development lead. "The short-term goal for USS Dahlgren is to leverage and connect to existing Naval infrastructure at NR&DE (Naval Research and Development Establishment) sites and to virtualize any missing elements as necessary, creating an air, surface, undersea test bed that replicates our current and future strike groups."

In a 2014 test, the USS Dahlgren - a Navy Innovative Science and Engineering funded-test bed – proved it could integrate unmanned vehicles into the fire control loop of a major weapon system aboard

a surface combatant.

"Efforts, like what we saw today, allow the Navy to explore new technologies and rapidly evaluate and deploy new capabilities to the Fleet. The USS Dahlgren modeling and simulation work is leading the way for the Naval Research and Development Establishment," said Markowich, the Department of the Navy Modeling and Simulation executive for the Assistant Secretary of the and Acquisition).

Meanwhile, NSWCDD plans to leverage USS Dahlgren to support integration of electromagnetic railgun solid-state lasers, and other initiatives for risk mitigation prior to fielding.

"This year we are taking the next big step for USS Dahlgren by integrating the fire control Baron.

The fire control loop's compatibility with complex systems and missions is now a fact due to USS Dahlgren's highly integrated lab environment that can emulate a kill chain, ship, or battle group while serving as a rapid prototyping and experimentation platform.

This integration is made possible by Navy-wide infrastructure linked to USS Dahlgren, including experimental test ranges, waterfront, and airspace; tactical and developmental comsensors, weapons, manned and

unmanned platforms; hardware in the loop and virtualized combat systems; and external connectivity via Department of Defense networks and overthe-air connectivity.


"In effect, USS Dahlgren provides a naval venue for research, development, test and evaluation that spans all aspects of the kill chain," said Mills. "It provides for continuous testing across the acquisition lifecycle in a high fidelity Navy (Research, Development environment via distributed network architectures."

> This constant testing capability spans the acquisition lifecycle, featuring off-site connectivity to investigate ship, battle force, and joint force integration and the ability to replicate the Fleet environment to address issues observed at sea.



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


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
