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Change of Charge: Duba relieves Smith at Expeditionary Exploitation Unit 1

Lt. Cmdr. Steve Duba relieved Cmdr. Patrick Smith as officer in charge (OIC) of Expeditionary Exploitation Unit One (EXU1) during the unit's first change-of-charge ceremony under the "Big Top" at the Stump Neck Annex of Naval Support Facility (NSF) Indian Head, July 28. Naval Surface Warfare Center Indian Head Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technology Division (NSWC IHEODTD) Commanding Officer, Capt. Vince Martinez, presided over the ceremony.

EXU1 has the distinction of being the only contiguous U.S sea duty unit within the entire Naval Sea Systems (NAV-SEA) enterprise. It has consistently been singled out for its operational excellence and war-fighting contributions, providing real-time information to all national intelligence agencies, the Joint Service, and many other federal agencies.

"When you look at EXU-1's accomplishments over the last few years, it's apparent that Commander Smith's leadership was the key denominator," said Martinez "His actions have contributed significantly to the Indian Head and Navy EOD communities as a whole."

Martinez presented Smith with the

U.S. Navy Submarine History Makes 'Deep' STEM Impact on Students

The deep-diving research vessel that took two hydronauts to the deepest point of the world's oceans 56 years ago is still diving — in many ways, deeper than ever.

The Trieste — a Swiss-designed, Italian-built bathyscaphe acquired by the U.S. Navy in 1958 — first made history by reaching the bottom of the Challenger Deep in the Pacific Ocean's Marianas Trench on Jan. 23, 1960.

U.S. Navy Lt. Don Walsh and scientist Jacques Piccard traveled nearly seven miles — precisely 35,797 feet — aboard the Trieste to prove that humans could safely explore the deepest ocean depths.

Now, the Trieste is making history with deep dives into the dreams and imaginations of students visiting the Undersea Exploration exhibit at the National Museum of the United States Navy.

"I really loved getting into the submarine that went into the deepest part of the ocean," said Tre, 11, who was briefed on the Trieste and its achievement — the equivalent of putting a man on the moon.

Tre was among 29 middle and high school students from Camp Dog-

wood Summer Academy visiting the museum with their scientist and engineer mentors from Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD), July 12.

"This camp is a great opportunity

for students to learn more about all of STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) opportunities within the Navy," said Brittany Noah, an NSWCDD human factors engineer. "It's also a great way for the Navy to pique the interest of bright minds for active duty and civilian service in the future."

Retired Navy officers Richard Bryant and Rodney Luck piqued students' minds with presentations that included the science behind how a submarine submerges, dives, and rises to surface.

"I learned about buoyancy and

how a submarine operates," said Jasmine, 12.

"Being able to interact with all the exhibits really caught my imagination and showed us what things were like a long time ago, and how they are now," added Amir, 12. "I really want to design a future sub. My favorite activity was being on the guns."

Amir, Jasmine, Tre and their peers also learned about navigation. fire control, torpedoes, propulsion plant, and sonar.

"The highlight of the tour was when we were able to move the big guns around," said Brianna, 12. "I would love to join the Navy after I do sports. I learned about how many people fit in different types of submarines and how they have improved over the years."

What's more, Bryant and Luck shared sea stories about operational aspects of submarine life, explaining how the crew ate, sleep, trained, and enjoyed morale activities like pizza night, movie night, and Xbox challenges.

"My favorite part was when we learned about the submarines and how many people can fit in them," said Delonte. 11.

The students were briefed at exhibits ranging from a diving capsule, torpedo room, and periscope to 40mm anti-air guns and artic undersea operations, including ice breakthroughs.

"I loved when we saw the submarine jump out of the water," said Tre. "I thought it was really cool."

The museum's Undersea Exploration Exhibit highlights the U.S. Navy's involvement with undersea exploration for navigation, scientific research, strategic, and educational purposes. By 1958, the Navy - often a catalyst for innovative research – funded nearly 90 percent of all U.S. oceanographic ventures. It enabled scientists to explore the deepest regions of the oceans and to design increasingly sophisticated remotely operated vehicles that could observe the depths without risk to human life.

"The students saw how submarines have been with the U.S. since the start of our nation and that we are still innovating submarines today," said David Barker, the museum's deputy director of education and public programs. "They loved the story about the Trieste and how deep it went."

Improvement of naval operations and equipment continues to be largely dependent on the discoveries made through oceanographic research. The Navy's undersea operations have ranged from diving to the collection of scientific data, to the investigation of shipwrecks such as the Titanic.

Camp Dogwood Summer Academy is one of many programs sponsored by the AnBryce Foundation philanthropic organization to promote social change by building a community of global citizens through education, career, cultural, and leadership opportunities to under-resourced young people.

The academy offers distinct summer experiences for young people ages 7-18: Camp Dogwood for rising 2nd through 9th graders; Rites of Passage for rising 10th through 12th graders, and the Staff Training Enrichment Program for rising 11th and 12th graders. For over a decade, the ratio of one counselor for two campers ensures individualized mentoring and instruction. At the end of every session, each camper is evaluated on academic performance and overall character development.

The Naval Sea Systems Command and its warfare centers, including NSWCDD, offers STEM internships for high school students via the Science and Engineering Apprenticeship Program. Civilian employment opportunities are also available for college students via the Navy Pathways Internship Program which provides degree-seeking students with exposure to public service while enhancing their educational experience, and possibly providing financial aid to support their educational goals.

NSWCDD is a premier research and development center that serves as a specialty site for weapon system integration. The command's unique ability to rapidly introduce new technology into complex warfighting systems is based on its longstanding competencies in science and technology, research and development, and test and evaluation.

Marines sharpen skills at Home

Maintaining a high state of readiness is a top priority for the Chemical Biological Incident Response Force, CBIRF, whose mission could send them across the globe within a moment's notice to support chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear or highyield explosive crisis management.

Preparing Marines and sailors for "no fail" missions starts with taking care of the unit's personnel at their home station.

On July 22 Marines with (CBIRF) set up mobile cooling stations for the local chow hall aboard Naval Support Facility Indian Head, Md.

"This provided additional, real-world training. They had to think outside of the box," said Capt. Craig Shurgot, a Montgomery, Texas, native and the logistics officer for CBIRF. The more junior Marines learn from their superiors with hands-on training and working out the kinks of setting up the equipment he added.

In a real-world crisis, these Marines can provide heat or air conditioning to the reconstitution tent where Marines coming back from a contaminated site or "hot zone" can rest and rehydrate. They also provide utilities for the medical personnel sent to a contaminated area and provide their services

to the center operations center for a more austere, expeditionary situation. Shurgot commended the engineer platoon, commenting on their high work ethic and motivation even while setting up the equipment. "Whatever [we] task them with, they complete to their full ability," said Shurgot. "Whenever they were out there, they worked together as a team. And it gives them the opportunity to make a difference."

"The number one priority is the Marines."

For the engineer platoon and the

logistics component of CBIRF, the number one priority is taking care of Marines, said Shurgot

"We will keep doing our best to provide some comfort for the Marines," said Prince George, Va., native-Sgt. Kenneth Hunt. "It benefits the Marines by improving the overall morale. The engineer section is trying to help the Marines feel a sense of being at home."

Hunt who serves as the maintenance chief for the Engineer platoon with CBIRF led the effort by supervising the Marines under his charge and working alongside them. The individuals setting up the equipment were electrical systems technicians, water support technicians or engineer equipment mechanics with the unit.

When directed, CBIRF forward-deploys and/or responds with minimal warning to a chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear or high-yield explosive (CBRNE) threat or event in order to assist local, state, or federal agencies and the geographic combatant commanders in the conduct of CBRNE response or consequence management operations, providing capabilities for command and control; agent detection and identification; search, rescue, and decontamination; and emergency medical care for contaminated personnel.



Upon graduation, he was assigned as Officer in Charge (OIC) of EOD Mobile Unit (EODMU) SIX Detachment TWO in Ingleside, Texas, deploying twice in support of CTF 56 Mine Countermeasures and Theater Security Cooperation operationsthroughout the Navy's Fifth Fleet.

We encourage you to participate in this conference and receive several perspectives on EMW, it's convergence with Cyber Warfare, as well as obtaining insight into defense acquisition and DoD systems engineering. We need these perspectives to not only survive in a challenging fiscal environment, but also to help EW missions contribute more to our critical overall national defense mission.



Taking a Glance at the Military Blended Retirement System

As the Department of Defense (DoD) transitions to a new pay system for retirees, as many as 1.8 million active duty and reserve component members will be given an option to switch to the new "Military Blended Retirement System" (MBRS) that Congress enacted under the FY-2016 National Defense Authorization Act. The new system is scheduled to go into effect on Jan. 1, 2018. Personnel who join the military on or after Jan. 1, 2018 will be automatically enrolled in the MBRS. Personnel who joined the military after Jan. 1, 2006 but before Jan. 1, 2018 will be provided the option to switch to the new plan and personnel who joined the military prior to Jan. 1, 2006 will be "grandfathered" in their current retiree pay plan.

The new system is called "blended" because it combines the current annuity (Defined Benefit Plan) that retirees with twenty years of service or more earn with the Thrift Savings Plan (Defined Contribution Plan). Additionally, a third key feature labeled "Continuation Pay" will also be added for personnel who are willing to obligate at least four additional years of service at the twelve year mark in their career. The new MBRS model closely resembles the Federal Employee Retirement System.

Some of the highlights and goals of the new MBRS include:

Automatically creating TSP accounts for all service members and beginning government contributions equal to 1 percent of basic pay after 60 days on active duty.

Automatically setting service member's voluntary personal contributions to the TSP at 3 percent of basic pay.

Allowing service members to opt out of that 3 percent voluntary contribution of basic pay only after completing financial literacy training at their first duty station.

Allowing the TSP to "vest" and be legally transferred to individual service members after two years.

Beginning a government dol-

lar-for-dollar match of individual service member's out-of-pocket TSP contributions, up to 4 % of base pay at the start of the third year of service through twenty six years of service. Coupled with the previously mentioned 1% automatic contribution, the total government contribution to the service member's TSP account would equal 5%.

Allowing the individual military services to offer "continuation pay" to boost retention.

Shrinking the size of the current pension by 20 percent. Retirees currently earn 2.5% of the "High 36" average of base pay times the number of years served. Under the MBRS, that rate will drop to 2.0% of the "High 36" average of base pay X number of years served. With this reduction, DoD estimates an overall savings of \$1.9 billion by the year 2021.

Should You Choose the Military's Blended Retirement System? Perhaps that's not even a fair question until you've had a chance to learn as much as you can about it.

The goal of DoD is to make sure that

personnel who are eligible to switch to the new MBRS will be armed significantly enough to make a well informed decision. Training and education programs will become widely available as the military prepares for this major transition.

Whether transitioning to the MBRS or not, it is certainly prudent for all military (and civilian) personnel to learn as much as they can about the Thrift Savings Plan and to utilize the funds within TSP to enhance their retirement savings.

As we move closer to the MBRS, service members will see dozens of articles and some planning calculators offered between now and Jan. 1, 2018. However, an article that I recently read offered these quick and simple thoughts regarding the MBRS for most of today's service members:

1. If you think you're staying on active duty for at least 20 years, then stick with the current High Three retirement.

2. If you're pretty sure that you're leaving active duty before 20 years then take the new Blended Retirement System if you are eligible.

Training on the new MBRS is currently being offered in Joint Knowledge On-Line (JKO). The course title is J3OP-US1330 Leader Training to Introduce the Blended Retirement System (BRS) For the Uniformed Services. Although this course is designed to give Leaders insight to the new MBRS, I recommend that everyone complete the training and become more familiar with the elements and verbiage of the MBRS.

In a nutshell, while we are waiting for more training and information, think about how these changes to the retirement system can affect you and your family as you prepare and consider your long range retirement planning goals.
