Navy Integrates Weapon Systems with Unmanned Vehicles for New Surface Warfare Capability

Naval Surface Warfare Center **Dahlgren Division** Public Affairs

Navy engineers used technologies supporting the science of integration to guide live gun fire onto distant targets, demonstrating a new integrated surface warfare capability in a maritime environment, Sept. 29. Military and civilian

leaders observed as unmanned surface and air vehicles - integrated with naval guns and the Aegis combat system - relayed targeting data to operators engaging fictitious threats on the Potomac River Test Range.

This is a major first step in demonstrating an integrated surface warfare capability utilizing unmanned vehicles in support of the key engagement functions of plan, detect, control, engage and assess," said Neil Baron, Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) distinguished scientist for combat control. "We are working

hard at focusing on the integration sciences to deal with mission engineering challenges for surface warfare."

Specifically, Baron and his team of Navy scientists and engineers used the science of integration to make surface warfare systems interoperable with unmanned air and unmanned surface

vehicles, enabling streaming identification and shot correction data to naval gunnery throughout the

test.

"It's a spectacular example of how scientists and engineers are enabling new technologies for the warfighter," said Baron.

Surface warfare officers

evaluating the technology joined civilian technologists at the event to prove the Navy can bridge interoperability gaps - known as the interstitial space - between complex system-of-systems.

The ability to send a small, persistent unmanned system down range in hostile territory for real-time

gun or missile engagement spotting and targeting is needed by warships," said NSWCDD Engagement Systems Department Military Deputy Cmdr. Marc Williams. "The technology has the potential to be impor-

Rear Adm. Gumataotao highlights IAMD WTI graduation

Rear Adm. Peter Gumataotao, commander, Naval Surface Force Atlantic, congratulated the Navy's newest Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) Weapons and Tactics Instructors (WTIs) during a graduation ceremony Oct. 2 at Naval Support Facility Dahlgren. The program, established in 2013 by Navy Air and Missile Defense Command (NAMDC) with assistance from the Center for Surface Combat Systems (CSCS) and the Aegis Training and Readiness Center (ATRC), is a component of a larger, evolving initiative that will enhance the warfighting skills of the surface warfare commu-

Patterned on the success of the aviation community's Naval Strike and Air Warfare Center (NSAWC), the Naval Surface Warfare Development

Center will sharpen the tactics techniques and procedures of the surface fleet. The goal is to establish a training continuum in several core surface warfare disciplines, develop surface warfare tactics and doctrine, and above all, to give talented young officers advanced tactical skills and perspective that they can share with wardrooms across the Navy.

Gumataotao said he was proud of the 12 surface warfare officers (SWOs) for successfully completing the elite course, but encouraged them to keep learning. "I think you should walk out of here humble after 19 weeks," he said. "Knowledge doesn't give you a license for arrogance-knowledge should humble you to understand that there is a lot more to learn.

As newly-minted WTIs in several surface warfare disciplines begin to make their way back to the fleet, Gumataotao wants commanding officers in

the surface community to send their "best and brightest" to the advanced training programs. While WTIs will contribute to all aspects of surface operations, he added, the basis for SWO promotion will remain 'performance at sea.

Gumataotao underscored the need for WTIs with a frank

assessment of the surface Navy's performance during World War II. "In the beginning, [the Imperial Japanese Navy] had the quality, they had the technology and they had the tactics better than us," he said.

Though U.S. tactics and productive capacity would eventually neutralize the Japa-

nese threat, the surface fleet has faced only asymmetrical threats since. Gumataotao contrasted the experience of the surface community with that of the Navy's aviation community, which faced very serious opponents during the Vietnam

"Aviators were dying because they didn't know how to fly, didn't know the tactics and didn't know the weapons that were being used against them,' he said. "We haven't had that [in the surface community] since World War II. The aviators, by warfighting necessity, had to stand up NSAWC.

Gumataotao, who has visited NSAWC at Naval Air Station Fallon, Nev., said he appreciates the program's emphasis on tactical competence across all levels of leadership. "What I love about NSAWC is that they take the most current threat.

Unmanned: Maximizing response accuracy, timeliness

tant for surface ships, especially relating to Aegis weapon system, Naval Surface Fire Support, and surface warfare."

Williams - the surface warfare tactical action officer for the experiment - ordered a gun engagement on a fictitious threat based on identification and targeting data he saw streaming from an unmanned surface vehicle.

At that point, the commander used a deployed Scan Eagle unmanned aerial vehicle's streaming video data to spot, precisely target, engage and continually support reengagement through gun targeting corrections to the MK160 gun weapon system operator.

"Scan Eagle has been deployed on guided missile destroyers for years to provide persistent electro-optical and infrared surveillance," said Williams, adding that, "it has been used for Naval Surface Fire Support spotting to walk gun rounds onto an enemy target, but not in an automated fashion like in this experiment."

Moreover, Williams used a Navy technology called Visual Automated Scoring System (VASS) to instantly correct the gun targeting.

The NSWCDD-patented system is an automated, computerized method for determining gunfire miss distances using video data. With a non-line of sight weapon system, VASS allows the gunner to adapt gun pointing angle and converge gunfire onto a target without having to risk the lives of forward observers.

"This was as much a demonstration about integration as it was about the three research initiatives being exercised," said Baron.

The NSWCDD-funded initiatives featured a virtual ship called the USS Dahlgren, VASS adaptive fire control, and new mission engineering efforts to link surface combatant warfare systems with unmanned vehicles.

Throughout the test, the cybernetic USS Dahlgren responded to reports of hostile threats by searching intelligence and data across multiple air and ship control operational systems, maximizing response accuracy and timeliness.

"The virtual USS Dahlgren is hosting new technological advancements and platforms for integrated test and

evaluation full speed ahead," said NSWCDD Technical Director Dennis McLaughlin who watched the demonstration. "We are providing linkage that ensures our test and evaluation capabilities can be rapidly adapted to changing warfighter needs."

Bridging the interstitial space between Navy surface combatants, integrated systems, and adaptive fire control is vital to accomplish key fiscal year 2015 Navy objectives - proliferating unmanned systems, integrating unmanned systems into the Navy culture, and developing, fielding, and deploying unmanned systems in the

air, on and under the sea, and on the ground.

"The science of integration - a relatively new area of investigation for NSWC Dahlgren Division - hides in the interstitial space," said Baron. "We are working hard at focusing on the integration sciences to deal with mission engineering challenges for surface warfare. These demonstrations are casting a strong light into the interstitial space to address naval interoperability and integration challenges and continue to advance warfighting capabilities into our surface fleet."

Staff ride teaches lessons of the past

Military personnel and civilians from the Joint Warfare Analysis Center (JWAC) visited Antietam National Battlefield on September 30 as part of a staff ride to discuss battlefield leadership and decision making during the Civil War and how it applies to today.

What is true then is true today," said facilitator and retired Marine Lt. Col. Jerry

A. Roberts, "When you get into an infantry fight, what makes the difference is artillery. This was a stand-up, in-the-open, face-to-face, shoot-'em-up battle. There was no entrenching or fortifications.

About 30 JWAC employees toured the battlefield where nearly 23,000 Americans were killed, wounded, or reported missing in twelve hours of fighting, making September 17, 1862 the bloodiest day in American history.

bered two to one and with his back to the Potomac River, Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee chose to stand and fight along the banks of Maryland's Antietam Creek instead of retreating back into Virginia, following his abortive invasion of the North.

"Lee has his fingers in this battle everywhere, Roberts explained. "In this battle more than any other, Lee made masterful use of his reserves.

Although the battle was Despite being outnum- a tactical draw with neither

side gaining an absolute advantage, Lee's strategic defeat allowed the Lincoln Administration to claim enough of a victory to issue the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation a week later, freeing slaves in those states then in rebellion.

The group also visited other sites related to the Antietam campaign on the one-day tour, including Harpers Ferry, W. Va. and South Mountain, Md., scenes of heavy fighting be-

Energy conservation awareness underway at Dahlgren, IH

Naval Support Activity South Potomac wasted little time in supporting October's Energy Awareness Month with an opening ceremony at Dahlgren Oct. 1 and Indian Head Oct. 2.

"It's up to all of us across the Navy to execute energy conservation," said Capt. Mary Feinberg, NSASP commander. "To jump start the program for this month, the Navy has decreed October as Energy Awareness Month.

Feinberg said one of the biggest goals was to create a shift in energy culture and behavior.

We want to make energy conservation a part of daily operations," she said. "Once we are successful at that, we will be able to decrease the overall energy usage of the base. We want to continue to increase tenant participation in the monthly energy meetings and establish a long-term strategy that benefits not only the base, but the tenant commands?

Steve Weedon, NSASP instal-

lation energy manager, said that having an energy officer for each individual tenant command can benefit the energy conservation cause. He also said there are things in an office you can look for to help cut down on energy use, such as when one person in an office has the heater on and another one has the fan on.

'You never want to heat and cool at the same time," he said.

the most current adversary, they apply tactics, and then they let you fly on it," he said. "And then they send you out to sea on a deployment. What do we do now for the most current tactics? Let's grade ourselves, SWOs.

Gumataotao used the concept of warm eddies, ocean currents that duct sound to the surface and thus make it easier for surface ships to detect submarines, to highlight the need for the WTI program to drive a culture shift among the surface community.

You have all been sitting in a warm eddy," he said. "I have news for you-in an anti-access, area-denial environment, we better start getting smart in the surface community on getting ahead of adversaries, because they're coming up fast."

As the surface community

begins to integrate new skills and tactics into fleet operations, Gumataotao, thanked the new WTIs and SWOs in attendance for being part of that transformation. "You see how important vou are. You may save lives in the future: you may win battles and wars. I'm very proud of you all."

For the graduates, the IAMD WTI course measured up to its Top Gun pedigree. "The first seven weeks is drinking from a fire hose," said Lt. Chris Murphy, honor graduate. "Right off the bat, they hit you everything you'll possibly need to know. The following 12 weeks are fleshing that information out and filling in the gaps, to make you a well-rounded Weapons Tactics Instructor."

A visit to NSAWC during the course was especially insightful and inspiring to the class. "The highlight was the trip to Top Gun in Fallon," said Murphy. To see their methodologyhow they teach and instruct and train their own trainers. [IAMD WTI] is a brand new

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course right now and we're going to build the brand, build the expectation of what a WTI is out there, similar to Top Gun graduates. WTIs are the subject experts and we need to talk intelligently about IAMD.

Instilling that kind of perspective in junior SWOs is the product of NAMDC's efforts to establish the IAMD WTI course. The creative process brought together NAMDC and some of the Navy's premier training institutions.

NAMDC used Naval Strike and Air Warfare Center's wellestablished models for advanced officer training, primarily the Hawkeye WTI program, as a starting point for building the IAMD WTI program," said Lt. Cmdr. Matt Cox, an IAMD WTI course instructor assigned to NAMDC. "CSCS and ATRC provided curriculum development expertise and guidance during the initial stages of building the IAMD WTI curriculum, and we adopted ATRC's seven-week Advanced IAMD Tactics Course as a technical

foundation for our course."

The end result of that collaboration, the IAMD WTI keeps some of the best training practices of the surface community while adding to the skillsets of SWOs as they prepare to meet future challenges. 'The complexity of mod-

ern threats and significant advancements in U.S. and coalition capabilities require an integrated, force-level approach to Integrated Air and Missile Defense," said Cox. "A formallytrained cadre of Weapons and Tactics Instructors can provide professional, standardized and advanced tactical training that will enhance IAMD proficiency across the fleet. Our course teaches a joint approach toward countering the entire enemy air and missile kill chain, provides extensive instructor training, and places each WTI on a path to becoming an authority in naval IAMD execution, tactics development and training.'

Military veterans updated on resources, benefits at "A Veterans Affair"

Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) systems engineer Elma Coleman reviews veteran benefits with NSWCDD scientist Erica Borgers-Klonkowski - a veteran who served five years in the Marine Corps - at "A Veterans Affair" seminar at the University of Mary Washington Dahlgren Campus in September. The NSWCDD-hosted event introduced veterans to a variety of resources and benefits available to them.

"I received a lot of information that I will pass on to my brethren currently serving and those preparing for separation," said Borgers-Klonkowski, one of the veterans who spoke with representatives from federal agencies, chartered organizations and support groups. "The most interesting thing I learned was that I could apply to the VFW (Veterans of Foreign Wars) and that the VFW provided group therapy sessions with other veterans, which I did not consider previously," she said. "Just by being around other veterans gave me an insight to programs which I would

Naval Surface Warfare not have thought to pursue nter Dahlgren Division on my own."

"A Veteran's Affair" provided veterans with access to support networks and helped workforce executives improve awareness of veterans' capabilities and needs. The event encouraged veterans to get to know other veterans in addition to representatives from veteran support organizations who can assist them and their family members in an effort to improve veterans' quality of life.

Organizations such as the NSWCDD Blacks In Government (BIG) Chapter provided veterans with information and assistance about Navy employment, education, recruiting skills, and benefits such as life insurance, compensation and home loans. "BIG is determined to keeping the White House mission: Provide an opportunity for all Americans'," said Coleman, NSWCDD BIG Chapter president. "BIG is proud to serve as a gateway to support the Veteran's Program in assisting with service members, veterans, their dependents and survivors.





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
