## Cobras ready for NTC

Brigade moves more than 1,000 vehicles, gear to California's premiere training base

FORT IRWIN, Calif. – The 4th Infantry Division's 4th Brigade Combat Team is busy at the National Training Center preparing for its deployment to Iraq next summer.

NTC rotation number 08-02 will give insight into how operations will be performed during the brigade's future deployment and will teach Cobra Brigade leaders how to fine tune their Soldiers' training.

The 3,000-plus Cobra Brigade Soldiers' training required more than 1,000 vehicles and equipment to be transported from Fort Hood to the training center.

Once the equipment arrived at the U.S. Marine Corps

railhead in Yermo, Soldiers were transported from the training center to the rail yard to unload the vehicles.

vided military leadership to help move the vehicles to NTC. "As long as the sergeants are living the NCO Creed and providing for the Soldiers, the mission is going to get accomplished."

While the brigade's Soldiers and equipment consolidate at NTC, the personnel are conducting pre-

combat checks and inspections for the upcoming week of simulated combat in the California desert.

"I expect to get good training here," said Pvt. John Napier, a wheeled vehicle mechanic from Knoxville, Tenn., assigned to Company E, 1st Battalion, 12th

Infantry Regiment. "We are doing this so us new guys can go over to Iraq and be successful."

The realism provides the combat training that seasons junior Soldiers for war.

However, the training center's observer-controllers and the Cobra Brigade's safety officers are on hand to ensure proper procedures are followed during the training.

"You're not able to simulate the bullets cracking over your head," Sgt. Kyle Dorsch, a combat veteran infantryman assigned to the 1st Battalion, 12th Infantry Regiment's headquarters company. "But the training scenarios will teach you how to react under pressure and think on your feet. That should get us ready for anything."

## Cobra leaders trained to lead at NTC

FORT IRWIN, Calif. – The leaders of the 4th Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division kicked off the brigade's rotation at the National Training Center with their Leader Training Program Oct. 28.
