### Fighting the War against Stress Rest, Assess, TRY, Survive (RATS)

There is a childhood story about boogeyman living in the closet that most every one of us has heard – in one form or another. Usually it is a rite of passage that is passed down from one sibling to another. The character may be described in terms like gigantic, ferocious, or evil, but whatever the description the result is usually the same; the doors in your bedroom must always be closed when you finally lay down in the dark. The unfortunate thing for many of us is that we do not quite get over that feeling of unease as we grow older. We don't necessarily need to close the doors to our bedroom closet but we may migrate that fear to other doors which, in our minds, are best kept closed when we are in a dark place in our life.

The darkest place that any one of us may have been lately may have something to do with this deployment, separation from our family members and closest friends. This may have caused you to comfortably close those doors that have been previously been kept open because they offered up avenues of travel into new and exciting activities and events. For the time being, many of these new things must be experienced alone and there isn't the same comfort level with keeping those doors open. Your most advantageous plan to fight the stresses of your current situation would be to do exactly the opposite. In line with the current series of articles talking about fighting the war against stress, I would now encourage a bold new move. Keep the doors open and do your best to step through a new one every month. Here are a couple of suggestions to utilize as possible strategies.

First, trying new things is a great way to spread your wings and find new interests, and possibly develop new skills. In the earlier days of the Christian church there were those that had never been taught to be evangelists. The Jewish faith did not seek to propagate it's faith by sharing it. Instead it was almost completely a blood-based growth strategy. You were born into a Jewish faith and that was it. In a bold move Jesus took 70 of his followers and told them to go out into the cities, towns, and villages and to spread the Gospel message. They were unsure of their ability to do what was being asked of them. Ultimately the church began to grow because someone tried something new. The followers found that they had talents beyond their previous self-imposed limitations. You too could find new skills, talents, and interests if you keep that door open and step through it on a regular basis.

The second reason that we need to keep the doors open is to battle against our long-held fears of the unknown. Children often overcome the fear of the open closet door by going into the closet at night and turning on a light. Once they see that there is nothing to be afraid of it is easy to keep that door open. You may come to that same conclusion if you decide that there isn't anything that you can't overcome. There is nothing to fear in this world if you choose to face your fears. The Bible says it this way, "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16:33.

## THE NORTHERN POLICE CONFERENCE

After long preparation, the Northern Police Conference was held at the 1st Armored Division Headquarters on COB Speicher on July 16th, 2008. Many were in attendance, most notably, Maj. Gen. Hertling, Brig. Gen. Boozer, Brig. Gen. Thomas, Lt. Col. Bisacre, and the Provincial Director of Police for Salah ad Din, Gen. Hameed. In a Virtual Teleconference format, the 1st Armored Division and 728th Military Police Battalion communicated with Gen. Patreus and key Ministry of Interior officials as well as Provincial Police Transition Teams and their Provincial Directors of Police from Kirkuk, Diyala, and Ninewa.

Many important issues were discussed, from increases in Iraqi Police hiring authorizations to logistical support for Iraqi Police vehicles. The conference was a success and resulted in the overall increase in Iraqi Police throughout MND-N as well as the hiring of the Sons of Iraq (SOIz) under 90 contracts.

Each section focuses on certain aspect of the logistical world and, in turn, becomes the masters of their domain. Heading the team is OIC CPT DeWitt, along with his right hand NCOIC SFC Richardson. Together they are responsible for managing the S4 section as a whole and serve as the resident experts on contracting, budget, financial liability investigations, general supply, and ammunition. Missions change and adapt constantly during any deployment. The Soldiers of 3rd Squad, 3rd Platoon, 552nd Military Police Company are no strangers to this fact. After spending 7 months serving in a variety of capacities at Badoush Prison, the squad was moved back into the city of Mosul to work with Emergency Response Battalion 2 (ERB2). In just a few weeks, Staff Sgt. Bailey Kephas and his Soldiers have been able to make a large impact on the security of Mosul and the effectiveness of this Emergency Reaction Battalion. About the time that 3rd squad of the Spartan Platoon took over this new mission, the organization of Iraqi Police in Mosul changed. The purpose of ERB2 switched from being an oversized do-anything Iraqi Police station that conducted paramilitary operations throughout the city to a highly focused first responder force that is also responsible for security in the Southeast section of the city. This alone is a difficult task, but it became seemingly impossible to make this transition in the midst of constant operations with Coalition Forces and regular leadership changes.

Despite these challenges, ERB2 and 3/3/552nd have been able to do several notable things. With assistance from C-PATT and the International Police Advisors, the squad has facilitated formal Academy training for two dozen police officers and conducted survivability and law enforcement training to over 100 police at the station. The Police Transition Team squad provided continuity though three station commanders and a location move while simultaneously building training and personnel packets for 300 new Iraqi Police that were assigned to the station.

ERB2 also provided 150 police to Operation Lion's Roar, a joint mission with Coalition Forces and other Iraqi Security Forces that targeted several potential insurgent and criminal leads in the Southeast area of Mosul. 3/3/552nd provided constant over watch and security and coordinated the efforts of the police with other Coalition Forces units working with the Iraqi Army. ERB2 Iraqi Police searched several neighborhoods and discovered several caches. In total, the station gathered approximately 300 artillery rounds, 30 mines, IED making materials that included batteries and wires, several pounds of HME and several semi-automatic weapons. Attacks against Iraqi Police and Coalition Forces have been minimal since the completion of Operation Lion's Roar.

3/3/552nd is a great example to all other PTT squads on how to create a strong bond with the Iraqi Police. This squad's professional work and constant effort has benefitted all units working within Mosul.

As Soldiers of the 58th Military Police Company rapidly approach six months in theatre supporting Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF) we are proud to report that the Company is still going strong. Our unit continues to provide Police Transition Teams to the Diyala Province consisting of over 3000 Iraqi police in five Iraqi Police Districts, 19 police stations and six substations. This often challenging and, admittedly, frustrating mission is also a rewarding and fulfilling experience that gives every Soldier a greater appreciation for our country and what we've left behind. We hope to expand our contribution to our Iraqi police partners by adding additional Iraqi Police Districts and Iraqi police to our numbers. Prior to our arrival, the Diyala Province was considered be an insurgent strong hold and PTT operations where difficult to conduct. This has changed and Soldiers of our unit have been able to conduct PTT operations with great success.

To date, the company has conducted over 1,000 combat patrols which have assisted Iraqi Security Forces in the discovery of several caches, improvise explosive devices (IEDs), and the arrest and detention of over 150 Iraqi Criminals. The unit continues to facilitate Iraqi Police training at the "Scorpion Academy" a local three week training event for Iraqi Police recruits to learn the basic skills they will need to be successful. Between class cycles, seminars are held for IP station leaders on topics such as logistics, investigations, maintenance, and other pertinent topics. The Scorpion Academy was recently renovated and now holds up too 100 Iraqi Police recruits. The academy is run by our PTT NCO Sgt. 1st Class Cal Farrow, a team of International Police Advisors, and a cadre of four Iraqi Policemen. The Company recently graduated our fourth class at the Scorpion Academy and proudly boasts 200 Iraqi police back to work with the knowledge they need to help them ensure the safety and security of the communities they are sworn to serve.

The unit support sections have also been working hard to ensure the company reaches mission accomplishment. The Supply section has been able to provide Soldiers with the latest combat equipment to include ensuring that every Soldier is equipped with the Improved Outer Tactical Vest which gives Soldiers the ability to quickly remove their protective vests in an emergency situation. The motor pool and communications sections continue to provide one of the most important services to our Soldiers; ensuring that the Company is able to shoot, move, and communicate over a vast battle space. This is no simple task and there is constantly work to be done but they are exceptional Soldiers who take pride in their contribution to the fight. Our administrative section has its own fight; managing dozens of daily actions and processing hundreds of awards to include Combat Action Badges, service awards, and purple hearts.

Fortunately, quality of life improvements continue to remain a priority on FOB Normandy and our Soldiers have found ways to relax in their down time. Fellow FOB Normandy dweller, 3/2 Stryker Cavalry Regiment, has hosted a number of morale events to keep Soldiers entertained. The events include football, volleyball, basketball, and talent competitions. In the last talent competition held on 4 July 2008; Sgt. David Wright, Spc. Shawn McGrath, Priv. 1st Class Thomas Marquell, and Sgt. Herman Murray wowed the crowd and won the event by playing original music written by their band, "ODM" or "Our Darkest Moment."
