ACS Date Night promotes healthy relationship habits

In observance of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, U.S. Army Garrison Benelux’s Army Community Service hosted a Date Night Oct. 19. at the SHAPE Cinema in Belgium.

The audience was treated to a special screening of "Spiderman: Homecoming," but the event was more than just a fun date night.

“We want to encourage healthy relationship habits like going out to a date night,” said Betty McCain, the ACS Family Advocacy Program, or FAP, manager at USAG Benelux.

ACS program facilitators and the SHAPE chaplain were on-site to introduce themselves to attendees as well as inform them about community resources.

In October, the Army observed Domestic Violence Awareness Month and programs like ACS put the issue to the forefront of their communication efforts during the month.

“It’s a month to bring attention to a problem that is prevalent throughout all society and in the military as well,” said Bill Gault, victim advocate for FAP. “It can be prevented, which the most important message we can put out.”

FAP provides services and classes year-round, which increase self-sufficiency, resiliency and community cohesion for active-duty service members, families, civilians and retirees so they do not resort to handling problems in unhealthy and abusive ways.

However, if issues do escalate to that level, FAP staff members are there to help victims. FAP’s Domestic Abuse Victim Advocate program, in particular, provides comprehensive support services 24/7 to adult victims of domestic abuse including crisis intervention, safety planning, help obtaining medical treatment for injuries, information on legal rights and proceedings, referral to military and civilian shelters and other resources, according to the U.S. Army Garrison Benelux Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation’s website.

“If you are a victim of domestic violence, you do not have

to suffer in silence or suffer alone,” said Gault. “We can put you in touch with a multitude of resources that are right here on SHAPE. We want to make sure people are aware of them and reach out to receive the help they need. Ultimately, family readiness is mission readiness.”

In Memoriam: Sgt. Michael S. Yachanin

On Oct. 6, the U.S. Army Garrison Benelux community suffered a tragic loss after the death of a beloved Soldier.

Army Sgt. Michael S. Yachanin was born on Jan. 15, 1983 in Groton, Connecticut. He enlisted in the Army as a 56M Chaplain Assistant (Religious Affairs Specialist) and graduated from Basic Combat Training at Fort Jackson, South Carolina in August 2013. Upon graduation he attended the Advanced Individual Training at Fort Jackson. His military assignments include: 101st Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Brigade Special Troop Battalion, and the 502nd Headquarters and Headquarters Company at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, from October 2013 to October 2016. From 2016 to 2017, he was stationed in the Netherlands assigned to the USAG Benelux as a religious affairs non-commissioned officer.

His deployment to Afghanistan was from February to November 2014.

His awards and decorations include: the Army Meritorious Service Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Achievement Medal (2 OLC) the Army Good Conduct Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal with Campaign Star, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, the Army Service Ribbon, the Overseas Service Ribbon, the NATO Medal and the Air Assault Badge.

He is survived by his wife Jennifer; parents Edward and Ladessa Yachanin; brother David Yachanin; sisters Andrea Gates and Kara Dimick.

He will be remembered in the U.S. Army Garrison Benelux community for his dedication to serving the military as well as his love for playing the bagpipes. The JFC Brunssum community will hold his memorial ceremony Nov. 1 starting at 1 p.m. at the JFC Chapel in USAG Benelux - Schinnen, The Netherlands.

Chièvres Air Base personnel provide support to 1ACB helicopters, troops

Helicopters filled in the sky and landed on the airfield of Chièvres Air Base, Belgium, during an October weekend. The air base became a staging area for the 1st Air Cavalry Brigade's helicopters before they deploy to support Operation Atlantic Resolve and other training and missions across Europe.

The brigade, which is in the 1st Cavalry Division, stationed in Fort Hood, Texas, deployed with 89 aircraft, including Apaches, Chinooks and Black Hawks. The helicopters arrived by ship Oct. 19 at the port of Zeebrugge, Belgium, and were then staged at Chièvres Air Base, which is a part of U.S. Army Garrison Benelux.

It was reported that it took less than 60 hours for the helicopters to go from the port to the air base. It was originally estimated that the process would take 96 hours.

As the helicopters and troops quickly arrived, the base and local community welcomed them.

Army Col. Cain Baker, the commander of the 1st Air Cavalry Brigade, credited the operation's success to teamwork among the brigade, 424th Air Base Squadron on CAB and garrison employees.

"The important thing that has occurred here, in the last week, in Belgium, was a tremendous partnership. It has been a total team effort," said Baker. "The amount of support and the welcome we received here is overwhelming. I would like to say thank you to the local community for letting us be there and share this key point, key time in our mission as we go forward."

To support the mission, the 424th Air Base Squadron, which manages the base's airfield, worked on a short notice to prepare for the helicopters' and crews' arrival.

According to Air Force Lt. Col. Craig Lindstrom, the commander of the 424th Air Base Squadron, the airfield was the perfect platform to stage the helicopters and prepare the brigade for rapid movement to their next destination.

"Our airmen, in conjunction with the garrison, had an integrated plan in order to receive them," he said.

"We put together the parking plan. We had to make sure there was enough surface area to receive these helicopters. We also run the air traffic control for sequencing their flights in and out of here. We have a fire department, which provides fire and rescue response in the event that there is an emergency. We have a fueling team and refueling capacity so they were able to get adequate fuel to move onto their next destination."

The employees at USAG Benelux were also credited for their teamwork.

Army Col. Kurt Connell, garrison commander, acknowledged the garrison employees for their ability to support the incoming

personnel, such as building life support areas for the troops, under a short deadline.

"We did what garrisons always do, which is to find out what those gaps are that the mission units can't fill on their own and see what we can do to help them," he said.

"We get U.S. Army civilian employees that rotate here every three to five years. They bring a breadth of experiences from other bases and other places that they have been assigned. Then we have our Belgian and Dutch professionals [in Schinnen, Netherlands, another location for the garrison], many of whom have been here for a long time, have the institutional knowledge of the place. When you marry those two things up, it gives us a very well-rounded response to do things."

The 1st Air Cavalry Brigade will replace the 10th Combat Aviation Brigade, which has been in Europe for nine months as part of the continuing deterrence mission.

Approximately 1,900 Soldiers will deploy for a nine-month rotation from November 2017 to August 2018. According to Baker, the Soldiers will be dispersed into Germany, Poland, Latvia and Romania.

Baker emphasized that the deterrence is not with just helicopters.

"It's a total team concept with our ground forces. With the 1st Air Cavalry Brigade, we have one job and one job only. That is support to our ground forces," he added. "We are their overhead to provide tech. aviation, medical and lift capabilities. We enhance the Soldier on the ground."

CSM Pitre assumes garrison responsibility

Army Command Sgt. Maj. Samara Lyn Pitre took the U.S. Army Garrison Benelux flag from garrison commander Army Col. Pitre, a native of Staten Island, New York, enlisted in the U.S. Army in June 1990 as a split-option trainee reservist, completing Basic Training at Fort Dix, New Jersey, in September 1990, and advanced individual training as a legal specialist, at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indiana, in October 1991. She transferred to active duty in November 1991 and completed her second AIT as an administrative specialist at Fort Jackson, South Carolina, in June 1992.

Before assuming responsibility of the garrison, she recently completed a tour as the CSM for the Special Troops Battalion of the 2nd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade.

"I was inspired. I was inspired that once again I would be given the opportunity to take care of people. When I

Army Command Sgt. Maj. William L. Majors, who assumed responsibility of USAG Benelux in June 2015, said his farewell address at the event. He spoke about the Benelux team.

"The most self-disciplined, the most highly-trained professionals. Everyone looks out for one another...I really appreciate the fact that you continue to move the ball forward," he said. "Allies and partners, I thank you for building a strong community of friends and family members. That's necessary for keeping us going forward."

The garrison commander spoke about Majors. "You need that best friend, that partner who will bolster you up when you need it. That's what CSM Majors did for me over the course of the last year and a half...That's why I'm so grateful to the Army for putting someone like CSM Majors in my path to provide me with the true coaching you get from your peers," Connell said.

A retirement ceremony honoring Majors' career followed the Change of Responsibility that day.

"We received a lot of positive feedback from all of the retirees and veterans who attended today. They were very appreciative of the services provided, but most importantly they were grateful to have the occasion to visit with their comrades," said Ron Macauley, the event organizer. "The event went off without a hitch -- and it's all because of our amazing volunteers and supporters whose dedication and expertise made for an outstanding job well done."

Retiree Appreciation Day was also held Oct. 21 at the SHAPE Health Clinic for those living in Belgium.

He then addressed the crowd, particularly about how veterans may not have received appreciation for their service when they initially came back home from the Vietnam War and other conflicts. Mons-Saint-Ghislain (E42-E19/A7): Good news! The rehabilitation of the covering of the E42-E19/A7 highway between Saint-Ghislain and Mons on a stretch of 6 km, in the direction of Saint-Ghislain, is finally done! Since Oct. 23, traffic has returned to normal.



Mons-Obourg (E19-A7): Rehabilitation of the section (8 km) between Mons and Obourg, in the direction of Brussels. Work is expected to be completed by the end of November. Traffic is reduced to two lanes and the speed of traffic is reduced to 50 km/hour. Please plan ahead and adjust your commute time if you have to enter or exit the highway in Mons or Nimy.



Mons/Nimy: Because of the Mons-Obourg project, there is still traffic congestion at all hours of the day on the boulevards in Mons and on N6 between Mons and the access to the highway in Nimy.



Route de Wallonie: Try to avoid this road until the beginning of November. Few projects are still underway, between Ghlin and Baudour, from the N552 to Bernissart and from Hautrage to Granglise.



Andenne/Daussoux (E42/A15): The three-way yard between Andenne and Daussoux has been underway since August. This project involves 15 km, in both directions. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained. Work will be completed by August 2018.

All Saints' Day honors the deceased


A public holiday in Belgium, All Saints' Day, Nov. 1, honors all Christian saints. Belgians often celebrate Toussaint, its French name, by placing chrysanthemums on the graves of dead relatives as All Souls Day, Nov. 2, is not a public holiday.

At this period of time, chrysanthemums are available in all flower shops, in all varieties and colors. It is one of the few flowering plants that flourish at this time and doesn't need a lot of care.

In many countries, such as Italy, France and Portugal, people place a lighted candle on the graves of deceased relatives. Filipinos traditionally observe this day by visiting the family dead and cleaning and repairing their tombstones. The first day of the Day of the Dead celebration in Mexico, All Saints' Day honors deceased children and infants. Although not a public holiday in the Netherlands, All Saints' Day is observed on the first Sunday in November there.

The first All Saints' Day occurred May 13, 609, when Pope Boniface IV accepted the Pantheon in Rome as a gift from Byzantine Emperor Phocas. The pope dedicated the day as a holiday to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the martyrs. Things turned bad for Phocas the following year, and in 610 he was beheaded by Heraclius who usurped the throne.

In 835, Pope Gregory III moved the holiday to Nov. 1 and expanded it to include the honoring of all saints. In Roman Catholicism, All Saints' Day is a holy day of obligation on which Catholics are encouraged to attend Mass.

Daylight Saving Time in Europe: Time to "fall back"

Just like in the United States, people in Europe have to change their clocks twice year in observance of Daylight Saving Time. The time changes do not necessarily occur on the same date every year. In 2017, the biannual clock change will happen Sunday, Oct. 29.

When local daylight time will be about to reach Oct. 29 at 3 a.m., you will have to turn your clocks backward one hour to Oct. 29 at 2 a.m., local standard time instead. You will get an extra hour of sleep as you "fall back" an hour.

Sunrise and sunset will be about one hour earlier Oct. 29 than the day before. Also, there will be more light in the morning. Don't forget to change all your clocks before Sunday morning.
