V-E Day I Continued

Victory in Europe Day or V-E Day commemorates the day the Germans officially surrendered, May 8, 1945, making an end to the European phase of World War II.

Failure to defeat the Soviets and the entry of the United States into World War II, forced the Nazis to become defensive and they soon suffered a series of escalating defeats. As a result, Adolf Hitler committed suicide, April 30, 1945 to avoid being captured by the Red Army.

A couple of days later, his successor signed the German's surrender.

Most of the Belgian cities commemorated V-E Day with a ceremony at the war monument. USAG Benelux participated in the ceremonies held in the garrison's neighboring cities of Brugelette and Chièvres.

Ribbon cut on second prepositioned equipment site

U.S. and German leaders cut the ribbon in Dülmen May 10 on the second of three Army Prepositioned Stock sites set to open this year.

The APS site in Dülmen will house the equipment an artillery brigade would use in the event of a conflict in Europe. Other sites are set to open and become fully stocked over the next three years. Once fully capable, APS will provide combat equipment, such as modernized Abrams battle tanks, Paladin artillery and Bradley fighting vehicles for deploying U.S. Army personnel in Europe.

"We say speed matters, because we have to have a timely response," said Maj. Gen. Duane A. Gamble, commanding general, 21st Theater Sustainment Command. "We fear that if we don't have a timely response we won't be able to deter to prevent a war. It's about preventing war.

"Having equipment prepositioned in Europe helps us respond faster in a deterrent way, and a preventative way," Gamble said. "These facilities, because it is war reserves, we don't intend to use them, we hope never to use them, and so we need facilities such as this that give us good storage out of the weather so the equipment stays healthy."

The installation in the town of 46,000 people was used by British forces until 2014 and was assumed by the U.S. Army in the past year.

The opening of the site is part of the NATO switch

from assurance operations, where allies work together to build trust and strengthen the alliance, to deterrence operations.

"We cannot ignore that we live in a world increasingly affected by wars, violence, and terror, which also raises anxiety and insecurity in Europe," said Dülmen Mayor Lisa Stremlau. "I think it's of great importance these days that there is a strong Europe and that the Western allies can rely on each other. The democratic forces must show unity and take a stand for their values and global peace. You can see and feel this in Dülmen today, because the

takeover of the depot through U.S. Army Europe is part of a greater NATO initiative."

During the past year, in preparation for the opening, employees started working at the new site and the first vehicles and equipment were delivered.

The mayor and Gamble indicated that they hope to continue to build on the relationship between the local community and the U.S. Army.

"I personally and we as the United States Army, have a deep and sincere appreciation and gratitude for our host nation Germany, which is where we draw our strength," Gamble said. "It's our center

of gravity in Europe. The U.S. Army could not support the NATO alliance without the support of Germany.

"It's been that way for decades. We know we will have that same type of relationship with the local community here with the citizens of Dülmen. We won't be able to do our mission without the support of the local community and the support of the citizens of Dülmen. We look forward to a trusting and fruitful partnership in the future."

Sexual assaults in military drop, reporting goes up

The past-year prevalence of sexual assault in the military reached a new low in fiscal year 2016, and reporting of such crimes is on the upswing from previous years, Defense Department officials said Monday.

The Annual Report on Sexual Assault in the Military for fiscal year 2016 shows that 4.3 percent of women and 0.6 percent of men said they experienced a sexual assault in the year prior to the force-wide survey. Those numbers are down compared to the fiscal year 2014 figures of 4.9 percent of women and 0.9 percent of men, officials said.

The report shows that, in addition to the drop in the estimated total number of incidents via the survey, the portion of those incidents that is reported to DOD authorities has risen. As many as one in three service members reported the incidents in fiscal 2016, compared to one in 14 people 10 years ago, they added.

The fiscal 2016 report shows about 14,900 service members indicated they experienced a sexual assault last year, which is 5,400 fewer than the 20,300 victims estimated in 2014.

"We're encouraged that there was less of this horrible crime in 2016. However, there are still too many people experiencing a sexual assault," said Navy Rear Adm. Ann Burkhardt, the director



of DOD's Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Office. "We will continue to provide first-class support to those who have been victimized and further evolve our prevention efforts to stop the crime before it occurs."

Resounding Message

"Our people have heard the message from their senior leadership that this crime has no place in our military," SAPRO Deputy Director Nate Galbreath said of the uptick in victim reporting. "We believed 10 years ago that, if we built services that gave people confidence, they would be supported, [and] more people would report."

And more men are reporting sexual assault crimes because of strides DOD has made through awareness, he noted.

"Leadership at all levels of the department have been making an effort to let men know we want to hear from them," Galbreath said. "In

the military, sexual assault is something experienced equally by men and women -- there are just as many men as women who experience sexual assault. ... Real warriors ask for help when they need it."

While force-wide surveys in DOD are voluntary, more than 735,000 active-duty service members were invited to take the fiscal 2016 survey, and 24 percent of those invited replied, Galbreath noted.

"That kind of response gives us a lot of precision and confidence in our results," he said. "Our surveys are designed so that the results represent the entire force. This is how we know that about 14,900 active duty men and women experienced a sexual assault in 2016 -- down from some 20,300 in 2014, and way down from about 34,000 in 2006 when we first started."

DoD Supports Victims

Service members who made a sexual assault report and participated in the military

justice system said in the Military Investigation and Justice Experience Survey that they received solid support, the deputy director said.

"We are very lucky to hear from a small, but important, group of military members who take our [survey]," he added. "They've told us that they get great support from our special victims' counsel -- their lawyers -- as well as from their victim advocates and sexual assault response coordinators."

"Three-quarters of these service members who've been through the justice process would recommend that other service members make a report," he continued. "If anyone is wondering whether they should come forward, I hope they take this advice."

Prevention is the key to further reducing the occurrence of sexual assault and increase reporting, Galbreath said.

"If we expect prevalence rates of sexual assault to decrease in the future, we will need to get after the prevention of co-occurring misconduct like sexual harassment, hazing and alcohol misuse," he said. "We have plans in the works to collaborate with our counterpart organizations across the DOD to press forward together."

Measles vaccinations recommended for 6-12 month olds

Regional Health Command Europe officials are recommending that 6-12 month old children should be immunized with the Measles, Mumps and Rubella vaccine, as a result of an ongoing measles outbreak in several European countries.



This dose is in addition to the two doses children normally receive, starting after their first birthday. The vaccine will now be a part of the routine 6-month-old visit with their pediatrician, and is encouraged for all children aged 6-12 months, especially those in day care.

Measles is an extremely contagious virus, with essentially 100 percent of exposed susceptible individuals becoming infected. The virus can linger in the air of a room or transportation vehicle for up to two hours, according to COL (Dr.) Rodney Coldren, the Chief of Epidemiology and Disease Surveillance for

Public Health Command Europe.

“However, the MMR vaccine is a very safe and effective means to prevent this disease,” said Coldren. “The vast majority of Americans are already immunized against measles, having received at least two doses of the MMR (Measles, Mumps, and Rubella) vaccine in early childhood.”

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued a travel alert for Belgium, Italy and Germany April 17, recommending that all travelers in that age group receive the vaccine. This dose does not replace either of the two doses required after 12 months of age for long-term immunity.

Adults and children not vaccinated for measles could be at risk for contracting the illness due to the outbreak. The most seriously affected countries are Italy and Romania. However, France,

Germany, Poland, Switzerland, Ukraine are seeing a significant number of cases and Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Iceland, Hungary, Portugal, Spain, and Sweden have experienced a few cases.

“Measles has been largely eliminated in the United States, with the exception of small, localized outbreaks, so the MMR vaccine isn’t normally administered until 12 months of age,” said Coldren. “However, this leaves infants 6-12 months old at risk in areas where the virus is present, because the immunity that was passed on to them from their mothers is generally not effective beyond six months.”

Measles can be a very serious, even fatal, illness and is especially severe in babies and elderly persons, according to Coldren.

Donations are essential to the continuing success of AER. Although the campaign runs through May 15, donations are welcome throughout the year. Over 8% of the active duty force received assistance during 2016.

Since its inception 1942, AER has assisted more than 3.7 million Soldiers and family members with over \$1.7 billion, according to the most current AER annual report.

In 2015 AER provided \$71 million in assistance to more than 47,000 Soldiers and their Families, according to the AER website.

Mattis Meets With Lithuanian President, Baltic Defense Ministers

Defense Secretary Jim Mattis reassured U.S. allies in the Baltic states of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia of American solidarity with them and of U.S. determination to defend Baltic and other NATO territory against any aggression.

During his visit to Vilnius, Lithuania May 9, Mattis met in the morning with Lithuanian President Dalia Grybauskaitė and in the afternoon with Estonian Defense Minister Margus Tsahkna, Latvian Defense Minister Raimonds Bergmanis and Lithuanian Defense Minister Raimundus Karobolis.

The secretary held news conferences after each meeting.

“United by our transatlantic bond, I believe that you who have withstood oppression can most keenly savor freedom, never taking it for granted or looking away when it is threatened,” Mattis said during a joint news conference with Grybauskaitė.

“Even in the face of a neighbor next door shredding trust,” he added, referring to nearby Russia, “Lithuania has nonetheless contributed to the NATO-led mission far away in Afghanistan and has continued to provide capable trainers” in Iraq for the mission to counter the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria.

Common Cause

Mattis said he believes that 2014 was a watershed year in Europe, when the Baltic states and the NATO alliance faced dangers from terrorism, aggression, cyberattacks and more.

“Have no doubt we stand with you, united in a common cause,” the secretary said, adding that the U.S. commitment to the security guarantee of NATO's Article 5 remains ironclad. Article 5 of the Washington Treaty that established NATO says an attack on one ally is considered as an attack on all.

Mattis commended Lithuania for its commitment to raise defense spending above 2 percent of gross domestic product by next year.

“Your recognition of the threat and of our treaty obligation under NATO Article 3, to maintain our individual

and collective capacity to resist armed attack, heartens the American people, and you rightly stand as an example for all NATO allies,” the secretary said.

Americans join the United Kingdom, Germany and Canada as NATO framework nations lead diverse allied defensive forces deployed in Eastern Europe to reinforce a deterrent posture and allow diplomats to engage with Russia. The NATO framework nation concept involves nations working multinationally for the joint development of forces and capabilities the alliance needs.

NATO's purely defensive stance, Mattis said, is designed to assure allied sovereignty by preventing miscalculation and buying time for diplomats to restore mutual respect.

Meeting With Baltic Defense Ministers

Tuesday afternoon, Mattis joined his Baltic defense counterparts in a meeting and reiterated the strong U.S. commitment to defend its Baltic allies.

He also visited Pabrade Training Area, there meeting with the NATO battle group, which he called a stabilizing force in the region. The group consists

of allied forces deployed in Lithuania to demonstrate the nations' solidarity and determination to defend NATO territory against any aggression, Mattis said.

During their meeting, Mattis said, he and the Baltic defense ministers had good talks, as they share an appreciation of the situation and of the road ahead. “And what you see here with the enhanced forward brigade is matched in the several other Baltic nations as well,” he added.

The battle group in Lithuania has a German commander and a strong German contingent, the secretary said, “but allied nations also are part of the battle group, ... [and] it shows the way NATO can be interoperable and troops can come together and work together and, if necessary, fight together.”

Mattis is traveling this week to Denmark, Lithuania and the United Kingdom to meet with U.S. partners and reaffirm key military alliances. While in Denmark, Mattis and the Danish defense minister co-hosted a meeting of senior leaders from 15 countries that are key contributors to the fight against ISIS.
