The workshop was an exchange of information regarding the maintenance of good air quality inside submarines and the International Space Station.

In addition, the staff from NMCPHC and U.S. Navy workshop attendees included representatives from Naval Sea Systems Command Headquarters, technical warrant holder for Submarine Atmosphere Control, engineers from Naval Surface Warfare Center, Philadelphia and Carderock Divisions and the Naval Submarine Medical Research Laboratory.

"The biggest misconcep-

tion in our area is that people say they had no idea that there was housing, or they heard that everything had a two-year waitlist," Taylor said. "I have people who are shocked that they can move in right away or in 30 or 60 days."

Benefits for active-duty renters include no credit or background check fees or any other upfront costs, no pet rent or deposits, free community events and sixmonth leases, Taylor said. Also, those who use a lower amount of electricity have an opportunity to earn money back.

Lincoln Military Housing is an affiliate of Lincoln Property Company, which formed a private-public partnership with the Department of Defense in 2001. It has developed and managed more than 36,000 military family homes across the nation, according to its website, https://lincolnmilitary.

Bauernschmidt takes on role of first female aircraft carrier XO

When opportunity knocks, you have two choices – seize the chance or let it slip away.

Capt. Amy Bauernschmidt, the executive officer aboard Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72), is the type of person who throws the door open wide and asks "What have you got for me now"?

During National Women's History Month, Bauernschmidt took the time to share with Lincoln's crew the story first female executive officer assigned to an aircraft carrier.

"I take it all back to something I learned very early on from a very important woman in my life," she said, referencing her mother as a pivotal part of her naval success. "Never pass up an opportunity."

In 1994, Bauernschmidt was a senior at the U.S. Naval Academy, majoring in Ocean Engineering, when Congress repealed the combat exclusion law that prevented women from serving on combatant ships and in combat aircraft. She said her class was about 50 days away from selecting future assignments and this repeal military career.

process and air sampling methodology," NMCPHC department head for industrial hygiene Robert Edwards said.

"It also provided a good networking opportunity to meet your counterpart within the Royal navy and NASA," Edwards said. "The laboratory tour at NASA WSTF provided us further insight into the instrumentation and procedures used for off-gas testing of materials and to have a one on one discussion with the NASA scientists."

Discussion topics included air quality monitoring, deriving exposure limits for chemical contaminants and material control.

"I really enjoyed the collaborative spirit among the attendees in solving unique problems with real-world application to Navy submarines and NASA's International Space Station and future spacecraft like the Orion," toxicologist NMCPHC Dr. Amy Delong said. "The collective experience between NASA, the Royal navy and U.S. Navy was remarkable. I look forward to working with our counterparts on future projects."

Collaborations were an important byproduct of the workshop.

"Naval Sea Systems Command Headquarters, technical warrant holder and Navy and Marine Corps Public Health Center updated the test protocol for the Navy Submarine Atmosphere Material Control Program at the White Sands Test Facility and discussed offgas test results with NASA scientists," Edwards said. "We also got the opportunity to tour their off-gas testing facility."

NMCPHC is a key member of the U.S. Navy Submarine Environment Advisory Board which is chaired by the chief of U.S. Navy Bureau of Medicine and Surgery (BUMED) M9. NMCPHC's Submarine Materials Review Board (SMRB) reviews all non-metallic material prior to installation aboard a submarine. The SMRB evaluates the toxicological and hazardous material aspects of the material and forwards a recommendation for usage category to the chief of BUMED M9. NMCPHC also recommends which non-metallic materials are sent to NASA for off-gas testing, interprets the results, and determines whether the materials will adversely affect the submarine air quality.


The Office of the Oceanographer of the Navy, under direction from the Chief of Naval Operations, announced the establishment of Task Force Ocean, March 24.

Our overall capabilities are second to none, but the gap is closing and we can't be complacent. It's time to up-our-game to stay ahead of our competitors."



We thought baking the cookies under the broiler was genius, until the smoke alarm went off at 11 p.m. and the building residents had to stand outside in their pajamas waiting for the German fire trucks to arrive.

With April Fool's Day upon us, I am reminded of my buffoonery and wonder, "Am I the only foolish military spouse?" I recently reached out to others and found out that nobody is perfect.

One Navy wife confessed that after two decades of going to formal military ceremonies, she still forgets to put her hand over her heart during the national anthem and then

Back when she was ignorant of the ranking system, one Navy spouse pinned one of her husband's oak leaves on upside down during his promotion ceremony, all while smiling obliviously at the crowd. The General took pity on her and pinned the other oak leaf on upside down to match.

Turns out, we all make mistakes from time to time. The only foolish act would be denying it.

USS Lake Erie assists distressed mariners

Ticonderoga-class guided-missile cruiser USS Lake Erie (CG 70) provided assistance to 25 mariners in the early hours of March 19, after receiving a distress call from a civilian ship taking on water.

Lake Erie deployed a rescue and assistance team aboard a rigid hull inflatable boat (RHIB) and after embarking the distressed vessel the eight-member team began dewatering the ship and searching for the source of the flooding.

"After making sure everyone was alright, we noticed water was coming in at about 1,200 gallons a minute," Lake Erie's damage control assistant Lt. Ruben Maldonado said. "We estimated 24 inches of water to be flooding the deck."

The team found two cracks in the hull of the wooden vessel and used wooden shoring to reduce the flow of water.


"We wanted to ensure the seaworthiness of the vessel," Maldonado said. "Over time, with wooden ships, something like this is bound to happen."

The Lake Erie team turned over the operation to the U.S. Coast Guard once the flooding was under control and the water level dropped.

"We train every day for these types of situations," Damage Controlman 2nd Class Mark C. Grizer said. "Every situation is unique, so we have to have a creative mind to fix any problems we find. This was a great opportunity to help our fellow Americans in need."

Lake Erie is currently underway conducting Composite Training Unit Exercise (COMPTUEX) with the Nimitz Carrier Strike Group in preparation for an upcoming deployment. COMPTUEX tests the mission readiness of the strike group's assets through simulated real-world scenarios and their ability to perform as an integrated unit.



OCEAN Fiveyear roadmap to be developed

School. The executive steering committee will develop a five-year ocean science roadmap designed to advance ocean science that supports the Navy's mission.

The roadmap will focus on the Navy's capability to observe the ocean environment, process the collected data into products that can be used by operational commanders and further strengthen the Navy's ocean science technical workforce.

"Through the implementation of the roadmap, our priority is to reinvigorate and reconstitute our technical workforce," Gallaudet said. "We'll be looking at everything from oceanographic survey ships, unmanned vehicles, ocean and acoustic modeling and how we apply our products to recruiting, educating, developing and retaining our workforce."

Hahn further explained the importance of interagency, academic and private sector partnership.

"Since the 1840s, the U.S. Navy has consistently been a major force in the advancement of ocean science," Hahn said. "Task Force Ocean will ensure we maintain our historic edge in understanding and predicting the marine environment in support of naval operations in all the world's oceans."

Gallaudet elaborated on the significance of ocean science to the Navy's mission.

"It's hard to believe that in this globally interconnected information age, only five percent of the volume of the world's oceans have been explored and only 20 percent of the world's seafloor has been mapped to modern standards. So there's a lot that we don't know. We need to better understand the oceans because that's where the Navy operates," Gallaudet said.

The Office of the Oceanographer of the Navy is the Chief of Naval Operations' resource, requirements and policy adviser for the Navy's oceanography program. The oceanographer also serves as the Navy's senior policy adviser for issues related to national ocean policy, governance and interagency ocean

activities. The Office of Naval Research reports to the Secretary of the Navy through the Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Research, Development and Acquisition. Led by the Chief of Naval Research, its senior leadership oversees a portfolio of investments ranging from immediate, quick turnaround technologies to long-term basic re-





Options beyond **April 18 tax** deadline

From IRS

WASHINGTON

The Internal Revenue Service reminds taxpayers that if they are unable to file their tax returns by this year's April 18 deadline there is an easy, online option to get more time to complete their return.

Taxpayers who need more time to complete their return can request an automatic six-month extension. An extension allows for extra time to gather, prepare and file paperwork with the IRS, however, it does not extend the time to pay any tax due.

The fastest and easiest way to get an extension is through Free File on IRS.gov. Taxpayers can electronically request an extension on Form 4868. This service is free for everyone, regardless of income. Filing this form gives taxpayers until Oct. 16 to file their tax return. To get the extension, taxpayers must estimate their tax liability on this form and should pay any amount due.

Members of the military on duty outside the United States and Puerto Rico receive an automatic twomonth extension to file. Those serving in combat zones have up to 180 days after they leave the combat zone to file returns and pay any taxes due. Details are available in the Armed Forces' Tax Guide Publica-

Other fast, free and easy ways to get an extension include using IRS Direct Pay, the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System or by paying with a credit or debit card. There is no need to file a separate Form 4868 extension request when making an electronic payment and indicating it is for an extension.

Direct Pay is available online and on the IRS2Go app. It's free, does not require preregistration and gives instant confirmation when taxpayers submit a payment. It also provides the option of scheduling a payment up to 30 days in advance.

The program is largely beneficial for patients dealing with certain including conditions, multiple sclerosis, gait disorders, Parkinson's disease, and language and memory disorders. Chemali says that others dealing with anxiety, lethargy, breathing disorders, cognitive problems and chronic pain have also seen improvements with therapy from the Music and Medicine Center. Other health facilities in the area also have forms of music therapy, like Bon Secours DePaul Medical Center with its Healing Touch program. A harpist is on its part-time staff. The Sentara Music and Medicine Center, however, has a more involved approach, targeting neurological disorders specifically.

Data to quantify the success of the program, which started in 2011, is being analyzed, says Chemali, who came to Music and Medicine from the Cleveland Clinic in 2012.

For Rodriguez, the Music and Medicine patient recovering from a stroke, the therapy over three years has helped to bring back glimmers of the affable guy he was before - the former insurance salesman who met his wife 50 years ago at the old Peppermint Beach Club in Virginia Beach.



'Motown the Musical' at Chrysler Hall, April 4-9

The long wait is over! "Motown the Musical," the original Hitsville, USA itself, will be at Chrysler Hall April 4-9 for eight amazing performances and almost 60 songs to please every lover of the Motown sound.

"Motown the Musical" tells the true story of Diana Ross, Michael Jackson, Smokey Robinson, Marvin Gaye, Stevie Wonder, The Temptations and more, as seen through the eyes of Berry Gordy, the founder of Motown.

I had the pleasure of speaking recently with David Kaverman, who plays Smokey Robinson.

Yiorgo (Y): Smoky Robinson is such an icon, how do you even go about playing such a revered musical

David Kaverman (DK): By understanding the man himself. Smokey is such a strong, powerful guy. Even though people know his voice to be higher and softer, he was one of the original gangsters from the streets. He grew up in Detroit. He is a tough guy. He is not one to shy from saying anything. There are a couple of scenes in the show where he has to let Berry know what's what. He is also a very religious man, a man of faith. He started singing at Motown when he was 18, so for him Motown has been his whole

Y: I'm sure the rehearsal process was a lot of fun. How did you prepare your voice, dance moves, chore-

DK: I did have to work at altering my voice a little bit, but the creative team told us that they did not want impersonators. They said, 'Don't try to sound like them, just give a flavor of who they were and who they still are.'

I watched a lot of YouTube and tried to capture who he is, because Smokey is such a cool dude, so smooth, such a poet, and a musician. It took me a while to find who he

was, how he operated and spoke.

Like an athlete, you practice and repeat. Luckily, I had so much support from the creative team and the cast and other principals. From director Charles Randolph-Wright, to Allison Semmes who plays Dianna Ross, to Chester Gregory who plays Berry Gordy and Jarran Muse who plays Marvin

This is the second National Tour, and the other three leads were from the first National Tour. They had already done it and were really supportive with helping me find my Smokey and willing to adapt to what I was doing. For me it was such an easy comfortable rehearsal period. I was the unknown, but they were so great and supportive.

Y: What was the actual audition process for Motown

DK: It really was a blessing. I was hoping to snag something big, but I had originally auditioned to be in the ensemble. They were looking for a Smokey cover in the ensemble.

I went in for the first round, they called me back, they said we are going to have a dance round, then sing your sides.

I was so nervous. Several of my friends who had been in it in the past were saying, 'You would be great as Smokey Robinson.' So I am really putting in all the work. I did the dance audition, but I know that dancing is not my strong suit and I had to do a lot of dance for this tract so I was really nervous for the dance portion and afterwards I felt like oh man I really blew this. Others nailed the choreography more than I did and my insecurity kicked

So originally I was not going to stay for the afternoon portion to read, but I persevered and stayed, because the casting director said we are not making any cuts after dance. So I said if they are not cutting anybody why should I cut myself.

They called me in to do my reading, and I put everything into it because that is my strong suit. They put us on tape, because Berry

Gordy could not make it to the New York auditions so he scenes playing himself with could watch them.

The next day I get a call from my agent that they want to put me on hold for Smokey Robinson. I said for the cover right? He said no, for the role! So they called again and they said they want to do another Skype for Berry Gordy with all the Smokeys.

I got the news that I had the part over Thanksgiving break, so it was the best Thanksgiving ever. But there is also a point to the story and that is, don't quit before somebody tells you no.

Y: Performing for Berry Gordy on Skype had to be one of those wow moments. Have you had any more moments you want to share?

DK: Oh my yes. After all the rehearsals were done, the time came to do what we have been working for and perform it for Berry Gordy in hug and said good job and Los Angeles for our opening. Mr. Gordy gave us a lot of notes, and I got to sit down and talk with him one-onone for about half an hour.

The crazy thing is, he is

in his 80s and he was doing me, so of course that was such a surreal moment for me doing scenes with the actual Berry Gordy.


