## NAS staff, peers laud long-time airfield manager

Naval Air Station Key West Airfield Manager Dave Vermillion died June 3 at the age of 58.

Vermillion came to NAS in 2002, a few years after retiring from the U.S. Air Force with 20 years of service.

Vermillion was the consummate professional, colleagues say. He managed an airfield that recently welcomed President Donald Trump, thrilled the public with air shows in 2004, 2010, 2013 and 2016, saw hundreds of VIP arrivals and departures and trained combat aviators in tens of thousands of sorties.

A Pittsburgh native, Vermillion was a Steelers football and Penguins hockey fan. He was quiet, private and reserved - unless you were among the gathering of friends tying up at the "Redneck Yacht Club" on Marvin Key.

Vermillion loved the ocean, enjoyed fishing and driving top-of-the-line Corvettes. Friends

## JIATF South training focuses on hurricane response

### FROM JIATF SOUTH PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Joint Interagency Task Force South provided all-day training May 30 to its personnel to prepare for hurricane season.

Also presenting were leaders from Monroe County and the City of Key West, who provided "lessons learned" and "Plan early, plan often and be prepared," Keck stated.

In her opening comments, Rear Adm. Stephanie Keck, JIATF South deputy director,

noted the importance of ensuring ongoing, accurate communications from JIATF South to its people, and described recent innovations to improve these communications. She also discussed the need to obtain necessary evacuation and preparedness essentials before disaster hits.

Three representatives from the county and city level also discussed lessons learned from past disasters and

new strides to improve communications and services.

Shannon Davis-Weiner, deputy director of Monroe County Emergency Management, provided information on shelters and re-entry procedures, including staged re-entry for Tier 1 and Tier 2 responders.

Monroe County Sheriff Rick Ramsay, described strides to ensure secondary communications were in place, given the failure of internet, phone and satellite systems during

Irma.

Key West District V Commissioner Margaret Romero discussed procedures to ensure that first responders could best ensure residents' safety and city services that are available to assist with hurricane preparedness and evacuation.

JIATF South representatives concluded by providing hands-on training to its personnel on systems to ensure efficient internal communications and procedures to follow when evacuating.



## NEX gives back with A-OK program

### FROM NEXCOM PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Navy Exchange Service Command's A-OK Student Reward Program offers all qualified students to participate in a quarterly drawing for monetary awards of \$2,500, \$1,500, \$1,000 or \$500 for a total of \$5,500 per quarter.

The next drawing is at the end of this month.

Any eligible full-time student that has a B-grade point average equivalent or better, as determined by their school system, may enter the drawing. Homeschooled students can also qualify with acknowledgement that the student has a "B" average or equivalent record of accomplishment.

Eligible students include dependent children of active duty members, reservists

and military retirees.

Students must be enrolled in first through 12th grade. Dependent children without an individual Dependent Identification Card must be accompanied by their sponsor to submit their entry.

Each student may enter only once each grading period and must re-enter with each qualifying report card.

To enter the drawing, stop by any NEX with a current report card or progress report and have a NEX associate verify the eligibility. Then fill out an entry card and obtain an A-OK ID which entitles the student to discount coupons for NEX products and services.

NEXCOM has been offering students a chance to help pay for college through its A-OK Student Reward Program since 1997. NEXCOM has awarded \$722,000 to students.


Southeast. Second place was awarded to Coast Guard Sector Key West and third place went to Fighter Squadron Composite (VFC) 111.
