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Incoming Command Executive Officer Lusk a Familiar Face

If you have been at any local swim meets or youth baseball and soccer games in the King George area, you may have already met incoming Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) Executive Officer Cmdr. Robert Lusk. He, his wife Charla and their three children – a 14 and 9-year-old son and a 13-year-old daughter – have lived in King George since 2011 and take a very active role in the community.

Hailing from St. Paul, Minn., Lusk first came to Dahlgren in 2011. He was preparing for his next orders and had a choice to go to the Pentagon, overseas or a little base in Virginia named Dahlgren.

He and his wife did a bit of research and decided to make the move to King George and Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren; he served at the Joint Warfare Analysis Center (JWAC) as the liaison officer to Central Command and branch officer to Africa Command until 2014.

When the time came in 2014 for Lusk to move to his next assignment, the family faced the decision of moving on or remaining in the community that had



come to mean so much to them. It was an easy call. "We've found a community here that we really en-

joy. We've found families here we are really close with and we have adaptability," Lusk said. "When those orders came up for me to go to Newport News, I said we can either all go down there [Hampton Roads] together and then try to get follow-on orders down there in the Chesapeake area, or I can go and be a geo-bachelor and they just said, 'see ya!'"

Lusk acknowledged the sacrifices that his family has made in support of his career—moving 11 times over the last 19 years—and thought it was his turn to make the sacrifice. He credits the successful integration of his children into the local community and their successes in school with their mother Charla, whom he calls a phenomenal example of a military wife.

Over the last few weeks, Lusk worked side by side with NSASP's former executive officer, Cmdr. Christopher Zayatz and he has high praise for the transition that took place in May.

"It's been an excellent turnover so far with Commander Zayatz, I can truly say that," Lusk explained. "Everyone I've met on the N-Code staff has been

NSWCDD Commanding Officer and Boy Scouts Retire American Flag

Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) Commanding Officer Capt. Godfrey "Gus" Weekes presided over a solemn flag retirement ceremony with Boy Scout Troop 1404 after his keynote speech inspired the scouts troop during their troop meeting, May 24.

"We always welcome community leaders such as Captain Weekes to come and speak and participate at our troop meetings," said David Hanger, an NSWCDD engineer who is a Boy Scout parent and charter organization representative, serving as the troop's liaison to

its Dahlgren United Methodist Church sponsor. "It certainly helps inspire and motivate the boys to set their goals high. Captain Weekes's message emphasizing the Scout Oath and his participation in the flag retirement ceremony was a definite treat for the scouts."

"The core values of the Navy (honor-courage-commitment) and the core values of the Boy Scouts, as described in the Scout Oath, are similar," added Chip Warder, Troop 1404 scoutmaster who is a Boy Scout parent and NSWCDD engineer. "Captain Weekes discussed the importance of these values as well as leadership, duty, and serving the community. The boys hear the importance of these ideals from the troop's adult leaders and parents all the time, but

Month of the Military Spouses — The Glue That Keeps Things All Together

In our last segment highlighting just a few of the outstanding military spouses at Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren and NSF Indian Head during May's Month of the Military Spouse, we are recognizing three Ombudsmen from across Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) and its tenant commands. These three ladies have a collective 40-plus years as military spouses, children and service members, and truly epitomize the idea that a military spouse can do anything.

Between them, they have won statewide pageants, wrestled alligators and demonstrated the very best of humanity by volunteering countless hours serving in the command and in the community.

NSASP's Ombudsman — Laura Ludwig — has been a military spouse for more than 19 years and despite a number of deployments and moves, established herself as a leader across career paths including certified dog trainer, photographer and librarian; she also holds one job that might not have paid out monetarily, but which provided Ludwig with a wealth of opportunities to share the life of a military spouse across her home state of Louisiana. Ludwig was Mrs. Louisiana 2009 and during her reign traveled the state sharing how deployments impact families and especially, the children.

"I was one of eight military spouses with state or country titles that year using our titles to speak up and support other military families."

A mother of five, Ludwig credits the military life with providing her very successful children with many opportunities and adventures.

"Our kids have gotten to experience things that I could only dream of as a child," Ludwig shared. "Our middle child has best friends in Japan, Guam and San Diego that she keeps in touch with daily."

One of the more difficult aspects is the transient life that most in the military count as just part of the job. Ludwig explained that while being able to connect online via video chat and email is an amazing tool, it just isn't the same as being able to spend time together in person.

Her best advice for new spouses is to embrace the change and lifestyle.

"There is something great about where you are heading even if you get orders you didn't ask for. With every duty stations we have been to, even the ones we didn't want, we have found people or connections that were 'ah-ha' moments as to why we were there at that time. Look for those 'ah-ha' moments and connections and you'll enjoy this journey," Ludwig said.

Jennifer Diaz is the Naval Health Clinic Patuxent River and South Potomac (NHCPR) Ombudsman, as well as a management and program analyst with the FFRC at Commander Navy Installation Command headquarters (CNIC) in Washington Navy Yard, a mother of two and has been a military spouse for 13 years. For her, the most difficult aspect of being a spouse is during a deployment when she believes spouses don their "Super Woman" capes.

"[During deployment] spouses take on double duty as both mom and dad in order to keep a simple and comfortable lifestyle for our loved ones," Diaz shared. "If a plan is not in order, then tasks become stressful. You have to find balance with work, family, volunteering and other activities. That's the system to keep a

happy family afloat and full of adventures."

In addition to being the NHCPR Ombudsman, Diaz spends her time volunteering for many organizations — state and local food banks, shelters, schools and other non-profit organizations.

"I feel it's my duty to serve and give back. I've had the opportunity to motivate more and more military spouses to volunteer their time to make their community a better safe haven for all families to enjoy while being stationed [here] temporarily," Diaz said.

Being a military spouse provides many benefits and Diaz enjoys meeting new friends and reconnecting with old friends at different duty stations. Sharing the common experiences with others is one way that Diaz believes newer spouses may benefit from getting out and getting to know others in their community.

"You find reassurance and comfort with others when you've met another spouse who shares the same experiences," Diaz explained. "It's insightful to know that I relate to aspects of the military lifestyle and exchange resources and ways to improve our temporary lifestyles. Support your military member and understand their mission to serve. I'm blessed to be a military spouse and although it will have its challenges you must keep it together, take care of your own health as well, and enjoy the ride."

Angel Boily, the AEGIS Training and Readiness Center (ATRC) Ombudsman, is also a familiar face around Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren. She can also be found at the Fleet and Family Services Center assisting other spouses in her role as a work and family life specialist, as well as being the vice president of the Dahlgren Officers Spouses Club.

Boily, former Soldier and an Air Force "brat," was no stranger to the military lifestyle when she married into the Navy, but having experienced it from every viewpoint, Boily echoes sentiment heard from many of our spouses — having to be both mom and dad during times of deployment is one of the most difficult tasks faced by our military spouses. However, she believes that a great deal of the satisfaction a military spouse experiences in the role is truly what they put into it.

"A good attitude and a willingness to go with the flow will make the experience that much better," Boily shared. "The military life truly is what you make it."

In addition to her work at the FFSC, Boily enjoys serving the Sailors and spouses by supporting their relocation process and helping incoming families settle in, as well as serving as a liaison be-

amazing, not only here but at Indian Head as well. There are a lot of daunting tasks here, as we all know. We have five fence lines and it's a big job with a lot of responsibility. While acknowledging the challenges of his new job, he offered high praise for his new NSASP shipmates, the community and especially, his family. "I can't say it enough; the community is amazing, my family is amazing," Lusk said. "I know this is going to be a tough tour; there's going to be a lot of responsibilities and hardships, but I think I am up to the challenge. I truly wanted to be here; there were other options, but this is where we wanted to be."

tween outgoing families and their new command Ombudsman.

Boiley also enjoys volunteering with organizations such as Boy Scout, Girl Scouts, Sea Scouts, Sea Cadets and animal shelters.

"I am currently working on a project to help [re-home] service member's 'fur babies' that are unable to relocate with them due to many reasons," Boily shared. "I also like to get my children involved in local events to help give back to the community both civilian and military."

Boily encourages spouses to get out and volunteer on their base, as well as in local community so that they can make new friends.

"It's also a great way to build up your resume," Boily said.

Not only a military spouse, volunteer and mother to five, Boily is also one of only a handful of women to be certified as a licensed nuisance alligator trapper by the Florida Wildlife Commission. Having grown up in Florida, Boily was no stranger to gators and in 2012, she received training and ran a very successful at trapping team that included her daughter, who was 17 the time.

It was during a deployment that Boily decided to train with the Statewide Nuisance Alligator Program (SNAP), proving that not only does life go on hold when spouses are deployed, but that the family members who keep the home fires burning can thrive and grow in their own right.

More Than Just Smoke and Mirrors – NSWC-DD STEM Night at Colonial Beach Library

Staff from the Naval Support Warfare Center (NSWC) Dahlgren Division took part in a Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) demonstration at the Cooper Branch Library in Colonial Beach on May 18 to a group of nearly 30 children. Dr. Daniel Wallace, technical warrant holder for displays and human factors engineering, with the Surface Warfare Systems Engineering (NAVSEA 05W) group within the Naval Systems Engineering Directorate (SEA 05) at NAVSEA headquarters, along with Barbara DeBary-Kesner from V14, the Human Systems Integration Branch within V Department -Warfare Systems Engineering and Integration demonstrated liquid nitrogen effects on different materials, Charles' Law and effect of temperature on gasses, Lenz's Law and effect of temperature on electrical resistance, Leidenfrost Effect, expanding gasses and propulsion, propagation of smoke rings, and engaged the children in a thorough discussion on the scientific method.

"I really enjoy helping the students get a practical 'so what' understanding of why STEM is important and relevant to them," Wallace said.

an American flag that was no longer in condition to continue flying over an NSWCCD building at Naval Support Facility Dahlgren.
The U.S. code (title 36, chapter 10,

section 176, paragraph k) directs that, "the flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." Moreover, the Boy Scouts of America handbook advises that, "Scouts can volunteer to help replace faded and tattered flags in their communities and to conduct flag retirement cere-

monies for those that have been taken down." The BSA handbook adds that, "a national flag that is worn beyond repair may be burned in a fire. The ceremony should be conducted with dignity and respect and the flag burned completely to ashes."
The dignity and respect was evident as a scout read a patriotic, historical overview of the American flag

during the solemn event. Another scout played taps while all in attendance stood silently at attention.
"It brings a profound and emotional element to retiring the flag properly," said Warder. "Retiring a faded, torn or weathered U.S. flag in a respectful and dignified manner is something we take very seriously in our troop. The ceremony was espe-

cially memorable since we had the honor of having Capt. Weekes attendance. He placed the flag in the fire, then stood at attention while saluting along with the boys. It was special to all of us. Having an active member of the military participate in the flag retirement ceremony adds another element to the event that we all will fondly remember for a long time."



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
