NSASP Bids Farewell to Feinberg as O'Leary Assumes Command

Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) bid farewell to outgoing Commanding Officer Capt. Mary Feinberg at a June 21 change of command ceremony at the Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren Parade Field. Rear Adm. Charles "Chip" Rock, commandant of Naval District Washington (NDW), presided over the ceremony that also welcomed aboard NSASP's new commanding officer, Capt. Michael O'Leary.

The Navy Band was on hand to perform the National Anthem and the AEGIS Training and Readiness Center (ATRC) Color Guard presented the colors for the ceremony.

Amidst the solemnity of the ceremony, Rock took a moment to jest with Feinberg regarding her fierce loyalty to her alma mater, Louisiana State University, by donning a ball cap sporting his team -Texas A&M's colors momentarily garnering a chuckle from those in attendance.

Rock took a more serious tone when extolling the many accomplishments Feinberg achieved during her three years at the helm of NSASP — an activity that encompasses three bases in two states.

"Anyone who knows Mary admires her tireless work ethic and her positive outlook that permeates the entire command," Rock said.

Feinberg hosted three major concerts during her tenure, including the first Morale Welfare and Recreation (MWR) concert event in 15 years at NSF Indian Head, where performers Daughtry and Magic! wowed the base. Feinberg was also at the helm when the Navy's last coal-fired power plant was decommissioned in October of 2015 to make way for the more energy efficient natural gas and steam-powered plant. Feinberg said the decommissioning was "my proudest MILCON [Military Construction] moment" and added that the old Goddard Power Plant had been in operation for nearly 70 years, long past its intended service life. The NSF Indian Head Community Center was also established during Feinberg's tenure by combining the library and community recreation, and adding the Market Fresh Bistro.

At NSF Dahlgren, NSASP completed numerous MILCON projects under Feinberg's leadership, including opening a \$13 million fitness center, renovating one of the Child Development Centers, an addition to the ATRC and a \$28 million submarine ballistic missile facility.

Rock presented Feinberg with Legion of Merit before turning the podium over to the outgoing leader

Feinberg took a moment at the beginning of her remarks to perform her last official duty as commanding officer of NSASP — to recognize one of the

JWAC's New CO Assumes Command

Air Force Col. Melvin Douglas Sachs took command of the Joint Warfare Analysis Center (JWAC) on June 20, in a ceremony on the Dahlgren parade field, replacing Navy Capt. Andrew L. Feinberg.

Sachs is the eleventh commander of JWAC since 1994 and the first Air Force officer in that position since 2009. Most recently, he served as the Senior Defense Official and Defense Attaché to Australia since 2014.

"In Doug, we find the equal of Andy Feinberg," said Air Force Gen. John E. Hyten, Commander, U.S. Strategic Command (USSTRATCOM) in Omaha, Neb., to those in attendance. "We had to go 10,000 miles.... Doug and Chele (his wife) are a powerhouse, quality team."

In his remarks, Hyten advised Sachs to do three things as he begins his new job; focus on the war-fighter, help USSTRATCOM as it restructures and emphasize speed and innovation.

Hyten also praised Feinberg, who became JWAC's commander in May 2015 and now heads to the Navy staff, OPNAV N455, at the Pentagon.

"Andy, well done and well done to your organization," Hyten said. "The impact Andy made on this organization will be felt for years."

For his part, Sachs brings an

engineering background, flying time with the RC-135S Cobra Ball surveillance aircraft, and many staff and command assignments to his new assignment at JWAC.

"To JWAC, I am grateful and honored to join you," Sachs said. "I'll make every effort when I come to work in the morning to do my best."

Originally from Missouri, Sachs joined the Air Force in 1988 after being commissioned as a distinguished graduate of the Reserve Officer Training Corps program at the Missouri University of Science and Technology where he earned a Bachelor and Master of Science degrees in Engineering Management.

Eagle Scout Achievement for NSASP Employee's Son

Michael Chizuk, son of Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) Security Director Stan Chizuk, was recently awarded the rank of Eagle, the highest rank in the Boy Scouts of America at a Court of Honor ceremony. The rank of Eagle puts him in a small percentage of Scouts who advance that far — about five percent. What makes Chizuk's achievement more extraordinary is that he completed the requirements for the rank at the age of 13, about three to five years earlier than most.

"I had some friends in my troop who were older and going into high school and they had shared that if they had one thing to do over [with scouting], it would be to complete their Eagle scout before high school since it becomes more difficult," Chizuk said.

Chizuk began his scouting journey in the first grade in Rochester, New York, and is currently a member of Boy Scout Troop 218 in the Aquia District.

Inspired by a visit to the Greenfield Senior Living Center in Fredericksburg, Chizuk built a 40- by 40-foot picket fence, two picnic tables — one handicap accessible- and then a tabletop bowling alley for the residents for his Eagle Scout project.

"I was making my confirmation this year [with my church] and we went there to play bingo with the seniors," Chizuk said.

He added that he appreciated the environment the facility offers its residents, most of whom are living with dementia and Alzheimer's

Karen Estes, executive director of Greenfield Senior Living Center, shared how grateful all of the residents and staff are for the dedication that Chizuk and the other volunteers exhibited.

"It has been a real blessing to all of us," Estes said. "The residents enjoy being outside so much and they thoroughly enjoyed Michael being here."

Estes went on to share that Chizuk was an inspiration, and not just to young people. His civic-mindedness and diligence left her almost speechless.

"It was not an easy project," Estes shared. "Our jobs are so hard sometimes and their support for our mission — there really are no words. It has been so rewarding to see someone so young and

so committed. It really is almost unheard of anymore."

Through T-shirt sales and generous donations from local home improvement and lumber stores, Chizuk was able to generate the funding necessary to complete the project.

He has earned a total of 26 merit badges, five more than the required 21 to achieve the Eagle rank.

Chizuk is now considered a mentor and will continue his scouting journey earning bronze, silver and gold palms. While he already has the requisite number of merit badges to achieve

bronze, Chizuk must remain active for an additional three months to earn his bronze palm.

In addition to scouting, Chizuk plans to go into the computer engineering field. He enjoys computers and programming.

Next year, Chizuk will begin his high school journey at Mountain View High School in Stafford, Va., where he will taking part in the International Baccalaureate Program.

CSCS Commemorates Battle of Midway

The Center for Surface Combat Systems (CSCS) and one of its learning sites, AEGIS Training and Readiness Center (ATRC), co-located onboard Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP), commemorated the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Midway on June 8.

"The Battle of Midway took place June 4-7 1942 and was a pivotal victory for the U.S.," explained Master Chief Shawn Harrell, ATRC's Senior Enlisted Leader and coordinator for the event. "As the years pass and we now celebrate the 75th anniversary, those who lived through this historic battle have become few. Therefore, it is crucial that their voices are heard so our future generations of Sailors never forget."

NSASP and its tenant commands joined CSCS and ATRC to remember what is considered to be a turning point in the Pacific campaign for the United States and its allies during World War II.

Lt. Cmdr. Johnny Redford, a recent Warfare Tactics Instructor (WTI) graduate and ATRC

 $instructor, was \ the \ keynote \ speaker.$

"Today, I want you to understand the Battle of Midway and its lessons learned," Redford explained to the audience, a mix of military and civilians. "I will discuss key events, leadership, Order of Battle, the timeline of the battle, and tactical takeaways."

Redford engaged the audience by asking questions and sharing a piece of his family's history.

"My oba-chan [grandmother] lost her brothers during WWII, father after WWII, and husband during the Korean War. Therefore, when I joined the Navy and was promoted to Chief, she told me that my job was to bring Sailors safely home. I am now an officer and her words are still with me every day. The Battle of Midway illustrates why training is so essential to our lethality. The training we provide our Sailors at the schoolhouse prepares them to successfully defend our waters and keep our nation and allies safe. Training also provides Sailors with the best chance to return home to their loved ones."

The 75th anniversary of the Battle of Midway has concluded but those who defended our nation are not forgotten.

"One of the reasons I decided to join the U.S. Navy was the actual Battle of Midway movie that starred Henry Fonda and Charlton Heston," said Capt. Frank X. Castellano, CSCS commanding officer. "I was a child when I first saw the film but clearly understood it was not only a decisive U.S. victory, but also represented a time in our history where our nation came together to defend its freedom. These Sailors helped change the course of WWII through blood, sweat, and tears. Their sacrifices encouraged me at the young age of nine to become the Sailor I am today."

CSCS' mission is to develop and deliver surface ship combat systems training to achieve surface warfare superiority. CSCS headquarters' staff oversees 15 learning sites and detachments located throughout the continental United States, Hawaii, Spain, and Japan. CSCS provides nearly 70,000 hours of curriculum for 528 courses a year to more than 37,000 Sailors. CSCS delivers specialized training for Officer and Enlisted Sailors required to tactically operate, maintain, and employ shipboard and shore-based weapons, sensors, and command and control systems utilized in today's Navy.

Sailors whose dedication Feinberg wanted to acknowledge. Feinberg presented Yeoman 2nd Class Petty Officer Tyrone Powell with his Yeoman First Class Petty Officer badges through the Meritorious Advancement Program. The program allows senior leadership to recognize and reward sustained superior performance by their Sailors by advancing them in rank. Powell's advancement will be effective July 1.

Feinberg continued by sharing her fond memories of what she considered a tour "so unlike any other tour throughout my naval career." A naval aviator, the bulk of her career centered on operational flying and navigator training tours; her assignment at NSASP was an installation management tour.

Thanking the various department heads for their continued support, she acknowledged the wealth of knowledge she had come to appreciate regarding a range of topics relevant to installation management, including environmental clean-up, public infrastructure, day care and youth center activities, public works along with safety, emergency management and community relations.

Summing up her experience aboard the installation, Feinberg acknowledged the dedicated efforts of NSASP employees.

"Absolutely none of this would be possible with the dedicated efforts of the employees... who come to work every day wanting to provide the best and highest quality of service to the personnel and their families that utilize our services," Feinberg said.

"Every one of you is an irreplaceable and valued member of the South Potomac team," Feinberg said. "From the bottom of my heart, thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve with you... you have made me a better person personally and professionally, and a better naval officer."

After offering thanks to Rock for the latitude to command NSASP to best meet the requirements given and for presiding over the ceremony, Feinberg offered the highest praise an aviator could give to a fellow Sailor: "You are the

most 'aviator-like' Surface Warfare Officer I have ever had the opportunity to work for, thank you for everything."

Feinberg went on to thank her fellow installation commanders and her family, concluding with special thanks to her husband, Capt. Andy Feinberg, who had just relinquished command of the Joint Warfare Analysis Center (JWAC), hosted aboard NSF Dahlgren the day before.

Before turning the podium over to incoming Commanding Officer Capt. Michael O'Leary, she praised the turnover and shared that it was with a heavy heart that she awaited the time-honored tradition of the relinquishing of command to him, though she was confident that he would find, as she did, the NSASP staff to be an exceptional cadre of professionals

"I wish you and the South Potomac team the best of luck as you start this new chapter in your Navy journey," Feinberg concluded.

Feinberg read her orders to conclude her remarks and turned the podium — and command — over to Capt. O'Leary, who in turn read

his orders assuming command of the installa-

O'Leary offered his appreciation to Feinberg and to his family and friends for attending the event, including his wife Laura and children Aidan, Patrick and Jacob.

"Sailors — women and men of South Potomac — I look forward to your continued support and collaboration with our peers throughout the region and our partners both inside and outside the fence line," O'Leary said. "Captain Feinberg, you have built a tremendous legacy, thank you again for the leadership and mentorship."

"As we continue to train sailors for today's missions," O'Leary concluded, "to respond to crises both locally and globally to ensure the Department of Defense's ability to operation in the maritime air and space command and to develop the transformational weapons of tomorrow, please know I am incredibly proud to serve alongside you and look forward to the next three years."

Following a benediction from NSASP Chaplain Lt. Joshua Okwori, attendees enjoyed a reception at the NSASP flagpole.
