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# NSWC Dahlgren Division Personnel Awarded for Achievements Vital to Current and Future Fleet

Ninety-two individuals and 16 teams were honored with 21 different Navy and Dahlgren Division awards as the Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) held its annual honor awards ceremony, May 17.

Family and friends of awardees watched Naval Surface Warfare Center (NSWC) and Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) Executive Director Donald McCormack present the awards with NSWCDD Commanding Officer Capt. Godfrey "Gus" Weekes and NSWCDD Technical Director John Fiore while the event was livestreamed on the command's Facebook page.

"The award narratives bolstered the confidence I have that the warfare centers are intellectually prepared to meet any challenge," McCormack told a packed audience at the University of Mary Washington Dahlgren campus auditorium. "Dahlgren is poised to help the Navy accept the technical direction of today's Navy, tomorrow's Navy and the Navy after next."

McCormack leads more than 20,000 civilian scientists, engineers, technicians and support personnel — based at nine NSWC and NUWC divisions across the country — who perform research, development, test, and evaluation for the future Navy in addition to in-service engineering and logistics support for the operating fleet.

"Thank you for your skills and devotion to Dahlgren, to the warfare centers and our Navy," said Mc-Cormack. "We are one team, so as you celebrate your accomplishments today, please take a moment to pass along your thanks to everyone that helped you make today a reality, and of course that needs to start with your families."

The annual ceremony honors the men and women of the NSWCDD workforce who demonstrated

exceptional resolve to meet the command's mission objectives in addition to those who significantly impacted the community through volunteer service.

"They exemplified NSWC Dahlgren Division's spirit of innovation in keeping with our strategic vision — to be recognized as the technical leader in delivering innovative, affordable and effective solutions for the Navy and in support of joint and national initiatives," Weekes wrote in the Annual Honorary Awards Ceremony program. "It is also important to recognize our awardees' families and co-workers, who are partners in the professional successes we celebrate today. To the spouses, children, parents, and friends — thank you for your devotion and understanding as long hours and extended travel were necessary."

Weekes recounted the command's numerous accomplishments in 2016, citing examples of work vital to Navy technological programs and the development of new capabilities such as the virtual USS Dahlgren. The cybernetic ship coordinated an engagement with virtual and hardware representations of systems on the USS John C. Stennis (CVN 74), USS Bunker Hill (CG 52) and USS Independence (LCS 2) last August. "The event occurred during live-fire destruction of surface threats, allowing NSWCDD to evaluate how multiple Navy assets can work together seamlessly at reduced cost," said Weekes, adding that

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# Always Moving Forward: CBIRF Spouses Share Wisdom

The diversity of life experience and talent that today's military spouse brings to the table is just as diverse as service members themselves. Whether they were raised as "military brats" or newly married and on their first tour, spouses have to be just as dedicated to the mission as their Soldier, Sailor, Airman, Marine or Coast Guardsman. Two spouses from the Chemical Biological Incident Response Force (CBIRF) team chatted recently about their journey as a military spouse.

Mary Ann O'Connell considers herself a bit of a local girl. While not born and raised in the Indian Head, Md. area, this self-professed military brat grew up as a Navy dependent and her father's last duty station was at the Washington Navy Yard, a move that brought her family to the area. It was O'Connell's military roots that colored her perspective in her early days as a military spouse.

"I thought that there was a specific role I had to play being a military spouse," O'Connell said. "I thought that there was a certain way I was supposed to be and it took a few years to realize that that wasn't serving anybody. I love the military community, but I don't help anybody being that person that they think I should be. The hardest part for me was learning to be authentic."

Tiffany Gates is a fellow CBIRF spouse that had never been a part of a military family before, so her experience differs a bit. Without a preconceived notion of who a military spouse is, Gates had to learn on the fly. How-

ever, Gates credits those early lessons and dealing with the stresses that can come with deployments with strengthening and maturing her, just as it did for her Marine.

"When you go through certain things and they [the service member] aren't home, it makes you so much stronger," Gates shared.

Gates gave an example of her first experience with a deployment when the return date seemed to be in flux.

"It was so wishy washy when they were about to come back and it was frustrating," Gates explained. "Two days before he was supposed to come back we got an email saying that they were going to be another six weeks and I literally ran into the bathroom at work and fell apart."

the test was "a huge win for the Navy and warfighter."

NSWC Dahlgren Division's mission to the Navy and warfighter focuses on research, development, test and evaluation, analysis, systems engineering, integration and certification of complex naval warfare systems related to surface warfare, strategic systems, combat and weapons systems associated with surface warfare. The command also provides system integration and certification for weapons, combat systems and warfare systems.

"You've been providing technical and business excellence for nearly a century, and we will be celebrating Dahlgren's 100th anniversary shortly," said McCormack, the event's keynote speaker. "One hundred years of providing research, development, test and evaluation, analysis, systems engineering, and so much more. One hundred years of innovation and stewarding the intellectual capital we need from testing guns on the range (Potomac River Test Range) to missiles and now to directed energy weapons, and of course the incredibly capable Aegis combat system. The history and collaboration of our warfare centers is important. History helps us learn lessons on collaboration to provide the best technological solutions — not just what we develop locally — and how working together (across warfare center divisions) makes us stronger."

Families and co-workers watched as awardees were honored at the morning individual awards and afternoon group awards sessions.

#### Navy Superior Civilian Service Award

Stephen Malyevac received the Navy Superior Civilian Service Award. The honor recognizes employee contributions that are exceptionally high in value, but affect a smaller area than the Navy Distinguished Civilian Service Award and are more significant than those for which the award of the Navy Meritorious Civilian Service Award is made. The Superior Civilian Service Award may be awarded for contributions that serve as a model for other commands.

#### Navy Meritorious Civilian Service Award

Ten NSWCDD employees were presented with the Navy Meritorious Civilian Service Award -

#### John Adolphus Dahlgren Award

The John Adolphus Dahlgren Award, the command's highest award, was presented to Joseph Berenotto and Anthony D'Alessandro.

The Dahlgren Award is named for Rear Adm. John A. Dahlgren — who is considered the "Father of Modern Naval Ordnance" — and honors individuals with significant achievement in science, engineering or management.

Lt. Cmdr. Wesley Simon received the C.J. Rorie Award, established to recognize military personnel assigned to NSWCDD whose excellence in the performance of their duties contributed significantly to the effectiveness of the Division's military operation.



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

# SafeHelp Provides Support for Men Following Unwanted Sexual Contact

Safe HelpRoom, a service provided by DoD Safe Helpline, is an online community of sexual assault survivors in the military that meets to support each other in taking the next steps after a sexual assault. It's free, secure and available 24/7 – and, since May 14, there's an additional help room specifically for men.

Every Sunday, between the hours of 1-3 p.m. EST, men who have gone through similar experiences can connect with one another securely, confidentially and anonymously by accessing www.safehelpline.org.

"As part of ongoing efforts to support military men, Safe Helpline will hold Safe HelpRoom sessions for military men who have experienced unwanted sexual contact," explained Kinjal Dalal, senior Safe Helpline manger. "Safe HelpRoom is an anonymous, moderated, 24/7 online group chat that allows individuals who have experienced sexual assault in the military to connect with and support one another."

According to FY 2016 DoD's Annual Report on Sexual Assault in the Military, "reports from women still outnumbered men, but more men reported the crime in 2016 than ever before."


Sexual Assault Response Coordinator, (SARC) Gloria Arteaga's experience has shown that men more often report a "restricted" case when reporting sexual assault to the SAPR program.

"Often, restricted cases are also reported to confidential sources like counselors, medical and/or Chaplains but many others still go unreported," Arteaga said." The Safe HelpRoom is intended to help those who still struggle with what happened to them and allows them a safe place to rid of some of the trauma caused by a sexual assault violation."

Safe HelpRoom sessions have a moderator who can provide referrals and help keep the conversation focused on survivors' needs as well as a reviewer who ensures all participants are adhering to the site's ground rules, such as not providing any personally identifying information; not requesting any identifying information from other participants; refraining from the use of abusive, graphic or inappropriate language; and actively interacting with the group.

Security and anonymity are protected because Self HelpRoom does not capture a participant's IP address, so there is no record they were ever involved. And no transcript is saved, so once a chat window is closed, the text is not retrievable. Chat group reviewers also have the real-time ability to block messages that violate the site's aforementioned ground rules.

"These sessions are for survivors only," Dalal reiterated. "Safe Helpline staff serve as moderators to ensure that anonymity is maintained and that the sessions are safe and supportive expe-

Fast-forward to a recent deployment that seemed to mirror the nebulous return date of the first and Gates realized how she has matured as a military spouse.

"It had been a difficult deployment and they did the same thing and I thought, 'You know what? What's a few more weeks?" Gates said. "Literally, a day later I got an email that they would be home the next day."

Gates explained that it's important for spouses to grow and learn just as their service member grows in their military career and advances in rank.

"It's a give and take," Gates declared. "It's a growing up process and you grow up alongside them and learn how to conduct yourself next to him."

The hardest part though, Gates explains, is coming to the realization that if a service member had to choose between their significant other and their job and they had a choice, they would choose their spouse.

"But they don't have that choice. They signed a contract and you can't take it personally. You have to realize that everything he is doing will pan out and it will be better in the long run if you can just support him now."

O'Connell shared that in addition to being supportive, you have to be authentic, being able to express feelings but not getting lost in a particular disappointment or frustration.

"It's crying when you need to cry, but picking yourself up that next day," O'Connell explained.

"You can't live in that particular moment. It's character building. There are things that I experienced as a younger spouse that now, as a more seasoned spouse, I handle differently, because I know the world isn't going to end tomorrow."

O'Connell continued by explaining that being a part of the military family as a spouse is akin to being a part of a sports

team. Contributing to a larger team effort, but still being true to one's self.

"There's that sort of idea that it's just a bunch of gossipy wives," O'Connell said. "That's not true, there are so many people at CBIRF that are wonderful mothers, some at home and some who have careers, and I think programs like the Family Readiness Program help break down those community wall barriers You shape your own community. If you sit in your little box, that becomes your reality. Don't be afraid to vent, but don't live there. That's when you get stuck. It's nice to be a part of something bigger than yourself."

Gates agrees that making use of the programs that are in place for military dependents can be vital in ensuring a successful venture.

"Ramona [Higgins, the CBIRF Ombudsman] is the first FRO [Family Readiness Officer] that I ever talked to," Gates shared. "I always felt like there were other spouses that would need help more than I did and I thought I could handle it on my own. Sometimes I wish I had gotten that assistance, but I also feel like those experiences helped me learn to deal with things on my own."

O'Connell and Gates agreed that new spouses coming into the service often aren't aware of the support and connections that are in place to provide assistance to the family.

"They don't always have the opportunity to take advantage of the resources," Gates said, "especially when they are a part of a huge fleet. You have to be willing to take that first step and not be afraid. We've all been there. Chances are the wife sitting next to you is going through the same thing, even if was 10 years ago. They can understand and offer advice."

Also important, both spouses agree, is actively seeking to expand your horizons, whether it's taking a class, volunteering, working from home or establishing a career outside the home.

"Focus on something that is fulfilling to you," O'Connell advised. "That way, you're not losing yourself and blaming the Marine Corps for everything. It can become so easy to become resentful - that's where you don't want to stay. Always moving forward."

[Interviews like these are always difficult to write in that you have to limit how much you can include due to space constraints. Both ladies had so much terrific advice for new spouses that we were not able to fit in print and Gates volunteers time to speak with new or struggling spouses. # NSWC IHEODTD Logistician Wins Lottery

For most people, winning the lottery translates to money. However, when Gaoussou Cisse, logistics management specialist and pre-expended program manager at NSWC IHEODTD, won his lottery, he gained the opportunity to move from the Ivory Coast to the United States.

The Diversity Immigrant Visa program is a Department of State congressionally-mandated lottery program which allows foreign nationals to apply for a green card. According to Cisse, around 400 people from the Ivory Coast won the year he did. The lottery has several regulations; applicants must know someone already residing in the United States and have already obtained at least a high school diploma. Cisse applied for the lottery in November of 2005. He was announced a winner six months later and officially moved to the United States in 2007.

"I've been dreaming of moving here since I was five," said Cisse. At the age of 30, Cisse left his home country and traveled alone across the world to live with his cousin in New Jersey. In the beginning, he didn't speak much English. While he had learned some in high school he never fully retained much, as there was no need to use it. Cisse began working full-time at a gas station for minimum wage while he waited for his green card. But he wasn't satisfied.

"I kept asking people 'What can I do in this country to better myself?" Cisse said. During his endeavor to find his niche, his cousin suggested he join the military.

What Cisse had known of the military was far different in the Ivory Coast. Several people steered him away and advised he didn't join. However, he knew he wanted to succeed. Cisse bought a dictionary and stayed up until 4 a.m. teaching himself English after work. After only three months of living in the United States, Cisse contacted a Navy recruiter to take the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery test. Much to his surprise, he passed.

His boot camp began in June 2008. His training continued as his shipmates helped teach him colloquial English. Shortly after completing boot camp, he moved to the Navy Supply School in Mississippi where he graduated the following November.

Cisse's first duty station was aboard Naval Air Station Patuxent River. He started as a Seaman and was promoted to Store Keeper Third Class (SK3) during his tour. His will to keep learning didn't cease. While at Patuxent River, he took college courses and graduated with a Bachelor's degree from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

His career then led him to the Naval Air Station Oceana where he worked as a logistics specialist and a DoD contractor for Serco Inc. It was around that time that Cisse began applying to positions at NSWC IHEODTD and was hired in 2015 as part of the Naval Acquisition Development Program (NADP).

Ten years after moving to the United States, Cisse is now a logistics specialist and pre-expended program manager in the property management office. The diversity and hard work of his colleagues at NSWC IHEODTD is a proud motivator in his daily life

"I'm so grateful for this country," said Cisse. His family plans to make their first trip to the United States to visit next year.

"I tell everyone you need to step up and do what you have to. The best thing you can do to succeed in this country is to serve," said Cisse. "If you love your country, you have to show it."

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
