Keith Plumadore, EOD Department Head, served as MC for the event. "As we gather to recognize EOD technicians who gave their all carrying out the EOD mission, it is also appropriate to take this opportunity to contemplate on how circumstance brought us to this isolated and picturesque peninsula on the Potomac almost exactly 70 years ago," said Plumadore.

"When you navigate your way here through rural Southern Maryland and finally find this place with its peaceful wooded scenery and the single roadway navigating the base, you wouldn't think much is going on

Junior Navy Scientists and Engineers Make Early Warning CBR Detection via UAVs a Reality

Sly Fox Mission 21 has all the trappings of a smash hit reality television series with a technological innovation that may one day save the lives of warfighters across the joint services.

Although it was never filmed or broadcast, the drama, technology, and names of the seven junior scientists and engineers are real.

Hundreds of Navy civilian and military personnel witnessed this reality as the mission culminated with a technological capability demonstration on the Potomac River Test Range, June 15.

"One of the secrets to the Sly Fox Program's success is the makeup of the team — using scientists and engineers with fresh perspectives from a wide array of technical disciplines helps identify solutions that otherwise may not be apparent," said Kevin Cogley, head

of the Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) Chemical, Biological, and Radiological (CBR) Detection Branch.

Similar to reality TV, the Sly Fox members took time to get to know each other, including their strengths and weaknesses, as they worked to make the warfighter's urgent need for an early warning CBR detection capability — adaptable to various unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) — a reality.

"The Sly Fox program serves as an outstanding experience accelerator for members our workforce," said Dale Sisson, NSWCDD deputy technical director. "By presenting the Sly Fox teams with real world challenges and schedules, we are able to allow them to gain valuable experience into what it takes to support our warfighters."

The team of mentors — senior NSWCDD scientists and engineers

Dahlgren Yacht Club Members Take on Oyster Farming

At a meeting of the Dahlgren Yacht Club aboard Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren on June 14, members gathered to get a lesson in raising oysters, quite a different topic for the group, but an important one for the environment.

A team of experts from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) led by Jackie Shannon, the oyster restoration manager for the organization, were on hand to discuss the long-standing tradition of oystering in the Potomac and surrounding bodies of water, including Upper Machodoc Creek, the body of water that the Dahlgren Yacht Club is situated on. The history of the bivalved mollusks and their relationship to the inhabitants of this region reaches back further than the presence of the European settlers. But the numbers of oysters in the bay along the bay and its tributaries declined precipitously over the course of the last century, though the population is slowly rebounding.

With assistance from CBF and concerned citizens like the members of the Dahlgren Yacht Club, oysters are making a comeback — a boon for seafood lovers — but they are also improving the quality of the waters they inhabit. At its most basic level, CBF's oyster restoration program recruits and helps volunteers tend "gardens" of juvenile oysters known as spat. Participants in the program, like the members of the yacht club, ensure that the garden, or wire cage of spat-on-shells (baby oysters set on recycled shells), remains in the water and that the cage remains free of obstructions, which keep the spat clean and healthy. As they grow and form their own shells, the spat grow into mature oysters and fill the cages. During this growing phase, the spat will feast on the algae and other impurities, including nitrogen pollution, in the water.

Shannon explained that oysters are filter feeders and each can filter approximately 50 gallons of water each day. Each of these oyster gardens will benefit not only the water quality, but also create additional habitat for other fish and crustaceans as the oysters grow and form reefs. In addition, as the native oyster species *Crassostrea virginica* makes a comeback, the hope is that the industry will soon follow.

Base employee Alan Hardesty, who is the yacht club's commodore, said he and other members

of the Dahlgren Yacht Club decided to be a part of the program because they were interested in reintroducing the oysters to the Upper Machodoc Creek and the Potomac River.

"King George has quite a history of watermen and oyster harvesting," said Hardesty. "We hope to help restore that proud tradition."

Randy Grigg, along with wife Betty, are heading the oyster gardening program for the yacht club. Grigg shared that the club will work in conjunction with Naval Support Activity South Potomac and the CBF to relocate the spats to a sanctuary reef once the oysters reach adulthood next June. The oyster gardening program is open to anyone who has access to a dock and can care for the growing bivalves during the course of the year it takes to reach maturity.

"Our hope is to keep this going year after year, to be able to fully create reefs out here to help clean up our waters," he said.

Shannon told the DYU volunteers how best to care for the cages of maturing oysters, including how to protect them during inclement weather and how to ensure that as they get bigger, they have ample space to accommodate the growing oysters by separating the growing spats into additional cages.

After the tutorial on oyster care, the majority of the oyster cages that Shannon brought were hung at the end of the yacht club's dock, while the rest of the cages went home with attendees to be incubated at their own home docks.

The oyster gardening program through CBF would like to have more participants on all of the bodies of water that feed into the bay. Shannon and her team are giving presentations at other locations to raise awareness with the hopes of having 500 cages of oysters growing by the year 2022. Dahlgren's oyster garden will be the first located in the Potomac River and Up-

per Machodoc Creek.

If you are interested in being a part of the oyster gardening program, you must live on the water with some salinity. Waters northwest of the Harry Nice bridge tend to not have the salinity needed, but Shannon says they are happy to provide spats if an interested party lives on slightly less salty waters to attempt to grow oysters. If you don't have access to water, you can also help the program by saving oyster shells. Spats need shells to "incubate" on and there is a shortage of shells. CBF turns 2,000 bushels of recycled oyster shells each year into habitat for millions of oysters planted in the Bay and its rivers.

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DECA Commissaries: Celebrating 150 Years of Service



1867-2017: DECA Commissaries Celebrate

In 2016, the men and women of DeCA observed a quarter-century of their agency's service to the military community.

This year, DeCA is celebrating the 150th anniversary of the modern commissary benefit, which officially began on July 1, 1867.

On that date, two years following the Civil War, enlisted men received the same shopping privilege that had been available to officers since 1825: the right to purchase goods, "at cost price," from their post's subsistence department warehouses.

But 1867 is regarded as the start of the "modern benefit" because men of all ranks became eligible to make such purchases, and these sales were not limited to frontier posts. Rather, they

were permitted at every post, across the country as well as on the frontier, where the commanding officer believed they were necessary.

It seems fitting that, following a war that helped do away with slavery and some of the old class distinctions, enlisted men, who were more in need of the commissary benefit because they received lower pay than their officers, were permitted to supplement their official rations at minimal cost.

As years passed, retirees, spouses and families also became eligible shoppers, and commissaries mirrored changes and progress in the civilian retail grocery industry – from self-service and supermarket-style shopping to product proliferation. As the nation sent its armed forces overseas, commissaries followed: Cuba, the Philippines, China and Panama all had U.S. military commissaries before 1905. Surcharges came and went. During the World Wars, commissaries spread all over the globe, from Europe and the Middle East to the Far East and even South America.

The Navy and Marine Corps opened their first commissaries in 1909-1910, and when the Air Force came into being in 1947, it inherited commissaries at Army Air Force bases and airfields.

In the early 20th century, each store ran things its own way – or, rather, as the local commander desired. If the commander was interested and enthused about the commissary, the facilities were good and well-run, with large stock lists; if he was not, then the commissary – and its patrons – suffered the consequences.

World War II sent Americans in uniform all over the world, and commissaries followed. After war's end, starting with the Armed Services Commissary Store Regulation of 1949, the services began taking control of the commissaries on their bases, professionalized store staffs, and created career paths for military and

civilian employees.

By the 1980s, the four major services each had their own commissary system: AFCONS (the Air Force Commissary Service), NAVRESSO (Navy Resale and Services Support Office), TSA (the Army's Troop Support Agency) and the Marine Corps Commissary Section. Under their direction, commissary staffs were further professionalized, many practices and procedures were standardized, and the stores themselves were upgraded.

By 1991, with the end of the Cold War in sight, funding for the military was beginning to be a political issue. Anticipating possible efforts to cut the commissary benefit, Congress approved merging the commissary systems of the four major services into one agency, the Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA), which officially took over the operation of 411 separate commissary locations around the world on Oct. 1, 1991. For the next 25 years, DeCA improved service, modernized its stores and increased customer savings.

Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) actions and the downsizing of the American military have reduced the number of DeCA commissaries to 238, but all are either new or have been remodeled and modernized.

The commissary remains a key factor in both recruitment and retention, a focal point for quality of life on military installations, and along with medical care, is one of the two most valued items in the military benefit package. The commissary customers of 1867 would no doubt be amazed by the transformation that has taken place in the last century-and-a-half; but they would be pleased to know the benefit not only still exists, but is thriving.

Special sales and other events will be held in celebration of the 150th anniversary, some of which will vary by store, so check with your commissary management for details about upcoming events.

— ensured a strong focus on technical rigor as they taught the Sly Fox team how to perform under pressure.

“The program is challenging, both to the home organization and to the employee,” said Mary Collings, head of the NSWCDD Gun Prototyping and Rapid Fielding Branch and supervisor of one of the Mission 21 team members. “It enables employees to experience the development of a system from beginning to end. They start with requirements and finish by demonstrating a product.”

The intensive collaboration resulted in a system called SCAPEGOAT, otherwise known as “Senses CBR Agents Pre-Engagement and Goes Over All Terrain”. The modular CBR detection system accommodates multiple sensor modules across multiple UAV platforms, enabling Sailors to better protect themselves from the increasing frequency of CBR attacks by relaying threat data to command and control assets.

Throughout the demonstration, spectators looked at the horizon over the Potomac River and viewed monitors to see the SCAPEGOAT system onboard a commercial octocopter UAS platform detect and report the presence of chemical simulants.

“It directly addresses a real warfighter need for low cost, flexible CBR early warning technologies,” said Cogley, a Sly Fox process mentor. “While other organizations and industry have demonstrated similar capabilities, the SCAPEGOAT’s low cost and ability to operate with multiple UAV platforms and CBR sensors is the unique quality that sets it apart from other solutions.”

Early in the design phase, the team decided to integrate existing CBR detection technology into SCAPEGOAT, avoiding major modifications of CBR sensors and UAS platforms that involve strict payload weight limitations. Their decision led to a system design with three interchangeable mission modules — one each for the chemical detection, biological, and radiological detection capabilities.

Moreover, the chemical and radiological detection modules are compatible with currently fielded military sensors. The biological collection unit is a custom NSWCDD-designed module compatible with currently fielded filter media that uses a 12-volt fan to pull air through the system. In addition to CBR detection systems, SCAPEGOAT features modules for communications, a global positioning system, camera, and power.

As the demonstration concluded, team members reflected on their Sly Fox Mission experience and shared lessons learned.

“The primary lesson I learned from Sly Fox is the necessity of technical rigor in concept development, design, and testing,” said Joshua Taylor, NSWCDD physicist. “Sly Fox connected me to

people and resources around NSWCDD that left me with a deep appreciation of the scope and rigor of the work being done at Dahlgren. Subject matter experts that advised the development of the SCAPEGOAT inspired me to pursue a collaborative environment that is driven by real and present needs of the fleet, where I can be challenged to develop new skills.”

“To actually experience the full development of a program in such a short timeframe, from defining requirements to testing and evaluation, has been enormously enlightening,” said Charles Miller, NSWCDD scientist. “I learned a lot about the DoD acquisitions and rapid prototyping processes. This entailed striking a balance between the well-defined procurement process and the need for maximum flexibility in rapid prototyping.”

“This Sly Fox team was one of the best teams I have ever worked on, and as an ensemble musician throughout most of my life, I’ve worked in group settings quite often,” said Jordan Lieberman, NSWCDD physicist. “I’ve gained valuable experience in presenting and answering tough technical questions, skills that will be useful for the remainder of my career. The hardest part of this mission was developing requirements, concepts, and early designs for a product in a scientific field I had no previous experience in. I relied heavily on the knowledge and expertise of our mentors and on the members of the team with relevant experience.”

The benefit of transitioning technical, project management and leadership knowledge to junior engineers and scientists across organizations is reflected in the careers of Sly Fox Mission members since the first Sly Fox Mission was launched in 2002. The inaugural team successfully developed the Passive Anti-Ship

Missile Detection System within the designated six-month timeframe and confirmed the Sly Fox program was an excellent way to develop leadership skills for young engineers and scientists.

“Each and every one of the outcomes from the Sly Fox teams is nothing short of impressive,” said Sisson. “The Mission 21 team is certainly no exception. Having had the opportunity to see them in action, I was extremely impressed with the level of professionalism with which the

team conducted their mission and excited to see the technical prowess that they collectively demonstrated. I am a huge fan of the Sly Fox Program and feel that the Sly Fox missions are absolutely critical to our workforce development efforts.”

DoD and government officials attending the demonstration represented commands and agencies that included the Chemical Biological Incident Response Force, Joint Program Executive Office for Chemical and Biological Defense, Marine Corps Systems Command, Marine Corps Forces Command, Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Nuclear, Chemical, and Biological Defense Programs, Defense Threat Reduction Agency, Naval Research Laboratory, Pentagon Force Protection Agency, U.S. Coast Guard, Naval Sea Systems Command, and the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations.

The Sly Fox program is an NSWCDD Naval Innovative Science and Engineering (section 219) funded rapid prototyping program intended to develop the science and engineering workforce while applying their talents to known technology gaps. Like the previous 20 missions — including efforts in directed energy, radar systems, unmanned systems, and cyber threats — Sly Fox Mission 21 took advantage of the diverse skills of its team members to tackle a mission that is important to NSWCDD and its customers.

As the mission concludes on June 30, team members will depart with new technical experiences, unique perspectives on rapid development, and a network of professional colleagues from across the command that will guide them in their current positions and throughout their careers.

here," Plumadore said, "but this little annex has been both directly and indirectly integrated into many of the most important and transformational military events experienced by the United States."

The EOD elements of the NSWC IHEODTD can trace their origin back to the earliest days of World War II when the U.S. Navy recognized the need for a capability to counter emerging threats from advanced and more complex weapons systems being deployed by other nations.

Retired EOD Officer and Paralympian, Brad Snyder, served as special guest speaker for the ceremony. As an EOD Officer, Snyder deployed in the Spring of 2011 to Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. After six months of assault operations, Brad was severely injured Sept. 7, 2011, when he functioned an improvised explosive device (IED) that was buried in the ground.

Snyder sustained complete vision loss as a result of his injury, but did not suffer any other lasting wounds. As a part of his rehabilitation process he turned to swimming. After a few short months of training was able to earn a spot on the U.S. Paralympic
