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Operation Supply Drop Visits NSF Dahlgren Liberty

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NSWC Dahlgren Division Wins Award for Service Disabled Veteran Owned Small Business Contracts

What does a film broadcast by the British Broadcasting Corporation have in common with the success of programs sponsored by the Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) Small Business Office?

Kris Parker, NSWCDD deputy for small business – who won a Department of the Navy (DON) Office of Small Business Programs award in May 2017 – wrote the answer on the top of a white board in his office.

It's a quote from Matthew Vaughn's film "Layer Cake," spoken by Sir Michael Gambon: "The art of good business is being a good middleman."

"The movie wasn't about the Federal Small Business Program, but I thought the quote was fitting to the fundamental purpose of the office," said Parker, recounting the 2004 motion picture he saw via BBC. "We facilitate opportunities for small business and identify companies to support those opportunities." As a good middleman, Parker is adept at connecting small business owners and executives with opportunities they can parlay into success stories, and

he enjoys it. An important success story in fiscal year 2016 was the command's ability to award contracts to the tune of three percent, or more, of total contracted dollars

Emily Harman, director DON Office of Small Business Programs, congratulated NSWC Dahlgren Division for its first-time achievement of this statutory small business goal – three percent of total contracted dollars to service disabled veteran owned small businesses.

"Through your efforts, you have demonstrated the essence of our mission to promote acquisition opportunities where small business can best support the needs of our Sailors and Marines," said Harman in her letter to NSWCDD Commanding Officer Capt. Godfrey Weekes, who presented the award to Parker. "I am confident that you will be able to maintain this level of success."

Each year, the DON Office of Small Business Programs awards the Statutory Goal Achievement Award for initial achievement of a specific sub-category of Small Business.

"This is a command award, and could not have been realized without the continued leadership of NSWC Dahlgren with support from contracts and the technical departments," said Parker.

The efforts of NSWCDD leaders in creating a climate to advance small business opportunities through various small business programs and initiatives have maximized opportunities for interested small businesses, resulting in a whopping increase of more than 58 percent in the command's small business obligations between fiscal years 2012 and 2016. Moreover, the NSWCDD acquisition and small

International Partner Visits Dahlgren Training Command

The Royal Australian Navy's (RAN) Commodore Training (COMTRAIN) visited the Center for Surface Combat Systems (CSCS) and one of its learning sites, AEGIS Training and Readiness Center (ATRC), co-located onboard Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP), Jul. 5.

Commodore Justin Jones is responsible for all of RAN training. He visited CSCS and ATRC, accompanied by Commodore Peter Leavy, the Naval Attaché to the United States, to discuss AEGIS baseline 9C training, U.S. Navy training initiatives and to see firsthand how the U.S. Navy is training the RAN Sailors manning the new Hobart class of air warfare destroyers (AWD), which are equipped with the AEGIS combat system.

ATRC Commanding Officer Capt.

Pete Galluch and CSCS Executive Officer Cmdr. Chris Simmons welcomed Jones and provided him command overviews, a brief tour of the schoolhouse, and training demonstrations.

"Commodore Jones observed a blended learning solution that includes standard classrooms, hands-on labs, simulations, as well as computer-based and interactive courseware training," Galluch explained. "He was able to see how we have been helping his Sailors implement and execute AE-GIS since the beginning of 2014."

Jones, who was appointed his current role in Nov. 2016, enjoyed his time in Dahlgren.

"I was impressed with the quality of training Sailors receive to effectively operate the AWD's AEGIS combat system," Jones said. "I also appreciated meeting with leadership to reempha-

The South Potomac Pilot This Week in Navy History

July 14, 1955 — The first flight of jet-propelled Martin P6M seaplane is completed at Baltimore, Md.

July 15, 1942 — USS Terror (CM 5), the first minelayer built as such, is commissioned. During World War II she participates in Operation Torch, the Battle for Iwo Jima, and the Okinawa Invasion, where she is struck by a kamikaze on May 1, 1945.

July 16, 1915 — The first Navy ships, the battleships USS Ohio (BB 12), USS Missouri (BB 11), and USS Wisconsin (BB 9) transit the Panama Canal, steaming from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

July 17, 1975 — U.S. Apollo (Apollo 18) and Soviet Soyuz (Soyuz 19) spacecraft dock in space, making the first manned space flight conducted jointly by the two nations. The Apollo craft remains for nine days, one hour, and approximately 28 minutes. USS New Orleans (LPH 11) later recovers the Apollo craft.

July 18, 1792 — Continental Navy Capt. John Paul Jones dies in Paris, France. A legend during the American Revolution, Jones argues for Congress establishing a United States Navy. When it fails to do so, the unemployed captain found work as a rear admiral in the Russian navy for a couple of years but eventually returns to France, where he dies. More than a century later, his body is discovered, exhumed, brought back to the United States under huge fanfare and reburied in a magnificent sarcophagus at the United States Naval Academy.

July 19, 1940 — President Franklin D. Roosevelt signs the second Naval Expansion Act.

July 20, 1969 — Former Navy pilot Neil Armstrong is the first man to set foot on the moon, saying, "That's one small step for (a) man, one giant leap for mankind." Armstrong is Commander of Apollo 11, which during its 8-day mission lands on the Sea of Tranquility. Michael Collins is the Command Module Pilot and Edwin Buzz E. Aldrin Jr. is the Lunar Module Pilot.

How Does a Turtle Cross the Road?

Very carefully. At this time of year, the number of critter casualties of the road are much higher than normal and no matter how much drivers would like to avoid the fatalities, it is inevitable. However, tips from the Department of Defense (DoD) Partners in Amphibian and Reptile Conservation's (PARC) might help aid drivers in assisting turtles in their migrations. According to PARC, encounters with vehicles on roadways can be a significant source of mortality for many species of aquatic and terrestrial turtles. Turtles may cross roads to move between sources of water, to search for locations to lay eggs and to search for breeding partners. Helping turtles cross roads is a legitimate conservation measure but should only be done when you do not put yourself or others at risk.

• Only assist if a turtle is in imminent danger of traffic and it is safe to move it. Be aware of traffic or other hazards.

• Pick up the turtle firmly with both hands across the middle of its body. DO NOT pick a turtle up by the tail.

• Place the turtle across the road in the direction it was heading. A turtle will attempt to make the crossing again if you put it back where it began.

• Turtles may bite, scratch, or defecate when handled. Be careful as some species such as snapping turtles and softshell turtles may turn their heads completely to the side to bite.



• If available use a broom, shovel, or large stick to encourage turtles that are too dangerous to handle to move out of the roadway.

• Resist the urge to move the turtle to an "appropriate area" for release. Many turtles have home ranges with burrows and other features that they need for survival. Moving them out of their home range could result in their death from predators, exposure, or other factors.

Most DOD installations have an Environmental Branch or Natural Resources Section that can provide more information about turtle conservation or how to handle turtle encounters. Operation Supply Drop Reaches Next Generation of Service Members

In response to a friend downrange, an Army veteran sent a care package in 2010 containing video games in an effort to provide something other than the typical care package with baby wipes, socks and chapstick. That first supply drop, codename "Firestarter," delivered Call of Duty, Guitar Hero and DJ Hero to forward-deployed troops in Iraq; from there, a mission and Operation Supply Drop (OSD) was born.

That mission has grown significantly and by 2017, the organization has benefited more than 400,000 service members, veterans and family members, as well as NATO-partnered military members

On July 7, Sailors at the Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren Liberty Center were pleased to be a part of the program with a delivery of more than \$5,000 worth of video games, Microsoft Xbox systems, Starbucks gifts and cards. The "drop" also delivered board and card games, including the highly sought after "Disgruntled Decks," a Cards Against Humanity-type game geared towards service members. A number of Sailors were on hand to enjoy the games and snacks provided by Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) Morale Welfare and Recreation (MWR).

Stacey Scarabello, MWR marketing manager, was instrumental in bringing Operation Supply Drop aboard NSF Dahlgren.

"There was no better fit in my mind than to have them come directly to our Liberty Center and see where our Sailors spend their time playing games and watching movies while having a bite to eat and socializing with friends after their shift. The great thing about the team at OSD is that they are a mix of veterans, service members, spouses and civilians who are giving back to the military community and can relate to the interests and activities of our active duty service members stationed at NSF Dahlgren. Although the logistics and event were done in a short amount of time, OSD left behind supplies that will leave a positive impact on the Liberty Center long-term," Scarabello said.

Air Force Staff Sergeants Scott Delphia and P.J. Steblen, volunteers from OSD, arrived from Langley Air Force Base, in Hampton, Va. to present the donations to the Liberty Center. Delphia was introduced to the organization following his tour of duty in Afghanistan in 2014. The

troops previously assigned in his area of connected with fellow service members responsibility had left their X-Box game system and one game behind when they returned stateside; Delphia remembered how tough it was trying to get new gear to share and how he wanted to be able to pay it forward. On his return home, he sought ways to create a program with the same mission and it was through that process that Delphia discovered the OSD program and began volunteering. One of the factors that Delphia appreciates most about the organization is that they are providing donations of items that most young service members can enjoy.

"We truly provide the most generationally-relatable support to our servicemembers," Delphia explained.

Operation Supply Drop not only provides entertainment for troops downrange but also provides services such as mentoring through their Heroic Forces program. Heroic Forces programs provide necessary skills and direction to veterans with an emphasis on small groups and networking. The organization works closely with local and regional companies and service organizations to provide a resource for veterans who need to transition into the civilian workforce.

Games to Grunts, launched in partnership with GovX, provides Xbox, Playstation, Mobile, VR and PC video games to active-military, veterans and their families.

According to the OSD website, the "healing power of gaming" is something many military members understand. They state that gaming provided distraction, unit cohesion and built camaraderie downrange; it also allowed troops to stay

and friends after returning stateside.

In addition to Games to Grunts and Heroic Forces, OSD provides relief to some of the most hard-hit veterans those who require medical assistance when they have left the field. The OSD program "Respawn" provides medically acceptable therapy through gaming, technology and innovation. OSD has been able to provide support to individual veterans, military medical facilities and Warrior Transition Battalions. According to their website, gaming is proven to positively impact recovery and directly help with cognitive processing, balance, range of motion, psychosocial interaction and overall well-being.

On hand at the presentation at the Liberty Center were Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) Commanding Officer Capt. Michael "Moe" O'Leary and Command Master Chief Jacob Bristow.

"Part of our job is to be invested in the quality of life for our Sailors," Bristow said. "To have people within the community, as well as military, invest in that for our people is good. It allows our people to see that we care about them not only during working hours but after hours as well."

O'Leary added his appreciation to the organization as well for their donations and service.

"Thank you to Operation Supply Drop for supporting our sponsored activity on base and for supporting our active duty Sailors, Airmen and Marines at NSASP."

business best practices promote the use of sources sought requests and industry days for competitive procurements in excess of the \$150,000 simplified acquisition threshold. These events are preceded by announcements of the effort and event, demonstrating the commitment of NSWCDD leadership to a robust acquisition process that includes appropriate opportunities for Small Businesses.

"The standard agenda for our industry days includes an overview of the technical department sponsoring the work, a detailed breakdown of the work in question and an opportunity to learn first-hand how industry may be able to provide support," said Parker. "These unique events are consistently well attended and facilitate competition and the introduction of new companies into our market. In fiscal year 2016, four new small businesses who participated in one of these industry day events successfully won prime awards at NSWCDD."

Additional NSWCDD outreach initiatives include face-to-face meetings and counseling sessions between Parker and small and large business entities – about 80 sessions per year, increasing the awareness of Small Business opportunities at NSWCDD, the Navy and Department of Defense at large. Annual internal small business training is also provided for all contracts personnel.

size the USN and RAN's growing partnership."

CSCS' international training is coordinated through the command's Security Assistance and International Programs directorate. Their mission is to provide allied forces quality training to enable them to develop ready teams capable of operations that maintain and expertly employ surface combatants.

CSCS International Programs Director Dr. Darrell Tatro and CSCS International Programs Training Technology and Tools Mr. Lloyd Kleinman briefed Jones on CSCS' current technology initiatives, including the Synthetic Combat Operator Trainer (SCOT), a personal computer (PC) based trainer used to train AEGIS operators for the U.S. Navy and military members from partner nations and Visual Interactive Simulated Training Application (VISTA), a PC-based real-time simulation of ship board equipment used to train maintenance operators for the U.S. Navy and military members from partner nations.

"We demonstrated how we are currently

training U.S. and RAN Sailors, training tools we have exported to Australia, and future development initiatives that are forthcoming between our two nations," Tatro explained. "We share a special partnership with the Royal Australian Navy and we will continue to focus on facilitating an exchange of ideas, information and training material as we progress with the AWD program."



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
