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New Chief Petty Officers Pinned at Dahlgren

Twelve new chief petty officers were pinned during a Sept. 15 ceremony at the Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren Parade Field. Family and friends gathered to celebrate the momentous occasion as their Sailors pinned on their anchors, received their combination covers and were piped aboard the Chiefs Mess. The ceremony followed eight weeks of rigorous preparation that they received in Chief Petty Officer (CPO) 365 Phase II training.

Master Chief Fire Controlman Shawn Harrell, senior enlisted leader of the Center for Surface Combat Systems (CSCS) and the ceremony's emcee, welcomed guests, advising them that they were not merely present for the advancement of the first class petty officers to the next rank, but to share in the most significant transition they will make in their Navy careers.

"Today, you will witness a ceremony where those recently selected to the rank of petty officer will be pinned with the insignia of their new rank," Harrell said. "This ceremony is the culmination of the weeks of training and hard work of those standing before you now."

Harrell shared with the selectees the depth of experience and expectation that each will face as they enter into the next phase of their Naval careers.

"The chief is charged with motivating Sailors," Harrell said. "It's the chief's job to create an atmosphere where that motivation is encouraged and rewarded. That motivation must come from within and it's the chief's job to figure out how to get it out. It's the chief's job to train and develop subordinates into leaders"

One of the most important and challenging tasks that a chief will face, Harrell explained, is to educate and guide junior officers.

"Junior officers are those whose trainings have been extensive on the technicalities of war but slight on the realities of deckplate leadership," Harrell said.

"It has often been said that the officers run the Navy but the chiefs make the Navy run," Harrell said. "Every commanding officer remembers their first chief. Every commanding officer was at one time that junior officer. Never forget that. Never forget the impression that you make on that young naval officer will follow

AEGIS Training and Readiness Center Changes Leadership

During a change of command ceremony at the AEGIS Training and Readiness Center (ATRC), on board Naval Support Facility Dahlgren, Va., Capt. Pete Galluch turned over command to Capt. Dave Zook September 13.

Capt. Frank X. Castellano, commanding officer for the Center for Surface Combat Systems (CSCS), was the guest speaker at the event.

"Under Pete's leadership, ATRC has not only thrived but excelled," said Castellano. "He and his staff trained more than 2400 Aegis Fire Controlmen, 1700 future surface department heads, and 500 prospective commanding and executive officer students. He created a 24 hour overlapping five-shift schedule and increased FC student throughput by 25 percent. In addition, Pete and his team were instrumental in opening the new ATRC wing, an important asset for the fleet and our country, and bringing the training community together to celebrate 30 years of AEGIS on October 21, 2015."

Galluch explained that he had several choices where he could assume command in 2014.

"But ATRC was really the only choice for me," he said. "ATRC is arguably the premier training facility in the Surface Force. It is directly connected to the fleet in the most critical ways. This schoolhouse is the foundation of the Surface Force's Integrated Air and Missile Defense readiness."

Galluch was presented his second

Legion of Merit for many of his accomplishments at ATRC. Part of the award citation extoled the captain as, "the driving force in Navy Integrated Air and Missile Defense improvement by leading stakeholders to improve and advance Integrated Air and Missile Defense initiatives across the Fleet: through his drive and inspiration, he personally moved his staff beyond outdated business practices by establishing procedural compliance standards; and he and his supply team systematically tracked thousands of AEGIS parts, returning parts valued more than 53 million dollars to the Navy Supply System."

Castellano also commented on the future of ATRC under new leadership.

"Captain Zook has not traveled far," said Castellano. "Most recently, he served as the deputy for the Naval Surface and Mine Warfighting Development Center Detachment Dahlgren, right across the street from us. As deputy, he helped deliver the critical lessons learned from combat operations in the Red Sea to the fleet and led the devel-

them throughout their Naval careers. One day that junior officer may be your commanding officer."


Harrell encouraged the Chiefs' Mess to be courageous and to challenge those occurrences that they know to be wrong.

"Show courage, pick your battles wisely," he said. "You will never have all the answers, but you will never solve problems if you don't try. Rely on your fellow chiefs for guidance and remember — documentation beats conversation. A good chief does not earn his anchors once, but daily."

Sharing words of advice regarding leadership, Harrell encouraged those who were about to step into this new chapter of their career to commit themselves to being a true leader.

"If you're in charge... take charge and remember who you are," he said. "You are about to join the rank of the chief petty officer and those who went before you. Wear your anchors with pride."

With Harrell's remarks concluded, Chief Cryptologic Techni-

cian (Technical) Joshua Schroder gave a reading on the meaning of the fouled anchor, the CPO insignia, and CPO Chief's creed was read by Senior Chief Hospitalman April Harrision.

The selectees were then called front and center to receive their

anchors, assisted by family and friends, and a mentor chief presented their combination cover. In the Navy's time-honored tradition, each new chief was piped aboard and welcomed to the ranks.

opment and fielding of tools and tactical guidance to address critical Combat Identification interoperability, advanced Ballistic Missile Defense Capability training and employment, and Naval Integrated Fire Control employment. Zook said he is honored to become part of the AEGIS community.

End of an Era — Generators Depart NSF Dahlgren

For more than two decades, generators — set in place and leased from the Seabee's Mobile Utilities Support Equipment (MUSE) unit — have weathered the elements around Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren and supported missions. These critical machines withstood numerous weather events, including run-ins with hurricanes named Irene, Sandy and Isabel. Throughout it all, NAVFAC Public Works Department (PWD) employees maintained and operated these workhorses.

In November of 2016, a number of the 2.5 megawatt generators were taken offline at Dahlgren. Since the end of August, staff from PWD along with Construction Mechanic 1st Class Joe Gugala, Construction Electrician 1st Class Luke Clemens, Construction Mechanic First Class Jeremy Tatlock and Construction Mechanic Second Class Andres Henriquez Seabees with MUSE, based in Port Hueneme, California, have been coordinating efforts to get one of the generators back to California. The generators, located at Substation Number 10, (across from Building 1470), will then be completely renovated and the unit will find a new life providing stable power elsewhere.

Gugala has worked closely with the employees of PWD to ensure that the generator at Substation Number 10 was ready to travel and praised the work ethic of the PWD staff.

"Roland 'Wendil' Crowley, Joseph 'Gene' Jackson and Ralph Spillman have been here for decades, and they are real hard-chargers," Gugala said. "The best part about them is their knowledge; it's truly invaluable."

Gugala explained that if asked, the gentlemen could trace back an entire electric line from memory and explain when and how it was installed; their expertise and knowledge were invaluable in ensuring a safe removal of the generator.

The three gentlemen have been a part of the Dahlgren family for 44, 37 and 31 years respectively. Throughout the life cycle of the generators on base, it has been their responsibility to ensure that the locomotive-sized engines were in top running order and ready to fire.

On Sept. 14, the 25-ton generator and its radiator (the length of a dump truck) along with the control skid and a muffler that is more than 8 feet long and 24 inches around were loaded with a 110-foot tall crane over the course of two days to be trucked across the country. The trip was a coordinated effort of a flag vehicle company from Oklahoma, a truck driver from Tennessee, a contractor from Georgia, Dahlgren PWD personnel and Gugala, and will take roughly a week.

Once aboard Port Hueneme, the generator will undergo a complete overhaul. The generator began its service life in the late 1950s and every 20 years or so it is completely rebuilt.

"This unit — even though it's [the engine block] from the 50s — we're going to send it out to be rebuilt," Gugala said. "We'll have it all refitted — new power packs, all new electronics, muffler — and update it from its last retrofit in the 90s."

Due to the increase in demand for electricity in and around the base, in 2011 Dominion

Virginia Power began a project to provide additional power supply to support the area in King George County. The base and its surrounding area had exceeded the capacities of distribution and in 2014, a new transmission line and substation near NSF Dahlgren was completed.

Before that new line, power on the base and surrounding area was fickle, so much so that Utility Branch Head for Public Works Mark Murphy recalls that his team spent days on base, braving the weather and running the generators during 24-hour operations.

"We were at the end of the line [for power], so they brought these [generators] back around 1996," Murphy recalls. "If there was a storm coming, we'd actually stand by and turn these on ahead of the storm because we'd know we were going to lose power. All the hurricanes I can recall, we were here."

Murphy remembers just how crucial the generators were to maintaining an operational base prior to 2014, noting that many times he and his team would spend up to five non-stop days ensuring that the machines were running properly. However, with the new node in place, electricity became a much more stable utility, rendering the generators less useful to the base.

"Since the new DVP station has been in place, we've only had two hours and 41 minutes [cumulative] of power outages without the switch. Before that we'd have 20 major outages a year that spanned days," Murphy said.

For Murphy and the other PWD employees, bidding farewell to the units will be bittersweet. Many hours were spent ensuring that the equipment was maintained and functional. Taking them offline marks the end of an era

"It's a mixed blessing," Murphy said. "It's good that we don't need them anymore, but then again, once they're gone, people won't understand the history or what we did."

Murphy noted that during hurricane Isabel in 2003, Dahlgren was the only location with power for more than five days from Alexandria through the Northern Neck because of the massive generators and it was Public Works' job to keep the engines running. The generators, essentially 20-cylinder locomotive diesel-driven engines, are the same kind that are deployed to forward operating bases around the world.

"They like to run. The more load you put on them [the generators], the harder they work and the more they like it," Murphy said.

The remaining generators are scheduled to be removed from NSF Dahlgren and returned to California, where they will also be renovated and returned to duty.

Once the unit was shipped out and the termination inspection was complete, the MUSE technicians returned to Port Hueneme and are preparing to deploy again to locations worldwide to support the Department of Defense (DOD) with their advanced training, skills and critical experience.
