## Hurricane Harvey relief leaves Hunter

With the flooding of Southern Eastern Texas and the President of the United States announcing a state of emergency the U.S. Army and other agencies are

coming to the aide of the victims of Hurricane Harvey.

Company C, 63rd Expeditionary Signal Battalion, 35th Theater Tactical Signal Brigade has been training for this very situation, to deploy a comprehensive equipping strategy to

meet critical requirements for equipment and manpower to answer the nations call and render aide for those in need during this natural disaster.

"In the last month we have trained for this and many other scenarios," said Capt. Alyca

Waldrop, C Company, 63rd ESB, commander. "We are trained and ready to help in any way we can. An Emergency Deployment Readiness Exercise is designed to exercise the movement plans of a unit to deploy with little time to prepare.

## Fort Stewart hosts antiterrorism course

The instructors and course material came from a mobilized training team headquartered at the home of the United States Army Military Police School in Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. The course took place during the U.S. Army's eighth annual observance of Antiterrorism Awareness Month.

In accordance with Army Regulation 350-1, Army Training and Leader Development, all Soldiers and Department of the Army Civilians are required to participate in level I antiterrorism training. However, AT level II dives significantly deeper.

"It's a risk management process to mitigate threats against Army assets," said Stacy Howell, antiterrorism instructor. "Basic

level I encourages awareness that there are threats out there. AT level II certifies personnel to be considered antiterrorism officers for their battalion or above units."

Antiterrorism officers, or ATOs, are charged with the responsibility to protect the commander's assets - including but not limited to personnel, equipment and mission essential vulnerable areas.

"That person's sole purpose is to create a risk management plan to protect their commander's individual resources and MEVAs (mission essential vulnerable area) that help them conduct their missions such as dining facilities, clinics, motor pools, arms rooms or even barracks," said Howell.

Another major subject area that was covered in the course was active shooter response training.

## Guest speaker highlights women's equality

The Fort Stewart, Georgia, community paid tribute to women and their achievements throughout history during the 3rd Infantry Division Women's Equality Day observance Aug. 23 at Club Stewart.

"For being the year 2017 and still having to use the phrases of, 'the first female commander,' or 'the first female Ranger School graduates,' tells people how important and prevalent Women's Equality Day still is," said Sgt. 1st Class Shaun Williamson, equal opportunity advisor, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Inf. Div.

Williamson said the observance served to educate people on women's equality and bring light to unknown strides made for and by women throughout history.

The observance recognizing Women's Equality Day was established by Joint Resolution of Congress in 1971. The day is observed on the 26th day of August and commemorates the 1920 passage of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, which gave women the right to vote. Fort Stewart, Georgia, recognized the day on the 23rd in order to maximize the impact of the observance on post.

The observance has grown to include focusing attention on women's continued efforts toward gaining full equality.

Lt. Gen. Laura Richardson, U.S. Army Forces Command deputy commanding general, guest speaker at the observance, spoke to the Soldiers and community members about the impact two milestones for women throughout history have had on her career.

The first milestone she discussed as important to her as an Army helicopter pilot was the formation during World War II of the Women Airforce Service Pilots, due to the shortage of pilots at that time. She said although the WASPs donned military uniforms and performed military pilot duties, they did not have a military status when they returned home, but instead gained the status in 1977 – 35 years later.

Richardson said she was working with the United States Senate in 2010 and was in attendance when the WASPs were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal.

She said the branch insignia that the WASPs wore is the aviation branch insignia that the Army has today.

"It was just incredible to see that we had a whole generation of folks who had spearheaded this equality back in World War II," Richardson said.

Richardson said she started flying at the age of 15 and obtained her private pilot license at 16. She said she made about all the mistakes a new pilot can make during that time.

"By the time I went to ROTC, was in college and I graduated, I think I kind of made it easy for the Army to choose me as an Army aviator," Richardson said, noting that September marks 31 years for her as an Army aviator.

The second instance Richardson highlighted was Title IX in 1972, which prohibited any educational program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance from excluding persons based on sex.

Richardson said that since athletic programs are considered educational programs, within Title IX, females could participate in sports and receive athletic scholarships.

After being exposed to several different sports, Richardson took on swimming. She was a high school and a college state champion and achieved all-American.

"What I didn't realize is at the time that I was in high school, in 1979, there were girls' sports – I had no clue that just seven years earlier, there weren't girls' sports in high school, in college," she said. "I just thought that that was the way it always was."

Richardson said she is a firm believer that growing up in sports her entire life before joining the Army was a huge benefit to her as a Soldier.

"As I've talked about and shared with you some of the impacts of history on my life, I know that I certainly wouldn't be here in this capacity without the changes that really started back in 1920," Richardson said.

The leaders she had along the way to mentor and coach her in the Army were actually all men, she said, noting that there weren't as many women in the Army then as there are today.

"As professionals in the Army, it doesn't matter if you're a male or a female coach or mentor; we are professionals and we have the responsibility to train, coach and mentor all of our Soldiers," Richardson said.

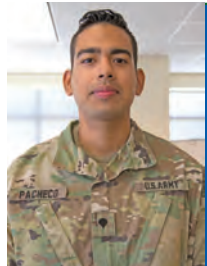

"All deployable units normally participate in an EDRE annually. If executed realistically, an EDRE can be the most valuable evaluation process for commanders to determine their strengths and weaknesses in a deployment. Having recently completed this training we knew exactly our shortfalls and how to adapt and overcome them. I'm humbled to be their commander and i'm glad my Soldiers will have a direct impact on bringing relief to the people of Texas," Waldrop said.

When the Soldiers get to their destination they are expected to hit the ground running, breaking into three teams providing both secure and unclassified networks to various agencies who need them to assist with relief efforts. In addition to communications support teams we are sending a maintenance support team to keep them running after that it's business as usual helping where they can and giving the support they're most notably known for communication.

"I can't emphasize how much they love what they do and they're the absolute best at what they do," Lt. Col. Indira Donegan, 63rd ESB, commander. "When it comes to providing network support and signal communications, so for us this is game time, time for us to show our skills. You can't make a better place for us to do this than in our own backyard helping fellow Americans during their time of need."

The role of U.S. Armed Forces during any humanitarian assistance event is to rapidly respond with support to help mitigate human suffering and prevent further loss of life.

"We have four Soldiers that just left this morning from the areas affected by Hurricane Harvey, they still have families there so this is personal to them, they're ready to help, they want to help and we will do our absolute best to provide whatever support possible to help." said Donegan. "We'll be there until the requirement of support isn't necessary anymore. We have a bunch of different signal and communication assemblages, but for this mission we are sending a smaller package which is very expeditious and easy to maneuver and brings a very able capability for agencies on the move."

The issues with tropical storms and hurricanes is the effects after the initial storm, the national weather agency is calling for another 25 inches of rain on top of the flooding levels of rain already brought to areas on the Texas coast. Agencies helping and those that are sending help will be crucial in the stabilization and relief needed to bring normality back to the cities devastated by this hurricane.

The OCR World Championship brings together athletes from all walks of life.

The event started off as an annual national event where athletes could test themselves on a world-class course against the best competitors in the country.

"I love the OCR Community and what it stands for," said Pinero. "The community itself is like a family, and since I get to represent Puerto Rico, it makes it all worth it."

Pinero said OCR is a place

As the event gets closer, Pinero plans to increase his caloric intake to 5000 calories by eating tons of carbs.

Competitors who win individual events will be rewarded medals, and the top three men and women in both the 3k and 15k events will win a cash prize.

"I hope to bring home a win," he said.

# Working Dogs Tackle Threats

Soldiers with the 93rd Military Working Dog Detachment, 385th Military Police Battalion on Fort Stewart conducted a health and welfare briefing for the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade leadership Aug. 28. The handlers took the commanders through the process of requesting an inspection with the detachment and ended the day with a controlled aggression demonstration.

We are reminded of how important our military police to maintaining the safety of the post. The military working dog handlers train constantly with their dogs to ensure that our base is protected from any threats.

The MWD's are used for patrol and apprehension and are able to seek out explosives and narcotics. The kennels at Fort Stewart currently house a total of 13 MWD's who all work with the various handlers to protect the post.

Their intense training is not to be trifled with. To display the skills of the

handlers and their dogs, they allowed the commanders to participate in the controlled aggression demonstration.

Capt. Lucas Chase, the 632nd Support Maintenance Company commander, 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Inf. Div. Sust. Bde., dressed up in a protective suit and was taken down by Laco, a military working dog, as part of the demonstration.

"The dog caught me off guard and it hit me harder than I expected," said Chase. "The handlers are professional and serious about their job."

The handlers train the dogs in scenarios to prepare for when they are on the road or in a deployed environment. They routinely do health and welfare checks of the buildings on post to maintain a safe environment.

"Demos allow Soldiers to see leader's participation and it boosts moral in regards to the demos," said Spc. Nathan Lei, a military working dog handler in the 93rd MWD Det. "They are the live witness to the dogs power and show that the dogs are the real deal."

# JAG attorneys train to better help the retiree community

Civilian attorneys taught members of Fort Stewart's Judge Advocate General team laws aimed towards our retiree community here, August 14-15.

Civilian attorneys as far as Arizona, Oklahoma, Texas, South Carolina, Florida and Georgia came together to teach a two day seminar to JAG personnel assigned to Fort Stewart.

This unique event was a first for Fort Stewart's JAG office.

According to the Georgia Veteran Fact Book, there are 765,289 veterans in the state of Georgia. There are around 50,000 retirees in the Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield surrounding areas.

"Fort Stewart has one of the largest military retiree population in the country," said Capt. Elizabeth Strickland, Administrative Law Attorney. "The focus of this seminar is to teach JAG and Department of the

Army civilians here how to better help serve the retiree community."

Elder law is an area of legal practice that specializes on issues that affect the aging population. The purpose of elder law planning is to prepare the elderly person for financial freedom and autonomy through proper financial planning and long-term care options

The seminar included five civilian experts in elder law, which included Professor Rebecca Morgan who took the main lead in making sure the JAG attorneys understood and are capable to help retirees.

The main objective was to teach JAG attorneys how to help retirees with estate planning, long term care and the end of life decisions such as drafting wills.

Another key point taught to the JAG attorneys was how to help retirees with exploitations by scams and elder abuse.

"Abuse, neglect and exploitations is a huge problem, a rising problem, as well as a hidden problem," said Robert Fleming, an Elder Law Attorney from Arizona.

"The most common type of neglect is self-neglect," he said.

According to studies done by the National Center on Elder Abuse out of 500,000 people 60 years of age and older, only 16 percent referred help, while 84 percent left the issue of abuse hidden.

The seminar was designed to familiarize the JAG and DA civilians with cases and issues that affect the retiree community so they would be aware and able to better assist them.

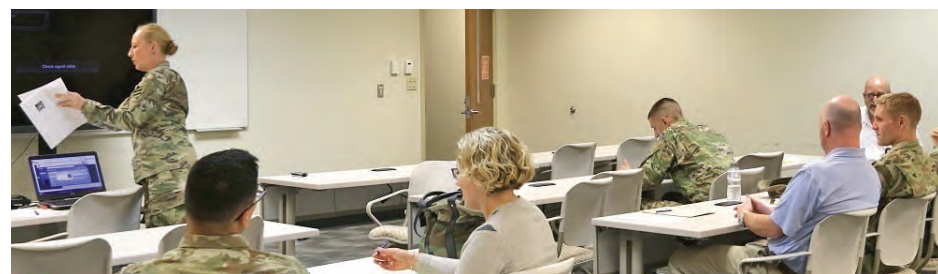
Mark Shalloway, an Elder Law Attorney from Florida, said, "When representing retirees you have to have their best interest. You must provide them with enough scope of the terms and conditions of what is going on, whether it is financially, designation of beneficiaries and real estate."

With this training that the JAG team and the DA Civilians received, they are now better prepared and equipped to assist veterans and retirees in the area of elder law.

## Ft. Stewart & Hunter Army Airfield Fire Department wants you to Stand by Your Plan

How often has the doorbell rung or a child interrupted you while you were cooking, causing you to forget about the chicken you left sizzling on the stove - until smoke filled the house?

If this scenario or a similar one sounds familiar to you, you may want to think about it a little more because it's likely that you, a friend or family member has run the risk of having a dangerous fire. As prevention chief of the Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield Fire Department, I often talk to people about the ways they can stay safe in their homes. Too often, we have that talk after they've suffered a damaging fire.

It's my hope that people reading this article won't have to learn the hard way. If I could give just one fire warning, I'd say, "Keep an eye on what you fry!"

According to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association cooking is the leading cause of home fires, the latest statistics from NFPA say U.S. Fire Departments responded to an estimated annual average of 156,600 cooking-related fires from

2012 to 2017.

We're joining forces with NFPA and thousands of other fire departments across North America to commemorate Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 8-14 "Every second counts; plan two ways out." The theme reminds us the importance of every second in a fire situation.

Often when we're called to a cooking-related fire, the residents tell us they only left the kitchen for a few minutes. Sadly, that's all it takes for a dangerous fire to start. The bottom line is that there's really no safe period of time for the cook to step away from a hot stove. A few key points to remember:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you must leave the room even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- When you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, stay in the home, and use a timer to remind you.
- Keep cooking areas clean and clear of combustibles (e.g. potholders, towels, rags, drapes and food packaging).
- Keep children away from cooking areas by enforcing a "kid-free zone" of three feet around

the stove.

- If you have a fire in your microwave, turn it off immediately and keep the door closed. Never open the door until the fire is completely out. If in doubt, get out of the home and call the fire department
  - Always keep an oven mitt and a lid nearby. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan (make sure you are wearing the oven mitt). Turn off the burner. Do not move the pan. To keep the fire from restarting, do not remove the lid until it is completely cool. Never pour water on a grease fire. If the fire does not go out, get out of the home and call the fire department.
  - If an oven fire starts, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. If the fire does not go out, get out of the home and call the fire department.
- A cooking fire can quickly turn deadly. I have seen too many homes destroyed and people killed or injured by fires that could have been easily avoided. Please heed these simple safety rules. We firefighters would like to be in your kitchen, but only when you invite us for dinner!

## 3rd ID mail support delivers

Many people find going to the post office a draining and daunting experience. The pace is slow, the lines are long and the clerks are seemingly unhappy. Nope, there's just nothing exciting or sexy about mail. That is if you're stateside. While deployed, mail is the hottest thing going and nobody cares if the pace is slow, the line is long, or even if the busy mailroom clerks don't greet you with a smile.

"At home I go to the post office maybe once every few months," said Sgt. Maj. Oubrinyahn Stonewall, the non-commissioned officer in charge of the USFOR-A and JTF-3 personnel department. "It's like going to the DMV, not enough employees manning the counter."

Not having enough "employees" manning the counter is not a problem here at the USFOR-A mailroom. Each section is required to have at least one person trained to conduct mailroom activities in order help the clerks handle and maintain over 400 pieces of mail per day.

"We serve all units that fall underneath the umbrella of the USAFOR-A," said 1st Sgt Romiel Alexandre, the Headquarter, Headquarter Company First Sergeant for USFOR-A and JTF-3.

Those addition units are everyone from the Bosnian military unit here to the Defense Logistics Agency that is predominantly comprised of Civilian contractors, Alexandre added.

Who the mail is distributed to, however, is not a focus

of Pfc. Jeffrey Waldrop, the Non-commissioned Officer in Charge of the USFOR-A mailroom. Along with his direct mailroom helpers, Spc. Shaquille Wilson and Spc. Tristan Forrest, Waldrop - who is on his first deployment - takes the responsibility of accounting for everyone's letters and packages from home very seriously.

"I did not expect this much mail," Waldrop said about the amount of mail he picks up from the main Bagram Post Office each day. "But, it feels good knowing that I am boosting the morale of the Soldiers that are away from their families."

It's that moral boost that makes the mailroom so popular with Soldiers.

"Mail from [home] has historically always boosted morale," Alexandre explained. "Seeing that a loved one is thinking of you and taking the time to actually write a letter in this new age of technology... that contact means a lot."

The connection to home, is what Spc. Gabriel Guerrier, the G2 Fire Marshall for USFOR-A and JTF-3, who is also on his first deployment, says he noticed first about his fellow Soldiers and their excitement for inbound mail.

"I noticed that people stalk the mail deliveries," he said. "Once the mail person leaves to go bring mail to your designated section, the anxiety kicks up like its Christmas morning."

Christmas morning... what until Guerrier and Waldrop see the number of packages to come in then. A new USFOR-A mailroom will need to be constructed to house the increased number of letters and packages from home.

"Usually Soldiers are on-scene first in these particular situations, even before law enforcement," said Howell. "The active shooter material that we go over in the course include dos and don'ts, potential warning signs and prevention measures."

Staff Sgt. Andy W. Zeigler, another instructor for the course said unit ATOs are an integral aspect of the antiterrorism risk management process.

"We spend a day and a half extensively and thoroughly going into the antiterrorism risk management process," said Zeigler. "A lot of it parallels the composite risk management that leaders already implement. We have different tools and factors that come into play to identify to commanders where their antiterrorism risks lie."

1st Lt. Christopher J. Polo, Hunter Army

Airfield Garrison Headquarters and Headquarters Company and recent AT Level II grad, said he was highly impressed with the course and walked away with a plethora of knowledge and new-found awareness.

"The course highlighted a number of different approaches of employing physical security measures," said Polo. "I think a lot of time people think of AT awareness with an installation frame of mind, but really, these methods can be used in any setting and at any location."

The MTT is slated to return to Fort Stewart for another AT level II rotation in October. DA Civilians and Soldiers in the rank of staff sergeant and above are encouraged to submit packets through their chain of command.

## 396th Conducts First Sustainment Gunnery

Soldiers with the 396th Composite Transportation Company, 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade conducted a sustainment gunnery on Aug. 25 as part of the Pyramid Focus exercise on Fort Stewart. This was their qualifying event before their culminating convoy live-fire exercise in September.

The unit has been conducting gunnery operations, since Tuesday, to qualify on their weapons systems. They fired mounted .50 caliber Browning machine

guns and M240 machine guns. They utilized Common Remotely Operated Weapon Stations to engage various targets from simulated troops, vehicles, and moving targets.

Teams of four would roll out in their M-ATV's to a firing point and, with direction from the control tower, fire at the targets using the CROWS. The Soldiers relied on all elements of the team to successfully hit targets.

"It was rugged in the beginning," said Sgt. Alan Mitchell, a motor transport operator with the 396th CTC. "Now they are excelling in the vocals, in radioing to one another."

A gunnery takes place every six

months and the purpose is to train and validate the 396th CTC teams to be able to provide convoy security, area defense and personal security details in all operational environments.

The Pyramid Focus exercise takes place every year as the culminating training exercise. This year, the company added the gunnery and a range.

"This is the first time a sustainment gunnery has taken place on Fort Stewart," said 1st Lt. Nadia Pascetta, a platoon leader assigned to the 396th CTC. "It was a challenge creating it from the bottom up. We created scenarios of our own using the standard as our basis."

Through extensive research and ask-

ing experienced personnel for guidance, the company is able to create their own exercise to better train the sustainment Soldiers. And while the gunnery is a basic, true to form exercise, the convoy live-fire exercise will be the company's own thing.

The convoy live-fire scheduled for September will feature their convoy acting as a rolling security element. They want to prepare for future missions and deployments.

"We'll work out the kinks here so we can be better for the next time," said Pascetta. "We can create and sharpen a new element that will be integrated in the sustainment brigade."

## "Can Do" Battalion's Missilepalooza

Soldiers with 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, conducted training on a Javelin anti-tank missile launcher on Aug. 22, at Fort Stewart.

The Javelin weapons system is a medium anti-tank, portable launcher that uses a tandem-shaped charge penetrator to defeat armored threats.

"Soldiers have to be able to take this high-end weapon system and put it in action under stress," said Sgt.

Dean Frymyer, an infantryman with Company C, 3-15 Inf.

Frymyer, a graduate of the Javelin gunnery course, was on site to certify Soldiers on the weapon system.

"During combat, we can't just sit on top of a hill and launch off a rocket and call it a day," said Frymyer. "We must tactically maneuver into a fighting position without being seen. That's why this training is important."

Before conducting live fire with the Javelin, the Soldiers received instruction in the classroom and trained at the electronic skills trainer. Then they learned how to move tactically to a fighting position,

while notionally avoiding an armored enemy.

"All of our materials pull from the heavy weapons leaders course, and the Javelin gunnery course," said Staff Sgt. Ty Zehner, an infantryman with 3-15 Inf. "We discussed the launch, tube assembly, firing the round, and carrying techniques. The Soldiers were also tested on everything they learned during the training to ensure performance measures were met."

After the Soldiers complete Javelin training, they can attend the heavy weapons leaders course at Fort Benning, to certify as trainers for future javelin certification courses.

## MEDEVAC Training for 3ID Soldiers Downrange

**OB FENTY, AFGHANISTAN** – 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers with Task Force Leopard are learning what it takes to get casualties off the battlefield and into a doctor's care as quickly as possible at OB Fenty, Afghanistan.

U.S. Reserve Soldiers from Co. C, 5th Battalion (General Support), 159th Aviation Regiment conducted the Medical Evacuation training, which familiarized Marne Soldiers with the capabilities and equipment used in a MEDEVAC situation.

"This kind of training is important to reinforce our knowledge of how to safely get a casualty off the battlefield," said Maj. Andrew Neighbors, Task Force Leopard Senior Medical Advisor. "Everyone here has the ability to save a life and if a situation occurs where they need to act, this is the type of training that will make sure they know the right thing to do."

After this first round of instruction, the 3rd ID Soldiers will return next week to practice evacuating casualties using the helicopter's hoist system. The training will involve Soldiers placing a casualty into a basket to be lifted into the

UH-60 Blackhawk's cabin while the helicopter hovers 50 feet overhead.

"It's tough training, but understanding how to use the systems we have available keeps Soldiers alive," said training session leader, Staff Sgt. Brandon Evans, "This is a great opportunity to instruct a new group of Soldiers and also to give our pilots the chance to get more training on these procedures."

Training is important as security operations in southern Nangarhar province have led to Marne Soldiers experiencing MEDEVAC actions firsthand during their time in country. 3rd ID

Soldiers helped unload wounded Afghan and Coalition forces from MEDEVAC helicopters and move them to the base's medical facilities after an IED attack in mid-August.

"When someone is wounded, getting them the appropriate medical care quickly is what is important," said Neighbors. "We want to make sure that we are ready to handle these types of situations all the way from evacuation off the battlefield, to bringing them off the helicopter and into the care of our medics. Training for these situations means Soldiers know what to do and it means we save lives."

# Exploring Your Career: Addressing Combat Experience in a Resume

*The core of a transitioning Soldier's employment success is the civilian resume. Soldiers must "demilitarize" their resume as much as possible using terminology the average civilian employer will understand. Soldiers need to properly address their combat experience within their resumes.*

## Tips for Writing about Combat Experience On Your Resume

When writing your resume, don't let the wrong language keep you from landing the job you're qualified for. When it comes to transitioning out of the military and into the private sector, combat veterans possess a wealth of knowledge and battlefield experience that separates them from their civilian peers. Unfortunately, sometimes that's not enough on its own. You have to be able to express it in a way your civilian peers will understand. Which is a lot harder than it sounds. Most civilian employers have only a tangential understanding of what military service or combat entails, informed by pop culture, films, books, and occasionally second-hand knowledge. To find out how best to make that experience translatable in the civilian sector, Task & Purpose spoke with Ben Vinograd and John Thompson of Conditions Set, a non-profit that helps veterans and service members with their job applications. We asked Vinograd, the chief executive officer, and Thompson, a former Marine officer and the nonprofit's president, about the one thing that no hiring manager wants to see on a resume.

### A detailed account of your combat experience

American service members have been at war for a long time now. They've seen combat and have had their leadership skills tested in a brutal crucible, so it makes sense that it's something they'd want to highlight. Unfortunately, that type of experience doesn't always translate well to the civilian job market. "Hiring managers who are looking for resumes of people who are directly involved in combat do not want to see too many references to the combat mission," Vinograd explained.

However, this doesn't mean that you shouldn't include that information, just that there are right and wrong ways to do it. It's all about knowing your audience and tailoring the language to fit with the position and the company you're applying to. "Sometimes you get resumes where there are bullets, where they say 'received combat action ribbon for direct combat with the enemy,' and another bullet saying 'responsible for the KIA of 13 Taliban,'" said Thompson. "We generally recommend that it's probably a good idea to either completely delete this or to rephrase it in softer language, because unfortunately there's a preconceived notion that if you're in combat you have PTSD or might have emotional problems or something like that." While frustrating, it's important to remember that the hiring manager reviewing your resume may have little to no experience with the military at large, and combat in particular. "It's just kind of how the culture is, everyone sees movies, and everything like that and it's obviously not the case, but in order to be cautious we recommend you tamper down that language," Thompson explained, adding that if you're applying to a security firm or government contracting company, you can probably keep that information in there.

### Now, how do you make combat experience translatable?

First, you need to recognize that the language you might be used to using doesn't translate well to the job you're applying for, said Thompson. For example, don't write patrol. "Instead of saying patrol, call that a project, because essentially that's a project," continued Thompson. "There's a lot of planning that goes ahead of that, a lot of managing and impromptu decision making that goes into that." Another thing you can do is to tweak the language you use for individual units. "If you're a squad leader, and you're responsible for a squad, then that's a team," added Thompson. "Basically, everything's a team. Doesn't matter how big your team is. If you're a squad leader, then you led a team of 13 individuals, if you're a platoon commander, then you led a team of 42 or so individuals." The reason you do this is to make the language more relatable to a civilian audience by using terminology that's standard within the corporate environment. Another way to help you translate your military experience is to provide your billet, and then explain what that position was in terms that relate to the job you're applying for. "In the majority of cases, we have the transitioning service member include what their official titles were, then just use the first bullet underneath it to be the more general description of what that actually means," said

Vinograd. "Whatever it is, they can then use that bullet to kind of put it in context." However, Vinograd stressed that you shouldn't feel compelled to completely mask or hide your military background or experience. Instead you should try to find a way to make it relatable to someone who hasn't served. "There's no need to completely erase your military vocabulary, it's just picking and choosing when you provide the military vocabulary and when you provide the translation," explained Vinograd. In the end, your military background and your experiences in combat or overseas are what separates you from your civilian peers; just be sure you explain it in a way your prospective employer can relate to. *Published in GI Jobs Magazine and re-posted on Task and Purpose:*

Col. Jason A. Wolter, Fort Stewart garrison commander, addressed the auditorium filled with the 'Diamond Gator' students and faculty. Wolter has a child who attends the school and spoke on the benefits of being in the student body of a DoD-ran school.

"You are part of 72,000 other kids and this is one of 166 different schools in 11 different countries," said Wolter. "And you may not know this but being a DoDEA student – a gator student – means

that your math and reading scores will be some of the top in the nation. Being in a DoDEA school means your high school graduation rate will be higher than the rest of the country, and you will have a greater chance at attending college."

Wolter wrapped up by expressing gratitude to the teachers of Diamond Elementary, an all too often thankless job.

"You are the glue that holds this all together," said Wolter.

The school was named after Pfc. James H. Diamond, a 24th Infantry Division Soldier who was killed in action while trying to save the lives of his comrades in the Philippines in 1945. Diamond was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for his valiant and intrepid actions.

Diamond's great niece, Kelly Strozier, and great nephews Scott Evers and Jarrod Gruber, were present for the ceremony and boasted on the warm welcome they were given by the Marine division.

"It's great to see how the service continues to put family first," said Evers. "He [Diamond] would absolutely be amazed by this facility. He continues to make an impact so long after his death, and it's comforting to see he isn't forgotten."

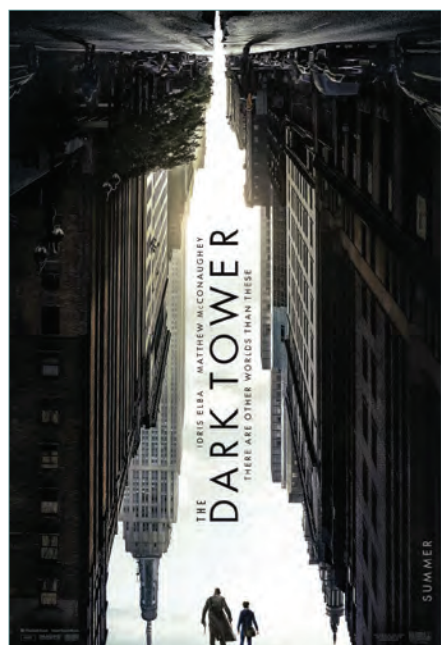

## Lean Leader course reinforces readiness at Winn

In the mission of medical readiness and providing our Soldiers and staff with the tools necessary to develop their leadership skills, U.S. Army Medical Department Activity – Fort Stewart in partnership with Womack Army Medical Center taught the first Lean Leader course Aug. 21-25 at the SFC Paul R. Smith Army Education Center.

The one-week course is a new program that began this past fiscal year. It takes all of the meat from the previous Lean Six Sigma courses and streamlines it so that each student is on an even-playing field.

"This becomes a win-win, both for our organization

and Womack as well, because we [partnered] with them within the region to develop the initiative for the organization," said Maj. Kellie Mosley, U.S. Army Medical Department Activity - Fort Stewart, acting deputy commander of administration, acting executive officer.

Mosley, and Master Black Belt Instructor Robin Wein, spent a week teaching 17 MEDDAC Soldiers and Civilians how to develop and utilize the eight-step problem-solving approach, or more commonly referred to as the A3 Model. The course guides each student through the eight-step process and helps them develop their own A3 Model.

"Every organization is driven by quality, cost and speed considerations. The Lean Leader Course pro-

vides students with the tools to address these considerations," Wein said.

The focus of the one-week course is the reduction of waste and improving efficiency.

"When we know that about 90 percent of what we do in all our processes today, there's 90 percent waste in there," Wein said. "If we can pull that waste out and figure out ways to remove it, we can streamline processes, and just have a much more efficient and functional way to go forward."

Autumn Currence, an ophthalmology technician with MEDDAC, plans to use what she has learned from the class to improve efficiency within her clinic.

"Personally, for me, I'm very big on standardization and reduction of waste," Currence said. "I'm trying to move into the admin position out of the clinical positions, so this is going to hopefully help me achieve my goal and give me more tools that I can try to implement standardization."

The course stresses the understanding of customer and business values. It allows the students to map out the process through the eyes of their coworkers, which instills respect and value and emphasizes importance of team work.

"I think that with the process that I have been given, now that I can break it down and not try to eat the entire elephant like I've been doing, I can just take it one step at a time," said Maj. Kenora Walker.

The employees who graduate from this course will have the tools necessary to recognize, address and resolve a problem, reinforcing Winn Army Community Hospital's continuing mission to medical readiness.

"By acquiring a second bod pod, [were going] to be able to do simultaneous body composition analysis," Hamm said.

One of the main functions of the wellness center is to provide wellness coaching, in which clients can talk about their individual health care goals and develop a plan to meet those goals. The new

facility bolsters an entire suite of rooms with the sole purpose of ensuring patient confidentiality.

Even though the move will require some patience, Hamm wants the community to know this relocation will allow the committed staff of the AWC to build upon the commitment they have made to provide beneficiaries with the tools and resources they need to excel.

"Our commitment to healthcare is teaching patients to be in control of their own health outcomes and that's what the Army Wellness Center is really centered around," Hamm said.

The facility is located

at 808 Worcester Avenue and will re-open its doors Monday, September 11.

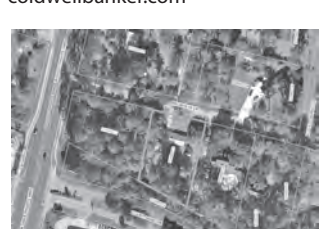

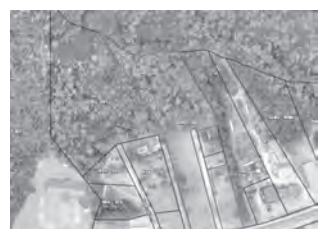
