US-led multinational teams assess Ukrainian brigades

YAVORIV, Ukraine--Two U.S.-led teams from the Joint Multinational Training Group-Ukraine conducted week-long assessments of two Ukrainian combat brigades in Odessa and Kharkiv, Nov. 11.

The teams were there to assess the combat readiness of the 28th and 53rd Brigades. The multinational teams were comprised of Canadian, U.K. and U.S. Soldiers from 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division as well as 7th Army Training Command out of Grafenwoehr, Germany.

According to Brig. Gen. Tony Aguto, commander of 7th Army Training Command, the multinational make-up of the teams was essential to their success.

“There’s not much that we do here that doesn’t involve all three of us,” Aguto said. “It is a synchronized effort to build better Ukrainian training and forces. The assessment team would not have done any good if one nation did it, if we are all eventually going to help train these units, so it made sense.”

Once on ground the teams got to work by first establishing a baseline that they could use to assess the current training status and identify potential gaps in the unit’s focused training progression. This was done through focused questioning to establish how the brigade, battalions and companies had trained prior to their recent deployment to the Anti-Terrorist Operation Zone in Eastern Ukraine. The teams then assessed that against current training, manning and equipping plans.

Lt. Col. Jay Wisham, commander of 6-8 Cav., led the Odessa team. He said that the teams were able to conduct a thorough review of the Brigades’ current state of readiness and what their training needs are as a unit going through an immediate reset and retrain to get ready for their next ATO rotation.

“This has a lot of potential strategic impact. It’s less about hands on training and more about how we make recommendations and assist our Ukrainian partners,” Wisham said. “We are looking much deeper and with a much longer lens. How do we help them shape their

force generation process?”

The idea for the assessment teams came out of a visit by Gen. Viktor Muzhenko, chief of general staff, Commander in Chief of Armed Forces for Ukraine, to 7th ATC’s Grafenwoehr and Hohenfels training centers in Germany. According to Aguto, Muzhenko was impressed with the way the U.S. Army assesses itself and learns from after action reviews.

“He asked us at that time if, when their units come in from the ATO, it would be possible to send an assessment team and take a look at their units for a couple of purposes,” Aguto said. “One, to just see the readiness of their units as they come off the ATO and two, and more importantly, was to help them improve their training plan as those units get ready to go back into the ATO.”

Currently, most U.S. training has occurred within the confines of the International Peacekeeping and Security Center in Yavoriv, Ukraine. The Joint Multinational Training Group-Ukraine has spent the past year helping to build an enduring and sustainable training capacity through direct training and the development of dedicated cadre. The assessment teams offered another opportunity to assist in the development of that training capacity.

“I think it will allow us to develop or touch units we would not have seen going into operations,” Aguto said. “So, I think what they will do with this assessment is possibly incorporate our recommendations to make these units better the same way we do out here in Yavoriv.”

According to Wisham, this assessment process may be the way ahead for U.S. support to Ukrainian military reform.

“This certainly has the potential to be a very attractive option for the Ukrainian units and the tri-nations team as we go forward,” he said. “Over time we are going to adjust the composition of what our forces do because the Ukrainian forces are becoming very adept at running the CTC (combat training center) on their own and that allows us to recapitalize some of our capability and actually help them in other ways. This could be one of those ways.”

DIVARTY receives Q-50 radars, training

Soldiers from Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 3rd Infantry Division Artillery field tested two AN/TPQ-50 radar systems recently added to the DIVARTY’s arsenal, Nov 8. This fielding served as a validation exercise to test and calibrate the systems capabilities.

The AN/TPQ-50 (Q-50) system’s primary purpose is to detect, locate, and report hostile enemy mortar, artillery, and rocket systems. All enemy indirect projectiles are automatically detected and tracked to pinpoint the location of hostile weapon systems. The Q-50 radar provides a continuous 360-degree detec-

tion coverage for indirect fire systems ranging from around 500 meters to approximately 10,000 meters.

The training was completed through coordination with 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment’s Counterfire Cell. The DIVARTY Q-50 section successfully acquired 12 x 155mm artillery rounds shot by 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery, successfully transferring the acquisition data to 1-9 FA’s Counter-fire Cell.

“The Q-50 training represents a step forward in the Division Artillery’s ability to serve as a self-sustainable Warfighting element capable of serving the needs of the 3rd Infantry Division,” said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Matthew Pfannerstill. “Our systems and radar operators of the DIVARTY sensor platoon are fully mission capable and ready to serve.”

New technology takes training to new level

Preparing to endure a lack of oxygen, smoke and fire, Staff Sergeant Emily Bradshaw, fire chief for the 92nd Engineers, prepared to lead her team, Nov. 22, into a building on Fort Stewart, where the temperature exceeded 925 degrees Fahrenheit.

Covered from head to toe and wearing an oxygen mask, there was no outward sign of anxiety as the team stacked and moved smoothly into the building to combat the fires beyond. And though this was a training exercise, the overwhelming heat, flames, smoke made the treat real.

Bradshaw said this type of training is the exact type training her team needs to help prepare them for upcoming missions.

"We need to get our guys some real world training," Bradshaw said. "This is an intense burn, and great training. Next week we were doing an aircraft fire." The structure burn was provided

by the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Directorate of Emergency Services, with their new \$230,000 training facility.

Although the facility appears, from the outside, to look like a group of stacked rail-cargo containers painted red, Fire Chief Gary Flores said it provides a lot of value to the installation emergency responders and their community partners.

Flores said the facility allows them to do search and rescue operations in a confined space where temperatures can exceed 1000 degrees. But the facility also offers cost savings and an opportunity to work with local community fire fighters.

According to Flores, while training cost varies, sending a single person off for certification could cost about \$1,200 per person. But he notes the facility offers local firefighter an opportunity in the area to come here to conduct their specialized training. Training installation firefighters can take advantage of too.

Ukrainian soldiers conduct air assault training

YAVORIV, Ukraine—Ukrainian soldiers assigned to 1st Battalion, 80th Airmobile Brigade conducted an air assault mission in conjunction with a situational training exercise, led by U.S. Soldiers from 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, Nov. 28, at the International Peacekeeping and Security Center.

The training scenario consisted of a platoon-sized element of Ukrainian soldiers assaulting from four Mi-8 helicopters during a simulated firefight to relieve Ukrainian forces that were pinned down. Once the area was secured, Ukrainian soldiers utilizing BTR armored personnel carriers and ZU-23-2 towed anti-aircraft weapons provided support in strengthening the defensive perimeter.

“This training is important because it builds confidence in the Ukrainian force’s ability to utilize com-

bined arms maneuver,” said Sgt. Christopher Marinucci, assistant team leader assigned to 6-8 CAV. “We’re working with rotary wing aircraft, armored personnel carriers, dismounted infantry and it’s important for the commander on the ground to be confident working with all the combined elements.”

Prior to conducting the air assault mission, the Ukrainian soldiers went through several weeks of training to prepare them for a successful mission.

“We started off by doing squad, platoon and company level situational training exercises, medical training, such as first aid and combat life savers course, call for fire procedures, and then went into hot load/cold load procedures for the aircraft before conducting this training,” Marinucci said.

Once the mission was complete, the Ukrainian soldiers conducted an after action review. The AAR allows soldiers to understand what went well during the training, and how they can improve the training to obtain better results in the future.

According to Marinucci they teach them the standard Army AAR process, which is extremely effective. They look at each phase of the operation to determine what the initial plan was and what actually happened in order to learn how they could improve for the next training iteration.

Marinucci has been in Ukraine for six months and has formed strong bonds with the Ukrainian soldiers.

“Some of the Ukrainian soldiers have told us that we may have been born American but we are definitely Ukrainian at heart, which is a great compliment.”

Soldiers of 6-8 CAV are currently responsible for training Ukrainian ground forces as part of the Joint Multinational Training Group-Ukraine. JMTG-U is training Ukrainian land forces and building a team of Ukrainian cadre who will ultimately assume that responsibility. The training is designed to reinforce defensive skills of the Ukrainian ground forces in order to increase their capacity for self-defense.

For some, there is no greater calling than helping Soldiers who served their country. Jennifer Lewis, an adaptive reconditioning manager and physical therapist, and Buddy Karolev, an adaptive reconditioning coordinator and coach; both, understand that feeling as they have played a key role in helping others at the Warrior Transition Battalion.

Jennifer Lewis said the purpose of the WTB is to assist wounded and ill Soldiers

to engage in activities that help them transition back to active duty or civilian life.

A major part of that process is sports or adaptive sports; where outdoor cycling and other popular activities are done. The activities address physical needs; but also allows Soldiers to cope with stress.

The Soldiers have an opportunity to work with people like Jennifer and Buddy to address their issues - whether physical health or mental well-being. Karolev coaches about 80 percent of all the Fort Stewart WTB available sports and is

proud to say that during Marne week; out of the 15 teams competing, the Fort Stewart WTB team placed first in wheelchair basketball.

"It's a fantastic job," Karolev said. "I get to help Soldiers in their recovery through sports."

The breakdown of the Soldiers schedule is that they do 4.5 hours of adaptive reconditioning per week; in which 2.5 is a modern intensity exercise. They have a physical therapy adaptive reconditioning calendar that shows all the different activities Soldiers can participate in. They

range from yoga to taekwondo, to cycling and so on. The calendar has 25 hours of activities per week.

Some Soldiers train to become participants at the Warrior Games; which are held in Chicago this June, hosted by the Navy. Seven Soldiers from the Fort Stewart WTB went to the regional trials at Fort Benning. The results of who made it to the Army trials at Fort Bliss this February are still pending.

Controlled Burn Season to Begin Soon

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield's Forestry Branch will begin a controlled burn season today. Controlled burning is a managed burn that uses low intensity fire to improve and enhance our Soldiers' training lands, clear underbrush to reduce wildfire hazards and improve wildlife habitat. Because of Fort Stewart's aggressive burn program, the number of wildfires has steadily decreased over the past 10 years. Since the year 2000, not one day of training has been lost on the installation due to wildfires.

Extensive preparation and work goes into each planned burn. The Forestry Branch develops burn prescriptions for each area that will be burned during the season. These planned burns may involve burning 500 acres to 2,500 acres per day and may occur on any day during the burn season. Even with preplanning, the dates of each burn are only estimates as they are dependent upon weather conditions as well as access to military training areas. However, the Forestry Branch goes to great lengths to ensure the installation and surrounding communities are aware of scheduled burns and

up-to-date on any changes to the burn plan for a particular day.

During a burn, Forestry monitors weather via the National Weather Service in Charleston, Georgia Forestry Commission, five local remote access weather stations located throughout Fort Stewart and close observation from at least two of the five fire towers located on the installation. Fort Stewart foresters do everything within their power to manage smoke impacts from these burns and ensure the safety of residents both in and around Fort Stewart. However, there are uncontrollable conditions, such as sudden changes in wind direction and/or intensity that can cause smoke to drift into surrounding neighborhoods or highways. For this reason, the Forestry Branch asks residents to be aware of the ongoing burn season and to use extra caution when traveling through areas where smoke may be present.

Stewart-Hunter recognizes that our forests and trees are a vital resource to both our present and future missions. Controlled burning is critical to sustaining the environment in which we train, work, live and play as well as preserving it for future generations.

Now that the Holiday season is upon us, there will be people in a rush to get into and out of stores to do their shopping. With their minds on Christmas gifts, decorations, and travel plans, they will also be in a rush to get into and out of parking spaces. When they're behind the wheel, this lack of attention to the road and to surroundings is a form of distracted driving.

According to www.distraction.gov, in 2014 alone there were 3,179 people killed and 431,000 injured in accidents that involved distracted driving. This year, please be aware in of children and other holiday shoppers while driving in parking lots and garages. Here are some tips to remem-

- ber:
- Back out of parking spots slowly, looking left, right, and then left again.
 - Be vigilant and drive defensively.
 - Watch your speed.
 - Use your seatbelts.
 - Do not drive or let others drive while fatigued or under the influence of alcohol!

Ask the Judge

Safeguarding personal property in on-post quarters, barracks

Q: Can I file a claim if my property is stolen from my on-post quarters or barracks?

A: Yes. The Personnel Claims Act allows the Army to pay for certain types of property loss, including loss of property due to theft if the loss occurred in on-post living quarters or barracks. However, the PCA specifically provides that losses from CONUS off-post housing or losses due to the claimant's own negligence are not payable.

Q: How do I properly safeguard my property in the barracks?

A: Small, easily pilfered items such as laptop computers, cameras, iPods, cell phones, MP3 players, and similar items should be secured in a locked wall locker or foot locker when not being used. Remember, while you may have a roommate, you don't always know who will be entering your room when you're not there. Large amounts of cash or valuable jewelry should not be stored in a desk drawer or under your mattress. These items should be stored in a locked container, preferably double locked, when the owner is not present in the room. Stereo systems, desktop computers, and similar electronic items should be secured in a wall locker or unit supply room when the Soldier is going to be absent for an extended period of time, for example, temporary duty, leave or deployments.

Most claims for property stolen from barracks rooms involve a thief who forced entry into the room or container containing the property. Never leave your door or windows open or unlocked when you are not in your barracks room. Leaving your room unsecured may indicate negligence, and the PCA bars payment of claims where the claimant was negligent.

Q: How do I properly safeguard my property in on-post living quarters?

A: Keep all windows closed and locked when not at home. For personnel in quarters, the need to secure or conceal small high value items within the home only arises if the occupants will be away for an extended period. Ensure Family Members know to follow these rules when you are on leave or deployed. Carefully screen individuals that you decide to leave spare keys with. The same forced entry rule applies as it does with barracks rooms.

Q: If my personal property gets stolen from my on-post living quarters or barracks, how can I substantiate my claim?

A: It's up to you to document your losses. In order to substantiate a claim, you must show proof of ownership and prove the value of the stolen items. Proof of purchase, debit or credit card transaction records, video or photographs are usually sufficient

to prove ownership. Providing advertisements of comparable items or an appraisal is usually sufficient to substantiate value. Remember, the better your records are, the quicker and more accurate your settlement will be.

Q: How can Commanders assist in the prevention of barracks theft?

A: A Soldier's command can ensure that all incoming Soldiers get briefed on properly safeguarding their personal property while residing in the barracks. Unit supply rooms can be made available to Soldiers when they are going on extended leave. Commanders should adhere to strict key control procedures. For those rooms that have key code entry pads, ensure that the codes are changed as personnel PCS or change barracks rooms. Finally, commanders should ensure that all barracks personnel complete high-value inventory lists.

Q: What is the amount payable on a specific claim?

A: The PCA does not provide insurance coverage. Instead, it was created by Congress to lessen the hardships of military life by providing a gratuitous, but sometimes limited compensation for certain types of property losses. Compensation under the PCA is limited to the lesser of the cost to repair or replace the damaged item. In addition, the replacement cost of an item under the PCA is not the price you paid for the item, but rather the value of an item of comparable quality depreciated at an annual rate to the age of the damaged item. For example, if your ten year old color television was stolen, the replacement value will not be what you paid for your television. Rather, it will be the cost of a new color television of comparable quality, depreciated to the value of a 10-year-old television.

Q: What are the steps required to submit a claim?

A: First, notify the Military Police immediately after the incident to report the circumstances of the theft and to report all missing property. Second, after you get a copy of the final military police report, gather all necessary substantiation and visit the Fort Stewart Claims Office to start the claims process.

Q: How do I contact the Fort Stewart Claims Office?

A: The Fort Stewart Claims Office is located on the first floor of building 709 on Gulick Ave. and William H. Wilson Ave. directly north of Popeye's. The phone number is 912-767-8185/1052. Office hours are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., except federal holidays and some training holidays.

behind the wheel. I know that I can call someone for a ride any time I feel that I need to get out of an unsafe situation.

I will respect your rules. I will drive within the boundaries we've discussed.

I will call you. If I need a ride home I can count on someone in my chain of command to either pick me up or make arrangements to have me picked up, no questions asked and without retribution.

I agree to live and abide by this pledge.

Commanders and Leaders:

I will be there for you. I/ We will ensure, that if called upon, we will either arrange for transportation or personally provide you a safe ride home, even if you have broken every rule that we have agreed to follow, we will make sure you get home safely.

I will be a good role model and lead by example. I agree to live by the same safe driving rules we have set for you.

Additionally, all new Soldiers to the Marne Division will sign a similar pledge - keep your unit off the bottle by abiding by your pledge. **DON'T DRINK AND DRIVE.**

It is important for all military and civilian personnel assigned to the installation, read the guidelines and resections outlined in USAG Policy Letter #45, regarding the use of Radio Controlled Model aircraft and Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems. <https://intra.stewart.army.mil/garrison/gc/PolicyLetter-GC2012/USAG>.

1. All RC/sUAS of all shapes and sizes are prohibited for operating on the installation without specific approval.

2. There are two Recreational Restricted

Operating Zones: Donovan ROZ located on Stewart and Neal ROZ located on Hunter.

3. Hobbyists desiring to use ROZ locations must contact the appropriate Airfield Operation's office to verify that the area is open for use and to check in with required information (912) 315-7050

4. If requesting to use ROZ's on the weekend must check in no later than 6 p.m. on Friday.

The FAA is implementing many new policies for sUAS operations and operators are strongly encourage to remain up to date with operating rules and requirements. To get most current information operators may log on to <https://www.Faa.gov/uas> and view updates and changes to FAA sUAS policies. The FAA has started a campaign "Know before you fly," it includes videos instruction people on how to safely and correctly use drone. Among those are: Don't fly drones above 400 feet, within five miles of an airport or near a stadium.

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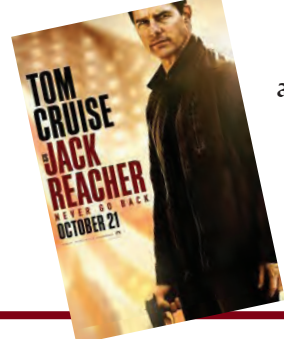

Do not be anxious

Do you often experience symptoms such as sudden overwhelming fear, palpitations, sweating, trembling, shortness of breath, fear of dying and so on? These are all symptoms of anxiety. When I experience symptoms such as these, I know that it is time for me to take an azimuth check. I need to refocus and discover God's bearing for my life. The Bible instructs us in **Philippians 4:6-7 – Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. 7) And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.**

It is when we take our focus off of God that we begin to experience anxiety. When Peter took his eyes off of Jesus and refocused on the storm he began to sink below the water. When King David took his eyes off God and refocused them on Bathsheba, he committed adultery and murder. When the Israelites quit looking to God and crafted a golden image of a cow, they angered God and fell out of grace with Him.

Yet with an opposite focus, the Apostle Paul was able to sing songs while he was in prison thus winning jailers to the Lord. Joseph was able to keep his focus on God while in prison and eventually rose to be second in command of Egypt. So it is not the situation or storms in our lives that cause us anxiety; it is how we respond to those situations and storms.

In terms of anxiety, which by the way is the fastest growing disease experienced amongst college students,

the Bible tells us that as we keep our focus on God, that the peace of God will guard our hearts and minds. I exhort you as we enter the Holidays to keep your eyes on the prize, the Lord Jesus Christ, so that you may experience an ever increasing peace in your lives.

SBA approves over \$5 Million in disaster loans for Hurricane Matthew survivors

GA SBA Disaster Loan Program

ATLANTA – The U.S. Small Business Administration has approved more than \$5 million in low-interest disaster loans for businesses and residents in Georgia affected by Hurricane Matthew that occurred on Oct. 4-15, 2016.

“Currently, 224 disaster loans have been approved in the amount of \$5,385,900 for affected survivors,” said Frank Skaggs, director of SBA's Field Operations Center East in Atlanta. “We are pleased to get these loans approved so residents in the disaster area can start to rebuild and resume their normal lives. I encourage anyone who has not submitted an SBA disaster loan application

to do so as quickly as possible.”

The disaster declaration covers the counties of Bryan, Bulloch, Chatham, Effingham, Evans, Glynn, Liberty, Long, McIntosh and Wayne in Georgia, which are eligible for both Physical and Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the SBA. Small businesses and most private nonprofit organizations in the following adjacent counties are eligible to apply only for SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans: Appling, Brantley, Camden, Candler, Emanuel, Jenkins, Pierce, Screven and Tattnall in Georgia; and Hampton and Jasper in South Carolina.

To be considered for all forms of disaster assistance, applicants should

register online at www.DisasterAssistance.gov or by downloading the FEMA mobile app. If online or mobile access is unavailable, applicants should call the FEMA toll-free Helpline at 800-621-3362. Those who use 711-Relay or Video Relay Services should call 800-621-3362 (800-462-7585 TTY).

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at <https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela>.

Disaster loan information and application forms may also be obtained by calling the SBA's Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 (800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing) or by sending an email to disastercus-

tomerservice@sba.gov.

Loan applications can be downloaded from www.sba.gov/disaster. Completed applications can be returned to a recovery center or mailed to: U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155.

The filing deadline to return applications for physical property damage is Dec. 16. The deadline to return economic injury applications is July 17, 2017.

Arts, Crafts can help heal veterans

When people hear there might be a bomb nearby, most will try to get as far away as fast as possible. U.S. Army Specialist Brandon Sanford and his bomb-sniffing dog Rexo, however, were not as lucky.

Sanford and Rexo were part of the Army's bomb detection unit, tasked with finding life-threatening explosive devices. “I was nervous on the first patrol missions since our duty was to find explosives designed to kill American soldiers,” said Sanford.

When a roadside bomb exploded near his vehicle in 2008, Sanford suffered a traumatic brain injury (TBI), among other wounds. Because of his injuries, Sanford suffers from seizures as well as problems with balance, fine motor skills and more. Basic tasks like buttoning a shirt are now daunting endeavors for him. And so the long, arduous process of healing began. Along with surgery and physical therapy, craft therapy became part of Sanford's treatment plan.

When men and women return from war or other military postings, they often bring home more than their duffel bags. That is why Help Heal Veterans (Heal Vets), a nonprofit founded during the Vietnam War,

operates on the knowledge that not all medicine comes in a bottle. As America's largest supplier of therapeutic arts and crafts resources, Heal Vets has distributed more than 29 million kits since 1971, averaging 43,000 kits per month. The kits consist of hundreds of craft categories like woodworking, leather, models and a variety of needlecrafts.

Many doctors and occupational therapists prescribe arts and crafts as an important component of a treatment plan. Such an approach provides tremendous therapeutic and rehabilitative benefits, including improving fine motor skills, cognitive functioning, memory and dexterity. Crafts can also help alleviate anger issues and the severity of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and TBI triggers, such as anxiety, memories, sadness and frustration.

In some cases, the benefits are physical as well. For example, stringing together a leather craft might help with hand-eye coordination and dexterity. Painting or model building can ease symptoms of PTSD or depression. Sanford said that working with small pieces has helped him with his hand-eye coordination. He also suffers from short-term memory problems associated with his TBI, so working on the kits helps train his focus

and concentration skills.

Since World War I, craft kits have consistently proven effective tools for veterans' rehabilitation and healing. According to a Health Care Data Inc. study, 89.6 percent of patients surveyed felt Heal Vets craft therapy helped maintain or improve their physical capabilities. Furthermore, craft projects help build family bonds when completed with loved ones, improve self-esteem and surface previously untapped artistic talent.

As Americans pay their respects this month to those who have served, Heal Vets encourages you to think about ways you can help enrich the lives of the 22 million U.S. veterans and military personnel. Heal Vets relies solely on charitable donations to produce its craft kits. For more information about the program or to donate art supplies, journals and other tools that spark creativity to a veterans' organization near you, visit HealVets.org.

“Today, one of every three Iraq and Afghanistan veterans suffers from PTSD and/or TBI. Even more, the suicide rate for U.S. military members continues to rise. 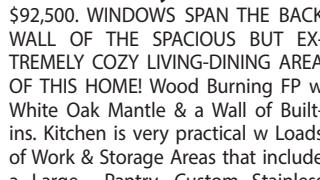

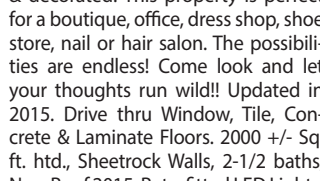

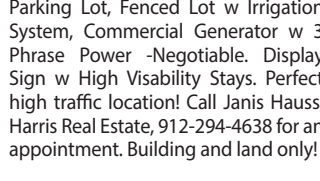
