# CC call addresses Airmen wellness, introduces new CCC

SCHRIEVER AIR FORCE BASE, Colo. — Col. Jennifer Grant, commander of the 50th Space Wing, hosted an all-call to address Schriever Airmen's wellness and results of the Defense Equal Opportunity Climate Survey at Schriever Air Force Base, Colorado, July 12.

However, the all-call was kicked off by an introduction of Chief Master Sgt. Boston Alexander, command chief of the 50th SW, and gave him the opportunity to introduce himself and lay out his expectations of Airmen.

"There is no better time to be in space, we are the epicenter of space," he said. "It isn't happening without Team Schriever. Every day is training camp. We're champs on a champion team, and we're the best at what we do."

Alexander expressed gratitude for the chance to serve 50th SW Airmen, and excitement for the future.

SCHRIEVER AIR FORCE BASE, Colo. — More than 175 people packed the event center at Schriever Air Force Base, Colorado, for the inaugural First Friday event July 13.

First Friday is a monthly morale-building event held the first Friday of every month, where Airmen can play games, eat free food, experience fellowship and enjoy music. (This event was held the second Friday due to the 4th of July Holiday).

"This is something [Col. Jennifer Grant, commander of the 50th Space Wing] wanted to put together so the base could relax and come together," said Thea Wasche, deputy commander of the 50th Force Support Squadron. "We knew it was going to be a hit, but I didn't expect it to be as big as it was. We had a huge turnout and people seemed to really enjoy themselves."

The 50th FSS worked closely with the USO to bring free pizza, sandwiches, frozen custard, beverages and games to the event. Schriever AFB also debunked the unlucky lore of "Friday the 13th" and lucked out, scoring a live performance from the band Willy Pete.

"The food, venue and music were all a nice change of pace from the daily grind," said Staff Sgt. Jeramy Anderson, sustainment technician with the 50th Space Communication Squadron. "It is one thing for the 50th SW to allow us time away from work to reconnect, but to be able to eat, drink and truly relax shows that the base takes the morale of its troops seriously."

In addition to allowing Airmen the opportunity to unwind, the event gave them a chance to connect with each other.

"The event provided a great location to interact and bond with squadron members you don't get to see very often, and also allowed access to individuals from other squadrons to discuss how different topics uniquely affect separate units," said Capt. Wolf Thielmann, engineering flight commander with the 4th Space Operations Squadron.

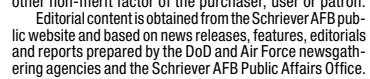

Additionally, Alexander encouraged Airmen to get to know not only the command chief, but Boston Alexander as a person.

“I want you to know the man behind the uniform,” he said.

Alexander ended his introduction reminding Airmen why he is excited to be a part of Team Schriever.

“I know I’m home, and we’ll work together to turn the bad guys into dust,” he said.

Next, Grant welcomed new leaders, and addressed the DEOCS survey results, explaining she read all 145 pages of comments, looking at strengths, improvements and Airmen’s personal thoughts.

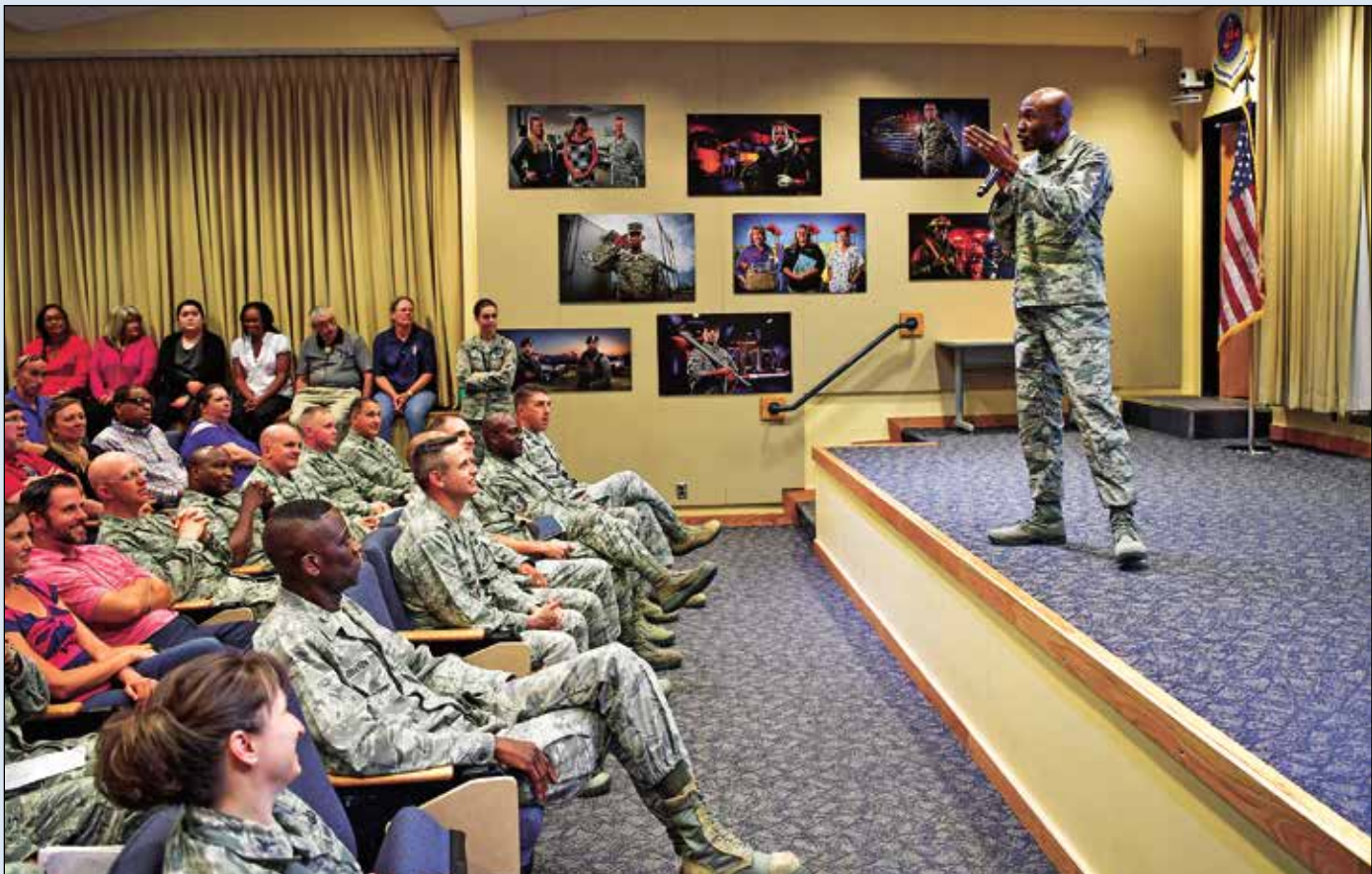
“This is where it starts and ends,” she said. “This is where the rubber meets the road. I want to look at ways to implement suggestions from the survey. It shows we’re good at what we do, but there’s always room for improvement.”

Grant emphasized the need for work on point-to-point communication, up and down the leadership chain.

“Structure is a good thing, but too much is a burden,” she said. “There is a happy medium, and the end goal is to preserve the Airmen’s time. We want to accomplish more in a shorter period of time.”

Grant then explained how the 50th SW fits into the larger space mission.

“We need everybody in the fight,” she said. “The message is consistent, we are the epicenter of everything that goes on in space. We have an acute understanding

Grant reminded Airmen of the upcoming Summer Slam Base Picnic July 20 and Diversity Day Aug. 17, both of which are great opportunities for the base to get to know new people.

“There is nothing that rivals these

events,” she said. “They gives us the chance to unplug and relax. The picnic is for the whole family to connect. People are the most important resource we have, but it all depends on how committed we are to meeting new people every day.”

Grant ended the commander’s call with an opportunity for Airmen to ask questions, while sharing a personal story of

# Back-to-school seminar prepares families

For children and parents, the beginning of the school season may usher in thoughts of bagged lunches, report cards, homework, as well as early mornings, late evenings and hectic schedules.

Gary Hernandez, Schriever School Age Care Program coordinator with the 50th Force Support Squadron, said the event ensures Airmen and their families are prepared for the school season.

“We want to highlight what the SAC and Child Development Center does as well as provide details on other programs,” he said. “Our job is to provide quality educational enrichment and care.”

# AF updates AFI 36-2903

WASHINGTON — The Air Force announced a series of uniform updates to Air Force Instruction 36-2903, Dress and Personal Appearance of Air Force Personnel, effective July 13.

“These changes stemmed from the 100th Air Force Uniform Board, which incorporated direct feedback from Airmen,” said Lt. Gen. Gina Grosso, Deputy Chief of Staff, Manpower, Personnel, and Services. “There are additional Uniform Board initiatives that are ongoing and still being analyzed for consideration and implementation by senior leaders.”

The notable changes are, but not limited to:

**Grooming and Appearance Standards**

- No minimum hair length for females, but up to a maximum bulk of three-and-half inches from scalp, allowing for proper wear of headgear.
- Females are also authorized locs, which must be lightly fused or interwoven to present a neat, professional appearance.

**Dress Uniform**

- All enlisted personnel may wear three-and-a-half inch or four-inch chevrons.
- All or some ribbons and devices may be worn on service dress uniform.
- All, some or no ribbons and devices may be worn on blue service uniform.

**Outer Garments, Headgear, Rank Insignia and Accessories**

- While off duty in civilian clothes males are authorized to wear earrings on or off installation.
- Females are authorized to wear round or square white diamond, gold, white pearl

- or silver earrings as a set with any uniform combination.
- Eyeglasses and sunglasses may have a small logo that can contrast with frame color or lenses. Conservative, clear, slightly tinted or photosensitive lenses are also authorized.
- Airmen may wear either a sling style

- backpack or two strap backpack.
- Handbags for all uniform combinations will be solid black leather or vinyl without ornamentation with black or white stitching.

**Physical Training Gear**

- Short- and long-sleeved solid white, black

- or light gray form fitting undershirts may be worn and visible under the short-sleeved shirt.
- A balaclava (black) may now be worn with PT gear while performing physical fitness activities outdoors.

## Dress and Appearance

### Dress Uniform



- All enlisted personnel may wear three and a half inch or four inch chevrons



- All or some ribbons and devices may be worn on the service dress uniform
- All, some or ribbons and devices may be worn on the service uniform

### Grooming and Appearance



- No minimum hair length for females, but up to a maximum bulk of three-and-half inches from scalp, allowing for proper wear of headgear
- Females are also authorized locs, which must be lightly fused or interwoven to present a neat, professional appearance

### Accessories



- Eyeglasses and sunglasses may have a small logo that can contrast with frame or color lenses
- Conservative, clear, slightly tinted, or photosensitive lenses are also authorized



- Handbags for all uniform combinations will be solid black leather or vinyl without ornamentation with black or white stitching

“Ellicott does not have school on Friday, so we focus on the program support we can provide for children at that time,” he said. “Our calendar coincides closely with the district.”

Andrea Hernandez, A&FRC community readiness consultant with the 50th FSS, shared advice on how parents can communicate with their child effectively as the school season approaches.

“Communication is key,” she said. “Parents can ask what their child is excited about in the upcoming school year and address what their child might be worried about. Make shopping for school supplies a special event, and allow your child to pick a couple of individual items such as a fun notebook or pen.”

thought it was great. # 24th AF changes command, commander during ceremony

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas — the Twenty Fourth Air Force was reassigned to a new major command and welcomed a new commander during a ceremony here, July 17.

During the ceremony, 24th AF moved from Air Force Space Command to Air Combat Command. Generals Jay Raymond, AFSPC commander, and Mike Holmes, ACC commander, presided over the ceremony.

The move was directed to realign the 24th AF cyber operations and the 25th AF intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance missions under the same command; all to “drive faster decisions as we fight,” said Secretary of the Air Force Heather Wilson, in a June 7 statement.

“If we’re going to compete, deter and win on the international stage, we must think of every domain as coequal and interdependent,” Holmes said. “This codependence and coequality may be even more important in competition, and the transfer of the 24th Air Force is a step on that path that will offer additional options for our warfighters and national leaders.”

The transfer will optimize multi-domain integration of cyber capabilities and effects in support of Air Force core missions. The new construct will improve the Air Force’s ability to organize, train, and equip cyber forces in presentation to and support of Air Force component commanders and combatant commanders.

For his leadership, Raymond presented Weggeman the Distinguished Service Medal, after which Weggeman credited his success to his Airmen.

“To the Airmen of Air Forces Cyber ... thank you,” Weggeman said. “You’ve shattered my every expectation and I am so inspired and proud of who you are and what you have accomplished. You are a globally recognized, battle-

risk-taking, bold and innovative leaders at all levels continually increasing our warfighter readiness and lethality. That is the only way to ensure the success of our National Defense Strategy. I’m excited to join your team, as we provide the world’s greatest combat cyber power to fight the adversary across all domains.”

Since its Aug. 18, 2009 activation, the 24th AF has delivered full-spectrum, global cyberspace capabilities and effects to the Air Force, joint force and nation. It is the only Numbered Air Force dedicated to cyberspace operations.

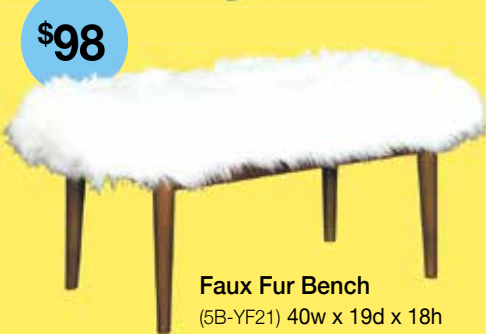

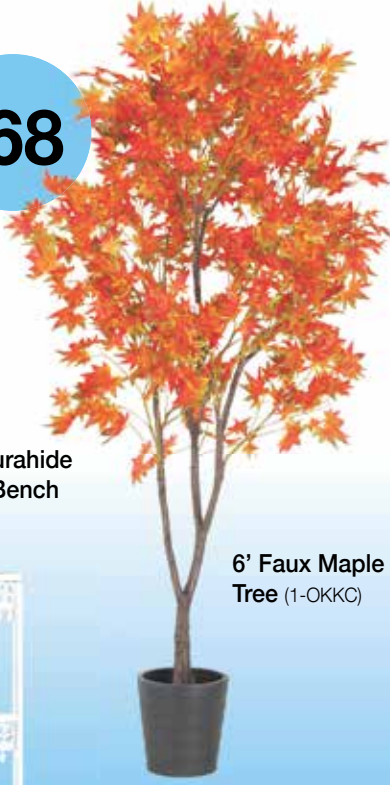
