Measles outbreak in Europe continues

LANDSTUHL, Germany — Adults and children not vaccinated for measles could be at risk for contracting the illness as a result of an ongoing measles outbreak in several European countries.

Regional Health Command Europe officials recommend families review their vaccination records to ensure everyone is fully vaccinated against the disease.

Additionally, in 2017, Army Medicine clinics throughout Europe began giving the Measles, Mumps and Rubella vaccine as part of the routine six-month visit with pediatricians. The vaccine is highly encouraged for all children aged 6-12 months, especially those in daycare. This dose is in addition to the two doses given to children in the U.S. over 12 months of age.

Measles is an extremely contagious virus, with 100 percent of exposed susceptible individuals becoming infected.

The virus can linger in the air of a room or transportation vehicle for up to two hours according to Col. Rodney Coldren, preventive medicine chief, Public Health Command Europe.

"There is a very safe and effective vaccine available to prevent this disease," said Coldren. "The vast majority of Americans are already immunized against measles, having received at least two doses of the MMR vaccine in early childhood."

Forum offers platform for feedback, ideas

VICENZA — The Army Family Action Plan (AFAP) is the military family's platform to voice quality-of-life issues, feedback, ideas and suggestions.

It's the best way to let Army leadership know about what works, what doesn't, and how you think problems can be resolved. AFAP gives active and Reserve Component Soldiers, Army civilians, retirees, survivors and family members a primary tool to help identify issues and concerns and shape standards of living.

The program identifies critical issues concerning welfare and morale and presents them to senior Army leadership for resolution. Since AFAP was created in 1983, 714 issues have been submitted, resulting in 129 legislative changes, 193 Department of Defense or Army policy changes and 214 improved programs or services. Some examples of AFAP successes Armywide include:

- Service member's Group Life Insurance increased from \$50,000 to \$400,000
- Thrift Savings Plan was authorized
- Creation of the Better Opportunities for Single Soldiers Program

CID launches new crime tips system for web, phones

QUANTICO, Va. – The Army community and American public now have the ability to use their computers and smartphones to submit tips about crimes, suspicious activity or threats to the U.S. Army’s Criminal Investigation Command via a new digital crime tips system.

The CID crime tips system recently transitioned to a web-based and smartphone app submission method. The public can access the system via any Internet-connected device by visiting, <http://www.cid.army.mil/>. In addition to the web interface, the app is for submission of tips and is available for free download from the Apple Store and Google Play at <http://www.p3tips.com/app>.

According to CID’s implementation project manager, Special Agent Christopher L. Adams, the new system provides users a safe, secure and anonymous method to report criminal activity and security threats without concerns of retaliation or fear.

He explained that whenever a person submits a tip online, the completed form is securely transferred directly to Army CID through a Secure Sockets Layer connection, which means that the tips are encrypted, entirely confidential and completely anonymous. Users can also attach images, videos and documents with their tips.

“This new system is the ideal solution for ‘tipsters’ to report criminal activities or suspicious activity anonymously.

“Tips received will be seamlessly assigned to various units for further investigation.



Additionally, persons providing anonymous tips will have the ability to communicate with the CID Agents,” Adams said. “After submitting a tip, a tip reference/ID number is created that allows the tipster to create a password to check the status of the submitted tip or check on the status of a reward – if applicable. So do not misplace your ID number, as it will be needed to check on the status of your tip.”

There is also the multi-language feature for global use that allows tips to be auto-converted into English on the backend regardless of what language they were

submitted. Tips will be responded to in English and auto-translated back to their source language during the two-way dialog process.

According to Christopher Grey, CID’s spokesman, the previous methods of reporting a crime to CID will remain in effect until the new Crime Tips System is fully implemented.

“It is critical for people to say something when they see something and it literally can mean the difference between someone receiving the justice they deserve or victimizing another innocent person,” Grey said.

“Although we prefer people with information to use the new digital Crime Tips system, they can still report a crime through our current methods until these methods are phased out within the next 60 days: contact your local CID office, contact 1-844-ARMY-CID (844-276-9243) or email CID at Army.CID.Crime.Tips@mail.mil.”

Officials warn of increased risk of West Nile Virus in northern Italy

LANDSTUHL, Germany — Public Health Command Europe is urging people in Northern Italy to take extra precautions against mosquito bites this year due to an increased risk of exposure to West Nile Virus.

Health authorities have identified at least 123 human cases of West Nile virus in Emilia-Romagna and Veneto, Italy, between June and Aug. 8. This number increased significantly compared to only five cases identified during the same period in 2017.

The West Nile Virus is transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito, according to PHCE.

"The WNV, Culex species, mosquito is a dusk and dawn biting mosquito and their occurrence around our home is weather dependent," said Maj. Amanda Cline, PHCE's Entomological Science Program chief.

"Mosquitoes will be present in northern Italy as long as the days are warm and there is rainfall, which is typically from April to November. The mosquito population will taper off after a few consecutive freezing nights."

Most infected people who have been bitten by this specific mosquito develop no symptoms. However, a few do. Approximately 20 percent of infected people develop febrile illness characterized by symptoms of fever, headache, body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea and rash.

"Less than one percent of infected individuals develop serious neurologic illness, which can become life-threatening. The virus' symptoms typically appear within two to six days after being bitten, but can develop up to 14 days after exposure," explained Lt. Col. Ruben Ortiz from U.S. Army

Africa Surgeon's office.

Avoid scratching mosquito bites and apply hydrocortisone cream or calamine lotion to reduce itching. Seek medical attention if the symptoms develop within two weeks of being in affected areas.

To avoid mosquito bites, PHCE recommends the following:

- Cover exposed skin by wearing light-colored, long-sleeved shirts, long pants, and hats
- Use insect repellent that contains DEET when outdoors
- Wear a Permethrin-treated military uniform and wear it properly
- Eliminate mosquito breeding sites

by draining standing water around your property

- Make sure door and window screens do not have holes

To keep houses mosquito free, PHCE officials suggest attaching screens on windows and doors and using air conditioning, when available. The reduction, elimination or treatment of mosquito breeding areas is the best and most cost-effective technique for mosquito control.

The most important things community members can do to reduce the risk of exposure to West Nile Virus are to eliminate mosquito-breeding areas in your environment and limit exposure to feeding mosquitoes. Eliminate all standing water in yards and work areas. Check old tires, flower pots, abandoned swimming pools and rain gutters. Change water in pet bowls, birdbaths and children's pools once a week. Mosquito larvae can survive in water the size of a bottle cap.

All issues submitted are considered and worked until resolution, unless they are deemed unattainable. Keep in mind that it may take some time for the results of your issue to be seen.

The “Issue Title” should be a brief summary of the issue or problem, not a sentence. Make sure to be specific — the title should tell the reader what the issue is all about, i.e. “tuition assistance for overseas spouses.”

“Scope” is a clear and concise statement describing the issue, why it’s a problem and whom it affects. The scope should be written in paragraph form (three to four sentences long). State the problem, provide facts or additional information, and say why the issue is important.

Under “Recommendation(s),” list practical recommendations for what you want to happen to “fix” the issue or problem identified in the scope. Use strong action verbs (e.g. provide, conduct, develop, fund, build), and remember there is a limit of three or fewer recommendations per issue.

An example of a well-written recommendation is as follows: “Develop a tuition assistance program for overseas spouses.”

AFAP accepts issues on an ongoing basis; however, to have an issue considered for fiscal year 2018, deadline is Oct. 8.

Policy prohibits improper disposal of waste

VICENZA — The United States Army Garrison Italy commander signed a recycling policy Aug. 20 that refers to Army and Italian regulations concerning proper disposal of recyclable and non-recyclable waste, and implements mandatory solid waste recycling to the maximum extent possible.

Garrison Commander Col. Erik M. Berdy approved the policy that further prohibits improper disposal of recyclable items into a dry waste container; and disposal of waste generated from outside USAG Italy (Darby and Vicenza military communities) into a waste container on any garrison installation.

Command emphasis is being placed on increasing our recycling rates, and this policy is being used as the kickoff for this campaign.

Many people may not know the VMC spends \$2.35 million per year for recycling/refuse collection. By comparison, natural gas costs \$2.15 million annually here. It costs roughly \$2,000 per roll-off for the disposal of non-recyclable (dry waste), while cost for recyclables is approximately \$70.

A 2016 Solid Waste Study showed that 67 percent by volume of Vicenza dry waste is recyclable. One can easily see how maximizing recycling rates can save

USAG Italy a significant amount of money, money that can be better used for mission and community support.

So what is recyclable here in Italy? Practically everything. Items must be segregated into the following categories: umido (food waste) and clean (e.g. not contaminated with food) items including glass, plastic and cans, batteries, and paper. These are collected through USAG

Italy custodial contracts.

Larger items such as electronics can be taken to your municipality or the Caserma Ederle/Del Din eco centers.

At Darby, large items may be brought to the Solid Waste Accumulation Point; and batteries to containers located across from the post office and the Depot Coffee Bar.

Pharmaceutical waste is collected at

the Ederle Medical Clinic, or personnel can bring it to any pharmacy for proper disposal. Eco islands are also located throughout USAG Italy; there you can place separated waste into the proper containers.

Examples for dry waste (non-recyclables) are items such as: rubber, audio and video cassettes, CDs, dishes, cutlery, toys, pens, wax paper, laminated paper, nylon stockings, rags, diapers, sanitary napkins, cosmetics, vacuum cleaner dust, shoes, incandescent light bulbs, and ceramics/porcelain.

The Directorate of Public Works is currently working to procure recycling containers for VMC and DMC offices and barracks, and Villaggio housing. By purchasing these bins, the garrison is making an investment of approximately \$180,000 to better facilitate recycling efforts. The goal is begin distribution of these containers in late October.

Please join us in supporting this important Army sustainability initiative. This will ultimately support the mission, enhance well-being in the community, and protect the environment.

September’s book club choice came about when Caralyn Champa, public services librarian for U.S. Army Garrison Italy, found the book after reading Robinson’s article about Catajo Castle in *Italy Magazine*.

“My mom and I started reading (‘The Best Mud in Italy’) on my Kindle,” said Champa. “When it was time for her to go back home to Minnesota, she asked if she could take my Kindle so she could finish reading the book.”

The librarian was not willing to let her reading device go back to the States, however, so she offered to contact the author to obtain a copy of the book so her mother could finish. After a pleasant exchange, Robinson sent an autographed copy of the book to Champa’s mother at her home in Minnesota, and a friendship between the librarian and the writer was born.

The book is comprised of vignettes about experiences that unfolded as Robinson learned about Italian culture and ways of the Italian people.

Champa added that “Mud” includes “funny anecdotes, charming characters and lots of great tips for travel and exploration in the Veneto region.” She thought the book could help Vicenza Library patrons learn more about the region; thus, the book became a club selection.

With such chapter titles as *Hot Water*

and a Dozen Ways to Cook a Rabbit, Trattoria Tips, and The Grand Dame of Tuscany, “Mud” is an eclectic read that easily worms its way into the hearts of readers — especially those from countries other than Italy who have the experience of day-to-day living here.

Although she studied French and spent much time in France, the writer said she ended up Italy because she was looking for a change.

“I wanted to do something different,” Robinson said. “So I decided to come to Italy. And I wanted to be in an area off the tourist track.”

The small town in the volcanic Euganean Hills offered exactly what she was looking for. With an obsession for visiting spa towns, she ended up in Battaglia Terme, initially, because it was known for having “the best mud in Italy.” Battaglia lies at the easternmost edge of the Hills and has been noted for saline springs and natural vapor grotto since the Middle Ages. (Robinson’s experience with getting a doctor’s prescription for a body treatment that included six buckets of hot mud is a chapter that readers won’t want to miss.)

The town became her home away from home, and its people and her experiences living and traveling gave her plenty of material for what became a body of work that she describes as a “labor of love.”

The writer’s visit to Caserma Ederle was a successful one, as 18 club members (including two newly arrived spouses) were there to greet her.

“It was great fun,” said Champa. “Myra has a charming British accent and sense of humor, and she was tickled by how closely we paid attention to her stories.”

Book club members shared their thoughts about the book and asked Robinson questions about people and locations described in the various stories. No detail was left unexamined by the end of the evening.

Other writers who have participated in library events here are Daniel Wallace (Big Fish), who visited the book club and conducted a writer’s workshop in 2009; and a Skype interview with Bernie Krause (The Great Animal Orchestra) in 2015.

Robinson’s book is available online and at the post library.

Stop, look, listen: Bus safety begins, ends at home

Safe student transportation is one of Department of Defense Education Activity-Europe East District's highest priorities.

The following highlights critical school transportation-related safety protocol and measures to keep students safe and prepared for the daily travel to and from their school.

(1) **LOOK** at and KNOW your children's route to and from the bus stop.

(2) **SHOW** children how to go safely to and from the bus stop. Use hands-on instruction. Cross streets only at designated crossings; do not cross the street between parked cars.

(3) **REVIEW** the five safety rules (below) with your children. Follow up and reinforce.

(4) **STRESS** good behavior on the bus – good behavior and safety go hand-in-hand. Students must present bus passes to the driver when boarding the bus.

(5) **REPORT** safety or security concerns to the school bus office.

Children, particularly in kindergarten through 2nd

grade, need parental supervision to keep them safe. Please take them to and from the bus stop, and wait with them until they have safely boarded the bus. When they return from school, meet them on the same side of the street as the bus stop. Do not wait in a parked car or a

building; do not allow your child to come to you after getting off the school bus.

Important facts for parents to know:

- In Europe, traffic does not stop for loading and unloading school buses. Teach your children this life-saving rule: Never cross in front of or behind a loading or unloading school bus.

- Children are at the greatest risk for accidents and injuries going to and from the bus stop.

Five basic safety rules that prevent most accidents and injuries are as follows:

(1) Be on time. Walk, do not run to the bus stop.

(2) When waiting for the bus, take at least three large steps away from the curb.

(3) Take your seat on the bus and stay in it while the bus is moving. If there are seat belts, buckle up.

(4) When getting off the bus, take three large steps away from the curb and wait for the bus to depart before crossing the street.

(5) Never cross the street in front of or behind the bus.

Measles can be a very serious, even fatal, illness and is especially severe in babies and elderly persons, according to Coldren. Adults and children not vaccinated for measles could be at risk for contracting the illness due to the outbreak.

Two groups of people in the American military community are particularly vulnerable to measles infection:

1. Family members who were not subject to the U.S. immunization schedule as children (for example, foreign-born spouses). To help protect your family when traveling around Europe, PHC recommends that personnel review their vaccination records to ensure everyone is fully vaccinated against measles.

2. Children younger than one year old traveling to high risk areas. Children under one are too young to receive the first regularly scheduled measles vaccine.

This is a concern if they are travelling to an area affected by a measles outbreak. In such cases, U.S. authorities allow for

early administration of the measles vaccine to provide protection until the regular measles series can be started at 12 months of age. This early dose can be given as early as six months. However, the early dose is additional and does not replace the first shot in the normal immunization schedule.

"Measles has been largely eliminated in the United States, with the exception of small, localized outbreaks, so the MMR vaccine isn't normally administered until 12 months of age," said Coldren.

"However, this leaves infants 6-12 months old at risk in areas where the virus is present, because the immunity that was passed on to them from their mothers is generally not effective beyond six months."

For love of the game

Civilian employee umpires in championship Italian 'Super Bowl' game

VICENZA — For 20 years, Mark Turney has moonlighted as an official for sporting events, namely softball, soccer and football. No matter where his career took him, he sought out the local association and signed on.

On July 7, he participated in what has become one of the highlights of that side gig: he was the only American this year to officiate at the “Italian Super Bowl,” in the Division 3 championship game for the *Federazione Italiana di American Football* (FIDAF; in English, the Italian Federation of American Football).

Turney, a Department of the Army civilian who serves as a public affairs specialist and webmaster for United States Army Garrison Italy, said he was especially honored because he was the only American to officiate in the Super Bowl and the league this year, and the only person ever to be a Division 1 White Hat as a first-year official in FIDAF.

“I won’t deny that I was scared to death in those Division 1 games,” Turney said, laughing. “It was an amazing honor. This was 1st Division football and a really big deal here in Italy. Every move we made was going to be televised.”

But years of training and experience had prepared him for it. Turney began officiating unit- and high school-level football in Heidelberg, Germany, in 1988. From there, he moved stateside and joined the football association in whatever town he moved to, including locations in Virginia, New York, Nevada and Georgia. He learned to call NCAA rules and NFL rules, and participated in a variety of training experiences. Such training var-

ies from weekly meetings and clinics, to group talks and annual certification exams. He also spends a lot of time studying rules and preparing for games on his own.

“We (referees/umpires) can never take for granted that we know a rule,” said the Milwaukee, Wisconsin native. “I am always studying, preparing, sharing rules. We have to make split-second decisions on the field, and we have to know the rules cold. I never want to be the reason a team is the victor or the loser.”

That being said, the responsibility of the White Hat is significant. The person who holds that position on the field is legally

responsible for the game, from one hour before and until everyone steps off the field at the end. The responsibility also includes communication with the team of referees before the game, making sure uniforms are correct, assigning positions and more.

Although he has served as White Hat in other places, Turney, who has been living and working in Italy since October 2016, had to work his way up to the position here. It all started by getting in touch with FIDAF through contacts in Germany, and the rest fell into place. Beginning in September 2017, he hit the field as part of a team of referees. He was shuffled around to various locations in Italy, such as Bolzano, Vicenza, Torino and Verona.

“Those games were my proving ground, so to speak,” said Turney. “The association started getting comfortable with

what I brought to the field, and I started going farther and farther out of the area.”

Soon he found himself at games in Bologna, Parma and Trieste, and the levels increased from Division 3 to Division 1. And although he doesn’t speak Italian, it doesn’t prove to be a problem.

“I have not had a game yet where my lack of Italian has been a significant issue. The rules are largely understood,” Turney said. “There are often players who don’t speak English, but there is usually someone who can cross the gap so we can get our point across. We figure it out however we can.”

For the American who loves football, figuring it out is the only solution and why he spends so much of his spare time on the field.

“I love football,” Turney said. “It’s as simple as that. I grew up in a football town, played football as a kid, played in college. I love the game, and I love giving the game to people.”

“When your crew is clicking and the game is firing on all cylinders, it is the most fun you can have in sports. It’s an exciting time when it all works, and when it doesn’t, well, your mistakes are out there for the world to see. You need to own it and move on. Every time you blow a whistle or throw a flag, half of the people there love you and the other half hates you. It teaches you a lot.”

Turney encourages anyone who is interested in becoming involved with the FIDAF to reach out to him if they need assistance in getting in touch with the right contacts. He also recommends studying NCAA rules and going in with a good attitude.

As for his side gig, he plans to participate for as long as he can deliver a quality game.

“When I can’t do it anymore, I’ll hang up the spikes,” he said. But for now — and at least until next season— he’ll ride the high of his experience at the Super Bowl in Italy.
