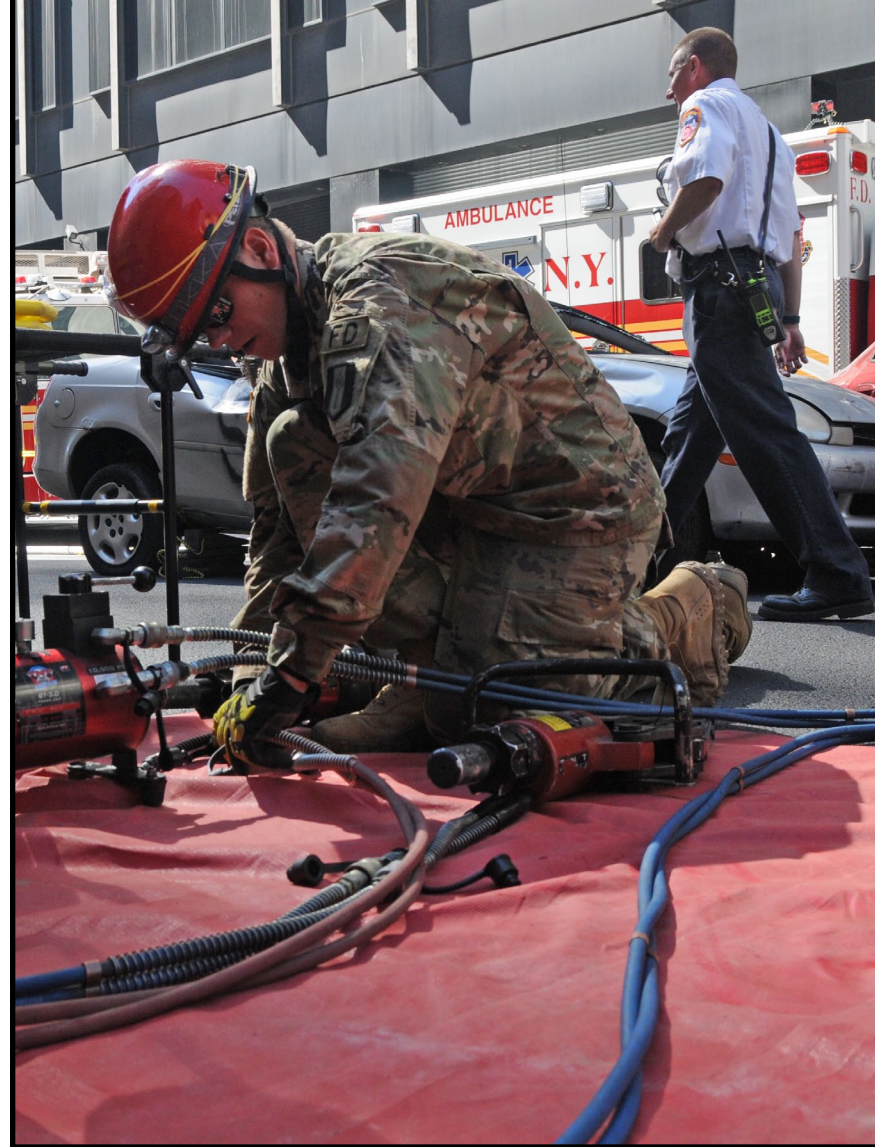
## 468th Firefighting Headquarters partners with FDNY

## Facility Engineering and how it relates to Command Readiness

Facility engineering for functional commands has a dynamic scope lending itself to broad areas of engagement. Commands have a vested interest in ensuring that their needs, opportunities & issues are addressed by the Readiness Division (RD). Direct engagement with the Readiness Divisions staff sections and the functional commands are a necessity.

Operation & Maintenance funding for the U.S. Army Reserve (USAR) is a fraction of the \$72 billion allocated for USAR maintenance that is used to repair aging facilities. Units ensure that the facility meets the mission requirements; which are then reported in the Installation Status Reports (ISR). This tool is used to grade facilities in the ISR and must have input from the tenant units.

Your command is the subject matter expert on mission requirements that support the sustainment model and Ready Force X. The RD is your advocate, but the need for unit participation is critical to fully grasp the reality of how to serve the operational force.

## Improving training readiness

CAMP SHELBY JOINT FORCES TRAINING CENTER, Mississippi -- More than 150 Soldiers from Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 412th Theater Engineer Command (TEC) improved their training readiness here June 7-10, 2018.

The unit's mission was to qualify Soldiers in small arms with maximum effectiveness and to implement facets of the U.S. Army Reserve Ready Force X (RFX): a pool of units tasked with maintaining higher levels of peacetime readiness that offset risks to the nation. RFX units are expected to respond to evolving

threats, and are training for rapid mobilization and deployment on compressed timelines in order to meet requirements of "Fast Fight" formations across several theaters.

TEC Commander, Maj. Gen. Daniel Christian, said the mission was successful. "We're a Ready Force headquarters. Should a conflict occur, wherever it occurs, we can stand up this unit in the time that's allotted to us; do it accurately; do it well."

Christian noted the training was in line with RFX standards.

Throughout the event, Soldiers qualified with their assigned weapons, either a M4 rifle or M9 semi-automatic pistol, honed their marksmanship skills on the Electronic Skills

Trainer, and several had the opportunity to familiarize fire the M2 .50 caliber machine gun.

The capabilities of Camp Shelby were essential to the mission's overall success, said Christian.

"We've merely touched on the basic capabilities Camp Shelby can provide. I'm looking forward to the next building block."

He represented the U.S. Army Reserve (USAR) in the Department of the Army 2018 Best Warrior competition at Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia Sept. 30-Oct. 4, 2018. Sgt. Chase Craig representing the 84th Training Command won the NCO of the Year honor.

Munday advanced to the USAR Best Warrior competition by winning for the TEC in the Major Command-level Best Warrior Competition at Devens Reserve Forces Training Area, Massachusetts, April 15-19, 2018. Sgt. Christian Cieslak, 382nd Engineer Company, 365th Engineer Battalion, 411th Eng. Bde. won the TEC's NCO of the Year honor.

Munday, who has been in America's Army Reserve since April, 2016, said sleep deprivation and attempting to execute all the tasks under that condition challenged him the most in both competitions.

He said he owes his success to talking to fellow Soldiers and competitors. Case in point: Munday said he asked Craig several questions because Craig is a former active Army infantryman.

"I definitely learned more from those around me in every competition," said Munday.

# Engineer Battalion makes history on Fort Knox ranges

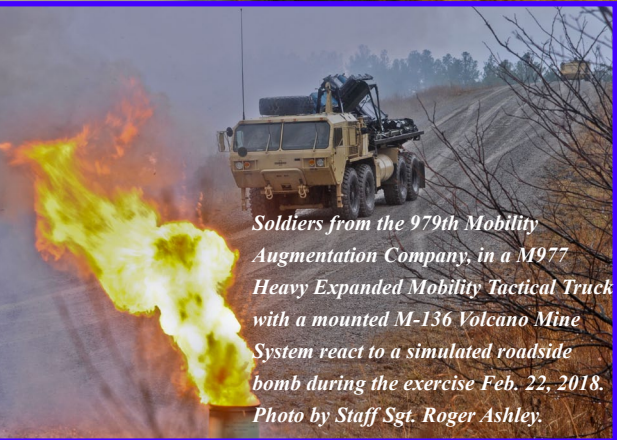
FORT KNOX, Ky., -- Soldiers from the U.S. Army Reserve's 478th Engineer Battalion, 412th Theater Engineer Command (TEC), based in Fort Thomas, Kentucky, made history on a range here Feb. 4-23, 2018.

The battalion's four mobility augmentation companies earned T2 Training certification after being certified in GATE III — a section-level gunnery and Engineer Qualification Tables (EQTs) X through X11, which includes the firing of inert Mine Clearing Line Charges, or MICLCs.

Unit officials said this is the first time a TEC battalion has accomplished such a feat.

Battalion Commander Lt. Col. Andrew S. # Firefighting Headquarters supports Miami-Dade Fire Rescue in Joint Training Exercise

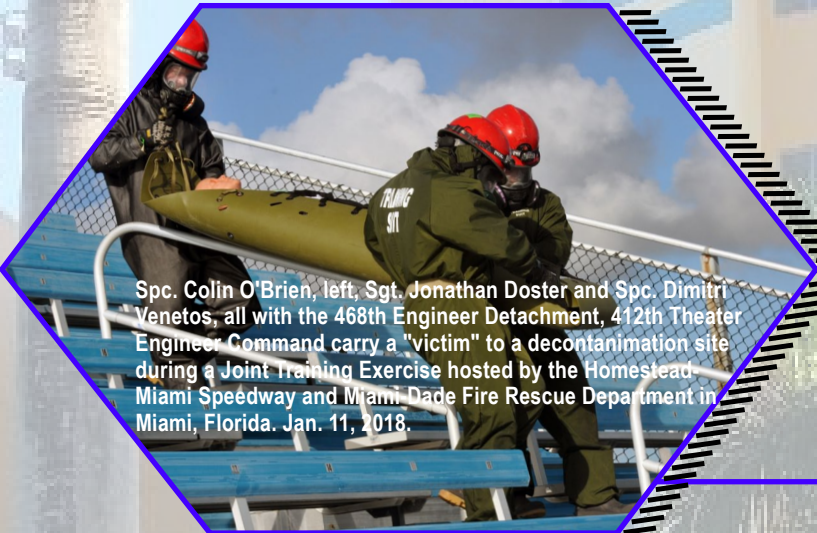
HOMESTEAD, Fla., -- Coordination between the Miami-Dade Fire Rescue (MDFR) and Active Army and U.S. Army Reserve Command (USARC) Chemical Biological Radiological and Nuclear (CBRN) teams, including the 468th Engineer Detachment (Firefighting Headquarters), saved lives in a simulated biohazard explosion at the Homestead Speedway near here, Jan. 11, 2018.

The MDFR set up decontamination sites for itself and the Army units which allowed teams like the Detachment's Urban Search and Rescue teams to respond to the scene even quicker.

"We can't send rescuers into the hot-zone until that is set

up so instead of having to wait until our own decontamination team set up their equipment we were able to push Soldiers out much faster," noted Capt. Samuel Turner, the detachment commander. "This type of coordination is the cornerstone of mutual aid. Anything we can do to support and facilitate each other ultimately supports the saving of lives."

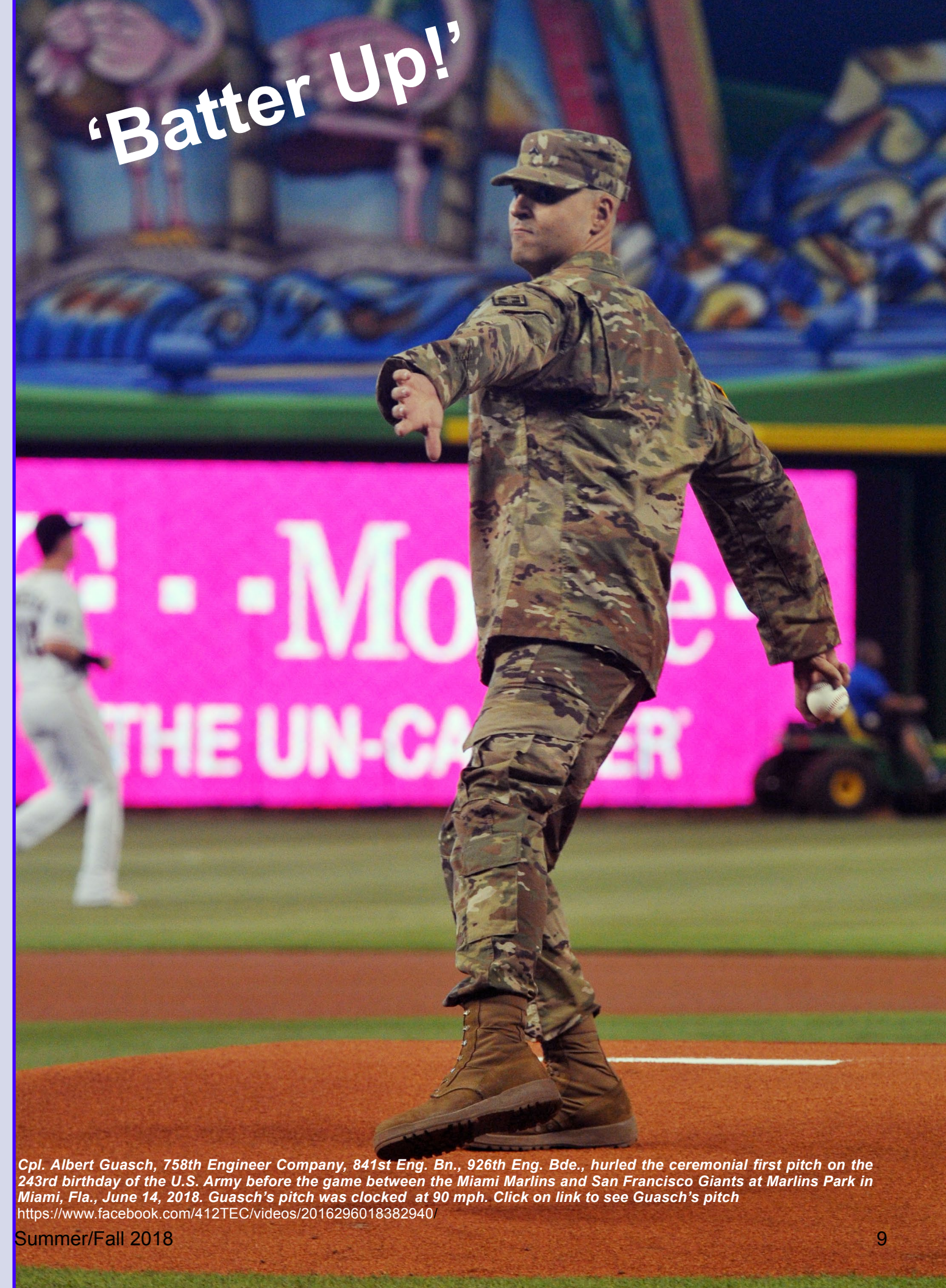

# Launched into history

First female officer to command  
USAR Mobility Augmentation  
Company

FORT KNOX, Ky., -- A loud blast followed by flames shooting underneath a trailer towed by a M113 Armored Personnel Carrier (APC) sent dirt and rocks flying in all directions on a range here in February, 2018. Soaring into the air was a solid-fuel rocket launched from an inert M58 Mine Clearing Line Charge or MICLIC on the trailer. To put this weapon in perspective, an armed MCLIC carries a several hundred-foot long cord of 1,750 pounds of C4 explosives and creates pathways as wide as semi-trailers in minefields.

This launch shook that buttoned-down APC of the 449th Mobility Augmentation Company (MAC) commanded by this female U.S. Army Reserve (USAR) officer. Little did Capt. Amanda Duffy know that months later, she was going to be launched into history.

Duffy, who agreed the launch really shook the APC, made history after becoming the first USAR female officer selected as a MAC commander. A MAC "clears the way for maneuver units" with missions like assault gap crossings, mounted and dismounted breaches and emplacing obstacles.

LA PAZ, El Salvador -- U.S. Army Reserve (USAR) Soldiers in the 390th and 380th Engineer Companies, both of the 844th Engineer Battalion, 926th Engineer Brigade, based in Chattanooga and Greenville, Tennessee, constructed the El Amate School Center here from May through the end of July as part of Beyond the Horizon 2018 (BTH).

Beyond the Horizon is a combined readiness exercise between U.S. Army South and El Salvador providing medical campaigns and construction projects for communities throughout the La Paz Department in the Central American country. It brings together active Army, USAR and Army National Guard service members from across the United States alongside host nation partners all working in unison to bring vital services and resources to rural communities.

Said Col. Israel Romero, Commander of Combined Joint Task Force (CJTF) Hope, "This was a collective success across all services and Components."

BTH, conducted annually, is part of [U.S. Army South](#) and [U.S. Southern Command's](#) (SOUTHCOM) humanitarian and civic assistance program. Army South has planned and conducted BTHs since 2008 in the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Honduras and Belize. U.S. personnel from the Army Reserve, National

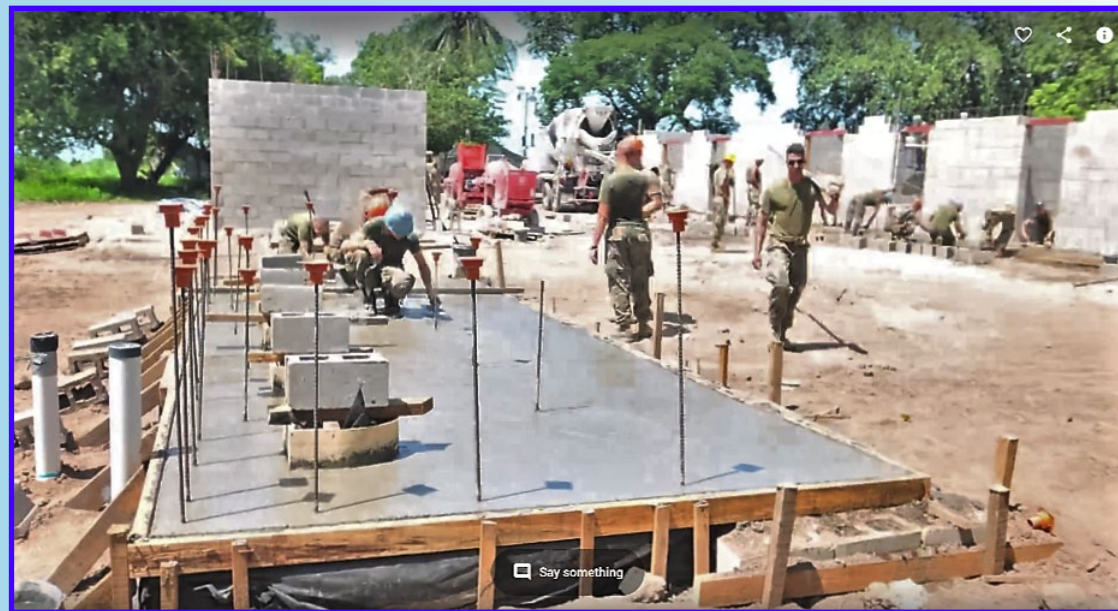

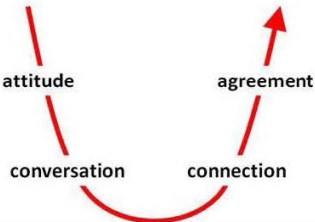
