The class, taught by Soldiers of the 4th Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division at Combat Support Center Cedar near the base here, was part of an ongoing partnership with the Muthanna Province's Tactical Security Unit in southern Iraq.

"This training has helped my (people) get vital situational training from experienced leaders," said Capt. Majid, the company commander of the TSU policemen.

During the two-week training, the 2nd Battalion, 12th Cavalry Regiment, also called the Thunder Horse Battalion, instructed the policemen in combat life-saver techniques and react to contact, escalation-of-force, reflexive fire and

Local citizens, contractors, Iraqi Police and Soldiers from the 2nd Combined Arms Battalion, 8th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, and the 110th Military Police Company celebrated the headquarters opening ceremony.

"They went from sharing an office to operating out of their own building," said 1st Lt. David Faulkner, 2nd Platoon Leader, 110th MP Co., attached to 2nd BCT.

Faulkner works with eight stations encompassing two districts of Diwaniya.

"It allows better facilities for Iraqi Police to focus on their training in a more conducive environment and allows a shorter distance of travel for each of the outlying stations," said Faulkner.

The central location also allows the headquarters better command and control, as well as coordinating the collective police force in the entire district.

The headquarters was built by Iraqi contractors and workers with coordination through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and Iraqi government.

The 2nd BCT began a working relationship with all the local Iraqi Security Forces after their arrival in September to Diwaniya, and the 110th MP Co. has been working with the IP for several months.

"Overall, we're advancing in our relations with them to further professionalize the Iraqi Police force," said Faulkner, a Detroit resident. "It's a great opportunity to share our ideas of policing to enhance their way of doing things."

"It's been a learning experience on both sides," added Sgt. William Teal, team leader, 2nd

Plt., 110th MP Co., and police transition team leader for two of the stations in the district.

He says the overall experience has been rewarding for the IPs, the MPs and for himself personally.

"Our mission with the IPs is to help them better their system," said Teal, a Nashville, Tenn. resident. "I'm here to help the country better itself and help the country stand on its own two feet."

also scheduled for a six-month rotation

"You had many great accomplishments over the last six months and made huge positive impacts both for the Iraqi people and toward the success of the Coalition Forces," said Lt. Col. Mark Nelson, deputy commander of the 4th Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division and a native Orem, Utah. "Simply put, this is a great day for Romania, a great day for the Iraqi Security Forces in Southern Iraq and a great day for the Iraqi people."

Located on Contingency Operating Base Adder near Nasiriyah, the 26th Inf. Bn. will conduct missions in the Dhi Qar province working with the 4th BCT, 1st Cav. Div., Long Knife Brigade. The 26th Inf. U.S. News:

WASHINGTON - Looking for happiness — it's family-friendly communities for some, tropical paradise or the rugged West for others. A survey of Americans' wellbeing, conducted by Gallup in partnership with Healthways and America's Health Insurance Plans, gives high marks to Utah, which boasts lots of outdoor recreation for its youthful population. Speaking of outdoor recreation, the islands of Hawaii took second place and Wyoming was third in the poll that rated such variables as mental, physical and economic health. But fun outdoors obviously wasn't the only criteria — "wild, wonderful" West Virginia was ranked last among the states. The Bluegrass State of Kentucky was 49th, with Mississippi 48th on the list. In general, highest well-being scores came from states in the West while the lowest were concentrated in the South. The happiest congressional districts were some of the wealthiest, while the lowest scores came in some of the poorest.

Science News:

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Seven astronauts raced to the international space station aboard space shuttle Discovery on Monday, while NASA debated whether the orbiting outpost will need to move aside to dodge a piece of space junk. Space station astronauts had a close call last week with a small piece of orbiting junk that passed nearby, and NASA said Monday that a piece of a Russian satellite could come within about half a mile of the station early Tuesday. NASA will decide later Monday whether to fire the space station's engines to nudge the complex out of the path of the debris.

Odd News:

HUDSON, Ohio - A woman's postcard bearing greetings from Montana has finally arrived in northeastern Ohio -47 years later. Insurance agent Dave Conn opened his post office box in the community of Hudson last week and found the mailing sent from Helena, Mont., in 1962. It was sent to Marion White, the previous renter of the box, who had died in 1988. The writer signed the postcard "Fran" and mentioned having "had a marvelous time in Montana." After asking around, Conn says he determined the card must have come from White's well-traveled friend Frances Murphey, a longtime reporter at the Akron Beacon Journal. She died in 1998 at age 75. U.S. Postal Service spokesman Victor Dubina says the postcard may have been stuck in equipment or lost behind a mail chute.
