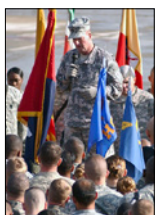

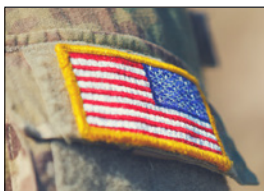

FORT CAMPBELL, Ky. — The historic and accomplished 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) welcomed its 47th commanding general today, as Maj. Gen. Andrew Poppas relinquished command to Maj. Gen. Brian Winski.

Under Poppas' leadership, the 101st Abn. Div. deployed Soldiers to combat, contingency and peacekeeping missions around the world, to include Operation Inherent Resolve in Iraq, Operation Freedom's Sentinel in Afghanistan, dozens of training and partnership missions on the African and European continents, and hurricane and disaster relief missions in Puerto Rico and the U.S. He spoke to the thousands of "Screaming Eagle" Soldiers, Veterans and community

members who assembled for the ceremony at Fort Campbell's parade field.

"We know that this division exists to fight and win our nation's wars," said Poppas. "And that's been true since our inception in 1942 in Camp Claiborne, Louisiana, as we were born in the maelstrom of World War II, as we moved forward into Korea, Vietnam and all the way through the Gulf War to our current fights; we continue that legacy today with the past 18 years of continuous combat."

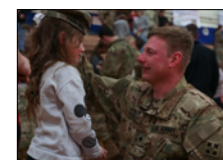
Most recently, Poppas and 250 Soldiers from the division's headquarters returned from a nine-month deployment to Afghanistan, where they served at the fore of the conditions-based U.S. South Asia Strategy and the NATO-led, 41-nation Resolute Support mission.

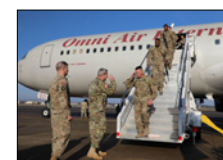
