'Quarterhorse' navigates new terrain in Poland




SWIETOSZOW, Poland – Cavalry Scouts assigned to 1st Squadron, 4th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division tested the Polish terrain and honed their skills during a training exercise here, April 2-4, 2019.





Quarter Cav Soldiers earn their spurs






2-34 brings American firepower to European partners



guns. The Platoon practiced reconnaissance and initial occupation of a firing point. Increasingly difficult missions were being sent down to ensure a first time go for Table 12.


After the completion of the fire missions the platoon tactically maneuvered to the next firing point. There they underwent more variables to training.
